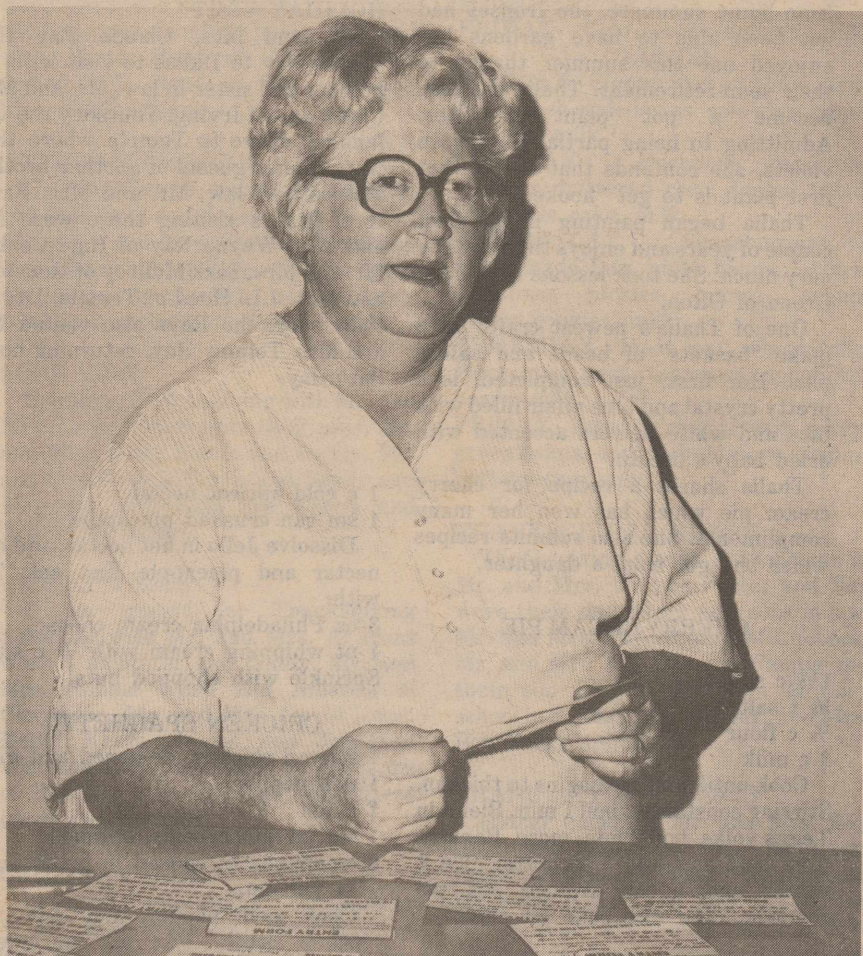

Cotton Harvest Still On 'Hold'

Soggy fields, well-soaked from recent snows, are still keeping cotton farmers from gathering their remaining cotton acreages. All three local gins had caught up this week with the cotton they had on yards and were awaiting drying conditions.

Hart Gin was able to pick up some

modules Monday but conditions were still too wet for operations to get into full swing.

L.J. Rice, manager of Hart Producers Co-op Gin, said he believed the area cotton was 80 to 85 percent in when the snows came.

Mailing Suggestions Shared

With the Christmas mailing season just ahead, Hart Postmaster Betty Sanders is offering some tips for customers to make sure their cards and packages arrive on time and in good shape.

In addition to shopping early, Postmaster Sanders urges customers to properly address cards and packages with the name, street number and name or post office box number and the city, state and ZIP code reserved for the last line. It's also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels. Be sure to include your return address including your ZIP code on all envelopes and packages.

Postmaster Sanders also reminds customers to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas cards. Letter size standards which went into effect last year require envelopes to be at least 3 1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The Postal Service is also asking its customers to put an ounce of extra care in preparing packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their destination in good shape if mailers follow a few simple instructions:

1. Make sure the contents are well-cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item, on the bottom, the sides and on top of your gift. Foamed plastic shells and air pocket padding are also good cushions.

2. Brown wrapping paper and twine cord are not necessary. Wrappings can rip off, and twine can get caught in processing machinery.

3. Use sealing tape to close off and

seal the box. Three types are recommended - pressure-sensitive tape, kraft paper reinforced with nylon or glass and filament-reinforced pressure-sensitive tape. DON'T use masking tape or cellophane tape. They're no longer recommended due to past poor performance.

4. Use a smudge-proof ink for the address which should appear in the lower right-hand corner of the box. Write your return address in the upper left-hand corner. BE SURE TO INCLUDE THE ZIP CODE FOR BOTH THE ADDRESSEE'S ADDRESS AND YOUR RETURN ADDRESS.

5. Remove any other labels or addresses from the carton.

6. Mail early in the month and mail early in the day to avoid the rush.

7. Send irreplaceable articles, cash and all valuable items by registered mail.

Cook until mixture begins to thicken. Stirring constantly, boil 1 min. Blend in 3 eggs yolks, boil 2 min. more. Remove from heat and add 1 T butter, 1 1/2 t vanilla and 1 can drained red pie cherries. Pour into bake pie shell.

Mrs. Warren Lemons showed a film strip and pictures as she told of the life and works of Picasso at a recent meeting of the Zealot Club.

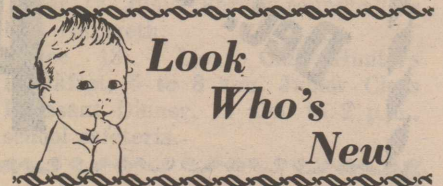

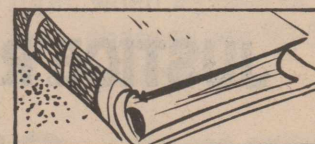

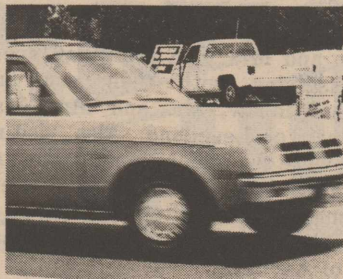

Why 55?

1. Traffic accidents are the number one cause of death to America's young people . . . 60% of accidental deaths of ages 1 through 19 are the result of traffic accidents.



2. Excessive speed is involved in 70% of all fatal

accidents.



3. You lose 1 mile per gallon for each 5 mph you drive over 50. Department of Transportation studies show that cars improve their gas mileage from 17% to 40% at 55 as opposed to 70.

4. The average car can get as many as 50 more miles per tankful. Or stated another way, you could save two extra gallons for every ten gallons you buy, simply by driving 55 instead of 70.

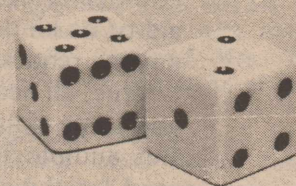
5. If more drivers would go no faster than 55 mph, we could save 4.9 billion gallons each year. (Our country uses nine million gallons of highway motor fuel a day.)

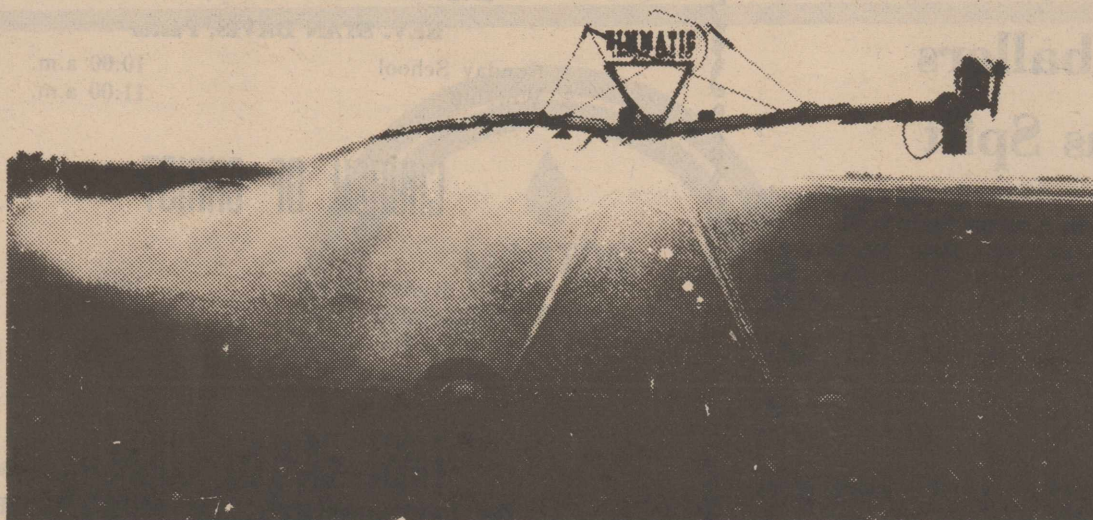
7. 55 mph may seem slow. The truth is, driving 55 costs you very little in time.

A 100 mile trip driving 65 mph takes one hour and 32 minutes. That same trip at 55 takes one hour and 49 minutes. Seventeen minutes difference.



8. Like better odds? At 55 mph, chances of a fatal accident are 1 in 33. At 70 mph, when a crash occurs, chances are 50-50 of a fatal accident.

9. 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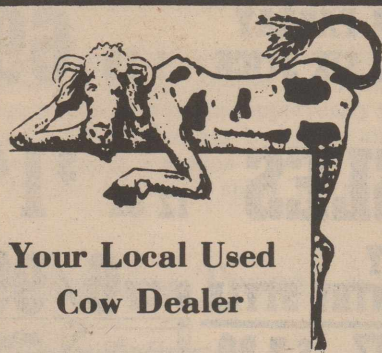
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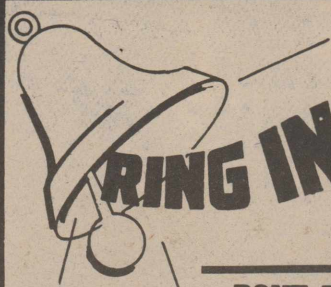
