County Heart Assn. Sets Goals For Year

Last week the Lynn County Heart Association reorganized for 1988-89 at a meeting in the Community Room of the Tahoka First National Bank, with the following as incoming officers: President, Melvin Burks; President-Elect, Alecia Curry; Program Chairman, Annis Brown; Development Chairman, Alecia Curry; Communications Chairman, Terry Wood; Secretary, Jo Beth Renfro; and Treasurer, Jean Meeks.

Also present at the meeting was Carolyn Kennedy from American Heart Assn. regional office in Lubbock.

A goal was set to raise \$6,000 for The AHA in Lynn County during the coming year.

The county association had a very good year during 1987-88 and was honored at the regional meeting of The AHA in Lubbock June 15 for exceeding their goal. Outgoing President Gary Jones was commended for this out-

standing effort but due to a conflict was unable to attend the banquet and the award was accepted by incoming president Melvin Burks.

Donations to the AHA through the Lynn County Heart Assn. are being accepted by Jean Meeks at the Tahoka bank, and checks may be mailed to the county association.

County officials noted this week that a person's chances of contracting AIDS (assuming one is heterosexual and not a drug user) are one in a million, chances of being struck by lightning are one in 600,000, chances of being murdered are one in 10,000, chances of being killed in a vehicle accident are one in 5,000, but that a person's chances of dying of a heart disease are one in two. Car Stolen Near Tahoka Recovered

A 1978 Pontiac stolen from the home of Carl Griffing, four miles south of Tahoka on U.S. 87 sometime after 10 p.m. last Saturday was recovered Sunday by Howard County officers, who found the vehicle with the keys in it.

Mrs. Curtis Wilke, Rt. 1, Slaton, reported that a Panasonic videocassette recorder had been stolen from her home about 5 miles northeast of Wilson last Friday. The VCR was valued at \$450. No other items were reported missing from the home. Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$500 reward in the case.

Sweet Street Baptist Church, located at 1300 Ave. J, reported to police on Monday that person(s) unknown had damaged a new basketball backboard, resulting from someone jumping up and grabbing the rim causing it to break. This was believed to have occurred on Sunday between 12:30 p.m. and 6 p.m. and damage was set at \$65.

Police picked up two runaway girls, ages 11 and 8, from Tahoka, who were later released to their parents on Sunday.

Police arrested one Tahoka man for DWI during the past week.

In jail during the week were two persons each on charges of burglary of a building, no seat belt and public intoxication. In addition to these six persons, five others were jailed on charges of theft over \$750 and under \$20,000, driving while intoxicated, public intoxication plus speeding, disorderly conduct plus resisting arrest, and public intoxication plus unlawfully carrying a weapon.

New Ambulance Now In Service At Hospital

Lynn County EMS now is operating its new ambulance, recently delivered to replace the old wornout unit. The new ambulance, costing \$43,120, was mostly paid for by donations and through the fund-raising efforts of the Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary.

The Emergency Medical Service (EMS) which operates the ambulance with volunteer personnel still needs about \$18,000 to pay off the vehicle, according to Billy Tomlinson.

The unit is a 1988 Ford, 7.3 liter diesel on a 1-ton chassis, and it is classified as a Type III module. Tomlinson noted that "it just happened to be Bulldog colors." The vehicle was a demo, affording a savings of about \$7,000, from the normal price. It does, however, have the standard 6-year, 60,000-mile warranty on the main power train.

The unit has dual wheels on

the rear, which make for smoother riding and greater stability at high speeds. It can accommodate two patients and has adequate storage space for equipment and supplies. It also will have new communications equipment donated by the law firm of Huffaker and Green.

Cash donations or memorials may be deposited in the Lynn County Ambulance Fund at the First National Bank of Tahoka or given to any EMS personnel. All memorials are acknowledged to the families by cards, Tomlinson said.

Duplicates Found Of GI Records Lost In Fire

Recent discovery of duplicate military records by the National Archives will enable thousands of World War II and Korean Conflict Army and Air Corps veterans to file for Veterans Administration disability compensation payments.

To speed these claims, the VA has introduced special procedures, collectively called Project Expedite, which involves a massive cross-checking of files to determine cases that can be reopened.

Using the new records, VA benefits counselors now hope to assist many veterans whose claims had been denied because no record was available to confirm medical disabilities that occurred during military service.

Veterans and survivors unsure whether their disability compen-

sation claims are affected should contact the nearest VA regional office. A toll-free number of the nearest VA regional office is listed in the Federal Government section of telephone directories.

The National Archives and Records Administration on June 15 advised the VA that it had located a collection of computer tape containing some 10 million Army medical records that partially fill a gap created when a 1973 fire destroyed millions of military files at a federal warehouse in St. Louis. The newly found records cover the years from 1942 to 1945 and from 1950 to 1954.

For certain veterans whose claims for disability compensation were denied since the fire, the VA may now be able to establish documentary evidence to support their claims.

The St. Louis fire destroyed or seriously damaged some 18 million service records, making future disability claims difficult and, in some cases, impossible to process.

STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

GTE Southwest Incorporated, in accordance with the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates in Texas, effective July 6, 1988. This proceeding has been previously docketed by the Commission as Docket No. 5610.

The proposed changes in rates will affect approximately 970,500 of the Company's Texas customers who represent all classes of customers subscribing to the Company's local exchange and foreign exchange services within the State of Texas, as well as all entities subscribing to the Company's billing and collection services within the state. The proposed changes in rates are designed to increase the Company's intrastate revenues by \$81,407,000, or approximately 11.8 percent annually.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. Trash Bags Not For Use With Food

When working with food, it's wise to use only containers, cooking utensils and dishes designed for use with food.

For example, now that they come in so many sizes, plastic trash bags may seem to be convenient containers for any number of foods — quarts of popcorn for a party, a disposable container for marinating meat, or handy wrapping for picnic foods.

Before you put food into a plastic trash bag, however, check the package label. Very often there will be a statement indicating whether the bag is approved for use with food. If there is no statement, assume that the product is not approved for food use.

Materials used in the production of trash bags do not have to be tested for eating safety if the product is not considered to be generally used with food. The chemical process for manufacturing plastic bags may not permanently bind harmful components in the bag material. So it's possible, for instance, that an acid in meat marinade could allow chemicals in the plastic bag to get into your food. Also, a deodorant product is sometimes used in trash bags and that could affect the test of the food.
