Glenn Roenfeldt resigns as First Baptist pastor

Members of the First Baptist Church Sunday accepted with regret the resignation of Rev. Glenn Roenfeldt, pastor for the past 19 years.

Roefeldt, 59, will be going to San Angelo where he will be chaplain of the Baptist Memorial Center which includes a hospital, nursing home and retirement center. Oct. 11 will be his last Sunday to be preach here.

Mrs. Roefeldt, a fourth grade teacher at Hutchinson Elementary School, will submit her resignation as soon as a suitable replacement can be found. This is her 19th year to teach in the local school system.

"My primary responsibility will be to the people in the nursing home and hospital and their families," Roefeldt said of his new job. The nursing home and hospital offer six levels of care as recognized by Medicare.

"I will miss many of the pastoral activities and will miss being involved in the community," he said. "The focus of the ministry will keep me from much community involvement."

While in Colorado City, he has been active in the Lions Club, the Chamber of Commerce and the Ministerial Allinace. He was a member of the Mitchell County

He has served on the board of directors of Baptist Memorial Center since 1971 and as president of the board from 1978-79.

Mrs. Roenfeldt is a member of the Beta Epsilon Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma International, an organization promoting excellence in teaching.

Roenfeldt is a regular visitor to local nursing homes and the hospital.

"Hospital visitations let me have an association with people among all denominations," he said. "And, I thoroughly enjoyed that."

In his letter of resignation which he read at the close of the Sunday morning worship service, Roenfeldt said "There have been times when God has spoken to me as obviously as a West Texas sandstorm. One of those times was 19 years ago when I was

praying about my decision to become pastor of this great church. In the past two weeks God has spoken again. The voice was inaudible, but the message was clear. This time the call has come for me to accept the position of chaplain of Baptist Memorial Center in San Angelo."

Prior to coming to Colorado City, Roenfeldt was pastor of the Southern Baptist Temple in Phoenix, Ari. from 1964-68. Before that he was pastor of First Baptist Church in Roscoe from 1957-64. Other pastorates include Chapel Hill Baptist Church in Lubbock from 1953-57 and Lillie Baptist Church in Wellington from 1949-50.

He is a graduate of Wayland Baptist College in Plainview where he majored in Bible and English. He has done graduate study at Texas Tech University in Lubbock and at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

Mrs. Roenfeldt is a graduate of Wayland Baptist College.

The Roenfeldts have three children, Jerene Rae Cargile, Carla Joyce Reynolds and Roger Glenn Roenfeldt.

Biking course offered

SWEETWATER--Young or beginning motorcycle riders in need of instruction on the proper techniques of biking will benefit from the Fall offering of the Motorcycle Rider Course, a joint project of the Texas Department of Public Safety and Texas State Technical Institute - Sweetwater.

The course, which will be taught on the weekend of October 3-4 at the Sweetwater campus, consists of 16 hours of instruction. Eight of those hours are spent on a range, where the students ride motorcycles through a prepared course to practice proper handling skills and safety techniques from a DPS-certified instructor.

Motorcycles will be provided for student use. The bikes used in the course are on loan from Kent's Honda and Max's Kawasaki-Honda of Abilene.

Students will need to provide proper footwear, helmets, and riding gear. They will also need their Driver Education certificate in order to receive credit for the course.

The course will qualify beginning bikers to ride motorcycles above the 125cc size. In addition, many insurance companies will offer special discounts to students who complete the class.

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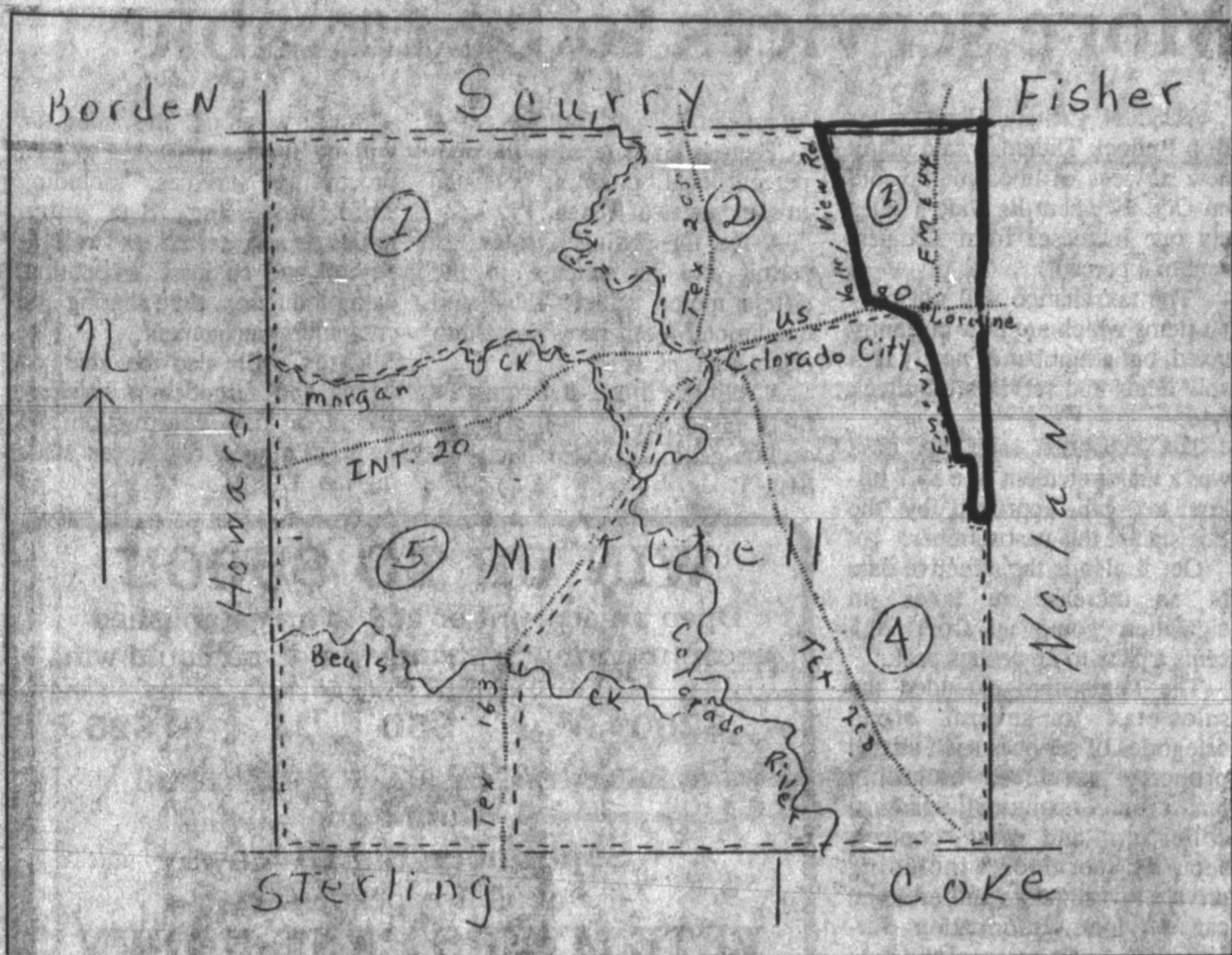
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Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District

Zone 3 directors to be elected

An election for directors to serve in Zone 3 on the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation district board is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. at the SWCD office in the G-Kell building in Colorado City. Jimmy Harrison, Chairman of the board, has announced.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agriculture land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in the county or any part of which is in the district, and the voter must be at least 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be at least 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in the county, all or part of which is in the district. Spouses of those eligible may also vote.

Zone 3 of the district includes an area beginning at the northeast corner of Mitchell-Nolan County line to a point approximately 6.7 miles south of the intersection of said county line and Farm-to-

Market Road 2319; thence west .5 of a mile on county road; thence in a northerly direction approximately 3.5 miles along the same county road; thence west approximately one mile along county road to the intersection of Farm-to-Market 644; thence north along Farm-to-Market Road 644 to the intersection of U. S. 80 (Interstate 20); thence west along U. S. 80 (Interstate 20) approximately two miles to the intersection of the Valley View Community Road; thence north along the Valley View Community Road to its intersection with Mitchell-Scurry County lines; thence east along the Mitchell-Scurry County line to the northeast corner of Mitchell County which is the point of beginning.

Current members of the board of directors of the Mitchell SWCD are Jimmy Harrison, chairman; D. M. Smith, vice chairman; Travis Turner, secretary; Warren Anderson and George Martin, members. George Martin is currently serving as director from Zone 3.

The purpose of the Mitchell SWCD, with headquarters in the G-Kell building is to promote sound soil and water conservation

programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

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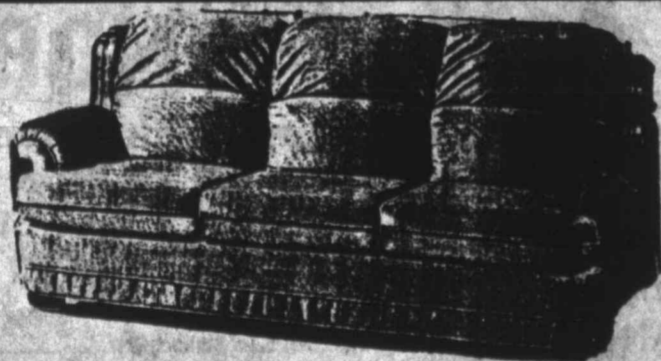
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Selective Service registration required for USPS employment

The federal government's largest employer - the Postal Service - recently announced Selective Service registration requirements for employment. Under the new guidelines, a young man must prove that he has registered with Selective Service before being eligible for appointment to a position in the Postal Service.

This requirement follows the

Thummond/Montgomery Amendment to the Fiscal Year 1986 Department of Defense Authorization Act. The amendment prohibits a young man who is required to register from being appointed to a position in an executive agency of the federal government unless he has registered. The intent of the legislation was to ensure that all men re-

quired by law to register do so.

Rep. Gerald Solomon (R-NY), a strong supporter of Selective Service, introduced legislation in July requiring registration as a prerequisite to employment with the Postal Service. Technically the Postal Service was not included in the original Thummond/Montgomery Amendment because it is not an executive agency of the federal government. Commenting on the legislation, Solomon said, "If a young man is going to accept the benefits of this country then he should be ready and willing to accept the responsibilities as well. Registration is one of these responsibilities."

As of mid-August, all young men who are 18 through 25 years of age must show proof of registration before being considered for a position with the Postal Service. Those young men who do not reach 18 until after appointment will be asked to submit proof within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Men who fail to provide proof of registration will be considered "not available" and will receive no further consideration for employment.

Along with federal employment, Selective Service registration has been linked to federal student aid and job training benefits. Many states also require registration as a prerequisite for state student aid, entrance into a state supported college or university and state employment.

More services to be taxable

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said many new services will become taxable on Oct. 1, when the state's sales tax rate increases from 5 1/4 percent to 6 percent.

"The tax change will not only hit items which are now currently taxed, but a number of newly taxable items and services," Bullock said.

The expanded sales tax base was a major element of a \$5.7 billion tax bill approved by the Legislature this past summer.

Oct. 1 also is the effective date of an increase in taxes on cigarettes, going up from 20.5 cents a pack to 26 cents a pack.

The Legislature extended the sales tax to several broad categories of services such as real property services, including landscaping, janitorial, garbage collection and pest control; security services, including private investigators and armored car services; information furnished by credit bureaus; and debt services, such as adjustments and repossessions.

It also will include information services like financial research, specialized information and insurance services including damage appraisals, investigations and claims adjustments, but not premiums paid for insurance.

The expanded tax base is expected to add more than 64,000 Texas businesses to the state's tax rolls, joining the more than 420,000 merchants and businesses already collecting sales taxes.

Newly taxable items include custom computer programs, labor on installations to tangible property, some transportation charges on the sale of goods, telephone service and membership and dues to private clubs.

"Businesses need to reprogram cash registers and alert workers and staff of the new rate taking

effect Oct. 1," said Bullock. There is no increase in the one-percent local option tax collected in some areas of Texas.

A fee for getting a sales tax permit and an increase in the state's motor vehicle sales and hotel/motel room taxes went into effect on Sept. 1.

A rollback in the state's motor fuels tax from 15 cents to 10 cents a gallon was also cancelled Sept. 1.

Starting Jan. 1, the sales tax will be further extended to data processing services, including word processing, data entry, retrieval and search as well as payroll and business accounting, data production, time sharing and computer management.

Taxes will also be due on repair and remodeling services, except on new construction and owner-occupied residences starting Jan. 1.

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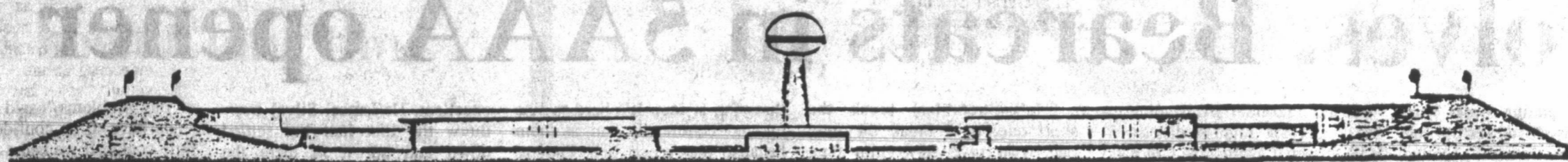

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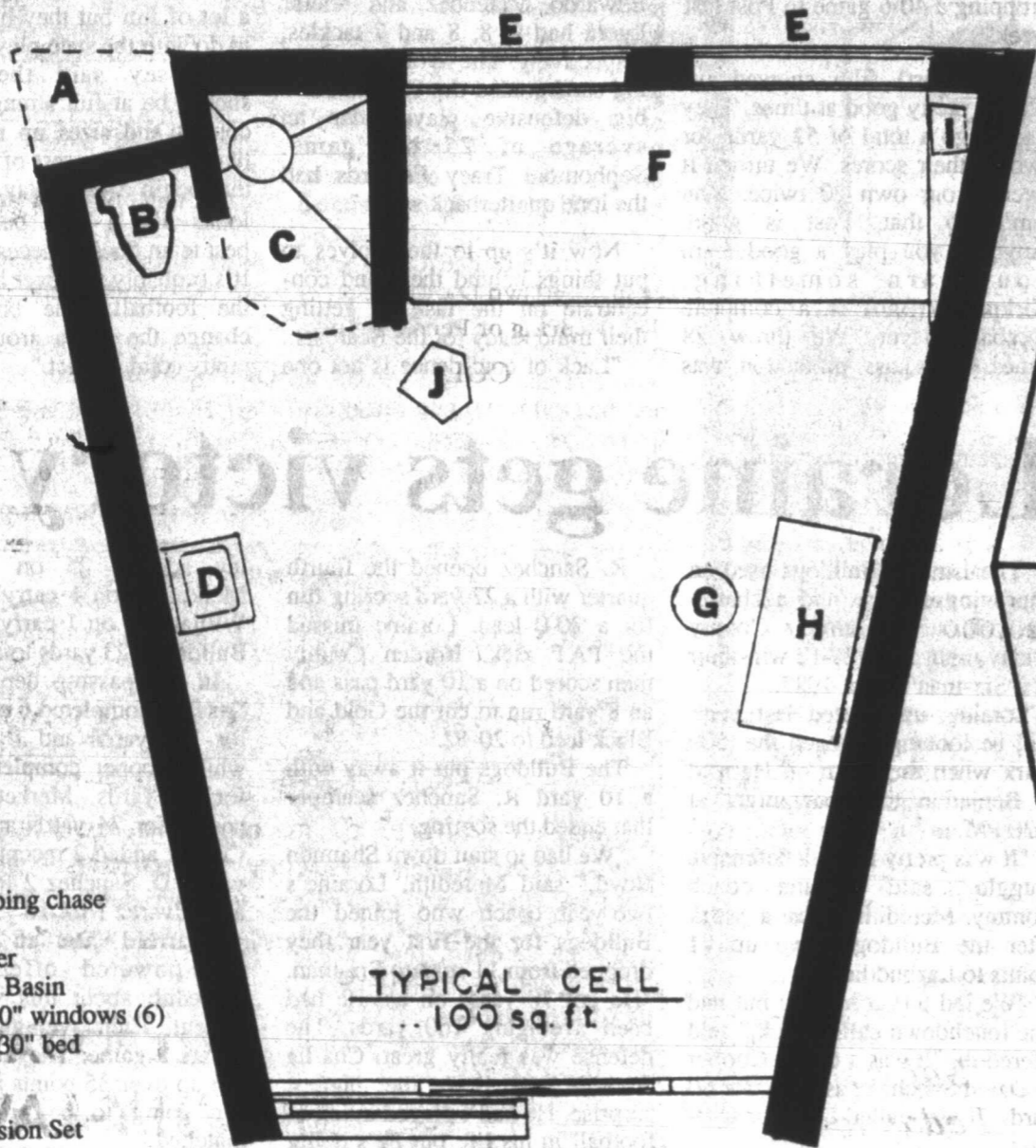
Proposed Prison Plans

GROUND VIEW

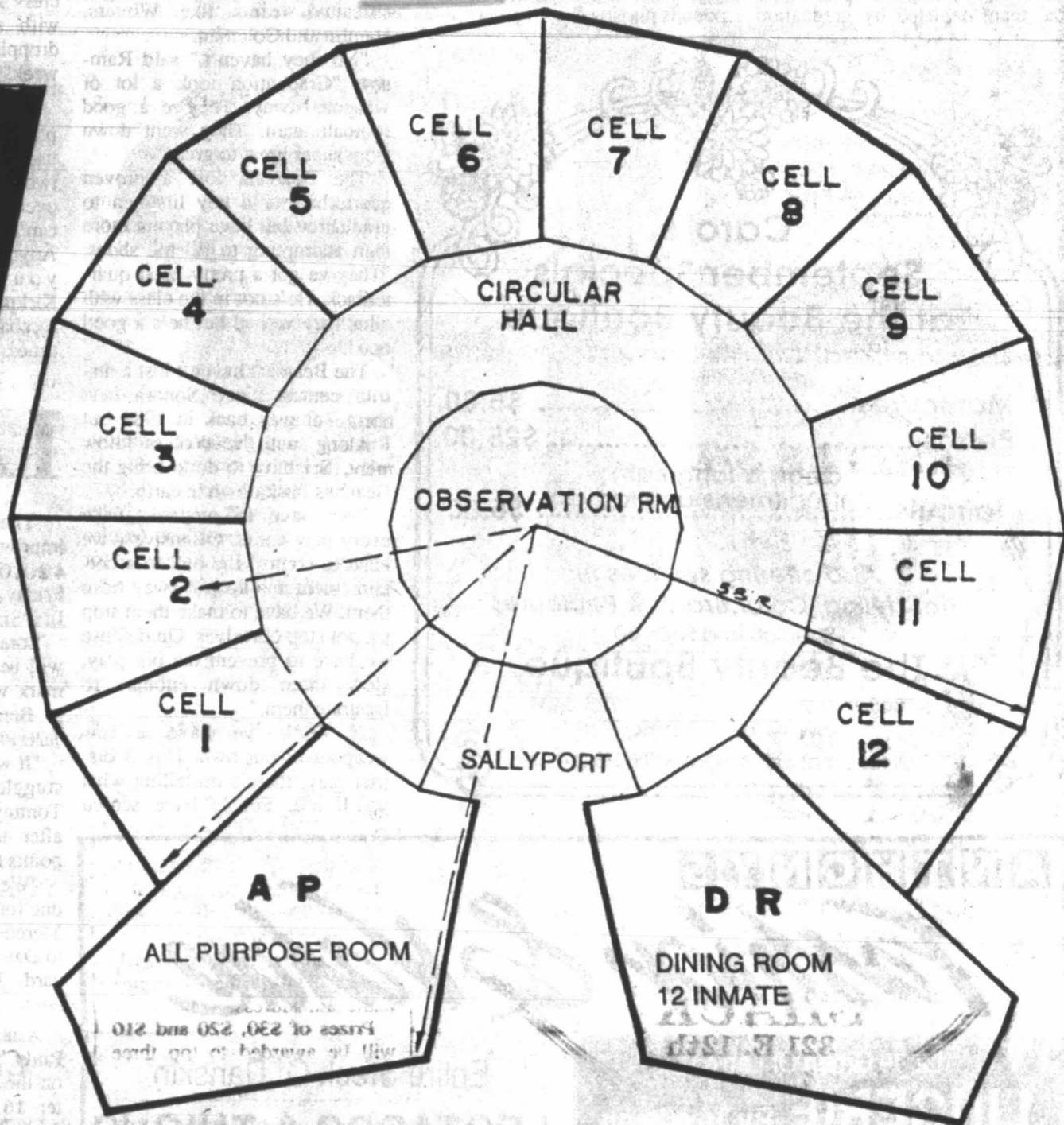
CELL FLOOR PLAN

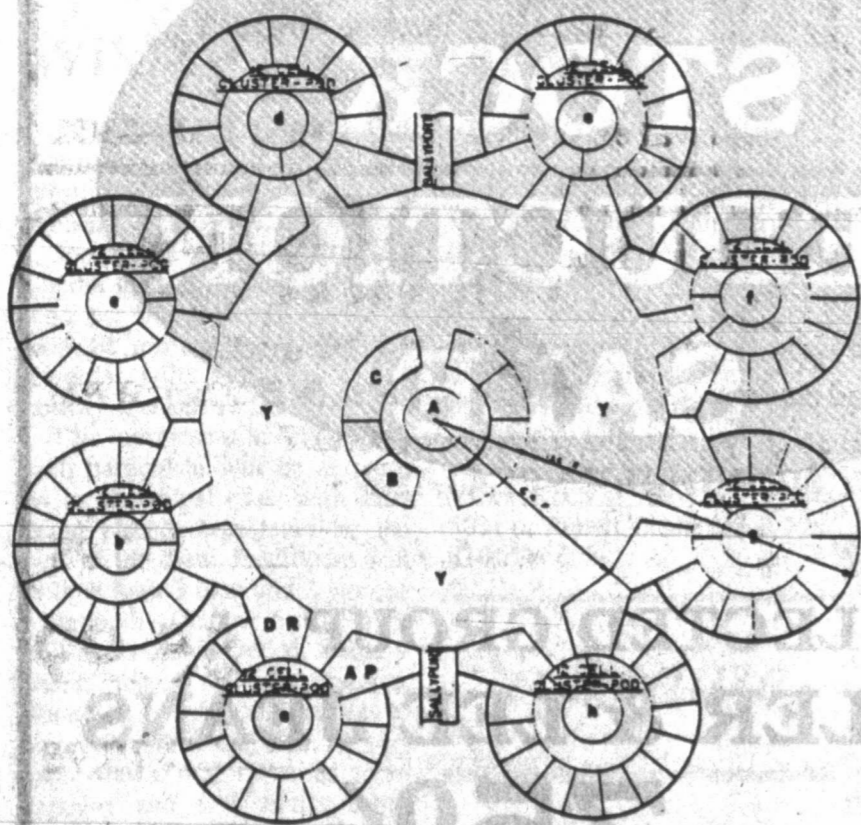
THE POD

Wolves, Bearcats in 5AAA opener

All-State running back Terry Strambler has played for the Ballinger Bearcat varsity football team since his freshman year. Not coincidentally, the Bearcats have strung together five consecutive district championships.

Would it be correct to say that Strambler, now a senior, really carries the load for a 1987 Bearcat team depleted by graduation

but still a familiar 3-0 heading into tomorrow night's district 5-AAA opener against the Colorado City Wolves at Bearcat Stadium? "Yeah, no doubt about it," said Wolves coach Tom Ramsey. "Him and a big line. They're 260, 250 and 220 up front. They're huge and look like a college line. I've heard they've got a kid 300 pounds playing."

"He'll (Strambler) break the short one, he'll break the long one. You give it to him long enough and he'll break it. They give him the ball inside and outside. They'll throw to him. Although undefeated and ranked by some of the Bearcats haven't been blowing people away in wins over smaller classification teams like Winters, Hamlin and Coleman. "No they haven't," said Ramsey. "Graduation took a lot of weapons away. They're a good football team. They went down from super great to great."

The Bearcats lost a proven quarterback and key linemen to graduation but have players more than attempting to fill the shoes. "They've got a pretty good quarterback. He's not in the class with what they've had but he's a good one."

The Bearcats haven't lost a district contest since Sonora beat them 7-0 way back in 1982 but Ramsey says the Wolves know what they have to do to bring the Bearcats back down to earth. "We have to prepare, make every play count. Offensively we have to control the ball to a certain extent and keep it away from them. We have to make them stop us, not stop ourselves. On defense we have to prevent the big play, slow them down enough to frustrate them."

"I think we have a few weapons of our own. This is district play, there's no telling what you'll see. People have scored

throwing at 'em. It's hard to line up and continually run at them because they're so big. They're 200 pounds across the defensive front then they play their big kids on offense."

While Ballinger was beating up on smaller schools the Wolves started the year by taking on three class AAA teams and came out with a 2-1 non-district record, dropping a 40-6 game to Post last week.

The (Post) film showed we played pretty good at times. They had to go a total of 52 yards for two of their scores. We turned it over at our own 20 twice. You can't do that. Post is good. Anytime you play a good team you learn something. Kirkpatrick (Ben) is a complete football player. We threw 28 times. The pass protection was

excellent. He (Ismael Silva) overthrew the first half but settled down and put it in there the second half. We moved the ball but it was basically from the 20 to 20 yard lines.

Chris Perkin led the Wolves defensively against Post with 14 tackles. Mark Russell had 3 unassisted tackles and a total of 12 stops. Ray Rivera, Jerry Hulme, Eduardo Melendez and Victor Luera had 9, 8, 8 and 7 tackles, respectively. The Wolves' coaching staff graded the Wolves for 7 big defensive plays under an average of 25 per game. Sophomore Tracy Edwards had the lone quarterback sack.

Now it's up to the Wolves to put things behind them and concentrate on the task of getting their mind ready for the Bearcats. "Lack of confidence is not one

of our problems," said Ramsey. "You have to be confident and a little cocky. If we had a choice to play anybody in the free world we'd get on the that bus and head to Ballinger. It's Red and Black on both sides. The crowds are defeaning in Ballinger but it's fun to play there. They have a lot of tradition. It's not hard to get up for a game like this."

"Those other three games were a lot of fun but they had nothing to do with the state playoffs." Ramsey said the Wolves should be at full strength for the contest and sizes up the contest like he sees the rest of the games that begin 5AAA play that again looks like a barn burner. "The best team doesn't necessarily win. It's probably whoever hangs on to the football. One break could change the game around. It's a pretty solid district."

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Lorraine gets victory

The Lorraine Bulldogs used an improving defense and a changing offense at Borden County Friday night for a 26-12 win their first Six-man win of 1987.

Lorraine, undefeated last year, will be looking to reach the .500 mark when they take on Harrold at Benjamin tomorrow night at 7:30 PM.

"It was pretty much a defensive struggle," said Lorraine coach Tommy Meredith. This a week after the Bulldogs gave up 71 points to Lazbuddie.

"We led 6-0 at halftime but had one touchdown called back," said Meredith. "It was a Casey Cooper to David Sanchez pass play for 60 yards. It was called back for clipping."

After a scoreless first quarter Rudy Sanchez put the Bulldogs on the board with a second quarter 16 yard run. Shawn Finley missed the extra point kick.

"We ran tight the whole first half. We couldn't get the dive going. We spread things out in the second half. We tied our speed against their size and it worked out to our advantage."

A 50 yard pass play from R. Sanchez to Quentin Merket and Finley's PAT kick made it 14-0 for the Bulldogs after three periods.

R. Sanchez opened the fourth quarter with a 27 yard scoring run for a 20-0 lead. Lorraine missed the PAT kick. Borden County then scored on a 10 yard pass and an 8 yard run to cut the Gold and Black lead to 20-12.

The Bulldogs put it away with a 10 yard R. Sanchez scamper that ended the scoring.

"We had to shut down Shannon Boyd," said Meredith, Lorraine's two-year coach who joined the Bulldogs for the first year they dropped from 11-man to Six-man.

"He got 70 yards on us. He had been averaging 160 yards. The defense was really great. Charlie Alvarez has been the biggest surprise. He had't played a lick of football in his life but he's doing alright."

Alvarez made one interception for Lorraine and made 15 tackles with 7 unassisted. Finley had 17 tackles with 9 being unassisted while R. Sanchez made 20 tackles with 9 being unassisted.

"Penalties hurt us all night. We got inside their 5 yard line twice and didn't score because penalties kept pushing us back. I don't like to spread the offense out but if it will help us win the ballgame I will."

R. Sanchez led Lorraine rushers with 85 yards on 15 carries. Fin-

ley added 25 on 7 carries, Merket 12 on 1 carry and Josell Williams 1 on 1 carry-giving the Bulldogs 123 yards total rushing.

In the passing department R. Sanchez completed 6 of 13 passes for 104 yards and 1 touchdown while Cooper completed 3 of 4 for 30 yards. Merket caught 3 passes for 74 yards and 1 score. Cooper added 3 receptions for 27 yards. D. Sanchez 2 for 30 yards and Alvarez 1 for 16 yards.

"Harrold has an explosive, high-powered offense," said Meredith about this week's opponent. Their averaging over 55 points a game. They're also giving up over 35 points a ballgame. It's going to be pretty evenly matched."

"They have a real good end they like to throw to." Harrold, 3-0 after last week's 60-50 win over Vernon Northside, returns offensively honorable mention All-State quarterback Ricky Gillespie, running back Minh Winger and end Shawn Smith.

The Bulldogs' hopes lie in an emerging defense and an offense that's ready to try new strategies. "We're going to try to run it," said Meredith. "If not will spread it out. Rudy (Sanchez) is having a hard time deciding whether to run or pass. I told him if we can get five yards a whack we'll take it."

Ray Rivera, thrown into a starting position at strong safety because of injury to Ritchey, seems

to be enjoying himself. "It feels pretty good(starting as a sophomore)," said Rivera. "I didn't expect it. I thought I'd be on the sideline and just kicking. I freaked out when I started on defense. I'm still learning. It's not like Thursday nights. You get real nervous for Friday's but I just try to keep it out of my because if I don't I'll mess up." Rivera started kicking as a freshman when Saturday and Sunday practice started to pay off and has also come through as a tight end. "We're just going to have to try to beat them(Ballinger) and keep on winning. We gotta have a good defense and move the ball a lot and not give up any turnovers. I hope we Ballinger."

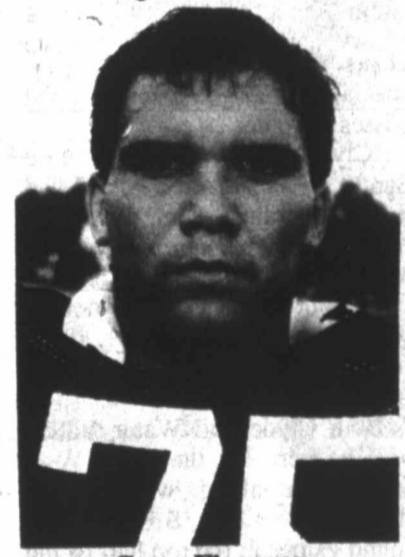
