Smith, accompanied by his parents, gave himself up to the sheriff at 7:20 p. m. Tuesday and gave information that Kenneth was hiding in a barn about 2 miles from the scene of the murder. A posse of 12 officers surrounded the barn and the surrendered successfully. County officers followed the trail of the slayers with blood hounds during the day, threw a dragnet around the county and were preparing for an all-night search when Smith surrendered and told of Kenneth Bridges' hiding place. The elder Bridges had been in the barn several hours before shortly after the body was found.

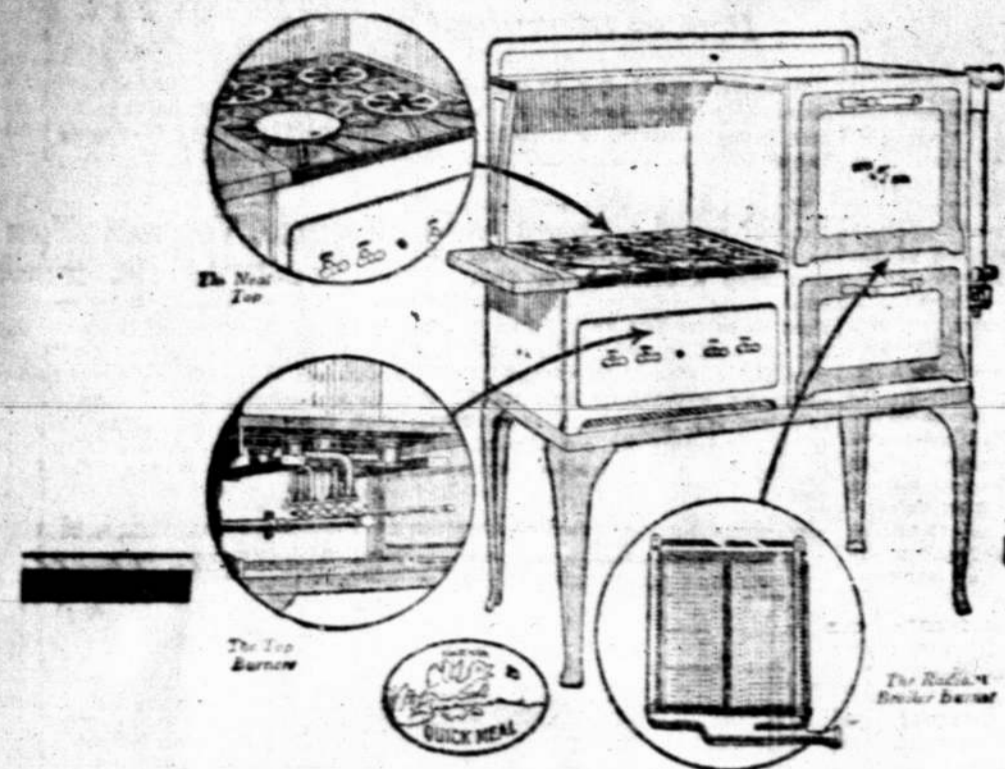

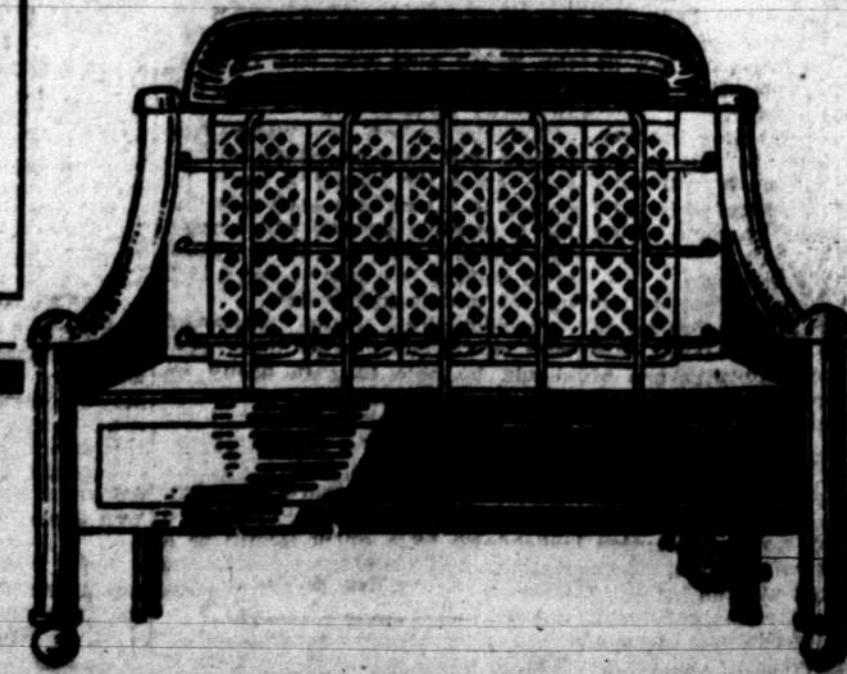

SCIENCE LINKS FIFTH VITAMIN IN DAIRY SIRES

ELEMENT IS FOUND IN SPROUTED OATS BUT TESTS INCOMPLETE

LABOR FAVORS BEER AND RAPS COURT CLAUSE

WOULD DEPRIVE COURT OF INJUNCTIONS ON LABOR BODIES

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12—The American Federation of Labor's thunderous cry for "wholesome beer" and its demand that courts be deprived of some of their power to use the injunction against unions remained the liveliest issues before its annual convention here today. A resolution favoring modification of the Volstead act to permit the sale and manufacture of "wholesome beer," defined as containing 2.5 percent alcohol, brought a thunder of "ayes" from delegates late yesterday. There was a scattering of "nays" when the question was put, but the affirmative was overwhelming.

Prolonged Applause Prolonged applause followed the voting and President William Green expressed the wish that labor men would vote as loud and as strong on other resolutions.
