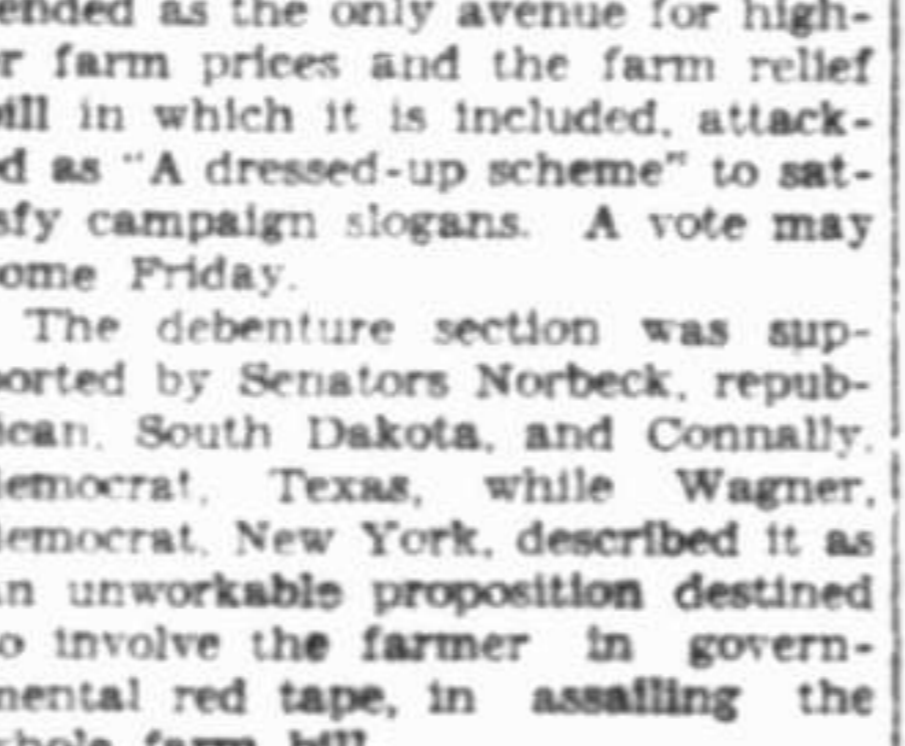

Tornado Struck

The tornado struck about one-half mile down the valley from the school, overturned several buildings, taking the roofs from others before ripping the two-story frame school asunder, and strewn the wreckage several hundred yards. Some of the children were blown 100 feet from the building while others were buried in the debris.

Scene Of Confusion

Newspapermen who went to the scene from Kingsport, Tenn., found a scene of great confusion. Bodies of the dead had been removed from the wreckage to nearby houses and the injured were being carried to Clinchport. Parents and friends were running about frantically in search of missing children.

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He Dreamed The "Cloudscraper" Forty Seven Years Ago—Now He Is Getting First Recognition; "Doubt Of Honor" Is Finally Settled

(By NEA Service)
MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., May 2.—Sometimes dreams do come true—though occasionally the dreamer has to wait a long, long time. Forty-seven years ago a Minneapolis architect, just turned 34, dreamed of a new kind of building for big cities; a building that should tower high in the air, relying on steel instead of stone for its strength, lifting its occupants three or four times as high above the streets as any buildings that then existed.

He devised a formula by which such buildings could be erected. He patented it; and he foresaw himself growing rich and famous, collecting royalties from the construction of all such buildings.

Architects derided him. But instead he won ridicule and prison. Architects and builders called him a crank, and "crack-brained" was one of the nicest adjectives applied to him. Then, later, when his idea came into use, he couldn't collect his royalties. Until but it's time to go back and start from the beginning.

The architect is Leroy S. Buffington, a builder of many of the best-known structures in the northwest United States and Canada. He has designed 12 hotels, the old Minnesota state capitol, numerous apartment houses, railway stations and many University of Minnesota buildings.

In 1882 he had just completed a five-story office building in Minneapolis, using more cast iron and beams than was usual at that time. Musing on his accomplishment, he thought somewhat as follows:

"Some time, even in this vast prairie, land is going to be too valuable in our big cities to confine our buildings to seven or eight stories. Some method must be devised whereby we can build much higher."
So he set himself the task of finding such a method—although the leading architects and structural engineers of the day said it was impossible.

"My first real inspiration," he said, "came when I read a translation of Viollet le Duc's treatise on architecture, in which he said: 'A practical architect might not naturally conceive the idea of erecting a vast edifice whose frame should be entirely of iron and clothing that frame with stone. But iron must be kept independent; it cannot be allied with masonry.'"

Tried Many Plans
"For many nights I sat at my drawing desk working out plans and then abandoning them because of their impracticability. At last the idea came into my mind of a cloudscraper—that's what they would be called for skyscraper means nothing in which the masonry veneer was supported at each successive story on an iron shelf."

"Two years after I set to work on the project I drew up an application for a patent. I drew up plans for a 28-story building in accordance with my theory, and at

the same time erected the West Hotel here, adopting in its construction the same principles. It still stands, and is as strong now as the day it was built.

Finally, in 1888, I was granted a patent. Then you should have heard the derision. 'Crack' 'fool,' 'notoriety seeker' and like epithets were hurled at me. I still have 500 clippings from various publications of that time telling what a half-brained rascal I was. Everyone just 'saw I belonged in an asylum.'

"But in a few years it became evident that there were quite a few men willing to take my ideas and put them into operation. Cloudscraper, according to my plans, began going up in a modest way. I called the attention of the builders and owners to the fact that they were infringing on my patent. They refused to settle and I went to

court with several of them. The result was that I spent \$30,000 and never collected a cent. Year after year I tried to cash in on my idea—but always I was done out of my royalties.

"Until just the other day."

The old gentleman pointed out of his office window to the towering frame of a building under construction nearby.

"You see that cloudscraper going

up down there—the Rand building," he said. "I'm receiving my first royalty off of that. And I didn't know a thing about it until the other day, long after it was started."

"I can't realize it yet, but it's true. After 30 years of litigation, after my patents have expired, along comes a man I never saw and generously offers to pay me a royalty on my invention which he could have used the same as the others, without cost."

"It's just a recognition where recognition is due," he told me. And then he handed me a check, the exact amount he would have had to pay had my patents been in force and had I made them stick in the courts."

"I am old, but I'm not broke and an act of charity. The check is quite appreciable to me for its intrinsic value, but much more than that I appreciate the recognition."

For there is no doubt about it, as Mr. Rand has learned after extensive investigation, that I did what no one else ever did—invented one of the three stages of architectural construction."

Felt Obligated to Pay
The building on which Mr. Buffington got his royalty is being built by Rufus L. Rand, millionaire Minneapolis capitalist.

"In the old days" Mr. Rand explained, "my grandfather had an office in the same building with Mr. Buffington. I remember him telling me that Mr. Buffington was the real father of the skyscraper and that he was euchered out of the benefits he was entitled to. I have since satisfied myself that such is the case."

"Without the genius of Mr. Buffington, my new building probably could not be erected today. Should I deprive him of his royalties just because I could do so under the law?"

WHEAT IN FINE SHAPE

Chicago Report Says Texas To Produce Much Grain

CHICAGO, May 2. (AP)—James E. Bennett said today: "J. C. Crouch of Dallas, wires me as follows and it coincides with other information along similar lines: 'Just completed 7,400 miles trip over entire Texas wheat belt, small strip running north and south of Abilene damaged some by wind and needs moisture, but this only small wheat producing territory. Central Texas territory north and west of Dallas also entire Panhandle and North Plains in perfect condition, with large increase in acreage, about 35 per cent above last year. 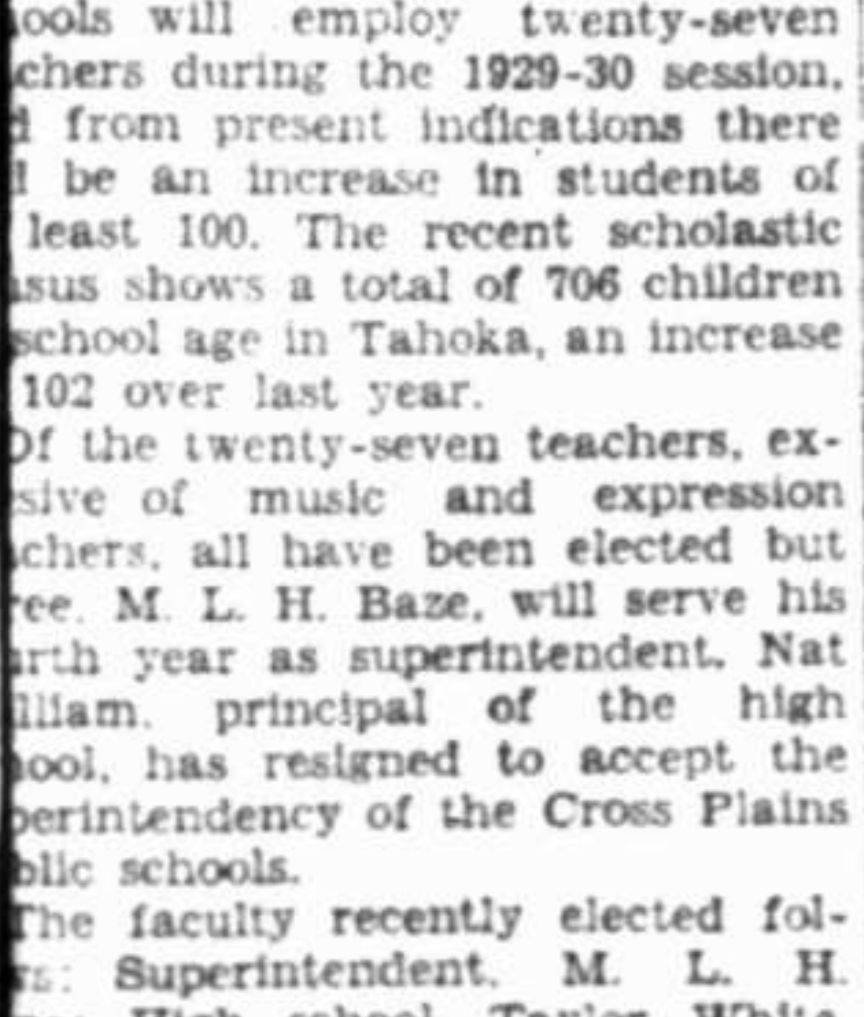

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Declaring the last campaign failed to give a clear cut decision on the type of relief the farmer wants, Senator Norbeck, republican, South Dakota, asserted in the Senate today that the substitution of the saloon for the equalization fee by Alfred E. Smith made the election of President Hoover certain "without any regard for the farm question."

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"I am not complaining about the attitude of President Hoover as some senators do," Senator Norbeck declared. Soil Tests Are To
Decide Number
Of Hilton Stories

Whether or not the Hilton hotel will be 14 or 16 stories, according to J. Gimare, superintendent of construction for the McKee Construction company, who are building the hotel, is to be determined within the next few days, after soil tests now being made are completed.

"It is possible that the building will go to 16 stories," Mr. Gimare declared, "if the soil tests prove that the ground is of sufficient strength to support that large a structure. If an additional foundation will be required, there is little possibility of the building going higher than 14 stories." Yesterday saw the beginning of the excavation work, the hotel site being on the lots formerly containing the old Merrill hotel, at the corner of Main street and Texas avenue. A steam shovel was busy digging into the ground and dumping great loads of dirt into trucks, the operation being watched by crowds of onlookers throughout the day.

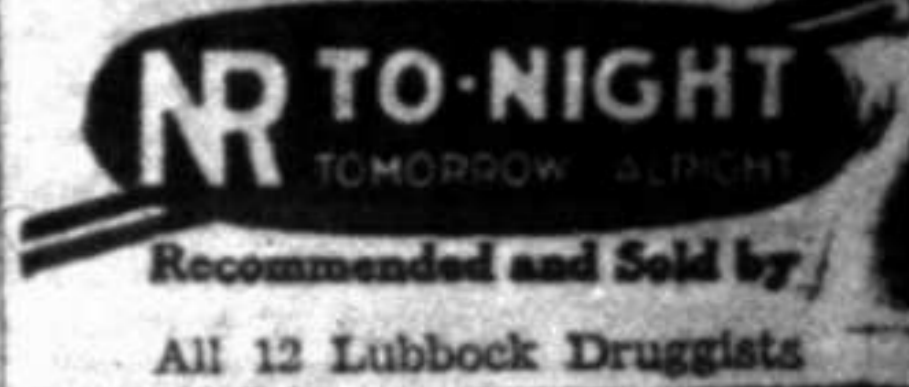

Hyer Parole Bill Passes In Senate

Measure Designed To Give State Satisfactory Law Is Approved With But One Dissenting Vote

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, May 2.—Senator Julien Hyer's parole bill, designed to give Texas a satisfactory parole law, passed the senate today with but one dissenting vote. Senator W. D. McFarlane, Graham voted against the amendment which he offered. The amendment concerned paroles recommended for persons serving indeterminate sentences. It provided that a convict would be eligible for parole at the end of one-third his maximum term rather than at the conclusion of his minimum length of service.

Senators A. J. Wirtz of Seguin and Thomas B. Love of Dallas concurred in the amendment. It conflicted with the indeterminate sentence law. It first was adopted, but senator Hyer withdrew his support of the amendment, and a motion to reconsider prevailed. 14 to 6. The amendment had been adopted by a vote of 12 to 6. While the proposed law would not divest the chief executive of any of his constitutional pardon and parole powers, its proponents claimed it would provide a systematic means for recommending clemency for meritorious convicts. It would be the duty of the board of pardons and paroles to investigate the clemency requests of all persons as soon as they became eligible for paroles.

Col. Slaughter established his ranch in 1902, originally being 230,000 acres. Following his death, in the division of the estate, the 17,000 acres to be colonized this fall have been allotted to C. C. Slaughter, Jr., of Dallas. Col. Slaughter was the grandfather of Jo Dick Slaughter and Bob Slaughter, of Lubbock.

Predicted Change

As one of the pioneer cattlemen of the plains, Colonel Slaughter more than 30 years ago dreamed of the day when cattle would vanish before the invasion of the farmer. When people of the plains country gathered in Plainview, in 1907, for a railroad celebration, Colonel Slaughter declared that "the day is not far off when the great fertile plains of Texas will become the bread-basket of the Southwest." His prediction has been borne out by happenings since that date.

In 1919, at the time of his death, Col. Slaughter owned nearly 1,000,000 acres of land, and his headquarters in Cochran county remain as one of the beauty spots of the cow country. Still standing on the 17,000 acres to be placed on the market for colonization this fall, the old headquarters building, a 12-room, Spanish type house, flanked by a tower, is occupied by the Oscar Sumner family at this time.

jo tariff protection.

"There are others knocking on the door of congress asking for legislative favors. The tariff masters are in Washington. They are asking for higher rates on manufactured goods. They will get them. The farmer will pay the increased cost for such goods.

"Those who are denouncing the debenture plan are demanding higher protection for the privileged few. They are demanding tariff bounties for the few. When it is proposed to turn the tariff around and give the farmer only 50 percent of the tariff on his exportable surplus, these apostles of privilege say that it is unsound and unworkable.

Bounties Are Sound.

"Bounties for the manufacturing few are sound. Bounties for the protected interests that have grown fat for 60 years upon privilege are sound. Export bounties for the farmers who have been exploited for 50 years are unsound.

"Export bounties for farmers who are suffering from depression and who are receiving ruinous prices cannot be tolerated by these pretended friends of the farmer.

"Unless the debenture plan system is adopted the farmer will get little relief at this session of congress."
