The City Commissioners have issued orders to the Police department to strictly enforce speed regulations within the Corporate limits. W. Lee Names Another Dry

W. J. TOWNSEND APPOINTED TO LIQUOR BOARD

Austin, June 11—Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel sent to the senate today his first appointment for the vacancy on the state liquor control board.

Submitting the name of W. J. Townsend of Lufkin, a former state senator and strong prohibitionist, the governor apparently reiterated an intention to place an ardent dry on the board.

The upper chamber previously has rejected nominations of Dr. W. D. Bradford of Dallas, who had been serving as board chairman under a recess appointment. Rev. Jeff Davis of Dallas and Mrs. Claude De Van Watts of Austin, state president of the W. C. T. U. Former Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas declined an appointment.

Burkburnett Has Siamese Triplets

Otto Myers presented one of Nature's phenomena when he brought siamese triplet cucumbers to town Wednesday.

The three full-grown cucumbers, about 5, 4½, and 4 inches long, are grown together so that their sides are parallel. Each has a separate stem, but they, too are grown together so that the middle cucumber is the only one that was actually attached to the vine.

The freak cucumbers were grown on Myers' farm southeast of town.

Long May It Wave!

The 48 stars and 13 stripes in our American flag today stand as indisputable evidence that a united continent is possible—that groups of people with different philosophies, of different races and with varying interests can become one peaceful, united nation.

On Flag day, June 14, we Americans will display our flag in public places and on homes throughout the nation to reaffirm our faith in all it stands for.

Flag day was proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson, in May, 1916, when we were on the brink of war, as we may be today. In proclaiming flag day, President Wilson said that it would be observed as a day on which we Americans might "re-dedicate ourselves to the nation, 'one and inseparable'."

With the same feeling in our hearts, President Roosevelt has this year asked us to observe this June 14 by suitable ceremonies in class-rooms, public gatherings, places of worship and in our homes to "reaffirm our faith in the ideals for which our flag stands and our loyalty to the nation over which it has waved for more than a century and a half."

National Emergency

The proclamation of an unlimited National Emergency, although momentous in its import, doesn't mean a quick change is going to take place in the life that we lead or in the freedom of action to which we are entitled in this country.

As a matter of fact, most legal students will agree that the President has added no new powers to those he assumed under the limited emergency which he proclaimed in 1939. Thus the proclamation of an unlimited emergency is believed to have been made primarily to make us more aware of the dangers that we face rather than to add to the Presidential authority.

Under either the unlimited emergency or the limited emergency, the President has

dictatorial powers over practically everything but the declaration of war. The power to declare war rests solely in the hands of congress. But he cannot exercise any of the emergency powers without making a separate proclamation for each new power.

It is expected that one of the first powers he will take over will be the right to act against aliens in this country who are taking instructions from the Axis nations. Ever since the fall of France and Norway, we have been warned time and time again about the dangers of a fifth column within our ranks, and many of us have favored rounding up all suspects.

It is probable, however, that even though few arrests have been made, all suspects are under constant watching by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. And it is comforting to know that when the time is ripe to round up these subversive elements, the President is in a position to do it without red tape—he will be able to make a proclamation and follow it through immediately with pre-planned action.

Sound Policy

An example of agricultural marketing cooperation at its best is found in the Dairymen's League Cooperative Association of New York, a pioneer in the great Eastern milk shed.

The treasurer of the Association announced that it is now paying off over \$2,300,000 worth of Certificates of Indebtedness which are not due until 1944 and 1945. In addition it will also pay \$477,000 of interest coupons now due on all other outstanding series of Certificates.

"It is important in a period like the present," the treasurer said, "when all business is facing the uncertainties of war and the possibility of a future economic upheaval, that an organization like the Dairymen's League maintain itself in the strongest possible financial position."

That is the kind of policy all farm groups should follow. It is the kind of policy which make for progress and profit for agriculture.

Know Texas

Texas is abundantly endowed with a wide variety of scenery, natural beauty, historical traditions, modern highways and innumerable other advantages that make the state a paradise for the vacationist. To nature's abundant gifts there have been added adequate resort and recreation facilities throughout the state.

Pictures and articles in newspapers showing the vacation advantages of Texas indicate the great possibilities in the future for the state in claiming a larger share of the national tourist trade. Texas needs only to be advertised on a nationwide scale and it will attract hundreds of thousands of summer and winter visitors who previously have spent vacations in other well-publicized vacation centers.

There is a rich opportunity for drawing these out-of-state tourists to Texas, and full advantage must be taken of it. Texas people also, must be reminded of the near-at-hand chance to know and enjoy their own state. Thousands of Texans who each year rush away to remote points have never seen the Gulf Coast, the woods of East Texas, the plains of West Texas, the Alamo and Missions around San Antonio, and the Big Bend country.

No matter how much an individual knows, he will always run across an expert who has studied less and knows more.

Democracy is not assisted by careless criticism of officials, whether they serve local, state or federal governments.

MELTING THE ICEBERG

Do you know how to make friends with the man on the other side of the desk? You know how cold he appears. Why! he could snap a ten-penny nail in two. But there's a way to get on his good side. He's probably as eager to be friendly as you are, but it's probably up to you to make the first advance. And it can be done!

Here are nine specific ways to get on the lee side of icebergs. I took them from a number of "Your Life" magazine. They could be helpful to you:

1. Regard the person you are talking to as more important than your business with him.
2. Take a real interest in the other fellow, his views, his needs, his pleasures, his problems; remain just as interested even though he turns you down.
3. Don't resent snobs, pity them; that makes you bigger than they are, big enough to see behind their masks.
4. Be direct and simple in your approach; don't be clever or meaninglessly polite.
5. Don't waste the time of busy people trying to establish intimacy; express your friendliness without intruding.
6. Never push your own grandiose qualities in the other fellow's face—he will don a mask instantly to hide his unpleasant feelings.
7. Remember, there's one human quality shared equally by great and small—a love of sincere appreciation.
8. Rich and exalted people, like less fortunate humans are more interested in little items of personal pleasure or pain than in vast, remote enterprises.
9. Don't dig or slam the other fellow needlessly; every time you do, you add another layer to his protective mask.

Who do you suppose is the easiest person for you to deceive? Some stupid person? Somebody a thousand miles away? No, the easiest person for you to deceive is reading this sentence right now. You! Does this sound like a radical idea? Well, Demosthenes, the great Attic orator and statesman of Greece said, three hundred and fifty years before Christ was born: "The easiest thing of all is to deceive one's self; for what a man wishes, he generally believes to be true."

Why not examine your beliefs? Why not ask, "What facts, what reasons, do I have for believing this? Do I believe it merely because I want to or is my belief founded on scientific evidence?" My guess would be that nine tenths of our beliefs are founded on "wish thinking." For example, I believe that I am an unusually broadminded and tolerant individual. How do I know that I am more broad-minded than the average citizen? The truth is, I don't know. I go on believing it because I wish to believe it. "Wish thinking" is often dangerous. It may be tragic. It fosters ignorance. I breeds narrow-mindedness. Don't deceive yourself. Go to your public library and read a good book on logical thinking. Your thoughts are the most important force in your life. Guard them. Protect them. See that they are founded on reason, not emotion.

ORDINANCE No.

AN ORDINANCE WHEREBY
THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT,
TEXAS, AND THE SOUTHWES-
TERN BELL TELEPHONE COM-
PANY AGREE THAT THE TEL-
EPHONE COMPANY SHALL
PAY AN ANNUAL INSPEC-
TION FEE AND SERVICE
CHARGE TO COVER THE COST
OF AND TO COMPENSATE THE

CITY FOR SERVICES RENDER-
ED BY THE CITY IN EXERCIS-
ING ITS POLICE POWER OR
REGULATION AND INSPEC-
TION OF POLES, WIRES, CON-
DUITS, EQUIPMENT AND OTH-
ER TELEPHONE CONSTRU-
CTION OF THE SOUTHWES-
TERN BELL TELEPHONE COM-
PANY IN THE STREETS, AL-
LEYS, HIGHWAYS AND PUB-
LIC GROUNDS OF THE CITY;
AND REPEALING ALL ORDIN-
ANCES AND AGREEMENTS
AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES
AND AGREEMENTS IN CON-
FLICT HEREWITH.

WHEREAS, the Southwestern
Bell Telephone Company, here-
inafter referred to as the "Tel-
ephone Company", is now and has
been engaged in the telephone
business in the State of Texas,
and in furtherance thereof, has
erected and maintained poles,
wires, conduits, equipment and
other telephone construction in
the streets, alleys, highways and
public grounds of the City of
Burkburnett, Texas, hereinafter
referred to as the "City," for many
years pursuant to such rights as
have been granted it by and
under the laws of the State of
Texas, and subject to the exercise
of such reasonable rights of regu-
lation under the police power
as have been lawfully granted
by and under said laws to said
City; and

WHEREAS, in exercising its
said rights of regulation under
the police power it is desirable
that the City regulate and inspect
the construction of the Telephone
Company's poles, wires, conduits,
lines and equipment in the streets,
alleys and highways of the City;
and

WHEREAS, the City incurs ex-
pense and renders services in
connection with said regulations
and inspection, which expense
should be borne and compensated
for by the Telephone Company,
THEREFORE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS
OF THE CITY OF BURKBUR-
NETT, TEXAS:

Section 1. That from and after
the effective date of this ordi-
nance the Telephone Company
shall pay to the City of Burk-
burnett an annual inspection fee
and service charge in an amount
equal to two per cent (2%) of
the gross receipts for the preced-
ing year received by the Tel-
ephone Company from the ren-
ditiion of local exchange telephone
transmission service within the
corporate limits of the City. Said
amount of two per cent (2%) of
the gross receipts shall constitute
compensation to the City for the
expense incurred and services
rendered by the City in exercising
its police power of regulation and
supervision over the construction
and location of the Telephone
Company's poles, wires, conduits,
equipment and other facilities in
the streets, alleys, highways and
public grounds of the City, and
shall be due and payable on the
15th day of March of each year
for the preceding calendar year.
The first payment hereunder shall
be made on March 15, 1942, and
shall equal in amount two per
cent (2%) of the gross receipts
aforesaid received for the year
1941; and thereafter payments
shall be made annually on March
15th, as hereinbefore provided.

Section 2. During the continu-
ance of this agreement and so
long as the Telephone Company
shall pay to the City the percent-
age of its gross receipts afore-
said, the City agrees that said
payment shall be received by it
in lieu of any tax, license, charge,
fee, street or alley rental, or other
character of charge for use and
occupancy of streets, alleys and
public places of the City; in lieu
of any poll tax or charge, in lieu
of any easement or franchise tax,
whether levied as an ad valorem,
special, or other character of tax;
and in lieu of any imposition
other than the usual general or
special ad valorem taxes now or
hereafter levied. Should the City
not have the legal power to
agree that the payment of the
percentage of gross receipts here-
in provided for shall be in lieu
of the taxes, licenses, charges,
fees, rentals, and easement or
franchise taxes aforesaid, then
the City agrees that it will apply
as may be necessary to the satis-
faction of the Telephone Com-
pany's obligations, if any, to pay
any such taxes, licenses, charges,
fees, rentals, and easement or
franchise taxes.

Section 3. All ordinances and
agreements and parts of ordi-
nances in conflict herewith are
hereby repealed.

Section 4. The Telephone Com-
pany shall have thirty (30) days
after the passage and approval
of this ordinance to file its writ-
ten acceptance thereof with the
City Secretary, and upon accept-
ance being filed, this ordinance
shall be considered as taking ef-
fect and being in force from and
after the date of its passage and
approval by the Mayor.

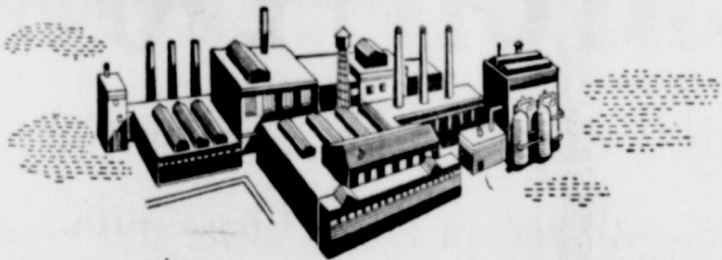

Stamps
HereOF MERCHANTS
FOR JUNE 23

Goods merchants of county are expected to meet at the Electric Service company, 904 Scott, Wichita, on the night of Thursday, to adopt final plans for the sale of cotton stamps in for cotton goods.

Announcement was made after a meeting for the cotton stamp plan, and Marvin Smith of Falls had been named as a five-man committee to advise county merchants on rules for such exchange.

Smith is to name one from Wichita Falls, one from Iowa Park and Electric Service company, which are to be issued through the county and will be exchangeable for goods. Each stamp will

be worth 25 cents in trade. For any single farm, there will be a maximum of \$25 in stamps. The federal government has set aside \$25,000,000 for the purpose.

Three-fold purpose of the program is to reduce cotton acreage; to increase consumption of cotton goods among cotton belt rural residents; and to increase cotton goods consumption in normal trade channels.

Stamps will be issued to farmers in exchange for withholding acreage from cotton plantings. The amount of stamp-credit given will be on the basis of average lint yield of such acreage.

Merchants who wish to participate in the program by accepting cotton stamps will obtain necessary forms from the county farm agent, G. R. McNeil.

About 35 merchants attended Wednesday's meeting, Charles A. Morgan of Burkburnett, presided.

Rooms For the Children

Children's rooms should be given the thought they deserve. It is not to use any old cast off furniture, pictures, etc. in their rooms and afford to do otherwise. It is in the early years that tastes and habits begin so that there is a real psychological reason to give them a room of their own which will appeal to their growing sense of orderliness, beauty and even ownership.

If you cannot buy new furniture there is much that can be done with a motley collection of old to give it a sense of unity. It may be painted or bleached, or in the case of old iron beds, durable denim slip covers may be made for the head board, and the foot board can be dispensed with. Everything in and about the room should be sturdy especially in boys' rooms. In little children's rooms, chests or cupboards should be provided for their toys. It is often a simple matter to build them in, just shelves if need be, but at a convenient height for the child himself. Or an old bookcase may be transformed to serve such a purpose, and made to match the other pieces in the room.

Solid Wood Furniture Is Good

Think of a typical room. Solid wood such as cherry, maple, birch or oak is being used for a straightforward type of furniture. It makes an excellent choice. For boys especially, but little girls like space is limited, the double decker beds are

even for his "possessions" which may be anything from a fish to a collection of marbles. Of course snow shoes, skis and sport equipment is best kept in a special closet elsewhere. The question of separate closets for two children is often difficult. A house just hasn't got two to a room. In that case a division should be settled upon and each child must do his part in it. To accomplish this, all the modern equipment of rods of sorts, clothes hangers, etc. should be used. I know of an untidy child who was quite reformed by having a place for everything. What a saved a busy mother by instilling orderliness, only a busy mother knows.

Floors may well be covered with linoleum with a warm rug by the fire in the winter, the walls painted, or covered with waterproof paper, so that muddy foot prints and dirty finger marks are easily removed. Children should be children; in this room of their own they are able to play. Therefore a ceiling light is wise, although light will be needed as they get older. Have few ornaments, all means use wisely chosen pictures.

Of course there is, and should be a difference in furnishing girls' rooms. Girls early show their love and preferences for color, "prettiness", while boys "don't want to be bothered" with anything and rightly so—but unconsciously appreciate comfort and convenience. It was a boy's recollections that went into the writing of "Sweet Home". Just as your home is your kingdom—so let your child's room be their kingdom. Consider their likes and dislikes, and give them the key to the city with rules to be kept.

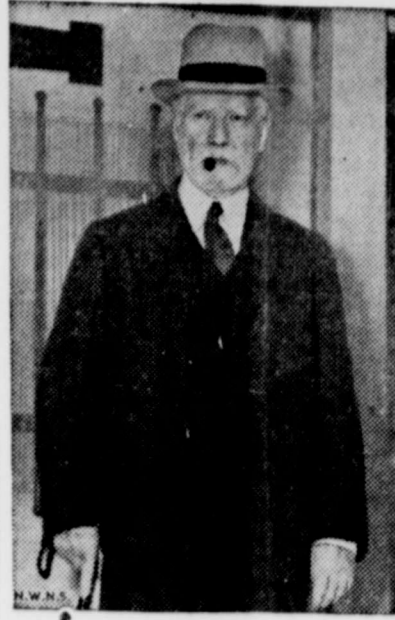

Texas Loans
Are Approved
By President

President Roosevelt approved United States housing authority loans totaling \$7,848,000 to provide new low-rent homes for 1,961 families in 16 Texas cities.

All these loans, with one exception, go to cities of less than 100,000 population. The smallest city receiving aid has a population of 6,459.

These loans will take care of 90 per cent of the total cost of development. Building will be done by local concerns.

Army Launches
Anti-Mosquito War

Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, declared Monday that malaria kills more people in Texas than typhoid fever. As a guard against malaria carrying mosquito, the government has allotted \$160,000 for malaria prevention inside army camps.

Cox said 19 trucks and a large supply of oil for use in spraying had been donated to the department and would be distributed to health units located in military areas.

LAW VIOLATOR PAYS

The Texas Game department would rather have hunters and fishermen observe the laws than collect fines from them, but occasionally it is necessary to "crack down" on a nimrod or angler. Such was the case recently in "East Texas". A game warden was finally able to arrest a known game hog who was already under an injunction. The result was that he was fined \$50 for killing a doe deer, \$25 for not having a hunting license, \$10 for trespassing and \$100 for violating his injunction. Costs brought the total to more than \$300.00.

One out of every three-and-one half wells drilled by Texas oilmen to date has been dry.

It Costs Less to Fly Than Drive—It now costs less to fly your plane than to drive your car. On an actual comparative trip, made both by air and automobile from Detroit to Dallas, Texas, then to Los Angeles, Seattle, Denver, returning to Dallas and then to Detroit, it cost thirty dollars less to operate the airplane. One of the factors in the great difference was the fact that the distance by air was 7,590 miles whereas by automobile it was 9,230. To fly the Stinson Voyager airplane, which was used in the test, it only cost one and one-third cents per mile for fuel and oil costs.

This Week IN WASHINGTON

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON
Washington, D. C. (NWNS)—

Although many points in our aid-to-Britain plans are still kept secret by the President in order to keep Hitler guessing, there are certain major revelations about our national policy which have been made recently. They include:

1. The use of convoys is not contemplated for the immediate future, the President having decided that they are outmoded and that the system of patrols, which we are now using, is more effective.

2. The President does not intend to ask for repeal of the neutrality law, since at present it

does not interfere with his plans. 3. The President expects labor and capital to stop letting disputes interfere with production but if they don't settle their problems among themselves the government will act.

4. The President has no immediate intention of using most of the powers available to him under his unlimited emergency proclamation, and he has no new legislation in mind.

5. We will "start shooting" if Germany and her allies attempt to get bases, such as Dakar, the Azores, or Greenland which the President considers might be used for an attack on the Americas.

6. We will probably not start shooting unless Germany provokes us to do so by attempts to get bases in our hemisphere or by attacks on our navy patrols.

7. Passage of the ship-seizure bill, insuring the U. S. permanent acquisition of Axis ships taken into custody, is considered a test of Nazi threats to start hostilities.

A new surge of effort to increase the speed of production of defense equipment has been clearly evident since the President's declaration of an unlimited emergency, partly because of the President's appeal and partly because we have now entered upon our second year of defense production with new and much larger goals to attain.

Outlining the job ahead, John D. Biggers, production director of the Office of Production Management said the new goals for the rest of the year include doubling of present airplane production, quadrupling tank production, trebling powder production and increasing five-fold the production of machine guns.

To do this, it is evident to all OPM officials that strikes must not be allowed to halt production. They have been encouraged by the recent Fortune poll showing that the majority of the labor army of the U. S. is strongly opposed to strikes in defense industries as is the non-labor population.

With both congressmen and the administration vitally interested in the trends of public opinion on the great issues before us, polls such as Fortune's and the Gallup polls are studied closely here. Many congressmen are encouraged by the recent Gallup poll which showed that aid-to-Britain and war as a last resort is favored just as much by families of boys in the military training

camp as by the people who are not called upon to make such personal sacrifices. Sixty-eight per cent of those families who have men serving in the army or expect to, said that they would favor this country going to war if it appeared certain that there was no other way to defeat Germany and Italy.

President Roosevelt has ordered a second registration day under the selective service act for July 1, when all those who have reached the age of 21 by that day, but who were under age when the first registration day, will be required to register. These men, however, will not be rushed into training, since present plans call for their being put at the bottom of the list.

It is believed that there are approximately 1,000,000 young men who have come of age since the last registration.

Fifth column and anti-American activities took the limelight here when Jan Valtin, author of the best seller "Out of the Night," which purports to give inside information on activities of the Communists and the German Gestapo, with both of which he admits formerly having been associated, appeared before the Dies committee and warned of the civil strife which German agents are attempting to bring about in this country. He said that even many of the refugees who fled Germany are being forced to supply vital information to the German government in order to keep their families in Germany from being put in concentration camps.

Congress does not appear as worried about strikes as it did a month ago, for it realizes that President Roosevelt now has the power, if he wants to use it, to bring a fast halt to all strikes by executive order and without new legislation. Furthermore, the American Federation of Labor has called for a halt in strikes and has appealed to all members to exercise self-discipline.

Almost incidental in Washington is the additional request for over \$3,000,000,000 which the President made to Congress the other day. This new request, on which he asked all possible haste, is largely to provide funds to build 15,000 planes additional to those already provided for which would be enough total funds to bring the army and navy plane strength to 50,000.

Amusement Industry Pledges Its Support

As the entire nation becomes conscious of the national crisis, the amusement industry pledged its full support to the United States national defense savings program, Tuesday.

In the principal address of the day, Carl Hobitzelle, president of Interstate Theaters and a member of the project's advisory board, pledged the full support of the Interstate group of theaters throughout Texas and called upon other leaders and employees of all branches of show business to support the program.

Interstate vice president and general manager, R. J. O'Donnell, laid out details of the plan for systematic saving among employees. The plan embraces the weekly or monthly purchase of defense savings stamps and bonds.

ORDINANCE NO.
AN ORDINANCE FIXING
RENTALS TO BE PAID BY EL-
ECTRIC AND GAS COMPANIES
FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF US-
ING WITH THEIR POLES,
WIRES, CONDUITS, PIPES AND
FIXTURES, THE STREETS,
EASEMENTS, AND ALLEYS
AND OTHER PUBLIC WAYS
WITHIN THE CITY OF BURK-
BURNETT, TEXAS, PROVID-
ING PENALTIES FOR VIOLA-
TION, AND PROVIDING AN
EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED by the
Board of Commissioners of the
City of Burkburnett, Texas:
Section 1. That all persons, as-
sociations, organizations, and cor-
porations using or maintaining
any telegraph, telephone, electric
light or other poles, gas pipe
lines, pipes and other fixtures in
any of the streets, highways, eas-
ements, alleys, parks or other
places within the corporate lim-
its of the City of Burkburnett,
Texas, shall on the 1st day of
July of each and every year file
with the City Secretary a sworn
report showing the gross receipts
from the business conducted by
such persons, associations, orga-
nizations and corporations within
the corporate limits of the said
city for the preceding year end-
ing May 30th.

Section 2. The Board of Com-
missioners may when it may see
fit have the books and records of
the person, association, organiza-
tion or corporation rendering the
statement required in Section 1
of this Ordinance examined by a
representative of the City to as-
certain whether such statement is
accurate, but nothing in this Or-
dinance shall be construed to pre-
vent the City from ascertaining
the facts by any other method.

Section 3. That upon the 1st
day of July of each and every
year every person, association,
organization, or corporation oc-
cupying or using the streets, high-
ways, easements, alleys, parks, or
other public places in the City of
Burkburnett, Texas, with poles,
pipes and for other fixtures shall
as a condition to such further oc-
cupancy, pay the city annually
for such privileges a rental equal
to two (2%) per cent of the gross
receipts received by such person,
association, organization, or cor-
poration from its business con-
ducted in the corporate limits of
the City of Burkburnett, Texas,
for the preceding year which sums
shall be paid to the City of Burk-
burnett, Texas.

Section 4. That upon receipt of
the above rental by the city, the
City Secretary shall deliver to the
person, association, organization,
or corporation paying the same a
receipt for such rental.

Section 5. That the rental for
the privilege of using the streets,
alleys, highways, easements, and
public places of the City of Burk-
burnett provided for in this or-
dinance is not charged as a tax but
is made for the privilege now en-
joyed and to be enjoyed by such
persons, associations, organiza-
tions, and corporations of using
the streets, easements, alleys, and
other public ways of the city in
the conduct of their respective
businesses; and such charges are
additional to all ad valorem and
franchise taxes and to all taxes of
every nature whatsoever against
the persons, association, organiza-
tions or corporations mentioned
herein.

Section 6. That nothing herein
is intended to relieve any persons,
association, organization or cor-
poration of any condition, re-
striction or requirement imposed
by any law or ordinance of the
said City of Burkburnett, Texas.

Section 7. That this ordinance
does not grant a franchise to any
utility or person, association, or-
ganization, or corporation, to use
the streets, easements, alleys and
other public ways and shall never
be so construed by the courts or
otherwise, and the City reserves
the right to cancel the privileges
granted hereunder and refund the
unearned rentals paid to the city.

Section 8. That the City of
Burkburnett hereby reserves the
right to put into effect at any
time other restrictions and regu-
lations as to the erection and
maintenance of poles, wires, pipes,
and other appurtenances in the
streets, easements, alleys, and oth-
er public ways of the said city
and from time to time to require
such poles, wires, pipes, and other

property equipment and fixtures
as it may deem proper to be re-
moved and to require wires to be
run in conduits on such terms as
the city may deem proper.

Section 9. That every person,
association, organization, and cor-
poration who shall operate any
business without the payment of
the rentals provided herein shall
be subject to a penalty of One
Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for
each and every day that such
persons, association, organization,
or corporation shall conduct such
business using and occupying the
streets, easements, alleys or other
public ways of the City of Burk-
burnett without the payment of
the said rentals which said sum
may be recovered by the City of
Burkburnett in a court of compe-
tent jurisdiction by a suit filed
therein.

Section 10. That every person,
association, organization, or cor-
poration and the local manager
or agent of every persons, associ-
ation, organization or corporation
failing or refusing to make the
report required by Section 1 of
this Ordinance, or failing or re-
fusing to allow the examination
provided for in Section 2 herein
shall upon conviction be fined in
any sum not to exceed One Hun-
dred (\$100.00) Dollars and every
day's failure or refusal as men-
tioned in this section, shall be
deemed a separate offense.

Section 11. The city fire mar-
shal, building inspector, electrical
inspector, city's police officers,
and such other persons designated
by the city, shall have power and
it shall be their duty to examine
and inspect from time to time all
telegraph, telephone, electric light
or other poles, gas pipe lines,
pipes and other fixtures in the
public places within the city for
the purpose of seeing that all of
same are in a safe and suitable
condition, and whenever any such
item is found to be unsafe or
unsuitable for the purpose for
which it is used, the person using,
possessing or maintaining same
shall be notified and required to
place same in a safe and suitable
condition.

Section 12. If any section, par-
agraph, subdivision, clause, phrase
or provision of the Ordinance
shall be adjudged invalid or held
unconstitutional, the same shall
not affect the validity of this
ordinance as a whole or any part
or provisions thereof other than
the part so decided to be invalid
or unconstitutional.

Section 13. That the fact that
telegraph, telephone, electric, and
gas companies have been occupy-
ing and using the streets, ease-

ments, alleys and other public
ways of the City of Burkburnett,
Texas, for many years without
the payment of rent for such use
creates an emergency, and this
ordinance shall take effect imme-
diately upon its passage, approval
and publication as required by
law.

Texas Laborers
Dwell In Cities

More than half of the Texas
labor forces were city dwellers at
the time of the employment cen-
sus in 1940 and a greater propor-
tion of the population was in the
labor force, the census bureau re-
ported recently.

In urban areas, men and wom-
en in the labor force represented
55.1 per cent of the population
14 years old and over, in rural
non-farm areas 50.4 per cent and
in rural-farm areas, 48.5 per cent.
The cities had a total population
above 14 of 2,258,615 and 1,244-
960 of them were in the labor
force. Reason for this large pro-
portion, the bureau explained,
was the much larger proportion
of women working.

DOVES IN "NORTH" AGAIN

White wing doves formerly
ranged no farther north in any
numbers than Duval county and
they still concentrate in the Rio
Grande valley area. However,
those excellent game birds are
again reported as far north as
Bandera county. A considerable
number are nesting in the vicinity
of Medina Lake.

Each year more and more
of the brush which white wings
use for cover is being cut off
Southwest Texas land and the

birds are more hard put to find
suitable areas in which to nest.
This is believed to be the reason
for the moves northward. Plans
are being studied by the game
department to help save the nest-
ing and feeding grounds of the
white wings in the Valley.
