As the rains continue, the weeds grow and grow and grow. Many of our vacant lots and houses without tenants are overgrown with a rank growth of unsightly weeds. These weeds are not only an eyesore but a definite health hazard.

The city is spending goodly sums of money to control the mosquitoes in town, but the weed patches make excellent places for the pesky mosquito to hide in and breed. The city is also mowing the bar ditches and rights of way along the streets, but this is a self-defeating program when not carried through in all aspects of pest and weed control. These dense growths are also areas in which mice, rats and other vermin can thrive.

We need to institute an immediate program of weed and rubbish control in Farwell. I say Farwell because Texico is already taking steps to eliminate its problems.

To the best of our knowledge, many communities control this problem by having the city mow and clean up when the property owner either won't or cannot do it. This extra time and labor on the part of the city is then added to the local taxes. If this avenue is not now available to the city, we suggest that it be enacted into an ordinance and the public given the health protection it deserves.

Elsewhere in the Tribune are several pictures of where a good cleaning up is in order. These are only a very few of many that are visible all over town. For the common good and for the personal satisfaction of living in a pleasing as well as healthy community, let's all pitch in and do our part.

This week marks the beginning of the political season for the folks in Texas and in New Mexico. The candidates will be issuing statements, taking positions, pointing with pride and viewing with alarm. The public will be deluged with claims and counterclaims. Truth will indeed be hard to find.

We suggest several guidelines in evaluating the candidates, the parties and the platforms. We like to keep in mind the Biblical injunction, "by their fruits shall you know them."

Words, promises and phrases are easy for a candidate to say, but it is not easy to erase the past history that a course of political thought has written. The results of these words and phrases as enacted into law are now with us to assess. If you are favorably impressed with the RESULTS as we are experiencing them, return their exponents to office. If these RESULTS are displeasing to you, then do not return those who espouse this philosophy.

Also in political thinking, there enters the Christian concept of self. Am I willing to attain physical comfort at the expense of deprivation to another person? This, I feel, applies to the concept of "a little inflation is good for us." The evaluation of the dollar is good for those who are healthy, young, and capable of increasing their earning power. It strikes with devastating force upon those who are old, ill, or retired and must depend upon a fixed income to provide the necessities of life.

We believe that the final answer to political thinking can be found by a Christian examination of our personal desire and beliefs. If we continue to let the politician appeal to the carnal self and ignore the spiritual self, we will soon pass from the scene as a Christian nation and ultimately pass from the scene as a nation.

Let us all pray that the spirit of the Almighty will lead, guide and direct us in the paths of righteousness, for this is the only path that will lead us to the fulfillment of our Christian destiny.

Judge Hears Pleas Of Guilty

Judge Pat Boone heard two pleas of guilty in district court which convened in Farwell Monday. The case of R. C. Smith, charged with passing worthless checks, was continued until a later date.

Pleas of guilty were entered by Alfred Charles Smith and Edward Hernandez. Smith, who pleaded guilty to a DWI charge, second offense, was given a three year probated sentence. Hernandez, charged with theft, was given a four year probated sentence.

Twelve civil cases were scheduled for the recent term of court. Eight of the cases were passed; three were settled out of court and the other case, that of Selma Estes VS Kerr Construction Company, was heard by a jury.

In the suit, Selma Estes VS Kerr Construction, in which she was suing for \$20,000 personal damages, \$250 medical bills, and \$250 property damage as result of an accident, the jury found in favor of the defendant. However, a motion for a new trial is pending at this time.

The grand jury is convening in Farwell today to hear evidence in several cases, with indictments expected to be returned against several persons.

Plains Next Foe --

Bobcats Edge Steers 16-12

Fighting a ten pound per man weight disadvantage in the starting lineups, the Farwell Steers tried but could not hold off a tough band of Dimmitt Bobcats as the visitors from Class AA edged out a 16-12 victory over the Steers Friday night in Steer Stadium.

Although the Steers' passing game functioned fairly well, it faltered in several crucial situations nullifying touchdown opportunities, while Dimmitt's strong line bolstered by two 200-pound tackles opened up running holes for several strong rapping backs who seemed able to pick up four to five yards at will.

The Steers moved the ball, mostly through the air, for good gains but when the chips were down, the big Dimmitt line held, preventing Farwell from picking up needed yardage and gaining the points needed for a victory.

The Steers won the toss and elected to receive. Johnny Schell returned the ball to the Farwell 25 yard line where the Steers' passing game went into action. On the first play from scrimmage, Bobby Field pitched to Schell who fired to Lewey Bradshaw for a gain of 40 yards and a first down on the Bobcat 35 yard line.

Al Phillips carried for five to bring up a second and five situation. The Steers then tried the same pass combination that had worked so well the first time, but Dimmitt's Ronnie Kenmore intercepted and returned to the Bobcat 32 before being hauled down.

Joe Bob Sanders carried for a gain of six to the 38 yard line where Quarterback Kent Lind-

sey kept for the first down. Following an off sides penalty against the Steers, Tommy Stafford moved the ball into Steer territory with a good gain to the Steer 45. A series of six more plays set up a first and goal situation on the Farwell nine yard line. Hutton moved the ball to the four where the Steers held on a fourth and goal situation thereby gaining possession of the football and seemingly averting a Bobcat score.

The good fortune did not last long however, as the big Dimmitt line crashed through on the first Farwell play and dropped the ball carrier behind the goal line for a two point safety to send the Bobcats into the lead with 3:15 left in the first quarter.

The ball was brought out to the 20-yard line where Al Phillips kicked to the Bobcats. On a quick hitting play, Lindsey took the kick and handed off to Hutton who raced through Steer defenders for 70 yards and the first Dimmitt touchdown. With eight minutes and 58 seconds gone in the first quarter, the Bobcats held a 9-0 lead.

After the ensuing kickoff the two teams traded punts before the Steers began a sustained drive which carried them to a first and goal situation on the Bobcat nine-yard line. Four straight incomplete passes however killed the Steers' chances for a score and the Bobcats took over on their own nine.

Dimmitt moved the ball downfield to the Farwell 43-yard line before being forced to punt. The ball landed to the Farwell eight where it was killed, putting the Steers into the hole once again. Field kept to move the ball out to the 20 and a little better field position. Two more completed passes resulted in a first down in Dimmitt territory with 55 seconds left in the first half.

Farwell could not move the ball from there and was forced to punt but the first Dimmitt play from scrimmage resulted in a fumble with a Steer recovery on the Dimmitt 20. Interference was called against the Bobcats on the next play and with 18 seconds left, the Steers had a first and goal on the Dimmitt 10-yard line. Johnny Schell was thrown for a loss and Field was tackled short of the goal line, however, as time ran out in the first half with Dimmitt holding a 9-0 lead. The Bobcats received the

second half kickoff and were forced to punt. Farwell took over on their own 43-yard line where Al Phillips broke loose for a good gain and a first down on the Bobcat 20. A completed pass to Johnny Schell resulted in a first and goal on the Dimmitt two and two plays later, Al Phillips crashed over from the one for the first Farwell tally. The try for point was no good and with 7:20 left in the third quarter the score was 9-6, still in favor of Dimmitt.

The Steers struck for another quick score as Dimmitt fumbled on the ensuing series of plays and Farwell recovered on the Bobcat 28. On the first play, Schell took a pitchout from Field and sidestepped defenders for a 28-yard touchdown run which sent the Steers into the lead for the first time in the game. Once again the try for point failed and the score stood 12-9 in favor of Farwell, with 5:16 left in the third quarter.

The remainder of the third quarter was scoreless as the two teams battled up and down the field and traded punts. An intercepted pass about midway through the fourth period set up Dimmitt's go ahead touchdown. Stafford picked off a Field pass to give the Bobcats a first down on the Farwell 32. Seven plays later Dimmitt had moved for a first and goal situation on the Steer two-yard line. An illegal procedure penalty cost the Bobcats five but three plays later, Ronnie Hutton bulled his way over from the two for the touchdown. With 4:42 left in the game, Farwell was faced with a 16-12 disadvantage.

The Steers tried valiantly to fight back but Dimmitt's John Hays intercepted another Farwell pass with only seven seconds left in the game to preserve the Bobcat victory.

Coach Toby Booth in commenting on the game said, "The game could have gone either way--our boys did a fine job and I am proud of the effort they put forth. Dimmitt has a fine ball club and is probably one of the toughest we will meet this year."

The Steers will travel to Plains tonight (Friday) to meet the Cowboys. Coach Booth says "they are a tough team, fast and heavy. They have about the same size line as Dimmitt; however, the backs might be a little lighter."

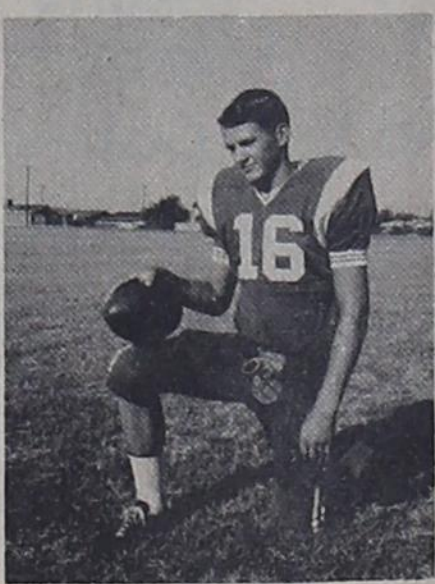

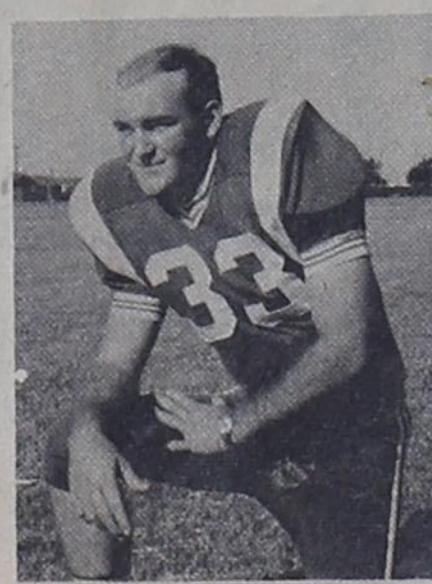

**Bobby Kennedy-

Soldier Attends Religious Retreat

Private First Class Lloyd W. Harrison, son of Mrs. Hettie A. Harrison, Texico, attended a five-day religious retreat at the English Army Religious Retreat Center in Seoul, Korea, Aug. 25-29.
Harrison and other American servicemen took time off from their military duties for religious meditation and counseling. A driver in Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion of the 38th Infantry in Korea, Harrison entered the Army in December 1965 and was last stationed at Fort Polk, La.
The 20-year-old soldier was graduated from Texico High School in 1964.

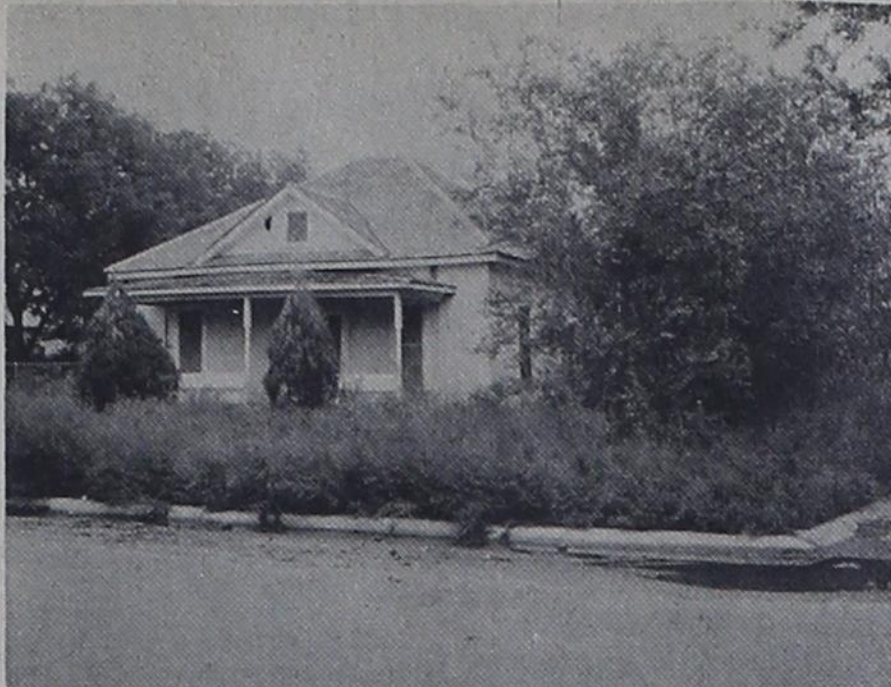

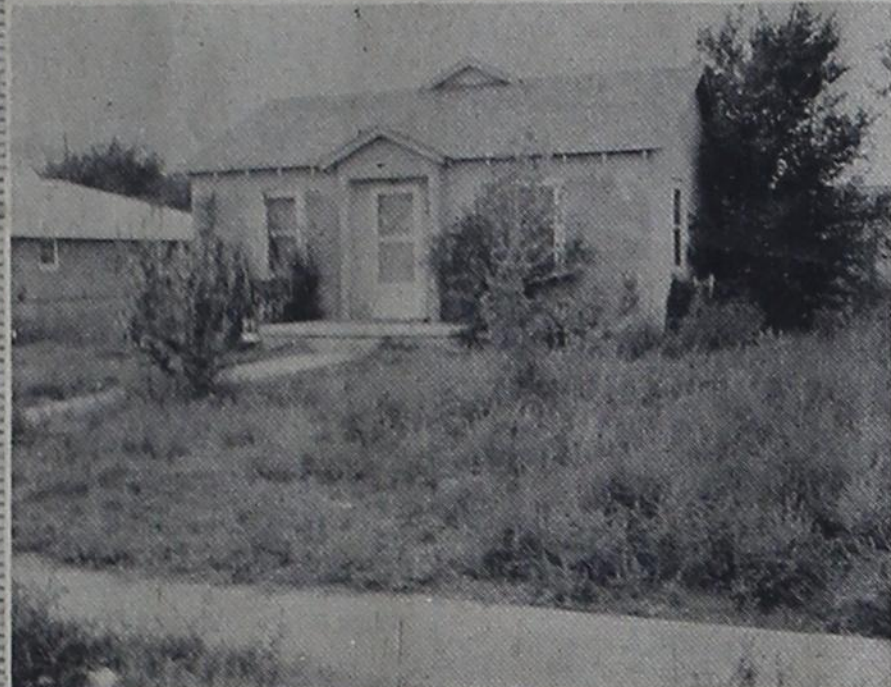

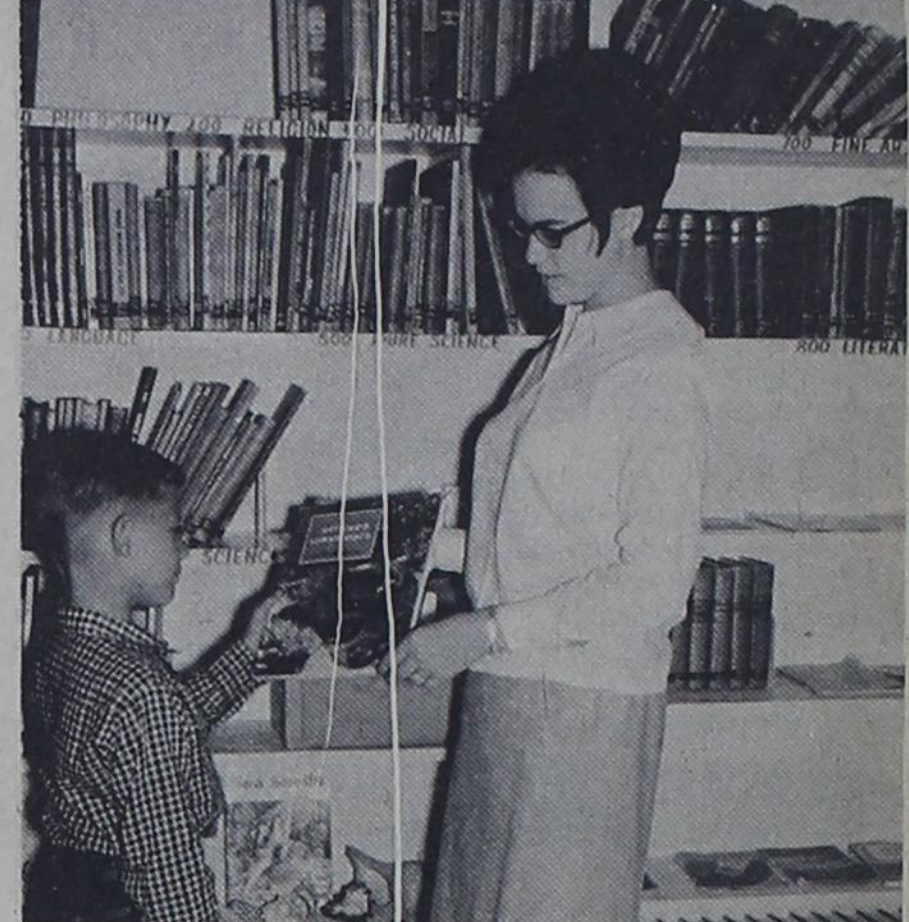

New officers will be elected at the next meeting, Sept. 26. Mrs. Anna Cargile is attending the state H. D. Convention in Corpus Christi this week.

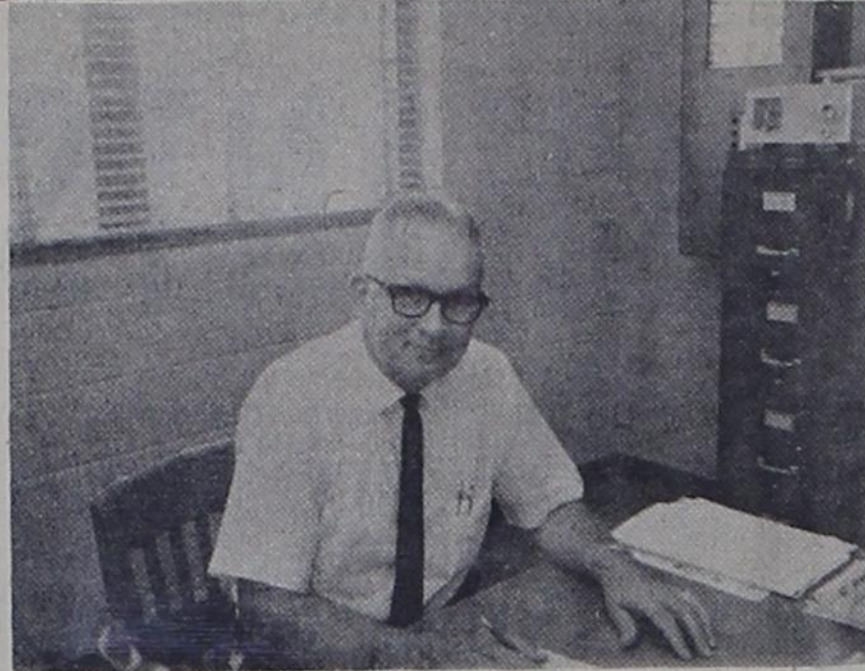

Few homemakers do not want to take the time for this, so it amounts to this--do we have more money than time?

Talking about convenience foods, there are of course many of these, despite the services, actually cost less than some food purchased in fresh form, such as frozen orange juice, lima beans, canned spinach and others, because processing has reduced weight and cost of transportation is reduced. A study of economics on how the food market works is not as glamorous as some subjects such as the space age and some others but those that are trying to establish homes, on modest incomes, can find a study of this helpful. Some worthwhile club programs on study of spending in the food dollar and buying practices is one way to become enlightened.

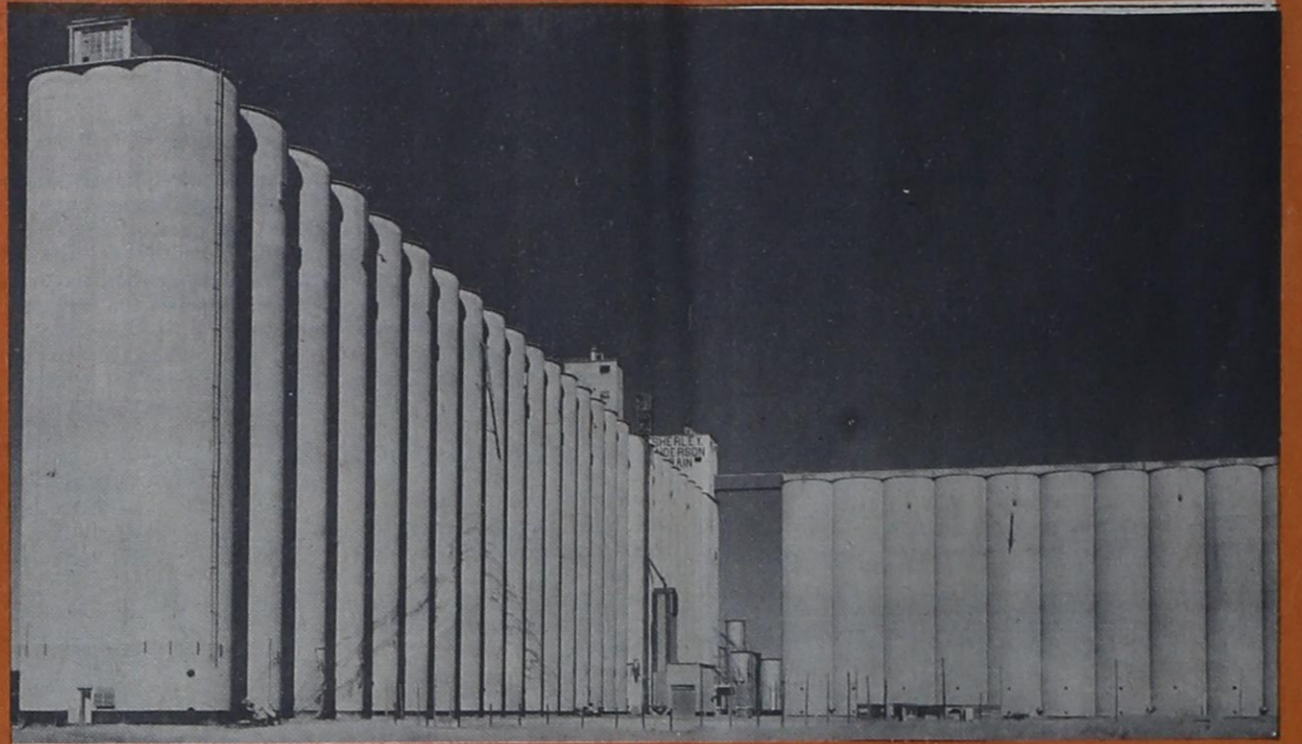
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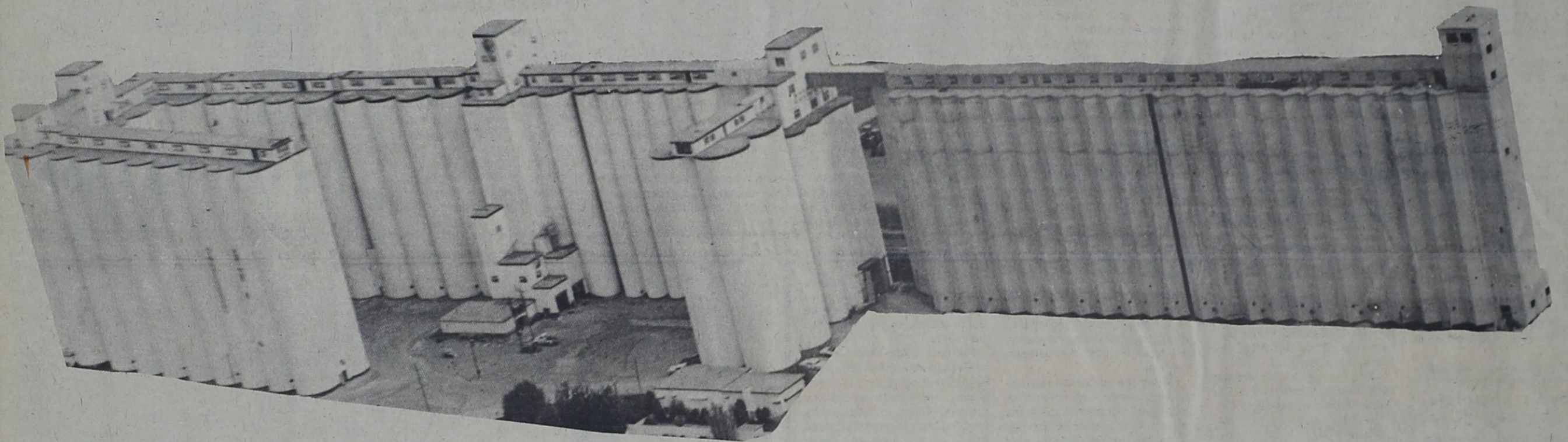
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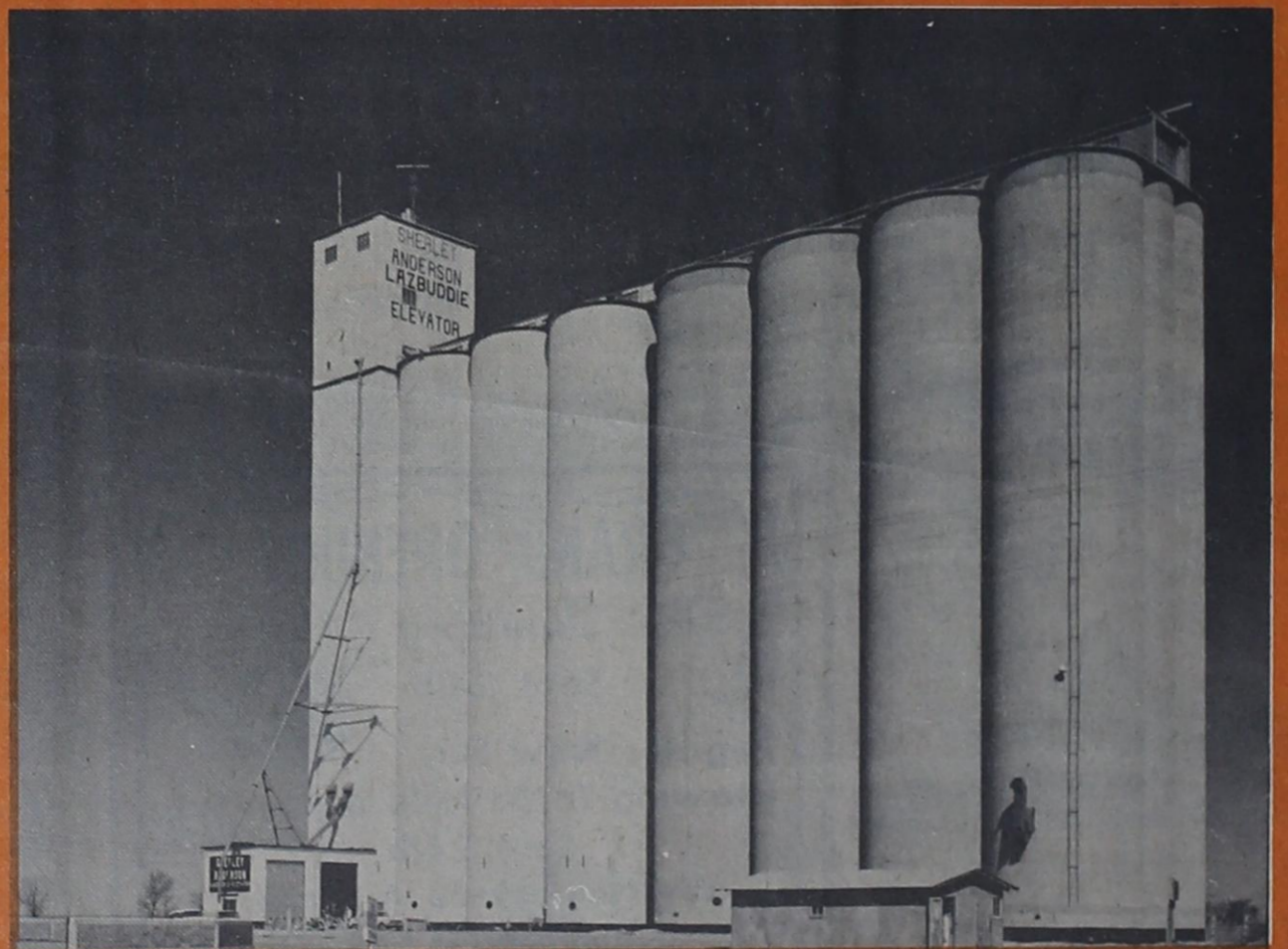


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
