He was graduated from Abernathy High school, and in 1939 he received a degree from West Texas State college, Canyon. He taught school at Keffr, in Swisher county, three years. He is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Harrison.

Ensign Mitchell entered the service as Yeoman, first class, April 3, 1942, and had boot training at San Diego, Calif., before entering radio school in New York City, on August 1, 1942. After 16 weeks of training, he was graduated with a rating of Radioman, third class. He advanced to the rating of RM 1c while serving at the Naval Radio Station at Chatham, Mass.

He was commissioned in the Naval Reserve at Boston, Mass., Sept. 28, 1944, and reported to the University of Arizona, Tucson, on Oct. 25, for further training. He finished training at Tucson in December and visited here before reporting to the west coast. His wife is with him in California.

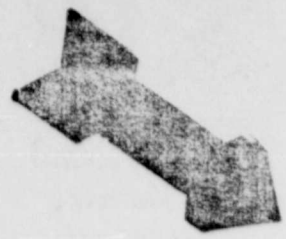

(Editor's Note: Following are excerpts from letters which Mr. and Mrs. Tom Struve received from their son, Sgt. Edgar, who is in the Philippines.)

Jan. 14 — Dear Mother and Dad: Just a few lines to let you know I'm still okay. I have just made another move, back again to where I was when I first came here. If you have been keeping up with the news, you should know just about where I am. . . . I received a letter from you last week that was written the last part of October. You said you had sent the watch band and foot powder. I have received the band, but as yet I haven't received the foot powder. I imagine it will be some time before it catches up with me. . . . Weather here is still hot and wet. If it doesn't quit raining soon, I'll be web footed when I do leave. . . . The Filipinos are quite friendly, quite a few talk some English, most of the younger people can speak and write it. They come around to our tents and ask to do our laundry for us. When we first came here they didn't want very much, some canned food, or some clothes, undershirts, shorts, shirts.

Sunday, Jan. 28, 1945

Dear Buford: Yesterday, while waiting at the Ft. Worth and Denver station here, my mother and I saw F. O. Ashton-T-Sgt. He was enroute to Sheppard Field for reassignment. I hardly recognized him after all these years. But he looked well. He told us that after 3 years in various parts of Alaska he has been in the states 6 months now—he about five were spent at Ogden, U-

tah. Incidentally, upon his return home, Artesia, N. M., he married. His wife is from Artesia. Perhaps you have this information, but just in case, I thought it might interest you. His parents address is Box 900, Artesia, N. M. By the way, my mother's sister, Hazel Graham, formerly Gilbreth, was happy to welcome her husband Pfc. George Graham home yesterday after 26 months duty in Alaska. She accompanied him to San Antonio from where he will receive 21 days furlough. I re-

ceived a V-Mail from Dewey yesterday. He will be home very soon and of course is quite happy about it. So long for now. Always, Corky. (Cortez Daniel, Amarillo.)

Dear Buford: As one away from home I know how the boys over there twist and turn the Review looking for local news of those at home. Things that might look silly to one at home don't look that way to the guy away from home. Can't you get those Tucco guys to give you some fresh stuff without having to wait for the Southwestern which already carries stuff a month old I know the Editor can't print it if the other fellow doesn't get it in.

We like Borger very much but do miss our Abernathy friends. As ever, the R. T. Prices.

Dear Buford: After hearing your name and reading the Abernathy Weekly Review and becoming a Medlin by marriage, I feel I know you well enough to say "Buford." I'm Mrs. Howard J. Medlin. Son John and myself trekked west in the auto and were home in California time for Thanksgiving dinner. I left Mr. and Mrs. Medlin well in health. Since work is scarce in Arkansas—for "strangers"—and Howard had embarked Halloween eve, I decided California was the place to go. Believe me I love Texas. Well, I should—I married a Texas boy! Anyway—did you know that during Howard's 17 weeks training I lived in Lubbock with Callie Mae Boren, John Boren's wife? Our two sons fought fiercely, but Callie Mae and I clicked and I've made a life-long true friend. She is one brave girl, Buford. She helped this gal get adjusted to being a soldier's wife. Her John should be about due a rest and sight of home. He'll certainly be thrilled with his little Paul, who, by the way, is the picture of his Marine Daddy. Over two years is a long time. Howard has really been getting around in his three months overseas. He went to England, Scotland, France, Belgium and into action in Germany. Since he mentioned Dinant and Liege I believe he is with the first army—Dec. 22nd he was evacuated out of action and 20 hours later he was operated on for appendicitis in Holland. (Something to tell his grandchildren, huh?) He reports wonderful care. When he was well enough to be moved, he was sent to France via Belgium. Letters to date, he was still in France hospitalized Jan. 12. Due to the German push in Decem-

ber, the mail was held back and then he had so many moves. He writes "still no mail." He's not had word from anyone since my letter dated Nov. 12th. He did receive his first mail since Thanksgiving, Dec. 18th, in Germany. It was a Christmas card from your paper and one from the Abernathy Methodist Church Men's Bible class. He said both cards were nice and he appreciated them very much. Thanks, from me, too. I do hope he gets mail soon. Dry runs on mail are the most hard to bear. Howard said he actually had to cry when he received my one letter. One satisfaction—when his mail does catch up, it will overwhelm him. He will get 4 large boxes and mail bags full. I received a small package from Howard sent from Germany. It contained 2 German medals, a German fair trinket with a "Saarburg" inscription, and 5 beautiful pieces of hand crocheted silk lace doilies. They are so intricate. One evidently was very old as it was stitched with thread in places. One was a fine example of Battenburg braid work. Howard was sitting in a cellar and writing from fox holes about that time. The crocheted pieces definitely need washing. Dirt was no matter—Howard held these things in his hands not many weeks past—they were held to my cheek. Howard seems to think the war with Germany will not last many months. He says the war there will end as soon as the Germans realize they are only being annihilated. He said the Germans are taking worse beatings. Our casualties are much less than theirs. Hey! I've talked enough—See enclosed money order. May I begin being an Abernathy Weekly Review subscriber? Howard has written, asking me to write you the latest news of Pvt. Howard J. Medlin. I have done so. Sincerely, Dorothy A. Medlin. (5121 Wiota St., Los Angeles 41, Calif. Jan. 29.) P. S.—Howard's address at present: (Cannot be published.) And Johnny just came down with the measles!

Dear Buford: I'm sending you a piece my brother, S/Sgt. James E. McNally wrote and if you care to print it you can, and if it is too lengthy to publish it will be o. k. Before moving to Post, he and my family lived at Lakeview. He attended school at Lakeview for three years. He sent home a piece of a German parachute. He is also a brother of Mrs. James Landtroop, formerly of Abernathy. Mrs. Fred Benefield, Tulia, Texas.

We Bomb Cologne—On One Good Engine. (Written for Post, Tex., Dispatch by S/Sgt. James C. McNally.)

(Editor's Note: Author of this story, S/Sgt. James C. McNally, 23, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. McNally, who live in Post. He attended Post High school until 1940, when he was employed by Consolidated Aircraft, San Diego, Calif. Entering the AAF in May, 1943, he attended airplane mechanic's school at Amarillo, and aerial gunnery school at Kingman, Ariz., where he received his wings in April, 1944. He is at present a top turret gunner and en-

gineer on an 8th Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress in the 385th Bombardment group. This group is a part of the famous 3rd Bombardment Division, which has been cited by the president for its now historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of the Messerschmitt airplane factories at Regensburg, Germany, in August of 1944.)

AN 8TH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England—We were told at "briefing" that our "target for today" was the marshalling yards at Cologne, Germany. Then our briefing officer told us of the importance of this mission. Through those rail yards was passing all the supplies and reinforcements for the city of Aachen, which our ground troops were struggling to encircle. Our job was to demolish their supply lines into the city in order to hasten the fall of Aachen. After all the other information was passed on to us—such as weather to be expected, the time under oxygen, flack guns at the target, and our route to and from the target, we proceeded to our planes to prepare for take-off.

Everything went as planned until we started our bomb run—then the Nazis started blasting away at us with their flack batteries. Not too accurate, but there was one burst that really was addressed to us. It knocked out our No. 3 engine, which the pilot quickly "feathered," and crippled our No. 4 engine so that it was drawing just enough power to keep going. We managed to stay in formation and drop our bombs "on target."

Right after "Bombs Away," our pilot feathered the ailing No. 4 engine and found that before our bombs had dropped, we had suffered another hit. The tip of our No. 1 propeller had been shot off, causing that engine to run raggedly. Now we were losing altitude rapidly and our formation was slowly pulling away from us. We had become a

"straggler" which means that we might fall prey to the Luftwaffe, which delights in finding an unprotected Fortress in trouble.

As there was a solid layer of clouds beneath us, our navigator set to work to plot a course that would get us to an airfield in friendly territory, but, meanwhile, we had to avoid the Nazi ground defenses along our route. With all the evasive action that we were forced to take to evade the flak guns, we lost our bearings but finally succeeded in reaching the vicinity of Brussels. Over the interphone came the order from the pilot to prepare for a crash landing. He had spotted an airfield near the city and was going to attempt a landing. So we all jammed into the radio room to brace ourselves for the shock—but none came. He set the giant Fortress down without a jar and out we spilled on Belgian soil to look our bomber over and count more than 100 holes from flak—but not a scratch on any crew member.

After two days in Brussels, we were given a ride back to England, to find out that our ground troops had captured their first German city—Aachen. We had done theirs. That's the kind of cooperation that has been pushing the Nazis back all along the line.

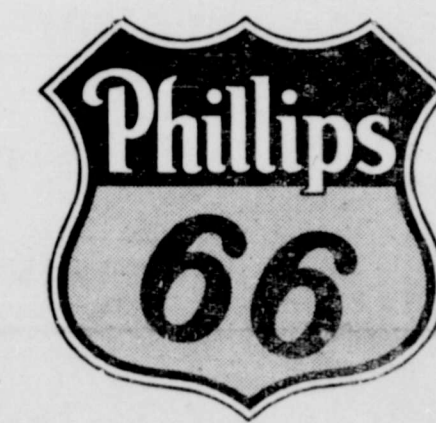

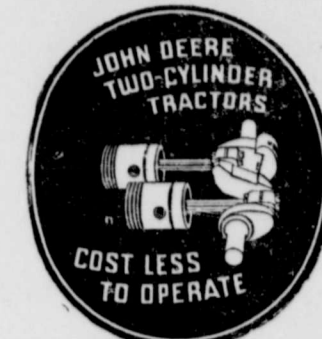

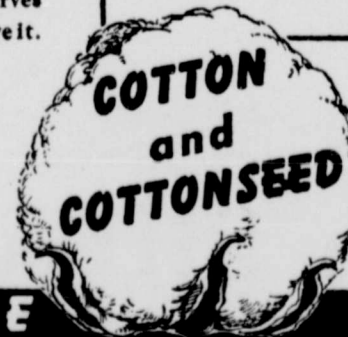
