## Students Register In Wellington August 25 & 26

The schedule for the opening of Wellington Schools was announced this week by Supt. E.W. Clement.

Due to action of the Texas Legislature in its called session, school vacations are extended a week, but schedules remain the same as last year.

The faculty will begin work on Monday, August 22.

Students will begin class-work, Monday, August 29.

Teachers will meet Monday at 9:15 a.m. to begin three days of inservice. A general faculty meeting will be held in the school library, and

afterwards the teachers will divide according to the school in which they are assigned. Morning inservice sessions will last until noon and afternoon sessions will be 1:00 to 3:30 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday morning sessions will start at 9:00 a.m.

Work scheduled will be on accreditation and on the 5-year self evaluation plan in which the school is engaged, Mr. Clement said.

Student enrollment will be held Thursday and Friday, August 25 and 26. The schedule will be:

Thursday, 9:00 to 11:00 a.m.: seniors, junior high, eighth grade, and fourth and fifth grades in elementary school.

Thursday, 1:00 to 3:30 p.m.: high school juniors; sixth and seventh grades in junior high, and second and thirds in elementary school.

Friday, 8:30 to 10:00 a.m.: high school sophomores; 10:00 to 11:30 a.m.: high school freshmen.

Friday, 9:00 to 10:30 a.m. first grade and kindergarten. Mr. Clement pointed out that through the year,

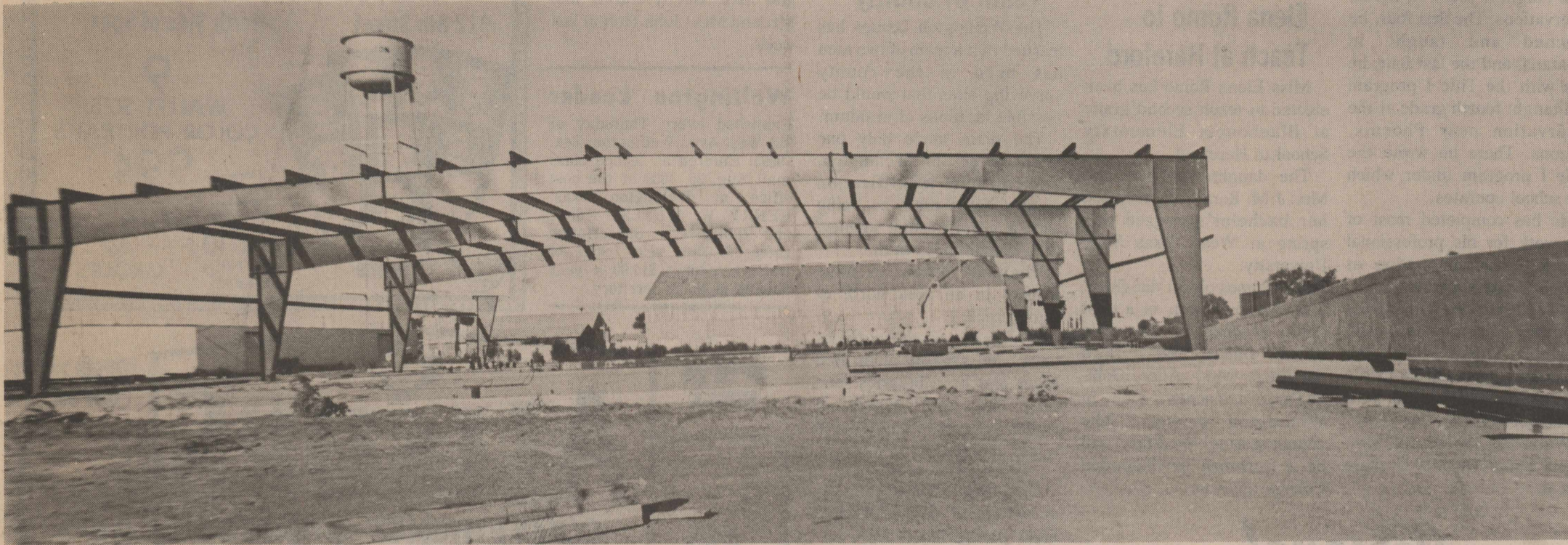
teachers will have 5 inservice days and 5 workdays, according to state school regulations. In addition to the three next week, there will be another at the district XVI TSTA meeting in Amarillo and the fifth at the close of school. The two days of registration are considered teacher work days, and there will be one work day at the end of each quarter.

Work on the new elementary school has started, with plumbing now being installed. One pour of the foundation will be made within a few days

and three others will follow. Band Hall redecoration is completed and work on the gymnasium is almost finished. A final finish remains to be put on the floor and on the bleachers, and new lights will be installed as soon as fixtures arrive.

Forms are in place for the foundation of the 50-foot addition to the field house.

Nothing will be done to the dressing rooms under the rock stadium under this improvement program, Mr. Clement said. These improvements will be done locally.

## 200 Expected at Ex-Students Dinner Saturday

Only 200 tickets will be available, Patsy Harper Mitchell, president said. In case of rain, the dinner will be moved to Bura Handley Community Center, where the other events of the 26th annual reunion will be held.

Registration will begin at

10:00 a.m. at the community center, and the entire day will be given over to visiting and reminiscing. No program is planned.

Mrs. Mitchell has requested that people who have school annuals they would like to donate to the Association to bring them to the reunion, so that others may also enjoy them.

Greater participation by ex-students still living in the Wellington area is urged.

"This is the big problem. These visitors travel all these miles to come to Wellington for the reunion. If they can travel those miles, why can't we come down to the community building to greet them," she declared. "We have had out-of-town ex-students come, find no one they knew, and leave--and not return."

Approximately 2,000 reunion notices were sent to ex-students for whom the

association has addresses, Mrs. Mitchell said.

"I'm sure we're not reaching half the people we should and we are urging those who attend this year to bring the addresses of other ex-students they may know. This is the only way we can build our list of those who formerly went to school in Wellington," Mrs. Mitchell requested.

She also urged Wellington people to register or pre-regi-

ster. The \$1.50 registration fee is the only source of regular income the Ex-Students Association has. However, there have been several donations from former residents, Mrs. Mitchell said. "These are always welcome," she added. More workers are needed.

Hosts and hostesses from the various classes are needed at the community center on throughout Saturday to visit with out of town ex-students, and especially with their families, who may not have lived here.

The Ex-Student Dance will start at the community building at 9:00 p.m. Saturday, with Kirby Stevens Western Band of Canadian playing.

Volunteers are also needed to stay and help clean up the community center, the streets

outside and the church grounds across the street.

day on the four courts, and Wellington area people, as well as those from out of town, are invited to come out and make up the gallery.

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Wellington for its semi-annual visit Wednesday, August 17, Charles Floyd, county blood chairman, had announced.

The quota remains at 118 units.

The bloodmobile, which comes here from the Red River Regional Center in Wichita Falls, will be at Bura Handley Community Center from 1:00 to 6:00 p.m.

Wellington Business and Professional Women's Club is in charge of the bloodmobile visit, with Mrs. Ernest Harwell as co-ordinator. Wellington Young Homemakers are assisting.

It is especially urgent that the quota be met, if not surpassed, on this visit, Mr. Floyd said. Collingsworth

General Hospital receives its entire supply of whole blood components from the Wichita Falls Red Cross center, and the hospital's part of this agreement is that Collingsworth County furnish the number of units asked for on each bloodmobile visit.

Each county's quota is set on the basis of its population. One thing makes this bloodmobile visit unusual.

It follows by two weeks the death of a popular young Wellington woman, Mrs. Craig Bergvall. Her death was attributed to hepatitis which she contracted in a blood transfusion during surgery several months ago.

They emphasize it was not Red Cross Blood, and the

His selection came in a special meeting of the Commissioners Court Thursday, August 4, and his appointment will be effective upon the approval of his bond by the State Comptroller, County Judge Zook Thomas announced.

Until then, the county tax office is closed, and no business can be transacted, although Mr. Scott is at the office to familiarize himself with it.

He will succeed Mrs. Frances Williams, who resigned from the Tax Assessor-Collector office effective August 1.

Before the office is opened, an inventory of supplies will also be made by Brooks Ross of the Amarillo office of Motor Vehicle Registration, Texas

Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Mr. Scott's first farming operations were three miles east of Wellington for 5 years, later he farmed southwest of Wellington until he entered the implement business in 1951.

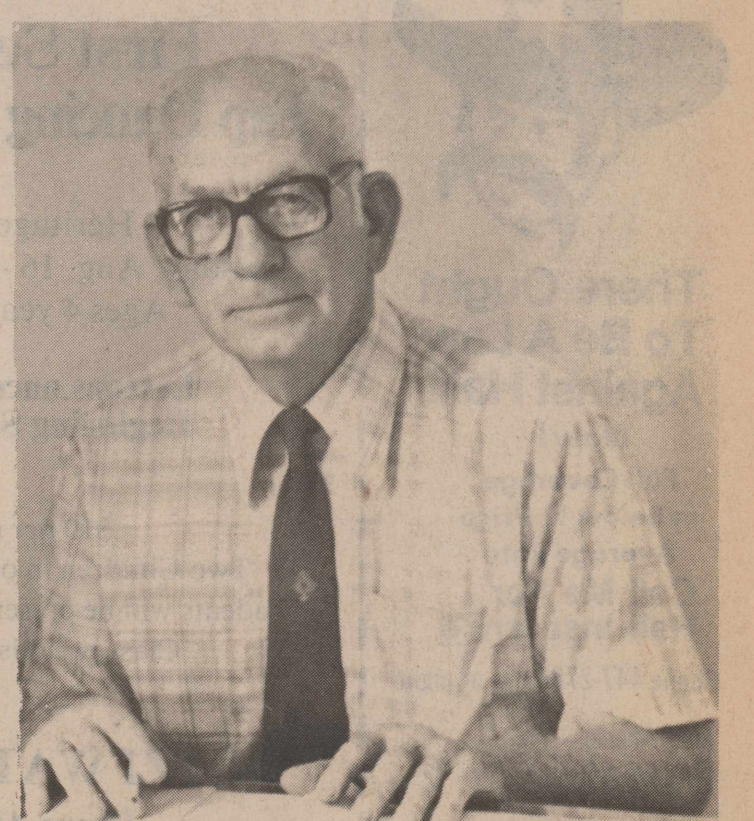
Following this, he was employed in the office of the City of Wellington as delinquent tax collector and city judge.

# 2 Board Sets School Tax Rate at \$2.19

Wellington School Board Monday, August 8 raised the school tax rate from \$1.92 to \$2.19 per \$100 valuation to pay for the schoolhouse bonds approved by voters earlier in the year.

Taxes for local maintenance of the schools remain the same--\$1.50; but taxes for permanent improvements climbed from 42 cents to 69 cents to pay for a new elementary building, an addition to the field house, air conditioning the high school auditorium, and other improvements.

The board also received the 1977-78 school budget prior to a public hearing on the budget set for Tuesday, August 16, at 8:30 p.m. in the superintendent's office. The public is

invited to come at that time to ask questions.

In other action the board approved floor plan changes in the field house requested by Coach James Williams, and hired Mr. and Mrs. Sam Jett as custodians. Mr. Jett will also drive a bus.

The board also approved the hiring of R.W. Warren as special education instructor by EPCO, the multi-county education cooperative.

KBGH Radio, Memphis, was selected to broadcast Skyrocket football games this fall.

The board also approved the school free lunch program.

## Architects Take Up Study of Jail Plans

Sheriffs, county judges and commissioners of Hall and Collingsworth Counties met Monday, August 1, with two architectural firms to plan additions to the Collingsworth County jail which would be used by both counties.

Plans call for spaces for juveniles-boys and girls-and for women. Also included in remodeling plans for the current jail are maximum and medium security spaces. All facilities would meet the current state jail standards.

The two counties plus Donley and Wheeler Counties had originally considered cooperating on an improved jail, but Donley and Wheeler have apparently backed out of the cooperative program, according to Collingsworth County Judge Zook Thomas.

The group resolved to work towards a jail that would include 22 spaces--4 for women, 4 for boys, 2 for girls and 12 for men.

Working with architects on plans will be Collingsworth County Sheriff John Rainey, Hall County Sheriff Elmer Neel and 100th Judicial Probation District Officer Bob Watson.

Attending the meeting to which several architects had been invited were Charles Roberts, Jr. and Clifford Abbott of Shiver-Megert &

## New Wheat Target Price Gives County \$180,113

Congressman Jack Hightower announced the increase in the target price for wheat passed by the Congress last week will mean additional payments to wheat farmers of approximately \$180,113.54, in Collingsworth County. This figure is an estimate based on the county allotment and the historical yield.

The House passed the 1977 Agricultural Act Thursday with the 1977 target price for wheat set at \$2.90 per bushel. The corn target and loan were raised to \$2.00 per bushel for the 1977 crop. The current wheat target is \$2.47 per bushel and the House committee had approved a \$2.65 per bushel level.

"When you consider that 'new money' in our local economy will turn over an estimated seven times, it is clear what this 43 cents per bushel increase means in dollars and cents to this county and the entire Northwest Texas area," stated Hightower. He went on to point out that although during consideration of the farm bill in the Livestock and Grain Subcommittee he had worked for a \$3.20 per bushel figure, the compromise figure will mean a good number of both farmers and local businesses will be able to continue to operate. "With every penny added to that target price," said Hightower, "fewer and fewer

of our people will be forced to leave the farm."

Hightower has been one of several farm state Congressmen fighting for higher target and loan rates. Depressed prices in commodities like wheat and corn have created severe financial crisis in the farm sector. Hightower emphasized this to the members of Congress in a floor speech during the first day of debate on the farm bill. He referred to a report released in April of this year predicting over 3,000 Texas farmers would declare bankruptcy before the year was over.

## Sun Power Clouded

In the United States, there's no such thing as a guaranteed right to the sun's rays, at least rays that strike at an angle, and thus are useful as a power source. This is only one of the clouds on the horizon for solar power developers.

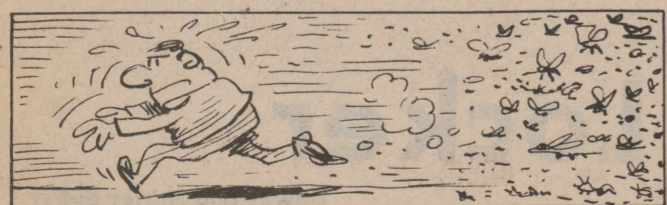
British common law recognizes rights to the sun's rays through the Ancient Lights Doctrine. Zoning laws as well as doubt over accessibility to sunlight could interfere with development of solar energy in the U.S., however.

Deed restrictions also could halt installation of solar energy collectors. But if the homeowner gets past government restrictions, he still could face a conservative banker in his quest for cheap and plentiful energy. Even if the loan officer is friendly, if the firm is subject to the Federal Home owners Loan Act, the amount of money that can be loaned on a house costing more than \$55,000 is limited. Since a solar system requires a backup conventional furnace, cost of an installation could exceed the amount of money available.

There is a bright side to all this, however. As the major manufacturers of heating and cooling equipment become more interested in solar power, market expansion could open a lot of doors, both governmental and financial. Solar energy isn't right around the corner, but it's not as far away as many fear. Wichita Falls Record News

AUSTIN—A quarter-billion-dollar state highway system repair, rebuilding and rehabilitation program received approval of the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission last week.

Projects spanning 6,900 miles of highways were made possible by additional funds appropriated for road purposes by the legislature this year.

Bulk of the work on 1,075 projects in 223 counties will be financed from general revenue funds earmarked for the purpose. The remainder will be paid for with state highway funds.

Extensive damage to the existing system due to severe weather conditions and a shortage of money in recent years made the rehabilitation necessary, SHPTC said. Cost of the work is about \$222.5 million. An additional \$4.3 million is set aside for later assignment.

Approximately 68 per cent of the program will be on state and U.S. highways, another 30 per cent on farm to market roads, and the rest (two per cent) is reserved for future assignment. The program is the first phase of a long-range program to restore the highway system to top standards. It is based on recommendations of several district engineers and was selected following a statewide assessment of needs.

All projects are expected to be underway within a year and a half, SHPTC said.

#### Small Hike Proposed

A State Insurance Board consultant has recommended

that automobile insurance rates be raised only 1.8 per cent statewide, as opposed to 10.1 per cent earlier projected by board staffers.

Charles Edwards of Dallas offered his suggestions at a board rate hearing last week.

The industry is seeking a 17.4 per cent average boost in rates.

The board delayed a decision for two weeks to make a careful study of the actuary's proposals.

Edwards noted that current rate formulas allow insurance companies 20 cents on each premium dollar for agents' commission and other production costs, but actual cost is only about 16.7 cents. Edwards was instrumental last year in holding down the increase by selling the board on automatic deductibles of \$200 for collision coverage and \$50 on comprehensive coverage.

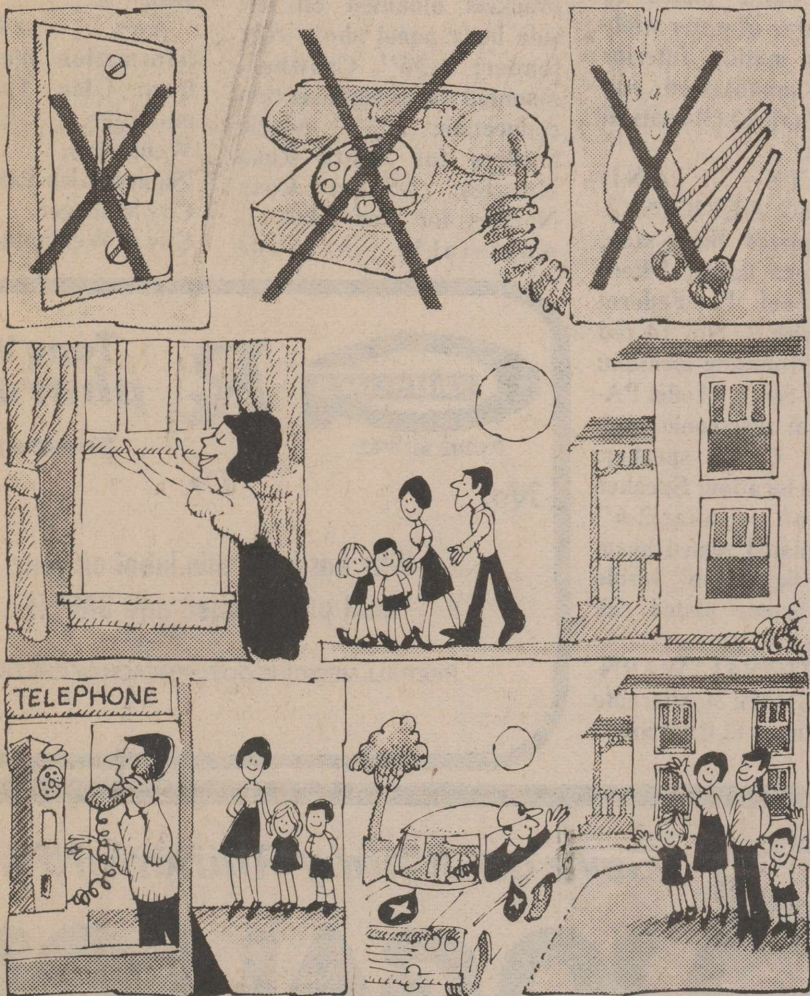

The Collingsworth County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 is located in Collingsworth County, Texas, and was created by the Commissioners Court of Collingsworth County on July 18, 1958. The Commission anticipates dissolving the District for reasons of inactivity and failure to perform during five consecutive years any of the functions for which it was created, and for having no outstanding bonded indebtedness.

Permit No. 2168 (Application No. 2394), as amended, was filed on May 10, 1965, and issued on June

30, 1965, and is owned by Collingsworth County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 according to Commission records. The permit authorizes the construction of a dam and 96,680 acre-foot reservoir on the Salt Fork of the Red River, Red River Basin, in Collingsworth County, Texas; and the diversion and use of 35,000 acre-feet per annum for the irrigation of 27,196 acres of land located in five separate tracts in Collingsworth County, Texas. The maximum authorized diversion rate is 122 cfs (55,000 gpm). The time limitation in the permit required construction to commence by June 30, 1967, and be completed by June 30, 1968. Permit No. 2168 was amended on November 15, 1965, to authorize the construction of a dam and 5,438 acre-foot balancing reservoir on Willow Creek, tributary Sand Creek, tributary Salt Fork Red River, Red River Basin, in Collingsworth County, Texas. Construction of this project was to commence by November 15, 1967, and be completed on November 15, 1968.

The Commission has issued five extensions of time to commence construction, the last being issued on May 1, 1975. The latest extension of time required that construction commence on all projects authorized by Permit No. 2168, as amended, by June 30, 1977. Permittee was notified by certified mail on June 2, 1977, of the deadline to commence construction and the need for an additional extension of time. Three unsuccessful attempts were made to deliver the letter and it was returned to the Commission unclaimed. Permittee has not applied for an extension of time and there is no evidence that construction has begun on the projects authorized by Permit No. 2168, as amended.

The Commissioner's Court of Collingsworth County has requested that Collingsworth County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 be dissolved and that ownership of Permit No. 2168, as amended, be transferred to the Commissioner's Court. 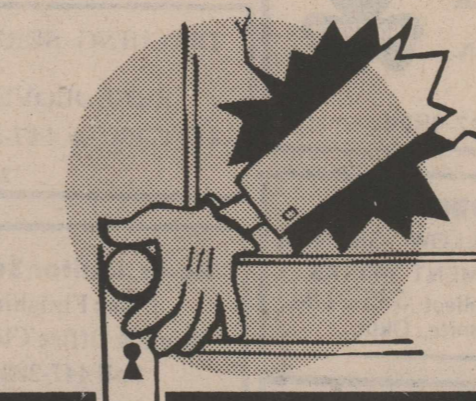
"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office and we believe these face-to-face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," Bullock added.
