Bigott resigns; Poole hired as cage coach

Harry Poole, former Post Athletic, has been hired by the school trustees as Post's high school basketball coach. Bigott, who in 1958 years at the cage helm has led the 'Lopes to one district outright and to a tie for first.

Bigott recently submitted his resignation to enter the school system.

system of Pasadena, big Houston suburb, as both coach and teacher.

A Houston product, Bigott has a seriously ill father in Houston and plans to continue study for his master's degree at nearby S. M. Houston State in Huntsville.

Bigott will enter the Pasadena school system as a junior high coach to meet Pasadena coaching

requirements before moving up to a high school position the following year.

Poole's appointment and Bigott's resignation were made and accepted by school trustees at a special meeting Tuesday afternoon which also saw the resignations of three other Post teachers accepted and the employment of three "first year" teachers approved on Supt. Bill Shiver's recommendations.

Prior to the approving of Poole's appointment, the trustees accepted the resignation of Russell Wilks Jr., from the board of trustees.

Wilks has been a board member for ten years. He is the father of Poole's wife, Linda. State law forbids the selection of teachers related to school trustees.

Supt. Shiver told the board that Wilks submitted his written resignation before Athletic Director Glynn Gregg interviewed Poole for the cage appointment and then recommended his selection to Shiver.

Shiver explained that Poole also is a qualified high school math teacher and will fill a very important need for the 1968-69 faculty.

Poole is a 1960 Post High graduate, who was a star guard on the football team and played some basketball. He is a graduate of Texas Tech and has had three years of coaching and teaching experience. Two of those years were as junior high coach at Edna and one as first assistant high school football and basketball coach at Lufkin.

Trustees at their special meeting Tuesday decided to wait until the full board could meet before appointing a trustee to fill the vacancy on the board created by Wilks' resignation.

State law provides that such appointments would apply only until the next school trustee election in the spring. Wilks' term on the board expires in May.

Test drilling to start this week

A group of four Post men and a former local resident, together with Phoenix interests, have staked uranium mining claims on 16,500 acres of public domain land in Arizona's Tonto Basin and are hopeful of uncovering rich uranium deposits in test drilling due to start this weekend.

The local group includes Giles McCrary, Elwood Wright, Earl Chapman, Jack Lott, and John Lott of Lubbock.

Chapman and Jack Lott have organized the Post Exploration Co. and have purchased a seismic rig, which can drill to a depth of 1,000 feet to test drill these claims.

After 10 days of repair work and painting of the rig, Chapman and Lott were scheduled to leave today for Arizona, where they will spend the next two weeks in test drilling as much of the claim area as possible.

"We ought to know in two weeks whether or not we've got a body of commercial uranium ore," Chapman told The Dispatch prior to their departure.

Surface indications throughout the area indicate strong uranium deposits, but only test drilling will prove whether their size of depth makes them commercially minable.

The 16,500 acres in claims are located approximately 65 miles northeast of Phoenix and are adjacent to the Theodore Roosevelt reservoir.

Despite the 3,400 foot elevation, temperatures soar well over the 100 degree mark throughout the day in summer months and much of the test drilling work may be done by the two Post men at night.

Chapman and Lott figure that after their "Arizona adventure" their new exploration firm will be ready and able to perform test drilling for uranium throughout Garza County and the surrounding area.

Mr. and Mrs. Toby Thomas will hold the Grand Opening of Post's new drive-in restaurant, Toby's Drive-In, at 507 South Broadway Friday.

The food and drink "opening specials" are offered in their full-page grand opening ad on page 11 of today's Dispatch.

The drive-in restaurant is a 34 by 42 foot all-steel building custom designed and built for Thomas by Better Products, Inc., of Lubbock.

Completely air-conditioned, the drive-in contains not only a new, all-electric kitchen with a wide variety of the latest in equipment, but also a 36 person capacity self-service dining room.

The drive-in has both drive-up and walk-up ordering windows from its all-weather parking lot which has a capacity of 60 cars.

The modern new restaurant and its parking lot has a 152 foot frontage on South Broadway, which is also much traveled US-84, and the parking area is also four lots across in depth.

Thomas, who has been in the drive-in business here in Post for the past five and one-half years, purchased the location several months ago and only recently completed construction of the drive-in restaurant. He opened it last weekend for the first time.

Toby says he plans to continue to operate his first drive-in, The Dairy Mart, on North Broadway, as well as his new drive-in restaurant.

McCrary told The Dispatch that the uranium prospect was uncovered for the local group through connections he established in Phoenix while looking into prospective copper claims in both Arizona and California.

He explained that the federal government would get no royalties from the local group's claims should a uranium strike be made.

The total 16,500 acres is made up of 20.4 acre-sized lode claims and placer mining claims on streambeds which in some cases would overlap the lode claims.

To keep these claims valid, the group is required to drill a 10 foot shaft per claim per year or spend \$125 for improvements on each claim annually.

Each of the many small claims making up the block had to be carefully staked and "monumented" according to federal regulations.

Assisting Phoenix interests did the staking and monumenting of the claims following the visit of (See Mining Leases, page 8)

Vandals 'raid' swimming pool

Some vandals last Thursday night closed the City - County swimming pool for a day for cleaning purposes last Friday and caused an estimated \$100 worth of destruction.

Pool Manager Waco Reynolds said the office - dressing room building was broken into and all the candy, ice cream, bottled soft drinks, and a jar of crackers were thrown into the swimming pool.

The glass jar holding the crackers broke and scattered glass on the bottom of the pool, necessitating closing the pool Friday while Reynolds and the two life guards, Steve Newby and David Pierce, swept the broken glass out under 10 feet of water in the deep end.

Had the pool required draining to retrieve all the broken glass, the pool would have had to have been closed for three days over the weekend at a real loss in pool revenue.

To be sure no broken glass was left in the pool, the glass jar was fitted together from the broken pieces and the cleaning not halted until every piece was found.

Only item stolen by the vandals was a portable radio belonging to Newby.

Store burglary is solved by owner

Paul Cartwright, manager of the Get Em 7 to 11 grocery on North Broadway, is one Post merchant who solved his own store burglary.

The grocery was burglarized Friday night for the second time in two weeks. A total of \$208 in merchandise was stolen.

Next morning Cartwright found all of the stolen merchandise hidden in high weeds in a nearby vacant lot.

So he "staked out" the lot himself and about 4 p. m. Saturday caught a 15-year-old local white boy who apparently had returned to the cache of stolen goods.

The boy is now in jail and may well be headed for reform school as he was up before Probate Judge J. E. Parker last week on another burglary and had already been paroled from a third break-in.

Cartwright said \$32 in change and \$50 in merchandise was stolen in the first burglary two weeks ago and the thieves who broke in then also stole the door key.

Evidently, the same burglar or burglars came back as there was no evidence of a break-in Friday night and the stolen key was found on the counter Saturday morning.

Sheriff L. E. (Fay) Claiborn said officers believe a second teenager also is involved in the burglaries of the grocery.

A home for our Western heritage

We've talked to a number of Post people in the last year or two who have had the opportunity of visiting the National Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center, which is on the outskirts of Oklahoma City, settled onto the crest of Persimmon Hill.

Those who have seen this major western museum praise it as highly as we've heard anyone praise the Astrodome in Houston, Six Flags Over Texas, HemisFair, or any other attraction.

Completed just three years ago, the museum at Oklahoma City is dedicated to preserving, for present and future generations, the facts, the legends, the towering personalities, the way of life, the sweep and hard splendor of the American West.

If there was one single attribute of character that the pioneers who built and developed the West had in common, it was courage. It took men and women with this quality to push the frontier of the United States, in a little more than 100 years, from the Allegheny Mountains across a hostile continent to the shores of the Pacific Ocean.

The course of some of the most colorful of Western history brushed close to the Hall of Fame site of Persimmon Hill. Just a few hundred yards

away, tens of thousands of longhorn steers cut a deep trail in the red earth as they moved in giant cattle drives up the fabled Chisholm Trail from the rangelands of Texas to Kansas markets. Claims were staked just south of Persimmon Hill, creating a town of some 10,000 people virtually overnight—so Oklahoma City had its birth.

Within the Hall of Fame's rooms and halls are chuck wagons and stagecoaches, the famous guns of the West—the single-action six-shooters, the Winchester repeating rifles and galling guns. There are life-sized models of soldiers, Indians and ranchers. There is the best in Western art, in painting and statuary, to preserve the form and color and life of the times.

On Highway 66, less than a quarter of a mile from Persimmon Hill, it is said that each year more than 7.5 million cars carrying over 18 million people pass. Many will stop and be enriched by the experience. They will go on their way with renewed awareness of our Western heritage and a sense of the courage and independence that we must carry to the task of preserving and building this nation which our forefathers gave us.

If your vacation trip carries you anywhere near the National Cowboy Hall of Fame, don't pass up the opportunity of going through it.—CD

THE GASOLINE give-away games appear to be headed for the same place the TV give-away quiz shows went a few years ago—down the drain. In Washington, a House of Representatives small business subcommittee is conducting a hearing into the games, which the committee chairman said lend themselves to easy rigging for the selection of handpicked winners.

The wife of a Maryland gasoline dealer demonstrated to House investigators that "instant cash" winners could be pulled out of a stack of gasoline give-away game cards. She didn't miss. And a Baltimore dealer testified he was given a \$111 ticket when one gasoline company's game was started to pass on to a customer of his choice "to get some quick winners on the street."

IN OPENING THE hearings, the chairman said the subcommittee has an indication that service station operators paid in for the cards about \$3 million more than the gasoline companies have paid out in prizes.

The same woman who demonstrated that she could pick out the instant cash winners also intentionally produced some losers from a stack of about 300 cards, explaining the instant winners could be detected by shading on the sides when the cards were stacked together.

WHILE THIS particular demonstration related to only one company, the chairman of the Maryland Association of Petroleum Retailers told the subcommittee that it has been shown that winning game cards of other firms also can be extracted in the same fashion.

Another dealer told the subcommittee his gasoline company's salesman came into his station and handed him an envelope with his name on the front and told him, "Give this to somebody right away so we can get some quick winners on the street." "What did you do with it?" the dealer was asked. "I gave it to one of my good customers," the dealer replied. "He owned a barroom." The same dealer said this was the only large winner he had in that game.

IN RESPONSE TO questions, the dealer estimated the net result of the games is an increased price of gasoline to customers. He said the cards cost about 15 cents each.

Suspicion that the gasoline contests were a fake began to form in many customers' minds late last year when several groups began to compile some statistics and organize a systematic plan to attempt to win some of the supposedly wonderful prizes being offered.

ONE MAN ADVERTISED in a Chicago newspaper for someone holding the other half of a gasoline contest card he received. He got a host of answers, but everybody had the same half he received. He concluded that the other half probably was never issued.

In Boston, the manager of a taxi-cab company had all his drivers pool all the contest cards they received over a long period. They ripped open 1,200 envelopes and won exactly \$1.

ACTUALLY, THE whole promotion plan has begun to have a reverse effect on many customers.

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LONESOME

Walt Disney's "Charlie, the Lonesome Cougar," the exciting adventures of a teen-age mountain lion, is now showing through Saturday at the Tower Theatre.

AUSTIN — Arrival at the mid-day mark in the 30-day special legislative session touched off an explosion of activity in key areas of spending, taxation and liquor.

Both House and Senate passed versions of the 1969 budget and sent to conference committee to work out differences.

House Revenue and Tax Committee sent out for debate and full House action Connally's \$119 million tax package. This controversial measure hopefully will land in conference committee this week for amendments in both houses.

Representatives voted overwhelmingly for a \$474 million general revenue budget, senators for a \$577 million general fund appropriations measure. House version would require \$132.6 million in new revenue. Senate bill \$137.9 million.

Phases of Connally's tax liquor-drink legislation were deemed to raise \$127.2 million, so additional revenue must be found.

HOUSE FOUGHT A BITTER BATTLE over the mini-bottles which was combined with proposals of a subcommittee for strengthening liquor tax on little bottles and increased fees will produce over \$8 million. An additional \$6.5 million would come from a gross receipts tax on private clubs, as called for by Connally's tax bill.

Margin on mini-bottles in the House is said to be even closer than in the Senate. Poll takers said 15 senators would be counted

as sure supporters.

A sales tax increase to three per cent is certain to figure in the final tax package. This whether the legislature votes a straight rate hike or goes along with Connally's plan to raise the rate and rebate 75 per cent of the take to cities (in lieu of their present local option sales tax levy). Connally also proposes to put sales tax on many services and cigarettes.

Mini-bottles bill would make one-drink-sized containers available in licensed hotels, clubs, restaurants, planes and trains. Sellers would have to do at least a third as much business in food sales as in liquor. Mini-bottles probably will be expensive, since they would carry a tax of about 10 and a half cents each. Sellers will have to pay the state permit fees ranging from \$500 in the smallest towns to \$1,250 in cities over 250,000. Furthermore, cities and counties can match the charge.

Bill also sets specifications for private clubs and raises fees, although it will allow managers and most other employees to issue guests cards to the drop-in trade and it authorizes credit card sales.

Legislation would further permit 16-year-olds to sack beer in groceries and serve as bus-boys where mini-bottles are handled. It would outlaw gambling, increase punishment for permitting minors to buy or consume alcoholic beverages, raise beer dealers' license fees from \$30 to \$150, provide for faster sale of confiscated liquor by the state and make most of the Texas Liquor Control Board records available to public inspection.

Barring logjams the legislature

had a fair chance of beating its deadline and winding up most business in a single special session.

GIN DUST — One of the differences between the Senate and the House is whether the Texas Air Control Board is going to be allowed to require cotton gins to put in dust-abatement devices.

Senate voted to strike out a "rider" which would prohibit the board from spending any money on activities connected with cotton gins. But the House voted to keep it in, by a vote of 95-47.

This prohibition was put into the present appropriations law in 1967. It led to a blast at the Legislature by some members of the Air Control Board. But a provision put into the air pollution control law in 1967 cannot be changed by this session of the Legislature, so it operates effectively to keep the Air Control Board out of the cotton business.

However, the ginning industry has been working with the Board and has been doing research aimed at reducing the air pollution problem caused by gin operations.

DRUNK TESTS ADVANCED — A bill to require those suspected of driving while intoxicated to submit to breath or blood tests on penalty of having their licenses suspended has been approved by the House State Affairs Committee.

Legislation provides that a driver gives implied consent to undergo chemical testing to determine if he is drunk when charged with the offense.

Most other states have similar laws as required by the 1966 federal highway safety act.

Tests showing a blood content of one-tenth per cent alcohol by weight would be prima facie evidence of being under the influence of alcohol. Arresting officers would have to appear in court. Those with religious objections to blood drawing could take a breath test.

RURAL ROADS — That long-quiet farm-to-market roads have come back to life.

Some city legislators are pushing a bill to do away with the \$13 million a year of general tax money which is being spent on rural roads. They want it spent on city streets. But their efforts have failed so far.

TAVERN "MONOPOLY" — Fort Worth Dist. Atty. Frank Coffey, testifying before a House committee on a bill to regulate vending machine companies under the liquor control board, claimed a sim-

ple coin machine concern controls hundreds of Texas taverns.

Coffey says 85 per cent of taverns in Fort Worth owe money to the concern which operates under many names. He said the same conditions exist in most other cities. Vending machine chain, the district attorney testified, started with B & B Music Company in El Paso. Former LCR Administrator Coke Stevenson Jr. recommended regulation of the vending machine operators and that they be barred from the tavern business.

COURTS SPEAK — U. S. Supreme Court has granted a stay of mandate in a lawsuit testing the constitutionality of Texas disturbing the peace law.

Three-judge Federal Court last April declared the law "impermissibly and unconstitutionally broad." Top court said it would allow the law to remain in effect until it passes on the question.

Texas Supreme Court ordered a Harris County district court to have a new trial on the lawsuit by R. L. Force and other operators in Haskell County seeking damages from Crown Central Petroleum Corp.

Unusual in that the provision has never been used before is this suit for \$59,800 in damages from a pipeline company. Plaintiffs contend that they had to pay 11 cents a barrel to truck their oil to the pipeline over a period of five years. Law requires a common carrier — common purchaser pipeline to connect to leases of all operators in an area. Force's case started in 1962, with a contention that Crown Central had discriminated against the group of independent operators in Haskell County.

Lower courts turned the independents down without a trial. But Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert held that they were in error, and the high court ordered a full new trial on the merits. Plaintiffs' wells were connected up in 1964 after the cases were started, but the oper-

ators still are trying to get back their hauling money in the form of damages.

ATTACK PLAN — Gov. John Connally has adopted an emergency resources management plan for the state to be used in the event of an enemy attack. Plan was developed by a special resources organization coordinated by Maj. Gen. James E. Taylor.

Connally issued an executive order assigning responsibilities for carrying out the plan to state officials, agencies, professional groups and private business institutions.

Overall coordination of activities under the plan is assigned to the director of the Department of Public Safety, Col. Wilson E. Speir, acting director of Texas Department of Public Safety, played a major role in its development.

Plan was financed through the federal Office of Emergency Planning.

Jehovah's Witnesses of area to attend district convention

Area Jehovah's Witnesses have been advised that they will comprise a congregational delegation to their "Good News For All Nations" District Assembly set for San Angelo, July 11-14.

A local spokesman remarked that the San Angelo convention will be only one of some 46 to be held throughout the United States and Canada during the summer of 1968.

The local delegation will be a part of more than 5,000 ministers attending the four-day training session at the San Angelo Coliseum.

Numerous ministers will present a series of training programs, discussions and dramatizations and talks during the convention with Watchtower officials from New

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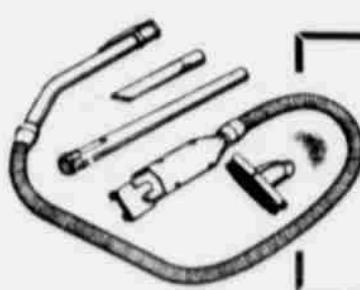

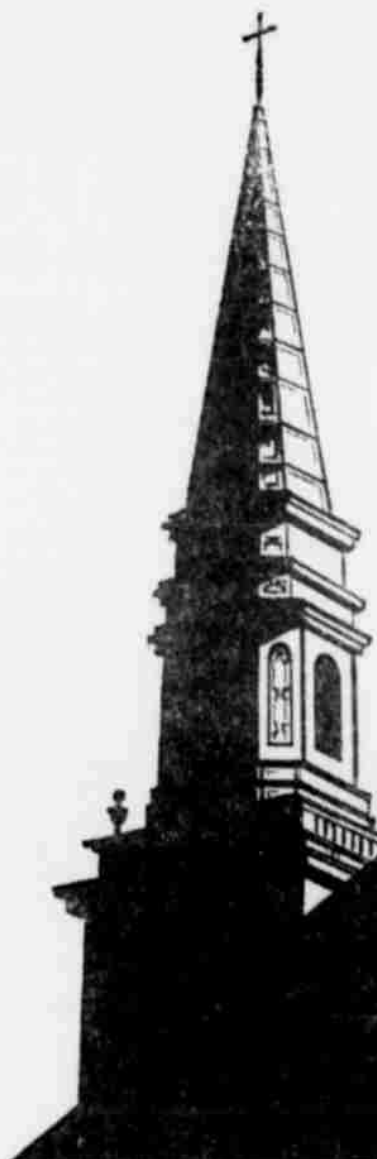

38 fatalities predicted

'Operation Motorcade' set for July 3 start

AUSTIN—The acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today called for "heads up" driving on the part of Texas motorists over the upcoming four-day Fourth of July weekend to help bring about a reduction in the estimated toll of 38 lives in traffic during the holiday period.

Wilson E. (Pat) Speir announced that "Operation Motorcade," a special emphasis program designed to focus attention on the added dangers of holiday travel, will be placed in effect from 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 3, through 11:59 p.m. Sunday, July 7.

Traffic fatalities will be tabulated by the DPS throughout the period, and the totals will be announced officially three times daily as a means of keeping safety uppermost in the minds of the motoring public, he said.

"It is a known fact that the unusually crowded conditions of the highways on Independence Day holidays makes driving more hazardous than usual," Speir said. "Past experience and the present

trend of traffic deaths indicate that 38 persons will lose their lives in traffic accidents during the 102-hour period of the holiday this year, according to DPS Statistical Services. This means that on the average one person will be killed in traffic every two and-a-half hours.

"Of course, we hope this proves to be too high an estimate, and will do everything we can to keep down the expected toll of lives and suffering from accidents. As part of this effort, we will be utilizing additional personnel from our other uniformed services to augment the regular Highway Patrol force during the holiday period.

"However, the most important effort needs to come from the drivers themselves who, of course, have the most at stake. We can talk all we please about inadequate highways, but in the end, the vast majority of all accidents and fatalities can be traced directly to misbehavior, misjudgment, recklessness, negligence, and mixing drinking and driving.

Detailed folders now available for two of 11 Texas Travel Trails

AUSTIN — Gov. John Connally today announced the publication of detailed folders for two of the Statewide system of Texas Travel Trails.

The folders, published by the Texas Highway Department, will serve as guides and detail numerous points of interest along the Texas Mountain Trail in far West Texas, and the Texas Forest Trail in deep East Texas.

The folders will lead travelers through picturesque landscapes, by historic sites and to colorful cities and towns on the two official State trails.

Connally announced the new Statewide system of trails last January. Each county erected special Travel Trail signs along the 10 official trail routes.

The Mountain Trail folder guides travelers through the tallest region of Texas, where 90 peaks thrust above a mile high. The route goes past the nation's newest national park, to be developed in the Guadalupe Mountains, and to Davis Mountains State Park.

Those following the Mountain Trail will visit Big Bend National Park, the scenic El Camino del Rio from Big Bend to Presidio, and through the cities of Van Horn, Fort Davis, Marfa, Alpine and El Paso.

The Texas Forest Trail explores a 790-mile loop through the vast Piney Woods region. It goes through four national forests and past scores of federal, State and county recreational areas.

Other spots of interest include the East Texas oil field, the State's only Indian reservation, the Big Thicket and such popular water sports as Lake O' the Pines, Caddo Lake and Sam Rayburn Reservoir.

Travel Trail literature is available from the Texas Highway Department tourist bureaus and district offices, and at chambers of commerce along the Travel Trail routes.

Individual folders for the remaining eight Travel Trails will be released during the next few weeks as soon as printing is completed.

It's the Law...

"DON'T BLAME ME!"

Startlingly simple was the defense offered by a young man accused of murdering his own father.

"I'm a rough character," he conceded in court, "but only because my father brought me up that way. He taught me to drink whiskey, use a gun, and run around with a gang. So don't blame me for what I did. Blame my father."

No doubt the slain father bore a share of the fault. But the court held the son guilty anyhow, because he was old enough and rational enough to take responsibility for his own behavior.

To what degree should extenuating circumstances excuse what would otherwise be a crime? To what degree should a killer be allowed to blame his upbringing? a thief his poverty? a rapist his passion? a vandal his youthfulness?

In an earlier day, there was little of such talk in the courtroom. Wrong brought retribution almost as a matter of course. Scarcely a century ago, a murderer was put to death in an American prison even though he was only 12 years old.

But with greater insight into human motivations has come greater understanding in fixing blame.

Thus, mental deficiencies are increasingly taken into account—not only in deciding on legal guilt but also in settling the punishment. And all states recognize a minimum age below which a person cannot be held to criminal liability.

Nevertheless, while today's law

avoids total responsibility, it also avoids total irresponsibility. It holds that most people in most situations, do indeed have freedom of choice between doing right and doing wrong.

Because of that freedom, an individual is expected to stand on his own feet, be his own man, and "take his medicine" for what he does wrong—just as he is entitled to take credit for what he does right.

In short, despite outer influence or inner weakness, despite the pressure of adversity or the lure of temptation, he usually has the power to refrain from harming others—if he tries hard enough.

And, for the sake of society, the law demands that he try that hard.

The Post group didn't file a day too early either.

A day after the claims were filed, the Getty Oil Co., representing Paul Getty, reportedly America's richest oil man, arrived in Phoenix to file lease claims on the same area.

The area in which the uranium claims have been staked is very sparsely inhabited. Only a few widely scattered cattle ranches are in the area. The nearest town is Globe, 60 miles to the south.

While on location test drilling, Chapman and Lott plan to stay at a small motel 15 miles away and drive back and forth. Originally they planned to take a camper along until learning of the motel's location.

Should the local group come up with a big uranium strike — it rates the odds at about 50-50 at best — development of the uranium deposit would require large corporate capitalization.

Which means of course the local group would sell their deposit to an interested uranium firm capable of its development.

Some of the same claims staked by the Post group three weeks ago were originally filed on back in 1953 when the nation's first big uranium hunt got under way. Those claims have not remained valid, but the claims were purchased anyway to avoid any legal difficulties which might arise later.

Supt. Shiver told the board now has five vacancies in the 69 faculty still to fill.

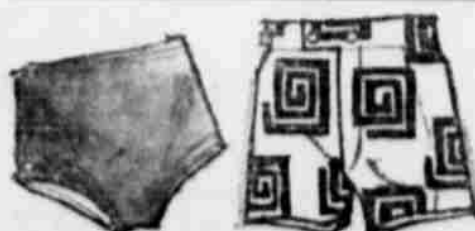

Parallel terraces enable the farmer to use large row-crop equipment efficiently. In the large field in the foreground, only one odd-shaped area between terraces and a triangular corner interrupt the full-length rows. These areas are planted to sown crops. The widths of the terrace ridges and of the intervals between are

calculated to accommodate a feasible number of "passes" of the equipment being used. The terraces were constructed with cost-sharing from the Great Plains Conservation Program and technical assistance from the SCS. The June issue of "Soil Conservation" had as its theme modern farming with big equipment. Thomas E. Cowan, agricultural engineer, SCS, Lubbock, wrote the article which appeared in the publication and submitted the cover photo.

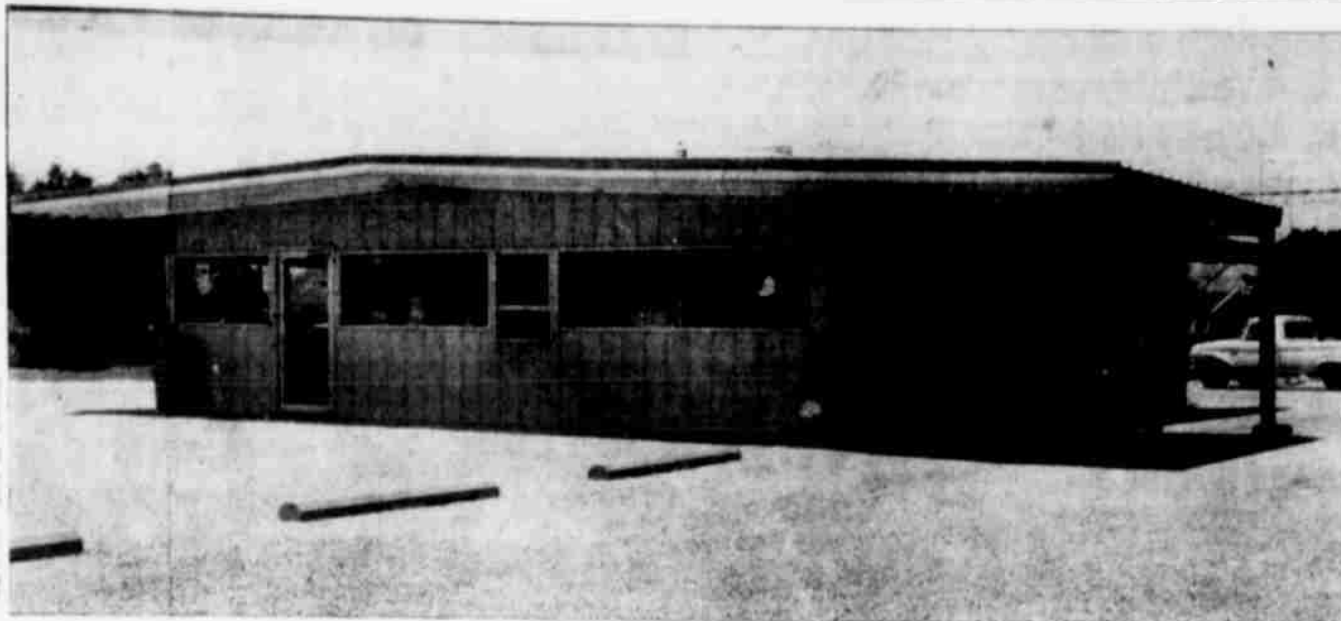
