Registration To Be Held In High School Building

Students Are Asked To Note Time And Report On Date Scheduled

F. T. McCollum, principal of the Lamesa High School, announces that high school pupils will register for courses next week beginning on Wednesday, August 27 and continuing through Saturday, August 30. A schedule for enrollment and course assignment is as follows:

Seniors will meet Wednesday at nine o'clock, Room 110. Seniors are those having eleven credits or more already completed.

Juniors are pupils with seven credits or more. They will meet Thursday at nine o'clock in Room 110.

Sophomores, or pupils having three or more credits, will meet Friday at nine o'clock in the same room.

Pupils with less than three credits, or entering this high school without any previous high school experience, will meet Mr. McCollum Saturday morning at nine o'clock in Room 110.

Pupils should present last year's report and book clearance cards. Pupils new to Lamesa schools should have vaccination certificates. A list of subjects desired should be made out before time by each pupil and after consultation with parents. Pupils who wish to prepare for admission to a particular college or university, should consult the principal regarding admission requirements that he may meet them, remembering that some high school offerings do not meet college (Continued on Page 5)

Enrollment Of Students Of Lamesa Elementary Schools To Begin Monday

Students in Grades 3 through 7 of the Elementary School will begin enrollment Monday, August 25, and one grade each day will be enrolled according to the schedule which follows. First and second grade children will enroll Tuesday, September 2, and announcements regarding these grades will be carried in this paper next week.

All students presenting themselves for enrollment should bring book cards and report cards from schools last attended, whether that was the Lamesa school or some other. It is absolutely imperative that book records be clear before books can be issued this year. Each child should be able to give his age, date of birth, exact place of residence, parent's initials, mail address and occupation, and date of vaccination.

Vaccination against smallpox will be required of all children entering school unless they have had the disease. All children entering this school for the first time should present certificate of immunity. Children who have attended this school before and who have been successfully vaccinated against smallpox will not be required to show certificates of vaccination because these records have been kept on the records of this school. 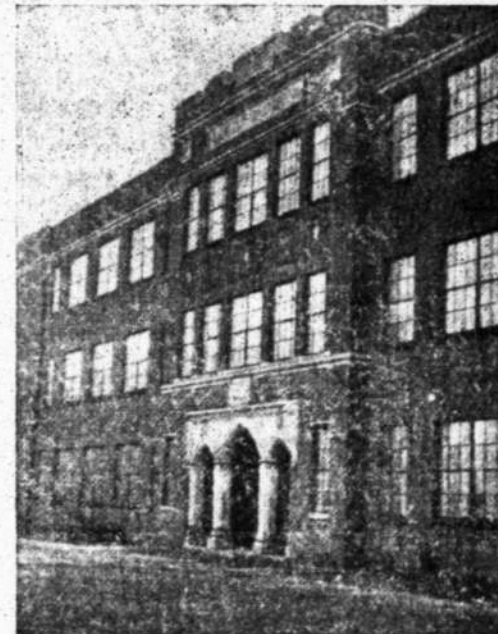

The building has been thoroughly reconditioned during the vacation season and officials pronounce it in absolute readiness for the term opening Tuesday, September 2nd. Bids On Migratory Labor Camp To Be Opened Soon

Bids will be opened August 29, for a \$160,000 migratory labor camp to be developed near here, it has been announced by Wilson Cowan, regional Farm Security Administration director.

The camp will consist of 25 quadruplex apartments to house 100 families, and several miscellaneous structures such as a gate house, community center and manager's residence and office.

Plans are to house migrant laborers who would drive daily over an area of 10 to 15 miles to agricultural work. To a certain degree those in the camp will set up their own government and recreational programs. Other agencies, such as the Texas State Employment Service, will co-operate in aiding the workers.

Instead of a total soil-depleting allotment for the farm, there may be substituted a special crop allotment covering feed grains in surplus areas, he said, adding that the State Committee has not yet decided whether this would be necessary in Texas. Feed grains include grain sorghum, barley, rye, oats and corn.

A soil-building allowance is established for each farm on the basis of such factors as the farm crop, land, pastureland and the participating farmer may earn his farm's allowance by carrying out approved soil-building practices.

Under the 1942 program, farmers may receive two kinds of payments with the rates from compliance and special crop allotments to be announced later. The two kinds of payments are: (1) A payment for carrying out approved soil-building practices and (2) A payment for planting within special crop allotments such as cotton and wheat.

As in former years, conservation payments to be made under the 1942 farm program are contingent on the annual appropriation authorized by Congress, the AAA official said.

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Total Of 133 Teachers Will Be Employed

Schools Will Open Either On September 1 or 2 Over Most Of County

School plants in Lamesa and all over Dawson County are ready to start the 1941-42 season off on either September 1 or 2.

Indications are that several of the schools, including Lamesa, will have the largest opening day enrollments in their history.

Some schools will see a decrease from former years, due largely to transfers from their home district to schools that offer either higher grades, or are more convenient to the transferes.

Dawson County and Lamesa schools will all adopt the twelve grade system for the first time this year. It has been pointed out that, while this will require quite a bit of readjustment, it will occur in the lower grades, and it is felt that no great inconvenience will be felt as a result of the new classification.

In another place in this paper will be found interesting instructions to prospective students of Lamesa High School, as to when and where they are to report for classification and assignments. These will all take place during next week, so that every student will be properly classified when school officially opens Tuesday morning, September 2nd.

Practically all of the schools of the county plan on opening Monday morning, September 1, but some will wait until the following week. A list of these was not obtainable by the Courier Thursday.

Six schools of the county will have a full twelve grade course for students. They are: Ackerly, Union, Dawson, Sparenberg, Klondike and Lamesa.

A total of 130 white teachers and three colored teachers will be on hand to instruct the more than four thousands students who will enroll in the various schools of the county.

Announcement is made this week of the annual Parker County former citizen reunion, to be held in McKenzie Park at Lubbock on Saturday, August 30th.

All citizens of West Texas who formerly lived in Parker County are invited to attend the gathering, which will be in the form of a basket picnic.

It will be an all-day affair, with several former citizens giving short talks. Clyde Williamson of Lubbock is chairman of the association and has charge of the day's program.

Texas Power Is Offered Defense Industries

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14. — A proffer of additional hydro-electric power in Texas for defense industries provided the government would finance such projects was considered by federal officials today.

The offer was made by officials of Brazos and Colorado river agencies yesterday.

The lower Colorado river authority, through its attorney, Sim Gideon, already had volunteered to aid the government in utilization of potential power on that river.

R. D. Collins, secretary of the Brazos River reclamation and conservation district, arrived in Washington yesterday, ahead of Brazos River representatives to suggest a power pool in which the river district might have a part.

Collins said that he would confer in New York with Lewis Mims, chairman of the board of directors of the Brazos district, and New York engineers associated with the district in advance of a conference with federal officials at Washington tomorrow.

DEPRESSION-BORN SUBURBS SUFFERS AS TIMES IMPROVE

Pensacola, Florida. — Hooverville, depression - born suburb of Pensacola, is on its way toward becoming a ghost town — because times are good again.

The settlement, with its shacks of scrap tin, lumber and tar paper, was started back in 1933 when several families moved into vacant land, owned by a large lumber company, and grew to a population of about 200.

Unable to pay even modest rent, they improvised living quarters from whatever materials they could find.

The lumber company kindly disposed toward its non-paying tenants, did not wish to eject them, and yet was concerned lest they establish "squatter's rights" by seven years continuous possession. It worked out a plan under which each family leased its plot for a dollar a month and retained possession of any buildings erected, with the right to remove them.

Now, however, many of the families are moving out as their bread winners find employment and they are able to afford better places to live. Parts of the settlement soon may be taken over for business purposes.

fin pans 2-3 full and bake in moderate hot oven (400 deg.) 20 minutes.

Whole Wheat Yeast Bread (6 loaves)
6 T sugar
6 t salt
3 c skim milk, heated to steaming
3 c water heated to simmering
(or 6 c skim milk for above two)
1 cake compressed yeast
1-2 T fat (or more up to 6 T, if desired. More fat makes a more velvety texture)
8 c white flour (or enough to make dough of proper consistency)
8 c whole wheat flour

Pour the hot milk and water over the fat, salt and sugar in a mixing bowl. Stir till sugar is dissolved and fat melted. Cool to lukewarm. Now soften the yeast in 1 T of the liquid, then stir it into the liquid. Mix the white and whole wheat flour. Add enough of the flour to make a stiff batter. Stir out all lumps and beat vigorously till batter is smooth. Cover the bowl with a lid and set in a warm place (not hot) till it doubles in bulk. Now add enough more flour to make a dough that can be kneaded without sticking either to the hands or board. Knead till it feels soft and velvety. Grease the mixing bowl and place dough in it; cover and set in warm place (not hot), to double in bulk. Then knead again. Make into six loaves and put in well greased pan for baking. Let double in bulk and then bake 40 to 45 minutes in moderate oven (325 deg. F.). Remove at once from pans when baked.

NOTE: For white bread follow above recipe but use only white flour.

Whole Wheat Ginger Cake (12 Servings)
1-3 c fat 2 t baking powder
1-2 c sugar 1 t soda
1 c molasses (sorghum or cane)
1 egg, well beaten 1-2 t salt
2-3 c raisins 1 t ginger
1 T white flour 1-2 t cloves
1 c sour milk
3 c whole wheat flour
Grease 2 layer cake pans and dust with flour or line with paper. Dust raisins with the white flour. Cream sugar and fat. Add molasses and beaten egg. Sift together the whole wheat flour, salt, baking powder and spices and add to first mixture alternately with the milk. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 30 to 40 minutes.

Whole Wheat Biscuit
2 c flour (half and half)
1-2 t salt
4 t baking powder
Mix and sift in a bowl these dry ingredients. 1-3 c fat. Rub into mixture. Use fingers. 2-3 c milk plus 1 t milk. Add all at one time. Stir vigorously until mixture thickens (about 20 sec.). Knead about 20 seconds. Roll to 1-2 to 3-4 inch thickness. Cut, place on baking sheet and bake at 425 degrees F. for about 12 minutes.

Spoon Corn Bread
2 c water 1 T shortening
2 c white cornmeal 1 t salt
1 c milk 2 eggs
Mix the water and cornmeal and bring slowly to the boiling point. Cook five minutes. Add the milk, shortening, salt and well beaten eggs. Beat thoroughly and bake in a well greased pan for 25 minutes at 400 degrees F. serve from the same dish with a spoon.

PROTEIN DISHES
Tomato Crown (8 Servings)
1 T butter
8 slices of onion (1-2 in. thick)
2 t salt
1-8 to 1-4 t pepper
8 sausage patties or slices about same size as onion slices
4 tomatoes, about 3 inches in diameter
Grease a shallow baking dish or pie pan of a size to hold the onion slices as a single layer. Heat the butter in a frying pan. In this, brown lightly the slices of onion and place them in the greased dish. Salt and pepper each onion slice and upon each place a sausage patty. Remove the stem of each tomato and cut in halves crosswise. Do not peel. Salt and pepper each one and place on top of a patty skin side up. Bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) till both onion and tomatoes are tender about 45 minutes.

Cabbage Casserole (8 Servings)
1 No. 2 can chili or 1 can beef and 1 T chili powder
1 c cabbage cut into small sections
1 t salt
Fat from the can of meat
Mix the chili powder with the meat. Grease a dish and place the chili or meat with the chili powder in a round in the center of it. Arrange the cabbage sections. Sprinkle the salt on the cabbage and dot the fat over it. Cover the dish loosely with foil and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) until the cabbage is done — about 30 minutes.

Baked Custard
4 c whole milk
4 eggs slightly beaten
1-4 t salt
8 T sugar
1 t vanilla
Cinnamon and nutmeg as desired
To the beaten eggs, add salt, sugar and milk. Stir gradually until sugar is dissolved. Add vanilla. Pour thru a wire strainer and then pour into ramekins. Makes 8. Sprinkle nutmeg and cinnamon on top of each ramekin. Set ramekins in pan of warm water. Bake in moderate oven until knife inserted cuts out clean. About 30 to 40 minutes.

Egg Salad
Take 2 heads of crisp lettuce or 1-2 gallon of crisp fresh spinach.

1-2 c of India Relish or chow-chow, or French dressing, 12 hard cooked eggs. Shred the leaves, mix with relish, marinate with salad dressing, and arrange on a large platter or bowl. Cut eggs lengthwise in 1-4's being careful to keep the yolks and whites intact. Arrange carefully. Serve with toasted whole wheat bread and butter sandwiches.

Cream Crowder Pea Casserole With Cabbage
1 c cooked cream crowder peas
1-4 c tomatoes
1-2 c shredded cabbage
1-2 c onion
1 thin slice salt pork
1 pint navy beans
1 small onion
1-8 pound salt pork, part fat
1-2 t salt
1-2 t dry mustard
2 T molasses

Soak beans in cold water overnight. In the morning drain and turn into bean pot. Pour boiling water over salt pork. Scrape the rind until white, score in half-inch strips, and bury meat in beans, leaving only the rind exposed. Mix salt, mustard, and molasses in a cup, fill with hot water, stir until well mixed, and pour over the pork and beans. Add water to cover, and bake in a 250-350 F. oven six to eight hours, adding more water to cover until the last hour, when pot cover is removed and pork raised to the surface to crisp.

Use corned beef instead of pork, or omit meat and use more salt, with one-third cup of fat.

Cheese Fondue
1 c grated cheese
2 t fat
1 c milk
1 c soft bread crumbs or 1 c cooked rice or other cereal
1-3 t salt
3 eggs
Cayenne

Scald the milk and pour it over the crumbs or cereal, then add the fat, the cheese and seasonings. Beat the egg yolks slightly and add to the mixture then fold in the stiffly beaten whites and turn the mixture into a greased baking dish. Set in a pan of water and bake in a moderate oven (375 deg. F.) until firm on top.

VEGETABLE DISHES
Baked Irish Potato
Select scrub, medium-sized potatoes. scrub, remove the eyes and any blemishes, place in a baking pan, or on the rack in a very hot oven (450-500 deg. F.) and bake until tender (30-60 minutes). Be sure to have the oven hot before the potatoes are put in. To test the potatoes, do not pierce them with a fork, but squeeze them with the hand wrapped in a towel. When soft, break the skin to keep them from being soggy, and serve.

Scalloped Irish Potatoes
4 qt. sliced potatoes
2 t flour as desired
2-1-2 t salt
Dash of pepper, if desired
2 T to 4 T margarine
2-1-2 c fat
Grease a casserole with a bit of the margarine. Arrange the potatoes in 3 or 4 layers in the casserole. Sprinkle each layer with salt, pepper (if used) and flour. Dot with margarine. Pour milk down one side of dish. Cook in a slow oven (250 to 275 deg. F.) till potatoes are tender, 1 to 2 hours.

French Fried Sweet Potatoes
Wash and pare potatoes and cut into eighths lengthwise. Dry between towels and fry in deep fat (350 deg. F.). Drain on soft paper, sprinkle with salt and serve in an uncovered dish.

Creamed Peas And Eggs With Parsley
2 c creamed peas, hot
2 c medium white sauce, hot
6 hard cooked eggs, hot
Cut hard cooked eggs in halves crosswise. Mix with peas, pour over white sauce. Garnish with parsley and serve.

Cabbage Slaw With Cream Dressing
2 T sugar
1-2 t salt
A few grains of paprika
2 T vinegar
1 c cream
Put seasonings into vinegar and stir until sugar is dissolved. Then stir this mixture slowly in to the milk. Pour over shredded cabbage.

Swiss Chard
2 lbs. Swiss chard.
Wash each leaf of swiss chard separately. Cut off stem ends and cut into 1-inch pieces. Cook in boiling water about 10 minutes. Add leaves and cook until tender. That will be approximately 15 minutes. Season with butter or vinegar if desired.

Beets With Sweet-Sour Sauce
Wash beets, and cook in boiling salted water until soft. Drain, and reserve one-half cup water in which beets were cooked. Plunge into cool water, rub off skins and cut into cubes. Reheat in

Sweet-Sour Sauce. Melt two tablespoons butter, add two tablespoons flour, and pour on the beet water. Add 1-4 cup each, vinegar, and cream, one T sugar, one-half t salt, and a few grains pepper.

FRUIT DISHES
Hot Apple Sauce
Wash 1 lb. dried apples. Let soak overnight in enough water to cover. Cook in covered vessel until tender. Put through sieve, and serve hot. Sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar mixture of 2 T cinnamon and 4 T sugar.

Biscuit Cinnamon Rolls (10 to 12)
2 c white flour
4 t baking powder
1-2 t salt
3-4 c milk
1 to 2 T margarine or butter
1-3 c sugar
3 T lard
1 t cinnamon

Mix sugar and cinnamon. Sift together all dry ingredients. Cut fat into mixture. Add liquid all at once and stir until well mixed. Beat vigorously for about 20 seconds. Turn onto a floured board and knead lightly about 20 seconds. Roll dough 1-2 inch thick; spread with margarine. Over this sprinkle a mixture of cinnamon and sugar. Roll as for a jelly roll. Cut 3-4 inch thick and place cut side down on pan or baking sheet. Scrape up sugar that falls out and put on top of roll. Bake 12 to 15 minutes in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees).

Baked Berry Crescents
2 quarts fresh berries
2 c sugar
Mix the berries with the sugar. Put in medium oven, until the sugar is melted and the berries begin to simmer. Drain off the juice. Use the berries for fillers for pie crusts.

Plain Pastry
2 cups all-purpose flour
2-3 cup fat
1 t salt
3 to 5 T cold water
Sift flour and salt, cut in fat with two knives, pastry blender or biscuit cutter until pieces are size of small peas (Chill if necessary). Sprinkle with water, using fork with tossing motion. Dampen all mixture. Press flour and fat together with back of spoon. Handle dough as little as possible. Shape, pat and roll 1-8 inch thick from center toward edges with short strokes, keeping round. Place dough loosely on pan (stretching causes it to shrink), and press out air bubbles. Crescents — Cut in 4-inch squares or rounds. Place 1 T filling (meat or fruit), wet edges fold over, and press edges together. Bake in medium oven. Serve hot in a deep dish or platter. Pour over hot berry juice and serve at the table immediately.

Cherry Upside Down Cake
First make up a cherry mixture according to the following method. Drain the juice from 1 No. 2 can (2-1-2 cups) of red sour cherries. To 1-4 cup of the cherry juice, add 1 cup sugar and 1-4 cup water. Boil until the mixture spins a thread. Add the drained cherries and boil rapidly until the mixture spins a thread. Melt 1 T butter in a heavy 9-inch frying pan. Pour in the candied cherries and allow the mixture to cool. Then add the following cake batter.

Cream 1-4 cup butter or other fat. Add 1-2 cup sugar and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Stir until the mixture is light and fluffy. Add 1 well beaten egg. Sift together 1-2 cups soft-wheat sifted flour, 2 t baking powder, and 1-4 t salt. Add this alternately with 1-2 c milk to the first mixture. Stir to mix well and pour over the cherries. Bake in a moderate oven for about 45 minutes. Loosen the sides of the cake, turn it out carefully upside down. If the fruit sticks to the pan, lift it out and place it on the cake. Serve with whipped cream.

Spanish Cream Ring With Peaches

2 packages plain gelatin
4 eggs
1 t salt
3-4 c sugar
4 c milk
1 t vanilla
Soak gelatin in milk for 5 minutes. Heat in top of double boiler until gelatin is dissolved. Pour over well beaten egg yolks to which one half of the sugar and the salt has been added. Return to double boiler and cook until a custard consistency. Remove from fire, cool and fold well beaten egg whites to which remainder of sugar has been added. Pour into ring mould and chill. Serve on glass platter. Fill center and garnish with peaches.

No Drastic Changes Are Contemplated In Twelve Grade System At School

The twelve-grade plan will be in effect in the Lamesa schools this year in accordance with the plans of the State Department of Education. This is not expected to result in any drastic changes immediately.

The most noticeable change will be the re-numbering of certain grades. Grade six will be called grade seven, and grade seven will be called grade eight. All grades below the sixth will continue with the same number, namely, one, two, three, four and five.

All half-grade sections, or irregular sections, will be advanced in number by one-half, thus eliminating any half-year sections hereafter. The group ordinarily called the high seventh at the beginning of the school term will be called the low eighth, and so on down the line. It is expected to discontinue the half-year sections, and pupils

failing at the end of the year will repeat the entire grade instead of the half-grade. One of the purposes of the twelve-year plan is to reduce the number of failures, and, therefore, only a very small percent will be expected to fail at the end of the year, and such students usually benefit by repeating the whole grade instead of only half of it.

No subject matter will be omitted by any students as a result of the change and none will be repeated which has been sufficiently learned. Curriculum adjustment will be made within the school as the need arises. Children getting the full benefit of the twelve-year plan will be more thoroughly grounded in the fundamental subjects, especially reading, language, and arithmetic, and more time than previously will be devoted to health, safety, music art and citizenship.

Draftees To Take Examinations Before Induction

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—A sweeping revision of selective service induction procedure has been ordered by the War Department in an effort to meet protests that many men called to arms have quit their jobs and made other financial arrangements only to be turned down at the last minute by army doctors.

The department worked out a new system last spring and tested it in Pennsylvania in May and June. It was learned today that this system has been approved in principle and that the high command has ordered it extended to all other states as rapidly as state selective service directors and army corps commanders can work out details covering local situations.

While the new procedure thus will vary somewhat from state to state, the principal of organization in all cases, one official said, will be to give the potential soldier his physical examination as far ahead as possible of the date set for induction, and as close as possible to his home.

This amounts to almost a complete reversal of the present general practice of giving army examinations at reception centers after a man reports for military duty.

Cotton Producers Who Have Loans Must Repay By Oct. 1

Dawson County Cotton producers with 1938, 1939, and 1940 loan cotton have until October 1, 1941, to repay loans and redeem cotton pledges.

Vernon Martin, Administrative Officer has announced.

All cotton not redeemed by this date will be placed in pool as provided by the loan agreement and sold by the Commodity Credit Corporation after March 1, 1942.

Unredeemed cotton from each crop will be placed in separate pools with producer's retaining title. When the cotton is sold in these pools, net proceeds will be distributed among the producers in proportion to their interests, Martin said. The net proceeds if any, would be distributed after reduction of all advance and accrued costs, including storage, insurance and handling charges.

When unredeemed cotton is placed in the pool, the AAA Officer said, no payment will be made to the producers and it cannot be sold during the time it is in the pool.

Recent reports show that Texas cotton growers have 77,047 bales of cotton outstanding in the 1938 crop and 360,135 bales in the 1940 crop.

Producers who are interested in selling their present equities should redeem their cotton before October 1, 1941 since it is possible that it will not be sold until some time after March 1, 1942, Martin said.

Cotton constitutes 56 per cent of the entire fiber supply of the world.

Under the 1942 program, the farmer's allowance will be computed at either 70c per acre of cropland not included in the special crop allotments for the farm in areas where feed grain allotments are not established, or 50c per acre of cropland not included in special crop allotments for the farm in areas where feed grain allotments are established. In 1941 the 70c rate applies only to areas generally deficient in feed while the 50c rate is available in surplus feed areas. The Texas AAA Committee has not yet designated areas where the different rates of payment will apply.

The rates of pastureland will be the same as those under the 1941 program, Martin said, and will vary by areas.

Included in the 1942 program will be a special allowance which farmers may earn by planting forest trees. This payment will be in addition to any other allowance which may be computed for the farm. The \$20.00 minimum payment to a farm is also included in the 1942 program, Martin said.

Private Yacht Owners Are Answering Call Of Coast Guard For More Boats

NEW YORK — The United States Coast Guard, after 151 years of answering cries for help, has cupped its hands and let out a mighty bellow of its own.

And from snooty yacht clubs, private docks and busy harbors, motor-boat sailormen are a-putt-putting to the aid of their long-time guardian angel.

When the preparedness program pulled a third of the Coast Guard's manpower and a great part of its craft away from regular duty, the coastline watchdogs found themselves hardpressed to handle normal work to say nothing of countless new duties.

And so the Coast Guard needs men—and boats. It takes only a short visit to the New York district of the Coast Guard Reserve to see how the service is getting them. Here's an incident that's typical:

A lean, sun-tanned, prosperous-looking man just under middle age takes his turn in line to see Lieut. P. D. Mills, in charge of the Coast Guard's district reserve program.

Admitted to Mills' office the visitor wastes no time.

"I have a boat," he says. "I hear the Coast Guard needs 'em."

He pulls from an envelope the picture of a handsome 35-foot cruiser, prow cutting the waves, a laughing couple on the deck.

"That's my boat," he says. "She will cruise at 21 knots, can do 35. I have a crew of two men. They go with the boat. Do you want 'em?"

"And for how long are you offering your boat?" Mills asks.

The minimum period is a month—and here's the payoff on the way yachtsmen are responding to the Coast Guard plea:

"Well, she's yours for the duration of the emergency—as long as you can use her."

That man's boat will become a regular Coast Guard unit, with a Coast Guard flag and a Coast Guard Reserve number. Its crew will become regular members of the Coast Guard for as long as the boat is in service. They will be rated according to service standards, equipped with regular uniforms (they buy them and are refunded up to \$100), and paid regular salaries. Pay ranges from \$54 for seamen up to \$126 for a chief petty officer, plus an additional \$34 for dependents in the upper brackets.

Many owners go into service right along with their boats; some receive commissions if their term of service is long enough and they qualify otherwise.

Skippers of the 31 civilian boats which are or have been in service around New York include a Stock Exchange member, the head of a book-binding firm, a liquor magnate, an advertising executive, and

a former lieutenant in the World War Navy.

Here's how the Coast Guard's new branch came into being. It dates back to June, 1939, when Congress created the Coast Guard Reserve, a voluntary, non-military organization of private yachtsmen belonging to units, called flotillas, of at least ten boats.

But in February of this year the Coast Guard Reserve and Auxiliary Ace transferred all members of the former Reserve to the Coast Guard Auxiliary and also set up a militarized unit, known as the Coast Guard Reserve, which is similar to the reserve branches of other services.

Members of the Auxiliary are subject to no military regulations, merely belong to a local flotilla of 10 or more boats and take instructions designed to promote co-operation with the Coast Guard. Interest in safety at sea and upon navigable waters, to better understanding of the rules and laws of navigation and operation of vessels.

Under the Act the Temporary Reserve also came into being. It's into this branch that volunteer boats and crews are placed. Volunteers must be members of the Auxiliary—but if non-members come in and offer their boats, it's a fairly simple matter to get them into the auxiliary so that they and their boats may be accepted as Temporary Reserves. During the period of service they are actual Coast Guardsmen.

Vessels of about thirty feet are used for boarding duty. Every private boat in New York district must be boarded and inspected twice a year and the smaller boats are assigned to this job. Larger boats, 40 feet and over, are used in open water for inspection patrol and rescue work.

The Coast Guard feels that in-shore patrols are especially necessary in the emergency. Piers and industries engaged in defense work must be kept under constant patrol. Temporary reservists participate in

policing these defense areas and also are on the lookout for evidences of espionage and sabotage.

Boatmen are assured that their craft will be returned to them at the end of the period of service in as good condition as they were received. All boat expenses are maintained by the government.

Coast Guardsmen like to point to the evacuation of Dunkirk as an example of the part yachtsmen play in an emergency—and they confidently expect their plea to produce the constant force of 270 active boats they need to meet the emergency.

Add both of these terrible accidents together and you get a total of 8,200 — just two hundred more than the average number of persons killed every month by accidents last year in the United States.

The Texas Safety Association points out that these day by day accident deaths are just as final as if the victims had been killed all at once in a flood or fire or hurricane. And we can stop accidents. Accidents are caused by carelessness, and carelessness is something we can control if we want to. Why not start today?

CITY ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LAMESA, TEXAS:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association, or corporation to knowingly or wantonly use or operate or cause to be used or operated within the corporate limits of the City of Lamesa, Texas, any mechanical or electrical device, machine, apparatus, or instrument which causes or produces any sound or noise which is reasonably calculated to disturb the peace and good order of the neighborhood or of the persons owning, using or occupying property within the corporate limits of the City of Lamesa.

Section 2. The noise or sound caused or produced by the operation of the hereinafter mentioned devices, machines, apparatus or instruments is hereby defined as noises or sounds which are reasonably calculated to disturb the peace and good order of the neighborhood or persons owning, using, or occupying property within the corporate limits of the City of Lamesa as set forth in Section 1 of this Ordinance to-wit:

The operation of any mechanical or electrical device, machine, or instrument to intensify or amplify or to reproduce the human voice or any other sound, within any building or on any premises in the City of Lamesa, whereby the sound therefrom is cast directly upon the public streets or places or where such device is maintained and operated for advertising purposes or for the purpose of attracting attention of the passing public, or which is so placed or operated that the sounds coming therefrom can be heard to the annoyance or inconvenience of travelers upon any street or public place, or of persons in neighboring premises; the operation of roller rinks or skating rinks; unnecessarily sounding of automobile horns or warning devices; open blast furnaces under or connected with steam boilers or water heaters; the operation of any steam boiler or water heater to which is attached an instrument or outlet, commonly called a "Pop-off Valve", through which steam is permitted to escape when the steam pressure within a boiler or water heater to which it is attached has reached a given pressure.

Section 3. The purpose of this ordinance is to prevent any noise or sound which is reasonably calculated to disturb the peace and good order of the neighborhood or of the persons owning, using or occupying property within the corporate limits of the City of Lamesa.

Section 4. That every person convicted of the violation of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00.

Section 5. Each day on which such violation of this ordinance occurs shall constitute a separate offense, punishable as hereinabove prescribed.

Section 6. If any portion or part of this ordinance be declared invalid, same shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of the said ordinance but same shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 7. This ordinance is to become effective from and after the publication thereof as provided by law.

A Foreigner In Japan Is Considered A Spy Until He Is Proven Otherwise

Tokyo — The foreigner, a bit uncertain as to which way he should go because the only signs were in Japanese, went down the stairs into the Ginza station of the subway, there to be engulfed by the mass of Japanese pushing their way into the waiting cars.

He bowed politely to the man in the next seat and asked whether the train was bound for Shibuya and how many stations away it was.

He was the only foreigner in the car. Around him on all sides were cold glances of suspicion. Why was he there?

The Japanese, unable to cast aside the traditional courtesy of his race, responded that yes, this was the train for Shibuya. Then he hurriedly got up and moved to another part of the car. There are many Japanese these troubled days who report fellow citizens who talk with foreigners.

Many Germans Evident
Japan, today, is decidedly spy conscious. Strangely enough, this development coincides with the arrival of hundreds of Germans, some of whom have definite official places in the business of censorship and allied matters.

Another foreigner, this time a newspaper man, invited a Japanese friend to have lunch with him, and the next day stern police were on hand to warn the Japanese against such associations. They wanted to know in detail what the two had talked about.

The vernacular and even the

government have two favorite terms for the present situation. It is either "delicate" or "tense." Four years of depressing warfare in China, has driven the Japanese to suspicions which are alien to their nature. They would like to be a friendly, pleasure enjoying empire, but they can't. Forces out of control drive them on.

Telephone Restrictions

Latest manifestations of the suspicion attached to foreigners came with the new telephone and telegraph regulations, inside Japan, except within the limits of the city in which you are talking, all telephone conversations must be in Japanese.

This rather effectively keeps newspaper correspondents in Tokyo, for few if any, know Japanese well enough to dictate a story in that language. The moment a word is spoken in another language the circuit is broken.

Let a group of foreigners — Germans and Italians included — gather in the lobby of the once swank Imperial Hotel, and almost immediately an unobtrusive Japanese will be seated nearby, studying the ceiling.

Spearhead of the anti-spy campaign, which was marked by a week of special lectures, pictures and posters, is the severe national Defense Security Law, which includes the death penalty for some violations of its provisions. It applies to Japanese and foreigners alike.

Tufted Spreads Is Big Business

DALTON, Ga. — The sale of a single tufted cotton bedspread by a 12-year-old farm girl for \$250 back in 1900 is an event which will long be remembered in this section of Georgia.

It ought to be. Just the other day a buyer for one large New York department store stepped on a north-bound train after signing contracts for the purchase of five carloads of these same tufted spreads.

There's just one big difference in the tufted cotton bedspreads today and the one Catherine Adams sold forty years ago. Catherine made hers by hand. Now machines make them. And one machine does the work of 600 hands.

"Bedspread Boulevard," a fifty-mile stretch down the Dixie Highway in Georgia, today consumes 30,000 bales of cotton a year. And that's a far cry from the scant pound or so Catherine Evans used in duplicating the spread which had been handed down in her family as a treasured heirloom.

Once Catherine had made the first fine tufted spread, it wasn't long before the neighbors took it up. And then there was an order from John Wannamakers for half a dozen spreads.

That order from Wannamakers started a landslide and before long even the business men were desert-
