"A Night in Tripoli," "Old Gray Mare," and "E Pluribus Unum" were the three pieces played in the McCamey contest by the Crane Band.

Prizes went to Fort Stockton, \$35, first place; Crane, \$25, second place; and McCamey, \$15, third place.

The judge was the bandmaster of the Midland High School Band.

Entire Faculty Broadcasts Crane Activities to Trans-Pecos Teachers Group Meet at Alpine April 26, 27

Bankston's Speech and Festive Banquet Featured

Crane high school's newly adopted, unique system of sending achievement and guidance reports in place of A. B. C. cards to students was explained to the Trans-Pecos division of the Texas State Teachers association meeting at Alpine Saturday morning, April 27. Much interest was displayed by the entire group in the local grading or student-achievement system. Dr. Fred C. Ayer, Texas University professor, and leading authority on high school curriculum, commended the Crane school system for being the first to institute the method.

Mr. Bankston was appointed to the executive committee of the division by Supt. A. M. Blakemore, McCamey, president.

Superintendents of Texas west of the Pecos were given a chance to question Mr. Bankston in a special meeting of the department of superintendence at Sul Ross College on Saturday afternoon when merits and faults of the system were discussed. Most of the administrators were inclined to favor the idea.

Banquet is Feature
Friday evening at seven o'clock, all teachers of Crane schools honored with a banquet at the Holland Hotel the following guests: Dr. Ayer; Mr. Bickley, state examiner of schools; and Mrs. Bickley; Dr. Morelock, president of Sul Ross; and Mrs. Morelock.

At the banquet it was revealed that Supt. Bankston has a tendency to take things that do not belong to him. For instance, in Atlantic City at the national meeting of the Department of Superintendence, it was reported that he tried to get off with a man's overcoat, hat and shoes, and kept the articles practically half a day before being caught.

Crane's elected English and journalism instructor, C. H. S. was elected (because he was not known, he declares), secretary and treasurer of the English teachers of the meeting. Mrs. Winters of Fort Stockton high school is president of the group. Miss Dorothy Riley, Crane librarian, made a talk on correlation of the library and English departments in high schools, giving as examples the work that is being done in the local plant. Mr. Underwood talked on correlation of high school journalism and English departments, and told some of the C. H. S. methods in use at the present time.
