MAN WANTED IN 3 STATES

Police Nab Suspect in Mail Theft Near T&P

Police may have nabbed a 63-year-old ex-convict here Thursday evening just before an attempt to burglarize mail sacks at Colorado City's T&P Station.

The gray-haired man, whose path has led him in and out of prison since 1918, is a suspect in a series of mail bag thefts across the country.

And when police took him into custody at 8:34 p. m. Thursday—he was across the street from T&P Station and his car was parked on the station lot.

Federal officers identified him as William H. Cox, wanted in Los Angeles, Calif., on federal indictment; wanted in Las Vegas, Nev., on two counts of jumping bond and for forgery. They filed charges in Abilene Friday against him for allegedly theft of a mail bag in Cisco Aug. 6.

The suspect, whose only comment here in Colorado City before being transferred to Abilene was a compliment for the nice "treatment" at hands of local officers, said he wasn't Cox and not the man officers were hunting.

But postal authorities have been trailing the ex-con for a long time and had traced him to this West Texas area.

Infact, he had been in this area for several weeks and, more recently, fishing at Lake Colorado City.

Local Police—long a nemesis for some of the nation's most wanted criminals—nabbed the mail theft suspect just 12 hours after they had received a "Wanted" bulletin and picture Thursday morning.

Police Chief Leon Yeager spotted the man on the sidewalk at the corner of Walnut and W. First St.

Quickly, without incident, the chief and Policeman Bill Henderson and Postal Inspector Robert H. Chapin of Midland made the arrest.

"What's your name, mister?" Yeager inquired as he approached the suspect after walking by for a good look to check identifying points.

The man replied with an assumed name.

"Your under arrest, William Cox," the chief countered.

Although he denied the name of Cox, the man's billfold contained a card with that name and the man's left index finger was amputated at the joint, the same as the Cox.

In the man's car, a 1963 green Valiant for which postal authorities had been alerted, was a crowd bar.

Bond on the federal charge of mail theft filed in Abilene Friday was set at \$10,000 by U. S. Commissioner Wallis. Earlier in the day a \$1,500 bond has been set on the Los Angeles indictment.

The Abilene charge, involving a mail theft at Cisco, alleges that Cox took a sack of mail on the Fort Worth & El Paso No. 27 (mail run) and the sack contained a letter from Breckenridge Lumber Company addressed to Thurman Head of 2025 Jameson St. Abilene.

Postal authorities said the suspect had recently been in company of Midland residents at Lake Colorado City.

Governor Names McCloud To Succeed Judge Mahon

Appointment In Effect Sept. 15

Austin O. McCloud, 34-year-old Colorado City attorney, will succeed Judge Eldon Mahon as judge of 32nd District Court for Mitchell, Nolan and Fisher counties.

Governor John Connally announced the appointment of McCloud Saturday morning in Austin.

The appointment is for Sept. 15, the day Mahon's resignation becomes effective.

Mahon—who has served Mitchell County and the 32nd District in succeeding tenures as county attorney, district attorney and district judge—is resigning to accept a position in the executive department of Texas Electric Service Company in Ft. Worth.

Official notification of his resignation to the governor was contained in a telegram to Austin Saturday. However, the impending resignation had been known for weeks and had been discussed with Governor Connally earlier.

Studious Approach To Law

"A wonderful... wonderful opportunity."

That's the way Austin O. McCloud sized up his appointment Saturday to judgeship of 32nd District Court.

The young lawyer, father of two girls, figures the judgeship is "break" that he shall not minimize.

His friends in the law profession figure just as strongly, that he was the logical choice for the position.

"He is capable and studious," one explained, "the kind of a lawyer who will develop into a fine judge."

District judgeships don't come often to young attorneys. But McCloud has been accomplishing the extra even as far back as high school when he hustled into the starting line-up as a pint-sized guard on a hefty state rated Lubbock High football team.

After being graduated from Lubbock High, he earned a business administration degree from Texas Tech, then his law degree—cum laude—from Baylor University.

While in Baylor he was awarded the Allen G. Flowers Memorial Scholarship and the Vernon Law Book Award for Legal Writing. He served as comments editor of Baylor Law Review, editor-in-chief of Baylor Law School grievance committee and was honored with membership in Who's Who in American Universities & Colleges as well as

McCloud, on whose behalf more than 200 telegrams poured into the governor's office, was named by the governor over District Attorney Weldon Kirk of Sweetwater.

Both McCloud and Kirk were called to Austin Friday for separate conferences with the governor.

McCloud, accompanied by his brother-in-law James Kelley, had returned to Colorado City Friday and was in his office Saturday morning when notified by the Colorado City Record of his appointment.

Later, Governor Connally's telegram arrived, stating: "I am today announcing your appointment as judge of the 32nd Judicial District. I am confident you will serve well in this capacity."

THE JUDGESHIP will be the first public office for McCloud, who came to Colorado City in 1959 to enter into a law partnership with Harry Ratliff as the firm of Ratliff & McCloud.

As the public service career for McCloud will be starting September 15 will bring to a close a long and respected public service by Mahon.

The resigning judge, one of Colorado City's foremost civic and church leaders, has served as 32nd District Judge since Jan. 1, 1961, when Judge A. S. Mauley resigned from the bench.

Before becoming judge, Mahon was district attorney for 13 years and, earlier, was county attorney for Mitchell County.

"IT HAS BEEN a very special high honor and privilege for me to serve this district as judge and district attorney," Mahon said Saturday after he submitted his official resignation to the governor.

"The people of this county and district have been wonderful to me and my family," he continued, "and, for this, we always will be grateful."

"And never will there be a place more dear to us than this home area."

Colorado City's Bonus Bucks auction is scheduled Thursday evening with more than \$750 in merchandise to be carried home free by local shoppers.

The auction will climax the special Bonus Bucks promotion staged by 52 local firms under sponsorship of Colorado City Chamber of Commerce.

All 52 participating firms have been handing out the Bonus Bucks free to shoppers since last July 15.

And now, at the auction Thursday night these Bonus Bucks can be used for money to bid for and buy the array of merchandise ranging from home items to fishing equipment, electric tools to house paint.

The auction will be in the paved parking area of City National Bank, beginning promptly at 7 p. m. Sale will not end until all items are gone.

2 Plead Guilty To Bootlegging

Two defendants pleaded guilty in County Court this week to bootlegging charges and one—believe it or not—asked for jail time.

He was sentenced to 90 days in jail when he said he preferred jail time to heavier fine.

Aubrey Krop, whose case has been on the docket for more than a year, was found not guilty in a jury trial this week.

He was charged August 12, 1962, with driving while intoxicated on Interstate 20 west of Colorado City.

IN ACCIDENT AT HOME

Father's Pistol Wounds Son, 10

A pistol in the hands of a father accidentally discharged Saturday, seriously wounding the man's stepson in the arm.

James Edward Tryon, 10, was shot in the right elbow by a .22-caliber bullet at about 8 a. m.

"When I saw what happened, I couldn't do nothing but just hurt me," said the father, Ezell Birming-

ham, as he wiped tears from his eyes.

The accident happened in the home in the city's northwest area at Mulberry and McKinney.

Doctors at Root Memorial Hospital said the bullet passed through the boy's arm, chipping the elbow bone.

Ezell and his family told police the gun fired unexpectedly while the father was inserting a clip of bul-

lets into the small automatic pistol.

The gun's mechanism had become faulty in the process, Ezell said, and a bullet in the firing chamber apparently discharged as he attempted to correct the mechanism.

The injured boy is one of eight children in the Ezell home—four boys and four girls.

NO INCREASE AHEAD

County Retains Same Tax Rate

Mitchell County Commissioners Court has set the county tax rate at the same level for 1964.

That means you'll be paying the usual \$1.05 per \$100 valuation, plus the usual 30-cent road tax.

This is the same rate county tax-payers have been paying for years.

The \$1.05 tax will be divided this year as follows: 15 cents for road and bridge, 18 cents for road and bridge special, 45 cents general fund, 17 cents permanent improvements, 10 cents sinking fund.

For 1964 the jury fund is being eliminated and the usual 5 cents reserved for jury is being divided between two other funds—2 cents to permanent improvements and 3 cents to road and bridge.

This switch is allowed for one year at a time when jury fund money is carried over to sufficient amount to meet those expenses during the incoming year.

The extra amount placed in permanent improvements will speed the Courthouse remodeling program without necessitating any tax rate hike.
