

Neff's Colt Races To Cash, World's Record

It was only a summer ago that Tom Neff bought a yearling quarter-horse with racing promise.

There was a slight hitch.

The animal had been injured in a car wreck. And, right then, you could take your pick of race track judgments concerning Neff's horse sense.

There's no doubt now.

See Him Go, now a 2-year-old charger, is a winner in this current racing season.

With a winner the Colorado City ranching and farming businessman is in the higher racing money.

A couple of Sunday afternoons ago, jockey Jerry Nicodemus rode See Him Go to second place in the "Kansas Quarter-Horse Futurity" at Ruidoso Downs.

When the horse went to the winner's circle, Neff opened his pocketbook for \$34,048 in brand new cash.

At the track's betting windows See Him Go paid 4.60 and 3.60.

The winner over the 350-yards distance for the "Kansas" was L. R. French's Miss Angel Eyes.

Miss Angel Eyes, by moving out in front by a half length in the stretch, won \$70,862 for his owner, a Midland oil man who got his start in Brownwood, and paid 18.60, 8.20 and 5.40.

Ruidoso's Kansas Futurity was the sixth race for Neff's horse this season.

The \$34,048 purse increased his earnings about \$56,000 for those six outings.

Still to come on See Him Go's path this season are Rainbow Quarter-Horse Futurity in July with an estimated purse of \$150,000 plus \$600,000 All-American Labor Day, both at Ruidoso.

Then, in September the Neff racing contingent moves to Albuquerque Futurity before returning to Sunland Park, near El Paso, for the Fall Futurity there.

The Neffs — Tom and wife, Jody, and their children, Mickey, Julie, Holly, Angie and Jeff — returned to Ruidoso Saturday for the next several weeks.

Another of Neff's horses, King's Kid, a 5-year gelding, ran Saturday in the 11th race at Ruidoso for a \$1,700 purse after winning his two most recent outings.

Tammikin, a 3-year-old mare owned by Neff, runs next

week. She's out of Tim Tam, a Kentucky Derby winner several years ago.

But it is See Him Go which has raised the eyes of the racing crowd this season — mostly with jockey Nicodemus up top.

The colt in six outings has run twice at Goliad, twice at Sunland and twice at Ruidoso, winning two times and placing second three.

At Goliad, See Him Go was second both in trials and "Texas Futurity" finals. Carried to Sunland April 14, he set a world's record of 17.48 for 2-year-olds over 350 yards.

They were pointing him toward bigger purse futurity finals there as the horse won trials by 5 to 6 lengths.

But in the finals the colt was crowded too much and knocked down. That's the only time he hasn't run first or second.

Neff bought the See Him Go from C. L. Madden in Willard, N. M.

"He was injured, all right, in that wreck," Neff said, "but not serious."

The Colorado City owner doesn't like to talk about the buying price he paid, but his friends have quoted a very reasonable figure, especially in view of the colt's success this season.

See Him Go put the Neff family on the race track. Since then, they have acquired King's Kid and Tammikin, plus another quarter-horse, Rag Time Chick, which won four of five and finished second that fifth race.

Rag Time has been impressive enough for Neff to call the quarter-horse "outstanding for 870 yards."

However, the three are not "near the money" that See Him Go races for, Neff quickly explains.

Even the last-place horse in "Kansas Quarter-Horse Futurity" a couple of weeks ago at Ruidoso earned \$7,235.

The "Kansas" gives you a good idea of the "class" which See Him Go races.

The futurity had \$224,000

in total prize money on the line for both "divisions" to become the second richest race now run at Ruidoso Downs and one of the five richest horse races in the world.

French's Miss Angel Eyes by winning the futurity became the richest two-year-old quarter-horse so far in 1970 with total earnings of \$76,339.40.

With that you quickly realize how near See Him Go is to the top with \$56,000 earnings so far this year.

In what bracket do you find the top money-winner for an entire year? Walter Merrick's world champion Easy Jet accumulated over \$400,000 in earnings last year with wins which included the "Kansas" and "All-American" futurities at Ruidoso.

That beats farming, for sure.

500 Attend Reunion

Awards Program Marks Events

More than 500 persons attended homecoming activities last week end in Westbrook.

Highlighting the three-day event, third for the community, was a Saturday afternoon program in which awards were presented to honor guests.

John Bullock of Abilene was recognized as earliest graduate of Westbrook School. He was graduated in 1904.

Mack Walker, a 1941 WHS graduate, traveled the farthest distance, 1810 miles from his home in Missoula, Mont. Three teachers serving in the school the same year, 1923-24, shared the distinction of earliest teachers. They were Mrs. Witt Hines, Mrs. Irene Bledsoe Kennedy of Stephenville and Mrs. Leroy Gressett.

However another ex-teacher, Perry Brown of Rising Star who taught in 1919, attended earlier homecoming activities but was unable to attend award presentation.

George Dawson was awarded a plaque as the oldest board member present.

L. M. Dawson, superintendent of schools and master of ceremonies for the afternoon made award presentations and welcomed ex-residents and guests.

Invocation was by Earl Cook of Dallas, former student and principal at Westbrook. Dwayne Clawson of Coahoma, directed group singing of "America". Mrs. Rex McKenney was narrator for the program which depicted the community's history.

First on the afternoon program in school cafeteria was history of sheep men, tent city, coming railroad and need of school. Music for the early day flash-back was by Hoyt Roberts, Dwayne Clawson, instrumentalists, and Mrs. Opal Wilson Powell of Sweetwater.

Mrs. McKenney reviewed history of the school's growth into the World War I and era of 1920's. Sons and daughters of Mr. and Mrs. P. E. Clawson sang "Harvest Moon".

Gold Diggers — a group of local Westbrook High School girls including Judy Chambers,

Sandy Anderson, Linda Ranne, Joyce McKenney and Kim Sullivan — sang "Dearie Do You Remember" and later presented "Tip Toe Through the Tulips" and "Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree".

Their accompanist was Mrs. LaRue Broussard, a Westbrook teacher.

In the World War II segment, the narrator paid tribute to veterans of world wars, those serving in military conflicts and to current servicemen.

During this memorial Miss Cheryl Hines, Colorado High School head twirler, presented a tap dance and twirling routine. Laverne Sullivan of Odessa sang "Tennessee Waltz".

The 1950 ear was noted by Mrs. Johnny Shackelford who sang, "You, You, You".

Last on the program was Eddie Ranne, a student at North Texas State University, who sang current hits, "Raindrops Falling on My Head" and "I've Got to Be Me". He was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Charles Ranne.

Climaxing the homecoming program was group singing of the school song, led by present Westbrook cheerleaders, and "Pleasant Be The Tie That Binds", directed by Clawson.

Homecoming registration got underway Friday with class and group parties hosted Friday night and Saturday morning. More than 400 persons attended the noon barbecue Saturday in school gymnasium.

Reunion committee heading arrangements for the event were Mrs. McKenney, Doug Barber, Jerry Webb, Alvin Byrd, W. E. Smith Jr., Louis Rees and David Anderson.

Crops Lost To Hail Storm

Several thousand acres of cotton and other crops were destroyed or damaged during Thursday's night hail storm.

Worst hit by the storm was a strip of farms beginning about Interstate 20 and Dorn Road extending south into Spade Community, according to Bobby Lemons, county extension agent.

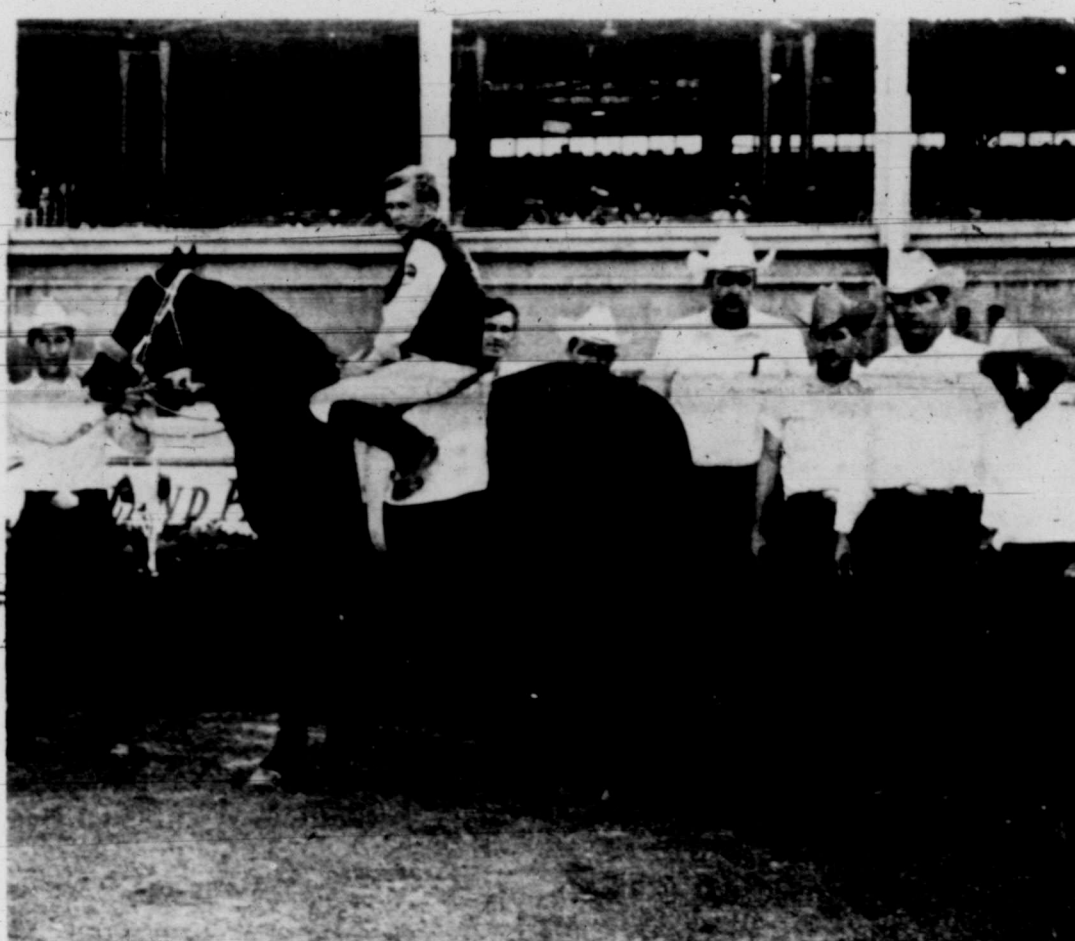
"Some areas were hurt worse than others," Lemons reported, "and young cotton was damaged more than older cotton which in some cases might have a chance to come out of it."

Some rain (up to 2 inches in spots) fell, but most damage was caused by wind driven hail that just beat the crops down, the agent said, although most of the feed has a chance to come back.

Lemons advised all farmers with crop loss to check with Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee before re-planting any crop.

Provision for crop losses have been made for producers who signed up in 1970 cotton and feed grain farm program and are able to plant crops because of adverse weather conditions.

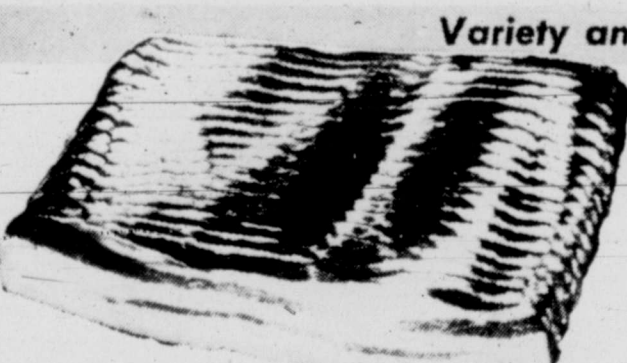

or feed grain is destroyed by natural forces the producer still can earn program payments.

"But the land must not be planted to any other crop before approval by the county committee," the agent warned. "Producers must file requests for acreage credit certifying they have been prevented from carrying out normal operations."

"The first thing a farmer should do is get in touch with the ASCS and report his situation."

In a Friday report Lemons suggested four alternatives that farmers might consider for crop destroyed acreage.

He suggested that farmers consider planting guar, a non-allotted crop with a market of \$4.65 per hundred; enter grazing program, plant feed grain if not already in feed grain program or replant cotton.

"If a farmer decides to replant cotton I would suggest only one variety," the agent said, "and that is Stripper 31."
