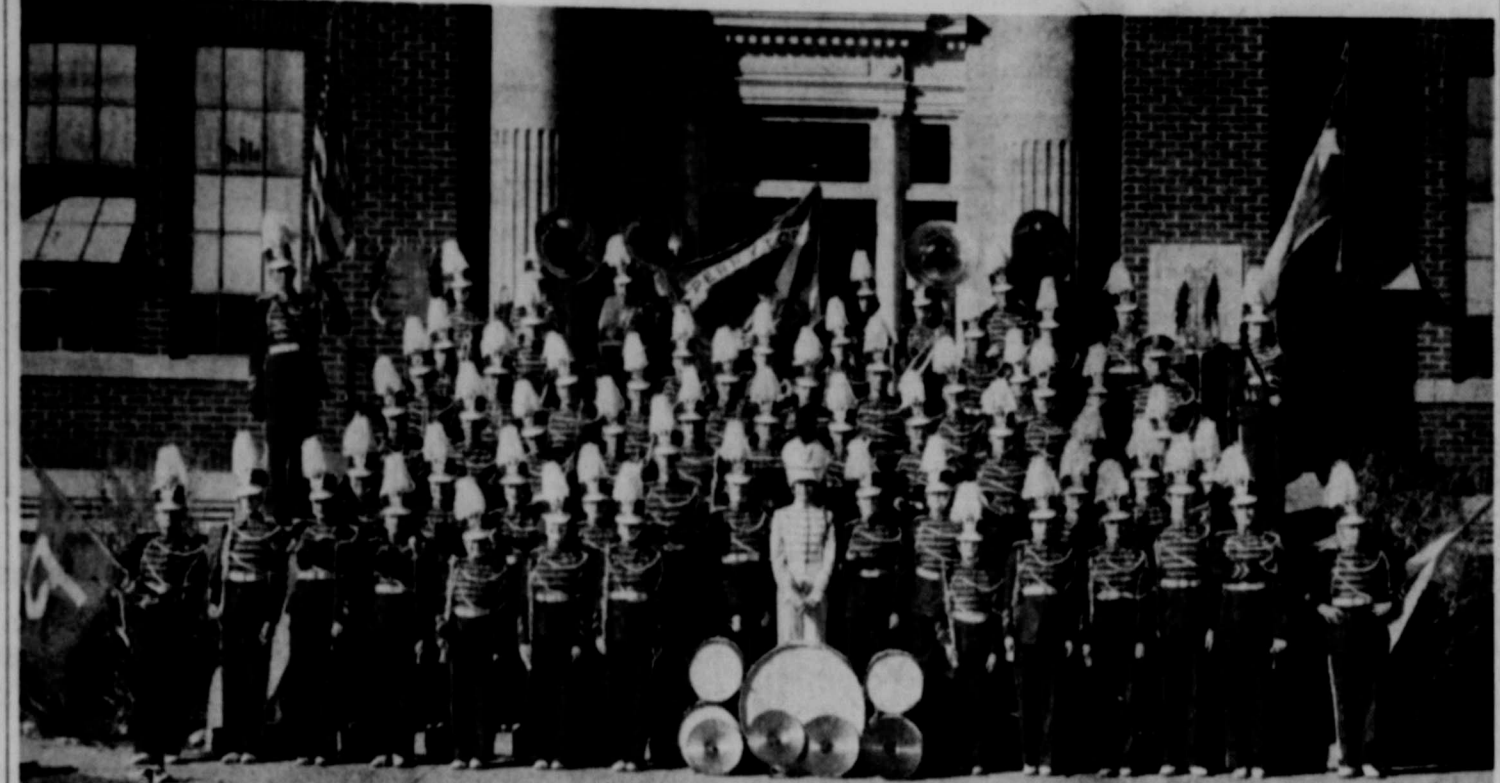

Ranger Band Makes 28 Appearances During School Year



The Perryton High School Ranger Band, composed of 49 members, pictured above, filled 28 engagements during the 1941-42 school term. Included in these public appearances were trips to Beaver, Amarillo, Spearman, Liberal, Canyon, Booker and Canadian. Glenn Truax, head of the music department of the Perryton school, states that the musical organizations, including the band, a cappella choir, girls' drum and bugle corps, junior high band, grade school band, the two girls' trios and the mixed quartet have performed at school, in the community and out of town a total of 124 engagements since school started last September. The Drum and Bugle Corps made a trip to Amarillo, Spearman, and Canyon, the choir to Canadian and Amarillo, the Girls' Trios to Spearman, Amarillo, Booker and Canadian. The total enrollment in the above musical organizations is 244 students. This number does not include the boys' choir directed by Miss Christyenne Helm. Number of appearances made by each organization is as follows: Ranger band, 28, a cappella choir, 18, drum and bugle corps 14, string choir 69 junior high school band 7, grade school band 3; senior trio, sophomore trio, brass sextette, drum quintet, mixed quartet and saxophone quartet 49.

Under auspices of the War Activities Committee of the Motion Picture Industry, all theatres in the country are becoming stamp agencies.

The drive will continue for the duration. It is hoped that the vast mass of moviegoers will become the nation's most active buyers of stamps, a veritable Moviegoers Victory Legion.

Three Weeks Term District Court Closes

W. D. Stewart Pleads Guilty in Car Theft Case; Set Two Years

The spring term of the Ochiltree county district court was closed last week by Judge Jack Allen. Judge Allen opened court at Canadian Monday.

The grand jury was called back last Thursday by Judge Allen and dismissed for the term. Three indictments were returned by the grand jury the first week of court. Judge Allen named J. R. Thomas, M. H. Crum and O. C. Rogers as Jury Commissioners to select the grand jury and three petit jury panels for the fall term of court. They made their report and were dismissed last Thursday.

W. D. Stewart, against whom the grand jury returned an indictment charging him with car theft, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to two years in the state prison.

War Victim Buried Sunday Afternoon

Perryton Area Office SCS To Be Closed

Three Regional and 79 Area SCS Offices to Be Eliminated

The Perryton area office of the Soil Conservation will be closed in the very near future, so George M. Parker, head of the local office announced. In a sweeping wartime reorganization program, three regional offices, including the Amarillo office, and 79 area offices will be abolished. The Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles will be under the jurisdiction of the Fort Worth regional office. No announcement has been made as to the disposition of the employees of the Perryton office.

Calling for greater use of soil-saving methods to increase the per-acre production of vital war crops, the U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced a reorganization of the Soil Conservation Service to give farmers and ranchers more help with war time land problems.

Through realignment of the agency, skilled technical employees now working in Washington, regional and other offices will be assigned to work directly with farmers.

Issue 4,004 War Ration Books One

The final tabulation on the registration for War Ration Book One showed that 4,004 books were issued in Ochiltree county. Total registration was 4,281. Of this number persons owned sugar in excess of pounds and did not receive ration books. Stamps for 1191 lbs. of sugar were removed from books issued.

Persons who did not register on 4-5-42 must wait two weeks before they can register. On and after Friday, May 22, persons who are not registered can register at county rationing office in the courthouse.

There were a number of organizations not registered in the trade registration on April 28-29. They can be registered today or at any time in the future at the county rationing office.

4-H and F.F.A. Calf Show Sat., May 23

Calves Exhibited Saturday and Sold On Tuesday Market

Plans for the annual 4-H and F. F. A. Calf Show and sale are practically completed. Date of show has been set for Saturday, May 23.

The calves will be tied in at the old Burrow Lumber Company yard by ten o'clock that morning and will be shown at 2 p. m. on the street just north of the First National Bank. At 4 o'clock the calves will be loaded, trucked to Liberal, Kansas, and then shipped to Kansas City to be sold on Tuesday's market.

The boys and their leaders will go to Kansas City on Sunday, returning Wednesday. Fourteen calves are expected to be shown and six other calves will be sold by the boys. Ray Bateman, local stockman and father of one of the boys, will put in enough additional cattle to make up the car load.

JUST HERE and THERE

Many motorists are making a serious mistake by not having their tires recapped while the tires are worth recapping. Of course this applies to persons who are eligible for recapped tires.

If you go ahead and wear your tires down to where they are not worth recapping, thinking you will get a certificate for new tires, in most cases you're going to be disappointed. With fewer and fewer new tires available every day and with decreased quotas, only a small per centage of those eligible for new tires will be able to obtain them.

When the Ochiltree County Rationing Board closed their books on the last day of April, they carried over a backlog of more than twice as many applications as there are new tires in the May quota.

So this all adds up to this . . . if you are eligible for either new or recapped tires and have a good carcass, then make application for a recapping certificate and count yourself lucky. Don't kid yourself about the rubber situation! It is critical! If you think differently, you are merely wishing and mis-planning.

Gasoline rationing is now a fact in the Eastern states. We can expect it to go nationwide after the trial period in the East is ended July 1. Gas shortage is temporary but tire shortage is permanent for the duration. One main purpose of gas rationing is to save tires and enforce the stretch-out of tire supply until 1944-45.

The drive for Ochiltree county's USO quota got underway Tuesday with the goal set at \$750. Solicitors have been appointed and quotas set for every voting precinct in the county. May we suggest that raising this quota is everybody's business.

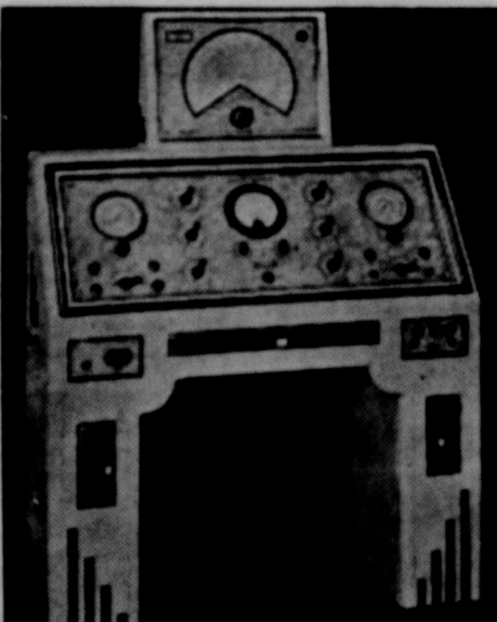

COLLEGE STATION, May 14—Basic loan rate for this year's wheat crop in Texas is \$1.34 per bushel but individual prices will vary according to locations.

The loan program, with rates based upon returns equivalent to 85 per cent of parity, became effective when wheat farmers approved marketing quotas in national referendum May 2. Unofficial vote indicated Texas wheat farmers approved quotas by approximately 89 per cent while national approval is expected to average about 82 per cent.

Wool Is Precious Care for It

Two or three times this nation's domestic production of wool will be necessary to meet military needs in 1943. With the manufacture of woolen blankets prohibited and a similar order for clothing expected shortly, homemakers should take the best possible care of these articles.

Louise Bryant, Extension Service specialist in home management, offers these suggestions for making woollens last longer:

Collect all winter clothing, blankets, and woolen accessories which will not be used again until next fall. Inspect the garments carefully for soil and grease spots. If they are spotted or dingy, send them to the cleaner. Dry cleaning or washing in a correct solution of neutral soap kills all forms of moths.

Articles not soiled enough to warrant cleaning or laundering should be hung out to air on a sunny, breezy day and given a thorough brushing.

Give each garment as much chance as possible to keep its shape. If articles are packed in chests or trunks, place the heaviest things at the bottom and the lighter things on top. Fold everything lightly sprinkling flake naphthalene or paradichlorobenzene between each fold.

There are dust-proof bags on the market made of heavy paper treated with a moth preventive. These will hold several garments and will allow the garments to hang in natural lines. Stuffing the sleeves and body of the garment with wads of tissue paper will help keep it free of wrinkles. Do the same with folded garments.

Announce Three Loan Programs

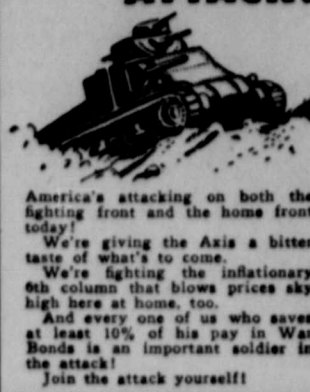
COLLEGE STATION, May 14—Texas grain sorghum, rye and barley growers will have a loan program again this year.

Loan rate for farm-stored rye grading No. 2 or better will be 60 cents per bushel at all locations. Barley loan rates, on farm-storage basis, will be 55 cents per bushel for No. 1, 54 cents for No. 2, 52 cents for No. 3, 49 cents for No. 4 and 45 cents for No. 5. Rates on grain sorghum, on same type storage, will be 55, 53, 50 and 45 cents per bushel respectively. Mixed barley and grain sorghum rates will be 2 cents per bushel less.

If grain is stored in warehouses, storage charges must be paid in advance, otherwise a deduction of 7 cents per bushel will be made from the loan rate, P. C. Colgin, state AAA commodity loan specialist, announced.

ers, local groups and other agencies in solving production and conservation problems. To do this, the Department said it would be necessary to close 82 field offices of the Soil Conservation Service, including three major regional headquarters. The staffs of the remaining regional offices and the Washington office will be reduced considerably.

Net result of the reorganization, the Department said, would be to promote more efficient use of land resources in the Food for Freedom program.

Commenting on the need for providing greater technical help with land-use problems, Dr. H. H. Bennett, Chief of the Soil Conservation Service, declared that during the last World War the productive capacity of millions of acres was unnecessarily reduced or lost outright through unwise cultivation. "Fortunately," he added, "practical soil conservation measures have been developed which will not only help prevent a repetition of such damage, but almost invariably lead to increased yields per acre—and now is the time to put this knowledge to work."

In cutting down the number of Soil Conservation regional offices, Kentucky and Tennessee, formerly part of the Ohio Valley Region with headquarters at Dayton, Ohio, are added to the Southeast Region, which includes Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama and Mississippi. Headquarters for the enlarged Southeast Region will remain at Spartanburg, South Carolina. Ohio, Indiana, and Michigan, also part of the Ohio Valley Region, are attached to the Upper Mississippi Valley Region of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, Illinois and Missouri. Headquarters for the region remain at Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The regional office at Dayton, Ohio, will be closed.

Kansas, formerly included in the Southern Plains Region, with headquarters at Amarillo, Texas, is made part of the Northern Plains Region, composed of Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota, Montana and Wyoming, with headquarters at Lincoln, Nebraska. The eastern portions of Colorado and New Mexico, also formerly included in the Southern Plains Region, are made part of the Southwest Region, with headquarters remaining at Albuquerque, New Mexico. The balance of the Southern Plains Region, the Panhandle areas of Oklahoma and Texas, are made part of the Western Gulf Region, with headquarters at Fort Worth, Texas. The regional office at Amarillo, Texas, will be discontinued.

The Pacific Southwest Region, including California and Nevada, is combined with the Pacific Northwest Region of Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. Regional offices located at Spokane, Washington, and Berkeley, California, are being closed and a new headquarters for the combined regions will be established at Portland, Oregon.

In addition to the elimination of three regional offices, 79 area offices throughout the country are discontinued. Soil Conservation activities formerly supervised by one or more area offices in a State will be handled from a single State office.

Killed in Crash

Sgt. R. T. Correll Jr. received injuries in the crash of a bomber at McChord Field, Tacoma, Wash. 3 p. m. Sunday, May 3. He lived until 3:03 the following morning, passing away in the Fort Lewis hospital. Before going, he was able to pass on to his superior officers the cause of the crash. This information is a military secret. Sgt. Correll's three companions on the flight were killed instantly.

R. T., as he has been called for years, enlisted in the Air Corps on Oct. 26, 1941. After receiving his preliminary training at Brooks Field, San Antonio, Texas, he was sent to the advanced school at Chanute Field, Rantoul, Ill., where he graduated and received a diploma in aeronautical engineering. In October of 1941, he was transferred to Boise, Idaho, where he was promoted to a Sergeant. He had been at McChord Field for several months.

Born at Ochiltree

R. T. was born at Ochiltree January 13, 1917 and had resided in this community until enlisting in the army. His parents, Judge and Mrs. R. T. Correll, are pioneer and

respected citizens of this county and of Perryton.

He attended the Perryton schools, graduating in 1936. After graduation he operated his father's ranch in the southwest part of the county. As a boy he was very active in Boy Scouts and gave much time to the work after he passed Scout age.

He had ever been keenly interested in motor mechanics and this knowledge and skill gained for him rapid advancement in the Air Corps. He was a pilot and owned his personal plane for many years before entering military service. R. T. was also an amateur radioman and for many years operated a broadcasting station here.

He was married May 21, 1941 to Miss Irene Juliusson, who was with him at McChord Field. Surviving are the widow, his parents; a sister, Miss Virginia Correll, Roswell, N. M.; a brother, Archie Edmund; and a host of relatives and friends.
