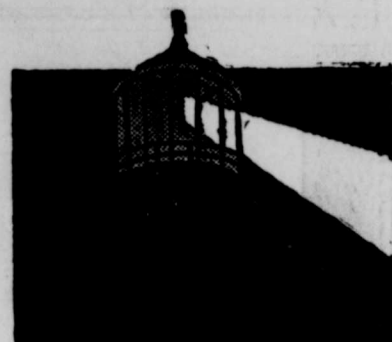

Skip-row farming, especially with cotton, has become a practice that just about every farmer follows. They have found that leaving a blank space between two rows of cotton actually increases the yield of cotton on the same number of planted acres. Now the Secretary of Agriculture wants to discontinue the skip-row practice. Naturally cotton farmers everywhere are much disturbed about the prospects.

The cotton industry is sick. Spinners prefer to use synthetic products because of its stronger being used so our surplus continues to pile up and that depresses the price.

Most of us will agree that the number of bales of cotton raised needs to be cut down but the method of cutting down on production pinches right where it hurts badly, in the pocketbook. The problem will be solved in the end by the farmers themselves.

It was heartening last week when a number of people went to the Little League baseball park and worked to clean it up to have it ready for the season which opens soon. There will be recreation for the kids and enjoyment for the grownups this summer. This reminds us again that when we put our mind and heart into something we get things done.

Scholarships Awarded To LHS Graduates

Loraine High School has been notified by Claude Hicks, Director of Student Aid Placement, Hardin Simmons University, Abilene, that Byron Mote, 1965 graduating senior and the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Mote, Loraine, will receive the honor scholarship due to his being in the upper 10% of the graduating class.

This scholarship is valued at \$100.00 per semester for the first two semesters. He is eligible to receive \$100.00 per semester for his sophomore year subject to fulfillment of academic requirements during his freshman year.

All state-supported colleges and universities offer a scholarship to the honor graduate (valedictorian) of each fully accredited high school of the state. The names of those eligible for the scholarship will be furnished by the Texas Education Agency. Each valedictorian is entitled to an exemption from payment of tuition during both semesters of the first regular session immediately following his graduation.

Scholarship certificates also are awarded by members of the Texas Council of Church-Related Colleges. These scholarships are valued from \$100 to \$2,000 and extend for a period of two to eight semesters.

DALLAS, TEXAS, MAY 14—Hundreds of vocational agriculture students in the Cornbelt will be learning about the farm machinery industry during their summer vacations this year—and getting paid for it.

Gary Finley, 18, of Loraine, Texas, is one such student. He is participating in Massey-Ferguson Inc.'s Youth Business Opportunity Program. Student Finley attends Loraine High School. He and his family farm 160 acres in cotton. His sponsoring dealer in the company program is B. W. Tartt Implement Company.

The program, according to C. F. Blatnik, company branch manager in Dallas, was developed to provide students "with a unique opportunity to better understand the role of business in agriculture today and the importance of modern farm technology in successful farm operation."

Loraine was the center of a hard rain, hail and electrical storm Saturday which started about 1:30 p.m. Lightening set fire to the Floyd Griffin home 2 miles East of here burning it to the ground, and the Champion community was hit by a tornado which blew highline poles, trees and sheds around at the Bruce Newton home.

Contents of the Griffin home would have been a total loss had it not been for two truck drivers who broke into the house and carried out part of the contents in one room.

One of the drivers said he saw smoke coming out of the roof of the house and stopped, flagging down another truck coming in the opposite direction. On finding no one home they broke into the house which was filled with smoke and ceilings of some of the rooms ablaze. They pulled out the deep freeze, a dresser, chest of drawers and metal cabinet which held 96 pieces of china sent to Mrs. Griffin by her son, Charles, while stationed in Japan. In order to get the large cabinet out the door it had to be turned on its side, but only one piece of the shelf, a cup, was cracked in the shuffle. A mattress and a few clothes the two were able to gather was also saved. Coming on the scene and helping with removing some of the articles were Marciano Madrid who lives on the place and three sons.

Mrs. Newton, who had witnessed one tornado while living at the same place 19 years ago, on the same day and almost the same hour of the day, said she heard the sound of the storm and saw the funnel. Getting into the storm cellar, she fastened down the door, but the door was blown open during the storm. No one was injured.

South of Loraine received more than three inches of rain and considerable hail that damaged cotton and gardens.

About 2 a.m. Sunday, another hail storm hit North of town and farmers in that section say they lost part or all of their cotton and gardens.

Weather over Texas, cleared some on Monday, but early Tuesday more rain and thunder storms were predicted for the state.

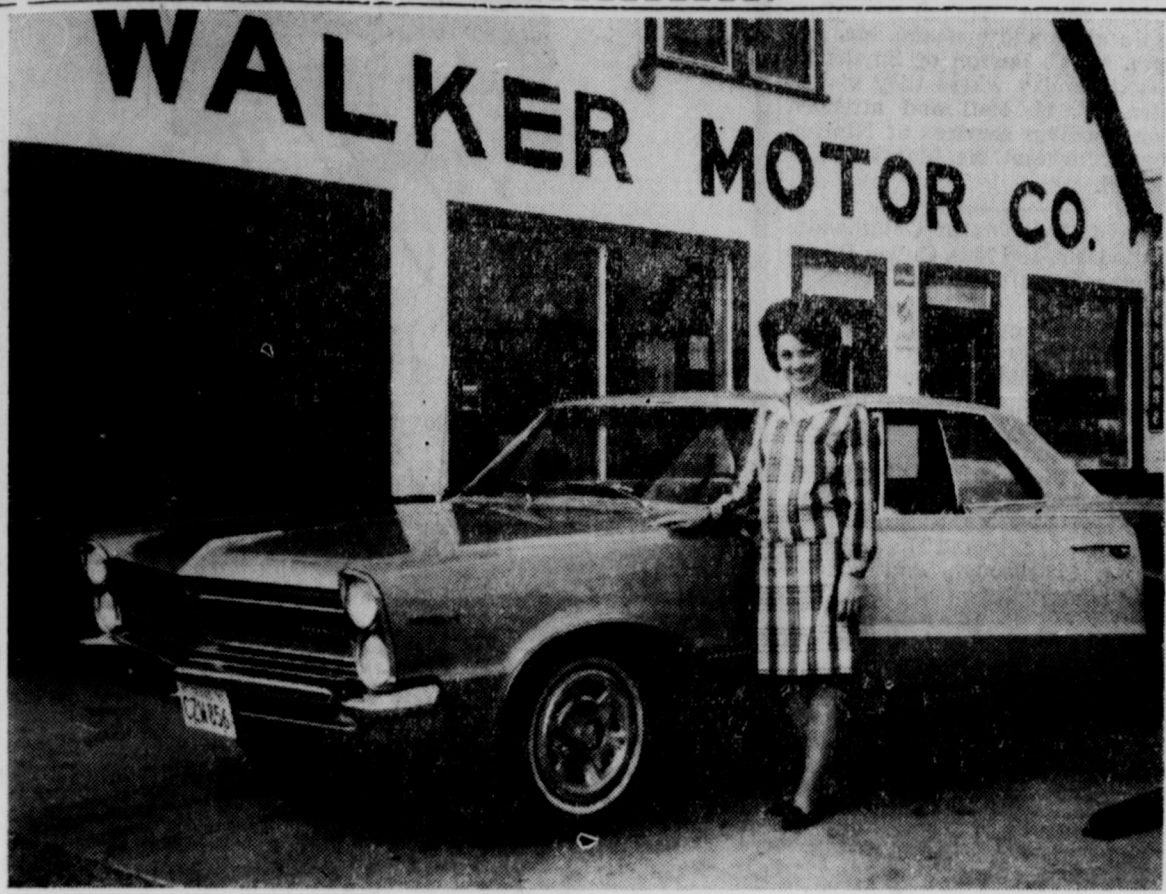
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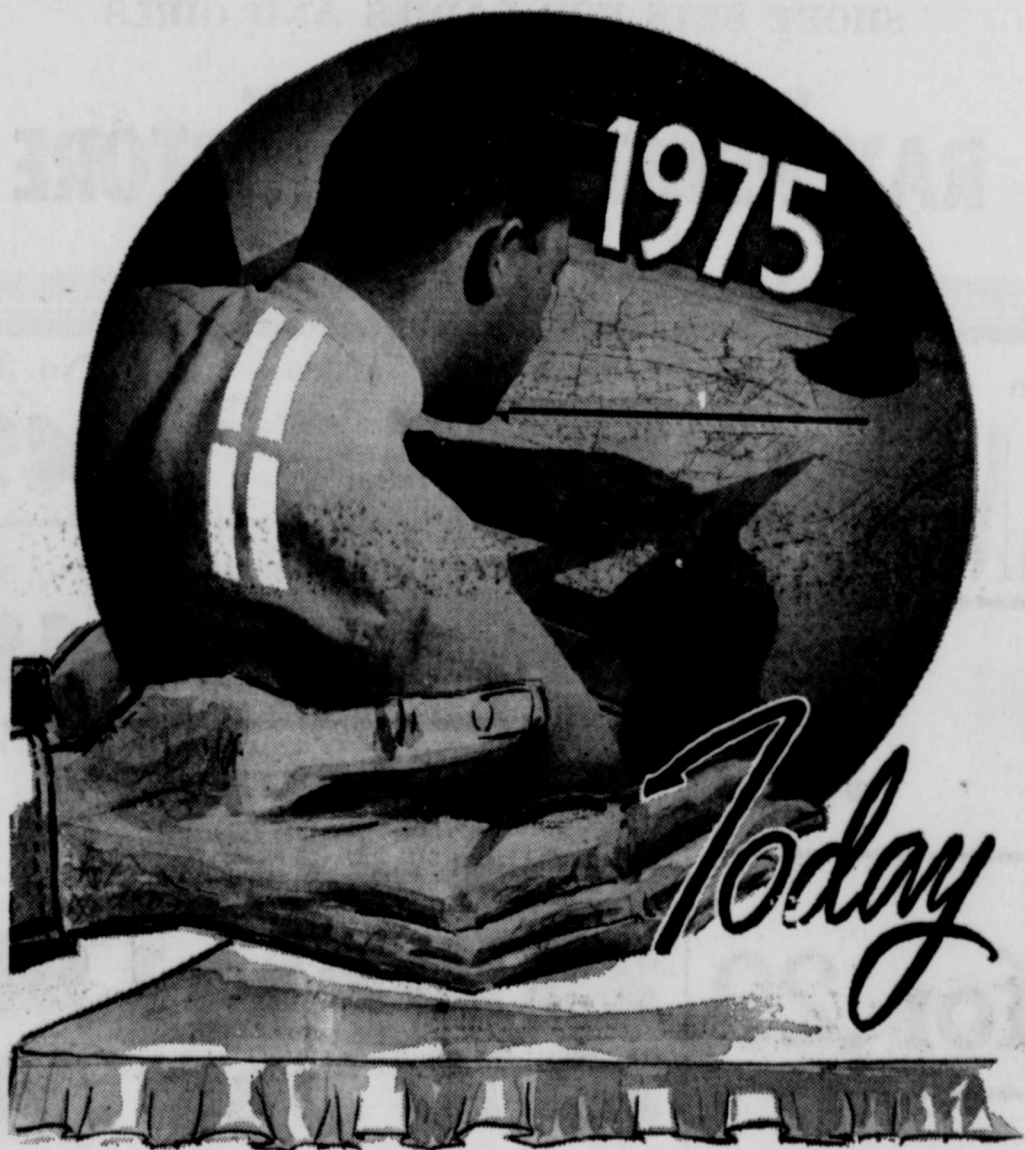

NOTICE

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1967 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1965 and May 15, 1965, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should NOT send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1965. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the applicant to qualify at the beginning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk. 52-2-C

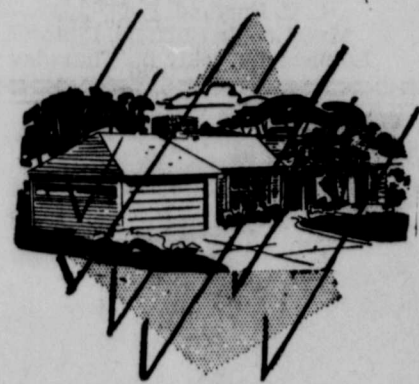
