War On Grasshopper Menace Started

Grand Jury Makes Recommendations in Cone Case

URGE FURTHER INVESTIGATION IN THIS CASE

No Indictments Returned by Grand Jury; No Jury Cases First Two Weeks of Court

COURT NEXT WEEK

Cases Tried During This Term of District Court; Petit Jury May 1

The Grand Jury for the April Term of the District Court of Ochiltree County adjourned Tuesday, April 25, without returning any bill of indictment. The petit jury called for this week of court was dismissed as no jury cases were ready for trial. Non-jury cases have been disposed of by District Judge Jack Allen during the present term of court, which convened April 17.

Considerable time and effort was spent by the Grand Jury in the investigation of the death of W. E. Cone and the disappearance of the two Cone children which occurred in this county on or about June 1, 1938. The unearthing of bones belonging to a child on Wolf Creek a few weeks ago resulted in renewed interest in the solving of this seven-year-old mystery. The following cases regarding the Cone case were taken from the final report of the Grand Jury:

The investigations being made have not reached the stage of development where at this time we can be authorized in taking any definite action thereon. We feel, however, that the investigation that we have made has reached the point where we can go no further, and that it has been extended to a point whereby in the future same may be carried out to a satisfactory conclusion, and a final report made.

BANKS CONSOLIDATE APR. 21

TWO CANADIAN BANKS CONSOLIDATE AND OPEN AS FIRST NATIONAL ON LAST SATURDAY

A deal was consummated on Friday, April 21, to consolidate the First National Bank and the Southwestern National Bank of Canadian. The consolidation was made in order to effect economies in cost of operation, officials said.

The new bank will continue to use the present name and charter of the First National Bank and use the building at the Second and Main Street, now occupied by the Southwestern National Bank.

Capital stock of the First National Bank, according to its statement as of March 29, 1939, is \$75,000; surplus, \$25,000; undivided profits, \$75,635.59; deposits \$563,373.66.

According to its statement as of March 29, 1939, the Southwestern National Bank's capital stock is \$100,000; surplus \$15,000; undivided profits \$15,398.27, and total deposits \$379,190.80.

FEEDING OUT FALL LITTER

TWO OCHILTREE COUNTY BOYS RECENTLY COMPLETED THE FEEDING OUT OF SOWS AND FALL LITTERS

Two Ochiltree county 4H Club boys have each recently finished feeding out their fall litters of pigs to a weight of more than a ton of pork.

C. J. Frantz Jr. living 14 miles west of Perryton won first place with sow and litter of nine pigs at the stock show here last fall. The pigs were then fed out and showed at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show, winning third place. The nine pigs weighed out at the end of six months to a total of 2140 pounds. An average of 236.7 pound each. A self feeder with barley chops and a protein supplement of equal parts of cotton seed meal and tagase was used in the feeding out. The pigs also had access to a mineral mixture of equal parts of limestone flour and salt.

Ray Schwab of Lone Tree community finished out his litter of 10 pigs to an average of 225 pounds each of a total of 2248 pounds. The pigs were marketed at an age of seven months and 10 days. They were fed on a self feed with barley chops with a protein supplement of equal parts of tagase and cotton seed meal. Skim milk was also fed throughout the feeding period thus reducing the quantity of tagase and cotton seed meal required.

Twenty-five boys have enrolled in 4H Club swine work for 1939, either with single fat pigs or bred sows or gilts.

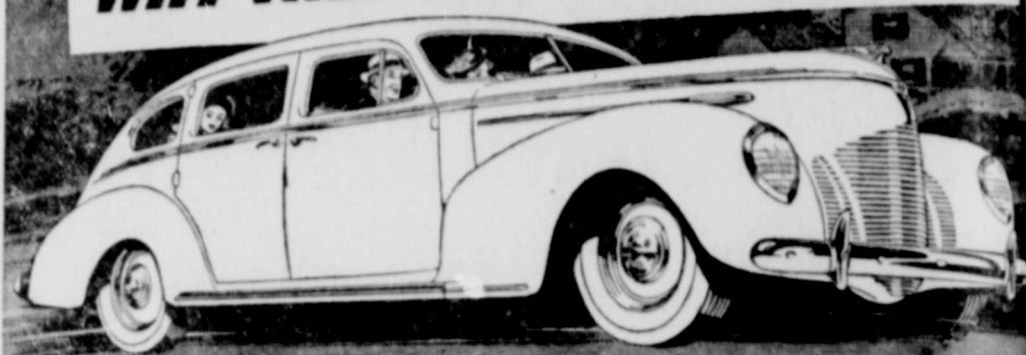

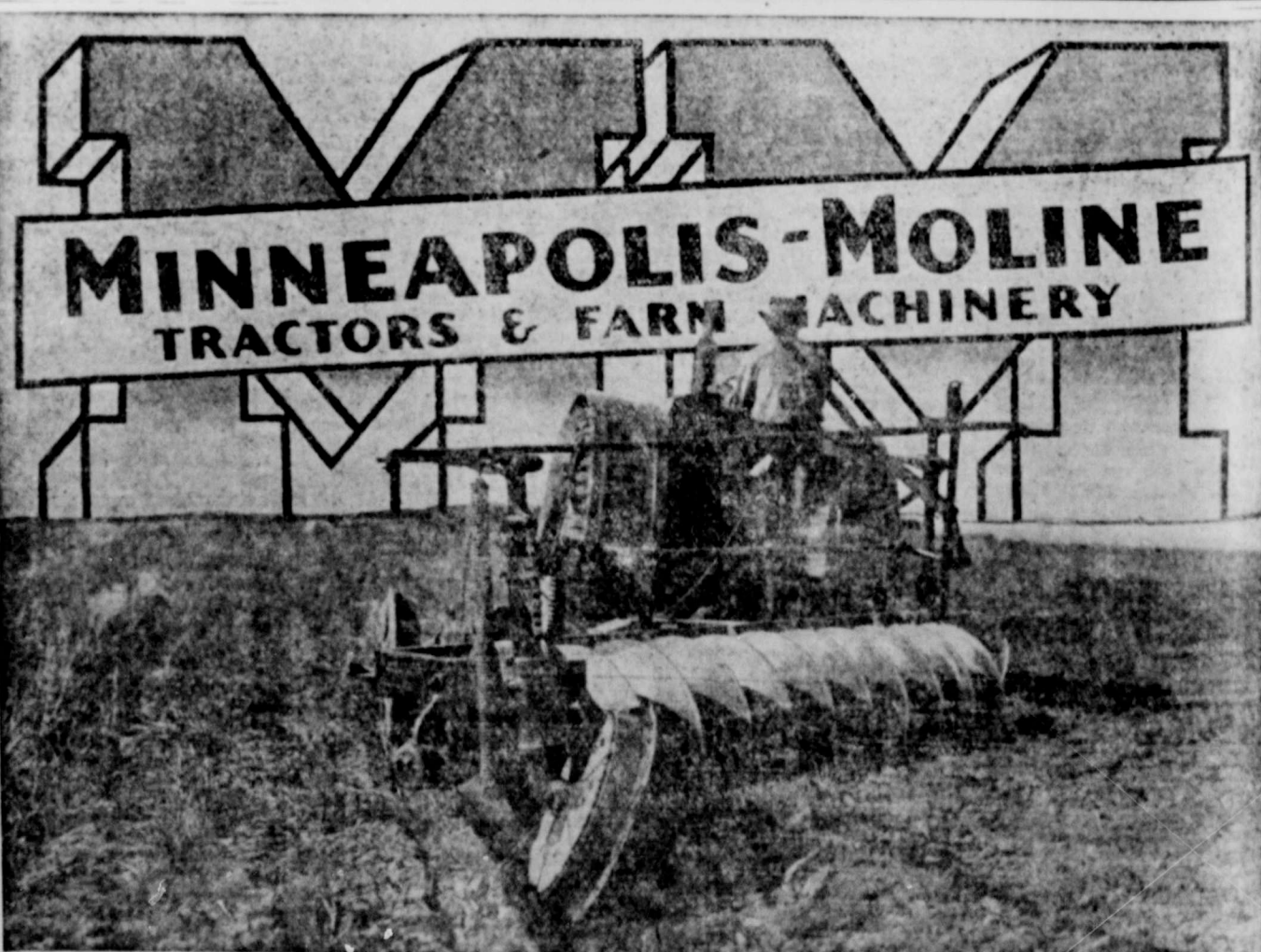

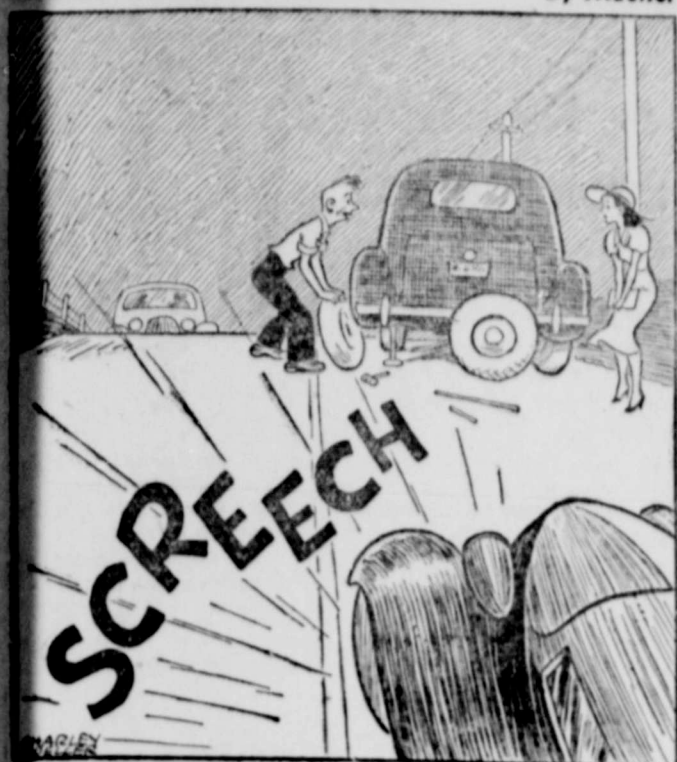

Highway Haulers pay their share

More than \$1,000,000 daily in taxes for use of Highways

In the four-year period from 1934 through 1937, federal, state and local taxes paid for motor truck operation totaled \$1,439,801,000. This figure exceeded tax payments of any other commercial carrier during the period.

Taxes paid by trucks in 1937 totaled \$417,510,000 as compared to \$308,828,000 in 1934. (Does not include taxes paid on income, payroll or property.)

REQUIRES MORE THAN MOISTURE

TO TAKE MORE THAN MOISTURE TO STOP WIND EROSION ACCORDING TO THE SCS AUTHORITY

Amarillo, Texas—Recent severe dust storms, coming when the Southern Great Plains as a whole has had heavy rains and snows during the winter with moisture conditions being the best in several years, proves conclusively that moisture alone will not control wind erosion, declares H. H. Pinnell, regional director of the Soil Conservation Service.

"High winds normally prevail in this area from January until May, and any land without protective vegetation or crop residues and trash can be expected to suffer damage from soil blowing during this period," Pinnell points out. "When such a condition exists, the farmer's only recourse is to list his land to create a rough, cloddy surface which will break the force of the wind and check the movement of soil. If this is done on the contour, the land is placed in condition to catch and hold moisture from spring rains which will aid in growing vegetation for protection during the next year."

The actual acreage subject to severe soil losses from blowing has been reduced from approximately 6,000,000 acres in 1938 to little more than 2,500,000 this year. The increasing use of soil and water conservation practices such as terracing, contour tillage, pasture furrowing, strip cropping and the growing of erosion-resistant crops, with improved moisture conditions, has been largely responsible for this improvement, the conservation director believes.

"The extended drought robbed millions of acres of the organic matter and left the land without protection during the blowing season. Until crops are grown and residues and trash are restored to the soil, land in such condition will remain subject to damage. Moisture is the essential requirement for vegetative growth."

"Regardless of how much rain or snow falls upon the land, it can be of little benefit to crops if allowed to rush down the slopes into roadside ditches, creeks and rivers. Water which runs off a field is lost for crop use on that field," Pinnell declares.

Observations on Soil Conservation Service areas and adjacent land following the recent dust storms show:

That good moisture in the soil, alone, did not control wind erosion.

That fields with no residue other than cotton stalks were blowing.

That grain sorghum fields from which crop residues had been removed, either by close harvesting or grazing, were blowing.

That fields with adequate grain sorghum stubble and residue were not blowing.

That fields listed after the January rains were not blowing.

That fields where cotton and grain sorghum stalks had been cut with a stalk cutter were blowing.

Physical Education

Demonstrate Respiration and Life Saving in Physical Ed on Friday, April 21

Lloyd B. Spence, a former life-guard at Lake Worth, assisted by Harold Witt, gave a demonstration of life saving and respiration during Physical Education period on Friday April 21. Mr. Spence demonstrated the strangle holds of a drowning person. The strangle holds are: front strangle hold, back strangle hold, single wrist lock, and the double wrist lock.

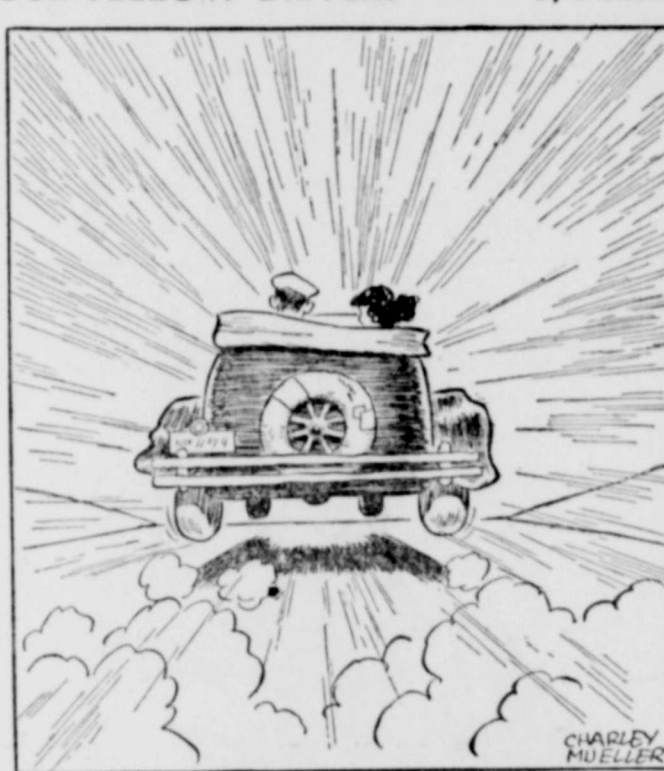

Civil War Vet Dies

Levi Sprague, Last of Civil War Veterans in Beaver County Died April 15

Levi Sprague, 90 years old, and last remaining Civil War veteran of Beaver County, died at the Beaver hospital Saturday, April 15. He was born in Michigan August 12, 1848.

He grew to manhood in Lima, Ohio. In 1864 he enlisted in the Union army, Company F, 82 regiment of the Ohio Veterans. He fought in the Battle of Peach Tree Creek, marched with General Sherman to the sea and was honorably discharged from the service of the United States, July 24, 1865 in Louisville, Kentucky.

He was married to Henrietta Bevens October 7, 1868 and to this union were born eight children, three preceding him in death.

The family moved to Arkansas and in 1905 moved westward into eastern Oklahoma near Chandler where his wife passed away.

In 1905 he filed on a claim near Elmwood and lived in that vicinity until his death.

On June 9, 1905, he was married to Mrs. Mary Plann.

He leaves to mourn his loss, his wife, Mrs. Mary Sprague; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Babcock and Mrs. Clara Russell of Akron, Ohio; three daughters, Mrs. David Hodson, Tyronne, Mrs. J. L. T. Reeves, Beaver, and Mrs. A.A. Oringderff, Balko; two sons, Nelson of Cushing and Albert of St. Louis, Mo.; 36 grandchildren, 68 great grandchildren and two great, great grandchildren.

Also two step-daughters, Mrs. Lydia Blosser and Mrs. John Longcor of Elmwood; four stepsons, W. G. Plann of Parma, Mo., Christopher Plann of Kansas City, Mo.; Walter and Fred Plann of Elmwood, a number of step-grandchildren and a host of friends.

mystery connected with this tragedy be solved, or, at least, the minds of the public be satisfied as to certain angles of the case that have been more recently brought to light in connection with the matter.

"We feel that the public has a right to demand that this investigation be carried on to a final conclusion, and in order that the proper effort be made in that respect, we recommend to the Commissioners Court of this County that the necessary expenses be allowed for the purpose of defraying the expenses incurred in necessary travel to and from the penitentiary of the State of Oregon for the purpose of interviewing two inmates there who have heretofore made statements accepting responsibility for the disappearance of the Cone children. In connection herewith, we suggest that the District Attorney of this District and some other designated official, and some citizen of this county, who is acquainted with the circumstances surrounding this mystery, be named to develop this phase of the investigation."
