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#### FOUR YOUTHS ARE JAILED IN ROBBERY

COUNTY OFFICERS ARREST QUARTET AS SUSPECTS IN \$500 THEFT

#### SEEKS TRAVEL RECORD

Balchen May Be Employed to Pilot Plane for Mears in Attempt to Establish Globe Mark

NEW YORK, July 27.—(AP)—The New York World says that Bert Balchen, member of Commander Byrd's trans-Atlantic flight crew, is being sought by John Henry Mears, former holder of the round-the-world speed record, as pilot of a plane in which Mears would attempt to capture his lost title.

Balchen left here tonight for Porton to confer with Byrd as to the possibility of making such a flight before the start of the Arctic flyer's south pole project, on which Balchen is to be engaged.

Mears, until last summer had held the globe circumnavigation record for 13 years. Edward S. Evans, and Linton Wells took the title from him with a mark of 23 days, 14 hours, 26 minutes, and 3 seconds. Mears contemplates hoping off with Balchen in a Fokker monoplane with a single Wright whirling motor and gliding the globe without changing from the craft. He would start about September 1 and try to complete the flight within 22 or 23 days.

#### SUBWAY BOMBS FOUND

Police Express Relief That It Had Nothing To Do With Strike Threats Recently Made

NEW YORK, July 27.—(AP)—With the threatened subway and elevated line strikes averted, at least for the moment, the police today reported that a bomb found shortly after the strike was called off in one of the east river subway tunnels.

There was no suggestion that it belonged to any connection with the subway strike, police believing it had been placed by a crank.

Police bomb experts and a chemist of the United States Bureau of Mines found that the bomb, an 18-gauge iron pipe with screw threads at one end, was filled with five pounds of dynamite and gun powder. An electric percussion cap was connected by wire to the third rail in such a manner as to be detonated when a train passed.

The bureau of mines chemist expressed the opinion that if the bomb had exploded the walls of the tunnel would have been blown away and the river would have inundated the tube, probably drowning all the passengers of the passing train.

#### GANG WARFARE RAGING

Worthless Check Leads to Death of Frank Hitchcock Who Was Planning to Open Inn

CHICAGO, July 27.—(AP)—A worthless check, given a gang of west side hoodlums, cost the life of Frank Hitchcock, who was found shot through the head, less than two miles from his residence in Burnham today.

Hitchcock, it was stated, planned to re-open the Arrowhead Inn, closed 25 months ago by a federal injunction, and for the last three months he had been stocking the place. Possibility that the check was given for part of the stock is believed to have led to the murder.

The killing is the thirtieth in the last six months here, in the gambling war being waged in the city and suburbs.

#### RANGERS ARE SCOUTING

Border Legion Takes To Brush To Halt Smuggling Activity After Old Fashioned Methods

MISSION, Texas, July 27.—(AP)—Returning to the methods of years ago to curb smuggling along the border, a company of rangers, augmented by mounted customs officers, have taken to the brush to the old country along the Rio Grande.

Ranger Captain Bill Sterling is in command of the expedition which includes pack mules heavily loaded with food and ammunition.

It is the first time since Governor Neff's administration that rangers, acting as a "boycott" company, have been used for the purpose of "putting a stop to degradations by armed bands of marauders."

Old timers recall in 1921 when Captain Bill Wright's company marched into the brush.

In two weeks of 1921 they had three fights and killed eight men, thereby putting a stop for the time to the operations of smugglers.

Returns Attack  
"I have not heretofore used Ferguson's name," he said, "but referred to an article in the Ferguson Forum charging the amendment in which he said I admitted three against real estate are excessive and we should have some relief, but the discrimination is against all real estate, city, as well as country, and nobody is to be exempted."

The Woman's Day

It met my eye as I read the evening paper homeward bound. "A girl's life begins when she marries," which Artie Brisbane, Texas, stood mopefully and alone...

I find that I am not the only woman who saw red and wrestled with a wild yearning to wring his neck. The open forums of papers the country over are filled with the uproar from a few hundred abandoned women who, though unmarried, had at least killed themselves that they were "living," and not dead, as Artie seems to think.

Another woman newspaper writer provides this: "I wonder, and am doubtful about Mr. Brisbane's pronouncement—it sounds decidedly artificial. I might even be tempted to express a suspicion that, too often, a boy's life ends when he goes into business, and a girl's when she marries."

"But I wouldn't." "I suppose it's largely a matter of one's definition of life. To one who agrees with Brisbane the big and significant thing may be the business of carrying on the species."

"Personally, I don't much care whether it's carried on or not, and 'life' to me is a matter of color—of which I find considerably more than do many of the married folks I know."

There is food for thought of a different sort here. Especially interesting is that point of whether or not it is so important that the human species be carried on. If we deny it, we are knocking out the props from under hundreds of thousands of women who have buckled down to their life's job of child-bearing and rearing, supported by a philosophy, conscious or subconscious, which assured them that their job was important, and its doing a civic duty.

But that's for another day. Today we must cudgel Artie. I hadn't heard that moth-eaten idea since when, a little girl, the family "pet" never married. Anne was a spinster of some 30 years, and superintendent of the county school. A job for a woman it was in those days when any job other than milking or sewing or hired-girling was a big job for a woman. Anne lived well, and even supplied some of the luxuries of life to her married sisters, who were lucky if they had the necessities. But "poor Anne has never really lived," the family bleated.

If it's a tasty nip in the harem of the modern woman to know that she herself knows that she is not really emancipated, and to know that she does not really revel in her state to the full, they may make the most of the nip.

"We may have our jobs and salaries and some independence," one of these women who have "never lived" said to me not long ago. "But we will not be really emancipated until we are accepted as human beings who are doing a worthwhile job which is intended to be a permanent job, and not merely a 'stop-gap' till we conform and marry and do the one thing which our families and the world in general will acclaim as a vital job."

Mother's Grief Halts Court Trial

FRANKLIN, La., July 28 (AP)—Grief of the aged mother of James J. Leboeuf, halted the trial of his alleged slayer for murder here today. Mrs. Willie Leboeuf collapsed after a half hour and a halt of her first visit to the court room.

Sitting near the daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ada Leboeuf, who with her alleged lover, Dr. Thomas E. Dreher, and James Beadle, is charged with murdering Leboeuf, the aged woman began sobbing as they then her shoulders heaved and she sobbed audibly.

Court was recessed and she was led from the room and taken to her home.

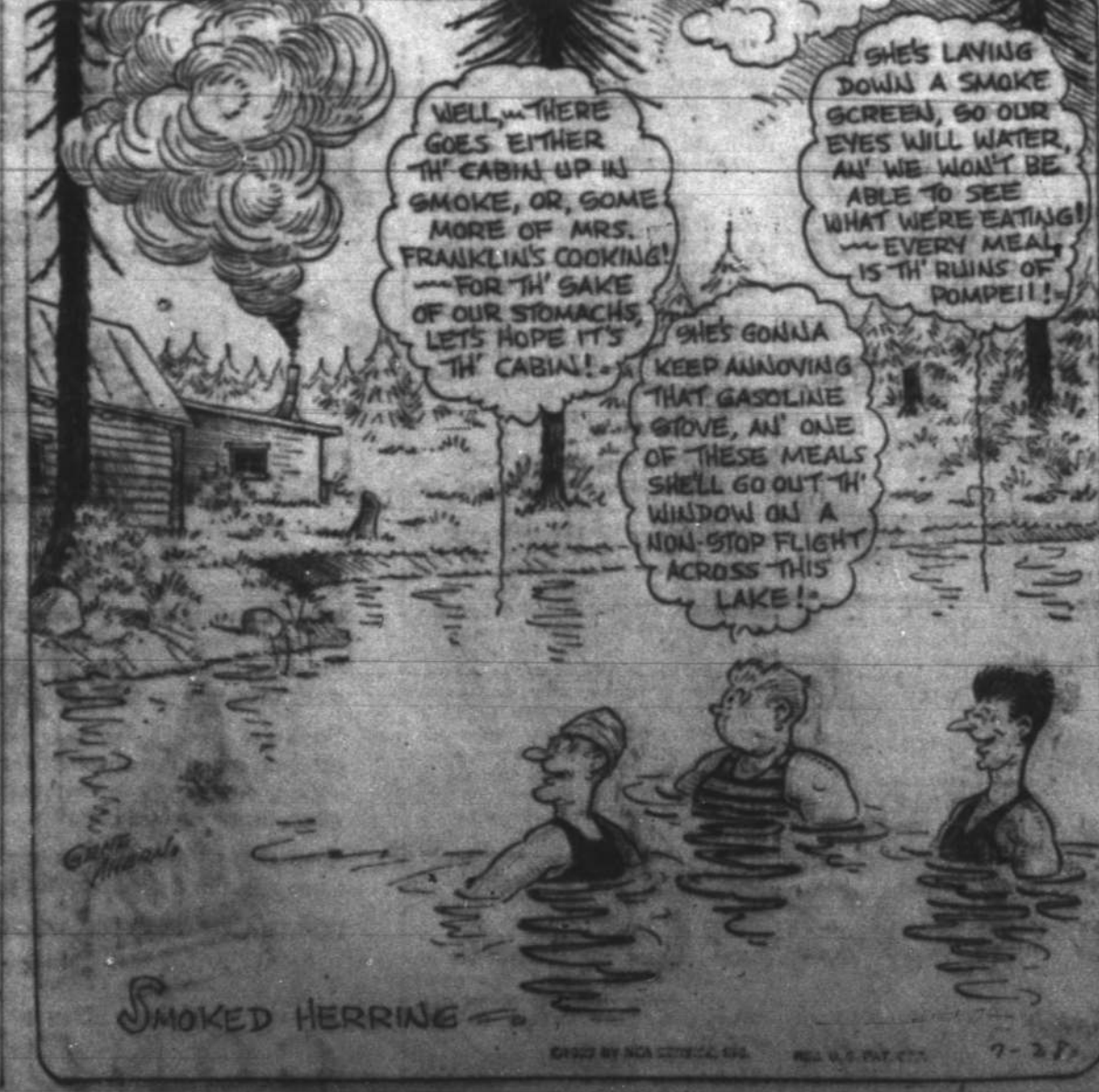
