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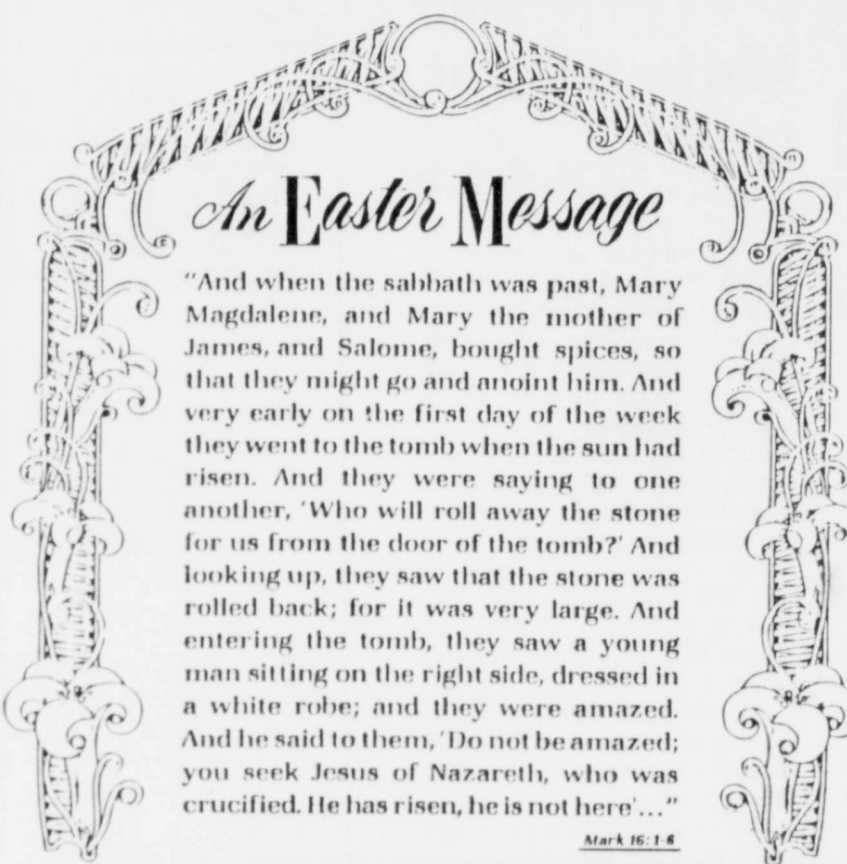

Elections...

Armstrong, Bassham, Craddock, Morris elected to hospital board

Preston Morris, Marion Bassham, Jay Craddock and Gus Armstrong were elected to the Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors Saturday from a field of eight candidates.

Bassham received 853 votes in the three-box total followed by Jay Craddock with 695, Morris with 693 and Armstrong with 623.

Morris was the only incumbent. The other three places are currently held by Bobby Lemons, board president; Herbert Mearse and Glenn Hemphill who chose not to seek re-election.

The other candidates and the total votes they received included Rhonda Slater, 283; Lee Woods, 520; Virgil Stone, 560; Marie Jackson, 541.

The total votes cast in the Colorado City box included Slater,

209; Morris, 434; Woods, 374; Bassham, 593; Stone, 397; Armstrong, 366; Jackson, 373; and Craddock, 530.

In Loraine, Slater received 61; Morris, 202; Woods, 117; Bassham, 202; Stone, 126; Armstrong, 229; Jackson, 119; and Craddock, 130.

In Westbrook, Slater received 13; Morris, 57; Woods, 29; Bassham, 58; Stone, 37; Armstrong, 28; Jackson, 49; and Craddock, 35.

Colorado City Council

Colorado City voters elected three council members and a mayor during Saturday's election.

Mayor Elmer Martin was re-elected to a two-year term with 424 votes in an uncontested race.

Elected to the two-year council positions were Tom Carlock with 435 votes; Don Webb with 375; and

Dee Hearn (incumbent) with 370 votes. The only other candidate was Jack Green who received 288 votes. The other two council positions were held by Dr. Don Bennett who chose not to seek re-election and by Ray Mason who resigned the position several months ago after being named administrator of Root Memorial Hospital.

There were a total of 449 votes cast in the election.

Colorado ISD

Incumbent Dr. Billy Bridgford and Kathy Bassham were elected to two three-year terms on the Colorado Independent School District board of trustees Saturday. Ronnie Aston was elected to a one-year unexpired term left vacant by the resignation of Dr. Pat Thomas.

Historical marker planned

Colorado City's historic "standpipe" will officially be honored with a Texas historical marker during ceremonies at 2 p.m. Saturday, April 20.

The standpipe is located behind the Wallace Education Center on U.S. 208 South.

The water tank became operational in 1885 and made Colorado one of the most modern towns in West Texas. The standpipe still holds a reserve of water and its main lines remain buried beneath the ground 100 years after being installed.

The marker will be unveiled by 10-year-old Jeffrey and 9-year-old Gregory Conaway, sons of Mr. and Mrs. William Conaway of Westbrook. The boys' great-grandfather, H.F. "Ikie" McCorkle, was a longtime Colorado City water superintendent.

Speaker for the program will be J. A. Sadler Jr. city manager of Merkel and former Colorado City city manager.

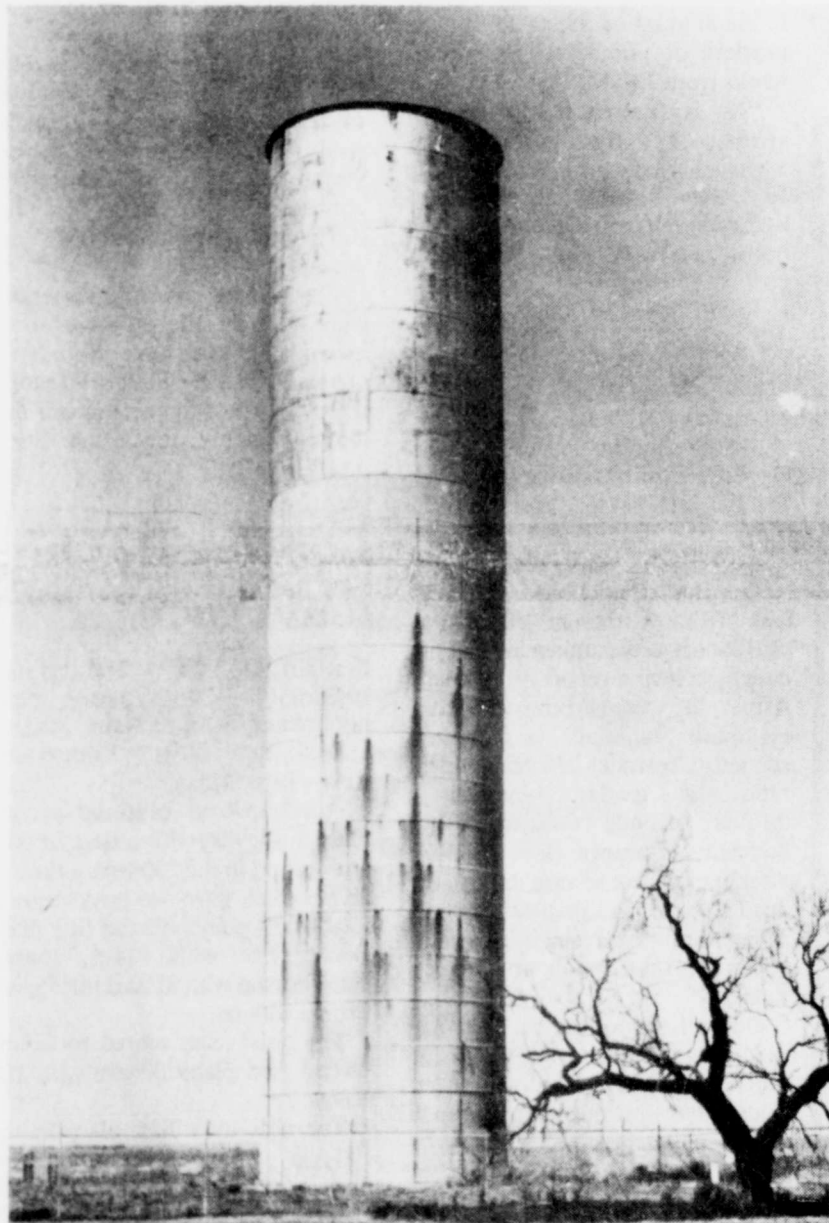
Others on the program who will make remarks are Mayor Elmer Martin, City Manager Brenda Tarter and historian Lee Jones Jr.

The invocation will be given by Gary Dennis, minister of the 22nd and Austin Streets Church of Christ.

Funds for the historical marker were provided by the Mitchell County Oldtimers' Association.

The public is cordially invited to attend the ceremony.

The historical marker is the result of efforts by Mrs. Margaret Oyer, Jones and Jim Baum. Mrs. Oyer's

father was H. F. McCorkle and she recalls that she grew up "in the shadow of the standpipe."

The inscription on the historical marker reads:

"In response to the need for a water supply system for Colorado, as this town was then known, the city's governing body issued water-work bonds in 1884. The bond

money was used to build this standpipe to lay mains through which the city's water supply could run. The 90-foot steel standpipe was erected in 1884 by Riter and Conley of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and continues in use as a storage facility for emergency water needs. The

Other action items on the agenda include payment of bills; advertise bids press box; long range plans gifted/talented program; refinish Wolf Gym floor; amend 1984-85 official budget; school board policies; teacher/other personnel contract renewal; and financial

Main Street project explained

Revitalization and historical preservation of the downtown area was the subject of a meeting held Wednesday at the Civic Center.

Mark Watson, city manager of Stamford, and James Butts, Main Street project manager of that town, told how Stamford has benefited from over two years of revitalization work accomplished through the Texas Main Street Program.

They related that the city of 4,500 has benefited from \$2.3 million spent on building rehabilitation, new construction totaling \$1.7 million, business or building acquisitions amounting to \$839,500 and \$1 million worth of new business inventories.

A project of the Texas Historical Commission, the Main Street program in Stamford has resulted in more than 50 renovation projects, 19 business starts or expansions

and the creation of approximately 77 new jobs. Also, since 1983, Stamford's sales tax figures have steadily increased showing a healthy, growing business climate, the Stamford officials related.

Watson urged Colorado City to apply for Main Street status, explaining that five cities are selected each year as official Main Street towns. He suggested that even if not selected, to consider becoming an unofficial Main Street town.

Watson said the program is a commitment "to determine what is in the best interest of your city." He said the project has helped build a positive image and raise the self esteem of Stamford.

Butts explained that the Main Street project is a three-year program but that no state funds are received. The Texas Historical

development of the city's water services was a major factor in the town's survival in the dry west Texas area."

Mrs. Oyler says that efforts to obtain a historical marker for the standpipe began shortly after the town's centennial celebration and credits Jones and Baum for the many hours of research it took to compile the narrative which was sent to the Historical Commission.

The narrative reads:
COLORADO CITY STANDPIPE
"The Town of Colorado, Mitchell County, Texas was incorporated in 1882. The name of the Town was changed to Colorado City by a vote of its citizens in 1939.

"During 1882-1907 the fiscal affairs of the Town of Colorado were in a state of chaos and confusion due to litigation in both the Federal and State courts challenging the validity of, or attempting to compel the payment of, numerous bonds, scripts and warrants issued by it; and, during the same time period when the Town had no charter, a court appointed Receiver was in

charge of its fiscal affairs.

"Prior to January 3, 1884, several abortive attempts were made by the Colorado-Seven Wells Waterworks Company, an association of prominent business men of Colorado and Mitchell County, to supply the Town of Colorado with water from Seven Wells, about six miles to the Southeast, or from artesian water wells to be drilled nearby.

"The City Council, or the Board of Aldermen, as the case may have been, felt the need of a water system to supply the City of Colorado with water and provide fire protection, and on January 3, 1884, issued waterworks bonds in the amount of \$45,000.00, and with the proceeds, erected a standpipe Southeast of Colorado and laid the mains which later supplied the City with water. These bonds were signed by William Martin, Mayor and by Ed Curd, City Clerk.

Frontier Financing

"Litigation involving the validity of these bonds, the subsequent mutation and final payment thereof, and the recurring diversity of ownership or control of the waterworks constitute a classic example of frontier financing, but a narrative in detail would serve no useful purpose and result in disproportionate allocation of space.

The Standpipe

"According to Colorado municipal records, and to a metal name plate still attached thereto, a 90-foot steel standpipe was erected in 1884 by the firm of Riter & Conley of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania on a foundation laid in late 1883 by D. C. Byrne, a Colorado, Texas independent contractor.

The Waterworks

"The Colorado waterworks, consisting of a standpipe, a boiler

fueled by coal, a steam engine, pumps, water wells and water mains, was tested on or about October 24, 1885 and found functional. During the months of November and December, 1885, revenue from the sale of water totaled \$506.86. On April 14, 1886, the City Council authorized and directed the payment of bills for coal and the freight thereon; and, on April 21, 1886 elected I. W. Guyton superintendent of the waterworks. On August 6, 1887, Guyton or his successor, who may have been H. N. Hickley, reported that the standpipe then was "in every respect as good as the day it was finished."

"On April 12, 1888, the City Council voted to accept the offer of J. N. Fletcher and H. C. Caldwell to lease the waterworks for 2 years (April 1, 1888-March 31, 1890) but, on January 15, 1891, Fletcher appeared before the City Council and stated that it was the desire and wish of the firm of Caldwell & Fletcher to turn the waterworks over to the Council and the Council accepted.

"During October, 1893, R. L. Boren, Receiver tried to buy back the waterworks, but the deal fell through. On August 6, 1894, the Waterworks Committee was authorized to proceed at once to employ men and a superintendent for the purpose of improving the waterworks system subject, however, to an agreement with R. L. Boren, Receiver to refund the amount spent in the event the City failed to purchase the Waterworks from Jas. M. Bell. At and during a special meeting of the City Council on August 27, 1894, it was unanimously agreed to issue bonds in the amount of \$5,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing the waterworks from Jas. M. Bell.

"It is common knowledge, verified by the current City Manager, that as of September 1, 1984, the old standpipe belonged to Colorado City, Texas and was still being used to store water for possible emergencies."

votes, Bobbie Graham with 144 and Roy Price with 117. They beat out incumbents Joel Ray Atkins with 107, Rick Rickard with 98 and Kent Boyd with 102. The only other candidate was Wendell Banks who received 38 votes.

Loraine ISD

Frank Garcia was elected to a one-year unexpired term on the Loraine Independent School District board of trustees with 225 votes in an uncontested race Saturday.

Elected to two three-year terms

were incumbent Danny Butler with 219 votes and Donnie Phillips with 260 votes. The only other candidate was Richard Cooper who received 124 votes.

A total of 330 votes were cast in the election.

Westbrook ISD

Larry Casey and Donnie Hale were re-elected to the Westbrook Independent School District board of trustees during Saturday's election in uncontested races. Each received 57 votes. A total of 62 votes were cast in the election.

Commission oversees the project and trains the project manager who becomes an employee of the city. The Commission provides a free market study and a resource team makes recommendations and helps establish goals. There is also free architectural assistance and a weekly newsletter keeps up with all the Main Street projects.

Butts said that he operates on an annual \$25,000 budget but that the program is almost paying for itself due to increased sales tax receipts.

They explained that only five cities are selected each year from about 20 that apply. There are 16-17 unofficial cities doing their own projects.

Mrs. Virginia Fuller, who owns a building on the square in Stamford, attended the meeting and commended the project.

The Stamford officials presented a slide show that gave a before and after look of many of the downtown buildings that had undergone exterior renovation.

They said the project involves four areas of work including organization, design (building renovation, cleanup, improving visual look of the downtown), economic restructuring (including recruiting new businesses) and promotion.

City Manager Brenda Tarter and Mayor Elmer Martin were at the meeting and said they will study the matter further before deciding whether or not to recommend that the city apply for Main Street status.

ROBERT LEE - The Loraine Bulldogs boys took fourth place honors and the girls team captured second place in the Robert Lee Relays here Friday.

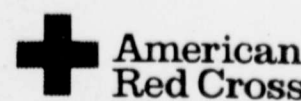

Her husband will eat casseroles, so she usually prepares a casserole and puts half in the freezer and then warms it up when they are busy.

Desserts are Mrs. Watlington's favorite things to prepare and she likes to try new recipes and experiments with them.

She cooks from scratch when she has time.

With desserts being Mrs. Watlington's favorite thing to make sometimes the unexpected can happen.

"After Larry Don and I married, his birthday came up. I had his parents and some more relatives over for supper.

"I made a Red Velvet Cake for his birthday and we were ready to eat it.

"We cut the cake and it was real gummy and gooey. I guess it didn't bake long enough, but it had been in the oven 30 minutes longer than it was supposed to be.

"Everyone said it was good and ate, but I knew it was terrible."

Mrs. Watlington and her husband, Larry Don, have one son, Matt, who is four.

Today she is sharing four of her recipes with RECORD readers.

HAMBURGER CASSEROLE

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1-16 oz. can of Pork & Beans
- 1/4 cup barbecue sauce
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon instant minced onion
- 2 cups shredded cheese
- 1 can biscuits

Pre-heat oven to 375 degrees.

Brown beef, drain. Stir in salt, Pork & Beans, sauce, brown sugar, minced onion. Heat until bubbly, then pour in a 2 quart casserole dish. Cut biscuits in half to form two half circles. Place cut side down around edge of casserole dish. Then sprinkle cheese over the biscuits. Bake at 375 for 25 to 30 minutes or until biscuits are golden brown.

COUNTY BEEF PIE

- 1/2 cup tomato sauce
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- One-eighth teaspoon pepper
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- One-eighth teaspoon oregano

Mix all and pat mixture into bottom of greased 9" pie pan, flute edge.

FILLING

- 1 1/2 cup instant rice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup water
- 1 1/2 cups tomato sauce
- Mix and bake at 350 degrees till done. Add cheese on top.

BROWNIES

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/4 cup cocoa
- 1 cup melted oleo
- 4 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Mix together. Bake at 350 for 35 minutes in 11x16 pan. As baking

mix together:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 cup cocoa
- 2 tablespoons white corn syrup
- 1/4 cup oleo
- One-eighth teaspoon salt

Cook to soft ball stage. Cool to lukewarm. Add powdered sugar--spread on hot brownies.

CRACKER JACKS

- 1/2 pound butter
 - 2 cups brown sugar
 - 1/2 cup corn syrup
- Boil and cook for 5 minutes, stirring constantly.

After cooking, beat in 1/2 teaspoon soda, dash of cream of tartar, pinch of salt. Pour over 6 quarts of popcorn. Stir and bake at 200 degrees for 1 hour. Stir every 15 minutes.

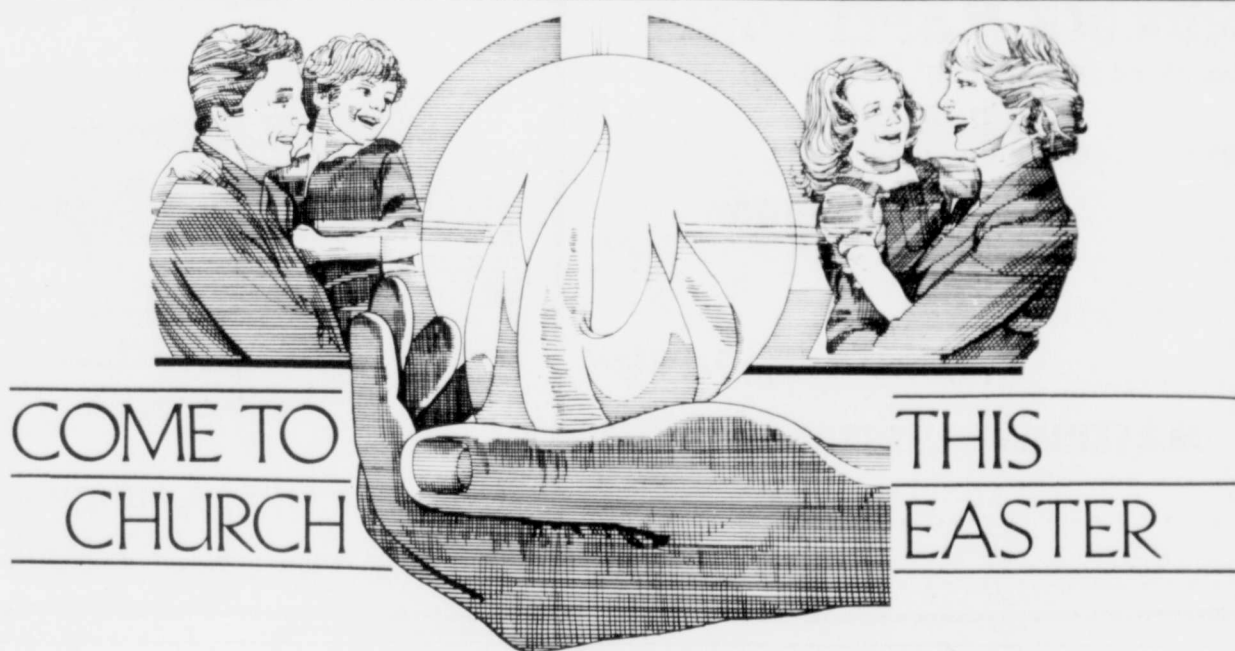

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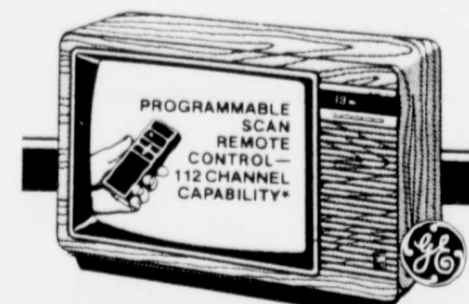
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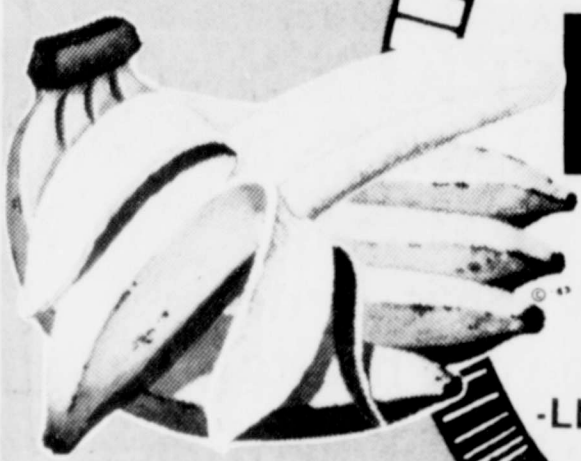

Sale of state-owned gas aids fund

We recently made available state-owned gas to the City of Corpus Christi on a short-term contract with the General Land Office, saving the utility customers in that city \$1.7 million over the next nine months.

Using a little-known legal option that allows the state to take its royalties in gas on state leases for oil and gas, the state is making that gas available to Central Power and

Light of Corpus Christi at a price of \$2.80 per mcf (thousand cubic feet). Customers in that city currently pay \$3.448 per mcf from the other suppliers.

This common sense method of receiving payment of oil and gas leases by the state will also put \$7.2 million in cash into the Permanent School Fund, instead of \$5.6 million under the private contract. And, we will receive an additional \$2.9 million for the general revenue

fund in cash—a total of \$4.5 million in nine months for the state.

With our current fiscal crisis in state government, the Land Office is getting the most out of our assets through sound management.

Through these aggressive management tactics we have achieved other savings in the past. In 1983, most state agencies were buying gas on the retail market at \$5 per mcf, while gas produced on state land was being sold for \$2.75 per mcf.

So, when I pointed this out to the Legislature, they included in an appropriations rider a directive that state agencies determine whether there was state gas available at a price lower than their respective contracts called for on the retail market.

The results include the following:

—Southwest Texas State University was buying gas at \$4.95 per mcf, but when the General Land Office offered them gas at \$3.54 per mcf, Entex, the university's com-

mercial supplier, matched this offer, resulting in a savings of \$1.1 million over a sixteen-month period.

—The University of Texas at Austin renegotiated its gas contract with Valero earlier this year after a similar offer of state gas was made, thus achieving a one-year savings of \$6 million.

—In 1983, the state signed a long-term contract with the City of San Antonio that increased state revenues by \$11,132,500 the first year. Over the next four years the contract will bring in \$12 million for the state and save San Antonio consumers \$25 million.

The General Land Office is also negotiating with the University of Houston for a contract that could save the university about \$1.4 million a year if the offer is accepted. Other entities we are negotiating with for the sale of state gas include Texas A&M University, the Texas Department of Corrections and the Capitol area complex, as well as other state agencies located in Austin.

This is the kind of common sense resource management by the General Land Office that can serve as a partial solution to the state's fiscal problems—this revenue comes at a time when the state is hard pressed to meet the demands of the state government's day to day operating expenses.

Easter 'goodies' should be properly cooked, cared for

Hard-cooked eggs and ham are familiar foods that get special treatment at Easter. It's this "special treatment" of decorating and hiding Easter eggs or serving a fresh ham for a large family gathering that raises questions about food safety.

Here are some commonly asked

questions about food safety for these Easter treats:

Q: Is it safe to eat the hard-cooked eggs used in an Easter egg hunt?

A: Yes, but they must be handled properly. First, cool hard-cooked eggs in cold water immediately after cooking and then refrigerate until cool all the way through. If any eggs crack while cooking, don't use them for the hunt since bacteria can

easily get through the openings and contaminate the eggs.

When you plan the hiding and hunting of Easter eggs, remember that they should not be out of the refrigerator for more than two hours.

Q: How long will hard-cooked eggs keep in the refrigerator?

A: Hard-cooked eggs in the shell should be used within one week.

Use eggs with cracked shells or those with the shell removed within one day.

Q: Is there any danger of trichinosis from hams?

A: If you choose a fully cooked ham, there is no danger. They are specially processed according to USDA guidelines to kill trichinae organisms. These hams are ready to eat without further cooking.

If you choose a fresh ham, take extra care in preparation. Cook the fresh ham until the center reaches a temperature of 170 degrees F. To make sure this temperature is reached, insert a meat thermometer in the thickest part of the cut, not touching the bone or fat.

Q: How long can ham be safely refrigerated?

A: Uncured ham will keep in the

refrigerator from three to five days. It will keep in the freezer from four to eight months.

Cured ham will keep in the refrigerator for one week. Leftover cooked ham that is tightly wrapped and refrigerated one to two hours after cooking will keep four to five days. Both uncooked and leftover ham can be kept in the freezer up to two months before losing flavor and texture.

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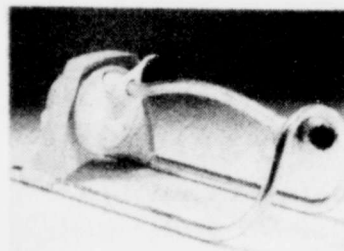

Wise shoppers can save by watching advertisements

A wise consumer shops carefully and watches advertising for bargains on items that are needed or desired. However, some advertising may be misleading.

In particular there is a form of advertising called "Distress Sale" advertising. All of us have seen advertising which tells of some natural disaster, unfortunate event, or unforeseen development which necessitates a quick sale at reduced prices.

One example of this type of advertising is a "Fire" sale. In the event of a fire, businesses sometimes are forced to liquidate inventory rapidly because of damage to the inventory or a lack of storage space. Many times the price has been greatly reduced to speed this process, and consumers can get a real bargain. However, there have been instances of businesses advertising a "Fire" sale when there has been no fire and the prices of the goods have not been lowered significantly. Consumers who have not familiarized themselves with general market prices of these goods in the local marketplace may be induced to buy something they may not otherwise have purchased because they thought they were getting a bargain.

Another similar type of advertising is the "Going Out of Business" sale. Here again, due to business failure, a company may be forced to sell its inventory at a greatly reduced price in order to move the goods quickly. Some businesses in the past have advertised a "Going Out of Business" sale when they never intended to cease doing business and did not significantly reduce prices.

A "Grand Opening" sale, though not the product of unfortunate circumstances, also means savings to many consumers. Stores, new to an area in order to build a clientele, will offer bargains. However, in some cases these sales

have been extended to the point that it becomes obvious that the prices are actually the prices normally charged for the particular items and the consumer realizes no real savings.

Other types of distress sales which have been legitimately used but also abused by some businessmen are "Flood" sales, "Hurricane" sales, "Tornado" sales, "Hail Damage" sales. All these terms lead the consumer to believe that, due to some event beyond the control of the businessman, prices have been reduced dramatically to facilitate the liquidation of inventory, thus providing the consumer with a genuine bargain.

The best way to protect yourself from the businesses which may use these terms falsely is to be familiar

with the prevailing prices of the brand names being offered in your area. Additionally, become informed about the actual occurrence of the event which caused the distressed situation through the media and by reading the daily newspaper. Finally, if it is a "Going Out of Business" sale, check with your City or County Tax Assessor and Collector to make sure that the business has made the filings required by law before this form of advertisement can be used.
