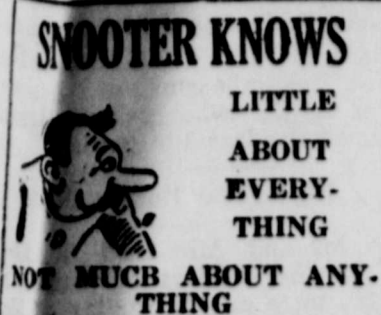

PROPERTY DAMAGE BY WIND AND RAIN

Friday evening of last week, a cloud, about the size of an umbrella, formed just west of town, came up on the denizens and emptied out hail stones about the size of marbles, some a little larger, that covered the ground, accompanied by a fairly good sprinkle of rain. All this time clouds were forming to the west and a little south of town, and when inflated with about all the wind they could carry, scooted into town on a 50 or 60-mile gale and a torrent of rain. The town and country south of the railroad tracks bore the brunt of the storm. Small out-buildings were blown down and barn unroofed. A rent house on the Louis Wren's farm south of town was demolished and household goods scattered over the premises. He also lost his brood or house and garage and the rain washed out his crop.

A brick chimney on his farm south of town, tumbled in the wake of the wind water pouring down through the hole carrying black soot and spreading it out over the interior ruining draperies and other articles. Roof of the barn of J. R. Sale, on his farm just south of town, was ripped off exposing feed to the heavy rain. George Lewis reported the wind blew water through his house as if it were a sieve. To keep pace with getting the water out of the house as fast as it came in George had to bore a hole in the floor with an auger and bit. Chicken house on the Lewis farm was blown down. The hardest rain he has ever seen fall in this community according to Mr. Lewis and he has been here all his life—some 25 years or more—measuring some four or five inches. On the M. F. Parker farm, south of town the rain was very heavy, filling all tanks to the overflowing mark and inundating the public road along the east side of his farm.

The wind was of such high velocity had it ever gotten into the least bit of a whirl, everything in its path would have been demolished. In Stanton the wind was at high speed but no damage reported. What rain fell north of the railroad track in town was blown across from the cloud that had opened its flood gates south of the railroad.

The path of the rain storm was about two miles wide and the precipitation ranged from two to five inches.

\$45,000 ROAD BONDS LOSES BY 10 VOTES

Disappointment prevails among 274 qualified voters of Martin county, as well, as we suppose, there is rejoicing in the camp of 152 voters in the county, as the former vote was for the \$45,000 county-wide road bond issue and the latter number was the vote cast against the issue, in the election held Saturday. The total vote cast revealed there was little interest taken in the matter. Out of over 1250 qualified voters in Martin county only 426 of them voted in Saturday's election. Even the most optimistic supporter of the bond issue agreed that to poll a two-third majority of all the votes cast was a leap over a pretty high hurdle to start with, but still it was agreed that as vital a proposition as the project was to the county, meaning a ribbon of hard-surfaced road traveling the county from the north to the south, connecting with major roads at Lamesa, Dawson county, and providing an outlet from Andrews county to the east, the supporter of the project felt pretty sure the bond issue would carry despite the big majority the proposition had to carry.

The votes at the two boxes Nos 1 and 2, counted on as polling big majorities, did not prove as elastic as figured. The voting strength of box No. 1 is some 200 votes and box No. 2 over 200 votes, the two boxes polled only 181 votes.

To Valley View goes the credit for casting 100 per cent vote for the bonds, while to the voting box of Earl Bryant goes the honor of voting 100 per cent against the issue.

The bond issue lacked 10 votes of the commissioners' court met Monday and canvassed the votes cast in Saturday's election, recording the following results.

WASHING GREASE WOOL SUBJECT, FLOWER GROVE

Four galvanized wash tubs, a small wooden paddle to agitate the wool, and a laundry wringer are essential in washing wool. Mrs. Ralph Mullins, bedroom demonstrator told the Flower Grove club in its meeting at Mrs. C. W. Butcher's, May 18, at 2:30 p. m.

"Have first tub 120 degrees F. with box of Dreet, second tub 115 F. with half the amount of Dreet, third tub, 110 degrees F. with a very small amount of Dreet. The fourth tub, 100 degrees F. (this is about blood temperature) and should be clear water for rinse. Also, half pound sal soda, and 3 lbs. soap to 10 gallons water can be used instead of the Dreet.

One new member was present Mrs. Robert Dunn.

It was agreed that each member bring from 2 to 6 eggs each meeting for the treasury.

WOOL WASHING DEMONSTRATION

Wool washing was demonstrated at the meeting Tuesday of the Lenorah home demonstration club, held at the home of Mrs. Delmar Hamm.

Equipment needed consists of the following:

(a) Four galvanized wash tubs.

(b) Small wooden paddle to agitate wool while in scouring solution.

(c) Laundry wringer. Preparation of scouring solution as follows:

(a) Heat 10 gallons of water then add 1/2 pound sal soda and stir well. To this add 3 lbs. of soap.

Strength of scouring solution: (a) The water in the first tub should be heated to 120 degrees F.

(b) Water in second tub should be 115 degrees F.

(c) The third tub should be heated to 110 degrees F.

(d) The fourth tub should be heated to 100 degrees F.

Method of handling wool:

The wool should be opened as much as possible with the fingers to allow all loose sand, dirt, etc., to fall out. Care should be taken to put only small amount of wool in the tub so as to allow plenty of freedom of the fiber. The scoured wool should be spread out in the sun and dried.

If these directions are followed the wool will be in good condition to press into filling for comforts and yarn.
