BEER-REVENUE BILL BEFORE CONGRESS

MOVES TO INHIBIT NEWS BROADCASTING

NEW YORK, March 14.—All broadcasting of United Press news will be prohibited if the House of Representatives passes its April meeting to support that policy, proposed by the other two major news organizations.

The other two major news organizations, the Associated Press and the International News Service, are following suit. Karl A. Brick, president of the United Press, said today in a letter to I. B. P. A. general manager of the P. A. club's letter follows:

Dear Mr. Palmer:

I am advised that at the annual meeting of the American Newspaper Publishers' association in New York next month an effort is made to solve the problem of proper relationship between newspapers and news broadcasting and to define what your association's attitude will be toward broadcasting of news by your members.

Years ago, upon the occasion of the first extended discussion of the question before an association of your organization, United Press association advised a letter to the A. N. P. A. declared its readiness to join your members in working out a program. This is in accordance with the interest and controlling interest of newspapers in your service.

To this time we have not proceeded our client newspapers who directly own radio stations who have control of time upon radio stations, from broadcasting United Press dispatches. We intend that no United Press dispatches be in connection with any advertising program. This is in accordance with the judgment of the committee of the American Newspaper Publishers' association, the United Press, at this time, to make its position in connection with the broadcasting of United Press news by client newspapers.

United Press is ready to proceed broadcasting of its news dispatches at any time the members of the American Newspaper Publishers' association vote to support that policy, provided that the two major news services also be problem of newspaper news broadcasting is primarily a news question. The newspapers' interest, through their national association, should determine the interests of the industry.

It is determined, the United Press is the fullest co-operation in the industry that the desires of newspapers are made effective.

Yarborough Gets 25 Years In His Trial For Murder

AUSTIN, March 14.—A district court jury today sentenced Cal B. Yarborough, 45-year-old Belton mechanic, to 25 years in the penitentiary on a charge of causing the fatal burning of his adopted daughter Doris, 15, last September.

The girl was fatally burned while helping Yarborough clean an automobile. Her clothes became ignited from spilled gasoline, and Yarborough threw a bucket of gasoline on her, thinking it was water, he said.

The prosecution had asked the death penalty.

PNEUMONIA IS BREAKING OUT IN QUAKE AREA

LOS ANGELES, March 14.—Possibility of a pneumonia epidemic today, overrode the fear of recurrent tremors in earthquake-stricken areas of California.

Sixteen pneumonia patients had been brought into hospitals and emergency receiving stations. Most of the victims were old people who had been sleeping on the damp ground in front of ruined homes.

Two aged women were found near death, too weak to call for aid. A younger woman, with a baby boy in her arms, was reached by ambulance crews. The boy had pneumonia, the mother cough pneumonia.

Ambulance drivers were instructed to inspect outdoor camps in front of Long Beach ruined homes.

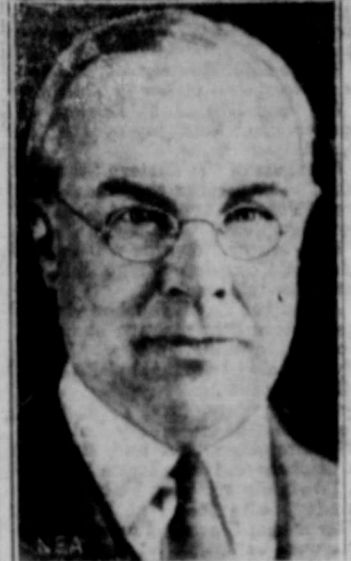
On the brighter side of the picture was the employment given today to almost 2,000 men assigned to the gigantic task of clearing the debris and tearing down menacing structures.

TEXAS MOVES TO REOPEN ALL BANKS IN STATE

AUSTIN, March 14.—With State Banking Commissioner James Shaw busy in his office with orders not to be disturbed, Texas was in a quandary today over its latest moratorium.

A proclamation issued by Shaw yesterday declared a moratorium on all financial institutions organized under state law other than banks and trust companies. Unofficial opinion here was that the proclamation would apply also to any loan or bond company that is normally under the supervision of the state banking department.

Texas moved forward today toward complete resumption of normal banking business, with the opening of state and national institutions in Houston, San Antonio, Fort Worth, El Paso, Galveston, Austin, Beaumont, Texarkana and Waco.

Many banks in other cities will end their banking holiday tomorrow as provided by federal and state regulations.

In Dallas and Fort Worth bankers were cheered by the confident response of the public. Deposits greatly exceeded withdrawals.

Senate Democrats Behind Roosevelt's Economy Move

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Senate Democrats, in caucus today, bound themselves to support President Roosevelt's \$500,000,000 economy bill, but left themselves free to vote as they please on amendments.

Under the agreement it appeared that Democrats could vote materially to reduce the potential saving proposed by the president.

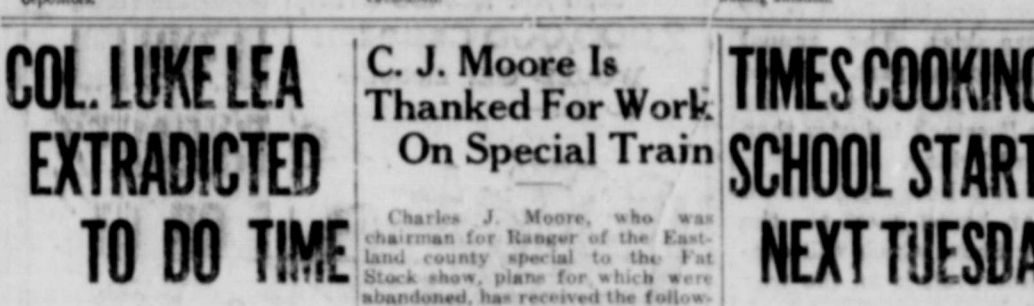
Here's How the New Money Will Get Into Circulation

COL. LUKE LEA EXTRADICTED TO DO TIME

CLARKSVILLE, Tenn., March 14.—Col. Luke Lea and his son, Luke, Jr., Nashville, Tenn., publishers, were arrested here today by Sheriff Laurence Brown of North Carolina, on an extradition warrant issued by Gov. Hill McAlister of Tennessee.

The Leas are under sentences in North Carolina on conviction of conspiracy to defraud the Central Bank and Trust company of Asheville, N. C., of \$1,300,000.

Col. Lea, former United States senator and a decorated army officer in the world war, is under sentence to serve from four to six years and his son to serve from four to five years or pay a \$25,000 fine.

They fought extradition to North Carolina after the United States supreme court denied an appeal for a reversal of their conviction. The Leas disappeared two days before the governor granted the extradition request.

1931 Saw Many Murders In Texas

AUSTIN, March 14.—Thirteen railroad passenger coaches would be required to carry the victims of murders in Texas each year, according to figures released by the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas state department of health. In 1931 782 persons were murdered in Texas and it is likely that the 1932 figures will show an increase. The average passenger coach contains accommodations for 60 people.

In 1931 the ages of the victims ranged from under 1 years to 95 years, with the peak in the age group 25 to 29 years. One-half of the total number of homicides were among those 20 to 40 years of age, the prime of life. Firearms were used in 68 per cent of the murders.

Suicides claimed 725 Texans during the same year. These deaths occurred between the ages 10 to 95 with the peak among those 25 to 29 years of age. The peak in suicides is not as sharply defined as among murders. Suicides between the ages 20 and 60 are fairly evenly distributed, 70 per cent of the total occurring in that group. Firearms were used in 50 per cent of the deaths.

The suicide rate in Texas has advanced steadily since 1923, when the number was 223 deaths. The year 1931 was an increase of 325 per cent in nine years. The depression cannot be held wholly responsible for this increase as some of the years of increase include some of the most prosperous years in the history of Texas.

Buggy Theft Puzzle To City Police

FORT WORTH, March 14.—Police here are looking for a new type of a criminal, a thief who stole a buggy.

The thief was the first of its kind in 10 years. E. C. McChel hand, owner of the vehicle, valued it at \$6. No reward was offered.

ACTION MAY BE TAKEN BY LATE TODAY

Texas May Get Beer By August Is Opinion of the Wet Leaders.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—The House of Representatives this afternoon passed the 3.2 per cent beer-for-revenue bill. Texas congressmen voting against the measure were Blanton, Johnson and Jones.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—A beer-for-revenue bill, legalizing 3.2 per cent alcoholic content, was taken up for action today by the house. A vote was assured at the conclusion of three hours debate.

The bill would go into effect 15 days after being signed by President Roosevelt. Leaders were certain it would be written soon into the laws of the United States, perhaps before the end of this week.

The measure, as agreed upon in committee, provides for legalization of beer, lager, ale and porter of not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight.

Other major provisions include a \$5 a barrel federal tax and a \$1,000 license fee for every brewery.

Dry states, which do not desire manufacture or sale of the pre-prohibition beverages within their borders, would be protected. All states will be given a free hand to regulate manufacture and distribution.

Chairman Ashurst of the senate judiciary committee, conferred with President Roosevelt today and said he believed the 3.2 per cent beer would be permissible under the constitution.

He expressed optimism as to early passage of the beer measure, remarking, "Two years ago the boys out of bathtub gin in two weeks."

AUSTIN, March 14.—Legal beer is possible in Texas by August, Representative John Mathis of Houston estimated here today.

Mathis, chairman of the state organization for modification of the liquor laws, said that as quickly as congress determines the legal percentage of alcohol in beer, steps will be taken to pass a similar measure in Texas.

He conceded that it will be impossible to get 100 votes in the house for beer. Failure to do so means that the bill legalizing beer, if it passes, cannot become effective until 90 days after the close of the present session of the legislature, which ends May 19, unless its time is extended.

Eastland Girl Has Big Part In All College Activities

WEATHERFORD, March 14.—During the past two years Miss Marjorie Spencer, daughter of Mrs. Sue Spencer, has been a student of Weatherford college, the college whose motto is "Better Education at Less Expense." Miss Spencer has taken an active part in college activities.

She is a member of the Thailians, a social organization, and the Conottes, a girls' pep club. Marjorie has also served in the capacity of student instructor in one of the student aid classes. This is a new movement in Weatherford college and is sponsored by the local chapter of Pi Theta Kappa, the scholarship society. It is so organized that small groups of students who are deficient in some subject meet with a student instructor and receive aid and advice as how best to solve their particular problem. These classes meet in addition to the regular class schedule.

FORT WORTH FAT STOCK SHOW DIRECTORS CARRY ON

Fort Worth for years had years has been the home of the famous Fat Stock Show, one of the greatest under the skies of the republic. In the last six months, there were timid souls who were ready to postpone, but not indefinitely, this historic exhibition of the livestock industry of the Southwest until next year. Well, the courageous vetoed the proposal.

They drove the timid to the bleachers. They made their program. They pledged financial assistance. They declared that the 1933 Fat Stock Show would be the greatest in the history of the city "where the panther laid down." Responses came from every quarter, from every livestock center under Southwestern skies. The annual Fat Stock Show is not to be a thing of the past. A PRO CRUSADER CHANGES HER MIND

"We live to learn." Mrs. Miriam McHenry of Kansas, age 84 and a lieutenant to Carry Nation in bygone years, is for repeal of the 18th amendment. This is the message she sent to the senators: "We would have a greater measure of enforcement under state direction if the federal forces were withdrawn." A second message was sent to the house of representatives by Mrs. McHenry, calling upon that body to pass the repeal bill. Mrs. McHenry is one of the veteran crusaders of America. She has been arrested and jailed 47 times in her 35 years of crusading against the saloon.

After surveying the entire field she announced she was as much opposed to the liquor traffic now as when she went about Kansas 30 years ago wrecking bars—but "that she believes the 18th amendment cannot be satisfactorily enforced under federal direction." It is a woman's privilege to change her mind. It is a man's privilege to be a square shooter, or a straddler, or a fence-rider, or "all things to all men" and women. A law must be backed by public opinion to bring about its near enforcement.

DID YOU EVER STOP TO THINK

E. P. CHASE, editor and publisher of the Atlantic (Iowa) News-Telegraph, says:

"There was spent in the United States in the last year prior to the depression, 1929, the sum of something like \$260,000,000 for newspaper and periodical advertising. The great bulk of this went to the newspapers. The spending of this money was handled by men and women schooled in the advertising business who know the value of various kinds of advertising, and whose business it is to produce results for advertising clients who entrust their business to them. These clients are also in the main those who have had long experience with various kinds of publicity and they have learned, as the advertising people have learned, that the only sure fire medium which brings a greater per cent of return than any other is the newspaper.

"The epidemic of radio advertising which persisted for a time appears to have subsided considerably. Part of this falling off, of course, is due to economic conditions, but a larger part of it is due to the fact people who have advertised over the air have discovered that the radio, no more than any other medium aside from the newspaper, gets them results in proportion to the money spent.

"The advertiser in any town or city who is seeking the most for his money gives the newspaper the preference. Indeed, the paper more often than not does the job satisfactorily and completely alone."

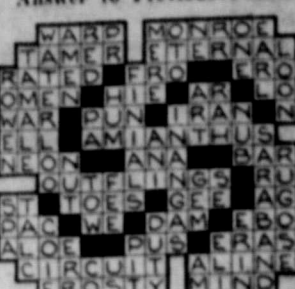

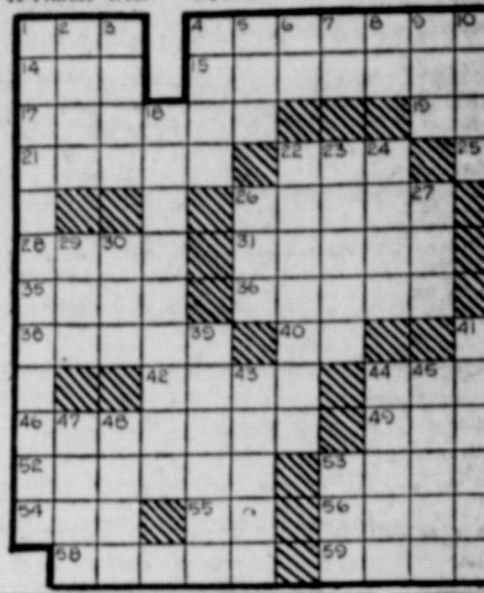

Bank Legislation Brings Out Stories

AUSTIN.—The adage, that a banker never gets left out of any deal, was borne out here when Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson signed the emergency act for a state banking moratorium.

Frank Patterson, representative of Fort Worth, who was one of the authors of the bill, furnished the pen with which the governor signed the measure.

Patterson planned, to keep the pen as a memento of the historic event—but a prominent banker got it.

Perhaps the funniest incident connected with the moratorium action occurred in the state senate chamber during the night session at which the bill first passed. James A. Shaw, banking commissioner, upon whom the bill conferred great powers, was sitting among a group of visitors.

Members were alternately questioning the advisability of placing so much power in one man's hands and others praising Shaw.

A woman sitting next to the commissioner expressed her views of his actions in connection with liquidation of a bank in which she had friends interested. Her remarks were decidedly critical of the commissioner.

Finally she turned to Shaw and asked him if he knew anything about the commissioner.

"I've heard a good deal about him, both favorable and unfavorable," he replied.

After further comment, she asked: "What sort of a man is he?"

"He's about my height and weight and age," said Shaw. "He has brown hair and brushes it back like I do."

"Is he here tonight?" Shaw's inquisitor asked.

"Oh, yes," he replied. Then he began to describe how he was dressed.

He described his own tie and color of his suit when the woman reddened.

"Oh, I'm sorry. I beg your pardon," she exclaimed.

"That's all right," said Shaw. "Since I have been in office my hide has gotten thick enough for anything."

POPE PIUS XI PLANS MAJOR CEREMONIALS

VATICAN CITY.—Pope Pius XI will appear in 24 major ceremonies in St. Peter's cathedral during the Holy Year beginning April 2.

As scheduled, these will include 10 beatifications, four canonizations, six major feast days and the remainder in special ceremonies. The pontiff will officiate on an average of once a fortnight, so that all pilgrims will have a chance to see the gorgeous ceremonies.

Those who are slated for beatification include a group of martyrs, who suffered for their faith in the early days of missionary work in Uruguay. This is the only ceremonial which has special significance in the Western Hemisphere.

The others who likely will be endowed with the appellation of "blessed" will be Venerable Vincenzo Gerosa, a nun of Brescia, Italy; Maria Pelletier, a French nun; Gemma Galgani, another Italian nun of Luca; Giuseppe Pignatelli, of Naples, and Catherine Labouret, a second French nun.

There are to be four canonizations, providing the procedure for the promulgation of the persons concerned as "saints" will be completed. Those chosen are the Blessed Fournet; Andre Robert, founder of the order of the Sisters of the Cross; Blessed Giovanni don Bosco, the Salesian father; Blessed Vincenzo Crambì, bishop of Macerata, Italy, and Blessed Corrado da Parzana, Capucine monk. There also is a chance that Blessed Lodovico de Marillac, a French nun, founder of the order of Daughters of Charity, may become a saint during the Holy Year.

The ceremony of canonization is the most elaborate in the long list of functions held in the Roman church. Here the church rises to its very highest. The pope presides during the whole ceremony, which lasts three hours. He is carried on a throne, in a procession, of cardinals and the papal court. As he is borne down through the nave of the great basilica, he blesses the multitudes.

The robes worn by the prelates participating are the richest in church functions. Red and gold is worn when the saint has been martyred for the cause and the silver trumpets announce the entrance and withdrawal of the pope.

At Schiaparelli's they chose No. 53—an all gray wool suit with a short jacket fastened at the waist by a cartridge-shaped link of burnished copper. The collar and rather wide revers accentuate the rather high waistline, and the shoulders are widened by the way the sleeves are set in, with an epaulette-like ridge on each side.

The skirt, which is straight and narrow, is topped by a blouse of printed crepe de chine, the pattern being of tiny white blossoms on an all gray ground.

It is simple and yet distinctive and without the disadvantage of being eccentric in the sense that one is conspicuous in either a small gathering, or in a crowd.

HERE--AND THERE

"Man's work is from sun to sun, but woman's work is never done." This familiar truism applies especially to our modern day of club, lodge, and church activities, that beset my fair lady's path and that forms almost a separate existence in combination with that of her regular home life, and mother duties.

Spring brings us face to face with the annual observance of two national movements, Better Homes week, that functions from April 23 to April 30; and annual National Music week, that fills the program for music lovers from Sunday, May 7 to the following Saturday.

Each of these feasts will be fully observed in Eastland, under the sponsorship of the Better Homes committee and the Eastland Music club.

The national office of the Better Homes in America, located in Washington, D. C., supervises the organization of the state, district, county and local committees and serves as a clearing house for information on all housing and home making problems.

The needs of the community are determined as preliminary to the local, Better Homes committee planning, their program. The problems of better housing are considered and where it is impossible to demonstrate a better home, with the furnishing and improvements, a similar idea may be carried out through the demonstrations in home equipment arranged in shop windows, in this way through a connection series illustrating modern home arrangements from the kitchen to the better rooms or living rooms of the home.

Of course the Better Homes bureau desires a demonstration house, one completely equipped and furnished and planned by an architect and housing specialist but this is not always possible in the smaller towns, especially at this time.

The home economics cottage is urged for the use of home making work of schools and colleges and it is considered important as well to plant the grounds there abouts with shrubbery and other beautiful landscape features.

An interesting feature of the work is the tour of houses during Better Homes week, which will include those homes which have some outstanding improvement made during year. A tour of this nature conducted by a local architect or housing specialist is featured in the larger cities, so that attention may be called to notable examples of architectural designs, and house planning.

In the Better Homes week program is included the programs, featuring the ideas of the work, and put on by civic organizations, schools, churches and theatres, and the musical recitals which are especially urged as a help in constructive building of the ideal home life.

Music week, a series of concerts provided by all organizations of the city, are in effect and at this time the chairman of civic music, Mrs. John D. H. Tester of San Angelo, asks for a report of each music club, that puts on a music week.

A trifle in advance of this season, a district musical given by a junior club's music students will be held Sunday, April 2, under direction of Mrs. A. F. Taylor of Eastland, junior program exchange chairman, with recital featured in the Methodist church auditorium.

The music week will have as chairman, Mrs. Turner M. Collier, who will soon have an organized program to be developed by the organizations of the churches, the clubs, and the various music-loving units of Eastland.

It is well to remember at this time that Eastland city will be hostesses in the latter part of October to the Sixth District Federation Music Clubs and this means a busy time for a hundred or more women of this city.

Mrs. E. C. Satterwhite, president of the Music club, and Mrs. W. K. Jackson, publicity chairman for music week, have plans that will bring results in both cultural and financial fashion for Music week.

A fine art prints exhibition will open in the high school auditorium on March 20-24, inclusive, sponsored by the High School Parent-Teacher association. These fine series are sent by the Practical Drawing company of Dallas, with self explanatory history of the artist and subject in hand, attached to each picture. The exhibit is of an educational nature and was secured through the efforts of Mrs. J. M. Perkins.

The district meeting of the Pythian Sisters temple will be held in Eastland on April 17, which means activity among lodge circles and a large number of guests in the city.
