The Houston County Poultry Show.

The secretary is receiving inquiries every day for catalogs and further information regarding the show, and everything points to a good exhibit from outside breeders. So far, however, the indications are not so good for exhibits from county breeders and it behooves the members of the association to get busy and help secure entries from the county. We cannot afford to advertise a big show, secure exhibits from other parts of the state, and then have nothing to show for our own community. Every inducement has been held out to local poultry raisers to bring in their birds, and below will be found additional premiums which have been arranged for.

Owners of thoroughbred poultry should not hesitate to exhibit what they have, even if they do not know it to be the best. Birds which the amateur may not think good may prove to score well; for the standard requirements, remember, are for ideal birds which never have existed, and it is not expected to find any one bird perfect in all points. Even if a breeder does not win way up, he will show his interest and have his birds passed on by one of the foremost judges in the country, which will help to improve his stock by another year. Send your entries in right away, so the secretary may not have all the entry work piled up at the last minute. One or two officers, no matter how enthusiastic and willing they may be, nor how hard they may

work, cannot make the show a success unless they have the earnest support of every member of the association.

The following additional prizes have been offered to Houston county breeders:

For best dozen brown hen eggs: first prize, one year's subscription Poultry Journal; second prize, ribbon; third prize, ribbon.

For best dozen white hen eggs: first prize, one year subscription Poultry Journal; second and third prizes, ribbons.

For best dozen white duck eggs: first prize, one year subscription Poultry Journal; second and third prizes, ribbons.

Best Capons, any breed: first prize, year subscription Poultry Journal; second and third prizes, ribbons.

In each of the above there must be two or more entries or winner will take ribbon only. No entry fee required.

The secretary of the association offers the following:

For best dry picked and dressed broiler, any breed, grown and dressed by boy or girl under seventeen years of age: first prize, one sitting Wosumok White Wyandotte eggs; second prize, copy Philo System book; third prize, year subscription Poultry Journal.

For best dry picked and dressed roaster, any breed, grown and dressed by boy or girl under 17 years of age: same premiums as above for broiler.

Above competition open to any boy or girl in Houston county; no

entry fee; to be brought to show room by 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, October 11.

Special ribbons have also been received from the Texas White Wyandotte Club to be awarded for best hen, best cock, best pullet, best cockerel and best pen of this breed in the show—competition open to any member of the White Wyandotte Club. Any breeder of White Wyandottes can receive certificate of membership, entitling him to compete for club prizes anywhere, by sending his name and address, with one dollar for one year's dues, to Mrs. J. L. Winnifred, Secretary, Lancaster, Texas.

The Road to Health.

It was something like three years ago that an ambitious book-keeper complained to the writer of his inability to keep his eyes open the moment he applied them to books of an evening after work. Since boyhood he had contributed to the support of a family of seven, and now at the age of 24 he desired to take up shorthand and to carry a correspondence course or two. If by hook or crook he did manage to work until 11 and 12 o'clock his mind would be dull and heavy the next day. At one time he was so ill advised as to try drinking strong tea for supper. Tea kept his eyes open all right, but headaches began to manifest themselves, and then sleeplessness and other symptoms of nervousness put in an appearance. The young man dropped the tea, and the headaches and nervousness disappeared almost immediately, but evening work was still impossible. The writer suggested to him that he discontinue his supper, eating at most an apple or other fresh fruit, or perhaps a bowl of cereal flakes with the juice of stewed fruit. He adopted the suggestion, adding to it one of his own devices—that he be careful at all meals to choose only the digestible foods—and before a year had gone his knowledge of short hand had gained him a private secretaryship to the president of his concern, and he is now a small stockholder. He had capitalized his time.

An eminent political economist recently ventured the assertion that not more than one person in ten is healthy—meaning by "healthy" not "just so so," but positively, vitally, actively, radiantly so. The other nine sort of worry along, some in positive

ill health, the others neither sick nor well, both classes a burden to themselves and to those who are obliged to live and work with them. And in as much as these persons are so preponderatingly in the majority it is pertinent to ask, "Can health come back?"

The answer is most emphatically that it can if you are willing to deny yourself accustomed luxuries. Self-denial—that is the price of getting well. It sounds a good deal easier than parting with good gold, but most people prefer contributing to the support of a physician to giving up one of their three or four daily meals, or a cup of tea. A drug trade journal recently descanted upon what it was pleased to call the "ivory headed public." The burden of the editor's satire was this: "In their ability to resist the letting in of information concerning matters of health, the heads of a remarkably large portion of the general public seem to be made of solid ivory, bone or wood. Patronize the restaurants and hotel dining rooms and note how many stuff their stomachs full of unmastered food, making it go down with icewater, coffee, beer or wine, instead of the natural digestive fluids of the mouth." If these strictures seem to be severe, try a little experiment. Select a dozen persons who for financial reasons are in particular need of the mental efficiency that comes of vigorous health and persuade them to adopt the suggestions contained in the following pages and then observe how few of them persevere. When a week of proper eating fails to correct the results of a life time of indulgence, they give up in despair and go back to fleshpots of the Nile with a suspicion that you are a crank.—Austin Statesman.

The Fast Young Man.

The sixty-seventh district grand jury, in its report submitted Tuesday, calls the attention of the court and the public to the large number of forgeries committed in Fort Worth during its session.

"Forgery is a prevailing crime," the grand jury says, "and the offenders, for the most part, young men." The frequency with which forgeries are committed are attributed to the "high pressure and tension of fast living."

Whether, as a matter of fact, young men are the chief offenders may be questioned by those who watch the criminal records from year to year, but there is no question that "fast" living is the principal cause of forgeries, or that this particular crime is ever on the increase.

Crime is not natural; it is always abnormal, and springs from abnormal conditions.

The clerk in the bank or the store or the office, whose salary is only \$75 or \$100 a month, creates an abnormal condition when he allows his expenses to exceed his monthly income. If he does not bring himself up short, he gradually drags behind until it is easy for him to persuade himself that if he can get money somewhere, some way, any way, to meet the present emergency, he will be able by some lucky turn of fortune to pay it back and escape punishment.

But the law gets him, and whatever he has gained of self-respect or of the respect of his business associates, is lost.

The way of the transgressor is a worn path that has been traveled by foolish, ignorant men years without number. It is a one-way road, for mighty seldom do the lawbreakers come back.

Let the young man who is getting his start in the world of business on a meagre but living salary remember that he can afford for a while to forego some of the pleasures that appeal to

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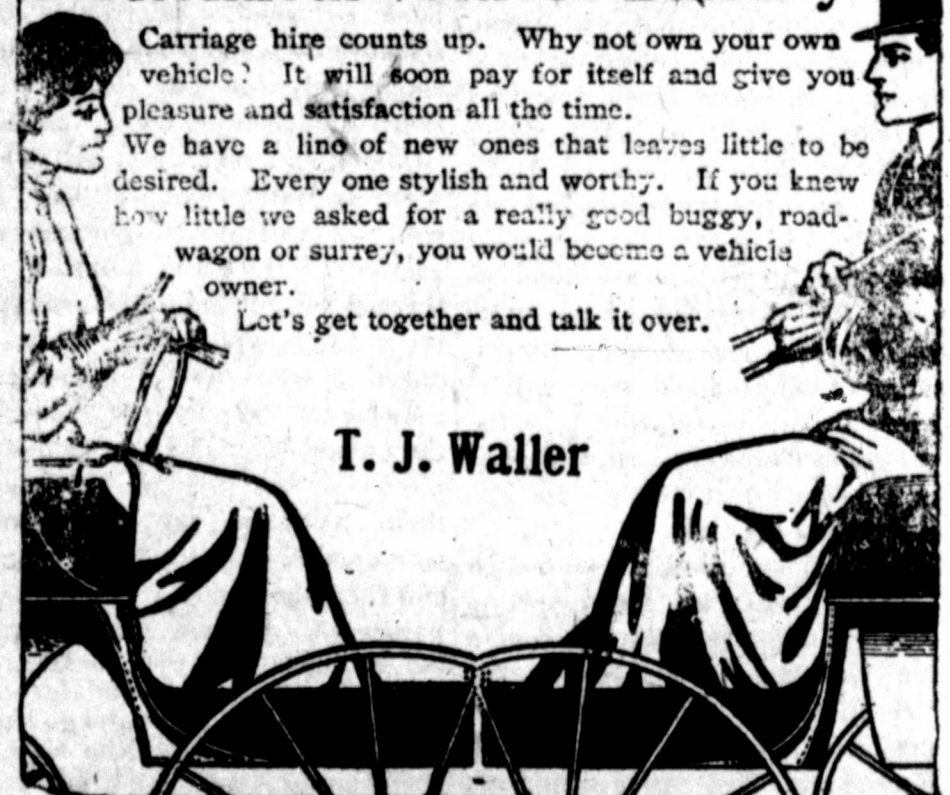
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
