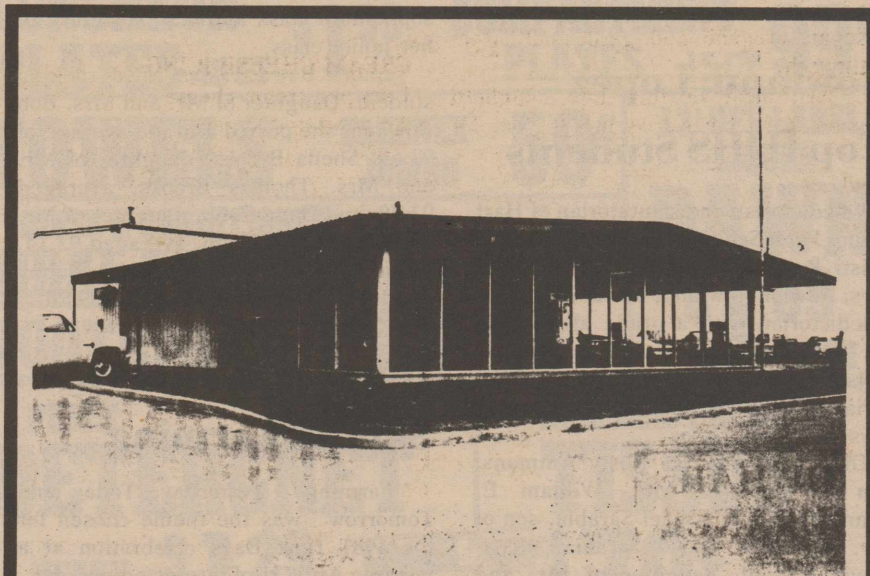

SPAGHETTI PIE

6 oz spaghetti
2 T butter or margarine
1/3 c grated parmesan cheese
2 well beaten eggs
1 c Velveeta cheese, grated
1 lb ground beef or bulk pork sausage
1/2 c chopped onion
1/4 c chopped green pepper
1 8 oz can (1 cup) tomatoes, cut up
1 6 oz can tomato paste
1 t sugar
1 t dried oregano, crushed
1/2 t garlic salt
1/2 c shredded Mozzarella cheese

Cook the spaghetti according to package directions; drain (should have about 3 cups spaghetti). Stir butter or margarine into hot spaghetti; stir in Parmesan cheese and eggs. Form spaghetti mixture into a "crust" in a buttered 10 inch pie plate. Spread Velveeta cheese over bottom of spaghetti crust.

2 T green pepper, chopped finely

2 T milk

Blend cheese and milk. Stir in beef, onion, green pepper and black pepper. Mix well. Stir in sour cream. Put in baking dish. Sprinkle top with nuts. Bake 15 mins at 350°.

3 eggs
1 8 oz can crushed pineapple with juice
1 c pecans
3 bananas, mashed
1 t vanilla

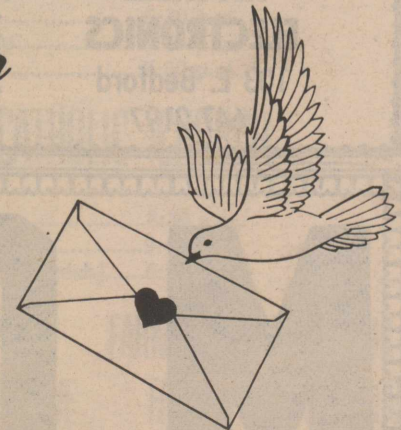

Glass Art Demonstrated For Chi Psi Sorority Recently

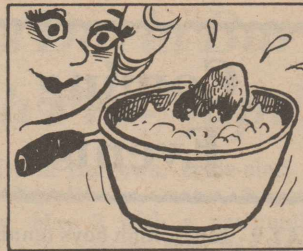

From the TAP Kitchen



BAKED STUFFED ONIONS is a deliciously different way to prepare onions, notes the Texas Department of Agriculture's home economist. Onion harvest is fully underway in the Lower Valley and a plentiful supply of fresh onions is now available in local supermarkets.

BAKED STUFFED ONIONS

- 6 onions
- 1 C. prepared cornbread dressing
- 1/4 C. chopped celery
- 1/4 C. chopped green pepper
- 1/3 C. chopped pimento
- 1 C. finely chopped ham

Peel onions, cut top off by cutting zig zag cuts in top of onion. Mix together dressing (according to directions on package), celery, green pepper, pimento, and ham. Stuff top of onions dividing mixture between the six onions. Wrap in foil and bake in 350 degree oven for 30-45 minutes.

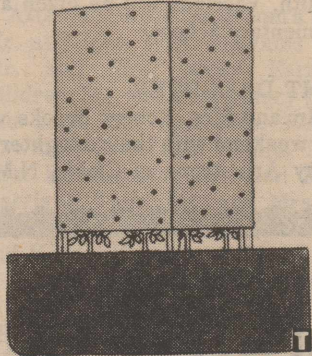

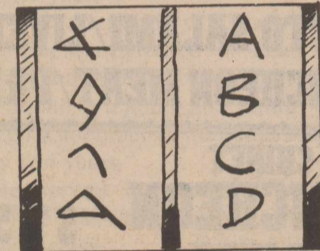
