P.I.C. Missionary Speaks To Women

The Rev. Titometo Quintero spoke to the Episcopal Churches of the Northwestern Deanery of the Diocese of Dallas at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Wichita Falls, Texas, on Monday, October 28, 1963. Rev. Quintero spoke of the Philippine Independent Church, its problems and growth, and of his missionary work in the islands of Hawaii. Rev. Quintero attended St. Andrews Seminary, a priest of the Philippine Independent Church, and is now working in Honolulu under Bishop Kennedy of the Episcopal Church. He came to the mainland as representative of the Supreme Bishop of the Philippine Independent Church which is in communion with the Anglican Communion.

The visit is of particular importance to the Diocese at this time because of the adoption of the Independent Church by the Diocese at the last Annual Convention. Father Quintero explained the difficulties under which his church works as well as the opportunities.

A number of Diocesan churches are "adopting" Philippine Independent Church priests and providing income for their stipend so that they may no longer be dependent on "Stole Fees" in order to exist. The Stole Fee is the only income the priest in the Philippines have for a livelihood. This is the pay they receive when they baptize, marry or bury a person.

With the help of the Episcopal Churches in the United States, a priest can have a regular income and could care for his flock without worry of his wife and children's welfare.

Prior to Rev. Quintero's speech, Holy Communion was celebrated at 10:30 with the Very Rev. Claude A. Beesley, Dean of the Northwest Deanery, as celebrant.

The Rev. Alanson Brown, Church of the Good Shepherd, delivered an inspiring talk on the role of Women in The Home.

A delicious luncheon was served in the Parish Hall at 11:45.

"Amendment No. 4 The Veterans Land Amendment

At the state-wide election on November 9, 1963, one of the four questions to be passed upon by Texas voters is Amendment No. 4, which extends the Veterans Land Purchasing Program for four more years. This program has proven to be highly successful. Over 32,000 Texas veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict have already purchased land under its terms. Some Veterans have already paid out their land and sold it at a profit. In some cases, oil has been discovered on the land purchased by veterans. In other words the program has been successful, except for a brief period in the early part of the program when the misconduct of the then Commissioner of the Land Office put a temporary shadow on the program. However, the losses caused by the improper conduct of the Land Commissioner at that time, have been made up through repayment by him and through the resale at a profit of the land involved in the irregular handling of the program by him.

The state borrows money to sell bonds and then lends the money to land buying veterans at a slightly higher rate of interest. This difference in the interest rate brings in enough to pay the expense of the program and to take care of any losses which may occur. The taxpayers of this state have not been out any money on account of the Veterans Land Program, and there is no reason to think that they will be.

Based upon the successful operation of this program it is hoped that on November 9, 1963 that Texas voters will approve Amendment No. 4, and thereby extend the Veterans Land Program for four more years. Since the program provides a way for veterans to buy land on a sound basis without cost to the taxpayers, it is clearly a desirable program and deserves your support.

E. W. Roderick Chosen Conservation Farmer For 1963

Mr. E. W. Roderick was chosen Conservation Farmer for the Clara-Fairview Community in the Bridwell Soil Awards Contest. He will compete with other conservation farmers from other communities for over-all winners.

The Rodericks live on Farm Road 369. Mr. Roderick farms about 545 acres. His main crop is wheat, but also plants barley, oats and always plants Austram Winter Peas to help build up his farming land.

He is working on a rotating basis with the peas. In four years he will have had peas on all his farm land. He has 40 acres of peas this year. He has recently built two tanks, one consisting of 2,000 yards and the other 3,000 yards. He also has made three water ways, one consists of six acres, one, two acres and one, one acre.

He also has cows, hogs, and chickens on his farm.

A Digest Of Texas Motor Vehicle Laws

Published By Texas Department Of Public Safety

RIGHT-OF-WAY AT AN INTERSECTION WITHOUT A TRAFFIC CONTROL OR SIGNAL

1-If two vehicles are approaching an intersection on different roadways and it appears that a collision will result unless one vehicle slows down, then the driver of the vehicle on the left shall slow down and give the right-of-way to the vehicle that is approaching on his right. So if two vehicles are approaching at approximately the same time, the driver on the left should yield to the vehicle on the right. (This rule also applies at traffic circle intersection.)

2-You must give the right-of-way to a vehicle that is already in an intersection while you are still approaching the intersection. (This rule would apply only in a situation where Rule 1. above would not apply, such as when a vehicle is already in the intersection waiting to clear vehicles or pedestrians before the vehicle on the right approaches.)

RIGHT-OF-WAY AT AN INTERSECTION WITH A SIGNAL LIGHT

1-When stop-and-go lights are operating, a driver entering the intersection on a green light and or clearing the intersection on a yellow light has the right-of-way.

NOTE: If you enter the intersection on a yellow light, you must clear the intersection before the red light comes on.

2-When stop-and-go lights are operating a driver approaching the intersection for a red light must stop and must not enter the intersection until the green light or a green arrow shows. When a green arrow shows, the driver may drive only in the direction the arrow points but shall give the right-of-way to pedestrians lawfully using the crosswalk and to other traffic lawfully using the intersection. A right turn on a red light, even after a stop, is illegal unless a green arrow permits the turn. (The only exception is a flashing red light.)

3-When a flashing red light is operating, a driver approaching the red light must stop before entering the intersection. Procedure and right-of-way after stop is the same as at a stop sign.

4-A flashing yellow light is a caution signal to warn drivers of a traffic hazard and presumably requires a speed slow enough to stop to avoid collision.

Mr. Frank Moore, Plainview, Texas, who represents West Texas on the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, advises us that Mr. Freeman is most anxious to discuss the farm and ranch problems directly with farmers and ranchers. On the basis of our information this may be a good opportunity for individual views to be expressed directly to the Secretary of Agriculture.

Mr. Freeman will appear at the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium beginning at 2:00 p. m. on November 4th.

WEATHERFORD, Texas — The Burkburnett Bulldogs absorbed a sound beating here Friday night, but it took a fourth quarter surge by the hosting Kangaroos to pull out a 21-8 win before a small shivering crowd.

The Bulldogs had pulled into an 8-7 lead in the third quarter, but the Kangaroos bounced back, hitting for two scores in the final stanza.

The first half was a tough battle, with All-District halfback, Wayne Lamb, and Mark Thomas spurring the "Roo" ground game. Ronnie Cauliflower, sophomore quarterback, and Lamb kept the Bulldogs loose with a flawless passing game.

The first score of the night for Weatherford came in the second quarter. With a first and ten on their own 37, Cauliflower whipped a pass to end Mac Smith who jogged the distance for a 63 yard pass and run touchdown combination. Smith then booted the point that put the Kangaroos ahead 7-0. That's how the score stood at the half.

In the third quarter, the "Dogs" pulled some aerial hijinx of their own that netted a score. Junior quarterback Mike Musick hit halfback Jerry Bingham with a 25 yarder that went over. Dale Lewis came back into the driver's seat for the conversion try. He hit Bingham for the two points and a narrow 8-7 lead.

In the fourth quarter, a questionable call set up a Weatherford touchdown. In a third and twenty-five situation on his own 49 yard line, Cauliflower unloaded a bomb that was taken on the Bulldogs three yard line by Gene Hooker. As Hooker stumbled toward the end zone, the ball squirted from his hands and Jerry Bingham pounced on it. But, according to the officials, Hooker was down before he fumbled. The touchdown came as Wayne Lamb carried over from the one yard stripe. Smith kicked the extra point.

Weatherford intercepted a Lewis pass to set up their next scoring drive. Lamb again scored the touchdown, this time from the six. Smith booted the PAT again. Weatherford sources said that he had yet to miss an attempt.

The Bulldogs were playing without the services of fullback Henry Bauch for the entire game, and halfback Jackie Cornelius for the greater part of the game. Bauch, favoring a bad leg, was unable to start. Cornelius went out with an ankle injury and fullback Charles Herring went out via the same route in the second half.

Dana Matherly, Pete Glover, Dean Thompson, Jerry Bingham, Perry Ellis, Larry Rarden and Johnny Koller all turned in top defensive games. Thompson, a sophomore end, had a moment of glory in the second half, blocking a field goal attempt.

Next week is homecoming, and the Bulldogs are hosting the Mineral Wells Mountaineers at Morgan Stadium.

Don't Want A National Penitentiary

The Federal Trade Commission has been considering new regulations concerning the "pre-ticketing" of various kinds of merchandise, covering a very wide spectrum, sold generally at retail. Pre-ticketing is an old established system whereby the manufacturer marks the article with a tag showing the suggested retail price.

The FTC action results from the fact that, undeniably, pre-ticketing has been employed by unscrupulous, fast-buck producers and sellers in an effort to establish outrageously high profits. But this has been very much a minority situation—and, in most instances, competition and buyer awareness have taken care of it. In the great majority of cases pre-ticketing serves several good ends. It provides the consumer with a guide. And it assures the retailer a reasonable profit, which encourages him to stock the item in question, and to display, advertise, and put his selling effort back of it.

There is a well grounded fear that proposed new regulations would be so severe and so complex that they would write finis to pre-ticketing altogether. A merchant who heads a relatively small retail operation provided some important testimony concerning this before the FTC. It has been said that the pre-ticketing rule would lead larger stores to switch to their own house-brands of merchandise. He agreed—but that would be done at the expense of the smaller stores which haven't the resources or the market to adopt this solution. So, ironically, the burden would be borne by these smaller businesses—which are the ones the FTC is supposed to protect.

It is one thing to legislate against the unscrupulous operator, whether in pre-ticketing or anything else. It is a very different thing, in doing that, to eliminate the very real virtues and service fair pre-ticketing provides. Then, going to the larger issue, one wonders what will happen if government, no matter how well-meaning its intentions may be, attempts to control by order and legislation every conceivable dereliction. Carried to the logical end, we would wind up living in a nation penitentiary.

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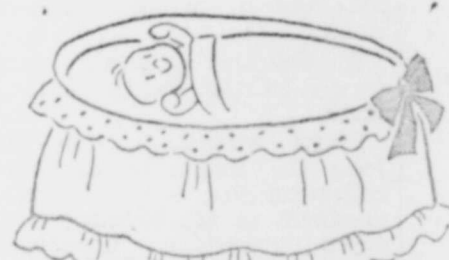

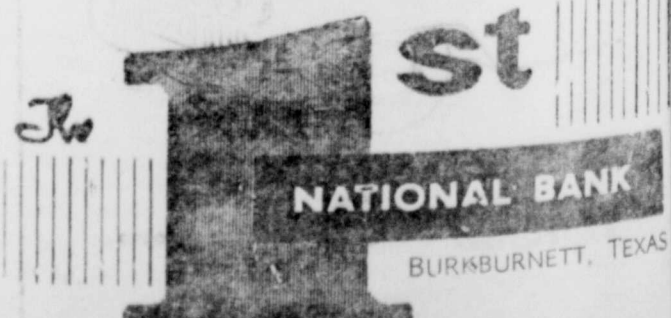

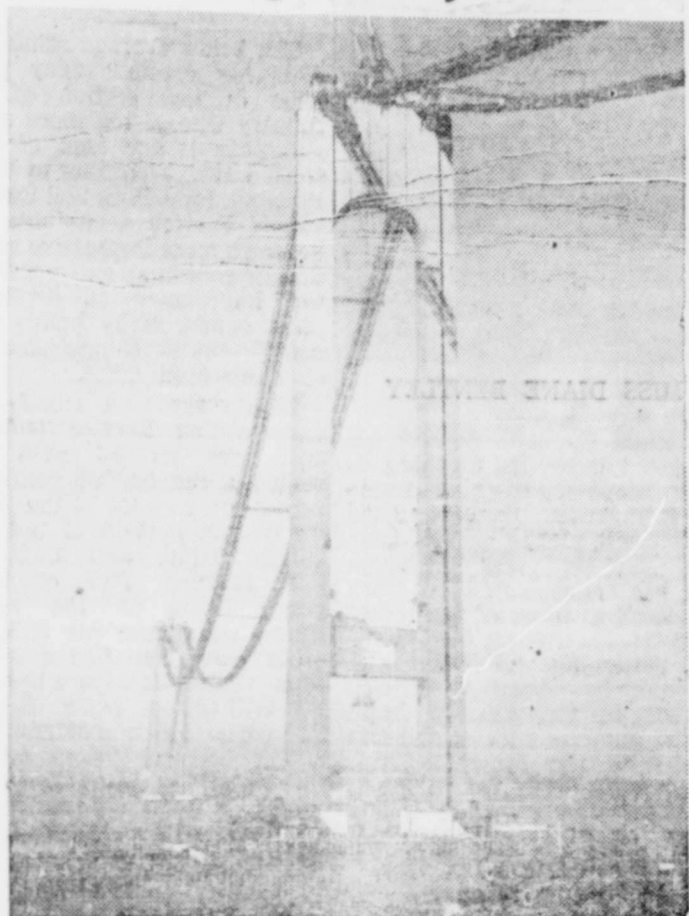

Questions & Answers

Q—When my National Service Life Insurance Endowment policy reaches the end of the premium payment period, may I receive monthly payments for the rest of my life?

A—No. However, you may choose a lump-sum settlement or payments over a period of three months to 240 months in equal installments.

Q—What will be the Veterans Administration's procedure in mailing out the increased Dependency and Indemnity Compensation payments to widows and children of disabled deceased veterans?

A—The increase will be mailed out in October. This will be a special check. The regular October check will contain the usual amount. Starting in November the checks will be at the new rates.

Q—My discharge was burned in a home fire. Can the VA furnish me a duplicate.

A—You should write to the Defense Personnel Records Center, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, Missouri. Be sure to give your full name, rank and serial number. If the serial number is not known, give your dates of entry into and discharge from the service.

It's The Law In Texas

Who Owns Wounded Game?

Suppose you are hunting and shoot a deer or a duck, which falls mortally wounded. Before you can get it, another hunter beats you there and claims the fallen game as his own. What are your Rights?

Jim had been hunting all day without success, and had headed for home when he finally saw a deer. He took careful aim and hit the deer with his first shot. Although mortally wounded, the deer managed to run a short distance, with Jim in hot pursuit.

Roy was also deer hunting. He heard Jim's shot and saw a deer running toward him. However, before it reached the spot where he was standing, the deer fell to the ground.

Although it was obvious that the deer was about to die, Roy walked to within three feet of it, delivering the finishing shot, and quickly put his tag on it. When Jim ran up and claimed the deer, Roy said that such deer were wild animals, and belonged to no one until killed. Since he was the one that killed the deer, Roy claimed that it belonged to him.

Which hunter has legal title to the deer?

In this case the deer belongs to Jim. Jim was the first to wound it, and did so before Roy appeared on the scene. He had mortally wounded the deer, and had it in such a situation that its escape was improbable, if not impossible. The prevailing rule is that the instant a wild animal is brought under the control of a person so that actual possession is practically inevitable, a vested property interest in its carcass which cannot be divested by another's intervening and killing it, or reaching it first.

Jim had delivered the shot which so crippled the animal

as to cause him to cease trying to escape, thus permitting Roy to walk up to the animal and deliver the finishing shot. Jim had effectively brought the deer under his control before Roy took a hand in the matter. The deer legally belonged to Jim, and he can enforce his claim in court.

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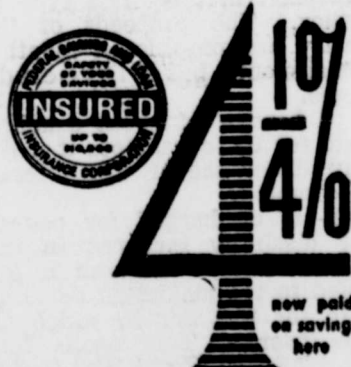

Whether they're fat or not, most teen-age girls are afraid they are or might be. That's one reason why a good many of them are not eating adequately, says Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. This was revealed in a recent study made of teen-agers and their eating habits.

Three other reasons why teen-age girls are poorly nourished include: (1) They skip breakfast; (2) They eat poor snacks (one-fourth of a day's calories may come from snacks); and (3) They drink no milk — or not enough.

The problem, as Miss Wirges sees it, is to erase the fear of being "Overweight" from their minds by showing them how they can have normal weight and still eat good, nutritious meals.

It's important that youngsters understand how a good diet contributes to correct weight as well as shiny hair, clear skin, and good posture.

Because every teen-age girl wants to meet the approval of her friends, she's going to do what they do — snack, party, and even skip a meal from time to time. But this need not be especially bad — if the youngster does it sensibly. She can snack on nourishing foods as well as "empty calories."

By relating good nutrition and proper food selection to the habits of teen-agers, parents can help their youngsters eat better.

For example, Miss Wirges suggests serving fruit juices at teen-age parties and dances. Make it the thing to do — and the kids will love it.

Have nutritious snack foods in the refrigerator — ready for and after-school or evening raid by your teen-ager and his friends.

Whatever you do, don't preach nutrition, Miss Wirges warns. Simply tell your youngster the facts, guide them, then try to put the selection of good food on their shoulders. Make them responsible — but also make them feel that this is important to them.

Because of this, study plans have been made by the Wichita County Program Building Subcommittee on Foods and Nutrition to include a concentrated study of teen-age nutrition in both adult and youth groups. Mrs. Jack Marshall is chairman of this subcommittee.

Accent on Health

Did you know that its possible for perfectly good teeth, with absolutely no decay, to fall out?

Teeth in excellent condition are often lost because the structure on which they rest gives way.

Teeth are not locked in the jaw, contrary to some beliefs. The rest is a springy hammock of gums and bone.

When this support becomes diseased and gives way, the teeth become loosened and may fall out if treatment is not started early.

Gum disease precipitating tooth fall-out is popularly known as pyorrhea. But the term is misused. Dentists apply pyorrhea of events grouped a sequence of events grouped under the general heading of periodontal diseases.

While tooth decay is the chief cause of tooth loss in young people, periodontal disease takes a greater toll in people over age 35.

Add ten more years — or by age 45 — one of every two men is afflicted with periodontal disease.

Years ago, the disease was thought incurable. Now, however, dentistry saves many teeth if gum tissues are treated in time.

Periodontal diseases usually start with gingivitis, or inflammation of the gums. Bleeding is a frequent symptom. Bleeding gums may be shrugged off as a fairly common occurrence. But dentists point out that this is a symptom calling for attention.

Bleeding gums grow progressively worse if untreated, as a general rule, and lead to more serious involvement.

The gums, which ordinarily hug the tooth like the collar of a turtle-neck sweater, begin to fall away. Debris then works down into the pocket formed between gum and tooth. This leads to periodontitis with inflammation extending deeper into the tissues.

As the disease progresses, pus pockets form and the springy hammock-like tissue — or periodontal membrane is destroyed.

Finally, the root is affected and the tooth becomes loose. By this time, the possibility of saving the tooth is slim.

To keep your own teeth, develop a good strong pattern of dental care and have a prompt check-up when danger signs occur.

OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

The below average rainfall in 1963 has created many problems in this section of the country. One of the more acute situations is the lack of livestock water, according to W. C. Fleming, Iowa Park Soil Conservation Service technician. It becomes more impressive as the drought continues and points up the importance of depth in farm ponds. Many ponds with insufficient depth are now dry or mere mud holes.

Within the past month Soil Conservation Service technicians have located sites and staked a number of ponds on farms and ranches in the Wichita County portion of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District. Two of these ponds being on the Foster Ranch near Sunshine Hill, another pond constructed in the same vicinity is owned by Stanley Williamson. W. H. Bentley has completed a damless pond and a terrace system on his farm south of Burkburnett. At present a terrace system is under construction on the W. M. Skrehot farm west of Iowa Park. Hill Brothers have constructed a large damless terrace pond on their farm three miles north of Iowa Park. A pond has recently been completed on the Floyd May farm west of Iowa Park. At present a pond is under construction on the Charles Sefcik farm northeast of Iowa Park.

Other activities in the Iowa Park work unit include: construction of terraces, waterways, land leveling, irrigation field ditches, and land preparation for seeding grasses. George Streit in the Punkin Center Community has added another terrace to his terrace system. B. H. Preston at Burkburnett has added another terrace to his system, also. There has been 24,045 feet of terraces and a waterway installed on the G. W. Hefley Estate Farm in the Fribery-Cooper Community. Ralph Swinford is operator of this farm.

Complete irrigation systems have just been completed on the following farms: Dr. J. R. McKinney, Kenneth Callaway, Roy Lewis and Dee Hankins. This includes land leveling, field ditches with turnouts and checks installed.

Dee Hankins, whose farm is at Kamay grew a crop of grain sorghum on 79 acres during the summer and has shredded it down as a dead litter for seeding native grasses next spring. Mr. Hankins is a Great Plains Conservation Program producer.

NOSE CARE

The nose is a delicate organ, both as concerns its smelling abilities and its structure.

The nose bruises and bleeds easily when punched. Its delicate lining covers a dense network of blood vessels, and the slightest break in this mucous surface causes bleeding.

It's an indelicate topic, but — too many people pick a the nose in a sort of habit pattern that is not only repulsive to others but also potentially dangerous. Serious infection may result. Another dangerous practice is pulling hairs from the nose. Excessive use of nose drops or inhalants can cause permanent damage to the delicate membrane.

A sometimes serious side effect of nose troubles can be involvement of the sinuses that empty into the nose.

If you must wash out your nose, use mild salt water and put it in drop by drop. Don't pour it in as though you were flushing out a catch basin.

If you catch a cold and your nose drips, blow it gently with both nostrils open to clear out the mucus. If one side is closed and you blast away, some of the force will back up into the throat.

Germ-laden mucus might be driven into one or both tubes into the middle ear, with possible infection resulting. Blow gently.

Your nose is useful appendage. It records many sensations, both pleasant and unpleasant. Sense of smell is an important part of the sense of taste. Smelling smoke might serve as a warning of danger from fire.

Don't abuse your nose. It must last you a lifetime.

Climate and Health

The relationship of climate to health has been a subject of speculation and debate since time immemorial.

We hear our friends tell about getting relief from arthritic pains by moving to a hot, dry zone. Others report they have fewer attacks of colds and flu in semi-desert cities and towns.

Colds and flu cannot be avoided merely by living in a hot, dry climate, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

Colds and flu are caused by viruses that can be transmitted readily from person to person regardless of the climate.

If there was any "best spot" geographically for arthritis, it would be so over run with people there would be standing room only. Scientific studies have shown that changes in barometric pressure can effect pains in the joints to a slight extent. But there are arthritics in every climate in the world, all of them more or less in pain much of the time.

If you're thinking about moving to a different climate for health reasons, it is advisable to make a preliminary visit of a few weeks before you pull up stakes and make a complete break from your hometown.

A short visit, plus consultation with your family doctor, will help determine whether you will gain any lasting benefit from the move.

It may be too early to know what the water fowl situation in the Central Flyway will be this year, but it is not too soon to learn about ducks.

Just issued by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service is a 25c bulletin titled "DUCKS AT A DISTANCE."

You can get this bulletin by sending a quarter to the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C.

If your local club wants to buy them in lots of 100 or more, there is a 25 percent discount.

This in an exciting little booklet.

It's in full color and illustrated by noted wildlife artist Bob Hines. Furthermore, it carries illustrations of all the major species of ducks and geese.

Unlike other field guides which show mating colors, "Ducks At A Distance" offers

invaluable identification clues for students, hunters and everyone who enjoys the study of birds, or just a walk along the shore.

Booklet contains 24 pages. It relates the shapes, colors, voices, flight patterns, rising views and flock formations of these fascinating fowl.

Because of an anticipated heavy demand, delivery delay of at least six weeks is expected. So send your order as early as possible.

There is increasing necessity for such a book among hunters. Bag limitations on certain species now make it a requirement to know your ducks. For the average hunter, who gets out after waterfowl only two or three times a year, this identification is no easy job. Especially where the duck supply is limited!

Most men know a mallard at a glance. They'll recognize a spoon bill or a teal. But they have difficulty in identifying a canvas back, sprig or other species.

Same is true of geese. If you see them every day, of if you

hunt a good many times each year, it soon becomes easy to know the species. But when the laws say you can't kill but certain species, and perhaps only one or two, at that, then it becomes very important to every hunter to know the difference.

I have been told many times about hunters in the rice fields of South Texas finding dead birds stashed away in straw stacks where hunters have hidden them. Such a bird doesn't do anyone any good.

Sometimes we wonder at the manner in which biologists reach their conclusion about bag limits.

Most of them will tell you that legal gun pressure will not deplete the birds. Then they will put a limit on them that is so impractical it results not only in violation, but worse still, in loss of the game entirely.

Same can be applied to turkeys.

In Texas, we have an all-gobbler law. Yet in the fields every year there are hundreds of hens killed and left in the

woods. Occasionally one winds up in the pot, but most of them are wasted.

No sportsman will shoot a hen intentionally. In fact it is seldom that a hen is killed by a sportsman accidentally.

Usually he knows the difference between a hen and a gobbler. And in hunting season the two seldom run together, unless it is a young hen not yet broken away from the mother hen.

Basically there is no reason for a hunter to kill a hen. But when one is killed, it is a shame that it's meat has to spoil. Perhaps a longer look at the system might improve this. Other states have.

Anyway, if you really want to learn how to identify ducks, get off your order right now for one of these new books, "DUCKS AT A DISTANCE."

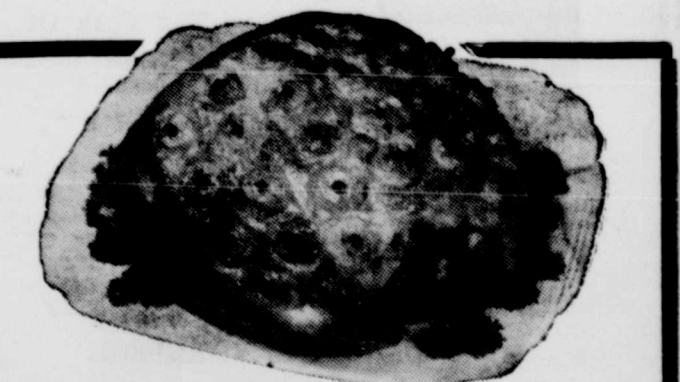

IT'S UP TO YOU

GENERATIONS pass but principles remain. Herodotus tells us that the Persians at one time implored Cyrus

to leave their scant land and choose for themselves a better country. Cyrus gave his permission but warned that "soft countries give birth to soft men—there was no region which produced very delightful fruits, and at the same time men of warlike spirit. So the Persians departed with altered minds, confessing that Cyrus was wiser than they; and chose rather to dwell in a cheerful land, and exercise lordship than to cultivate plains and be the slaves of others."

No recent commentator has been able to improve on Cyrus' statement that "soft countries give birth to soft men." If men have not sufficient self-discipline to withstand ease and comfort but give themselves over to soft living they will be supplanted by harder, better disciplined men. There is a lesson in Cyrus' warning for every American.

Not all the wisdom in the world has developed of recent years. Herodotus is also authority for the statement that the Persians felt that the most disgraceful thing in the world was to tell a lie and next to that to owe a debt. The latter is true "because among other reasons, the debtor is obligated to tell lies."

To realize the force of that last remark one needs only recall the vast amount of sophistry coming out of Washington trying to show that debt is not debt.

The Navy is resentful of a law requiring it to hand over about 25 per cent of its repair work to private shipyards. It therefore, spent \$197 thousand dollars of the taxpayers' money to hire a consulting firm to analyze costs in the hope that the findings would show Navy lower. The consulting firm's report said private shipyard costs were cheaper. So, the Navy made the report "unavailable." The Washington Daily News tells us that a reporter got hold of the story and printed it.

The sequel is that the private shipbuilders had an independent study made and it cost only 720 thousand dollars, but it likewise showed that the private shipyards could do the work cheaper than the Navy.

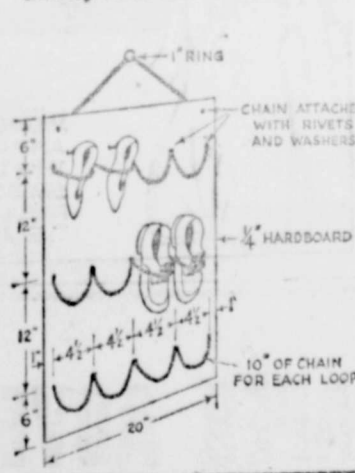

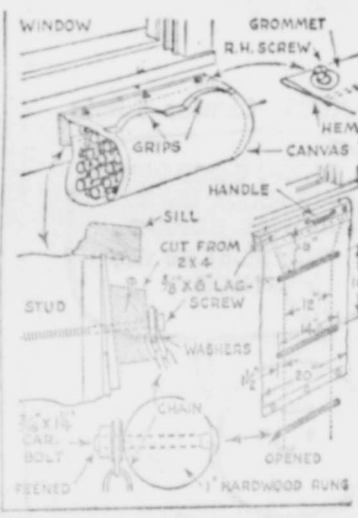
Escape Ladder

Quickly dropped for use, this fire-escape ladder hangs on lag-screws driven into wall studs, or screw anchors in a brick wall. A ladder of 16 hardwood rungs extends 20 ft. and may end 4 ft. above ground. The canvas sling opens by pulling on the grips. Other edge is nailed. Barn-door handle gives an added hold. Alternate location for ladder is inside under window, fastened to studs and concealed by open-back box. Combined load carrying capacity of two stringers of 3/16" welded chain would be approximately 1400 lbs.



Shoe Board

Having no pockets in which dirt can accumulate, this hanging shoe board consists of lightweight chain riveted to a piece of hardboard or plywood. First drill the rivet holes. If you want to paint the board do so before attaching the chain. For a larger board you follow the same spacing for chain. A 1-in. ring at the center of the cross chain keeps the board hanging vertically from a clothes hook or a nail driven into a stud. Or, the rack can be screwed to the inside of a closet door.

News From The County Agent

There will be a Beef Cattle Short Course held in the county on December 3, 4, and 5. Dr. C. M. Patterson, G. O. Hoffman and L. A. Maddox, from A&M University, will teach the course.

Approximately 80% of the cotton crop in the county has been harvested. The cotton crop in the county this year has been very spotted. We are making approximately one-half of a normal crop this year.

The next 30 to 60 days will be critical times as far as this program is concerned in the Southwest. There were 447 screwworm cases reported in Texas last week, the largest number reported for any one week in 1963. However, great progress has been made. From January through August, 1963, only 2,500 cases of worms were reported as compared to 33,969 cases for the same period in 1962.

Do your cattle have cattle grubs in their backs? If so, the grubs certainly don't add to your net profit. Kill the grubs now and it will cut down on next year's crop of heel flies. Rotenone dust or sprays can be used on both beef and dairy cattle.

Recently there has been some confusion among cattlemen about the use of Co-Ral for screwworms and cattle grub control, according to the county agent.

Co-Ral should not be used after October 1 as a 0.375 percent spray as recommended for grub control. However, the 0.25 percent spray of Co-Ral or 0.5 percent Korlan spray as recommended for screwworm control, can be used at any time.

Occasional reports of the death of weak, stressed or anemic animals following the use of Co-Ral may not necessarily be due to the application of the insecticide, but merely coin-

side with it. In some cases, as after the administration of anesthetic drugs, animals have died as the result of handling and undue excitement.

However, as with most insecticides, caution should be used when Co-Ral is used for the control or prevention of screwworms. Any death following the use of chemicals should be investigated, including a post-mortem examination to accurately determine the factors contributing to the death.

Finally, when using Co-Ral or Korlan, the directions and precautions on the manufacturer's label should be carefully followed.

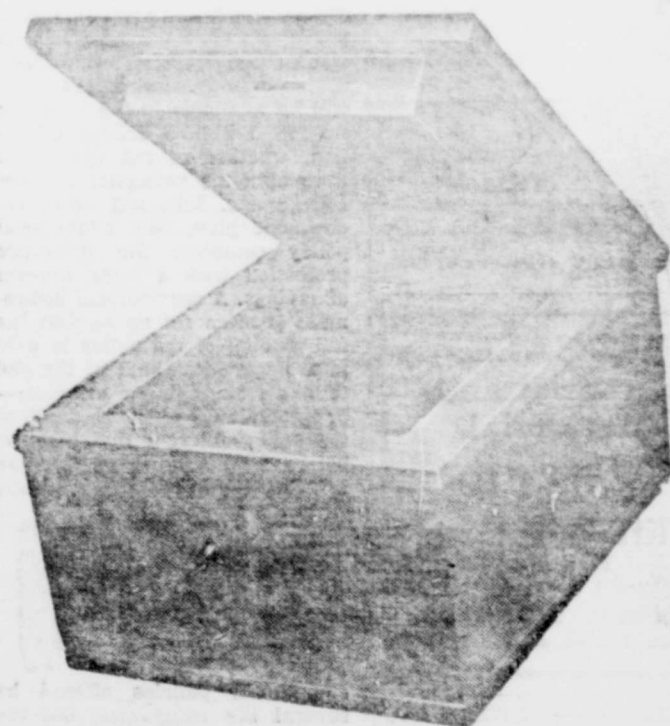

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. How does "educational life insurance" differ from other policies?

A. There are many different "educational" policies. One such policy is a special kind of endowment life insurance, specifically designed to guarantee that funds will be available in the future to finance a child's college education, whether or not the father lives until the youngster reaches college age. Like any other endowment plan, this educational policy combines life insurance protection with a large amount of savings. A conventional endowment is often set up so that the full amount of the policy is paid in a single lump sum at the end of a certain number of years—or immediately upon the death of the policyholder, if that happens before the policy matures. There is considerable variation among

educational policies offered by several life companies, but the benefit payments are usually spread out in equal installments over a four-year period beginning when the child reaches college age. With a typical plan, the father continues to pay premiums through the child's third college year. If the father should die before then, no further premium payments would be due, and full benefits would still be paid during the child's college years.

For example, a 35-year-old father might purchase a typical \$4,000 educational policy for the benefit of his 8-year-old son, who would be entering college about 10 years from now. The policy would provide \$1,000 during each of the four years the youngster would be in college.

Premiums on the educational policy are lower because they are spread over a longer period (13 years instead of 10) and benefits are paid in installments over four years instead of in a lump sum when the child enters college.

Sponges Vs. Germs

A cellulose sponge makes a good practical nurse! Chuckle if you must, but there's a good deal of truth in this. Sooner or later, every homemaker does her share of home nursing, and the sponges rate high among necessary aids.

They are easily sanitized—boilable and machine washable; so they are ideal for sick-room cleanup jobs. Use them with a pine oil cleaner. Then they not only keep things antiseptic; they also leave a pleasantly fresh aroma—good for patient morale.

In lieu of an ice bag, a sponge wrung out in icy water will help you bring a fever down. A fresh dampened one in a bowl on the bedside table can be used for washing newspaper off fingers and for other quick cleanups.

If you have to give bed baths, a cellulose sponge wrung out in sudsy water is ideal. The sponge retains the amount of suds you want without dripping. Use a second sponge wrung out in clear water, and don't forget that a dash of baking soda added to it will be just as soothing as it is in a tub bath.

The dishes of a person who has any contagious illness should be carefully sterilized. Use a separate sponge dishcloth for this, also sterilizing it frequently in boiling water.

A convalescing child can be entertained with the chance to do sponge painting with either water colors or finger paints. Assemble appropriate supplies on a sturdy bed tray and let art take his mind off confinement.

Finally, don't forget that when a siege of illness is over, there is nothing better for surface washing the mattress than a cellulose sponge wrung out in whipped mild suds. Rinse with another, and let the mattress dry in the airy room or, better still, outdoors in the sun.

Fire Safety Tips

Every day, an average of 1,500 homes burn, 31 lives are lost. These losses are tragic. But, most tragic of all—they need not happen! 9 out of 10 could have been prevented. To reduce causes of fires, the Sentry Safety Council of the Sentry Insurance companies has compiled this list of hazards to watch for:

- When emptying ashtrays, make sure every cigarette butt is cold; before retiring or leaving house, check to make sure no one has left a cigarette burning; never smoke in bed.
- Have heating systems cleaned annually; close unused flues with non-combustible caps.
- Never load wall plugs with more than two appliances.
- Use U.L. approved fuses—most household circuits should not have over 15 ampere fuses.
- Never leave electric iron with current on; cool before storing.

- Automatic gas water heaters should be checked annually; turn off non-automatic models before leaving house.
- Never string electrical cords under rugs, over radiators, through door jams.
- Caution baby sitter against permitting child to play with matches, electrical appliances; provide sitter with flashlight for use if lighting fails.
- Keep attic and basement clean.
- Never start an outdoor fire on a windy day; burn rubbish in a covered wire-mesh basket; extinguish fire thoroughly with water or cover with sand.
- Finally, plan what you and every member of your family would do in case of a fire emergency. The Sentry Safety Council says rehearse a family escape plan now—in advance.

Income payments over a certain number of years. 4. A fixed amount of income to be paid for as long as the proceeds last. 5. A guaranteed income for as long as your wife may live.

What if you have a family with young children? You'll never find them pulling the "funny-looking friend" ploy—when you choose for a best friend an ugly duckling who you shine in contrast. Nor do they buy their way into the most popular guy's favor—with gifts of a favorite cashmere or their mother's perfume—like some girls we know!

Boys may be as fierce as tigers (about winning that final set in tennis), but they're not cats. A man's best friend is his friend.

And while men talk, they haven't made a great art of gossip. Imagine a guy spinning a behind-the-back tale beginning: "He's a great guy but . . ."

Black isn't man's favorite color—in deeds. He may sink into as deep a depression, but he won't just sit there. He'll do something—wire a lamp or wash a car to move the mood on its way.

As a general rule (to which there are important exceptions), it is less advantageous to select the lifetime income option for a person younger than about 55 or 60, because payments beginning earlier than that must necessarily be smaller. On the other hand, it is generally less advantageous to select the fixed-income or certain-number-of-years options for an older person, because the income period might run out while the person is still alive.

Whatever options you choose, it is often advisable to allow your beneficiaries the right to modify them if changing family circumstances should make this necessary after your death.
