To The Haskell County Wheat Growers

We invite the attention of every wheat grower in Haskell county to the following showing as to the worth of a Custom flour mill located here, to him individually.

The experience of J. M. Johnson of Perrin Texas, showed that he realized \$1.40 per bushel for 10 bushels of wheat ground on the Midget mill there, when wheat was only \$1.00 per bu. His experience is the same of wheat growers in the neighborhood of Midget mills all over Texas. Then if there is a mill here the Haskell wheat growers can turn the same trick—make his grain net him \$1.40 per bu., if milled on a Midget mill; while if he sells it in the grain and buys his flour and other supplies with the proceeds, he only realizes the measly sum of \$1.00 per bushel. Mr. Johnson made \$4. on his 10 bushels of wheat. Now suppose he has a family of only four, which is less than half the size of the average farmers family, he would have to take ten bushels more to mill to supply his family for one year. (The estimate is a barrel of flour per year for each person and that estimate will hold good.) Then he will have saved \$8.00 which is ten per cent on \$80 and yet there are farmers who are hesitating to assist in any way in establishing a mill here. Every mother son of them agree that a mill is needed here, but prefer to have his neighbor put it up without any help from him and thus secure a saving of 10 per cent on \$80 as a kind of gratuity of his neighbors. But there is not a wheat grower in the county who could not put \$80 of his own money into the mill and feel that the ten per cent saved on that sum was rightfully his and not a gratuity from his more public spirited neighbors, and he could look them all straight in the eye when he met them at the mill door with a load of wheat, feeling that he was equally responsible for the mill being there as any of them. But how about the fellow who comes poking around the mill which his neighbors alone built and he is now taking advantage of their charity. We feel sure there are very few such persons in Haskell county and that every wheat grower is ready and willing to do his share in locating a custom mill here.

Tells How He Fought Weevils

In 1907, or about April 15, ten miles east of Tyler, I planted thirty acres in cotton. The year the weevils were at their worst, appearing when the first came out of the ground. By the time it began to fruit seemed to be two or three weeks to a stalk. I cultivated in accordance to the latest agricultural methods, but all in vain, for the weather kept so hot and the weevil, notwithstanding that the cotton fruited, punctured the squares as fast as they came.

About the last of June, the first of July, I was in despair. There was scarcely a bloom of cotton, and as a last resort I fourteen women and children come with baskets and sacks. They took it row by row and carefully picked over entire field, gathering twenty cotton baskets of squares, burned them in the middle of field. Ten days later I hired a same bunch and repeated the in a day and a half, gathering fourteen baskets of squares, burning them likewise. Ten days later, with the same crowd, repeated the job in one day, gathering only five baskets of squares. By that time it was full of bolls. I quit picking up squares and gathered in the fall seven bales of cotton, averaging over 500 pounds per bale, my neighbors in that vicinity quired all the way from fifteen acres to make a bale.

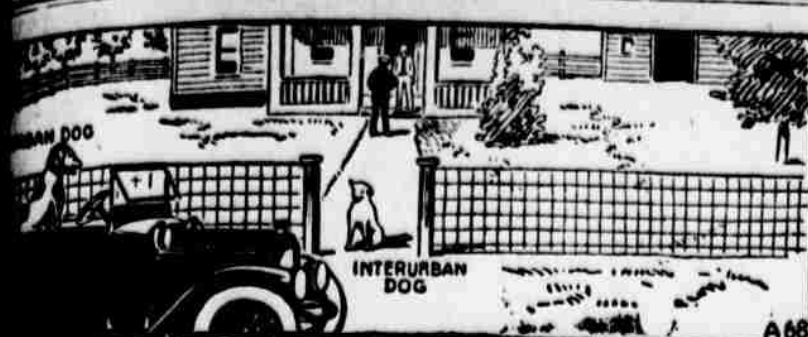
The State of Texas, County of Taylor. I, Tom M. Payne, being sworn, state: That I am a stenographer in the campaign office of Judge Thomas L. Blanton; that several days before the Haskell picnic, a Mr. L. O. Koen rang me up from Haskell over Long Distance and introduced me to Mr. C. E. Rutledge over the phone, stating that Mr. Rutledge wanted to talk to me about Judge Blanton. Mr. Rutledge asked me to tell Judge Blanton to speak at the Haskell picnic, and that if he couldn't come himself to send a representative. On Judge Blanton's return to the office I advised him of the invitation, and he certainly thought that he was invited. Later Mr. Long telephoned Judge Blanton that he had been given the eleven o'clock hour. I make this statement, because I notice in the Haskell Free Press a statement signed by several men stating that Judge Blanton "butted into a meeting where he was not asked or welcome at the time." 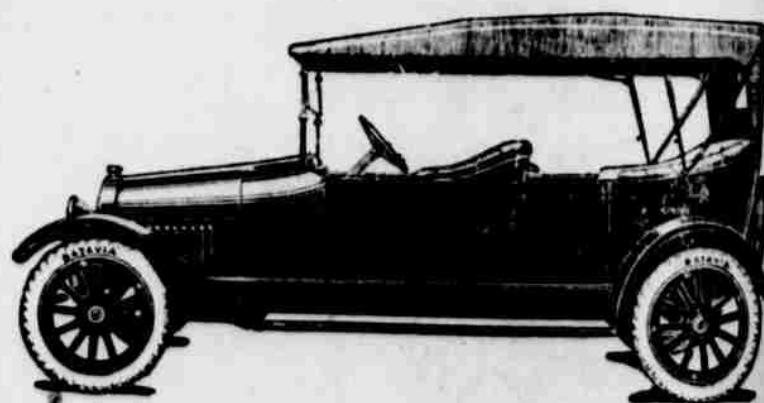

R. E. L. Knight, president of the State Fair of Texas, announces that the most extensive and complete arrangements have been made with a view of making the 1916 State Fair at Dallas, which opens October 14, and continues to and through October 29, the largest, most interesting and most valuable agricultural and educational exposition ever held.

During the year just passed, the Fair management has conducted vast improvement enterprises at Fair Park—practically every department has felt the influence of the earnest desire to bring all details connected with the Fair right up to the minute; and, as a consequence, when the 1916 Fair opens next fall, every necessary equipment and facility for an epoch-making exposition will have been provided.

Premiums Largely Increased.

The State Fair of Texas is, essentially, an agricultural exposition; its purpose is to gather together and display annually a representative showing of the wonderful resources and possibilities of the great Southwest, and this in order that the peoples of other sections may have an increased appreciation of the marvelous fertility of Southwestern soils, and the incomparable advantages of our matchless Southwestern climate. It is obvious that this purpose can be best achieved by inducing and influencing a large majority of farmers of the section to bring displays of their products to Dallas, and with this end in view, the directors of the Fair have, this year, voted large increases in premiums for practically all classes of agricultural and live stock exhibits. Many New Classifications Added.

In almost every division, and particularly in the sections devoted to

agriculture and live stock, there will be found this year a number of interesting new classifications. In the poultry section, a classification for all kinds of pigeons has been devised, and a special building is now being constructed to house the large number of pigeon exhibits expected. The raising of pigeons for the market is becoming an important industry in the Southwest—of sufficient importance, in fact, to justify a good representation at the State Fair of Texas.

While the title of this work is simply "Premium List," the publication is, in fact, much more—as it contains a great deal of interesting and valuable information relative to the rules and regulations governing the different classes and, in fact, all necessary data relative to the aims and purposes of the Fair.

A feature of this book which will interest practically all Texans will be found in the front of the publication in the nature of a large folder, 40 inches long by 8 inches wide, upon which his illustrated a splendid panoramic view of a portion of the Fair Grounds. This is a late photograph and shows the grounds just as they are today. The reverse side of this folder presents a fine panoramic view of the present skyline of the city of Dallas. This is likewise a very recent photograph and glowingly depicts the wonderful growth which Dallas has attained in recent years.

In the back of the 1916 Premium List will be found a similar large folder presenting many of the amusements which are to be at the Fair this fall. The amusement program, as outlined by Secretary Stratton, is by far the largest and most expensive ever offered by the Fair management, and while both sides of this large folder have been utilized for the purpose, it has been found to be entirely impossible to present a large portion of the acts which have already been secured.

Mr. Stratton states that a sufficient number of Premium Lists have been published to take care of all demands, and that a copy will be mailed to any address upon receipt of request. 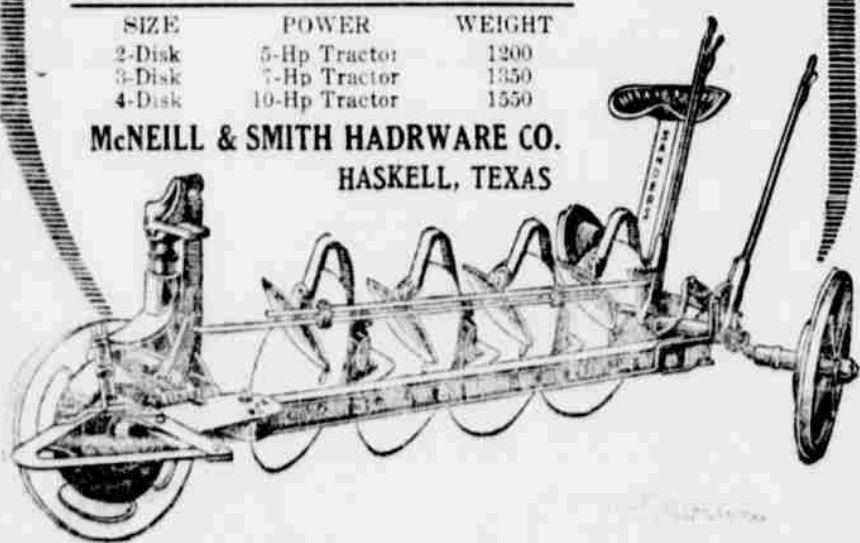

Mrs. Warner La Haskell

Mrs. Warner, State Chairman of Rural Work in Texas, gave a splendid lecture at the Public Library Saturday to a large crowd of Haskell women. She is known as "The Little Brown Wren" of the first District, and also as "The Lion." We found out both reasons. The first is that she is a very modest, plainly dressed little woman, and second, she is not only a powerful speaker holding her audience spell bound for one hour, but she does things for her county and state.

Her subject was the "Smith-Lever Bill." She explained that the Smith-Lever bill was a bill introduced by two men, Smith and Lever, for a government appropriation of a vast sum of money expended in sending teachers and demonstrators into each county to teach our people how best to dispose of their poultry, to form coming clubs, better eggs, how to exterminate the fly pest that causes the death of so many children each year. "If we do not kill the fly he will kill our children." 3,000,000 children die yearly in the United States of preventable diseases. The government spends \$40,000 to prevent these diseases. It is a noted fact that twenty times as much is spent in preventing and curing the diseases of boys. Why? Should we organize canning clubs in Texas? Because more than \$25,000,000 goes out of Texas every year to buy back in tin cans what could be produced in our own soil; enough to send 50,000 more Texas boys and girls to college each year.

All we have to do to meet the requirements of this bill is to appoint a meeting place and furnish conveyances to the place of meeting. If we meet the requirements our fund will double itself each year until 1923 when it will be one-half million dollars for Texas and will remain so.

Mrs. Warren in her great way then told just how much in dollars and cents our women on the farm are worth to the nation. She makes these reports and sends them to the Governor. She told of one woman who had been married 30 years and estimated that her work at a low estimate had amounted to \$61,000. She had in that time baked 35,000 loaves of bread, 10,000 cakes and 13,000 pies.

Let us get busy for Haskell and Haskell county.

COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS

Probably no man in public life in Texas today is better known or more enviable record than has Henry B. Terrell, who is now serving his term as State Comptroller. For fifteen years he served the people of Waco District in the House and Senate, resigning the office of State Comptroller of Public Accounts in January, 1915, to which he had been elected in the preceding election by an overwhelming majority carrying three times as many counties, both pro and anti, as his nearest competitor. He enjoys the distinction of never having been defeated for office nor was any vote he ever cast during his long legislative career questioned by an opponent on the stump.

His administration of the Comptroller's office, which is one of the important offices in the State, has been universally commended by the people of every political belief. His rigid enforcement of the liquor laws has the approval of every man who believes the law should be supreme. Refusing to persecute, he has prosecuted to the fullest extent each and every violator of the law and as a result of his prosecutions and activities there have been closed under his administration more saloons, illegitimate clubs, boot-legging joints combined than under the administration of all the Comptrollers for the same length of time.

He has known no creed or faction, but has given every man a full and a square deal. He has issued many public statements that it is unnecessary to employ attorneys to reach the Comptroller's office, but the doors were open to all who had business there and a letter would be the purpose of an attorney.

He is the first Comptroller to install an auditing system whereby all public officials, State departments and State institutions handling the people's money may be audited from time to time. This system has only been in effect a few months, though in this brief time more than \$100,000.00 has been recovered from officials and ex-officials which had been stolen or recovered from the State prior to his administration. He has referred to the General's Department and District Attorneys over the State for accounts amounting to more than \$100,000.00. Some of the money referred to has been due the State for fifteen years and in some instances have been out of office from five to ten years. Twenty-two indictments have been returned by various grand juries over the State as a result of his investigations. He has collected more than \$75,000.00 in interest on school taxes that was past due and had been past due from six months to three years when he entered the office.

By carefully scrutinizing accounts presented to the Department he has estimated that he is saving the tax-payers at least \$50,000.00 annually.

System and service has been the watchword under Mr. Terrell's administration, and his friends are proud of the record he has made. He has made the statement that if the next Legislature will give him the aid and such assistance as he needs, that he will recover to the people more than \$1,000,000.00 that has been withheld from the Treasury from twenty years.—(Political advertisement.)
