Region Title Game

Two Texas Class B football powers, Jayton and Grandfalls-Royalty, collide here Friday night for a regional championship.

Kickoff time will be at 7:30 o'clock in Wolf Stadium.

It will be a toss-up contest between the two teams whose seasonal records total up 10 victories between them.

Coach Jerry English's Jayton Jaybirds scored a 16-13 triumph here last week over Wall in bi-district competition. That was their triumph No. 11.

They scored 10 consecutive wins against non-conference foes and District 5-B opponents along the football trail to the playoffs.

Coach John McCabe's Grandfalls Cowboys won 9 and lost only 1 in their successful quest for the District 7-B title. That lone defeat was a 0-22 loss to Sanderson in their third game of the season. After that, there was no sidetracking the Cowboys.

Whether it will be an advantage or a loss of momentum remains will not be determined until Friday. But Grandfalls drew a bye in bi-district and was out of action last week while Jayton was coming from behind to beat Wall.

Both teams have a scoring punch. Jayton in regular season averaged more than 5 touchdowns a game while scoring 334 points.

And the Jaybirds 16 points against Wall here last week was nothing to be ashamed about. They traveled for 141 yards on the ground and 163 in the air to score two touchdowns.

Their defense was adequate all season, too, allowing only 45 points in 10 games. The fact they held Wall, with 290 points in 9 games, to two touchdowns and then scored a safety underscores Jayton's defensive strength.

Grandfalls in 18 regular season games tore up their opponents for 264 points while two backs -- Jim Raglin and Rudy Sanchez -- divided 22 touchdowns equally between themselves. Because they were held scoreless by Sanderson, the Cowboys scored all those 264 points (35 touchdowns) in just 9 games.

They field opponents scoreless twice, let only three teams score more than one touchdown.

Burglars Take 100 Cartons Of Cigarettes

Burglars with a selective taste in tobacco carried away approximately \$400 in cigarettes here Tuesday night.

The haul was made at Safeway Inc., 500 block of Oak.

Patrolman Dan Pfeuffer discovered the break-in at 4:42 a.m.

Entrance was gained by prying off aluminum facing of the super market's south rear door.

Police Chief Jesse Brown, who joined Assistant Chief Jim Latham and Patrolman Pfeuffer at the burglary scene, said approximately 100 cartons of cigarettes were taken.

Only five brands--regular and long, filter and menthol--were selected. Left behind were other brands.

Police believe two persons participated in the burglary, carrying their loot to a car parked nearby.

Entry to the building was gained during an approximate 30 to 40 minute between police patrols in the area.

It was the second burglary at the store within 14 months. The previous break-in was Oct. 2, 1969 and police captured a burglar leaving the building.

Time Worry

Hearing Too Soon

Civic leaders are apprehensive that a hurry-up hearing date will be Colorado City's disadvantage when it seeks to convince Texas Railroad Commission that the city's railroad agency station should stay open.

Originally, the community had only a week's notice that a hearing, requested by T&P Railroad to close and dismantle its station here, would be in Austin.

Chamber of Commerce, city and county officials immediately asked the commission for a postponement.

They got the postponement, but only to Dec. 10. That's right in the middle of the busiest period of the year for the town and it still leaves little time for development of adequate data opposing T&P's request.

"Adding to the disadvantage is the fact that T&P has been planning the move for months and months."

"We had wanted the commission to postpone the hearing until after Christmas and the first of the year," said J. C. Britton, Chamber of Commerce president.

Britton, Mayor Mike Burt and County Judge Elmer Martin requested postponement and change to Colorado City.

Martin specifically asked for postponement to allow "proper time" for formulated community opposition to the request. The mayor and Britton made it plain in their telegram requests that it would be best for a hearing date after Jan. 1.

But a quick return telegram from the Railroad Commission, possibly before all of the requests for postponement reached Austin, said the hearing was being reset from Dec. 3 to Dec. 10 and switched to Colorado City.

Still, with cotton harvest season just being completed, Christmas shopping in full swing and businessmen at their busiest pace of the year, Britton doesn't believe the community will have time to prepare and present proper opposition.

Stanton, Eastland and Strawn are three of the smaller cities along the T&P which has opposed the railroad's attempt at the closing local agencies. And their effort has paid off -- their agencies are open.

Kindergarten Census

3-Day Count Begins Monday

Children not enrolled in school now and who will be 5 years of age on or before next Sept. 1 will be counted by Colorado Independent School District.

The census will begin Monday, Dec. 7, under direction of Eston Blackmon, principal of Kelley Elementary School, and Mrs. Wally Price, director of the district's bilingual education program.

Purpose of the census will

be for long-range planning and to plan specifically for the 1970-71 kindergarten and bilingual programs.

Both are new for Colorado City schools and in their initial term have approximately 80 children in their classes.

The survey, beginning Monday and continuing next Tuesday and Wednesday, will involve all parents who have children in the specified age group.

Parents of these children (not now enrolled in school and who will be 5 on or before Sept. 1, 1971) are requested to visit Kelley Elementary School any of the three days from 2:30 p.m. to 4 p.m., according to Gary Gardner, assistant to the superintendent.

"We request that the parent bring the child's birth certificate, if one is available for verification of age. No immunization record will be necessary at this time," Gardner said.

In previous years a complete school census has been conducted. However, beginning this year, this broader census will be conducted only once every five years. So, the 5-year-old survey will be conducted separately.

Kindergarten began this fall for children age 5 years 5 months. Next year the age will drop to 5 years 2 months.

der in 1931 and while work-
ing with his boys, he also ear-
ned the Eagle badge.

Always interested in youth,
Rev. and Mrs. Parmenter or-
ganized a dramatic club and de-
bate society for young people
in Munday during depression
years.

Talking about their ministry
in Colorado City, Mrs. Parmenter
said, "They treat me like I
was something on a silver
platter."

Both Rev. and Mrs. Parmenter
feel that way about all their
charges-even the ones which
paid \$394 and \$525 a year,
much of that in chicken's wheat,
which he had to sell and then
deduct a percentage for the
conference and bishop.

"We haven't had anything but
love and dishwater," laughs
Mrs. Parmenter, "and some-
times the dishwater was
pretty weak. But we've had the
