PAGEANT OF NATIONS GETS APPROVAL OF CAPACITY CROWD THURSDAY NIGHT

National Music Week has come and gone. All over the nation music lovers concentrated upon the presentation of the best music to the general public in various forms and programs. The musical organizations, broadcasting stations, churches and many other groups interested in the dissemination of the better class of music joined in this great national week. The result has been a tremendous impetus toward music of the highest class and a greatly increased general public interest in music generally.

All Hereford is proud of the city's share in this great nationwide week of musical tests. Hereford has long been noted for the high plane of her music and for the annual personnel of her artists. The city has always made impressive showings in musical events of every kind. But the feeling is general all over town this week that the 1927 Musical Week was the peak of all former efforts and that the series of musical offerings last week eclipsed any previous endeavors along this line. The General Committee in charge of the affair are highly gratified at the results obtained, and it is possible that an annual music week for the future will grow out of it.

Rev. Jas. T. Ross was general chairman and great credit is due him for his untiring efforts to make the week a success. He was aided by the various musical leaders of the city, and most notably of all by Mrs. John McLean, chairman of the Musical Pageant of Nations, presented at the high school auditorium Thursday night of last week, and which was undoubtedly the crown of the program presented during the week. Mrs. McLean and her assistants evidenced rare skill and judgment in the general plan of the pageant, and executive ability of a high order in so ordering the routine of the program that it was carried through cleverly, smoothly and so entertainingly that the great crowd was reluctant to leave the building at the conclusion. Mrs. McLean is being showered with congratulations upon the vision and resourcefulness she displayed throughout the long series of drills and preliminary preparations and in the final triumph of the pageant.

The week began on Sunday, May 1, with hymn contests in the Sunday schools, sermons with special music and a sacred concert by the Music Study Club at the Christian church. Monday the program consisted of vespers at the Methodist church and a community sing-song on the court house lawn in the evening.

The musical picture at the Star Theatre, "The Music Master," was flashed on the screen both Monday and Tuesday nights. The picture made a phenomenal hit, especially with those who make music a study. A good attendance was noted on the second night.

Wednesday musical vespers were held at the Presbyterian church. A sacred concert was given at night. Thursday musical vespers were given at the Baptist church, with the Musical Pageant of Nations at the high school at night. Musical vespers were rendered at the Christian church Friday, with an ensemble program and musical lecture at night. Saturday was music day.

May 5, the Mothers' Day program, with beautiful music, was presented at the Christian church.

Boy Scouts Elect New Officers For Panhandle District

E. W. Harrison, local Boy Scout leader, was elected chairman of the Hereford Council, Boy Scouts of America for the coming year at a meeting held Tuesday. He succeeds G. A. F. Parker, who has held the office for the past two years.

Many of the local Boy Scout leaders were re-elected for the coming year, and those present pledged themselves to do the job better than ever. Here is a list of officers selected: A. O. Thompson, finance chairman; Jas. T. Ross, Court of Honor chairman; S. P. Ross, camping chairman; T. D. Moss, publicity chairman; Thurman Morgan, organization committee chairman; Rev. V. M. Cloyd, reading committee chairman; O. W. Humble, civic service committee chairman; Ralph Barnett, deputy commissioner. The chairman for the training and leadership committee will be selected by Mr. Harrison at a later date.

Thos. H. Nelson and F. D. Craft, executives of the Panhandle Council, attended the meeting and Mr. Nelson told of the plans for the Boy Scout encampment, which will start the first week in June at Warner Camp in the Palo Duro Canyon southwest of Amarillo. "We are expecting a large enrollment for this encampment," he stated.

The Boy Scout council in the Panhandle, it has been more active during the past two years than the local one and leaders here are making plans to push the work during the coming months, and to seek for a larger enrollment in Boy Scout work than ever before.

During the two years of Boy Scout activity here, four troops have been organized, embracing 120 members with high honors. Nine Eagle Scout badges have been presented, a large number of Scout honors have been won, and more than 300 have merit badges of various degrees.

Dr. R. E. L. Morgan Delivers Commencement Address At High School Auditorium Tonight; Forty Graduates Will Go Out From Hereford High School This Year; Few Fail

Dr. R. E. L. Morgan, president of Clarendon College, will deliver the commencement address to one of the largest graduating classes that has ever been turned out by the Hereford high school, this evening at the high school auditorium. The stage is all set for the commencement exercises, and folks from all walks of life are expected to turn out to witness the presentation of diplomas by Superintendent C. H. Dillehay to forty graduates.

Superintendent Dillehay will be exceptionally interested in the destinies of this class, as they are all his own products. He became head of the Hereford public schools at the same time that these boys and girls entered high school. Miss Velma Reed and Miss Clara Mae Glenn are the other high school teachers who have been here four years.

Development in the local school system is reflected in the increased number of graduates over the last four year period. In 1924 twenty-four received diplomas; in 1925 twenty-nine graduated; last year there were thirty-one who received the coveted honor, and tonight diplomas will be handed to forty.

A graduation exercise for the seventh grade will be held at 10 a. m. Friday morning and Travis M. Damron, local attorney, will deliver the address to these youngsters. C. H. Dillehay will present the diplomas to thirty-seven boys and girls. The program will be given in the high school auditorium.

The coaching staff for the Hereford high school will remain intact for another year, according to Superintendent C. W. Dillehay. J. Forrest Riggs, who has been coach in football, track and basketball for the past two years, has just been given a contract for another year, and C. W. Humble, business manager of all athletics and coach in baseball last season, will also return.

During the past two years these two men have put athletics on a business basis and have made sports more popular among the business interests of the city. Regardless of the fact that a number of star athletes graduate this year, prospects are bright for some good teams to represent the Hereford high school next season. J. T. Gilbreath, Howard Eberle and Arthur Harris will form the nucleus for a line, and Coach Riggs will have only George Murphy for the backfield.

A number of the second team of last season showed up well in the few matched games they played, and Coach Riggs hopes to build up a strong team with such athletes as Guthrie, Miller, Jewell and others which he will have to draw from.

Business Manager C. W. Humble stated that a part of the football schedule for next fall has already been arranged. Contracts have been signed with a number of the schools and the schedule is expected to be completed this summer. A two year contract was signed with both Tucuman and Clovis, New Mexico high schools.

Key-Rate Gets Substantial Cut for Next 12 Months

Hereford's key rate for fire insurance has just been lowered from fifty to thirty-seven cents, according to Ralph Barnett, local fire insurance representative, thus making a reduction of thirteen cents for the people of Hereford.

An eight inch main was laid around the business section of Hereford last year, and more than 1,000 feet of extension of water mains were put down over various parts of the city. This was largely responsible for the key rate reduction here, according to Mr. Barnett.

E. B. Black, Deaf Smith county Hereford breeder, is planning one of the best Hereford cattle sales that has ever been staged in Texas for November 3, 1927. Mr. Black has a herd of 200 Anxiety 4th Hereford and will select sixty straight line bred Anxiety 4th males and females from the cream of his herd for this sale. SANTA FE AGAIN AWARDS FREE TRIPS TO CLUBBERS; DEAF SMITH IS INCLUDED

Telephone, Hotel and Highway Take Attention C. of C.

A first-class hotel, a telephone line to Belview, New Mexico, and a paved highway through Deaf Smith county were three major projects discussed by the Chamber of Commerce at Monday's noon-day luncheon.

E. W. Harrison, chairman of the highway committee, told of the fire loss on the Tarrentine farm west of town Sunday during the high wind, and stated that had the telephone been in proper working order the fire department might have arrived in time to have saved much more of the property. Mr. Harrison also stated that with a phone line in good working order, a repetition of the disastrous prairie fire about a year ago might be prevented, and thus pay more than the cost of construction of such a line.

I. D. Cole, of Amarillo, made a talk, suggesting that Hereford business men work until a first class hotel is secured, stating that the traveling men thus benefited would give the town the right kind of advertising once a good hotel is erected here.

J. E. Beyer, local Santa Fe agent read a letter pertaining to a meeting of the Southwest Shippers Advisory Board, to be held in Amarillo May 21st, wherein it was urged that this meeting is to be of big importance to people of this section, and that large attendance was desired. Matters of interest to shippers and the railroad will be brought up at this meeting. President Black agreed with Mr. Beyer, and urged that a number attend the meeting on the 21st, making their plans beforehand in order that a good delegation attend from Hereford.

M. B. McLean announced the opening on Monday of Deaf Smith county's largest hatchery, a 47,000 egg capacity incubator, and invited everyone to make an inspection.

E. C. Enbanks announced the annual meeting of the Abo Highway Association at Clovis next Monday, urging members present to attend en masse. It was voted that the regular noon day dinner for that day be abandoned and a number signified their intention to attend the highway meeting. It is likely that all going will make the trip by automobile, going together, and an effort will be made to improve our highway situation.

G. A. F. Parker commented on the cotton situation here, urging that all growers plant a variety which will mature. He stated that the Chamber of Commerce had about 400 bushels of good, early maturing seed which might be purchased at a very low price.

Mayor E. S. Ireland told of the hunting trip he and T. E. Seiger enjoyed last week in the Taos Mountains of New Mexico. According to Mr. Ireland, the lions and bears were there, but tracks were all they saw. He reported a fine trip, spent in climbing hills and mountains on horse back.

Secretary T. D. Moss stated that Federal aid might be secured on the highway through Hereford because of the fact that the highway from Canyon to Hereford is designated as a primary road and the one leading south from Canyon is known by the state as a secondary road. This precludes the fact that Randall county will pave a greater distance toward Deaf Smith county line than here-tofore planned.

President Black, supporting the idea of cotton planting, related an incident wherein a farmer near Hereford planted cotton June 20th, 1926, and picked half a bale per acre.

M. E. Fuller, local manager of the Marland Oil Company wholesale house, stated that he had come to Hereford to stay. He will move his family here in June and his children will be in school here next year. He stated that he desired to become a Hereford citizen and had taken great interest in the meeting and expressed a desire to meet each of those present after the luncheon.

L. P. Landrum reported a bad place in the highway near the nursery, and President Black said

Our farm boys and girls realize that now is the time to decide to win one of these trips to Chicago and hundreds of them are enrolling with their local leaders in 4-H club work in order to be able to carry their work to completion by autumn. Let's have a Deaf Smith county 4-H club member bring down one of the Santa Fe prizes and be one of Texas' representatives at Chicago this fall.

Fine Eggs Imported by Golden Rule Hatchery

The Golden Rule Hatchery ordered some high-powered eggs, according to Henry Williamson, the manager of this big hatchery. The eggs, according to Mr. Williamson, run as high as \$10.00 each and none lower than \$5.00 each. These high priced "berries" come from the Regal Pedigreed Farm on Vashon Island, Washington, and they are from hens which won in the contest pens at College Station last year in the Texas National Egg Laying Contest. Records from one hen from which they are getting eggs show the highest mark in Texas, a record of 319 eggs in 365 days.

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Texas & Texans

Texas Aids Generously.

Texas is responding generously
to the appeal of the Red Cross for
aid to the Mississippi Valley flood
sufferers. Texas has its own trou-
bles occasionally, but they are in-
significant as compared with that
which exists in the Mississippi val-
ley. There is no space limit, no col-
or line, no racial restriction con-
sidered by Texans when they hear
the call of distress. Too much can
not be done for these flood suffer-
ers, for most of them have lost
practically all. But Texans should
demand of their representatives
that the government proceed at as
early a date as possible to soremedy conditions in the Missis-
sippi and tributary valleys that a
disastrous flood recurrence shall
hereafter be impossible. The coun-
try is amply able to do this and
sound economics demands that it
be done.

Texas Railroad Building.

The Interstate Commerce Com-
mission having granted the Quan-
ah, Acme and Pacific permission to
build a 200 miles extension, con-
tract will soon be let for an exten-
sion from McBatn to Floydada,
thereby opening up a rich North
Texas territory to railway traffic.
This work will be pushed as rap-
idly as possible, for the railroad
realizes that the section will fur-
nish a large amount of shipping.
There is every indication that 1927
will be a year of large railroad
building in Texas.

Speaking of Alice.

The South Texas town of the
feminine name seems to be growing
up. The newspapers report that a
contract has been let for bitumini-
ous paving of 42 city blocks in the re-
sidential section to be completed in
the next six months. Usually there
are about 10 or 12 city blocks to a
mile. When this work is completed
Alice proposes to go right ahead
and pave 30 or 40 more blocks,
bringing the total permanent pav-
ing to more than 100 blocks. Some
of Alice's larger sisters may well
take notice of what the little girl
is doing.

South Texas Railroads.

The big railroad systems operat-

ing in South Texas are scrapping
for the rights to extend their lines
into undeveloped fields, the lines
that want to build being fought by
competitive lines anxious to mono-
polize the territory. There is no
wonder in this. Since the exten-
sion of the Southern Pacific line
into the Rio Grande valley, its
freight traffic has increased tre-
mendously. Four months ago a
half dozen trains a day in and out
of the town of Alice was consid-
ered a big business. Now the aver-
age daily train movement has in-
creased to thirty trains and the
roads are having to increase their
yard trackage facilities. Watch
Texas development.

Sweetwater Builds Hotel.

A Sweetwater reader of "Texas
and Texans" sends notice that
Sweetwater is not being left be-
hind in the matter of hotel build-
ing, that enterprising West Texas
city having under contract a seven
story hotel with ground floor space
of 100 by 140 feet, the hotel having
120 rooms, each with private bath.
The building is to be of light
cream brick, antique finish and
trimmed with ornamental white
cut stone. This all sounds like
Sweetwater is to be a good hotel
town when the structure is com-
pleted, December 1. This writer
acknowledges an invitation to at-
tend the opening about that date
and if some one will send railroad
fare, he may get there.

Brewster Quicksilver Mines.

Quicksilver mining in Brewster
county has been revived and ship-
ments are being made from Alpine,
one shipment of 7,500 pounds hav-
ing been made recently and bring-
ing \$11,700. The Davis Mountains
are declared to be rich in many
kinds of ores that are merely
awaiting development. When min-
ing is done in Texas as earnestly
as it is undertaken in the Rocky
Mountains, Texas minerals will
likely prove to be most valuable
resources.

Oil Mining in Texas.

While Brownwood's largest oil
field so far as developed is at
depths from 1500 to 2000 feet, much
fine oil is obtained at around 200
feet. An enterprising oil opera-
tor is trying out an experiment of
oil mining. A shaft will be dug
just as an ordinary mining shaft
and when the oil sand is struck
at about 200 feet, as is hoped, the
sand will be run out in all direc-
tions to broaden the pool as much

as may be thought desirable.

Devine's Strong Claim.

A reader who says he follows
this column with much interest in
the Carlizzo Springs Javelin, but
who lives near Devine, writes that
Devine has something for which it
can put up a strong claim, and
that is a six acre field of garlic,
thought to be the largest garlic
field in the South. He sends along
some statistical figures to show
that this field produces enough gar-
lic to flavor 1,285,793 roasts of
beef, or 13,288,904 bowls of soup.
Maybe so, we merely say "We
don't know the flavoring possibili-
ties of garlic."

Harvest of Golden Grain.

Already the reapers are being
overhauled for harvesting the im-
mense grain crop that is turning
from silver to gold throughout Tex-
as. The acreage is reported about
20 per cent larger than it was last
year and prospects for a big yield
were never better. With favorable
weather for harvest the financial
returns should be the largest ever
known in the state.

College Without a Home.

The Methodist school at Clarendon
seems to be just now a home-
less waif. The board in control
of it decided to move to Amarillo,
that town having offered a consid-
erable bonus to buy it away from
its old location at Clarendon. Now
Amarillo appears to be having trou-
ble in getting her citizens to sub-
scribe the money with which to
pay the bonus to secure the school.
Meanwhile Clarendon has acquir-
ed an option on the physical prop-
erty located there and will use the
buildings and grounds for its pub-
lic schools. If Clarendon should
go ahead and build up a good lo-
cal junior college it will find it-
self better off than with a poorly
supported, debt-owing church in-
stitution. But still the practice of
moving church schools to the towns
offering the highest bids for them
can hardly be regarded as a square
deal for the places that often have
sacrificed much to get them.

Building a Hospital.

Stephenville is building a hospi-
tal. Every place as large as Ste-
phenville should have a hospital,
where patients may go for treat-
ment and the hospital facilities
should be provided at the lowest
rate on which the institution can
economically run. Disease and
misfortune should never be penal-
ized.

Proposing an amendment to the
Constitution of the State of Texas
by adding thereto Section 60, Ar-

appropriation to pay expenses.
Be It Resolved by the Legislature
of the State of Texas:SECTION 1. That the Consti-
tution of the State of Texas beamended by adding thereto another
section to be known as Section 60
Article 10, to read as follows, to-
wit:Section 60. The Legislature may
provide compensation for certain
district and county officers, to-wit:
The District Attorney, County
Judge, County Attorney, Sheriff,
County Clerk, District Clerk, Coun-
ty Tax Assessor and County Tax
Collector, by prescribing their du-
ties, and fixing salaries in lieu of
fees, commissions and other prere-
quisites as now provided by the
Constitution.Sec. 2. The foregoing constitu-
tional amendment shall be sub-
mitted to a vote of the qualified
electors of this State at an elec-
tion to be held on the first Mon-
day in August, A. D. 1927, at
which all ballots shall have print-

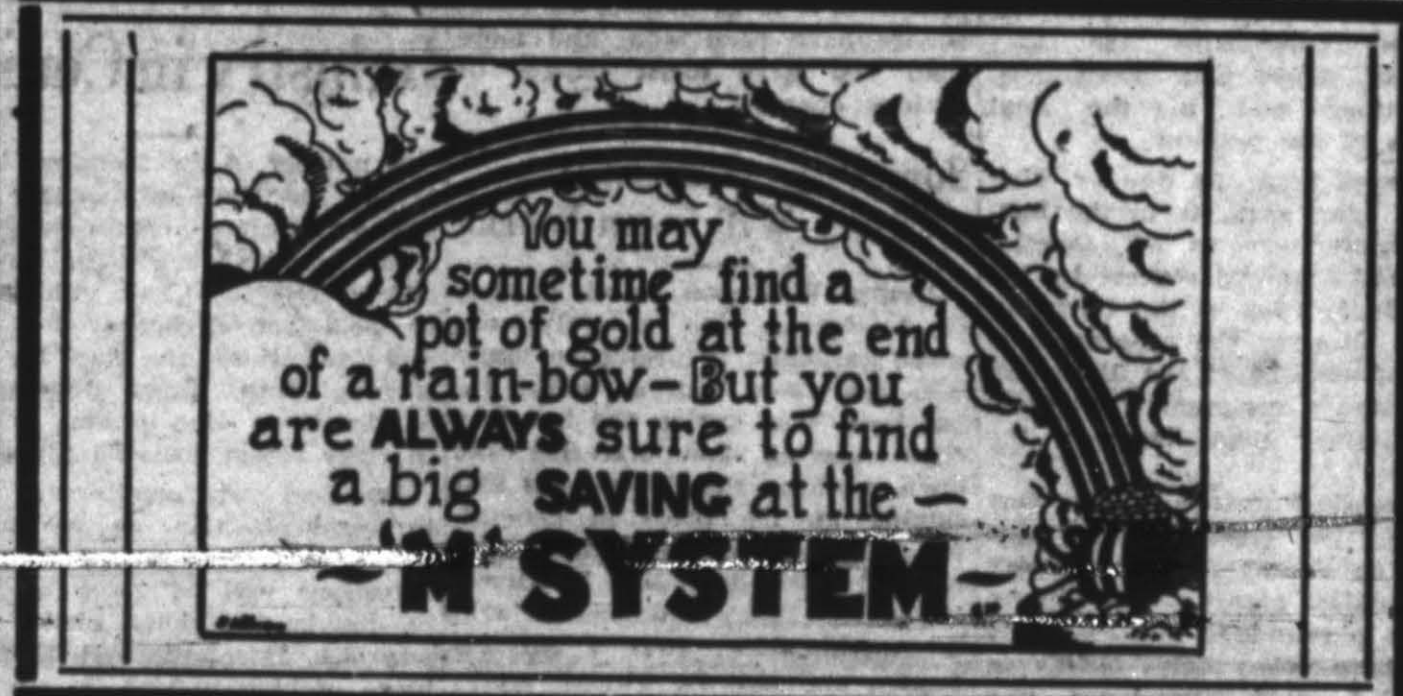

A JOINT RESOLUTION.
S. J. R. No. 33.

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas as removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein a new section, to be numbered Section 30a which shall read as follows:

Section 30a. All provisions of the present Constitution of Texas fixing or limiting the amount of salary or compensation of officers and members of the Legislature are hereby repealed and hereafter

said officers and members of the Legislature shall receive such salary or compensation and expenses as now provided until otherwise provided by law. The salary of the Governor shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year, and no more, payable monthly, and he shall have the occupancy and use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

The salary or compensation of any member of the Legislature shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per year, and actual traveling expenses from the place of residence to the capitol and returning for each session of the Legislature, as shall hereafter be provided by law; and provided that no change of salary or compensation from that now provided by the Constitution shall become effective until the first day of January following the first general election held after adoption of this amendment.

Sec. 2: Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which each voter opposing said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed thereon:

"For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner;" and each voter favoring said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner, the following words printed thereon:

Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner."

If it shall appear from a return of said election that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of said amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3: The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this resolution and the Constitution and laws of this State; and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the required vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

Sec. 4: The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for publication of the proclamation calling said election and any expense of the State in submitting said amendment and holding said election.

H. J. R. No. 23.
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article VIII by the insertion of Section 1-a therein, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the separation of the objects of taxation for State purposes and for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the State and Counties, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax or other form of tax for State purposes only, and for local purposes only; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the classification of objects of taxation and providing that rates shall be equal on the same class of property, and fixing limitations upon taxation.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein Section 1-a, as follows:

Section 1-a. The Legislature may separate the objects of taxation for State purposes from the objects of taxation for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the state and counties; and may provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax, or other form of tax, on certain classes of taxable property, or other objects, for State purposes only (including school purposes); or upon certain classes of property, or other objects, for county or local purposes only (including school purposes). In no event shall the rate of such taxes exceed the sum or the thirds of such taxes fixed by this Constitution for State, county and other local purposes. The Legislature may provide for the classification of objects of taxation. Taxation shall be equal and uniform.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitution amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"For the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-a, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

Against the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-a, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election to determine whether or not the proposed constitutional amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. And the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

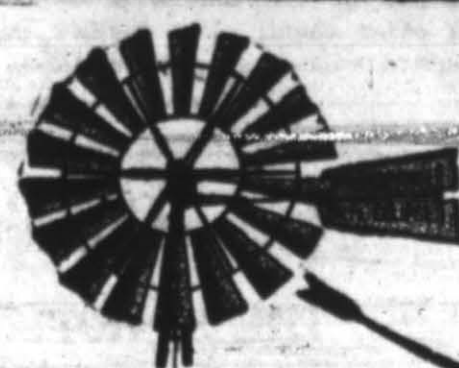

Whole Milk Industry
Proves Profitable One

The whole milk industry is proving profitable for S. O. Wilson, Deaf Smith country farmer, who lives just south of Hereford. Mr. Wilson is milking eighteen cows and his returns from the sale of whole milk is better than \$10 per day.

Mr. Wilson is practicing the diversified farming program and is actually making a go of it. He has 100 White Leghorn hens and is getting better than 100 eggs each day. He plans to brood out some 500 this year and Mrs. Wilson is raising a big crop of turkeys to help fatten the bank roll.

A little over twelve months ago Mr. Wilson secured four good brood sows. He butchered a number of hogs last fall for his meat supply and sold several pigs to Club boys over the county and has already marketed \$400 worth of hogs since the first of the year. This is a fairly good record for this man when you consider that he still has his four brood sows and some thirty "head of shoats" in his pens right now.

Mr. Wilson believes in the idea of better livestock as is shown by the fact that he is a member of one of the pure-bred Jersey bull circles, which was recently formed in Deaf Smith county, and Mr. Wilson has a few registered cows, so that he can build the right kind of a herd.

He will farm nearly 200 acres during the coming season and will stake his chances on a number of crops. He also plans to feed the grain he raises and will practice the live-at-home plans twelve months of the year.

What's Doing In West Texas

Lamesa—An association to foster expansion, betterment and advertisement of Highway No. 83 between Fort Worth and El Paso, the short line, was formed at a meeting of some 250 delegates and visitors of towns on this route here recently. The name of the association is to be conferred by a directorate of fifteen selected during the session. The formation of the Highway Association

marks a monumental step in the Lamesa territory.

San Antonio—Traffic experts of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce are at work on an analysis of the recent decision handed down by the Interstate Commerce Commission with reference to what is known as the Common Point Freight Case. Should the official ruling be considered of sufficient importance by West Texas officials a report of the order in full will be made at the annual convention to be held in Wichita Falls May 16 and 17, and the convention will be asked to take such action as is

necessary for requirements.

Canyon—Randall county's \$250,000 paving bond issue has been sold and the county has been granted state and federal aid by the State Highway Commission to the amount of two-thirds of the cost of paving between Canyon and Amarillo. The exact route of the highway is to be chosen at once and work will begin at the earliest moment possible.

Sweetwater—The Board of City Development and city officials have already established their offices in the new \$30000 Municipal build-

ing of Sweetwater which is a combination auditorium of 2000 capacity and a city hall. The latter part is already completed while construction is still underway on the former portion of the structure.

Goldthwaite—Improvements have been made in Hotel Saylor here recently which was re-stocking exterior of the building.

Cross Plains—Excavation work on the foundations for two new school buildings has been completed here and construction work proper is under way. The grade and high school structures, costing over \$400,000, will be ready for occupancy in the fall.

Odessa—Due to increased business at the local postoffice, considerable expansion is being made in the Odessa quarters. Second class recognition is expected before the first of the year.

Carlsbad, N. M.—The east side of Canyon Street here has recently been changed completely in appearance with new buildings, remodelings and improvements distributed along the main business block.

Quanah—Quanah will be 1928 host to the Green Belt-Lower Panhandle district convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. It was decided at the 1927 meet held at Childress May 5.

Dimmitt—Joe Hastings of this place has established a new implement firm at Hereford. The plant will go under the name of Hastings and Harmon Company of Hereford, and will be housed in a modern brick building 50 by 140 feet.

A BETTER NATIONAL TUNE. BEVERIDGE AND PHILLIPS. WHEN BABIES TWIDDLE TOES. RAILROADS AND BUSES.

The "Star Spangled Banner" will continue to make Americans stand up. To do a thing well you must get excited about it. Socrates, greatest Greek teacher of oratory, said, "To convince others, be yourself convinced." There will be no improved "Star Spangled Banner" until real danger inspires somebody to produce the right song.

Albert J. Beveridge died last week, sixty-four years old, of heart disease. An automobile stops when the engine stops; a man when his heart stops. One hundred men understand a motor engine for one that knows his own heart. There is no "resale price on a second-hand heart, and heart disease is increasing as consumption diminishes. Doctors can cure many disease, but you must cure your own heart, once you have been warned.

Beveridge and David Graham Phillips were school mates in Indiana, and represented their state well, Phillips in literature, Beveridge in national politics. Both are gone. It is "entirely illogical" as some say, to hope that they have met again, or is it, as others say, "a perfectly reasonable hope?"

A Young Women's Christian Association committee says: "The modern wife who works after marriage and continues to bring money into the home is the best type of young wife, better than the young wife who sits at home twiddling her thumbs."

Real wives can testify that there is little time at home twiddling thumbs, especially after the first baby begins to twiddle its toes. Every young man ought to be able to support one woman and proud to do it, while she takes care of the children. Working wives, respectable and admirable, should not be necessary.

This community treats the Mississippi problem as a poor man treats his farm, never spending enough to get it in good shape. Scores of millions have been spent on patch work against flood danger. The danger to the railroads is a small, ridiculous-looking thing on four wheels, running along the highway, paralleling the highway on a "right of way" that costs the motor omnibus and motor truck nothing but the price of their li-

cense. Every day four motor buses leave Los Angeles carrying passengers to Chicago. That doesn't amount to much. But they can carry twice as many passengers as there are on this magnificent Santa Fe "Chief" express. And the bus overhead is one man driving and another man to relieve him.

Omnibus travel is uncomfortable travel and will never compete with the express train. But WHAT ABOUT THE FLYING MACHINE that will soon be here?

And what about freight hauling by omnibus? On the Mojave Desert farmers buying agricultural machinery from Los Angeles do not ask the railroad to carry it.

The farmer calls up the truck line at Victorville. The freight motor truck delivers the mowing machine, plow or seed drill right in the farmer's barn yard. The freight bus costs a little more per hundred than the freight train. But what you order today you get tomorrow, and it is delivered at your door.

ABOUT DIET.

If the American people haven't been "fed up" on diet for the past decade, then there is nothing in what we see. Almost every magazine, newspaper or other candidate for the patronage of the reading public, has a special dietary counsel who dishes up the most fascinating technicalities about calories, proteins, carbohydrates, hydrocarbons, vitamins, A, B, and C. You are told that milk is all the food necessary for human life's sustenance; the working man knows better. You are told that any sort of meat is deadly, and must not be eaten, if you would live long. Some tell you that you should live on raw carrots, raw turnips, raw string beans, raw green corn—such advice is about as raw as the fellow who attempts to carry it out.

I know of an advertising charlatan who is reaping a financial harvest, using the "diet racket." People fall for it by the hundreds and, until they realize that they are stung. Folks, especially those of the "simpler sort, say, "I know there's a diet for every complaint that'll cure it if we could just find it out." Recently a "practical" nurse told me "I ain't a doctor, nor I ain't a graduate of any school, but I know that's the best treatment for this girl." "Please tell me how you know it," I asked; and for the life of her, she couldn't tell, not being a doctor nor a graduate nurse. A rough Missouri farmer once told me that he "cured himself by eating two cans of oysters at one sitting—just after the doctor had called and had told him he must not have solid food! And that farmer had about as much sense on dietary matters as the charlatans who tell you that a man can perform heavy manual labor on three quarts of milk a day. When shall common sense take the place of technical fooleries?

Prove all things; hold fast to that which is good.

Queer Quirks in Human Destiny

Russia Founded by Pirates

THE Empire of Russia was founded by pirates who had been invited by the citizens of Novgorod to defend them against other pirates.

Novgorod, in the north of Russia, was a republic, and for many years one of the mightiest cities of the earth. Its position was unique. Surrounded on all sides by tribes of barbarians who roamed over the vast plains of two continents, Novgorod alone of all settlements of Scythians attained a degree of civilization. Its neighbors were peoples who drank the blood of their enemies, scalped them, and used their scalps as napkins, and who ate the flesh of their parents.

The organized strength of Novgorod enabled the city to extend its rule over thousands of square miles and to exact tribute from tribes as far distant as the Ural mountains. The city enjoyed a wide commerce, sending goods eastward to Persia and India, south to Constantinople, and west to lands along the Baltic. It was this western commerce that suffered from the raids of the fierce Scandinavian pirates. Their attacks on the traders of Novgorod soon threatened to ruin their western commerce.

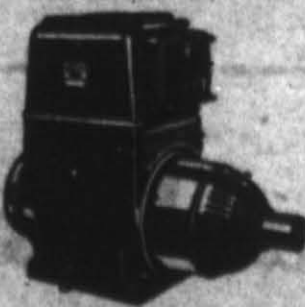
Then it was that Novgorod in the year 862 struck a bargain with three Varangian brothers, Rurik, Sinfar and Truvor. The Varangians were engaged in piracy in a small but enterprising way and were accomplished warriors.

They now gave up that calling and settled on the western border of Russia to defend the commerce of Novgorod against their kinsmen. Victorious against the foes of Russia, they turned their arms against their allies and so harassed them that Novgorod eventually invited Rurik to become its king.

Rurik died after fifteen years on the throne and left a four-year-old son and heir with Oleg, a kinsman, as regent.

He took to an iron grip the dominion of his ward. Oleg acquired Kiev and pressed on to Constantinople, where he levied a great ransom against that city. For three centuries thereafter Kiev was capital of all Russia, the empire founded by the Varangian pirates.

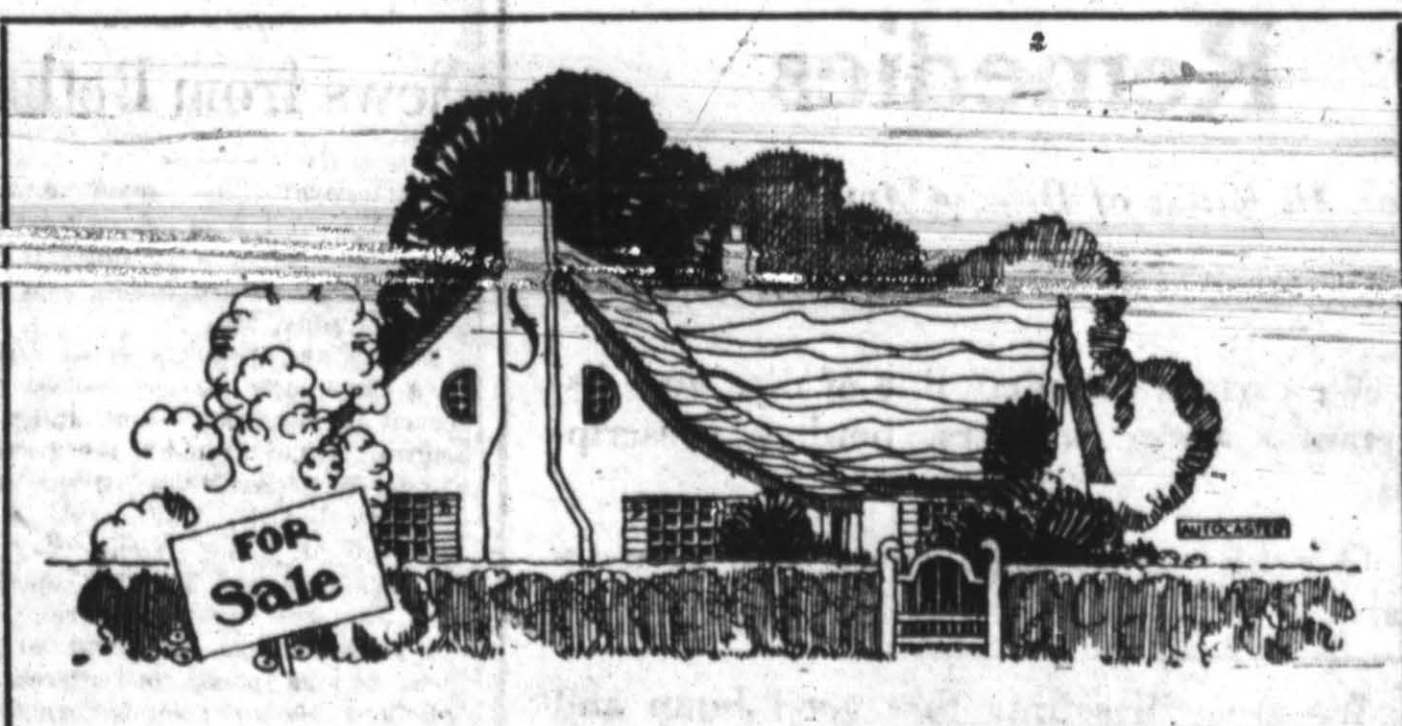

such cases as may be specified except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall also have power, upon affidavit or otherwise, as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction.

The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capital for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.

The present statutes defining the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court not in conflict herewith shall continue in effect until repealed or altered by the Legislature.

The Supreme Court shall appoint a Clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years, and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said Court, and who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide.

Section 4 (of Article V): The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of three judges, provided that the Legislature may increase the number to five, and a majority

of the Judges shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of a majority of the Judges shall be necessary to the decision of any case.

Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Judges of the Supreme Court.

They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State, at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years.

The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their terms of office under the present Constitution and laws.

Section 5 (of Article V): The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction co-extensive with the limits of the State in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, and the Legislature may confer original jurisdiction upon it to issue writs of mandamus, procedo and certiorari in criminal cases.

The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus and, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction.

The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have the power, upon affidavit or otherwise, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction.

Said Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capital for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by it.

Said Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the Court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said Court, and said Clerk shall receive such compensation as may be prescribed by law.

Section 6 (of Article V): The Legislature shall, from time to time, divide the State into such number of Supreme Judicial Districts as to it may seem necessary, not exceeding twelve at any one time, and shall have the power to re-divide the State at any time and shall establish a Court of Civil Appeals in each of said Districts, which Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and not less than two Associate Justices as the Legislature may provide, who shall have the qualifications as herein prescribed for Justices of the Supreme Court, provided that the aggregate number of Judges of all the Courts of Civil Appeals shall never at one time exceed thirty-six.

Each of the existing Courts of Civil Appeals shall continue until otherwise provided by law.

The Courts of Civil Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction co-extensive with the limits of their respective districts, which shall extend to all civil cases of which the District Courts or County Courts have original or appellate jurisdiction, under such restrictions and regulations as may be prescribed by the Legislature and at such times as may be prescribed by law.

Said Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of their respective districts, at a general election, for a term of six years, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law.

Said Courts shall have such other jurisdiction, original and appellate, as may be prescribed by law.

Each Court of Civil Appeals shall appoint a Clerk in the same manner as the Clerk of the Supreme Court, which Clerk shall receive such compensation as may be fixed by law.

The Judges of the Courts of Civil Appeals who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their present terms of office or appointment.

Section 7 (of Article V): The State shall be divided into as many Judicial Districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law.

For each district, there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a general election, a Judge, who shall hold his office for a term of four years, and shall receive for his services such compensation as may be prescribed by law.

He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

The Legislature shall have power, by general or special laws, to authorize the holding of special terms of the court or the holding of more than two terms in any County for the dispatch of business.

The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause, disabled or disqualified from presiding.

The Supreme Court or the Chief Justice thereof may assign any District Judge to any District in the State other than that for which he was elected, with all the powers of a resident District Judge of the District to which he is assigned under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, or by the Supreme Court in the absence of such regulations enacted by the Legislature.

The District Judges who may be in office when the amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their re-

spective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in August A. D. 1927 at which each voter opposing said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with pen or pencil the following words printed thereon:

"For the amendment to the State Constitution amending Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V, of the Constitution of Texas for the purpose of providing a more efficient judicial system;" and each voter favoring said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner, the following words printed thereon:

"Against the amendment to the State Constitution amending Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V, of the Constitution of Texas for the purpose of providing a more efficient judicial system."

If it shall appear from a return of said election that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of said amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this resolution.

and the Constitution and laws of this State; and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the required vote of the qualified electors of this State the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

Sec. 4. The sum of twelve thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for publication of the proclamation calling said election and any expense of the State in submitting said amendment and holding said election.

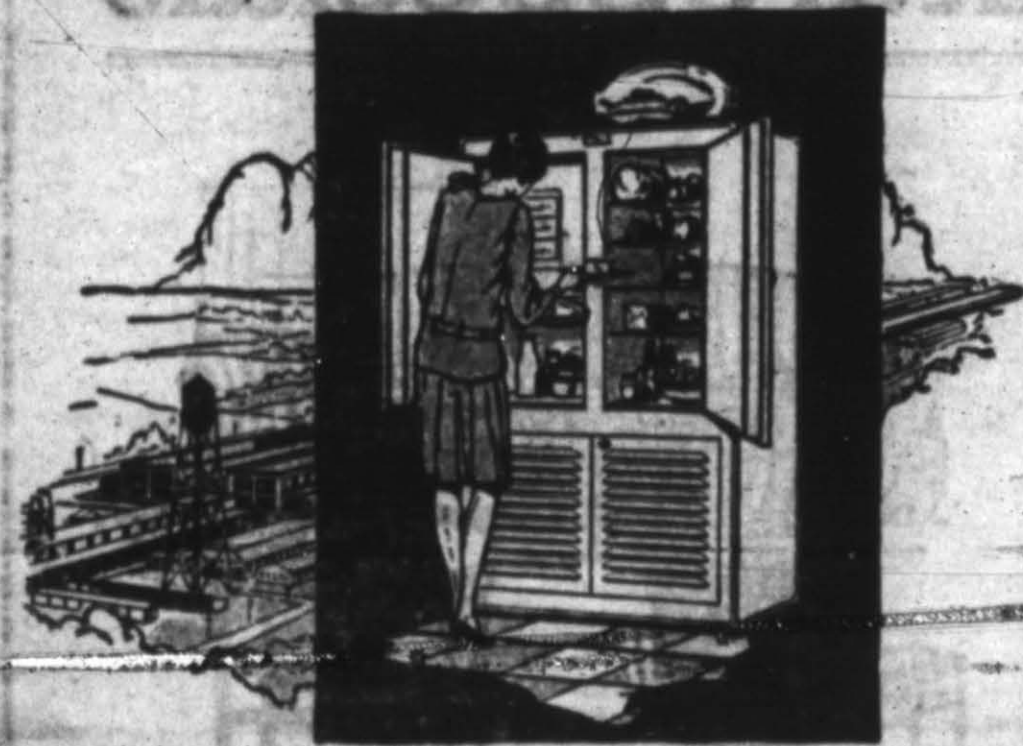

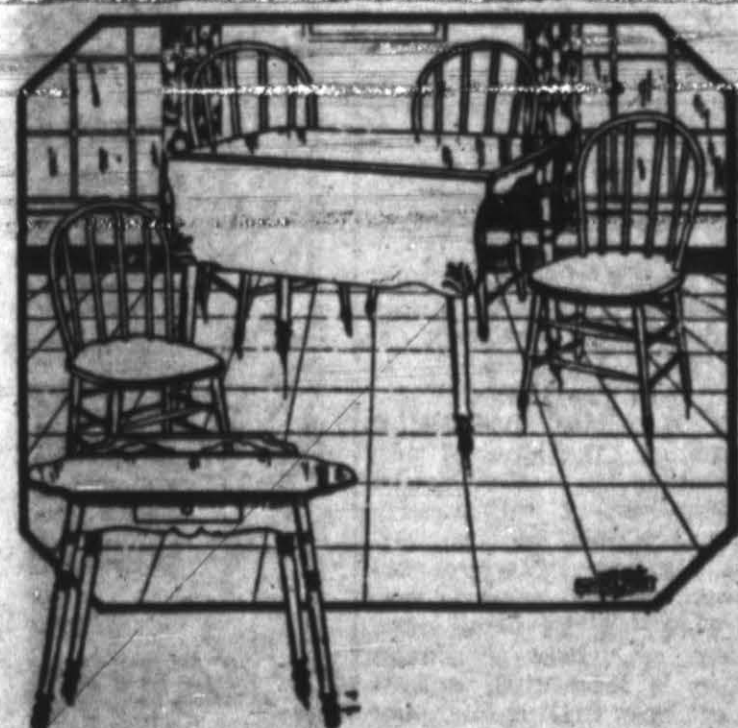
