EMBEZZLEMENT CASE CALLED FOR TRIAL, IS POSTPONED; ORIGINATED IN THIS COUNTY

The case styled State of Texas vs. Horace Walker, in which Walker is charged by indictment with embezzlement, was called for trial in District Court in Breckenridge Monday morning. However, for some reason, not known to us, the case was postponed. New trial date has been set for October 22.

This case originated in Eastland county, where Walker is charged with the embezzlement of county funds. The alleged shortage was discovered at a time when Walker was employed by the county to collect delinquent taxes. The case, originally called for trial and trial date set for September 19, was transferred to Stephens county. The case has had statewide attention and is being closely watched.

Walker is facing trial on five criminal counts, as well as a civil suit.

No Gas Shortage In Near Future, Chapman States

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 9 (UP)—Secretary of Interior Oscar L. Chapman says he does not believe gasoline rationing will be necessary in the near future unless the steel shortage curtails oil drilling. Chapman, here for a Democratic party dinner for members from 11 western states, was scheduled to leave today for Beaumont, to address the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

He said the steel shortage might cut down drilling activity and force "a rationing situation to arise," but barring that possibility, the nation should have all the petroleum it needs for both military and civilian uses.

The normal marketing petroleum process has been upset, Chapman said, by the seizure of the Anglo-Iranian refineries in Iran, which meant a loss to the world of 500,000 barrels of crude oil a day.

"Iran's Abadan refineries provided part of the million barrels of oil imported daily by the United States to make up the deficit between our daily production of 6,000,000 barrels and our 7,000,000 barrel-a-day consumption," he said.

"Some have suggested we need 50,000 new wells drilled this year," he said, "but if there is a shortage of steel pipe, we won't be able to hit that goal."

Chapman said he was urging a greater allocation of steel for the petroleum industry because "our whole military effort would collapse without oil."

Small Mountain Supplies Needed For Treatment

CHICAGO, Oct. 9 (UP)—Five persons and a small mountain of medical supplies would be needed to treat a single atomic bomb victim, a Navy expert said today.

LT. Allen W. Kenney, safety officer of the U. S. Navy Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, told the American Society of Safety Engineers that these things would be required to treat a person burned over 40 per cent of his body:

Forty-two tanks of oxygen; 36 pints of plasma; 40 pints of blood; 100 pints of other fluids, an undetermined amount of antibiotics; 27 miles of gauze; 3 nurses and 2 physicians.

AGREEMENT ON NEW SITE FOR TALKS REVIVES PEACE HOPES

UN ADVANCE BASE, Munsan, Korea, Oct. 9 (UP)—Agreement on Pan Mun Jom as the site for resumption of the Korean armistice talks revived hopes today for an early cease-fire agreement.

Some observers predicted a "stop-shooting" agreement within 30 days, or at most before winter grips the fighting front.

They pointed to a note of compromise on the site of the conference and a softer tone in the last Communist message to Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway. It was this message which proposed Pan Mun Jom for resumption of the talks. Ridgway agreed to the new

Out-Of-State Governors Are Coming To Fair

DALLAS, Oct. 9 (UP)—Dallas this week will become almost as lush with governors as was Gatlinburg, Tenn., last week with chief executives from at least five states scheduled to take in the annual State Fair of Texas.

Gov. Allan Shivers of Texas, Gov. Johnston Murray of Oklahoma and Gov. Forrest Smith of Missouri were all expected here Tuesday.

Gov. Dan Thornton of Colorado and Gov. Howard Pyle of Arizona have said they'll arrive Wednesday, in time for speeches by Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, D., Tex., and Defense Mobilization Director Charles E. Wilson.

Encouraged by brisk, autumn weather, Texans are streaming into the 187-acre fairground at a faster clip than ever before.

Through Monday, 398,222 persons had passed through the gates, 37,709 more than a comparable period last year. Monday's attendance amounted to 47,791.

Among other things, today was American Hereford Association Day, Texas Cotton Ginners Day, Veterans Day, Hillsboro and Hill County Day, Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders Association Day, South Plains Day and Lubbock at the exposition.

Peace Justice Ruling Stops Texas Rangers

GALVESTON, Oct. 9 (UP)—Texas Rangers were blocked from destruction of 106 confiscated slot machines today because of a Justice of the Peace court ruling saying the gadgets weren't gambling devices after the payoff mechanism was removed.

Justice of the Peace James L. McKenna made the ruling yesterday and directed the Rangers to return the machines to the Wiley & Nichols warehouse where they were seized Sept. 13.

McKenna said the state failed to show the machines were gambling devices during hearings Sept. 25. Attorneys for the machine owners also contended the new state law banning slot machines is unconstitutional. McKenna said it was beyond his providence to rule on that question.

Fort Worth Strikers Face Job Loss

FORT WORTH, Oct. 9 (UP)—Some 200 striking trash disposal workers faced an ultimatum today to end their strike or be fired.

The workers have stayed off their jobs in protest to the city's new hourly system of pay. They said such a system would penalize them during bad weather when they couldn't work.

The city council late Monday said that employees would not be permitted to "dictate" policies of the city government. The council's ultimatum followed a prediction by Public Works Director C. M. Thelmin last week that if the workers struck they probably would lose their jobs.

In a note delivered to the Communists at Pan Mun Jom at 8 a.m. today (6 p.m. Monday EST), Pan Mun Jom will replace Kaesong, five miles to the northwest, where the Reds broke off the truce talks Aug. 23.

The Communists advised that a message from the Red command would be delivered at Pan Mun Jom at 8 a.m. Wednesday (6 p.m. today EST). It was believed to be the Communist negotiator.

Eight different flocks totaling over 5,000 birds are included for inspection on the first annual Eastland County Turkey Tour scheduled for Friday, October 19, according to word from the County Agent's office in Eastland.

Flocks to be visited on the day tour include those of Alvin Kinesid, north of Cisco, W. B. Starr, Scranston; J. Elmo Smith, Pioneer; Cecil Carr, Rising Star; Rupe Miles, R. O. Buckley and J. H. Tidwell all of Desdemona and Mrs. John Thurman of the Staff Community. Both Baby Beef Bronze and Beltsville White turkeys are being grown and will be seen at one or more of the places it was said.

The group will leave from the City Hall in Eastland promptly at 9:30 o'clock that morning and the tour is expected to be completed around 4:30 o'clock that afternoon with time out for lunch at a cafe in Rising Star. The flocks are widely scattered and over 125 miles will be written on the tour by those making the complete round.

Turkey growers and breeders, buyers, feed men and others interested in the turkey industry in the country are cordially invited to participate on the tour. Women as well as men are invited.

Mrs. John Thurman, J. H. Tidwell, J. Elmo Smith and P. C. Spenny served on a committee along with J. M. Cooper, County Agricultural Agent to plan the tour at a meeting at the high school in Carbon recently.

Commission Rules Football Is A Big Business

DENVER, Oct. 9 (UP)—The Colorado Industrial Commission took an official stand today that collegiate football is "big business" and the relation between school and athlete is "that of employer and employee."

Commission Referee David F. How, Jr., ruled yesterday that Ernest E. Nemeth, former Denver University gridder, was, in effect, an employee of the university and therefore entitled to disability pay which may exceed \$1,000 plus medical expenses.

How ruled that Nemeth, 24, be paid a total of \$178.05 for a three-month period of total disability and his weekly "salary" until otherwise ordered for temporary disability. He also ruled that his medical expenses, up to \$1,000, be paid.

Nemeth, a stocky 190-pound ex-guard, was injured during spring practice in 1950. Unable to work at his part-time university job because of a dislocated vertebral disc, he filed a disability claim with the London Accident and Guarantee Co., Ltd., which carries a blanket insurance policy on all university employees. When the London Company denied his claim, Nemeth filed the Industrial Commission claim.

During the Industrial Commission hearing, Nemeth testified that a \$50-a-month part-time job free training-table meals and free board depended solely on his ability to make the varsity team.

Civil Defense Worker Speaks To Rotarians

With Lewis E. Berry, of Austin, Supervisor of Public Safety and Civil Defense Education of the Texas Department of Public Safety, as guest speaker at the noon-day luncheon of the Eastland Rotary club, the meeting proved to be one of the most outstanding for some months.

Rotarians entertained the local Lions Club, as well as a number of Rotarians and others from Cisco. Mrs. Virgil Seaberry sang the national anthem and received a very hearty applause from the audience and special mention from the guest speaker.

Following introduction of visitors and an announcement that the club had donated \$25.00 to a fund to defray expenses on Eastland's band's trip to the State Fair in Dallas, the meeting was turned over to the guest speaker who was introduced by City Manager I. C. Heck.

Mr. Berry stated that despite many wild stories, largely produced by fiction writers, concerning the "A" bomb, that the matter is a very serious one, and that such a thing as an all-out attack is not only possible, but likely very probable. In Eastland areas and similar areas, direct attack may not be as great as in metropolitan areas, but citizens in rural areas and smaller cities should be just as interested in education along the lines of protection as their brothers in the great cities, he said.

That America is to be on the receiving end of bomb attacks is almost sure, Mr. Berry said. But with attacks, only those in close range will suffer burns or may be death, so this safety campaign is being waged to teach us how to render aid to others as well as to protect ourselves.

The speaker also mentioned the dangers which might follow an explosion. Flying and shattered glass and other debris could spell havoc and may be result in the loss of many lives.

A safety film was also shown, depicting the ways and means for aiding the injured.

Mr. Berry was with the Metropolitan Police in Washington for 6 years, and is a recent graduate of the Federal Civil Defense Administration staff college at Olney, Md. He also received training at a Civil Defense Instructors course at Oklahoma A&M College at Stillwater, Okla.

Mr. Berry was flown from Austin this morning by Texas Ranger, Max Westerman.

Dallas Forms Club For "Ike"

DALLAS, Oct. 9 (UP)—Officers for a new Texas-for-Eisenhower Club were opened in downtown Dallas today with the purpose of organizing support for Gen. Dwight Eisenhower's nomination for president in 1952.

Mrs. Allie M. Currie, active Republican Party leader in Dallas County, said the "rank and file" of Texans want the general elected but "he's got to be nominated by a political party" first. She said the club hopes to make its influence felt at the Texas GOP convention next May.

Cab Driver Electrocuted

HUNTSVILLE, Oct. 9 (UP)—Houston cab driver Albert Edwards was electrocuted early today, the fourth time he was scheduled to die for the murder two years ago of Paul Walker.

Though he wasn't successful in his fourth attempt at getting a reprieve, Edwards did succeed in delaying the execution until 12:45, more than a half hour later than executions normally are carried out at the State Prison.

Remembering three other last-minute reprieves, prison officials did not prepare Edwards for his death until after they received word from Federal Judge James V. Allred at Houston that a writ of habeas corpus for the condemned man had been denied at a special night session.

After he was prepared, Edwards asked for another private conference with the prison chaplain. He then walked calmly into the death chamber and delivered a barely-audible statement, which night warden Marcus Heath said consumed 14 minutes.

Edwards was condemned to death for shooting Walker who was seated in a car with Edwards' estranged wife, Betty Lou. Mrs. Edwards was also slain at the time.

Jones Case Is Docketed in Eastland Court

A case styled Ruth Leggett Jones No. 17,497A vs. The First National Bank in Dallas, recently tried in the 42nd District Court in Abilene, of which J. R. Black is presiding judge, has been appealed, and has been docketed in the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals, in Eastland. However, no date has been set for a hearing.

The case, because of the prominence of the litigants and the amount of money involved, is attracting widespread attention. It has to do with the will and property settlement of the late Percy Jones of Abilene, millionaire businessman and railroad owner; he formerly being president of the Abilene Southern Railway.

Korea, Oct. 9 (UP)—Fanatic Reds battled attacking U. S. troops to a standstill on two vital ridges in east-central Korea today. Another American unit captured a strategic hill in an adjacent sector, however. On the western front, the U. S. 1st Cavalry Division smashed ahead more than a mile against mounting resistance. (In Tokyo, the U. S. Navy announced that two of its warships were damaged near Hungnam on the northeast Korean coast last week-end.)

(It said eight men were killed and 19 others injured when the destroyer U. S. S. Ernest G. Small struck a mine. A Washington announcement said a ninth man had died. Tokyo also said the auxiliary minesweeper Ams 10 Fire Crest

Former Wife Of Elliot Roosevelt Wants A Divorce

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Oct. 9 (UP)—Elliot Roosevelt's first wife was seeking to shed her third husband today on the grounds that he turned out to be a fortune hunter.

The wealthy Mrs. Elizabeth Donner Hanson's suit, charging extreme cruelty, claimed that Rev. Benedict H. Hanson wanted her to:

1. Make large monetary contributions to the church.
2. Provide a \$3,000 annual allowance for his mother.
3. Provide a "substantial yearly allowance," as has been done for the spouses of several rich wives, including Barbara Hutton.

The Hansons were married in June, 1947, and were separated in the fall of last year. Mrs. Hanson asked the court for custody of their three-year-old child.

Iran Oil Will Not Go To Reds, Preier Says

UNITED NATIONS, Oct. 9 (UP)—Hossein Fatemi, vice premier of Iran, pledged today that his country's oil will not fall into Soviet hands because of the dispute which Britain has brought to the United Nations.

While Mohammed Mossadeq, the 76-year-old Iranian Premier, exhausted by his 33-hour plane trip from Tehran, rested at the New York hospital for his Thursday appearance before the Security Council, his 34 year old aide and chief adviser said in an exclusive interview:

"Britain has sought to spread false propaganda that Iran will fall or be pushed into the Soviet orbit if her demands are not satisfied. I do not think the National Front Movement (the gov-

HOUSTON, Oct. 9 (UP)—The international romance of a Texas playboy that spanned three continents showed signs today of turning into a King-size matrimonial quiz show.

The "former" wife of Sheppard King III arrived home here from Paris, France, last night and denied she had remarried the oil heir last June, as Kaufman County records indicated.

King, travelling in the opposite direction, arrived in Cairo, Egypt and prepared to become a Moslem so he can marry Samia Gamal, the Egyptian belly dancer he met in a Paris nightclub.

But in Dallas, Judge Robert Hall said he had remarried King and Gloria, the wife whom he was divorced from in 1950, last June 2. An executed marriage license was on file in neighboring Kaufman County where it was issued two days before their "remarriage."

Patricia said at the airport she was headed for home "to tell her mother all about this affair." She dismissed questions about King's remarriage, saying—"I don't know—I'm only his sister."

Barkley Indicates He And Truman To Run Again In '52

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 9 (UP)—Vice President Alben W. Barkley implied last night that he and President Truman will be the Democratic standard bearers in 1952 "to preserve Democracy."

In an impassioned, hour-long speech to Democrats from 11 western states at a \$100-a-plate campaign fund-raising dinner, Barkley urged party members to stand squarely on the "magnificent record of performance" of the Truman administration.

At the conclusion of the text of his prepared speech, he said "no

president and vice president ever have worked more closely together than Harry S. Truman and I."

"We will stand on our record next year. We ask the people for another lease of power to preserve Democracy."

Some party members assumed that by "we," Barkley meant himself and the president, but others believed he referred only to the party. The vice president did not enlarge on the reference.

He said the current administration's record was one of "unmatched accomplishment."

Escapace Back In Jail; With His Wife This Time

TEXARKANA, Oct. 9 (UP)—A fleet-footed Arkansas native who escaped yesterday by leaping out of a sheriff's car was back in jail today, along with his wife.

Sheriff W. E. Davis said J. E. Burns, 33, of Corning, Ark., bolted from the car while being taken to the Western Union office to sign for a money order. The

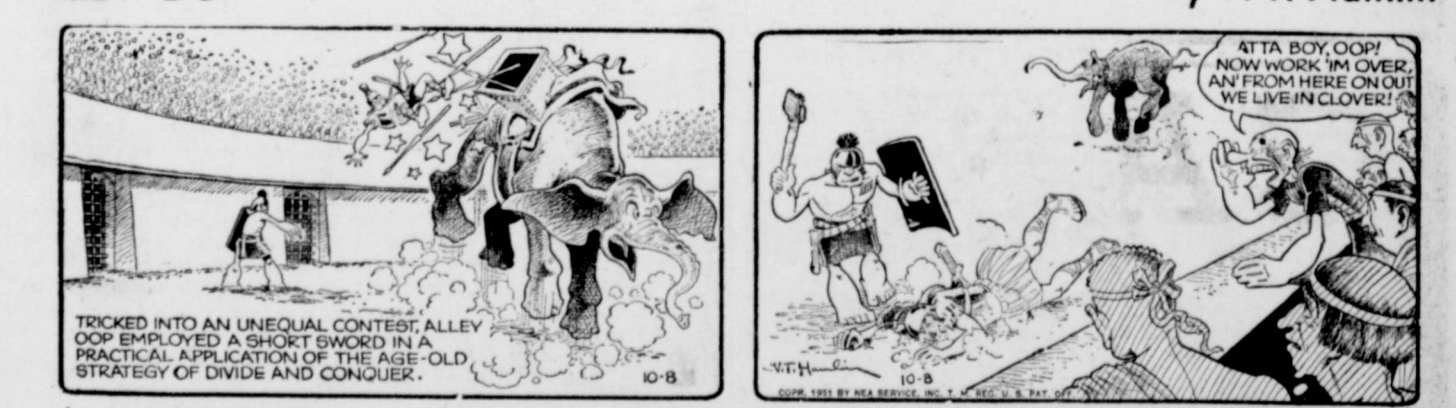

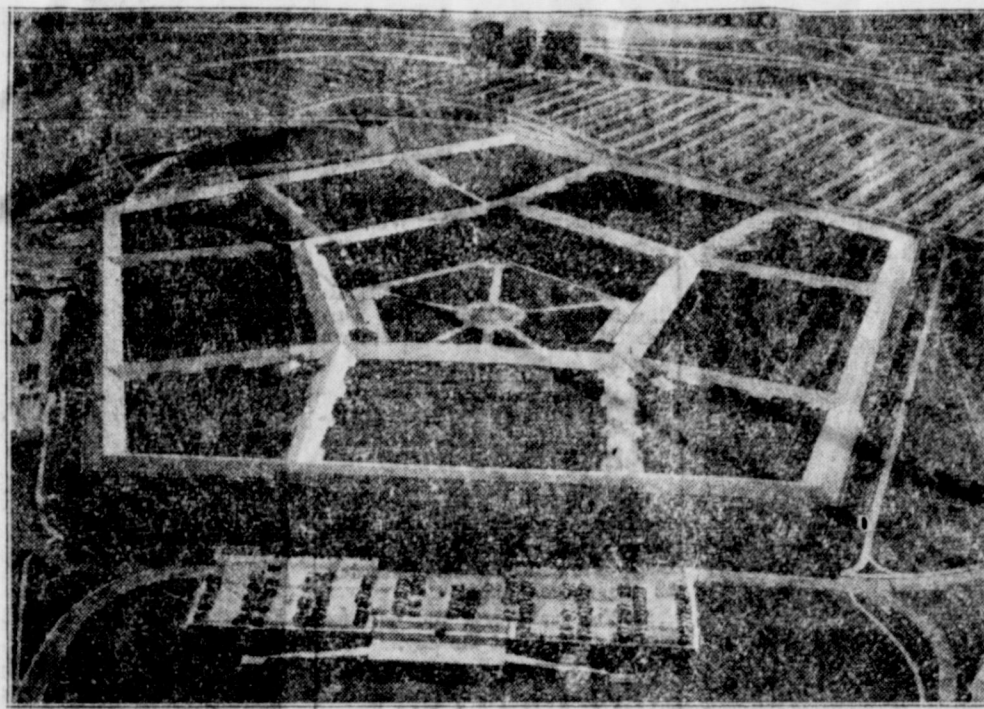

FIRST DECADE OF THE PENTAGON—The Pentagon, headquarters of the Department of Defense, the world's largest office building is now in its tenth year. Construction was begun in September, 1941. The building covers 24 acres. It has five floors, a mezzanine, a basement, and a sub-basement. The National Capitol would fit into one of its wedge-shaped sections. Framework of the Pentagon is steel reinforced concrete. Outside exposed walls are of monolithic architectural concrete. The mile-around perimeter wall is faced with limestone. It was ready for occupancy in October, 1942.

The corridors of the Pentagon are 17 1/2 miles long. The Department of Defense telephone system, operating 39,000 telephones and staffed with 200 persons, is the largest branch exchange in the world. A system of this size normally would provide service for a city of more than 200,000 residents. The building has complete banking service, medical and dental clinics, post offices, barber shop, uniform and laundry shop, florist, bakery, cafeteria and dining rooms, a department store, drug store and a book store. Daytime population of the Pentagon now exceeds 30,300. Peak daytime strength during World War II was 27,000 in April 1945.

Insult Of Cow Caused Chicago Fire In 1871

CHICAGO, Oct. 9 (UP)—A 92-year-old lady who ought to know says it was an oyster stew that made Mrs. O'Leary's cow kick over the lantern that burned Chicago down.

Mrs. Sarah Bates, who lived next door to the O'Leary's at the time, came forward with her version yesterday, 80 years to the day after the poor cow suffered her famous hot foot.

According to Mrs. Bates, a boarder at the O'Leary's threw a party for a new arrival from Ireland. Oyster stew was on the menu and that required lots of milk.

The cow had already been milked once that day. When Mrs. O'Leary came out again with the pail, Bossy got peeved and tipped over the lantern.

U. S. Atomic Weapons Far From Outmoded; Says Army Secretary

BEAUMONT, Oct. 9 (UP)—The United States army is in no danger of becoming outmoded in the fields of atomic weapons, guided missiles "and other advanced weapons," Secretary of the Army Frank Pace, Jr., said last night.

"While we have hastened to put weapons into mass production, we have been careful not to put a 'freeze' on new ideas for improved weapons and equipment," he said.

Recently, I visited a number of our proving grounds where the latest weapons are tested. I can report to you that the Army is in no danger of becoming outmoded because of failure to keep up with the times."

Pace's statement came near the end of a prepared speech on "the pattern of our defenses" made before a meeting of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association. Speakers today included Secretary of the Interior Oscar Chapman.

While Pace made no reference to Russia's progress in the field of atomic warfare, many of his listeners interpreted the statement to be a direct answer to Premier Josef Stalin's recent confirmation of successful atomic detonations in Russia.

In a review of this country's

attempts to halt the spread of Communist Aggression, Pace said the U. S. has laid down a "pattern of defense" based on the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, stepped up defense preparations in the Pacific, including bilateral treaties with New Zealand, Australia and the Philippines, and the United Nations' action in Korea.

"Korea marked a significant milestone in the relations of the free world," he said. "In Korea we gave an affirmative answer to the direct challenge of physical aggression."

In the war, he said, "The NATO army is a living reality."

"Nothing will make our collective defense efforts work so well as the growing confidence of the people who live within the shadow of the Soviet empire that the defenses are strong."

Northern Hemisphere residents think of the aurora as the "northern light", or aurora borealis. There is also an aurora australis, or "southern lights."

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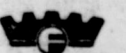
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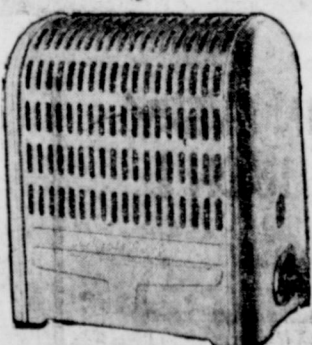

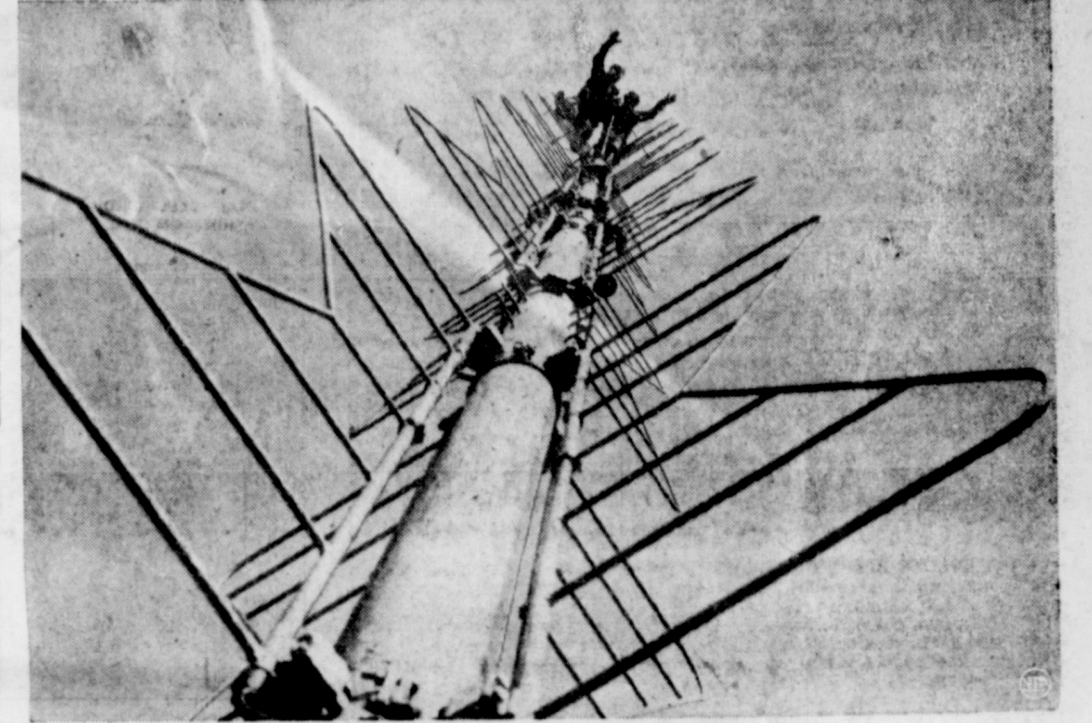

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Wrong Idea On Antelope Hunt

AUSTIN, Oct. — The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said some reaction to the Texas method of hunting antelope in the Big Bend country indicates need for those who have not hunted pronghorns to try their hand at it.

He said the opinion of some persons who have not participated in the short shoot of the fleet West Texas game animals seems to sense similarity "to shooting fish in a barrel."

"It's not that easy," he explained, "and you may need more ammunition than you took along."

"From published reports, it is indicated that some folks associate antelope hunting with buffalo 'hunting' in some Western states where the huge animals are rounded up and executed," continued the Executive Secretary.

"First of all this limited thinning project is necessary to manage and maintain vigorous herds, in the process of restoring antelope."

"Secondly, the Commission has to carefully supervise the shoot for the safety of the herds, the landowners' cattle and the hunters themselves."

"Ranchers and the warden force have to cooperate to guide

put out before you leave them. Don't just think you've extinguished the flame. Be sure!

Mrs. Wolfert's message is particularly timely just now. In case you've forgotten, October 8 to 14 is Fire Prevention Week.

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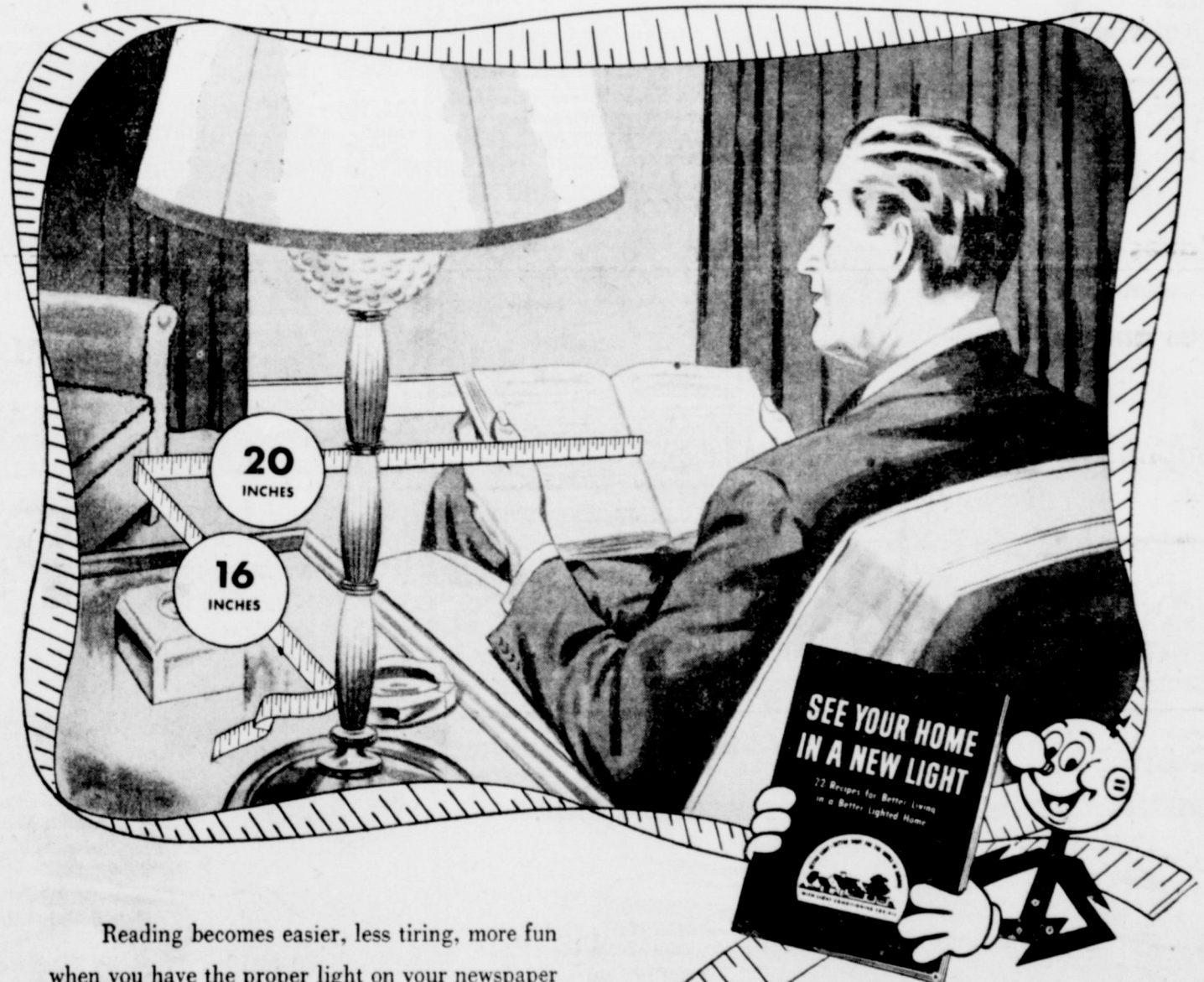
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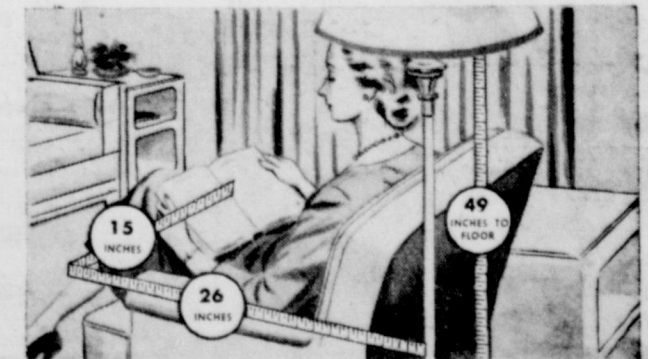
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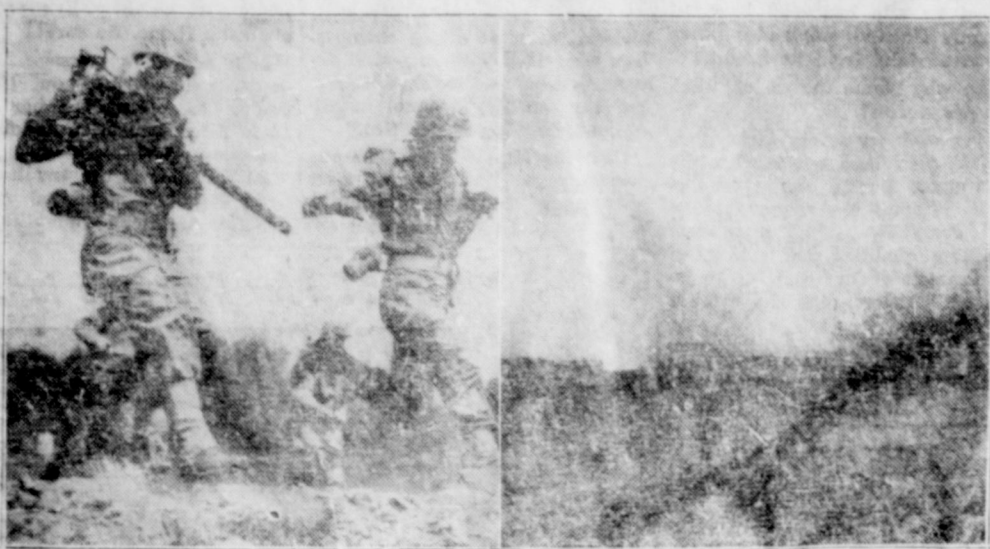

ceptance of Ridgway's proposal for a liaison meeting two hours later.

The Ridgway message was delivered by U. S. Marine Col. James C. Murray, a UN liaison officer, to North Korean Col. Chang Chun

San. Its text had been announced in Tokyo Monday.

Murray told Chang that "some temporary facilities" would be required for the liaison meeting Wednesday.

"I am prepared to establish a tent if this meets with your approval," Murray said.

Chang promised to reply later, presumably by way of the radio-telephone link between Communist headquarters at Kaesong and the UN truce camp at Munsan, 10 miles southeast of Pan Mun Jom.

It was believed that U. S. Air Force Col. Andrew J. Kinney, senior liaison officer, would represent the Allies at the liaison meeting. Chang probably will head the Communist delegation.

Whether there will be further wrangling at this meeting over differences between Communist proposals and those of Ridgway remains to be seen.

The major difference is over the size of the neutral zone to be established around Pan Mun Jom.

The Communists suggested that the present Kaesong five-mile radius neutral zone be extended into a rectangle covering both Pan Mun Jom and Munsan.

The supreme United Nations commander, however, said he thought the neutral zone would be confined to a small area around Pan Mun Jom "with Kaesong, Munsan and the roads to Pan Mun Jom from Kaesong and Munsan free from attack."

The Communists broke off the truce talks 48 days ago on the ground that the Allies had violated Kaesong's neutrality with a bombing raid. Then they charged so many additional UN neutrality violations that Ridgway refused to send his negotiators back to Communist-controlled Kaesong.

ernment party will go along with and 'international movement.'

"We are not going to marry whoever says hello to us."

Speaking freely in his secrete hotel suite, the little Iranian made this significant point:

"In a political struggle between big powers, in day-to-day politics, a country like Iran is bound to profit. But we have asked him from nobody. We did not ask Russia to support us (when Soviet delegate Semyon Tsarapkin opposed Security Council consideration of the Anglo-Iranian dispute), but we appreciated it when she did and we thanked the Russians."

"The United States and Britain supported Iran in Azerbaijan (in the 1946 dispute with Russia) and now, in the oil dispute, Russia has not remained impartial. All we do is for Iran's national integrity but no government, if it helps us in any question, should have hopes of abusing our gratitude."

Asked whether Iran might consider oil concessions in its northern territories to Russia, Fateni said no.

"The nationalization law," he

said, "Applies to the north as well as to the south."

Fateni spoke after ambassador Ernest A. Gross, deputy chief of the United States delegation, and George McGhee, Assistant Secretary of State, had spent an hour with Mossadegh in his \$240-a-day hospital suite. Informed sources said it was only a courtesy visit.

After seeing Mossadegh, however, Gross went into a conference with Sir Gladwyn Jebb, chief of the British delegation, and Francis Lacoste, acting permanent UN representative from France. Diplomatic sources said

that Gross went to express the state department's views on a revised British resolution in the oil impasse.

Under the new resolution, it was understood, Britain would content itself with a passing reference to the international court of justice injunction to both the British and Iranians not to interfere in operations of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company and would ask the council to call on both sides to resume the negotiation broken off at Tehran last month.

The new resolution, however, probably will not be ready for presentation when the council

convenes at Flushing Meadow at 10:30 a.m. Thursday.

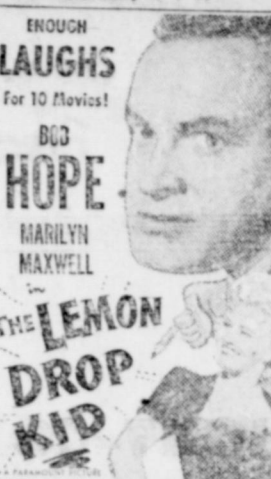

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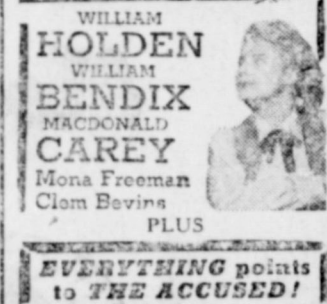

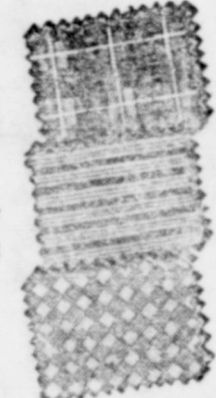
