UNION EQUITY EX- CHANGE ORGANIZES

PERRYTON, SPEARMAN, BOOK-
ER AND DARROUZETT EQU-
TY EXCHANGES PERFECT
BUYING AND SELLING
AGENCY

An organization has been recently
completed by the Equity Exchanges
at Spearman, Booker, Darrouzett and
Perryton which is known as the
Union Equity Exchange. This new
corporation has opened offices at
Enid, Oklahoma in the American Na-
tional Bank building. It will act as
a buying and selling agency for the
above named farmers organizations.

The forming of this company is
but another step forward in the co-
operative marketing program which
has been such a phenomenal success
in this section and more particularly
here in Perryton. The Perryton Equi-
ty Exchange was organized but a
few short years ago and now it has
elevators and warehouses at Hun-
toon, Twitchell, Farnsworth, Wawa-
ka and two here in Perryton. In this
short period it has grown from noth-
ing to a concern which does the lar-
gest volume of business in the entire
community. A full and comprehen-
sive outline of the new company, its
purposes, aims and aspirations will
be found else where in this issue.

The one thing above all else which
speaks well for the success of the
Union Equity Exchange is the quali-
ty and experience of the men that
have been chosen to direct its op-
eration. E. N. Puckett, the man who
is responsible for putting the Perry-
ton Equity at the head of similar or-
ganizations in the entire United
States, has accepted the position of
general manager. During the years
that he has been manager of the
Perryton Equity, he has worked un-
tiringly for the farmers and he will
now be in a position to help them in
a bigger way. He and his family will
move to Enid in the near future. Mr.

Representatives of the Oklahoma
City Chamber of Commerce, 150
strong, with a twenty-piece band,
will be in Perryton, Thursday, June
24, during the noon hour, as guests
of the Perryton Chamber of Commer-
ce.

But a short time ago this body of
Oklahoma City boosters made a trip

possibilities of this section, and real-
izing it's rapid growth and develop-

CHARGE ARDMORE BOY WITH CRIMINAL ASSAULT

Charged with criminal assault, G.
E. Mobley, Ardmore, Okla., boy was
arrested late Wednesday afternoon
by Sheriff Sid Talley and Night
watchman R. H. Gamel. The charges
were brought against him by Miss
Elizabeth Fast, 18 year old Oklaho-
ma girl, who for some time has been
working at the home of Mr. and Mrs.
Carl Ellis, about fifteen miles south-
east of Perryton.

Mobley is alleged to have gone
to the Ellis home Wednesday after-
noon to see Mr. Ellis about some oil
leases. Upon being informed that
there was no one home except Miss
Fast he departed but returned later,
at which time he is alleged to have
made the attack.

Upon returning home Mr. Ellis
notified the officers here and through
the description given, the arrest was
made at a local hotel where Mobley
registered. The preliminary hearing
was waived by the defendant, but
Miss Fast was taken to the county
jail where she identified Mobley.

Mobley was taken to Canadian to
await trial. No bond has been plac-
ed. Jack Allen is the attorney for the
defense.

C. OF C. HOLDS LUNCHEON TUES.

Forty-two members and guests of
the Perryton Chamber of Commerce
met at the Denver Cafe, Tuesday
evening for a luncheon, presided over
by E. C. Carver, to talk over im-
portant matters and make plans for
the year's work.

R. T. Correll headed the program
of speakers, giving a short talk on
finances, followed by W. B. LaMaster.
Sam. W. Martin, county agent of
Hansford County and secretary of
the Spearman Chamber of Commer-
ce, told the meeting why the towns
of the north plains should work to-
gether to help build up this country,
instead of letting petty jealousies
cause them to pull against each other.

J. M. Bull told of his experiences
as government assessor, offering facts
to show that the farmer on the 160
acres or half section is in better fi-
nancial condition than the man try-
ing to farm a thousand acres, stat-
ing that as soon as Ochiltree County
had a farm home on every half sec-
tion, and had a country population
of 30,000 that we would begin to
realize the possibilities of the great
plains country.

J. P. Stokes, Oklahoma City, Okla.,
and G. F. Lindsey, also of Oklaho-
ma City, both gave short talks, tel-
ling the importance of letting the
world know of the Panhandle.

C. W. Callaway told of the trip that
R. T. Shindler, J. W. Wilson, and
himself make to the Great Plains
Highway meeting at McCook, Neb.,
and how they definitely put Perryton
on the map and routed the highway
through our city.

Geo. M. Perry gave a short talk
concerning the advisability of trying
to stage a county fair here this fall,
and leaving the question for consid-
eration at the next business meet-
ing.

R. T. Shindler spoke on the matter
of raising money to finance the Cham-
ber of Commerce and of the budget
calling for \$1,200.00 for the years
work. He stated that within the next
week a committee would start the
work of raising this quota and hoped
that the business men would re-
spond to the call. He spoke also on
the proposed organization of a north
plains band to represent this section
of the country at the West Texas
Chamber of Commerce meeting at
Amarillo, June 21-23. However
as Dalhart has failed to do their part
in the organization, work along this
line has been held up. Mr. Shindler
also spoke of the Oklahoma City
Chamber of Commerce visit for June
24, and stated that the board of di-
rectors has authorized a luncheon to
be given to the visitors. In conclud-
ing his speech he called a meeting
of the board of directors for Thurs-
day evening at 8:30 o'clock.

J. L. Pryor made a very entertain-
ing talk as well as an instructive
one. He spoke of the ways the Per-
ryton citizens could "tell the world"
about our community, without really
seeming to be advertising it. Mr.
Pryor stated that he always took a
bunch of our wheat along with him
on every trip and never failed to let
it be seen at every town he passed
through. He also said that he believed
that at every town he visited in
this way he left someone thinking
of Perryton and the opportunities of
the great plains.

Sidney Swearingen, Spearman,
made a short talk, but owing to the
lack of time, others on the program
were not called on and the meeting
was adjourned.

A Suggestion To The Farmers Of Our Trade Territory

We notice quite a sprinkle of rye in the wheat this year, but it doesn't look as though it will be enough to cause a dock for milling purposes, but we believe you should be careful not to use any of this rye mixture for seed, as it will develop a larger percentage of rye next year.

As to Blackhull wheat, we will give you the Oklahoma program for the handling of the Blackhull wheat. They have divided the state into districts, giving each mill in Oklahoma a district to canvass by section lines, to locate the Blackhull wheat in order to keep it out of their milling wheat. We will suggest if all of you fellows that have Blackhull wheat will co-operate with us we can probably work it off during the season that there will be no premium for mill wheat at top price and no one will be hurt in so doing.

Should you have Turkey and Kanred wheat and also Blackhull wheat and desire to store or hold a portion, it would be advisable to sell the Blackhull wheat and hold the varieties that will more than likely bring a premium for milling, later on in the season.

As to wheat being harvested in good condition, we notice the terminal elevators are reserving the right to reject wheat out of condition in the way of too green or too much moisture, and the local elevator that runs too much risk on out of condition wheat is liable to be tied up entirely and cripple the flow of the wheat and cause quite a inconvenience to every farmer. Please co-operate with us by not cutting your wheat too wet, or too green and we will all get by in good shape.

While we realize there are a large percentage of the farmers that will care for their wheat in good shape, yet a few can act careless enough to inconvenience all by their carelessness.

Trusting we will have the hearty co-operation of ALL this season.

Mr. Connelly has associated himself with Mr. Trammell in a contract to drill a well in the near vicinity of the Sutton Store which is in the northeast corner of Township 1, Range 19, in what is known as the Danner-Montgomery block. We have been unable to learn the location of this project or the extent of the block. Drilling in this new block is to commence on July 1st, also.—Guyton Herald.

Eggs a la King
Glazed Sweet Potatoes
Ritz! Tomatoes
Fruit Salad a la Creme
Bread Beverage
Butterscotch Pie

Directions for each dish follow.

Eggs a la King
8 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons minced sweet pepper
4 cups (one quart) milk
3 tablespoons flour
2 cups mushrooms (fresh or canned)
12 hard boiled eggs, cut in pieces
2 teaspoons salt
Melt butter, add pepper and mush-
rooms, and cook until soft. Stir in
flour and add milk. Stir until thick-
ened. Add seasoning and eggs.
Heat very hot and serve on squares
of toast, or pour into a baking dish,
sprinkle with buttered crumbs and
brown in a quick oven.



Glazed Sweet Potatoes
12 medium-sized sweet potatoes
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
8 tablespoons butter
Boil the sweet potatoes in salted
water for ten minutes, remove the
skins and cut in halves lengthwise.
Arrange in a buttered pan. Make a
syrup by boiling the sugar and
water for three minutes. Add the
butter. Brush potatoes with syrup
and bake until brown, heating with
remaining syrup. Serve in a hot
covered dish.



Ritz! Tomatoes
Slice bread in usual manner, shape
with three-inch biscuit cutter and
toast. Slice ripe tomatoes, place a
slice on toast, sprinkle with salt,
grated cheese or cottage cheese and
onion, and finely chopped pepper.
Bake in hot oven until tomatoes are
cooked and slightly browned.

Fruit Salad a la Creme
2 large bananas
1 pint sliced pineapple
1 pound Tokay or Malaga grapes
1 cup Cream Salad Dressing
Drain the pineapple and cut into
small pieces. Peel the grapes, cut
into halves and remove the seeds.
Peel the bananas, scrape off the
fuzzy portions and dice. Mix with

Melt the butter in a double boiler,
stir in the flour and the cream (sour
milk being preferable). Stir until

it begins to thicken. Beat the egg-
yolks, add to them the salt, sugar
and lemon juice, and turn into the
thickened cream. Cook in a double
boiler about five minutes, or until
the eggs begin to thicken. Cool,
and fold in the whipped cream.

Plain Pastry:
2 cups flour
1/2 cup fat
1 teaspoon salt
Ice water

Mix salt with flour. Cut fat into
flour with two knives. Add just
enough ice water to hold mixture
together without its being sticky.
Roll lightly from center outward.
This is sufficient pastry for double
crusts of one large pie, or two pastry
shells.

Butterscotch Filling (for two pies)
4 egg yolks
4 cups dark brown sugar
4 cups milk
1 cup flour
1/2 cup butter
2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Beat yolks of eggs in inside of
double boiler, add milk and butter.
Mix flour with sugar and add to
milk mixture. Cook until thickened.
Remove from fire and cool. Fill
cooked pastry shells. Cover with
whipped cream or meringue.

Make a meringue with the four
egg whites beaten until stiff. Fold
in four tablespoons powdered
sugar, pile irregularly on top of the
pie and bake in moderate oven until
brown.

Why Long Chimneys?

Many women wonder why oil
stoves with long chimneys are supe-
rior to those with short ones. It is
because the long chimneys insure
perfect combustion. In other words,
every drop of oil is completely
burned before the heat reaches the
cooking. There is no chance for soot
or odor.

Short chimney stoves as a rule
focus the heat in one point—the
very center of the burner. Long
chimney stoves focus the heat on
the bottom of the kettle but diffuse
it over the entire kettle bottom.
That's why food cooked on long
chimney stoves is better done.

Then, with this new organization the producers come one step nearer to the consumer and thereby reduce the spread in price between them which is especially desired by our organization.

GRASSHOPPERS

Local infestations of grasshoppers are being reported in the north and west portions of the state, and damage may be severe in regions that did not experience heavy rainfall during the past winter and spring.

Farmers are urged to fight these insects early, if they threaten to migrate from pasture lands or fence rows into the cultivated crops, by the use of the poison bran mash. This is made up of the following ingredients:

Coarse wheat bran 25 lbs.

Paris green or white arsenic 1 lb.

High grade amyl acetate

(avoid cheap grades of

banana oil bronzing liquids 1 oz.

Cane or sorghum molasses

(avoid corn syrup) 2 qts.

Water sufficient to make a moist

mash as explained below:

Mix the bran and poison together thoroughly. Dilute the amyl acetate and molasses in about two gallons of water. Pour this liquid over the mixture of poison and bran until every particle is moist. Then make further additions of water and mix thoroughly until a mash is obtained that is quite moist, yet so it will fall apart after being tightly squeezed and so may be readily sown broadcast.

This quantity of mash should be broadcast so as to cover about five acres. A good practice is to mix at night and sow early in the morning before nine o'clock since the hoppers do not actively feed until the dew dries up. If it is desired to kill hoppers in grass land sow over the entire acreage to be protected. Where they are migrating from fence rows or pastures into cultivated crops sow the fence row or a fairly broad margin of the pasture, and also a broad margin of the cultivated crop with the mixture.

Amyl acetate is preferable in the formula but if it cannot be obtained, substitute six lemons for one ounce of the amyl acetate. This should be diluted with water as with the other substance, but one should use both juice and rinds, grinding the latter in a fine chopper.

Do not place the mash in piles.

Do not use lead arsenate—use Paris green or white arsenic.

Do not use cheap banana oil or bronzing liquids.

HI-TEST IMPROVING STATION

A very convenient improvement is being made at the Hi-Test Service Station, in the installation of air and water hoses to both sides of the station.

Tall uprights are being placed, with air hoses attached at the top on a weighted arm which will allow the hose to reach any tire. Water hose is also being connected on both the north and south side of the station. This will allow the cars and trucks to fill up with air and water without stopping on the platform in front and holding up the cars that wish gas and oil, making it especially convenient for the wheat trucks that will be using that street to the elevators.

Five or six loads of sand have also been dumped and spread around to insure a good driveway, even in muddy weather, making it much nicer.

OSCAR GAMEL HOME
