Bridge Contract To Bowie Firm

Underwood Manufacturing Company of Bowie has been awarded contracts for 2 bridge construction jobs in Mitchell County.

Total amount of the contracts, approved by Commissioners Court this week, was \$12,790.

Underwood was the only bidder for the projects — on Morgan Creek 5 miles north of Iatan in Precinct 2 and on North Champion Creek 3 miles west of Loraine in Precinct 4.

Contract for the Morgan Creek bridge—repair and im-

provement to the 90-foot structure—is for \$8,430. The project is to provide for heavy truck loads moving into the area's expanding oil development.

The Morgan Creek job will be for \$4,360 and will include a new 30-foot structure to replace a narrow concrete bridge.

Another county project was discussed in conferences during the week at the Court house when commissioners met with representatives of 2 steel fabricating firms of Midland-Odessa area.

The commissioners sought suggestions, ideas and building data pertaining to plans for construction of county livestock barn at the west city limits.

The series of conferences—a third firm had been contacted earlier and more will be sought—are shaping up build-

A-Battery Leaves For Fort Hood Encampment

Colorado City men in A-Battery, Third Rocket Howitzer Battalion, 132 Field Artillery, were to leave this morning by convoy for the 49th Armored Division encampment at North Fort Hood.

The encampment is set for July 17 through July 31. Sixty-nine men are in A-Battery, 29 of whom are from Colorado City.

HIGH SCHOOL'S MARRIAGE RULE

Married students in the future at Colorado City High will be limited to regular classroom work only.

That's the decision of school board members expressed in a resolution approved this week.

The resolution was adopted to state definitely the school's official policy concerning married students so there will be no misunderstanding if and when a student marries, Supt. Frank Wilson said.

School officials checked 25 high schools before taking the action.

Seventeen of the schools contacted—just as the policy adopted for Colorado City High—restricted married students to regular class work only and ruled them out of school activities. Two other schools suspended married students for 2 semesters and only 6 had no definite policy.

The new policy here goes into effect this fall, Wilson said.

FOR FREEWAY LOOP

4 More Right of Way Cases Up for Hearing

Special commissioners are expected to be named Monday to hear 4 more condemnation cases for Interstate 20 freeway.

Commissioners Court will discuss the appointments in a Courthouse meeting.

The special commissioners will sit as juries of view in the second group of cases that are winding up the acquisition of right of way for the freeway route looping Colorado City on the north.

Three cases were heard this week. Total number to be heard are 13, according to Joe Smoot, Texas Highway Department resident engineer.

Scheduled to be heard just as soon as special commissioners are appointed are these four cases: E. H. Wilson, involving 1.772 acres of land; Luther Long, involving 23.817 acres of land; R. B. Golden, involving 5.647 acres of land, and Lewis Vowell, involving 23.026 acres.

Hearing for a fifth case, which deals with 20.813 acres owned by Dr. J. Melvin Crymes, will be delayed until Crymes returns from vacation.

Juries of view this week made the following awards in initial right of way cases:

To Mrs. Art Heath et al (Bohannon Estate) — \$10,700 for 28.918 acres of land and damages, including \$1,000 to tenant Roy Neal.

To A. T. Hammond et al — \$6,725 for 643 acres of land, moving residence and damages.

To H. S. (Dick) Hickman — \$7,795 for 33.053 acres of land, damages and easement for drainage channel, including \$350 to Herman Ornelas and \$50 to Mack Doss, tenants.

The Bohannon Estate acreage is located east of State Highway 208, (to Snyder), northeast of the city's residential area, in vicinity of where Colorado Independent School District this year purchased a future school site.

Location of the Hammond property is adjacent to State Highway 208 (to Snyder) at 200.

where the highway and freeway will be separated by overpass.

Three voting places will be open Thursday for Mitchell County producers balloting in the 1961 wheat referendum.

The voting will decide whether marketing quotas — and accompanying requirements — are in effect for the 1961 wheat crop.

Orion J. (Jack) Linam, chairman of Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Committee, said the balloting places will be: Colorado City—Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation office, Loraine — Woodrow Pratt's Cotton & Grain office.

If at least two-thirds of the wheat growers who vote approved the quotas, then the quotas will be in effect for the '61 crop. In addition, marketing penalties will apply to the "excess" wheat of growers who do not comply with their farm allotments and price support will be available at not less than 75 per cent of parity.

Exact level of the price support will be announced soon, Linam said.

If more than one-third of the voters oppose the quotas, there will be no quotas or penalties for the '61 wheat crop and price support will be available at 50 per cent of parity. Also, allotments will remain in effect as a condition of the lower price support eligibility.

Councilmen and City Manager Earl Keaton will begin conferences with the engineers at 7:30 p. m. in City Hall.

The talks will be relative to checking qualifications, policies and other data pertinent to hiring of a consulting firm. City Council Monday night gave the signal for immediate conferences with engineers, subsequent to hiring consultants for a study and recommendations for improvements to the city water plant and distribution system.

Pinch of water usage again water plant capacity stirred council into the engineering conference. Capacity of the city's water treatment plant is approximately 2,500,000 gallons daily. Yet, city water usage early this summer already was peaking to near 3,000,000 gallons—a predicament which required the city to turn to its well field for supplemental supply.

Council Monday night voted 5 to 2 against rescinding its ordinance charging higher minimums for big tap water connections at local residences. Mayor Bob Robinson and Councilman H. I. Berman favored dropping the differential.

But Mayor Pro Tem Lawrence R. Uddick, Councilmen John Chinn, Sam L. (Buzz) Majors, Ira Uitz and A. W. Hubbard voted "no," emphasizing COUNCIL Pg. 7

When conditions — such as drought or hail—beyond control of a farm operator prevents the planting of cotton or having cotton available for harvest on any acreage in excess of the Choice A allotment, the operator may file an application with the ASC Committee to change the Choice B allotment to Choice A.

Sharon Producer, New Test Logged

One well completion and a new drilling location have been logged in Mitchell County oil fields.

The new producer is Wise Development No. 2 W. L. Hamilton, with an initial daily pumping potential of 33 barrels of 30 gravity oil in Sharon Ridge-1700 Field.

Production was from perforations between 1,548 and 1,580 feet at a location in Section 9, Block 20, T&P Survey.

Spotted as a new drilling site is Thies Drilling Company of Fort Stockton No. 1-A Powell, located on 80 acres 4 miles northwest of Westbrook in Turner-Gregory Field.

The No. 1-A Powell will be a cable tool project to 3,000 feet at a site 1,250 feet from south and 1,510 feet from and

west lines of Section 18, Block 28, T-1-N, T&P Survey.

Turner-Gregory was tops in new development for Mitchell County during the first 6 months of this year, with 11 new oil wells completed for total new potential of 812.67 barrels daily.

The Turner-Gregory completes were a third of the county's entire 33 new wells from January to July. Total potential for the entire 33 was 2,043.20 barrels per day.

Other completions during the first half of '60 in Mitchell County were: 6 wells for 1,000 barrels daily in Sharon Ridge-1700 Field; 4 wells for 1,175 barrels daily in Westbrook Field; 13 wells completed in 1,400 East Howard-1,400 Field.

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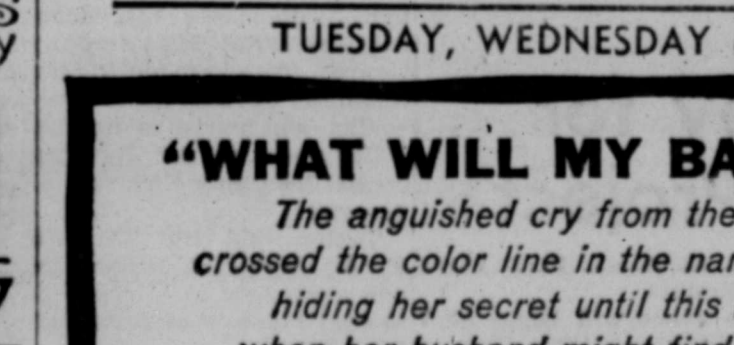

MINIATURE CRAB RICE PUFFS

2 cups cooked crabmeat 2 tablespoons minced onion
fresh, frozen or canned 3 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
1 cup cooked rice 3 tablespoons lemon juice
cooked in chicken broth 1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 cup chopped celery 1/4 cup chili sauce
1 1/2 cup sweet pickle-relish salt and pepper to taste
Place crabmeat, rice, celery, pickle-relish, onion and eggs in a mixing bowl. Toss lightly. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Add mayonnaise and chili sauce to moisten. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Chill until just before serving time.

Slice the tops from cream puffs. Fill with crabmeat mixture and replace tops.

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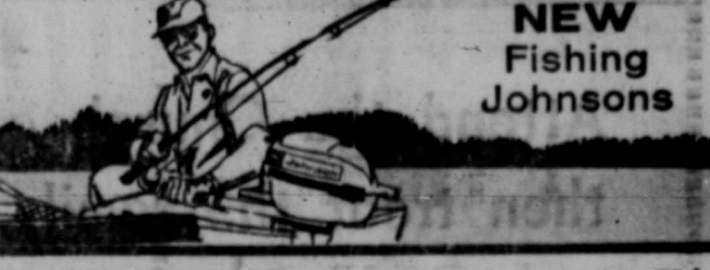

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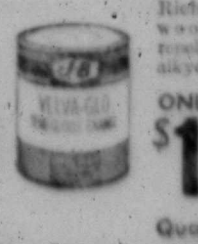

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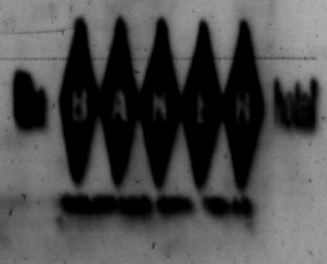

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

During the dove hunting season the wife of a friend of mine proudly displayed a new 20-gauge shotgun which her husband had given her for a birthday present.

That's an old trick. Many a husband has gotten a new gun or a new fishing rod of his special choice by the magnanimous gesture of giving it to friend wife for a present.

Sorta like buying junior an electric train!

Times are changing, however. If you don't believe it, go afield and note how many wives now are shooting.

There was a wonderful demonstration of this during the three-day white-winged dove season in the Valley. Here it was possible to see a congregation of hunters—thousands of them in fact. It seemed that about every third shooter was a woman. Some were wives, some were sweethearts, and some were unattached.

Women always have had a good eye for shooting. Whether at the trap or in the field, when they half try, women are just about as good shots as men. Some are far better.

Some women have come along slowly in gun-handling because they lack the natural aptitude of men for things mechanical. But when a woman understands the gun she is shooting, she becomes deadly with it. Game had better watch out.

Usually when a man presents his wife with a gun it is a good one. Perhaps it is the result of his own desires. But let's be charitable and say that he wants his wife to have the very best.

Usually this same man will put her in the best hunting spot and gallantly permit her to have the first shot. He's confident that if she misses he will kill the bird anyway. But, men find, very much to their surprise, that many of the birds failed to get through the pattern from the wife's gun.

A woman of my acquaintance who dearly loves the outdoors, had for a number of years shot a little single .410.

She never had killed a dove on wing. She had developed a habit of closing her eyes every time she pointed the gun at a flying bird, then pulled the trigger.

This year she came into possession of a neat little 28-gauge automatic. She was given a long preparatory drill in its handling and warned against the habit of closing her eyes.

On the very first shot she knocked down her dove. She almost got her limit from the first box of shells. On the next trip she was shooting alongside her husband, matching him bird for bird.

This is typical, for across the entire field of participating sports, women are assuming their position side by side with the men, and getting just as much enjoyment. They are good sports too. And certainly they make for more business for the sporting goods dealers.

Women are good fishermen, too. Elaine Vickers, who lives at Buchanan Dam, won the Texas bass championship last year at Lake Belton. Since then her picture and stories of her prowess have appeared in hundreds of newspapers across the nation.

Every day she gets letters from other women who want to learn to fish. They tell her of their experiences and wish for other women the same enjoyment they now have on water.

Some die-hard men fishermen talked about Elaine's victory being a fluke. They said it was just an accident that a woman could catch more and bigger fish than a man.

To show that it was no fluke she went to the coast with some top King fishermen. Around the oil rigs in the surf southeast of Corpus Christi she hung into more Kings than any of the men fishermen along.

Before 11 a. m. she had loaded her boat with Kings and headed for shore. By one o'clock that afternoon she was ready to go fishing again. But the men in the party wanted to rest a couple more hours.

There is a big place in the outdoors world for women who want to hunt and fish, or who enjoy other brands of water sports. Their children, too, will better appreciate the outdoors and the world will be better as a result.

Today when a man gives his wife a gun or a rod and reel, he might as well realize that she intends to use it. And she is beginning to learn the merchandise, too.

If you don't believe that, just drop into any sporting goods or marine store. You'll find plenty of women shoppers there.

Women today already are playing a very important part in boat buying. Very few good rigs are sold without the wife assisting in the selection, especially as to size, color, and price.
