

Civic Club Busy.
We want to stop just here long enough to doff our cap to the Civic Club ladies of Junction. Their efforts are deserving of complimentary notice and encouragement. Through their work our town has already been made more beautiful and more sanitary. The recent cleanup movement instigated by them had much good effect, and many weeds were hauled away to the dump grounds. This rubbish was not only an eyesore to the good appearance of the town but was harboring places and breeding places for some stegon million diseases—such as typhoid.

That cleanup campaign was principally for each individual's yards and premises. The Club now has a move started for the cleaning up of the vacant lots and streets. To his end the Club has called a mass meeting of all the ladies at the Park on Riley Hill this afternoon at three o'clock. We hope all the ladies of Junction who can will attend this meeting and give their aid to plans for a cleaner Junction. This is a matter of vital interest to our town's health and general welfare. Two-four physicians report having treated seventy-five cases of typhoid in the past twelve months. Most of these were due to unsanitary conditions and flies. Fourteen of these cases cost these particular homes some \$1,500. In view of these facts it appears that it is high time for the people of this town to wake up to the importance of sanitation. And the cleaning up of that vacant lot by your side and the streets about you is a most important contribution to the welfare of your health and to the appearance of your premises as well as the cleaning of your own back yard. It takes a better looking town to get yet constructed to keep out the germs of disease. The flies and mosquitoes that breed in these old cans and cans about the vacant lot of your side are not going to stay on the other side of the fence that is around your premises. They can easily bring typhoid to you and your family—and your own yard kept swept clean. And this is saying nothing of the stegon million diseases which breed in these cans and trashy vacant lots by your side. Let's clean up and wash up.

There are other matters why we hope the Civic Club will, in time, give their attention to. However one thing at a time and that time well. For the interest of Junction's welfare let us cheer the effort of your own health and that of your fellow citizens. Give your encouragement and cooperation to the Civic Club in its commendable work.
