Officers Of Two States Seeking Davis Brothers

NO TRACE OF PAIR FOUND TODAY

BROTHERS FROM TEXAS OBJECT OF SEARCH AFTER KILLING

ARDMORE, Okla., Dec. 12.—Search of Southern Oklahoma and Northern Texas for D. I. Davis and his brother, Colquitt, of Amarillo, suspected slayers of two men during the past few days, had brought no results early today.

The brothers were sought in connection with the death of Con Keirsey, Carter county deputy sheriff, and Harold McCarrick, grocer at Amarillo.

Keirsey, for years a colorful peace officer, died yesterday of gunshot wounds received at Wirt, 35 miles south of here, the night before when he and Vernon Cason, Carter county undersheriff, sought to question two men in connection with the alleged theft of an automobile. Cason also was wounded, but was expected to recover.

Killed in Holdup
McCarrick was killed about a week ago during a holdup which occurred as he was on his way home after closing his store for the night.

Frank Cain, Amarillo police captain, said the Davis brothers were bad characters, and he doubted they could be taken alive. Cain and Deputy Sheriff Farley of Amarillo, who were searching for the Davises in connection with the McCarrick death, arrived at Wirt Wednesday night, a short time after Cason and Keirsey were wounded.

Two women said to have witnessed the shooting at Wirt were held.

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VET SENATOR DIES TODAY

SENATOR OVERMAN OF NORTH CAROLINA DIES SUDDENLY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—A sudden illness today took from the senate one of its oldest and most highly regarded members.

Lee Slater Overman of North Carolina, closed seventy-six years of life and 26 of service in the senate chamber, shortly before one o'clock this morning. An indisposition of a few days standing had suddenly turned dangerous yesterday afternoon when he suffered an internal hemorrhage. Death then was inevitable.

With him was Mrs. Overman, who had shared his life since 1878, and one daughter, Mrs. E. N. Snow of Washington.

After a political career already distinguished, Overman entered the senate in 1903 and soon became a leading figure in the Democratic party ranks. During the World war, particularly, he became essential. President Wilson. His snowy white hair was acquired in the heavy war tasks which included service on five major committees. He sponsored the act which gave President Wilson wartime powers more sweeping than any ever exercised by an American chief executive, and was the author of much vital legislation of that day.

GANG GUNS BARK AGAIN

HIGHWAY BOND ISSUE ASKED IN LYNN

PETITIONS CIRCULATED NOW FOR \$800,000 OF IMPROVEMENTS

(Special To The Journal)

TAHOKA, Dec. 12.—An election to determine whether or not \$800,000 bonds will be issued for highway improvement will likely be called within the next few days by the Lynn county commissioners' court. Petitions are being circulated over the county for such an election by F. C. Greenhouse, N. M. Bray and J. K. Callaway, local citizens.

Should the voters authorize the issuance of these bonds, state highways 8 and 94 would be paved and lateral roads in each of the four commissioners' precincts would be improved. Highway 9, running north and south through the county, is a federal highway and the state and federal government would put up one dollar each for every dollar spent on its improvement by the county. Highway 84, crossing the county from east to west, is only a state highway at present but has been recommended by the state highway commission for federalization. Texas is due about 800 miles of new federal highway, it is said, and this new designation is reasonably sure.

One Issue Turned Down

A million dollar highway bond issue was turned down by Lynn county voters six or seven years ago, but this issue is expected to meet the approval of many property owners who have never favored such a bond issue before. If the election is called and bonds voted, the petitioners hope for start of work next year in time for Lynn county farmers to get in work on the roads before winter.

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WOMAN CHARGED FOR MAN'S DEATH

SULPHUR SPRINGS, Dec. 12.—Mrs. Lydia Robinson, 40, was charged \$5,000 bond today on a charge of murder filed yesterday after Dr. R. M. Payne, 55, dentist, was shot to death as he entered his office.

Mrs. Robinson was Dr. Payne's secretary and assistant for a number of years and officers said they had had trouble previously. Dr. Payne was a native of Hopkins county and Mrs. Robinson also had resided here all her life.

Dr. Payne was struck by a charge from a shot gun. Mrs. Robinson walked across the street to the sheriff's office where the surrendering. She refused to make a statement other than to tell officers: "I killed a man."

Probe of Hidalgo Affairs Is Asked

Leslie requesting a jury commission to investigate the charges.

Trucks Object of State Legislation

TEMPLE, Dec. 12.—Large trucks and buses were called a menace to public safety on the highways and unfair competition to railroads at a mass meeting here last night at which the district legislative representative was called upon to work for passage of a bill restricting those vehicles operating on state highways.

Speakers deplored conditions that fall, declaring trucks were hauling 30 to 40 bales of cotton across the state to ports.

Tom Mix's Wife Says He Rides Away From Home Once Too Often

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12.—A divorce suit on file here today asserted Tom Mix, hard-riding, quick-hooting cowboy of the screen and the circus, had jalloped a way from home and come back.

Mrs. Victoria Mix, in filling the suit yesterday, said Mix left November 26 and by way of emphasizing his statement that he would not be back, twirled a loaded gun on his trigger finger in his west fashion. She was greatly frightened, she said.

Mix had left home several times before and upon his return declined, his wife charged, to reveal where he had been. The first time, he was away for two days in October, 1929, her complaint set forth. Then this year he was away with a circus from March to October. He returned for two days, she said, and again was absent until November 20.

During the last absence their 8-year-old daughter, Tomista, became ill, Mrs. Mix said, and but for the fact that through "gossip" she learned he had been spending most of his time at Anga Caliente and at a Hollywood hotel, she would not have been able to summon him to the child's bedside.

While Mix always was a hero on the screen, his wife pictures him as a different character outside the films. He treated her with "extreme cruelty" for the past five years, she charged.

Mr. and Mrs. Mix were married in Riverside, Calif., in 1918, in suing for divorce Mrs. Mix asked the custody of their child. The actor transferred to his wife in January, 1929, property valued at \$100,000, including their Beverly Hills home.

The film cowboy was married to his first wife, Mrs. Olive Stockes Mix, daughter of a cattleman, in 1908 at Medora, N. D. She divorced him in April, 1917, charging desertion.

Mix is now in New York.

GAS COMPANY, CITY AND SCHOOLS ARE AGREED ON 'ONE METER' PLAN; LOCAL OFFICIALS STILL AFTER LOWER RATES

"If at first you don't succeed," etc., is apparently the slogan of the School board and the City of Lubbock, at least as concerns efforts to put the school and municipal buildings under industrial gas rates.

Reaching an agreement yesterday afternoon with the West Texas Gas company, whereby the "one meter" system of fuel billing will be placed into operation on three groups of public buildings, officials of both the city and the school board indicated today that they would not be satisfied until the industrial rate, lowest in the company's rate schedule, is applied.

Industrial Rate Low
The reason for seeking the industrial rate is apparent upon glancing at the company's rate schedule. The commercial rate, under which public buildings are billed, presents a sliding scale from 67 and a half cents per thousand cubic feet of gas, down to 15 cents per thousand. The industrial rate begins at 45 cents per thousand cubic feet and ends at eight cents. City and school authorities.

TWO MURDERED EARLY TODAY IN CHICAGO

LONELY ROAD SCENE OF ASSASSINATION OF YOUNG MEN

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—A fusillade of shots and the roar of an automobile engine signalled the apparent resumption early today of gangland warfare, quiescent for a month or more.

Two well-dressed young men were the victims. Both had been shot to death. Police said they were identified as Rudolph Mareno, 24, and John Thomas, 28, alias George Mayo, adding that Mayo had police records in Buffalo, N. Y., and Rochester, Ind.

Lonely Highway Used
A lonely highway in the Evergreen park was the scene of the assassination. Mrs. Martha Van Warden of Crown Point, Ind., a guest in the home of Joseph Wierma, a truck farmer, heard the shots and the roar of the motor of an automobile. A few minutes later Thomas Wierma, a resident of Evergreen park, en route home in his car found the bodies lying beside the road.

About the same time the Chicago Detective Bureau received a telephone call saying two men had slain. Neither the Evergreen park nor the county highway police had called, leading detectives to believe that the message had been telephoned by the killers themselves.

The last gangland slaying was that of Joe Aiello, Northside gang chief, who walked into a machine gun nest last October.

MANAGER CONFESSES TO TAKING FUNDS FOR PAST 5 YEARS

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Dec. 12.—Charles A. Whitmore, building and loan commissioner, announced today that delinquencies totaling several million dollars from the Guaranty Building and Loan association were admitted in a written confession by Gilbert Beesmyer, 45, its secretary-manager.

Directors of the association said Beesmyer's misappropriations might aggregate \$6,000,000. They were said to have affected not only the association, in which he was a 65 per cent stockholder, but also the North American Bond and Mortgage company and the Guaranty Holding corporation, both of Los Angeles. Beesmyer was described as having been a director of the latter.

Four Bodies Of Family Of Six Dug From Grave

WAITFORD CITY, N. D., Dec. 12.—Recovery of four bodies, three of them from a grave dug in a floor of a barn, today led county authorities to say they were close to a solution of the mysterious disappearance of a family of six near Schafer last February.

The arrest of Charles Bannan on charges of embezzlement led to recovery of the bodies of A. E. Haven, who had lived on the farm; his sons, Daniel, 19, and Leland, 16, and an infant of three months. Mrs. Haven and a three year old child still were missing. Bones of the latter child were also believed found, but identification was not certain. The victims apparently had been beaten to death with a hammer. The motive has not been learned.

The man was identified as a participant in the robbery when viewed by L. B. Hagyard, bank customer, at Fort Worth, two years ago, where Pendleton was held in jail before being taken to El Dorado, Ark. He escaped from jail at El Dorado.

Pete McKenzie Is To Go to Huntsville

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 12.—Sheriff Alfonso Newton, Jr., said yesterday that John M. "Pete" McKenzie, convicted slayer of Detective Chief Sam Street in 1927, would be transferred to the state penitentiary at Huntsville and placed in solitary confinement, as a penalty for his attempt to escape from the Bear county jail in an elaborately laid plot.

Nine hacksaw blades, a hacksaw, a hand drill, several drill bits and a file were found in the death cell which he occupied.

SERVICE SEEN MUCH BETTER ON T.P.N.

REPRESENTATIVES OF 2 CITIES EXPLAIN HOW THEY WILL BENEFIT

Representatives of Fort Worth and El Paso, which would not be on the proposed Texas & Pacific Northern railroad, but which claim they would share in its benefits, testified today.

Haskell C. Davis, examiner for the Interstate Commerce Commission, in conducting the hearing on the application of the T. & P. N., proposed subsidiary of the Texas & Pacific, to build from Big Spring, Amarillo, Lubbock and Vega. The hearing started Monday and promised to run into next week.

Fort Worth Mass Testifies
Both Fort Worth and El Paso maintain they would benefit as a result of construction of the road through lower rates, shorter mileage, a direct outlet to them and faster service. Representatives of Dallas already had testified in support of the project.

"We are a patient and long suffering people," Ed P. Byars, manager of the traffic department of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, stated. "But we are tired of seeing the Santa Fe advertise two-day service from St. Louis deep into Fort Worth territory and doing nothing to give us like service."

Neither Give Service
Byars pointed out that neither the Santa Fe, the Fort Worth and Denver, nor the Rock Island had the pickup and store door delivery service which the T. & P. N. would inaugurate.

"The territory to be served by the T. & P. N. does not have half as many railroads as west Oklahoma, a similar section," the witness testified.

Byars said he had no "kick" on the speed in shipments given by the Fort Worth & Denver to points

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First Reading of Ordinance Is Held

First reading of an ordinance licensing and regulating the sale of jewelry, watches and allied bric-a-brac at public auction was held at the bi-weekly meeting of the city commission Thursday.

The ordinance, which was submitted upon recommendation of the Retail Merchants association, is regulatory rather than prohibitory. It provides for a similar verbal sales representation by an auctioneer in his sales talk and against use of "coppers" of false bidders.

A jewelry company expecting to hold an auction sale will be required to obtain a license for that purpose and to submit full inventory of merchandise to be sold, and the auctioneer will be required to post bond, upon adoption of the ordinance.

LOST TRIBE OF ESKIMOS FORMS A MYSTERY

MOUNTED POLICE BEGIN HUNT FOR MISSING COLONY

THE PAS, Manitoba—The northern lights have seen queer sights

as the much-quoted Robert W. Service remarks—and the ever-

lasting silence of the regions under the Arctic Circle cloaks some

strange mysteries. But the northern lights do not tell of the queer

sights, nor does the Arctic silence set vocal about its mysteries. There is nothing to do, usually, but guess.

Far up in the heart of one of the most lonely places on earth—in the

Lake Angikuni country, 500 miles northwest of the port of Churchill,

on Hudson Bay—a whole tribe of Eskimos has vanished. Somewhere,

somehow, the endless desolation of Canada's northern Barren Lands has swallowed up 25 men, women

and children.

It is one of the most puzzling mysteries that has ever come down

out of the Arctic. The news of it has just reached The Pas, on the

fringe of civilization.

It was discovered when one Joe Labelle, a roving trapper of the

Barren Lands, came upon the tribe's abandoned camp. Its tents,

made of caribou skins, were still standing. Inside were hides, clothing,

cooking utensils, even rifles—the most prized possessions of any

Eskimo. There was no sign of violence, no sign of trouble. The place

was simply empty.

Mounted Police Join Search

The Royal Northwest Mounted Police have taken up the hunt, and

white trappers have been asked to be on the lookout. But nothing, so

far, has been learned.

Joe Labelle admits that stumbling on the abandoned village gave him

the creeps. A man doesn't get the creeps readily when he spends

months at a time trudging by his lone across the Barren Lands, where

there is never a house or a human being or anything to break the

white-rimmed silence; but Joe Labelle got creepy, just the same. The

empty sky and the silent, rocky plain held a mystery, and the trapper

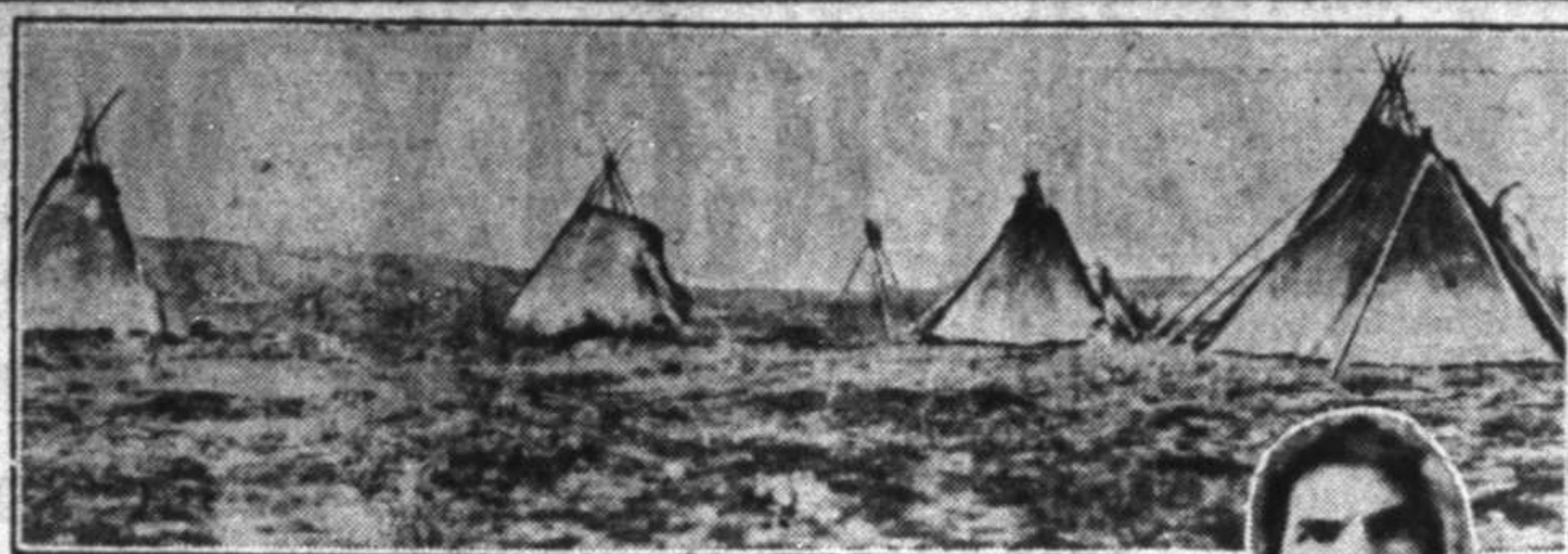
didn't like it.

Even when he spied the tent colony, Labelle says, he sensed that

there was something wrong. He had beached his canoe on the edge

of the lake, a hundred yards or so distant, and he let out a hall of

greeting as he walked up. But there was no answer. Then two

half-starved "husky" dogs crawled

and came towards him. They did not snarl and bark, as huskies

usually do with a stranger; they crept up, whining dolefully. The

bodies of seven dead dogs were lying around.

A "Village of the Dead"

"There were six tents, made out of

skin," he says. "I'll admit that when I went in the first tent I was

a little jumpy. Just looking around, I could see the place hadn't known

any human life for months, and I expected to find corpses inside. But

there was nothing there but the personal belongings of a family. A

couple of deer parkas (skin coats) were in one corner. Fish and deer

bones were scattered about. There were a few pairs of boots, and an

iron pot, greasy and black. Under one of the parkas I found a rifle.

It had been there so long it was all rusty.

"The whole thing looked as if it had been left just that way by people

who expected to come back. But

they hadn't come back.

"I went outside and looked over the rest of the camp. I tell you, I

was puzzled. I figured there had been about 25 people in the camp,

but all signs showed the place hadn't been lived in for nearly 12

months. As I strolled about, with those two walking skeletons of dogs

following me, I found the other tents in a similar state.

Recalls "Evil Spirit"

"I tried to figure out where those Eskimos had gone to. They hadn't

moved to a new territory, or they would have taken their equipment,

especially their guns and their dogs. Then I thought of the

Eskimos' 'evil spirit' Tornark, who has an ugly man's face

with two long tusks sticking up from each side of the nose. The

native live in fear of Tornark, and they wear charms to ward him

off. I thought about Tornark and I had to make an effort to put the

picture out of my mind.

"I walked into another tent. One body it had one contained. And I

side had been ripped to ribbons by the wind. On the floor were three

fox skins, made worthless by rain and snow and mud. Under them

was another rusty rifle. Those two rifles seemed strange—the last

thing an Eskimo ever parts with is his rifle. One of the dogs

brushed against my legs and whined, and I thought of that Tornark again and got outside.

Grave Is Riddle

"It was an Eskimo grave, with a

cairn built of stones. But for some reason the grave had been opened.

The stones had been pulled off of one side and there was nothing inside the cairn at all. I had no way

of telling when it had been opened, or what had been done with the

body it had one contained. And I

couldn't figure out why it had been

desecrated.

"I stayed around all afternoon, trying to figure things out. There

were no signs of any struggle. Everything looked peaceful. But

the air seemed deadly. I caught a few fish out of the lake and gave

them to the two dogs, and then moved on. I didn't want to spend a

night there."

During the season Labelle visited a dozen or more Eskimo camps, but

in none of them could he find any one who knew anything of the

deserted camp. Most of the Eskimos, when he told them about it, blamed

Tornark and let it go at that.

Probe Deepens Mystery

Officers of the Northwest Mounted Police, trying to trace the lost

tribe, are equally puzzled. They say the tribe may have perished in a

blizzard while off on a caribou hunt, although admitting that it is

unlikely that all the women and

children would have gone along.

Pestilence occasionally strikes Eskimo camps—but in that case there

would have been bodies.

One queer clue did come to light, but it hasn't lessened the puzzle. A

tribe living about 150 miles north of the abandoned camp has an

adopted 10-year-old Eskimo boy, who seems to have wandered into

camp one day a few months ago and who does not belong to any of

the nearby camps. But the boy and the tribe are reticent about things,

and nobody has learned anything from them so far.

Liquor Fails to Loosen Tongue

Another time an Eskimo named Saumek was brought down to a

hospital on the Hudson Bay railway for treatment for frozen legs. It

was thought that he might know something about it, so, after a long

search, an Eskimo was found who could speak Saumek's dialect; and

he began to question him. But Saumek refused to talk about it, men-

tioning Tornark mysteriously and refusing to answer any questions.

It occurred to the authorities that Saumek might talk if he got

intoxicated. So his Eskimo questioner was given a quart of whiskey

and told to ply Saumek with it. This, too, failed. Saumek refused

to touch a drop. Like most Eskimos, he did not like the taste of it.

So, any knowledge that Saumek might have remained a secret.

The police are doing their best to unravel the mystery. They may

succeed; on the other hand, the Arctic is full of mysteries. The

northern lights have seen queer sights; but the northern lights

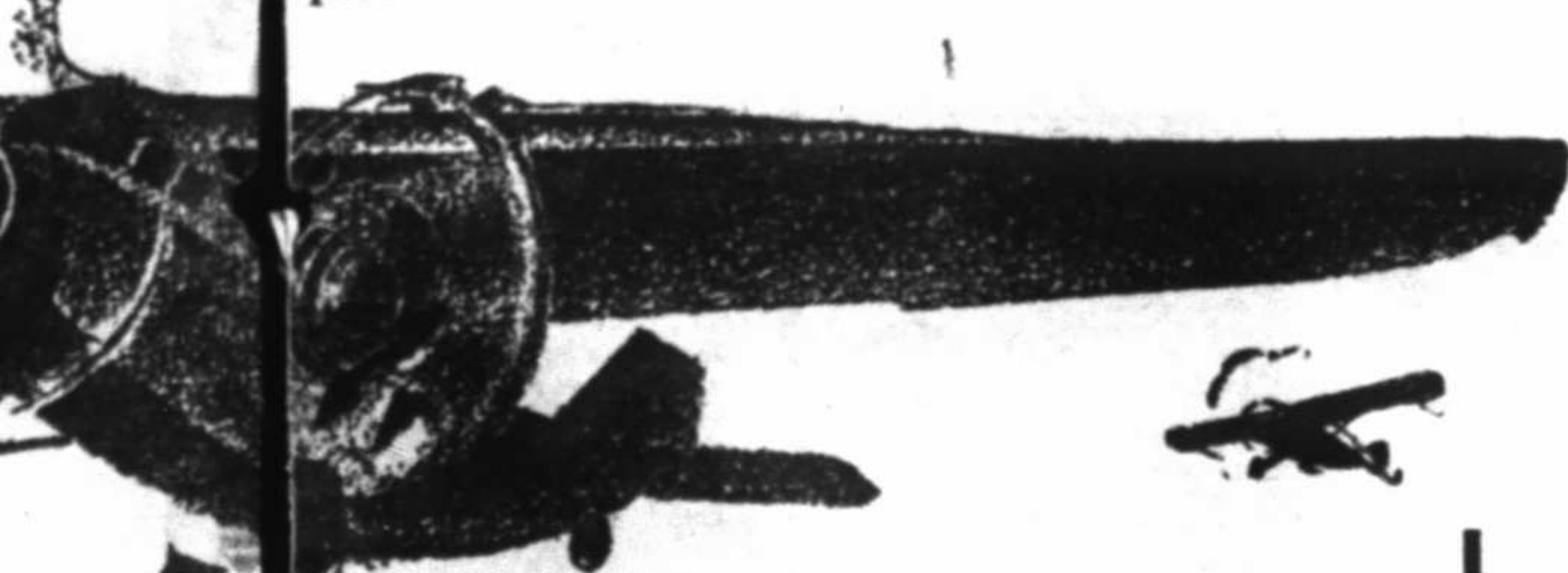

The nation's football season came

WELL folks, The Plainsman sees

thing, anyway. The gas com-
pany has approved the 'one meter'
system for the city's buildings as a
group, the schools as a group and
the county's buildings as a group.
That's something, anyhow, and in-
dicates that the company is in a
receptive frame of mind.

All three groups will save a
little money. It isn't much, but
collectively ought to run around
\$2,000 or \$2,500 per year, which
isn't to be sneezed at in these
days of Republican administra-
tion, and there's always the
hope that they'll get together
on the industrial rate basis
which will mean a sure enough
saving.

Mebbe the gas company can't
make any money by serving the
schools, the city and the county on
the industrial rate basis. The Plain-
sman is not an expert on gas service
and isn't in a position to say. This
column doesn't believe the company
should be expected to give service
on a 'break even' or a loss basis,
but on the other hand can't see
why the city, county and the schools
are not just as much industries as
the cleaning and pressing plants and
the gas.

JERRY Clements has said that he

depended upon to do it. Jerry is
fair enough not to want the gas com-
pany to make any more of a con-
cession than it should, you can

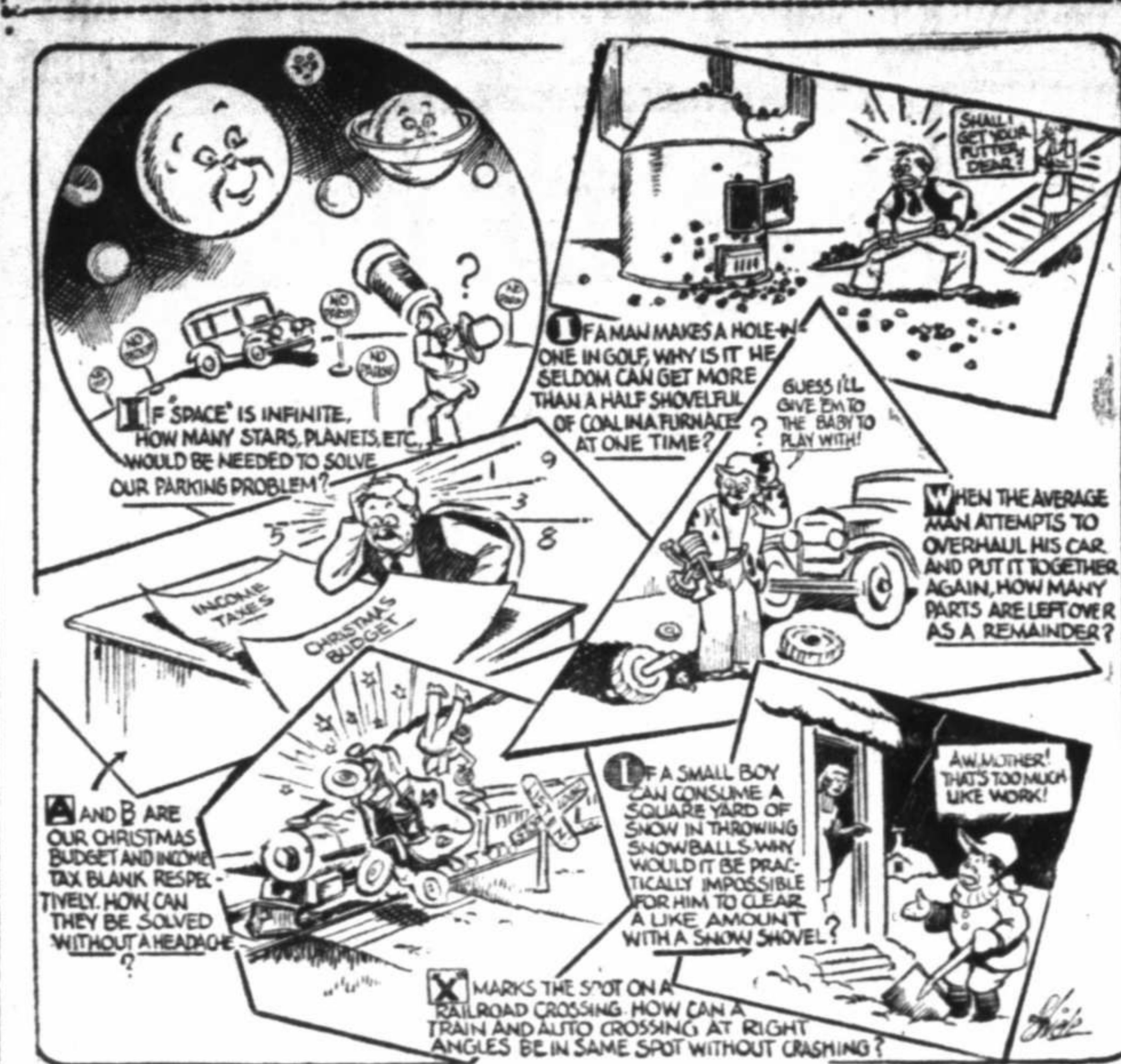

ENFORCEMENT STRENGTH IS OBJECT

WOODCOCK SEEKING TO MAKE EVERY DAY WORK GREATER

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Prohibition Director Woodcock would like to take prohibition enforcement entirely off the front pages of newspapers.

He is planning now a thoroughly military structure for his enforcing machine, including an efficiency rating system for agents. Just what he values as efficiency was indicated yesterday in the issuance of a citation to two Oklahoma agents who got their men under difficulty without bloodshed. But no Christmas drive, no cabaret raiding for him. Just day in and day out pressure against commercial violators is the way he explained his objective.

Thirteen Cases Pending
Today's report of prohibition cases had almost exactly balanced during November the activity of his agents in bringing cases to court. 525 cases being docketed and 524 terminated.

In the monthly report of his bureau was shown that on November 1 there had been 23,204 prohibition criminal cases on docket in the 12 prohibition districts, and at the end of the month the total was only 13 higher. Jail sentences totaling 2,094 years were imposed together with fines of nearly \$477,000. The total fines since July was placed at approximately \$1,859,000.

Among seizures reported were those of three railroad cars containing beer and alcohol valued at \$100,000 and another box car at Cleveland, coming from Galveston, labeled "frags" and containing 706 cases of bonded whisky believed to have been smuggled from Mexico and valued at \$75,000.

NO VIOLENCE IS FOUND ON BODY

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 12 (AP)—Dr. T. N. Goodson, county physician, announced last night after an autopsy had been held that no marks or external evidence of violence were found on the body of Mrs. Mildred Woodruff, who was found dead in an Austin fraternity house "Thanksgiving Day. Justice L. F. Bole had ordered the body examined yesterday after relatives requested Walter Tynan, district attorney, to have an autopsy conducted.

The confession, Whitmore said, was given to him and to directors of the association early today after which Beesmyer was taken into custody. The speculation was said to have taken place over a period of five years.

The building and loan association was capitalized at \$11,000,000 but officials said its deposits exceeded that figure. Whitmore said his department would take charge of the Guaranty Building and Loan association and liquidate the remaining assets for the benefit of depositors.

Beesmyer had been a leader in the building and loan movement here since 1921 and was a director of many such organizations as well as industrial firms. The association had 30,000 depositors.

Amarillo Lineman Is Killed by Flash

AMARILLO, Dec. 12 (AP)—William Claude Cody, 36, lineman for the Southwestern Public Service company, died in a hospital here late yesterday of burns and shock suffered when he was struck by what electrical experts described as a "flash" from a 66,000-volt wire. He was working on a dead wire beneath the one carrying the high voltage and the "flash" knocked him from a pole. Cody fell about 40 feet. The wires were about 48 inches apart.

Zupke Completes Squad for Classic

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Dec. 12 (AP)—Addition of seven players to the midwestern team in the annual Dixie Classic at Dallas New Year's Day has completed Coach Bob Zupke's squad.

Invitations have been accepted by Les Motlow, Loyola, and Bob Horn, Ohio State, halfbacks; Bob Conover, Illinois, guard; Bob Clark, Northwestern, center; Bill Storum, fullback and Art Masucci, tackle, both of the University of Detroit; and Brubaker, Indiana, quarterback.

CITY HONORS WAR CHIEF

EL PASO, Dec. 12 (AP)—A distinguished soldier, veteran of campaigns in Cuba, the Philippines and France, was honored by El Paso and its soldiers today as funeral rites were set for P. M. for Brigadier General George C. Bernhardt, 62, commander at Fort Bliss, who died Wednesday night of blood poisoning.

THRILLS TO BE OFFERED IN AIR CIRCUS

"THE THREE HAWKS" TO PRESENT PROGRAM HERE SUNDAY

When "The Three Hawks" make their debut before a South Plains audience near this city Sunday afternoon, thousands of persons from over the territory are expected to witness death-defying thrills to be offered on the afternoon's air circus program, according to estimates this morning of officials in charge of the event.

The air circus will be held five miles southwest of Lubbock on the Brownfield highway, starting promptly at 2 o'clock Sunday. Arrows will be erected today to direct traffic to the spot.

"The Three Hawks", Robert Hohag, Paul Milner and L. P. Quinn, are government licensed pilots and during the course of the two-hour program will offer many new thrills which have never been witnessed above a South Plains flying field.

Scheduled on the program are stunt flying, spins, loops, barrel rolls, inverted flying, races, wing walking and parachute jumping.

A percentage of the gate receipts are to go to Lubbock policemen who in turn have agreed to donate the money to the Lubbock Community Chest. A Bynum-Morgan ambulance will be on the grounds for emergency.

STATE INSPECTOR VISITING IN CITY

H. T. McCorkle, of Austin, state food and drug inspector for the state department of health, today is completing an inspection of all food handling agencies in the city of Lubbock, having been here for the last week. He has been assisted in the work by Dr. Y. J. Aiken, of the city health department.

All cafes, drug stores, wholesale houses, creameries, milk plants, grocery stores, poultry killing plants, butter factories, bottling works and bakeries have fallen to the attention of the inspector this week. He expects to complete a report of his findings Saturday.

"From my first investigations I find that the city of Lubbock is unusually fortunate in having clean food supply establishments," Mr. McCorkle stated today. "No charges of any nature have been filed against any concern and I find that practically all are up to standard of the health department."

School For Scouts To Be On Saturday

A first aid-and-ovies school for Boy Scouts expecting to appear before the next court of honor for advancement involving those subjects will be held at scout headquarters at city hall at 7:30 o'clock Saturday night.

D. Jennings, South Plains Area council executive, said that attendance at Saturday's classes would be required of those who will go before the next court for such recognition. Those expecting to attend the school must submit their names to scout headquarters by 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

A meeting of the South Plains Area council will be held at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the First Methodist Episcopal church. The meeting was called by T. A. White, president. District committees will be organized and plans laid for the annual meeting of the council.

EL PASO AND FORT WORTH JOIN IN SUPPORT OF TEXAS-PACIFIC PROJECT

(Continued from Page 1)

In this section which it reached.

Tells of Advantages
E. R. Tanner, traffic manager of the chamber of commerce at El Paso, told of the reciprocal advantages to El Paso and this territory in the event of building of the new road.

A. H. Priest of Fort Worth, representative of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' association, the Sheep and Goat association of Texas, and the Fort Worth Livestock Traffic association, expressed his enthusiastic approval of the project.

Priest said the restrictions which the Santa Fe imposed in the matter of joint through rates and routes caused Fort Worth to be discriminated against in livestock shipments from this territory, and Kansas City and Wichita, Kan., to be favored.

The Santa Fe restricts the routing to give it the longest possible haul, the witness stated. Other roads are liberal in their joint through rates and routings, he added.

Cowtown Losing Out
Fort Worth has been getting only 10 per cent of the cattle shipments from this territory while Kansas City has received 55 per cent and Wichita, Kan., 12 per cent, the witness said. In the territory south of this, served principally by the T. & P. and the Southern Pacific, Fort Worth has been getting 61 per cent, he stated.

Protestations of a desire to serve West Texas and particularly the South Plains and the Panhandle country, were made by Byars, of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, in his intervention testimony at the opening of the morning session.

Where West Begins
"Fort Worth is where the West begins," he stated in opening his testimony. "It is the gateway to West Texas."

Benefits assigned for the construction of the proposed TPN included "first, a means of developing a vast amount of new territory for Fort Worth," and "second, bringing Fort Worth closer geographically and socially, to West Texas."

Mr. Byars presented as evidence half a dozen exhibits to support his claims. He offered reports showing how Fort Worth's livestock and business concerns would be aided by the proposed lower rates.

Priest testified the "Panhandle and Santa Fe consistently refused to establish rates" enabling his market to get better service and lower costs. On the other hand, he stated, the "Texas and Pacific maintained a most liberal policy on livestock rates."

Cross Examined
To be cross examined him at length as did W. F. Peter for the Rock Island, John P. Slaton for the railroad committee and Ed Byars.

D. P. Harris, Jr., of the Acme Brick company, said his concern wanted better service to West Texas points. They control 11 plants by ownership and are operating two.

Roddy Harwell, Vega, an elevator man and farmer, testified as to the benefits his county, Oldham, with Deaf Smith, would receive from construction of the new line. He owns 1,380 acres and operates a total of 3,000 acres. His elevator has 22,000 bushel storage with 10,000 bushels more at other places.

Figures showing losses to farmers from dumping grain on the ground during the car shortage in 1928 were presented. Farmers lost a total of \$14,000, he stated.

"In 1929 there was a shortage," he added. "The county raised 1,800,000 bushels of wheat and half of it was on the ground for lack of cars."

The shortage lasted "30 days or more," he stated.

W. F. Peter, Rock Island attorney, cross examined him closely as to shortages of cars from 1926 to 1930 and also to his knowledge of construction of the Rock Island's Vega-Forest line.

CUBA STIRRED BY UNREST

VIRTUAL MARTIAL LAW IS DECLARED TODAY OVER NATION

By Associated Press
HAVANA, Dec. 12—Virtual martial law ruled Cuba today as President Machado sought to put down disturbances which are threatening the life of his regime.

Reports that he had tendered his resignation to the supreme court were denied by the president, and the American embassy branded as "utterly false" stories that it had asked that two cruisers be sent here to protect American interests.

Suspends Guarantees
After a day replete with island-wide disturbances which police urged only by firing their sidearms into and above the crowds, the president availed himself of power recently granted by congress and suspended constitutional guarantees for 60 days.

The suspension is similar to that effected in Havana and environs for a 30-day period, just ended, when student disturbances here threatened the government. It allows imprisonment without trial, suspends free speech and invokes other summary measures.

Physicians to Strike
Meanwhile 200 physicians, voicing protest at conditions, voted to "strike" if the government makes good its threat to imprison professors of the national university who sustain the leaders of the recent disturbances. The doctors said they would neither answer sick calls nor issue prescriptions.

Six students were injured in clashes in Havana yesterday prior to the president's action. No disorders were reported after the suspension.

Ricardo Herrera, minister plenipotentiary and personal secretary to President Machado, said of the suspension:

"It is merely a means to insure peace in Cuba during these weeks when trouble seems to have increased. The president is determined that order shall prevail."

alation expense. As a result, engineers have begun to compensate with lighter-weight pistons by the use of aluminum alloys, and with further use of aluminum alloys in other parts of the engine. That would bring down the weight considerably, which alone would raise the power-to-weight ratio and result in better performance.

Trouble with aluminum alloy pistons has been the great variation in expansion of such pistons as compared with the cast-iron cylinders in which they moved, and resultant "seizing" of the pistons. Now, aluminum men say, they have an alloy that will expand almost at the exact rate of the engine block material; and therefore will not cause the trouble experienced previously.

Such pistons will be noted on several new cars, and their operation will be watched keenly by many engineers.

In addition, there will be such developments as stainless steel for radiator shells, windshield frames and caps for hubs, gas tanks and radiators; more heat-resisting valves, especially on the exhaust side; shielding of ignition systems for radio installation; sturdier chassis frames; longer and wider springs; greater comfort in the body and a general tendency in design toward reduction of wind resistance.

MORE POWER AND EASIER DRIVING ARE IMPROVEMENTS NOW EXPECTED IN MOTORING AS 1931 STYLES ARE DISPLAYED

DETROIT—Preliminary investigation of the latest developments in automotive engineering reveals that the following subjects will have foremost consideration in the coming New York Auto Show.

1. Transmissions.
2. Oil cooling.
3. Braking.
4. Downdraft carburetion.
5. Aluminum alloys.
6. Power-to-weight ratio.

Although these will be the most prevalent topics, those never-end-

ing questions of "in-line" versus "V-type" eight, of front drives and of twelve and sixteen valves will continue to worry the salesman.

Transmission Changes
Greatest interest will be expected among the show visitors in the various types of transmission, for it is on this subject that engineers seem to be most at odds. Free-wheeling, synchro-mesh, constant mesh, herring-bone and the older type of sliding gear transmissions keep many an engineering meeting boiling hot and may be expected to add many a lay adherent and opponent to each type.

For the present, the free-wheeling device introduced last summer, and to be seen on at least one other manufacturer's products at the show, is expected to gather the largest crowds. There seems to be some mystery surrounding this appliance, although that will be easily dispelled by the knowledge that it is nothing else than a modern application of the coaster device we used to have on our bicycles.

As against this form of transmission, others will offer the synchro-mesh system first adopted in high priced eight. Now a manufacturer of a successful six will appear at the show for the first time with this type of transmission.

At the same time, internal gears of the constant mesh type will be shown by other manufacturers, one will continue its use of the herring-bone type while those still sticking to the plain sliding gear transmission, the majority to be sure, improve the gearing for greater silence and easier shifting.

Gearing for High Speed
Whatever the type, however, we may confidently expect better and quieter transmissions. Improved roads have brought about higher average speeds, one engineer points out, which would greatly reduce the life of the engine. To cope with this larger engines must be built, which would prove more expensive to operate, or the transmission must be geared for high speeds without raising the engine speed.

Despite all the talk about larger engines, however, it is the transmission that is being looked upon by engineers for higher speeds. The engineers have succeeded in lowering the gear ratios, particularly in second and third, while keeping them as quiet as ever.

Quiet operation, with the engine going its fastest in second and high gears, has been achieved also by the use of internal gearing, particularly in four-speed transmissions. Synchro-mesh, constant mesh and herring-bone types of gears attain the same objective. With ease and quietness of shifting gears, comes greater ease and silence in braking. Due to the increase in the number of drivers, engineers have pointed their efforts toward easier, yet more effective braking.
