POPULAR MAGICIAN RETURNS HERE MONDAY



Raymond Scheetz, popular magician, will appear in a program at Abernathy School auditorium, Monday, Nov. 5, at 10 a. m., according to an announcement by Supt. W. V. Swinburn. This is not "just another magic show." The stage settings, the lighting effects, stage manner and illusions are refreshingly original. The program, while a riot of fun, is dignified and unique.

Raymond Scheetz has built more than 14 years of his life into the show. More than half a ton of equipment is used. The "menagerie" includes a dog, birds, guinea pigs and rabbits.

Mirth and magic are blended by masterly hands into a show of striking entertainment value. Scheetz' patter is a high point of the performance. Among the illusions presented will be the Enchanted Cottage, a Collapsible Duck (The duck used is a sister of Grace Allen's Herman), Chinese Ink Cabinet, Rapid Transit, A Light Affair, Television Extraordinary, etc.

"Magic is as old as humanity. No one knows where or when it originated. Much of the power of the primitive, superstitious religions came from the ability of the priests or medicine men to perform feats of legerdemain which the uninitiated mistook for supernatural power. Sheer trickery was decked out in religious symbols, with miraculous meaning, and was used to deceive the untutored, childlike people of prehistoric days.

"Today that is largely a matter of ancient history, and magic is employed only—at least ALMOST only—in civilized countries for entertainment and diversion. Its popularity is attested by the fact there are more than 5,000 members of the national organization of magicians."

Following is the citation: Headquarters, 36th Infantry Division, APO 36, U. S. Army For Gallantry in Action, A Silver Star Medal is Awarded To CAPT. DARREL W. MATTHEWS

Citation
Darrell W. Matthews, 0519405, Captain (then Lt.) 141st Infantry Regt. for gallantry in action on 1 Jan. 1945 in the vicinity of Lemburg, France, when Co. I fell back to the base of a hill in the face of a fierce enemy tank and infantry attack, hostile troops firing from the summit of the hill inflicting heavy casualties on the disorganized group, coming forward from the company command post, Lt. Matthews, the company's executive officer, skillfully and swiftly reorganized Co. I and elements of another company, then, valiantly exposing himself to the intense hostile fire, he led his men in an attack up the hill, and after a fierce battle, drove back the German attackers, preventing the enemy from breaking through and seizing their objective, the town of Lemburg, France. Entering the service from Petersburg, Tex. R. L. STACK, Brig.-Gen., U. S. Army, Commander.

349 Receive Monthly Aid In Lubbock County, Says District Director Sam Leifeste
Sam Leifeste, manager of the Lubbock Office of the Social Security board, today released the current figures on the social security program for this area.

On Sept. 30, 1945, there were 828 benefits in force in the Lubbock field office area. Of this number, 209 are retired workers over 65 year of age who are receiving monthly payment and 53 wives who are 65 years of age. There are 396 children of retired and deceased workers receiving monthly checks as well as 144 widows who have children in their care, 15 aged widows and 3 dependent parents over 65 years of age. The total monthly payments to these beneficiaries is \$11,159.50, an increase of approximately 69% over the figures of May 20, 1944.

In addition to the monthly benefits in force, 52 lump sum payments have been made to claimants in the Lubbock area during the last six months, totaling \$6,268.32.

In Hale county there are 92 monthly benefits in force totaling \$1,335.53. Of this number, 32 are retired workers, 14 are widows with children in their care, 31 are children and 12 are wives of retired workers.

In Lubbock county, there are 349 monthly benefits in force, totaling \$4,880.45. Of this number, 85 are retired workers, 25 wives of retired workers, 163 children, 5 widows of retired workers and 71 widows with children in their care.

(Editor's note: In the following letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Richerson, Rae E. Richerson, RM2(c), informs them of his appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy.)

USS Salt Lake City, Oct. 18.
Dearest Mom: O, happy day! I got a letter from Congressman Eugene Worley Oct. 8 saying I had been named second alternate to the naval academy. Three days later my orders from Bupers arrived and I transferred on an hour and a half's notice. Everyone was excited, especially me. Congratulations from left and right. The captain called me in his cabin and said, "I don't know what we're keeping you aboard for, you're supposed to be at school. Congratulations, Richerson, on your appointment." It didn't take me long to get my gear together, in fact, that is about the fastest packing I ever did. Now I'm aboard the heavy cruiser, Salt Lake City enroute to Astoria, Ore., F.F.T. for further trans-

fer.) Bainbridge, Md. I'm not quite sure whether I'll get off in Astoria, or Portland, as the ship will fuel at Astoria and then go on to Portland. If I have time, I'll try to see Uncle Bob. I doubt I will get leave since the school convened around Oct. 1. The ship was delayed by a typhoon just before we left Japan and we've had rough weather throughout the trip since. We came a great circle route, which is the shortest way. I could see a couple of islands in the Alaskan chain and it has been cold all the way. Our ETA (estimated time of arrival) is daybreak of the 22nd, so I imagine that it will be around the 30th before I get to the NAPS. It's great to be back on a big ship once more. I feel quite at home. The ship has one of the most beautiful records of the war and the crew is a swell bunch, especially the radio gang, several Texans and all near the Panhandle. I stand watches but it's a pleasure more than it is work. Mom, there was some clothing that I checked at a hotel in Miami, Fla., when we were there in '44 and it had the return address, Shallowater, Rural Rt. One, on it. I wonder if they sent it on to you, or

whether it is still in Miami? Well, I'll secure for now, Mom, and send my mail to Hold NAPS, Bainbridge, Md., NTC, Lots of love, Rae Richerson, RM2(c) ... P. S. you are still my best girl, Mom.

Dear Buford: Just a line to thank you for the Review the last few years. I have enjoyed it a lot. Very few copies have failed to reach me sooner or later. You can stop them now as I expect to be on my way home in the next ten days or two weeks — hoping to make it by Thanksgiving. I have had enough of the Pacific to last me the rest of my life. I have been on eight of the islands and I would not give one county in Texas for all of them. Thanks again for the paper. As ever, Bob Harral. (Sgt. Robert C. Harral)

Dear Buford: I'm sorry I haven't written you sooner but it seems like I don't have much time to do anything here lately. I have been in the army four months and I have been stationed in four different bases. Right now I am at Hamilton Field, Calif. I like the base better than I have liked any of the others. This is an old field and is a very good one. I'm pretty well satisfied here. The first place I have been, though, I'm working in a supply house here and have charge of the shipments going in and out. It is a supply house for the motor pool. I have a good job and I guess that is why I like the base. There is a lot of things to see out here. I'm 20 miles north of San Francisco and I have to cross the Golden Gate bridge every time I go to town. It is surely a beautiful masterpiece of construction. The first time I saw it I stood and looked at it for some time. There are a lot of fellows here from Texas but I have never found any from around home. How are all the folks in good old Abernathy? You don't know that you do like the town until you are away from it and can't be there any. I have been lucky to be able to be at home as much as I have, though. I can't say anything against that. Well, Buford, I have written about all I can think of, so I'll sign off now. Please send me the paper. I haven't gotten one since I was at Sheppard Field. I certainly enjoy reading it. It is a lot of help to get it for it has all news of Abernathy. I'll be looking forward to hearing from you and getting the paper. Your friend, Jack. (Pvt. Jack Hamilton, Sqdn.
