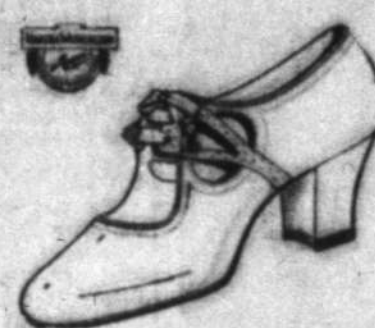

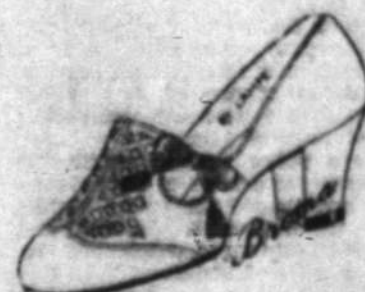

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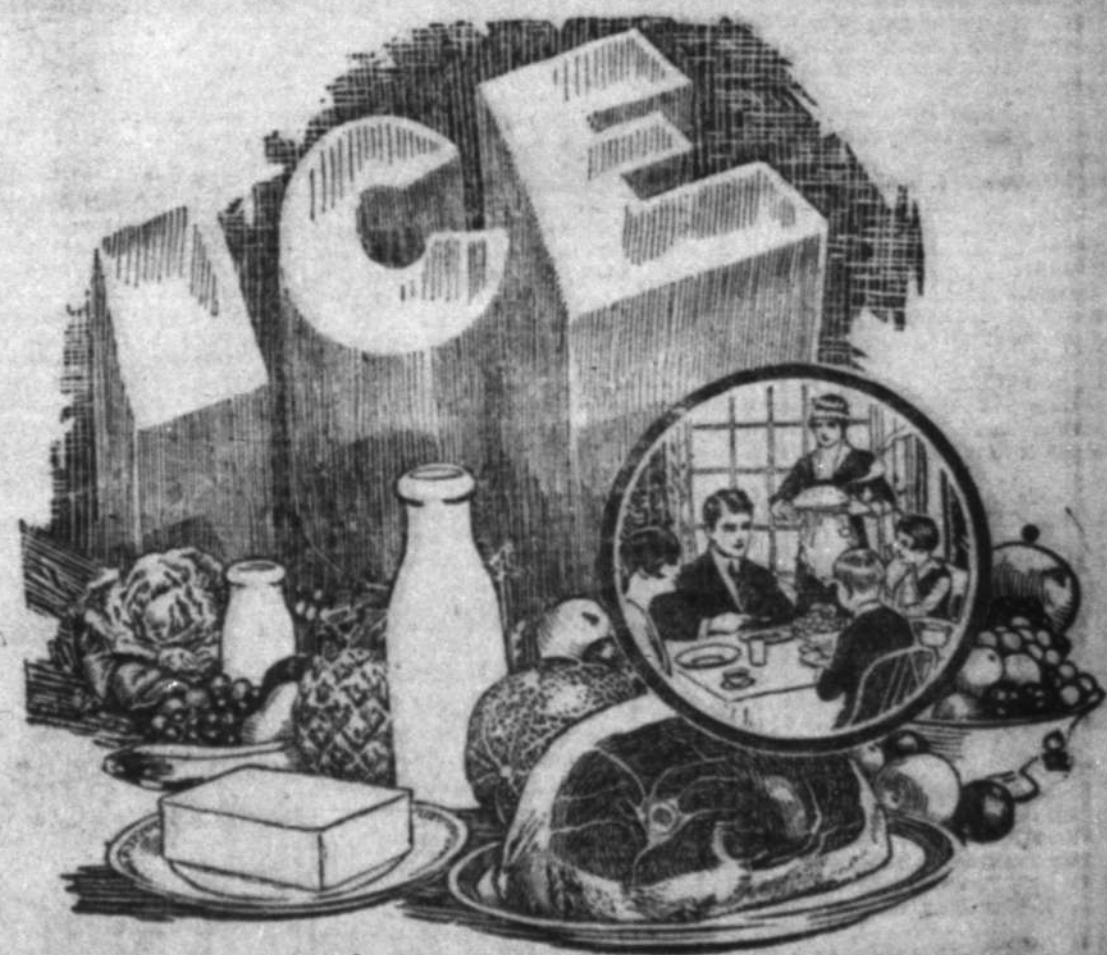

He was chased to the bench in the sixth, smarting under a barrage of base hits. No port rider has been able to stop the Hubbers yet this year.

Red Hill, veteran moundsman of the Hubber sharpshooting staff, is proving to be a successful manager. The locals have been forging up the percentage ladder under his tutelage, brought on through the illness of Skipper Bennie Brownlow.

It will be a long time before Manager Brownlow will be able to play ball even after he is released from the Ellwood hospital, where he is recovering from a siege of pneumonia. Bennie has lost several pounds during his illness and had not reached playing form when he was stricken.

Tom Garrard, Marvin L. Warlick, W. M. Ross and E. C. Foster were appointed as credentials committee. A. C. Levens, W. W. Campbell and W. M. Subanks as nominations committee and W. A. Jackson, John L.

Ratliff and J. H. Goodman as resolutions committee.

With the withdrawal of the committees to order rooms for their work, the convention floor was thrown open to coming candidates, Pink L. Parrish, candidate for senator from this district and J. K. Wester, candidate for representative, responding. Both made true democratic talks, pledging their best if elected to their respective offices.

Delegates Named.

The names of J. H. Goodman, W. A. Jackson, I. O. Burford, E. C. Foster, J. K. Wester, O. M. Eubanks, W. R. Buchanan, Mrs. T. T. Garrard, John L. Ratliff, W. W. Campbell, E. L. Elliott, D. W. Ruckebush, Marvin L. Warlick, S. P. Horne, C. V. Young, W. M. Ross, R. A. Logan and Pink L. Parrish were submitted by the nominations committee as the delegates to the state convention at Beaumont. They were accepted by the convention.

Following the report of the resolutions committee, Tom Garrard made a motion that the names of Judge O. E. Hamilton of Matador, and Judges J. L. Ratliff and J. H. Goodman of Lubbock, be recommended as delegates to the national convention from this section.

Resolutions.

The resolutions follow: "1. Be it resolved that all delegates to the state convention from this county are instructed to cast their votes as a unit for a resolution in-

structing the delegates from this state to cast their votes as a unit for Governor Dan Moody as a delegate as large to the national convention, and that he should serve as chairman of the Texas delegation.

"2. We denounce the republican party for bribery, graft and corruption in high office, which has characterized and condemned its administration during the last eight years; for corruption in election of members to the United States senate; for its receipt of dishonorable money used in electing a president of the United States.

"3. We favor a plank in the national democratic platform to be adopted at Houston, Texas, unequivocally indicating prohibition as written into the constitution of the United States and declaring relentless opposition to any attempt to repeal it or destroy the prohibition laws. Demanding the faithful, strict and efficient enforcement of all laws, including the eighteenth amendment; advocating adequate means of enforcement. We instruct our delegates to vote for resolutions favoring such a plank.

"4. We favor the state democratic convention at Beaumont instructing the delegation to the national convention to vote as a unit at all times and upon all questions and for candidates for president and vice president who each favor and support the foregoing plank.

obligation of party loyalty arises from participation in party affairs and we appeal to all democrats to recognize this principle and remain loyal to the party and unite to sweep corruption out of the national capitol at Washington.

"5. We believe in representative democracy. It is impossible for the individuals to force developments in a national nominating convention. We believe that the democratic voters are capable of selecting a group of people who will faithfully represent them in the national nominating convention. We believe that this group of our representative ought to be trusted.

"6. Be it resolved that the delegates from this county to the state democratic convention at Beaumont be instructed to cast their vote as a unit."
