City Bond Issue Carries By Twenty-Two To One Norris Raps Smith In First Plains Campaign Talk

Several Thousand Attend Speech Of Ft. Worth Pastor

Orderly Throng Stands For Three Hours While Demo Chief's Are Lambasted By Visitor

Praise For Hoover

Speaker Dwells Upon Good Points Of GOP Leader In Open Air Address; Scores Tammany And Raskob

Denouncing the candidacy of Governor Alfred E. Smith, democratic presidential nominee, here, and urging the election of Herbert Hoover, republican standard bearer, Dr. A. Frank Norris, Fort Worth Baptist pastor, last night delivered the first public speech dealing entirely with the national political situation yet heard in the South Plains section. Several thousand people, more than half of whom were forced to remain standing, heard the address throughout the three hours of its duration and although applause was frequent, was orderly in the extreme.

The speech was held just north of the Lubbock town, on Tenth Street between Texas Avenue and Avenue D, and the street and adjacent vacant lots were packed with people. Dr. Norris made his speech from a small platform along the side of the street. He was introduced by Frank E. Wheelock, regularly elected chairman of the county democratic committee.

Hundred Are Dead From Madrid Fire

Theatre Fire Claims Lives Of Madrid's Poor Sunday; Narrow Stairways Prevent Escape From Balconies

(By Associated Press)
MADRID, Sept. 24.—Approximately 100 dead had been recovered tonight from ruins of the Novedades Theatre where a Sunday performance suddenly was turned into a raging inferno which sent death among the panic-stricken audience.

The fire chief, directing his men in probing the smoldering wreckage which had been the stairways and balconies, said tonight he believed 60 more bodies might be found and the total death toll could be estimated conservatively at 120.

HECKLERS OUSTED AT CURTIS TALK

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 24. (P)—Reference by Senator Curtis, the Republican vice presidential nominee to Governor Smith at a rally here tonight brought two hecklers into action, and both were promptly ejected by police.

One of the hecklers was a woman, who shrieked, over and over, "don't talk about the 'Side-walks of New York'."

Senator Curtis spoke of Governor Smith's farm pronouncements and referred to him as "the man who marches to the tune of the 'Side-walks of New York'."

A man in the crowd shouted, "Yes, you would tear down the Statue of Liberty and put up one of Andrew Mellon."

"He is the best Secretary of the Treasury America ever had," Curtis shot back.

Then the woman on the other side shrieked out and two policemen escorted her out.

"Don't put them out," Curtis said, smiling.

A demonstration broke out when he added: "I came here to talk to men and women who prefer to march to the music of 'The Star Spangled Banner'."

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Smith Trains Guns On Black Chapters Of GOP Regimes

Republican Party Is Taking Texas Seriously In Coming Campaign

Writer Declares Republican Victory In Texas Gives Old Line Democrats Headache And Would Be Eighth Wonder Of The World; Cleavage Persists

FORT WORTH, Sept. 24. (P)—Texas, ever a paragon of democracy, now is experiencing the greatest political surprise of its life. For the first time in history the republican party actually is seriously talking about carrying Texas in a national republican campaign.

It is the thought of this possibility that is giving old line democrats a headache.

Would Be Eighth Wonder
A republican victory would be a political eighth wonder of the world, say these democrats, and they refused to believe that it can happen. But these are some, even many, democrats who say it can happen and they are striving to see that it does for the democratic party of the Lone Star State is split, and badly so.

To find the exact line of cleavage is the problem of the answer of facts who wants to answer the question—Smith or Hoover? For all practical purposes this is a one-party state; it barely gives office to

a republican in local affairs and in national affairs has never given less than a very comfortable two to one majority to the democratic candidate, and often a greater margin.

The republican party always has been an almost negligible quantity, but now, with the opposition divided, it offers temporary shelter to the democratic anti-Smith forces. Together they create what doubt there is as to the outcome in Texas. In its simplest terms the problem is, will democrats quit the party of Alfred E. Smith and vote for Herbert Hoover in sufficient numbers to upset the normal ratio?

An inquirer making the rounds of political camps draws three answers to the question—two affirmative and one negative. Republican and anti-Smith headquarters say "yes"; regular democratic leaders say "no." All can cite ample precedent to support their contention that the state that was host to the

Light Balloting Gives Approval Of \$350,000 Improvement Program For Lubbock; Only 458 Votes Are Cast

Only 21 Votes Go Against Issue; Subway Projects Receive Greatest Amount Of Ballots.

Ends 3 Years Work

Construction Work Likely To Start On Subways In Near Future; Woods Predicts Completion By June

Indicating that the owners of property in Lubbock are eager to aid in the advancement of the city, the \$350,000 bond issue for the construction of two subways and the extension of water, lights and sewer lines here was carried by more than a twenty-two to one vote, election officials reported last night as the close of the polls. Of the 458 votes cast only 21 voted against the improvements.

Each Unit Carries
The official count showed 457 voted for the street improvements totalling \$225,000 while 20 voted against; 453 for the \$85,000 sewer extensions and 20 against, and 453 for the \$40,000 water extensions and 21 against.

The balloting was exceedingly light all through the day, the officials said, the count bearing out their statements. The election had one of the lightest counts ever experienced in a city bond election here.

With the passing of the issue for the construction of the two subways under the railroad tracks here, three

A member of a social welfare organization is quoted as saying: "There is no profession in the world that would for one day tolerate a member who knew so little about his task as the average parent."

That is partly true. Yet there are many things in life that we cannot learn ahead of time. We must learn as we go. Parenthood is one of them.

I have no quarrel with the mother and father who have made mistakes with their children. As a rule they are doing pretty much the best they know how and when they are working hard and day to day to provide for their children, perhaps they have no time or are too tired to delve very deeply into the processes of character development.

Theory and practice often run parallel and never meet. It is all very fine to talk about how things should be done and then do them. It is all very well to talk about parents going to lectures and reading about child psychology, but how about mothers and fathers who are too tired or unable in other ways to take up these things and "undertake parenthood as a profession?"

But I believe now that such statements are discouraging to parents who need encouragement. Let's the idea that they couldn't bring a child up right if they had one that discourages so many people from having families!

The best way is not to scold parents but to drop a suggestion now and then when they are not too tired to pay attention.

Besides, parents are really learning. It is in the very air. Look at the lowly vegetable, a year or two ago despised, but now risen to a place of glory. Look at the boiled milk-bottle, the raised window, and the tooth-brush!

You can't tell me that there is as much corporal punishment as there was ten years ago. And I think parents are making greater sacrifices to their children's education than ever before.

You can prepare the adolescent generation for parenthood, but when the time actually arrives the same old lessons will have to be learned as they have always been learned. In the school of experience.

No, I don't believe the time will ever come when parenthood reaches the point of professionalism. When it does there will very likely be no parenthood.

New Styles Revive Old Favorite Bolero

BUT ONLY AS PART OF MODE'S THEME

PARIS, Sept. 24.—When the bolero reappeared on the scene about three years ago it was created with a great measure of surprise. After such a protracted absence it almost looked like something new!

It is interesting also to note that since then it has never been completely left aside. It has become a theme to work on just like apron effects in afternoon gowns and panels in evening gowns. The bolero, in fact, is now classed in the category of "flaring movements" that have characterized the fashions of the last season.

In my collection you will find that the bolero effect is used quite unostentatiously, as all other ideas devoid of the attraction of something really new. Everyone remembers how overdone the bolero idea was when it came in again. It was seen at every time and on practically every type of frock, without the least attempt at discrimination. Now it has resumed its proper sphere and remains what it really constitutes—a charming theme, susceptible of being diversely interpreted.

There are quite a number of boleros or bolero effects in my present collection. On some frocks they affect a cape movement at the back. On others the bolero is placed on the bias and one side of the bodice only in order to relieve the severity of the back.

Despite all these new interpretations, used in most instances to lend a more supple line to a gown, a bolero could never constitute in itself the only original note of a model. One can safely say that there are no more bolero dresses but that there are dresses with bolero effects. By this I mean that supposing these were removed, the dress would still look like a model.

I think you will find too, that in afternoon dresses the bolero figures more boldly and assumes a greater importance than in evening gowns. A bolero effect will often pass unnoted on an evening dress, it is only at a second glance that you notice it there at all. There is a reason for this and it is put there to disintegrate the waistline without detracting from its suppleness and ease, the passwords to this season's fashion.

Illustrative of the decorative value of the bolero, as a theme to be used in conjunction with others in a model, are two gowns in my collection.

You will note that the finesse may be taken either way. If there has been no indication of the location of the Queen of diamonds, the Jack of diamonds should be led from the dummy to coax east to cover with the Queen of diamonds. Regardless of whether east does so or not, declarer should play the King of diamonds. On the next round he should lead the 9 of diamonds from his own hand and finesse unless it is covered with the Queen of diamonds by west.

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Oatmeal with codded apples, cream, broiled cottage ham, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Stuffed baked, cucumber, lettuce and whole wheat bread, sandwiches, peach, cobbler, milk, tea.

DINNER—Halibut steak in tomato sauce, scalloped eggplant, stuffed pepper salad, rye bread, grape pudding, milk, coffee.

Scalloped Eggplant.

One eggplant, 1 sweet green pepper, dried bread crumbs, butter, salt and pepper, milk.

Pare eggplant, cut into dice and let stand in cold salted water for one hour. Drain and parboil for 20 minutes. Drain thoroughly. Into a well buttered baking dish put alternate layers of eggplant and crumbs sprinkling each layer with butter, dotting with salt and pepper and strewn finely minced pepper through the eggplant. 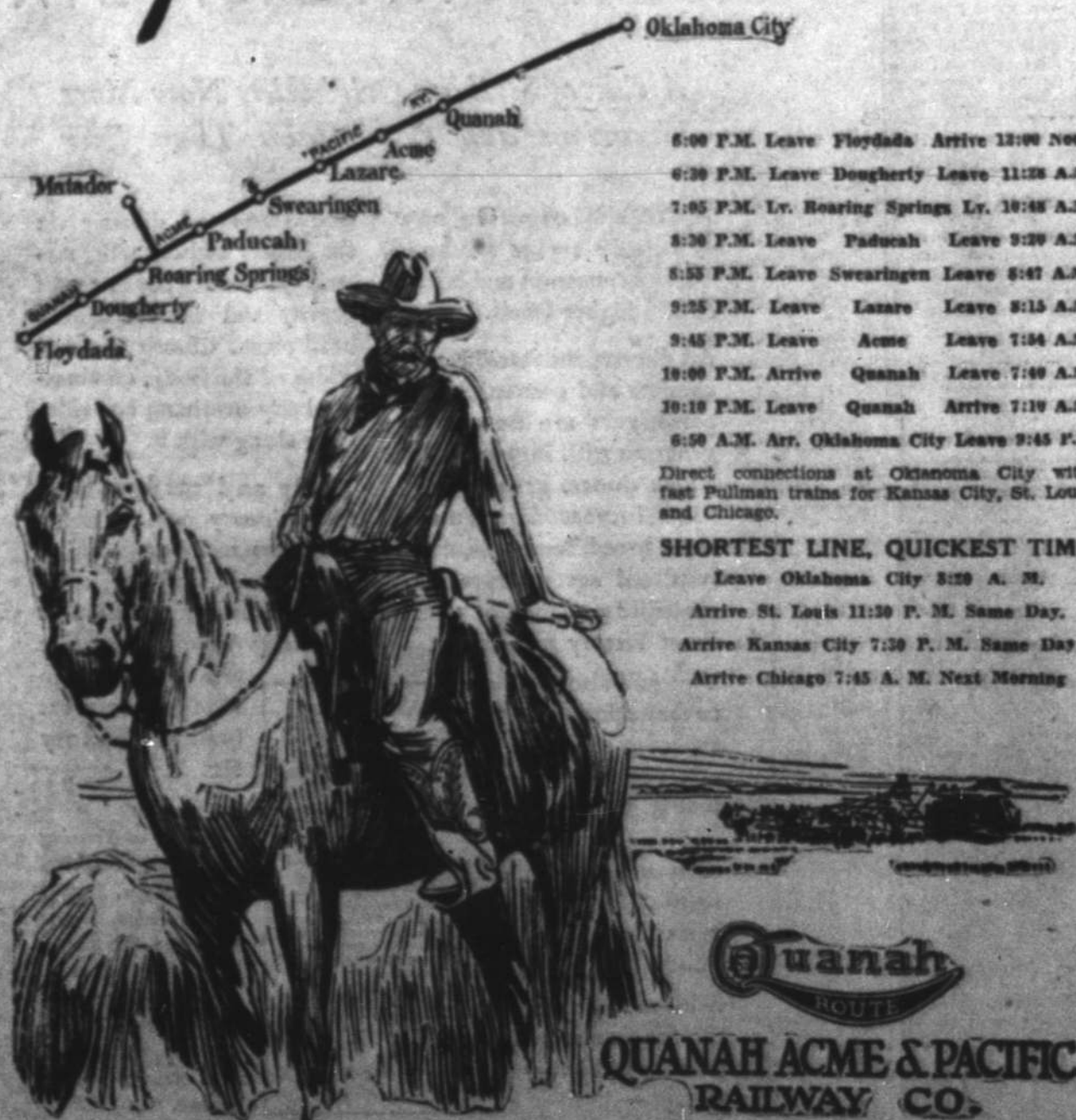

CHANGING THE CLIMATE

To rid the world of war it will first be necessary to change what has been referred to recently as the mental climate of the universe. That pertinent truth was very appropriately emphasized met in Prague under the auspices of the World Alliance for Promoting International Friendship Through the Churches. The religious, social and educational leaders, representative of more than half of the nation of the earth, who attended this conference, conferred together for many days on the fundamentals to be adopted as the methods to be employed in delivering mankind once and forever from the menace of war.

By a happy coincidence, the Kellogg Treaty for the renunciation of war was being signed in Paris while the Prague conferees were in the midst of their deliberations. It was agreed by the delegates attending the World Conference that treaties such as the one then being signed in Paris were of inestimable value in reducing to impotence the instruments of war. There was naught but praise at Prague for the League of Nations, the World Court, the Locarno Treaties, and for all other diplomatic and juridical gestures in behalf of peace. It was clearly recognized that the reduction of armaments was an urgent necessity; that every possible effort should be made to strengthen the arm of the peacemaker in the establishment of commissions of conciliation and arbitration. It was affirmed however, and reaffirmed, that all of these peaceful processes would utterly fail of high purpose unless, at the same time, the thinking habits of the people themselves were changed for the better.

It was without doubt from such a standpoint that Dr. William Pierson Merrill, president of the American branch of the World Alliance, made in his conference address this statement:

The best way, indeed the only way to rid the world of war is to change the climate. Let the campaign for the reduction of armaments go on. Let men go on building the institutions of co-operation and conference. But if the old climate remains unchanged, if the ancient hatreds, prejudices, ill will, love of domination, secret scheming and the rest remain unchecked and unchanged, war will live and thrive. Our supreme business is to change the mental climate of the universe so that war cannot live and breathe in the new atmosphere.

The peacemakers of the world do well to remember these words of wisdom. In the long struggle for peace too little significance has been attached to the heroic efforts, made in the face of great obstacles to change the thought of mankind. Relatively speaking, it is much easier to write a treaty than it is to uproot a prejudice. Both of these processes are vitally necessary to the attaining and maintaining of international harmony, but who can deny that treaties derive their sanction, not by force of arms, but by the predisposition toward peace resident in the consciousness of the peoples signatory to these same treaties. The World Alliance, consistent with this prior emphasis upon the spiritual implications of the peace problem, has announced its intention of supplementing the campaign now being made by the world's educators to instill in the consciousness of future generations an appreciative regard for the cultural and artistic tendencies of the peoples of the earth. Special emphasis is also to be given to the influence of the press and the motion picture in the shaping of international viewpoints.

Any formal renunciation of war, standing alone, will not produce peace. Nor will disarmament, nor courts of justice, suffice to accomplish the pacification of international contacts. The success of all these structural enterprises depends, in the last analysis, on the willingness of the nations to trust one another. This trusting attitude is derived from something more consequential than peace treaties. It springs from the inmost thoughts of every citizen of whatever flag. It is the friendly heart that counts for more than anything else in the slow

but steady climb toward the heights of peace.

SCRIMPING ON PUBLIC HEALTH EXPENDITURES

The pressing need of more liberal appropriations for public health work in this State, was emphasized by Dr. W. A. King, City Health Officer, in addressing the San Antonio Child Health Council on the occasion of its permanent organization, under the presidency of Miss Hannah Hirschberg.

Texas has been remiss in this respect, Dr. King showed. Its expenditures for these services average only 3 cents per capita, as compared with 25 cents per capita elsewhere.

Scrimping where the community health is concerned is not economy. State, county and city health departments utilize all the resources at their command in protecting the people against disease—insulating contagion and otherwise fighting epidemics; safeguarding the food-supply through periodic inspections; looking after sanitary systems, and educating the public in the essential art of taking care of itself. There is probably not a health office in all Texas but is handicapped by a lack of funds. The State Board of Health—in submitting its biennial budget to the Board of Control—has pointed to its present crippled condition. The Forty-first Legislature is besought to increase the annual appropriations for this work—though the sum requested still would be far less than what numerous other States spend, per capita, on public health. One item in the Texas Board's budget, \$20,000 for rural sanitation, is designed to repair the neglect of years. Matched by a like sum from the Rockefeller Foundation, this money would be utilized in establishing local health units in communities now lacking such service—in fighting malaria, typhoid fever and hookworm disease, both through sanitary improvements and popular education. The benefits which would accrue would far outweigh the small cost to the taxpayers. Indeed, that is true of the entire budget for the State Department of Health, as of whatever public expenditure for similar purposes. The health officials, State and local generally are engaged in applying the proverbial ounce of prevention—at once the cheapest and most efficacious phase of the biennial warfare against disease.

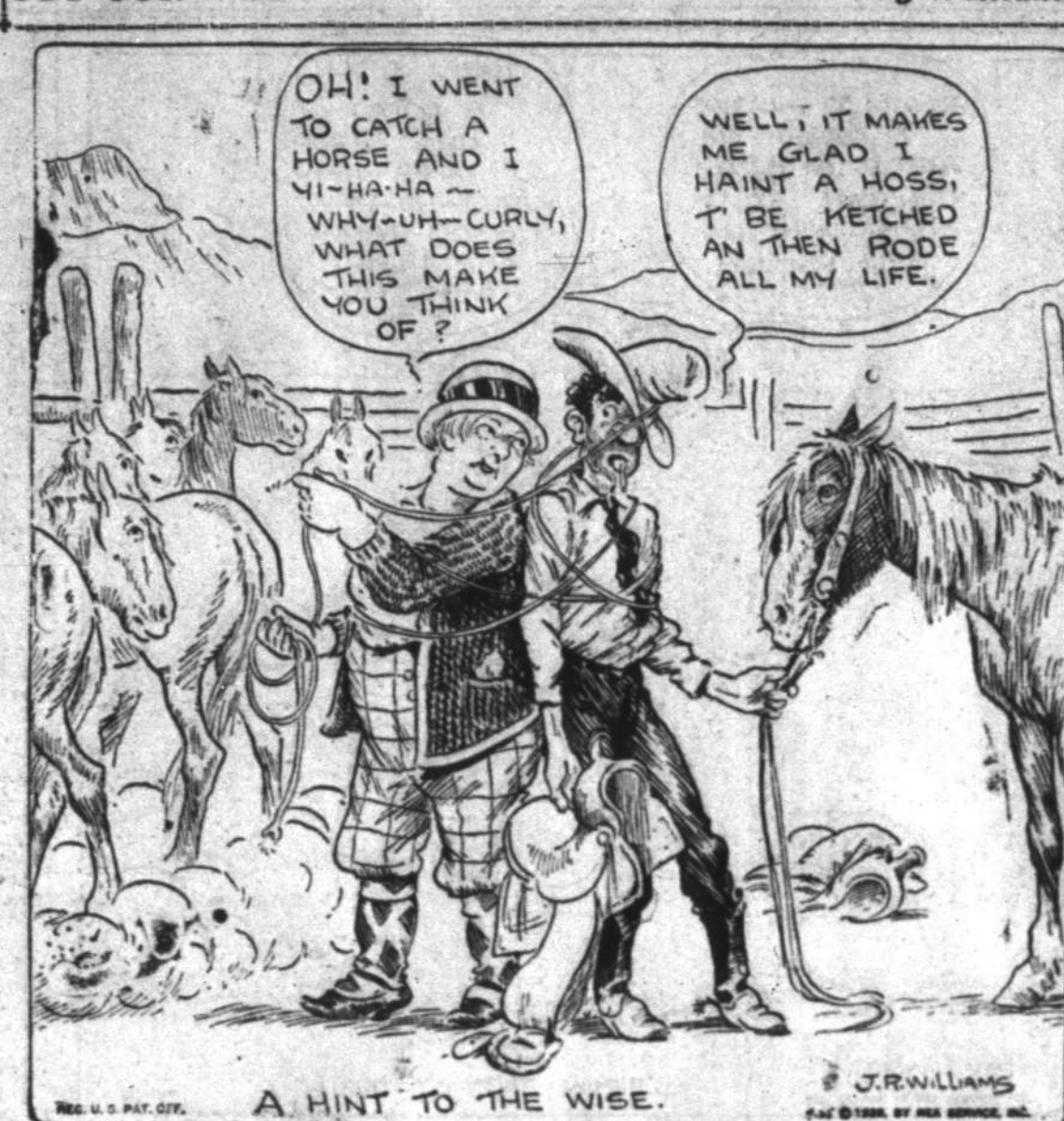
TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

Statistics compiled in Washington are reported to indicate that by 1935 we can look forward to the loss of 40,000 lives a year in highway accidents. That forecast is based upon the rate of increase in fatalities in the past. Every twenty-four hours this year, we are told, 2,360 persons were killed or injured on streets and highways in the United States. In the first six months of the present year, 13,750 were killed and 412,500 injured. Discourtesy and carelessness by both motorists and pedestrians are given as the chief causes of these accidents. Speeding, traffic law violations and intoxication are given in the order named as the causes of accidents in which the motorist is to blame. Among the 26,000 persons killed in 1927 the statistics quoted list 11,367 deaths as caused principally by pedestrians. That number must condemn carelessness among those on foot, but it leaves the larger number, 15,000, to be blamed upon the other causes, principally the motorist, notwithstanding that accidents involving pedestrians continue to grow. The human factor is blamed for 95 per cent of the accidents and other causes, wet streets, por lights, narrow roads, only 5 per cent. Daily we hear suggestions intended to reduce traffic accident toll. In the last months there has been talk of the driver's license. As if a man or woman would drive more carefully because an added tax of \$1 or \$3 or \$5, as it eventually would be, had been collected at the time the car was purchased. In the beginning all of the problems brought by the motor car were to be solved by requiring a license tag, so we could learn the identity of the driver. The suggestion that all cities and communities undertake and continue complete educational campaigns to teach safety rules, courtesy and caution is a step in the direction of safety. Real punishment for violation of these rules also would help. A uniform code of traffic rules throughout the country and educational efforts after their adoption is greatly to be desired. But after all the determination of everyone, driver or pedestrian, to use courtesy, caution and common sense every moment on street or highway will go further in eliminating traffic accidents than anything else. The problem hardly can be solved on any other basis.

HOOVER'S SPEECH

Mr. Hoover's speech at Newark is politically as notable for one striking omission as for what it included. Nothing was said to clarify the speaker's stand on prohibition. Although Mr. Hoover's acceptance speech was bone dry in tone and implication, it did not explicitly shut the door on an increase in the permissible alcoholic content of liquor to 3, 4 or 5 per cent. In his Newark address, which was his first campaign speech in a wet eastern State, Mr. Hoover said nothing either to encourage or discourage the hopeful assertion of Republican leaders in the wet eastern States that he is not bone dry. He has left this question unanswered. His speech was devoted mainly to orthodox Republican doctrine, although he repeated his advocacy of legislation to restrict the use of injunctions in labor disputes. Of this point the Republican and Democratic candidates for the presidency are rivaling each other, in order to attract the so-called "labor vote."

PRESS COMMENTS

JIM FERGUSON QUILTS
With the issue of The Ferguson Forum for Thursday, September 6, former Governor James E. Ferguson bids "adieu, adios, and goodbye" to his readers, stating in a front page editorial, that "this will in all probability be the last issue of The Ferguson Forum. For nearly eleven years, the Forum has been on the political firing line. It has had its ups and downs, its victories and its defeats. We have been right and we have been wrong. We have been human, therefore we've been erring."

Some people may find just a trace of pathos in "Farmer Jim's" valedictory. To many, the name of Ferguson is something to frighten children with. "Fergusonism" has been fought in many bitter political campaigns. It has been pointed out by the clergy as something to be guarded against—to be avoided at great peril. Perhaps no man in Texas has had as many uncompromising terms applied to him as has James E. Ferguson.

Right or wrong, Ferguson has maintained his weekly newspaper for almost eleven years. In it has appeared much that was good; much that was bad. It is hard for us to conceive that Ferguson is the arch demon he has been painted to often. We have been opposed to him frequently, but we have, upon occasion, admired the nerve and courage of this man who has played so vital a part in the political history of this state during recent years. It has been said that Jim Ferguson controlled a "vest-pocket" number of voters in this state and that what Jim told them to do, they did. However this may be, it is an undisputed fact that every time he has seen fit to run for office, or when his wife would run, a large number of voters has always left the Fer-

guson name on the ballot. Jim was not so fortunate this year. In the first primary he supported Louis J. Wardlaw against Dan Moody for the office of Governor and he lost; his man. He also supported Alvin C. Owens for the United States senate and lost again. In the run-off primary, Ferguson, through his paper, announced that he would vote for Earle B. Mayfield rather than for Tom Connally for United States senator, as he considered Mayfield the lesser evil. Again, Jim lost.

Many people in Texas have arrived at the conclusion that Ferguson is through. Maybe he is and maybe he isn't. At any event, he has wielded a vast political influence, and the suspension of his paper will take from the public life of this state a man and a medium respected and feared whenever a political election is in the offing. We can hardly think of "Farmer Jim" as passing for all time from the scene, and although he is advancing in years, Democrats of Texas may be sure that Jim will again start a racket, if he feels so inclined.—Memphis Democrat.

YOUR HEALTH

Active School Child Must Have Wholesome Breakfast

Editor's Note: This is the third of a series of 12 articles on the health of the school child. Tomorrow: The School Luncheon.

One of the first effects of the craze for reduction in weight which swept over the world following the great war was the elimination of breakfast as a regular meal. People found that a glass of orange juice or fruit of some sort would start off the day for the adult satisfactorily, particularly if combined with the stimulation of black coffee.

Many mothers in the more prosperous class of society accustomed to sleep late eat a late breakfast and eliminate luncheon. Unfortunately these adult habits are likely to reflect themselves on the care of the children.

Fuel for Exercise
The child walking a considerable distance to school and engaged for at least four hours in mental and physical activities should have fuel sufficient to carry it through its working day. A wholesome and tempting breakfast should be provided for every school child.

If a good breakfast is prepared, and varied from day to day as to the fruit, the cereal, the bacon and the eggs, the children will eat with good appetite and will thrive exceedingly.

Fresh fruits sweetened with sugar are, of course, the prime ingredients. Oranges, tangerines, grapefruit, melon, bananas and pineapple offer a wide variety. They have the effect of counteracting acid in the body.

Cooked fruits include baked apple, apple sauce, stewed prunes, stewed figs, cooked pears or apricots and are a good second choice. Cereals are offered today in a variety to tempt any appetite. Whole-grain cereals, including cracked wheat and oatmeal, properly cooked, are excellent. The pre-cooked cereals are helpful to those who have difficulties with digestion.

Roughage
Some of the special cereals provide enough roughage to stimulate the intestinal tract. Much depends on the way in which the milk or cream makes a soggy mass. The manufacturers are careful to suggest that the milk and cream be added at the side so that the crisp cereal may be sufficiently chewed and moistened with saliva before it is swallowed.

The best beverage for the child is milk. Cocoa and chocolate are pleasant variants if the child wants something hot. Waffles and pancakes may be eaten occasionally, but should not be a regular diet for the child. They place too great a strain, particularly when soaked with quantities of syrup, on a sensitive stomach.

TAX-DODGING

The theory of taxation is to distribute the assessments among the property holders in proportion to the amount of real and personal property possessed. An examination of the tax renditions will show that the theory is not followed very closely, that equalization is only roughly approximate, and that many of the so-called prominent citizens of the country are hiding their assets.

Tangible property falls under the full scrutiny of the tax assessor, and therefore owners of this class of goods pay their just proportion of the expense of government. Intangible goods do not reveal the real status of the owner, and hence much personal property goes unrendered. Look over the personal property list some day. Take a few prominent names—of persons whose belongings you know fairly well—and see how much their personal property is listed. The farmer, the owner of a place of business, and the average type of business man cannot hide their assets, and they have learned that it pays to keep their taxes paid and make the best settlement possible on the renditions. But it is not so of the man who has greater accumulations, some of which are invested in bonds, deposits, stocks, and other securities which may be kept secret.

This inequality of taxation will some day be remedied. There ought to be a law requiring all persons to list their personal property, with a penalty for hiding assets from tax assessors. Until this is done, the burden will continue to fall heaviest upon those who are least able to bear it.

Boards of equalization sometimes are criticized for favoritism, discrimination with regard to small and large property owners, and classes of property. It is imperative therefore, that members of such boards keep their findings clear of such charges and be able to defend their figures before any individual or group which may make comparisons. Tax dodging can grow out of this body, as well as through hiding of personal assets.

Taxes should not be considered as impositions upon the holders of property. The advantages of good government cannot be obtained free. The founders of this government determined upon taxation of property as the best basis for distributing the costs of governmental activities. Despite the progress that has been made since that time, the basis of taxation has changed little. The peculiarities of modern business make tax revision expedient yet changes in the fundamental law must be made slowly and cautiously. More complete enforcement of present statutes governing tax collection would improve matters.—Pampa Herald.

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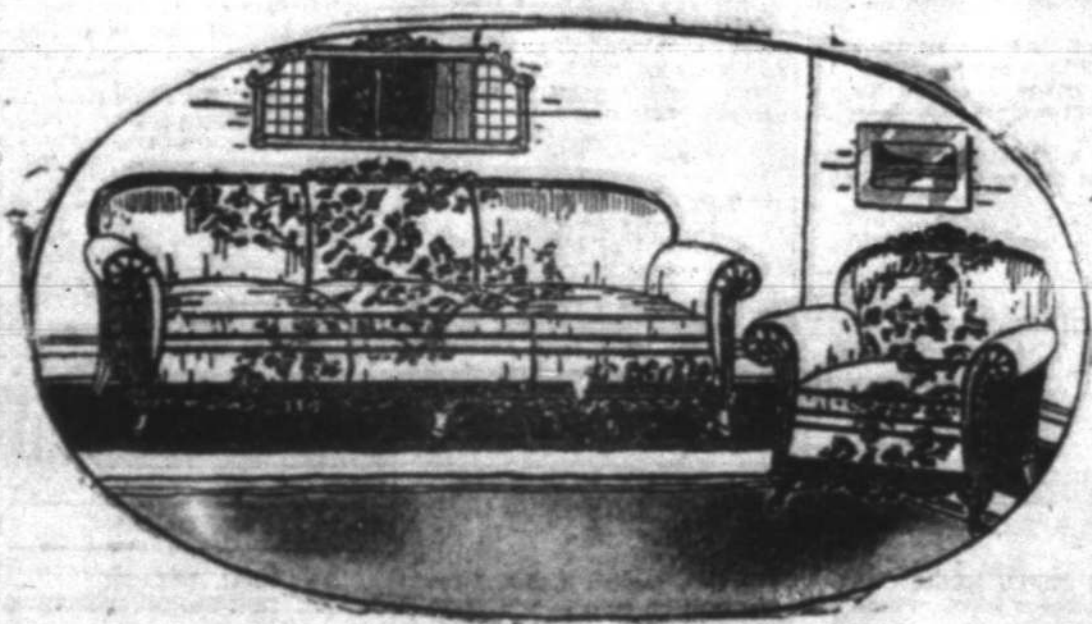

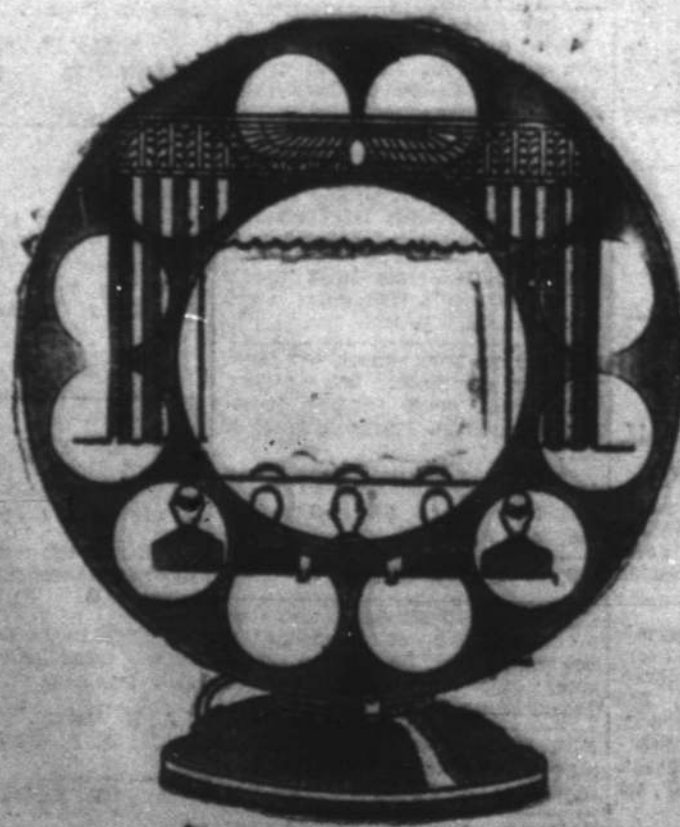
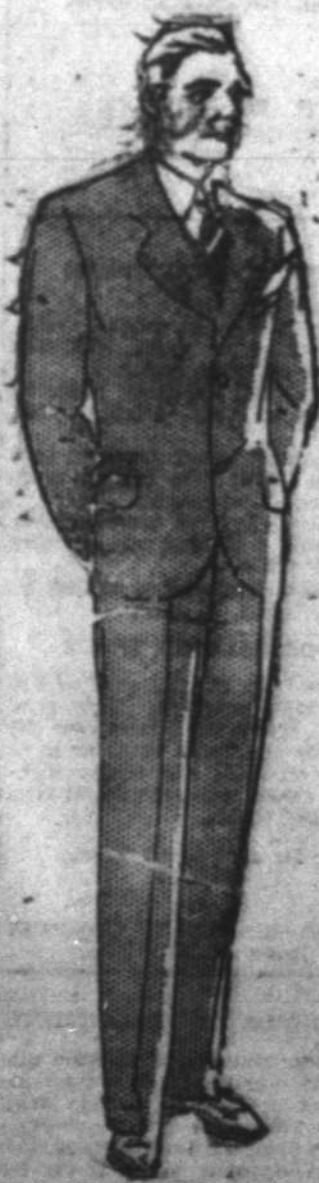

DAILY MARKETS

NEW YORK STOCKS
NEW YORK, Sept. 24. (AP)—Establishment of a new 1928 high, reached by U. S. Steel Common featuring the resumption of an irregularly higher price movement in today's stock market. Aggressive pool operations lifted nearly two score motors, oils, coppers, foods and specialties to new high ground, but final quotations also disclosed a rather sizeable list of net declines. Spring to the observance of the Jewish religious holiday by many speculators, trading showed a moderate contraction in volume, although the day's sales were well above \$4,000,000 shares.

Wall Street apparently was not disturbed by a continuance of relatively high money rates. Call funds were in plentiful supply all day at the reserve figure of 1-1/2 per cent, but a stiffer undercurrent was apparent in the time money market. Many bankers are reported to have declined to renew time loans, throwing the burden of financing the stock speculation on the call loan market.

Establishment of another new low by Sterling Exchange revived hopes of further gold shipments here from Great Britain to relieve the credit strain. Argentina is considered another possible source of gold exports as that country has more gold than it needs and the Argentine exchange rate is below dollar parity. Inasmuch as Wall Street figures that each dollar in gold forms the basis for \$10 in

credit, a fresh supply of the precious yellow metal would be looked upon as a bullish development. U. S. Steel Common returned to its old role as a market leader by crossing 161 to the highest price since the declaration of the 40 per cent stock dividend in January, 1927, closing at 160 5/8 for a net gain of nearly 2 points. Fourteen reports moved up 2 1/4 points, but the other steel shows little change. Coppers received considerable stimulus from the advance in the prices of export copper and brass. Anaconda, Kennecott, Howe Sound, Cerro de Pasco, Magma and U. S. Smelting all moved into new high ground.

Activity in the motor group was divided among Chrysler, Packard and Graham-Paige, all of which reached new high ground, and Hudson Motors which ran up more than 3 points. Unimportant reports of the Quten-Durant group had become interested in the stock. General motors closed unchanged at 213 1/4 and 215 1-2.

Briggs Manufacturing was again in brisk demand, touching a new high record at 87 1/4 on reports of record-breaking earnings. The company is understood to have taken over, or begun the construction of new plants to take care of the increased business from Chrysler, Ford and other manufacturers. Motor Frodo scored a sensational advance of 18 points by touching a new peak at 193, but lost nearly 2 points of its gain. Murray Corporation and Eaton Axle also reached new high ground.

Oils received some stimulus from unconfirmed rumors of an early increase in Mid-Continent crude prices, Atlantic Refining, Skelly and Sinclair reaching new high ground. Mexican Seaboard, was another strong feature. Coty, Jewel Tea, Otis Elevator and Union Carbide also showed outstanding strength. American Linseed, City Stores, B. Freeport, Texas, and Montgomery Ward were conspicuously heavy.

A rally of 79 cents in cotton to \$1.25 a bale was the only development of consequence in the commodity markets. Futures on most displays a firmer undertone. Coffee and sugar held steady.

Except for the establishment of a new low by Sterling Cables at \$4.84 15-16, there was little of interest in the foreign exchange market.

SUMMARY

Government ginning figures to September 15 of 2,498,000 were comparatively light and gave bulls encouragement. Repeated claims of damage to the crop came from the south and after reacting on profit taking and hedge selling, December New Orleans contracts rose to 152, 169 points higher than the low figure of 1953 made on September 18. After twelve o'clock

certificated stock in New York was 7,237 bales.

State Commissioner of Agriculture Terrell estimates the Texas cotton crop at 4,775,000 bales against his estimate of 5,250,000 made on August 18. This figure shows a decline of 475,000 bales or better than 11 per cent.

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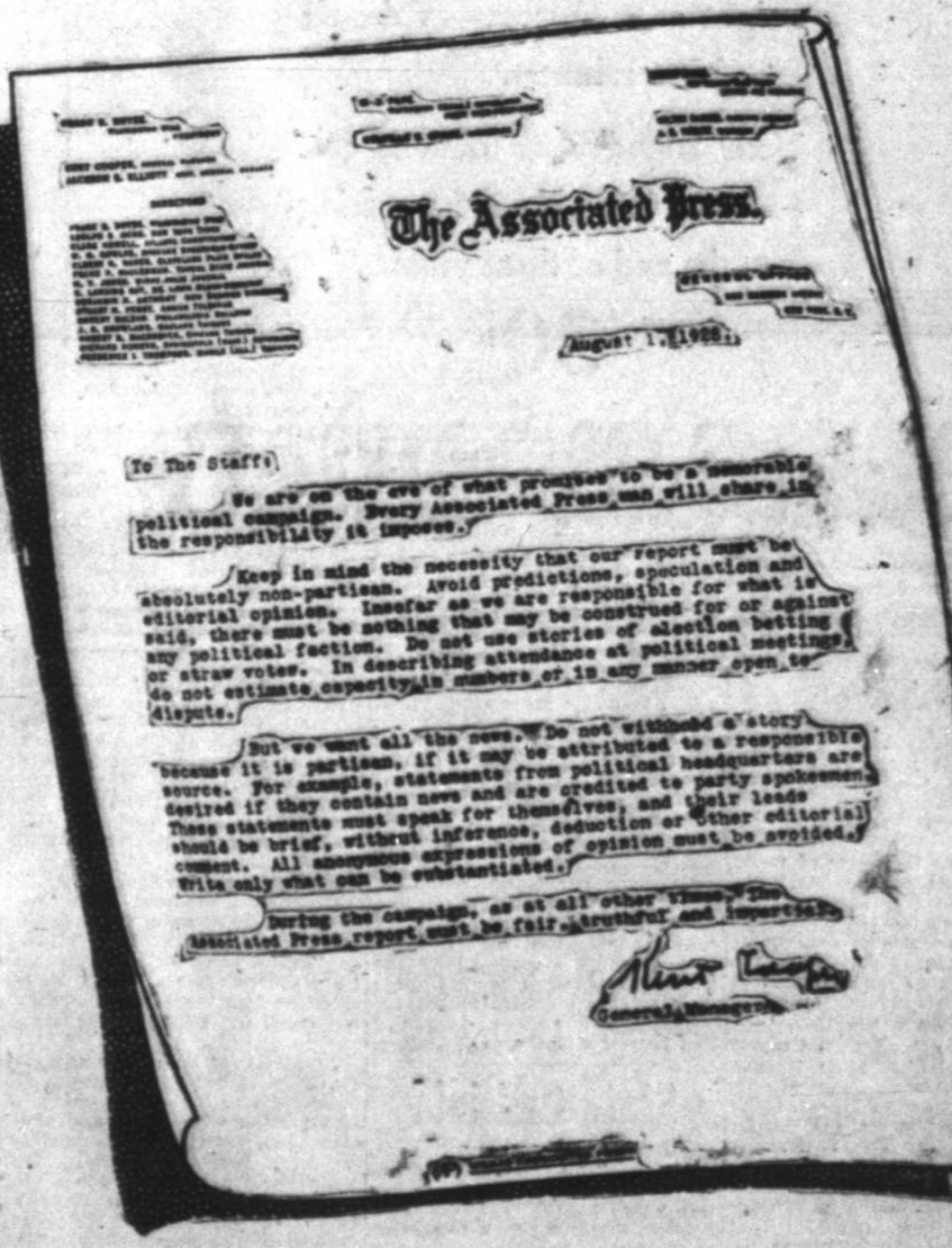
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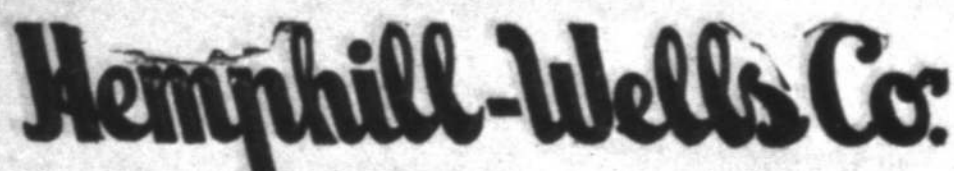
