BUREAU RELEASES 1926 FINAL COTTON FIGURES

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, March 21.—The 1926 cotton crop was placed at 17,687,607 running bales or 17,910,258 equivalent 500-pound bales, by the Census Bureau today in its final ginning report of the season.

The crop compares with 16,103,679 equivalent 500-pound bales for the 1925 season.

NEW YORK, March 21.—Cotton prices rallied from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per bale today on the publication of the Census Bureau report of the total ginnings which was smaller than expected.

KIRK MURDER CASE TO TRIAL NEXT MONDAY

The L. P. Kirk murder case, which some time ago was transferred to Sweetwater from Ballinger, will be called to trial next Monday morning, March 28, in Sweetwater, John White, chief deputy sheriff here, announced Monday.

The sheriff's department here has received several summonses for new witnesses in the case and all have been served with subpoenas. It is expected that the case will be ready for trial next Monday morning.

Kirk is charged with the murder of Crawford A. Tabor, a young Runnels county farmer, residing in the Wingate community, two or three years ago.

At the last session of district court for Nolan county the case was postponed until the next term.

Miss Spicer is the daughter of Sir Albert Spicer, a wealthy paper manufacturer, who is a staunch Liberal.

TEXAS CONGRESS MEET IN AUSTIN

The fifth annual conference of the Seventh District Texas Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teachers Associations will be held at Austin on April 4, 5 and 6, according to an announcement sent out by Mrs. J. M. Ramsey, of Austin, district president of the association.

Every Parent-Teachers association affiliated with the state and national congress is entitled to send its president and one voting delegate for every ten paid-up members. All others who are interested in child welfare work are also invited to attend this convention.

There are 22 counties in the seventh district. They are: Bastrop, Blanco, Brown, Burnet, Caldwell, Coleman, Comanche, Concho, Gillespie, Hamilton, Hays, Kimble, Llano, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Mills, Runnels, San Saba, Travis and Williamson. All these counties are expected to have at least one representative each at the meeting, while there will be many counties with several representatives.

The work carried on by this organization deals only with Child Welfare and the results of the past workings of the organization show that an unlimited interest is being taken in the organization by the Texas Mothers.

Runnels county will probably have two or more delegates at the conference.

Chinese Break Barrier of Foreign Settlement

SHANGHAI, March 21.—Chaos reigned in Shanghai tonight after the fall of the city to the Cantonese troops of the Southern army.

Rioters ran loose in the native quarters of the city all day and tonight a band of Chinese troops broke through the barrier on the northern edge of the international settlement and began looting there.

A British armored motor car was rushed up in response to a police call for aid. The car was subjected to continuous machine-gun fire.

Four soldiers were wounded in the rioting.

The Shantungese fled at the approach of the Cantonese and the city was taken without any fighting.

A number of disorders, however, have been reported and the foreign guards were strengthened in order to take care of the situation.

In one disturbance a British trooper was killed and several persons were injured.

SHANGHAI, March 21.—Shanghai was virtually in the control of the Chinese Nationalist forces today, the Southerners having entered the native part of the city this morning when disorders developed near the borders of the international settlement.

Soon after the Nationalists arrived, 1,500 United States marines were landed, while the Japanese landed 900 troops.

Immediately the general strike ordered to celebrate the coming of the Southerners went into effect and at noon there was every indication that there would be a widespread response by all classes of workers.

MERCURY DROPS TO 28 ABOVE ZERO

The government thermometer registered 28 degrees above zero here Saturday night as the low point following the north wind, rain and sleet. The mercury registered 62 degrees Saturday morning and dropped Saturday night to 28, or four points below freezing.

The low registration Sunday night was 30 degrees, and the high spot Sunday afternoon was 50 degrees.

Snyder was found slain in his home yesterday while his wife had been bound with a wire.

District Attorney Newcombe said today that a charge of homicide would be filed against Mrs. Snyder, but he declined to say what charge will be filed against Gray.

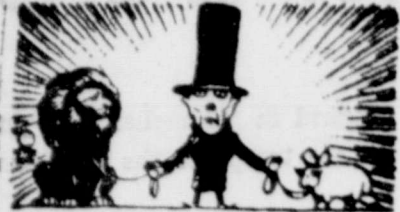
