Cooperating also, here is a recent resolution passed by the Knox Curtis Post of the American Legion, which reads as follows:

Resolution

WHEREAS this nation is involved in a war whose successful prosecution demands the best efforts of all the people, and

WHEREAS the homes and farms of this country contain a huge amount of scrap metal, rags, rubber and other materials that is urgently needed by war industries for the manufacture of tanks, guns and other equipment, and

WHEREAS the government has established in our community a salvage committee for the purpose of collecting this scrap; now

THEREFORE, be it resolved that Knox Curtis Post, No. 42, American Legion, pledge its full support and cooperation to the salvage committee of this city and county, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that as an organization and as individual members, each of us hereby offers his services to the end that the scrap salvage committee of this section may achieve its highest goal.

LARGEST POLITICAL RALLY THIS YEAR HEARS O'DANIEL

With the voters "gunning" for politicians and would-be office holders, the largest crowd this season turned out to hear U. S. Senator W. Lee O'Daniel when he spoke from his sound truck on the east side of the square Friday afternoon about 5:30.

Following the usual incidental music, Senator O'Daniel mounted the speaker's stand and layed his platform on the air via loudspeaker system.

Senator O'Daniel said he was now on an appreciation tour" of Texas, both to thank the voters for their magnificent support and ask them to keep up the good work and make it even better this time.

Said he felt lonesome with only one opponent, as they usually had four or five or more on his neck.

Said his opponent had practically "adopted" his platform since the first primary, and was trying to help the farmers with 25c cotton but hadn't said anything about helping the ranchers, peanut farmers, orange growers or any of the other kind of farmers. Said I've always been with and for the farmers, helping them every way possible.

O'Daniel lambasted the labor racketeers and the politically controlled newspapers and radio, and said they always had to get a legal expert to look over every scrip on the radio, but that speaking from his platform, he could say what he liked without this censorship.

Numerous times during the speech he was lustily cheered and the applause continued throughout his talk. The W. Lee O'Daniel News and stickers were passed out to the crowd.

REDS STOP NAZIS

Moscow, Aug. 17 (AP).—Soviet Russia announced officially today that the Caucasus oil city of Maikop had fallen to the Germans, but only after all oil supplies and equipment had been saved from the city and the oil establishments themselves made completely unusable.

MOSLEMS REVOLT IF HINDUS WIN

Bombay India, Aug. 16 (AP).—The leader of India's 80-million Moslems, Mohamed Ali Jinnah, declared Sunday that if the British in seeking peace with the Hindu-dominant India Congress party sacrificed the Moslem's interest he would end his cooperation.

MARINES TIGHTEN GRIP

Australia, Aug. 16 (AP).—U. S. Marines fighting in the sweltering rains of the Tulai area and

supported by naval units in the danerous waters of Sealark and Indispensable Channels were tightening their grip in the Solomons Sunday as the battle ended its tenth day.

LAND SHIPS AID MALTA

Carlo, Aug. 16 (AP).—Minute cooperation between air and sea forces enabled the furious beset convoy to deliver vital supplies to Malta last week, RAF spokesmen revealed Sunday.

London, Aug. 16 (AP).—U. S. army flyers, flying wing to wing with a Canadian squadron, made a long sweep over France in the past 24 hours, a communique announced Sunday.

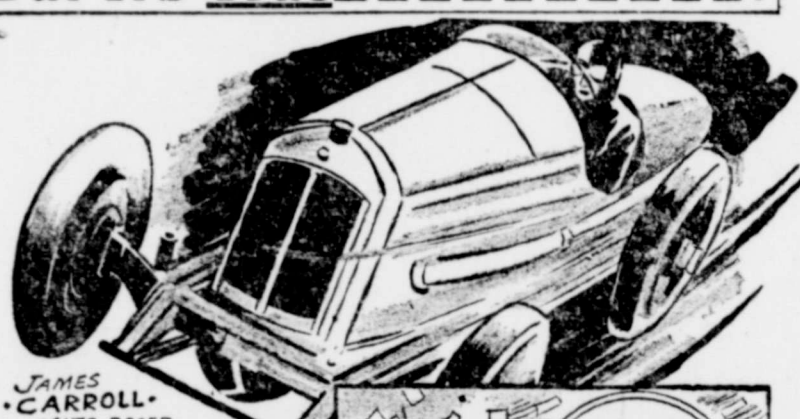

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article
 3 of the Constitution of Texas
 authorizing the lending of Two
 Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the
 Permanent School Fund for the
 construction of the State office
 building or buildings; providing
 for repayment to the Permanent
 School Fund; providing for the
 submission of this Amendment to
 the voters of this State; and pro-
 viding for the necessary procla-
 mation and expense of publica-
 tion.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the
 Constitution of the State of Texas
 be amended by adding thereto a
 new section to be known as Sec-
 tion 49-b which shall read as fol-
 lows:

"Section 49-b. The Legislature
 may provide by law for the is-
 suance of not more than two Mil-
 lion Dollars (\$2,000,000) in bonds
 or obligations of the State of Texas
 to the Permanent School Fund for
 the construction in the City of
 Austin of the State office building
 or buildings, and the State Board
 of Education is hereby directed to
 invest not more than Two Million
 Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Perma-
 nent School Fund therein. Such
 bonds shall be executed on behalf
 of the State of Texas by the Gov-
 ernor and Comptroller, and shall
 bear a rate of interest not to ex-
 ceed three (3) per cent per an-
 num, payable annually; they shall
 be of such denomination as may
 be prescribed by law, and shall be
 payable in not to exceed twenty-
 five (25) equal installments begin-
 ning one (1) year from date of is-
 suance; and the State Treasurer
 is hereby authorized and directed
 to set aside into a special fund an-
 nually at the beginning of each
 fiscal year until all of said bonds
 shall have been paid off and dis-
 charged, a sufficient amount of
 the first moneys coming into the
 Treasury for the use and benefit
 of the General Revenue Fund not
 otherwise heretofore obligated
 to the payment of bonds and inter-
 est, a sufficient amount to pay the
 interest becoming due and the
 bonds maturing during such fiscal
 year. From said Fund, the Treas-
 urer shall pay the interest on said
 bonds as it comes due, to the cred-
 it of the Available School Fund;
 and shall pay off said bonds as
 they become due and deposit the
 amounts so paid to the credit of
 the Permanent School Fund. The
 power hereby granted to issue
 bonds is expressly limited to the
 amount stated and to five (5) years
 from and after the adoption of this
 grant by the people."

Section 2. The foregoing Consti-
 tutional Amendment shall be sub-
 mitted to the qualified voters of
 the State of Texas at an election
 to be held on the third day of
 November, 1942, at which election
 all voters favoring such proposed
 Amendment shall write or have
 printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the
 Constitution of the State of Texas
 authorizing the investment of not
 more than Two Million Dollars
 (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent
 School Fund in bonds of the State
 of Texas to be issued for the con-
 struction of a State office build-
 ing or buildings and providing
 for the repayment of the said sum
 of money to the Permanent School
 Fund."

Those voters opposing said
 Amendment shall write or have
 printed on their ballots the words:
 "Against the Amendment to the
 Constitution of the State of Texas
 authorizing the investment of not
 more than Two Million Dollars
 (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent
 School Fund in bonds of the State
 of Texas to be issued for the con-
 struction of a State office build-
 ing or buildings and providing
 for the repayment of the said sum
 of money to the Permanent School

Fund."

Section 3. The Governor of the
 State is hereby directed to issue
 the necessary proclamation for
 said election and have the same
 published as required by the
 Constitution and existing laws of
 the State.

Section 4. The sum of Eight
 Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so
 much thereof as may be necessary,
 is hereby appropriated out of any
 funds in the Treasury of the state
 not otherwise appropriated to pay
 the expenses of said publication
 and election.

WAR BOND QUOTAS FOR AUGUST

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 10.—Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, today announced the August War Bond Quotas for the 3,070 counties in the nation totalling \$815,000,000.

The August quota for the State of Texas is \$27,250,000.

In arriving at the county quotas for August the Treasury Department took into consideration major factors affecting incomes which in turn cause significant variations in sales during the twelve-month period.

Hereafter actual Bond sales in the various states will be compared with quotas on a cumulative basis. The amount by which sales fall short of or exceed quotas in any month will be added to or subtracted from quotas for future months.

Quotas by counties are:

SIDE GLANCES ON TEXAS HISTORY

By Charles O. Hucker

WAR PRODUCTION—1860 STYLE

While Texas was not "in the thick" of the Civil War activity, it did see a few engagements, and at the outset of Texas' participation it became readily apparent to the state's administration that "business as usual" was out and the state's affairs would have to be placed on a war economy.

Details of this war effort are described by F. R. Lubbock in his memories, "Six Decades in Texas," a copy of which is a valued item

in the University of Texas Library's extensive Texas collection. Lubbock was governor of Texas during the early stages of Texas' participation.

Selective (?) Service

Lubbock called for, and obtained passage of, a law under which "every able-bodied man in the state liable to military duty shall be enrolled, disciplined, and placed under command of good and efficient officers. The compulsory military service age bracket extended from 18 to 50, and only essential public service agents were exempt.

Financing the War Effort

A military board was set up, with Lubbock as its head, empowered to use for military purposes the United States bonds in the state treasury, substituting for them in equal amounts Confede-

rate bonds, which officials of the Confederacy assured the Texas government "must be at all times at par, if not above."

In line with this program, the War Department of the Confederate States of America proposed to the Texas Military Board that a War Department agent—G. H. Giddings of Texas—purchase Mexican munition for the Confederacy's use with Texas-held United States bonds, with the understanding that the Confederacy "will receive the arms from you at cost and charges, and pay for them in its own 8 per cent bonds." The Texas board gave Giddings \$100,000 of the bonds on his receipt, informing the War Department that "In return, we expect to receive the Confederate bonds bearing 8 per cent interest." The War Department, however, replied that it had no authority to make such an exchange, being empowered merely to "purchase" the arms from the Texas agency.

Somewhat disconcerted, the military board, however, permitted Giddings ample time to attempt to negotiate the bonds, but he was "without success, and finally returned them to the board and they were placed back in the treasury."

Military Arsenals

In its other enterprises, on the other hand, the military board encountered more encouraging results. It purchased cotton with the state's loan bonds, forwarded it to Mexico and sold it, using the proceeds to buy essential military materials and to establish factories for the manufacture of arms and other needed supplies, Lubbock wrote.

It built a small cannon factory at Austin, to use copper from Mexico. The few brass cannons that were turned out "were finished complete, thoroughly tested with double charges of powder and solid four-pound shot, and in workmanship, appearance and excellence would compare favorably with any turned out by any cannon factory," Lubbock declared.

"We also established a cap and cartridge factory at Austin, utilizing the supreme court building for that purpose. It was also a part of our policy to make advances in cash and cotton to private individuals, in order that they might be enabled to establish needed industries."

100 Years Ago in Texas

"The public schools in the city of Houston will be opened on Monday next, the 21st inst., under the direction and instruction of the Rev. H. Reid.

"Rates and tuition, for spelling, reading, writing and arithmetic two dollars per month in par funds; for English grammar, and geography, three dollars per month; for the Latin and Greek languages, and the higher branches of science, four dollars per month, all to be paid in par funds. The pupils will not be permitted to use indecent or profane language while members of the Academy. —Telegraph and Texas Register (Houston), March 23, 1942.

once in well scalded pint jars. When ready to use drain off all liquid, rinse in cold water. Drain again. Cover with cold water and set where mixture will heat gradually, then boil 5 minutes. Drain season and serve in any way preferred.

Cucumber Pickles

18 large cucumbers
6 small onions chopped fine
1 quart vinegar
1½ cups sugar
1 tsp. cinnamon
2 tsp. mustard seed
2 tsp. ginger
½ tsp. celery seed
½ ground black pepper
1 tsp. tumeric powder

Cook together for about half an hour. Bottle and seal.

Okra

Only young, tender pods should be canned; older pods should be dried. After the okra is washed, cover with water, bring to a boil, and pack hot into the containers. Add 1 teaspoon of salt to each quart. Process immediately.

Canned Corn

10 cups corn
½ cup salt
1 cup sugar
2 cups boiling water
Cut corn from cob before measuring. Mix all ingredients and boil 5 to 10 minutes and seal at

Shell, wash add hot water to cover and simmer for about 5 minutes. Pack hot in pint jars or No. 2 tin cans, cover with hot water and add ½ teaspoon of salt to each pint. If tender peas are packed in quart jars or No. 3 cans they become overcooked and mushy.

Canned String Beans

1½ lbs. green or wax beans
3 cups water
2 tbsp. salt
1 tbsp. vinegar

Select young stringless beans. Wash thoroughly, cut slanting, in 1-inch lengths. Boil water, salt and vinegar a few minutes, add beans. Let boil 7 minutes. Place boiling hot, in hot sterilized jars, adjust new scalded rubbers, fill jar to overflowing with the boiling brine and seal at once. Enough for 1 quart. When ready to serve remove from jar, drain and rinse. Boil in fresh boiling water from 15 to 20 minutes or until tender.

Corn Relish

1 cabbage
12 ears corn
4 red peppers
4 green peppers
1 large onion
1½ cups sugar
6 cups vinegar
2 tsp. salt

Chop cabbage, corn, peppers and onion. Boil vinegar, sugar, add corn, cabbage, peppers and onion. Boil half an hour. Seal.

Canned Beets

Select young even-sized beets, cut off leaves, leaving 1-inch stem and all the root to retain the color. Wash and scrub. Cook in boiling water until tender, dip in cold water, and rub off skin with soft cloth. For each quart of boiled beets, take 1 quart water, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons vinegar. Heat water, vinegar and sugar, drop in beets, let heat to boiling point and pour at once into hot sterilized jars.

Chili Sauce

12 ripe tomatoes, cut in eighths
3 large onions, chopped fine
1 green pepper, chopped fine
1 cup sugar
1 cup vinegar
1 tbsp. celery seed
1 tsp. mustard
1 tsp. ginger
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. pepper

If you've been foresighted enough to have a war garden you will want to preserve some of its succulent products for next winter. It's an economical and patriotic measure, and, in addition, will yield great benefits in fine foodstuffs.

Canning Tomatoes

Select smooth, pink, fleshy tomatoes. Wash. Plunge few at a time in boiling water. When skins loosen, dip at once into cold water. Remove stem core and then skin, cut in quarters or slice. Place in preserving kettle, adding 1 teaspoon salt to 1 quart of tomatoes. Heat slowly, stirring frequently from the bottom. Let boil for 30 minutes. Pour boiling hot into hot sterilized jars, adjust new scalded rubbers and seal immediately.

Sweet Pickles

½ cup sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 quart vinegar
Spice to taste
Pour boiling brine (1 cup salt to a gallon of water) on pickles 3 days in succession. Heat salt, vinegar, sugar and spices. Fill jars with pickles, adding a small piece of alum the size of a pea to each jar, and pour hot syrup over pickles. When wanted to serve, add a cupful of light brown sugar or honey to a quart of pickles. Let stand 24 hours.

Canning Tomato Soup

1 peck ripe tomatoes
4 onions, sliced
12 sprigs parsley
2 bay leaves
1 tsp. pepper corns
1 tsp. celery seed
1 tsp. cloves, heads removed
2 tbsp. salt
1 tsp. sugar

Wipe tomatoes and quarter. Tie pieces in a bag. Boil all together gently at first, until the juices flow. Then let simmer for ½ hour. Strain, reheat, bring to boiling point, pour into sterilized, air-tight jars to overflowing, and seal at once. Use for meat, fish or vegetables, gravies or for soups.

Green Peas

Use only young, tender peas.
