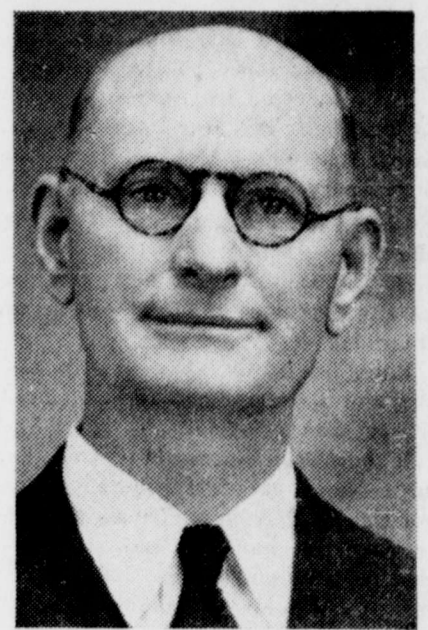

## Abernathy WAVE Officer Visits Pine Bluff, Ark., Recruiting Office



PINE BLUFF, Ark.—Pictured above, left to right, Yeoman Third Class Mamie Peterson, J. H. French, specialist first class, and Ensign Margaret Carver, as they were photographed at the naval recruiting station at the Chamber of Commerce building. The WAVES are attached to the Memphis, Tenn., office of Naval Officers Procurement, and for two days recently they enlisted Pine Bluff women in their organization, and in the SPARS. Also working with Mr. French, local recruiting officer, during the drive, were Lt. Frank Bridges, USN, and a staff of assistants, including a medical officer.

Yeoman Peterson is from Seattle, Wash., and received her training at Hunter college, N. Y., and her yeoman's training at Cedar Falls, Iowa. She has two brothers in the navy, a

lieutenant (jg), and a chief petty officer serving in the Canal Zone. She is not married and in private life was a legal stenographer.

Ensign Carver was sworn into the navy Dec. 7, 1942. She trained at Smith college. In private life she was a speech teacher and dean of girls in the high school at Abernathy, Tex. She has two brothers in the Army Air Corps and a cousin who is a captive of the Japanese on Bataan. At the declaration of war, and before her enlistment, Ensign Carver resigned from her job and became secretary to a major in the air corps. She is a graduate of Texas State Teachers college at Denton, receiving her B. A. degree in 1939.

Ensign Carver said any girl who joins the WAVES and SPARS can advance as rapidly as her own initiative and ability will permit. The age range for the organizations is 20 to

36 years. All enlisted women are sent to Hunter college for training, then receive specialists training at some other college before being stationed at a naval base.

Both the feminine visitors stated they were proud of their organization and pointed out that it offers many advantages for women who wish to serve their country. The WAVES were photographed in their working uniforms. Their dress uniforms for summer are white, with which they wear white pumps, white gloves and white hats.

July 4, 1943.

Dear Buford:  
I received the Review yesterday, and I suppose there is no need telling you I appreciate this courtesy a lot. Any person likes to be remembered, and news from home is always the best evidence of remembrance.

There are several boys here from Lubbock, Plainview and the surrounding area, so we'll try to give a good representation of that part of the Panhandle.

I will receive all of my basic training here. The basic training period ordinarily consists of 56 days, how-

ever, this is not compulsory, since many will be needed in his particular branch of the air corps before he completes his training. I was classified last week, and am the army medical corps. We are restricted to the post throughout the period of training, and we have very little time of our own.

### CHRISTMAS PACKAGES FOR SERVICEMEN

Christmas packages may be mailed to American soldiers overseas without a request from the soldier, from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15. The packages must be no more than 5 lbs. in

weight, 15 inches in length and 36 inches in length and girth combined. They should be marked "Christmas Gift Parcel." Only one such package will be accepted for mailing by or on behalf of the same person or concern to or for the same addressee in any one week.

### MILITARY SCHOLARSHIPS FOR BOYS 17 AND 18

Approximately 25,000 high school boys 17 and 18 years of age will be enrolled in an army specialized program and sent to school at selected colleges and universities. The reserve program will be limited to those volunteers who received qualifying scores on the pre-induction test administered last April 2, and to those who qualify in similar tests to be given in the future. The next test is scheduled for early November. Any local lad interested should contact the school superintendent shortly after school begins its 1943-44 term.

### EMERGENCY TIRES ON SALE

Unrepaired tires, branded with an "O" on the sidewall, may be sold to holders of Grade III rationing certificates now. Previously, sale of tires needing repairs was forbidden. These tires, which are unfit for recapping, but which still have some mileage in them, may be sold unrepaired or with temporary repairs such as reliners, boots and patches.

### CIVILIAN MEAT QUOTAS

More pork, lamb and mutton and less beef, will be available for civilian consumption during the 3-month period beginning July 1, the War Food Administration has announced. New quotas that commercial slaughterers may deliver for civilian consumption during the 3-month period beginning July 1, are: beef and veal, 65 percent; pork, 85 per cent., and lamb and mutton, 80 per cent. WFA officials said the changes in percentages are not expected to make any material change in the total quantity of meat available to civilians from commercial slaughtering.
