Senate Approves U. S. Neutrality Resolution

John Burke Tells Of Convention at Lions Club Meet

John A. Burke, president of the Lions club, reported on his recent trip to Mexico City, D. F., where the International Lions Convention was held, at the meeting of the organization on Connelley hotel roof Tuesday. R. L. Ferguson was program chairman.

A reinstated member, F. P. Mundy, and a new member, G. W. Colburn, who will serve as music director for the club, were present.

Announcement was made of a plan to increase interest in regular attendance.

EASTLAND MAN ASKS BODY TO FINISH ROAD

"Satisfactory as we expected under the circumstances," was the result of the hearing given delegates of West Texas who Tuesday pleaded before the highway commission at Austin for completion of Highway 89, according to Milburn McCarty of Eastland, spokesman.

"We're prepared to go farther with our efforts to secure favorable action," McCarty stated Wednesday as he reported on the hearing.

Twenty-one delegates from 10 towns, all favoring the completion were given the hearing which was heard by Chairman Harry Hines and D. K. Martin. The one hour session was left by John Woods, member, because of the illness of a relative.

McCarty told the commission of necessity of the completion of the project which has already cost \$500,000 and that it was to the interest of the state to protect its investments from deterioration and disintegration.

The commission, McCarty and delegates observed, seemed to be in favor of the completion if they had funds.

Evidence of hazardousness of transporting cattle over the Bankhead highway was heard by the commission. McCarty stated that cattlemen are forced to haul their stock to Fort Worth by way of Breckenridge, Graham and Jackboro to avoid the many curves on the road between Strawn and Weatherford.

The road is ready for completion, McCarty stated he had been informed by a highway engineer. Estimate of completing the road was reported at between \$300,000 and \$400,000.

Argued by the spokesman was that the state has spent \$500,000 for the 45.65 miles project which saves 14.21 miles between Fort Worth and West Texas points and it eliminates four railroad crossings. McCarty stated that the road saves 40 to 60 minutes for truck drivers from Fort Worth to Eastland county.

Delegates in behalf of the project were present from Midland, Colorado, City, Sweetwater, San Angelo, Baird, Putnam, Cisco, Eastland and Ranger.

NEWBURG, N. Y., Aug. 21.—Mrs. Dorothy Sherwood, 27, was "Oh, so happy," today because she had drowned her two-year-old son by holding him under water in a creek.

She told police a story that has become common in these times of depression, of ebbing funds and final despair. Her husband, Fred Sherwood, was a motion picture operator who died six months ago.

Mrs. Sherwood got a job as a waitress, but she couldn't hold it. She said she took the child to a stream, let him play until tired, and "then I led him out to the middle and held him under until he stopped moving. I took him out and held him in my arms a while. I then took off his wet rompers and put on dry ones."

DEL RIO, Texas, Aug. 21.—One smuggler was dead and several had fled after a gun fight with two customs officers near Rio Grande city today.

Officers said the dead man was a member of a band of known smugglers. The customs men confiscated 15 gallons of alcohol.

BRITAIN HAS NOT URGED A PEACE MOVE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—President Roosevelt today said that so far as he knows no request from Great Britain asking the United States join in efforts under the Kellogg-Briand pact in an effort to avert the Italian-Ethiopian conflict has been received.

Mr. Roosevelt's non-committal attitude on the Ethiopian situation came as Chairman Key Pittman, Democrat, Nevada, of the powerful senate foreign relations committee, placed himself on record against "mixing in these foreign affairs."

Referring to dispatches from Europe telling of efforts to get the United States to take some action under the Kellogg pact, he said:

"The Kellogg-Briand pact does not provide for any sanctions and is only morally obligating on the nations. The covenant of the League of Nations does provide sanctions, but we do not subscribe to that. I do not believe in mixing in these foreign affairs."

Mexican Hijacked, Reports to Police At Ranger State

Steve Guyadio, Mexican, 38, was lodged in the Ranger city jail Tuesday night on a complaint by Julio Garcia, section hand for the Texas & Pacific railway, stationed at Wiles.

Garcia told officers, through an interpreter, that Guyadio had pretended to be drunk and when Garcia attempted to aid him he was struck over the head and robbed of a gold watch, some money and a registered letter.

FOUR TEXAS BOYS THOUGHT RIDE VICTIMS

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 21. City and county officials today were searching for four Texas youths believed "taken for a ride" by local gangsters, angered because the youths raided slot machines by tampering with their mechanism.

The youths stopped here several days ago driving a car bearing a Texas license. They played dime slot machines, which paid off with amazing regularity.

One roadhouse operator said the four entered his place, two playing the slot machines, while the other two tampered with the mechanism. They were arrested and placed in jail.

Two men who represented themselves as being representatives of the slot machine manufacturers, called at the police station and introduced themselves, saying they did not want to press charges against the four. The youths drove off with them in their car and no trace has been found of them.

The machine, which bore Texas license number 218,384, issued to the Ponder Motor company of Fort Worth, was found at a tourist camp, hammered and destroyed.

Wallace Opposes 12c Cotton Loan

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace today cautioned AAA Administrator Chester Davis by telegram against any "gift loan" on the 1935 cotton crop.

The telegram was taken to indicate Wallace was opposed to announcement of a 12-cent loan on cotton while prices are around 11 cents, as at present.

Cotton interests including a number of senators and representatives, have brought pressure to bear on the administration seeking continuance of the 12-cent loan established for the 1934 crop.

Revival at Morton Valley Postponed

Because repairs are being made to the electrical system at the Morton Valley high school, the revival meeting scheduled to start at the school Monday night was postponed until next Sunday, announcements today stated.

Sunday school will be conducted at 10 o'clock, preaching at 11 o'clock and the meeting will be continued through all next week.

Rev. Hill will conduct the services all next week, and a cordial invitation has been extended to the public to attend the meetings. Especially are the residents of Morton Valley and the surrounding community invited to attend.

Indian Troops to Go to Ethiopia

SIMLA, India, Aug. 21.—A detachment of the Fifth Battalion, Fourteenth Punjab Regiment, of the British-Indian army, was under orders today to proceed to Bombay, there to embark for Ethiopia.

The troops will be used to reinforce the British legion guard at Addis Ababa. The legion there has been guarded by British-Indian troops for years.

MEASURE TO KEEP NATION OUT OF WAR

Passed By Senate and Now
Goes To House For
Action.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—The senate today approved legislation designed to keep the United States out of a possible foreign war. There was no record vote on the neutrality resolution.

The legislation was put through after less than half an hour of consideration and it now goes to the house where it was said the administration was anxious for its passage, indicating it would be put through soon.

The neutrality resolution pressed to the front as the European war crisis developed, was a compromise from a series of neutrality resolutions introduced in the senate.

While not meeting all the demands of the members of the committee, they refrained from attempting to attach amendments to it so that it would be speedily adopted.

Senator J. Hamilton Lewis, Democrat, Illinois, foe of the resolution, offered a substitute measure but did not press it.

Senator William Borah, Republican, Idaho, refrained from offering a measure to tighten provision to forbid Americans to travel, even on their own risk, in belligerent ships.

The legislation forbids arms shipments, restricted travel of American citizens on belligerent ships, licenses arms manufacturer.

The comeback of the automobile business is one of the most encouraging signs of the times. Millions of cars, counting pleasure cars and trucks, have been placed on the market this year. Vast army of trained workers has been given employment at high wages. Now the General Motors corporation has announced that it has begun a \$50,000,000 program of plant modernization in the United States, England, Germany and Canada. There must be a vast deal of money in circulation in America. All the American world appears to be on wheels again. Men who have money to buy gas and oil are not on the relief rolls. If they are on the relief rolls, they use the relief money for gas and not for the food. Maybe, General Charles G. Dawes was a true prophet. Away last fall he predicted a tremendous business revival in the late summer and fall of 1935.

Old Age Pensions Opposed By West Texas Chamber

Ray Nichols is president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce covers a vast territory and is a very powerful organization. It has hundreds of members who represent hundreds of large and small towns. Nichols visited Mineal Wells. He was interviewed by the press. He declared his organization "is opposed to the proposed old age amendment to the Texas constitution which will be voted Aug. 24.

There are crippled children, hundreds the state over, who appeal to the voters for straightened limbs waifs of society who should not be overlooked by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce or any other great commercial organization.

American Eagles to Support Child Labor Amendments

Delegates to the 37th annual convention of the Order of American Eagles in session in the city of Dayton adopted a unanimous resolution pledging continued support of the order's campaign against child labor. There is a constitutional amendment pending in the legislatures of many states. And its backers in all the states are hopeful of winning the requisite number of state ratifications the coming winter in order to make success possible. They have won many victories in recent years. They need 10 additional votes by states. They lost in New York and Texas in 1935 although the President and Governor Lehman battled for ratification at Albany and many of the New Deal strongest supporters, including the governor, championed the cause of ratification in Texas. Now the battle is on again, and unless the signs of the times are misleading, regardless of Herbert Hoover, the federal constitution may carry another addition before the coming of 1940.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 21.—Three thousand persons who formed an unbroken line before a funeral chapel here today, paid their respects to Wiley Post.

The crowd gathered at the chapel before sunrise to honor the famed aviator who died in a crash near Point Barrow, Alaska, with Will Rogers.

For three hours the line passed silently by the bier. At the request of two aviator friends the procession was stopped two hours before the body was taken to Maysville for rites at his former home.

Lloyds Refusing Bets On a War

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Lloyds are refusing to accept any bets against an Italian-Ethiopian war, inquirers were told today.

Condemned Man His Own Executioner

REVAL, Esthonia, Aug. 21.—Paul Voigenmast, condemned murderer, stoically lifted a "hemlock cup" of deadly poison to his lips today and fell dead, his own official executioner on behalf of the state.

It was the first legal self-execution in modern history, under Esthonia's new law giving the condemned the choice of hanging or killing himself with poison.

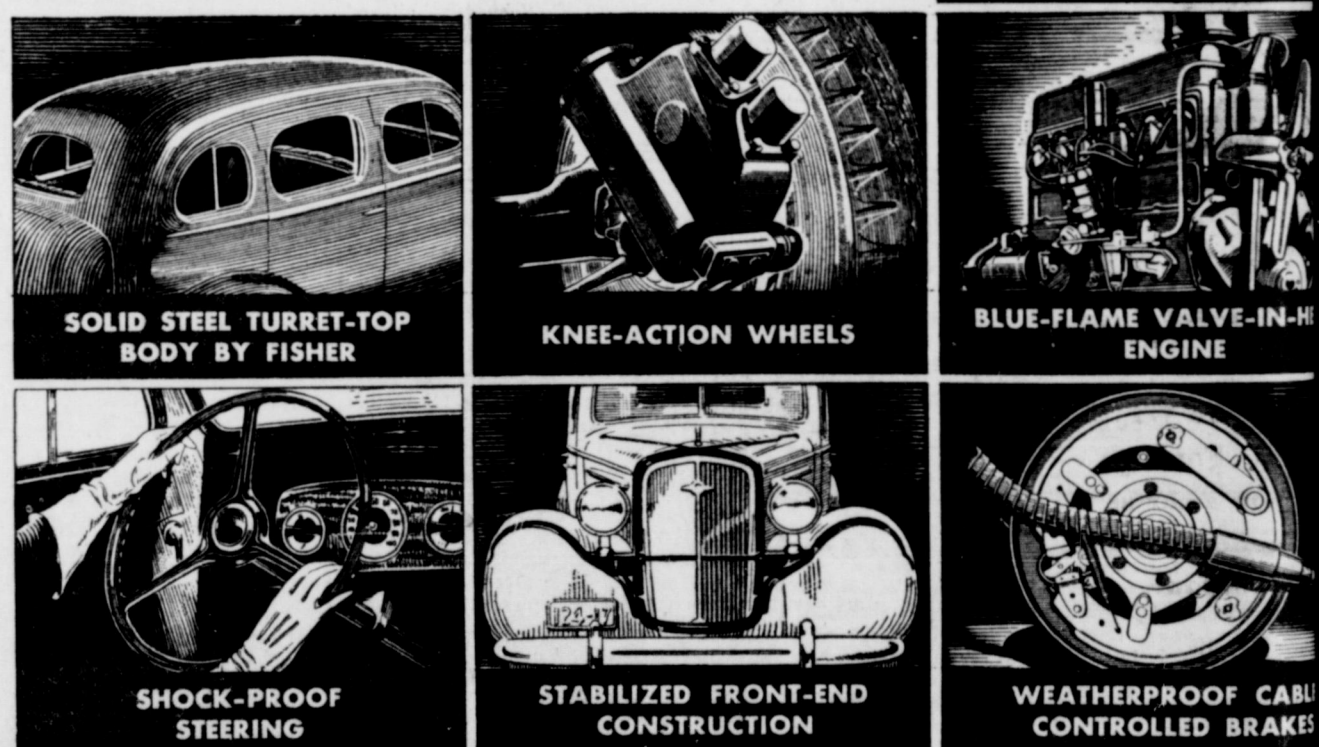

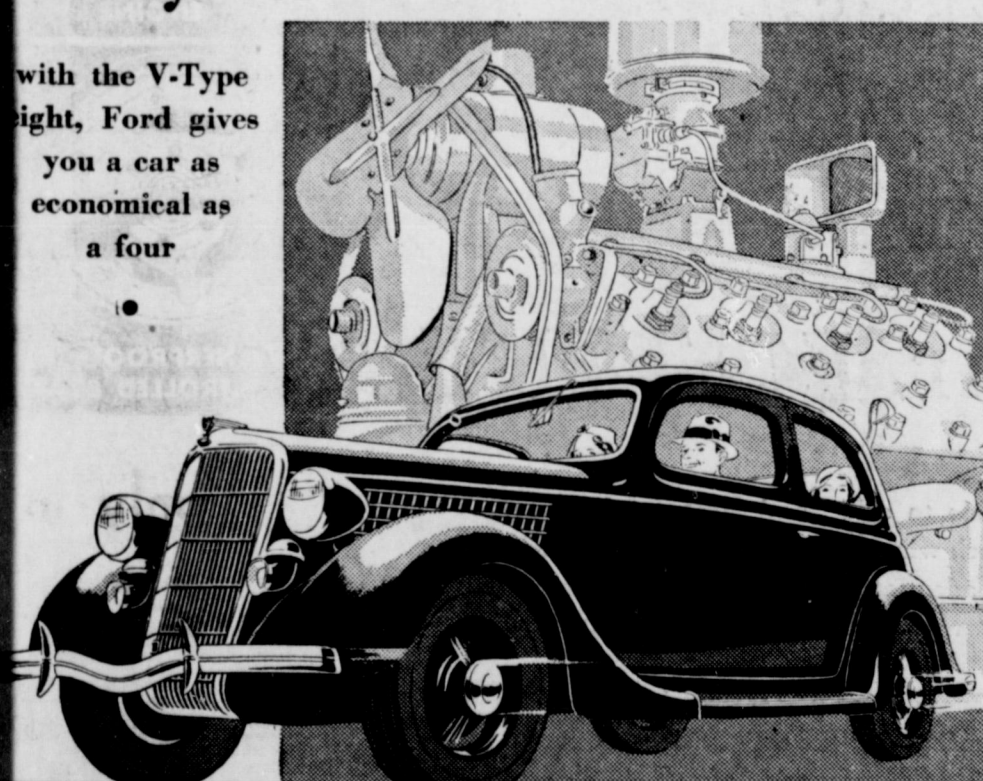

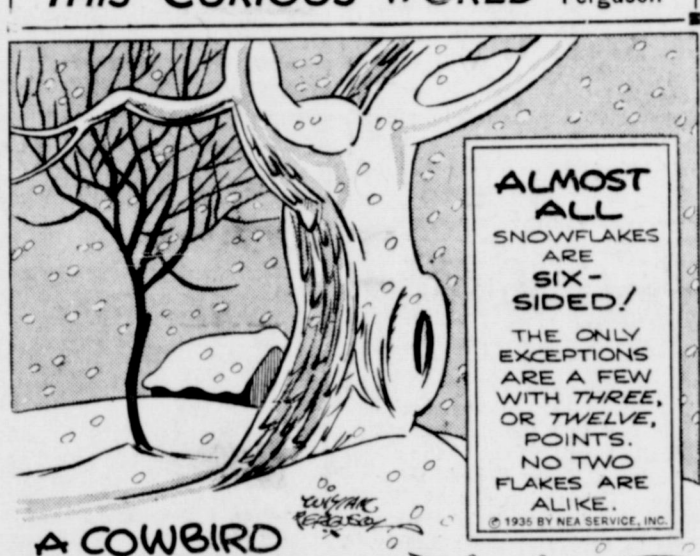

CAKE LURES DEER TO DEATH

HARTFORD, Conn.—A wedding cake lured a young brown doe to its death. Roaming the deserted streets at night, the animal spied the cake in a pastry shop window and leaped through the plate glass. The doe bled to death from a cut.

ON TEXAS FARMS

There are plenty of summer-time jobs in the yard besides lawn mowing—even if the main planting season is earlier or later, according to Miss Onah Jacks, extension landscape specialist.

Underpinning the house is one of them. She reports that it is being done by yard demonstrators with various types of locally available material. Native rocks in West Texas; native pine in East Texas; dry woods boxes are good in any place, too.

Identifying, studying, marking and trenching native shrubs for later transplanting into yards is a natural summer picnic job.

Equipping outdoor living rooms is a job to do now while the need to use them is felt more fully than at any other season. Tables, benches, fireplaces, swings, saws, arbor, sandpiles, pools and trellises all have found use in yard demonstrators' outdoor living rooms.

Preparing for fall planting is another summer-time yard job commended by Miss Jacks. Planting peas to turn under, she recommends as a good way to get the ground in shape.

FRADY—Planting soy beans in every third row of cotton saved part of his cotton crop for Grover T. Gattis, McCulloch county farmer, according to J. D. Prewitt, county agricultural agent.

Thirty acres, of which every row was planted to cotton, has been completely destroyed by cut worms and grasshoppers.

The 16 acres of cotton that he interplanted with soy beans came up in good condition. The cut worms and grasshoppers fed entirely on the soy beans and did not touch the cotton. Gattis says that the soy beans are growing again now and that he expects to make a good crop out of them.

COTULLA—The past three years have proved the advantages of diversified farming, according to John Nagy, county agricultural agent from LaSalle county.

"Before this time," he said, "the farmers of this county depended on corn and cotton as their cash crops."

One farmer in this county changed his method of farming from planting corn together to diversifying with other crops for feed and cash. On his farm of 400 acres in cultivation he has 60 acres in corn as roasting ears, averaging \$15.60 per acre; he gathered more

than one-third of his corn crop as dry corn.

He sold 93,000 pounds of pop corn for \$2,325. He has 60 acres of cotton on which he will harvest one-fourth of a bale per acre. He also has 100 acres of different kinds of grain sorghums, some of which will harvest three cuttings of feed. With this feed he will fatten his hogs and calves that he has raised, saving enough feed for his work stock.

On 80 acres, he has planted peas, picked them green and sold them at a profit. He then plowed under the pea vines and is keeping this piece of land in readiness for a fall crop of spinach and onions.

OLTON—One farm woman in Lamb county says that she always stores her sweet potatoes in the cellar in dry sand and that they keep all winter. The sand keeps the sweet potatoes warm and dry.

SULPHUR SPRINGS—Forty cents spent for Irish potato seed, 10 cents spent for poison and one-half day of labor produced 13 bushels of potatoes, according to Mrs. A. A. Strasser, farm food supply demonstrator of the Brinker Home Demonstration club of Hopkins county.

WAXAHACHIE—Telephone wire was used to replace all the broken wires of some bed springs of Mrs. A. H. Greenhaw of Ellis county.

She says her son just placed the old bed springs where the original wire was with some wire on hand.

CONROE—A portable pantry was built for Mrs. R. H. Smith of Montgomery county for \$12.80.

The pantry is built of 12-inch boards. It is six feet high and six feet long and the shelves are two feet wide. The shelves were built 10 inches apart in order to fit tin containers or quart jars. A wider space was left at the bottom for storing larger containers.

A brace was put through the middle to support the shelves and to keep them from swaying. There is a full length screen door on each side of the brace.

"Having doors on each side makes it more convenient to get the cans out," she said.

The \$12.80 was spent to purchase new lumber, screen wire, nails, door fasteners and paint.

Government Soon Will Get Out of Relief Business

AUSTIN, Tex.—Re-emphasizing the fact that the government eventually is getting out of the relief business, Texas Relief Commission officials have sent instruction to district administration offices to analyze more minutely than ever each relief client's private resources before giving him aid, making certain that his last possible private source of sustenance has been exhausted before he is allowed aid from the dwindling relief funds.

If a relief applicant has enough partially to live on, then the government can supply him with only supplementary aid to meet his basic requirements, but first however every available resource must be carefully taken into account, including possible aid from relatives.

"Family responsibility should be strengthened during these times of readjustment," Relief Commission officials emphasize, urging that families able to assist destitute relatives recognize their obligations.

General "dig in" advice has been issued to relief clients. Pointing out that present federal funds have been narrowly limited and that no more appropriations are likely, relief officials urge the necessity of conserving every cent possible in order to stretch the present funds until the Works Progress Administration gets fully under way. They have told district administration officials, particularly case supervisors and case workers, to investigate thoroughly the client's ability to support himself at least partially through his own resources.

"By resources," officials say, "we include such items as garden products, milk from the family's cow, help from relatives, aid from churches and other sources, savings accounts, insurance loans, odd jobs, income of children, etc."

Another step toward weeding out the relief rolls was taken when the Board of Control ruled that tenant farmers who are actually growing a crop or have already harvested one this year are not eligible for relief. Assistant State Relief Director J. T. Duke, has instructed district administrators to rule out all such applicants, pointing out that the responsibility for sustenance is with them and their landlords.

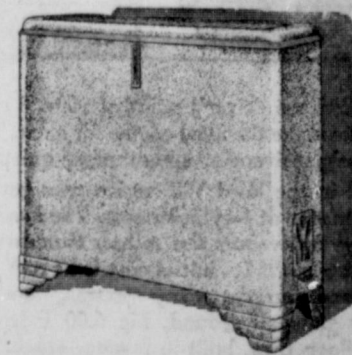
