Judging Team Eighth In State

Robert Lee High School's livestock judging team has brought home a lot of honors in the past several days not the least of which was taking eighth place in the entire State of Texas.

The team is made up of James Hood, Waldon Millican and James Wright. They attended a state contest at College Station last weekend and judged their way to eighth place in the entire state. Competition was stiff and was made up of the top 91 teams in the state. The team is coached by Lee Roy McDaniel, vocational agriculture teacher and FFA advisor.

In order to go to the state contest the lads had to do well in a preliminary contest held earlier at Texas Tech in Lubbock. And they did well. They tied with Spur for first place honors at Lubbock, which hosted 134 teams in West Texas.

In the Lubbock contest, Spur and Robert Lee came out with the same number of points. To

break the tie, they next counted the points of the high individual, and again the two teams were tied. Next place to go was the cattle grading contest, and that's where the Robert Lee boys lost out—by one point. Spur had 701 points to Robert Lee's 700.

But inspite of the technicalities they won second place and a right to go to the state contest at Texas A&M.

Individual honors were received in both contests. At Lubbock Hood tied for fifth place and Millican was 15th among the 402 boys who entered. At College Station Millican was 10th high boy in the state and Hood was only three points behind him.

The win at A&M placed the Robert Lee team in the top ten per cent in the nine areas of Texas.

Coke County voters turned out at less than half strength in last Saturday's Democratic Primary. A total of 726 of the 1630 eligible voters went to the polls.

Big upset for this county, as well as the state, was Lloyd

Bentsen's victory over Ralph Yarborough for nomination to the post of U. S. Senator from Texas. Bentsen received 378 votes while Yarborough got 303.

Voting was heavier in the east end of the county than the west

side as two contested races were on the ballot. Both races ended up in a close battle.

Jesse Parker defeated Bobby Vaughn for commissioner in precinct 2 by a vote of 193 to 152. They were running for the spot now held by Howard Brock.

Incumbent Justice of the Peace Earl D. "Pete" Nutter was narrowly defeated by Cecil Kemp for JP in precinct 2. Vote was 235 for Kemp and 215 for Nutter.

All other local positions found the incumbents unopposed for reelection.

Saturday Night Rodeo to Feature Buffalo Contests

A homecoming rodeo for Hackberry Johnson will be held Saturday night at the Coke County Roping arena in Bronte. The action will begin at 8 p.m. Everybody in West Texas has an invitation to attend the rodeo.

One of the featured events will be a buffalo riding contest. Also a trained monkey will be featured in the show.

Other contests will include rabbit roping, steer roping, junior steer riding, free jack rabbit scramble (for 8-12 year olds), open girls barrel race, tie down calf roping (for 18 years old and under), and an old man's steer roping contest (for those 64 and over).

A parade at 6 p.m. will precede the rodeo and everyone is invited to participate in it.

Anyone who wants to enter any of the contests has until 6 p.m. Saturday. Prospective contestants should contact J. L. Ennor at 473-4981 in Bronte. The rodeo will be sponsored by the Coke County Roping Club. Admission prices will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for school children.

BCD - Lions Banquet Set For Friday Night At 6:30

Final plans were discussed at Tuesday's BCD meeting for the joint BCD-Robert Lee-Silver Lions Club ladies night banquet which will be held Friday night. The affair will be held in the school lunchroom beginning at 6:30 p.m.

The banquet will be the first of its kind held in Robert Lee, and advance ticket sales indicated a good crowd would be present. The Rev. Don Timberlake, pastor of Oak Street Baptist Church in Colorado City, will be the speaker of the evening. A well known after dinner speaker in this area, the Rev. Mr. Timberlake is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He spent 18 months in the special services department

of the Army as an entertainer.

Jack Denman is program chairman and other entertainment will be provided. The meal will be prepared and served by women who are employed in the school lunchroom.

A large number of BCD members and Lions and their ladies are expected to be on hand Friday night for the banquet.

4-H's to Canvass For Dimes March

Robert Lee 4-H's will make a house to house canvass of the entire town Thursday, May 7, beginning at 7 p.m., for the benefit of the March of Dimes. The MOD drive is usually conducted in January but due to the lack of a sponsoring group, no drive has been made in Robert Lee. The Future Leaders 4-H Club of Robert Lee will be assisted by 4-H's in the fifth and sixth grades in the drive.

Money given to the March of Dimes is tax deductible. A portion of the money collected will be used in Coke County to help persons who qualify. The remainder is used for research on a national and state basis. Since the polio vaccine and its success, much of the money will be used in birth defects research.

4-H's will be assisted by adult leaders and County Extension Agents Mrs. Fay C. Roe and Sterling Lindsey in making the Thursday evening drive.

Any person missed during the drive may send contributions to Mrs. Roe at Box 14, Robert Lee.

Vaccination for Rabies Set May 12

The Coke County 4-H Clubs will sponsor a rabies vaccination program next Tuesday, May 12.

A veterinarian will be present to vaccinate pets for anyone who wants to have his dog or cat immunized against rabies.

The veterinarian, Dr. J. B. Joy of San Angelo, will be at the Robert Lee showbarn in the park from 8:30 to 10 a.m. He will then go to Bronte and work from 10:30 to 12 noon.

If you have not had your dog or cat vaccinated to prevent rabies, now would be a good time to have it done, the 4-H's said.

Austin — State Board of Mental Health-Mental Retardation accepted the resignation of State MH-MR Commissioner John Kinross-Wright and appointed a committee to look for a new commissioner.

Committee consists of MH-MR Chairman Ward Burke of Lufkin; Dr. Charles H. Brown, a Wichita Falls psychiatrist; Dr. Robert S. Tate Jr., pastor of the First Methodist Church of Austin, and Edwin R. Van Zandt, Beaumont newspaper executive.

First three appointees were among the six board members who had requested Kinross-Wright's resignation. Van Zandt was one of three board members who wanted the commissioner to

continue heading the massive (27,000 patients, 13,000 employees) state MH-MR care and treatment system.

Finding a new commissioner will not be an easy task. When the old Texas Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools was converted into the Board for Mental Health-Mental Retardation in 1963—and the new law charged that a commissioner should dictate everything but basic policy—it took many months to find a commissioner. Law also says the commissioner must be a physician.

Finally, Dr. Shervert Frazier of Baylor Medical College was persuaded to take the job on a part-time basis. That didn't work

out well for Frazier, or the system, and Kinross-Wright was lured from the Texas Research Institute for Mental Sciences in Houston three years ago.

His tenure was ridden with strife, as a segment of board members lead by Dr. Tate charged that the commissioner neglected the community mental health center program. Controversy flared into a firing when Kinross-Wright asked for the resignation of Deputy MH Commissioner Dr. Gary Miller, and Kinross-Wright ultimately bowed out.

Miller literally was waiting in the wings this week (having refused to accept his firing) as a hopeful for the vacancy. Gov. Preston Smith's comprehensive health planning director, Dr. David Wade of Austin, a psychiatrist who formerly headed the Texas Medical Association, was being mentioned as a possibility. But Wade insists he is committed to his present health planning pursuit. Whatever the committee does will be subject to criticism by some segments of state mental health and state mental retardation organizations.

AG OPINIONS — Attorney General Crawford Martin ruled that Hidalgo County voters who signed a petition to nominate Raza Unida Party candidates for county and precinct offices signed a valid document, but could invalidate it if they participated in any other party primary. So, the candidates may not have a clear path until the primary lists are checked against the petition signatures.

Martin also held that:

* An independent school district may deduct union dues from the wages of its custodial and maintenance employees with their authorization.

* New Texas Commission for Rehabilitation is the legal successor to all functions of the Texas Education Agency's divisions of vocational rehabilitation and vocational determination.

* In Harris County, probate instruments must be filed under the direction of the county clerk.

* Funds subject to escheat and held in trust by a district or county clerk are subject to being reported to the state as abandoned personal property.

PARKS & WILDLIFE — State Director of Wildlife Services E. A. Walker informed the Parks & Wildlife Commission that LBJ State Park will be completed by June 15. Only the National Park Service's exhibits and amphitheater in the state park remain to be completed. Walker said the federal service is making exhibits and taping former Pres. and Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson for "accents" for exhibits.

Commission approved construction of a \$3-million Corpus Christi water exchange pass across Mustang Island, and estimated that construction will begin in August.

"TALKING LICENSE" — Texas Public Safety Commission is considering possible future use of a "talking driver's license." Project is under development by DEK Processes Division, the firm that makes pictorial licenses for the state.

Proposed "talking" license would resemble a credit card, and provide DPS officers with an instantaneous method of checking on drivers. Card would have a magnetic number on the back (in computer code) which could be fed to a computer center over police radio.

Computer would send a print back to the apprehending officer within 30 seconds, indicating whether a person is wanted, the number of previous traffic violations, and so forth.

NATURAL FIBER STUDY — Chairman Charles Scruggs of the Interim Committee on Natu-

ral Fibers appointed subcommittees to assault the problems of the state's natural fiber industry. "Our goal is to add a billion dollars to Texas' farm income in five years," Scruggs said. "That's why we don't just want to write a report. We hope this will be an action committee."

Scruggs named the following to the subcommittee on cotton, wool and mohair export development: Rep. Hilary Doran of Del Rio, Sen. Wayne Connally of Floresville, Hillsboro Cotton Farmer Dan Pustejovsky and Natural Wool Growers Pres. James Powell of Fort McKavett.

Other subcommittees were named to study textile industry development and producing and marketing systems development.

JUDGES' VIEWS ON MARIJUANA SOUGHT — While other politicians and state officials argue about what penalties should be applied to persons possessing

marijuana, Governor Smith decided to ask the men who mete out the punishment.

So, he had Harold K. Dudley, director of the Governor's State Program on Narcotics and Drug Abuse, send a six-part questionnaire to every district judge in Texas. Query asks if the penalty for possession should remain a felony or be changed to a misdemeanor. And—if a change is advocated—should it be changed on the first offense, or the second or subsequent offenses.

Dr. E. S. Cox, U.S.D.A. Animal Health Division Regional Director, announced the lifting of federal hog cholera quarantines from Bosque-McLennan, Falls, Lavaca and Lee counties.

Texas Association of Sigma Delta Chi, the professional journalism society, named Rep. Russell Cummings of Houston "Friend of Journalism for 1969" in recognition of his sponsorship of the 1969 Open Meetings Law.

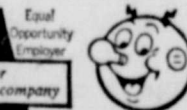

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

The Coke County 4-H Club still evaluation team that placed first in the state contest last year, participated in the National Land Judging Contest in Oklahoma City on April 30.

Team members making the trip were Lane Beaty, A. J. Roe III, Marshall Millican and Edwin Lindsey. Mak Matlock was a member of the team, but was unable to participate in the contest last week.

The 4-H division of the contest contained 33 teams from 26 states. The Coke County team members made a good effort, but were not among the winners when the scores were tallied. Each contestant judged four sites, one of which put us out of the running.

The many fields of waving grain were very noticeable on the trip to Oklahoma. If favorable conditions continue through to maturity, the wheat crop should be a bumper one this year. The ground was wet and the crops looked good late last week.

The Rural Electric Cooperatives of this area honored a group of 4-H Club leaders in Abilene last Tuesday night. We were pleased to have among the group Roy Tinkler, to be recognized for his contributions to youth work in Coke County. Roy as an individual and through the Coke County Stock Show Association and County Program Building Committee, has helped with numerous functions and events. We were pleased that his efforts were given recognition. He has contributed generously to the youth work in Coke County.

A system that amounts to a complete turn-about in grazing management is being tested by Texas A&M University researchers.

There is promise that the project will point the way to range-land production five to six times higher than it is now. The idea is not new, but is being given serious study for use on range lands.

The new technique appears at first to go along with the biggest taboo of all—overgrazing of native pastures. Large numbers of livestock are deliberately allowed to graze forage close to the ground.

"But before anyone gets upset, let me say right quick that the stock is not kept on the pasture any longer than it takes to get most of the forage," says Dr. C. L. Leinweber, head of the A&M Range Science Department. "When the best grazing is gone, the animals are moved to another pasture in a multi-pasture system, and they don't return until about five months later."

The project is called the high-intensity-low frequency grazing system.

No matter what the title, the new system has produced some startling grazing figures. At the A&M Agricultural Research Station near Sonora, small scale HILF work has been underway for 22 years under the guidance of Dr. Leo Merrill. Proper grazing under ordinary conditions is considered to be about 32 animal units per section of land at this location. But with the new method, researchers have grazed 110 animal units per section with improvement in range conditions.

An animal unit is a cow and calf or five mature sheep or seven goats.

HILF is for native ranges and would have to be modified for use on tame pastures. The system should have wide application throughout Texas.

A more extensive program on larger pastures is already underway at the Sonora station. This is in addition to current work near Barnhart farther west and proposed work at Throckmorton in North Central Texas.

"We feel that HILF is a logical system. Ranchers in Rhodesia in Africa have been using it successfully for a number of years, and A&M people have gone there to study its operation," Leinweber explained.

Length of time animals are allowed to stay on one pasture in a HILF system is determined by forage availability. The period is usually two to four weeks. By the time the stock is rotated through the other pastures, the first pasture will have rested four and a half to five months.

Animal performance so far has been good. What HILF can mean is calf production per acre about three times higher than with continuous grazing and increased income due to lower per animal unit overhead cost.

In conjunction with the project, A&M animal scientists are working on twinning traits and other calf production techniques which are expected to boost cow-calf ratios and increase efficiency of each mother cow.

"With these methods and HILF, we can think in terms of five to six times the current production on Texas rangeland," the scientist said.

Summing up, the following advantages of high intensity-low frequency grazing were listed:

1. Concentration of animals into one or two herds, with resulting saving in labor, death loss reduction, and better breeding efficiency.
2. More harvestable forage is produced per acre due to range improvement.
3. Lower overhead costs per animal unit.

4. Fewer internal parasite troubles.

5. Possibility of hiking pounds of animal product per acre as much as three times current figures.

6. Brush control efforts should be helped because pastures will receive longer rest periods for better grass re-growth.

Disadvantages include:

1. HILF might require re-fencing and more stock water develop-

ment.

2. More stock handling facilities may be necessary.

3. Animals would probably be obliged to graze mature forage, which could require special management.

Washington — The Administration's postal reform recommendations have taken on a complexion of a different hue under a "compromise." When submitted several months ago, the President's plan called for a reorganization of the department along corporate lines. It provided for a non-profit corporation some-

what comparable to the TVA and the Communication Satellite operation to run mail services with certain limited authority reserved to the Federal government.

Since our mail service is not what it should be, coupled with the fact that deficits in the operation of the postal services continue to climb, there has been great appeal for this idea.

This approach to make the Post Office Department mostly independent from direct Federal control was opposed by the postal unions of which there are seven.

At the time of the strike of postal employees in New York City and in a few other large offices, Postmaster General Blount and George Meany, head of the AFL-CIO, worked out a

compromise. The first part of the agreement was for the Congress to vote a postal pay increase, which it immediately passed and the President signed.

The remaining part of the agreement will be before the Congress in the near future. As introduced, it is H. R. 17070.

The idea of the postal corporation has been abandoned. In its place the Department would become the U. S. Postal Service with "independent status" somewhat like the Federal Reserve and NASA but still a part of the Federal government.

The proposal authorizes the unions and the Postal Service to negotiate compulsory "union shop" contracts for all employees. Postal workers would come under the National Labor Relations Board as do unions in the private sector. It would take away an employee's choice of belonging or not belonging to the union. The unions would not be under the so-called Landrum-Griffin Act, which requires reporting and accounting of funds by union officials.

Following the agreed recommendations between the Postmaster General and Mr. Meany, the AFL-CIO head indicated his pleasure with such an arrangement by saying that he expected the provisions of H. R. 17070 to give the same kind of power to postal employee unions that is now allowed in the private sector. He said the provisions would soon be extended to all Federal employee unions as well as at the state, county and city level.

Should compulsory unionism become the law, no employee could exercise his right to freedom of choice nor would he have any say as to what was done with his union dues. Obviously, a Federal edict of this kind would override a state's Right-to-Work Law and would cancel binding arbitration of disputes.

There is no question but that changes are needed in our postal operation. From the beginning, the postal service was never intended to be a profit making enterprise or for that matter a break-even proposition. Neither was it ever envisioned to be an agent of those using its services for profit. It was supposed to serve the people as a public necessity and convenience. Postal rates are set at a level to partially pay for services rendered but not intended to subsidize commercial users.

Under the proposal, considerable latitude would be given to the new organization but it appears that the "independence" referred to is hardly achieved. It gives certain veto rights to the Congress but there is no doubt that mailing rates will be increased and that employees will have their freedom of choice impaired. Under present law it is illegal to strike against the Federal Government. Assuming that the non-strike provision can be enforced (it was not in the recent strike) present law may be better than to remove the provision entirely.

Amendments to the proposed bill could make reorganization of the Post Office Department highly desirable.
