CLUB WINNERS ARE SELECTED

FOUR GIRLS GET TRIP TO STATE FAIR FOR PRIZE WORK

Lubbock county 4-H club girls now are busy getting ready for the State Fair at Dallas and, following competitive exhibitions at the Panhandle-South Plains fair here, four have been chosen to make the trip to Dallas. These four girls will have their expenses paid by the local fair association for having the best individual exhibits here. They include Ina Dee Moores, Carlisle; Laura Barton, Grovesville; Lorena Stewart, Acuff; and Faustina Woodruff, Hardy.

Each year four girls from Lubbock county are offered free trips to the State Fair. Exhibits of the girls were sent to Dallas Saturday by Miss Louise Baird, county home demonstration agent, and are being installed in the woman's building to there for display October 22 to 24. The displays will be competitive with those of girls from other sections of the state.

Poultry Emphasized
Ina Dee Moores, first year girl from Carlisle, had a good lead over the next high girl at the Panhandle-South Plains fair. She has poultry for a productive project and has realized \$14.50 clear profit from it. She has canned \$9.55 worth of canned goods, both for exhibit and home use. Her clothing work is valued at \$7 and the total financial value of her club work is \$31.05. The young lady states that the principles learned in her poultry work this year are well worth the efforts that have been put forth.

Laura Barton, second year girl from Grovesville, was winner by a slight margin over two other girls. She has made \$94.54 on her club work this year. She has made clothing articles which are not included in this figure. Her poultry netted \$38.50, food preservation counted to \$37.20, home improvement \$10.75 and clothing \$8. She won two first prizes with clothing articles and other work done by the young lady measures equally as well. She recently won first place in the county bedroom contest in which there were 49 rooms scored. Miss Baird is of the opinion that the young lady has every chance to win the \$300 scholarship if her next two years work measure up to the first.

Improves in All Phases
Lorena Stewart, third year girl from the Acuff club, has made notable improvement in every phase of her work this year. Not being able to keep an accurate record of everything grown in her garden, the financial showing is not so good in productive work. Besides what was consumed in her home, \$17.50 worth of vegetables have been canned. "Nothing was wasted," stated the young lady. Clothing work amounted to \$6.50 and her home improvement linen was \$2.

Faustina Woodruff, fourth year girl of the Hardy club, and her instructor states that very little has

been done in that club in which the young lady has not had a part in. This year will be her second trip to the Dallas Fair in addition to winning a trip to Farmers' Short Course at College Station in 1927 on poultry judging work. Here she won the state championship with her partner. The young lady has been in team demonstrations from her club, has won local bedroom contests, won honor in clothing work two years in succession and even joined the boys club and raised maize this year. The young farm girl tries out for everything and does her best. President of her club for three years, she has been an able leader. The record book this year shows a profit of \$376.05 on poultry work alone. Miss Woodruff is competing for the \$300 home demonstration club scholarship which is good for use in any state school.

Fair Grounds Being Cleaned Up Today

Clean up work is now going forward at the Panhandle-South Plains fair grounds, following the annual exposition which closed in this city Saturday night. The fair grounds, all last week scene of thousands of pleasure seekers, to there is deserted while debris and remains of exhibits lie in a tornado-struck community.

Officials of the fair association this morning expressed themselves as highly satisfied with this year's exposition and enthusiastic for the future of the organization.

A complete and detailed report of the funds will be made up within the next ten days. No estimate could be given today as to the amount of money taken in through the turnstiles. Officials are anxious that all outstanding bills against the association be turned in at once so that work of auditing may go forward.

PLAINS TOWNS BURGLARIZED

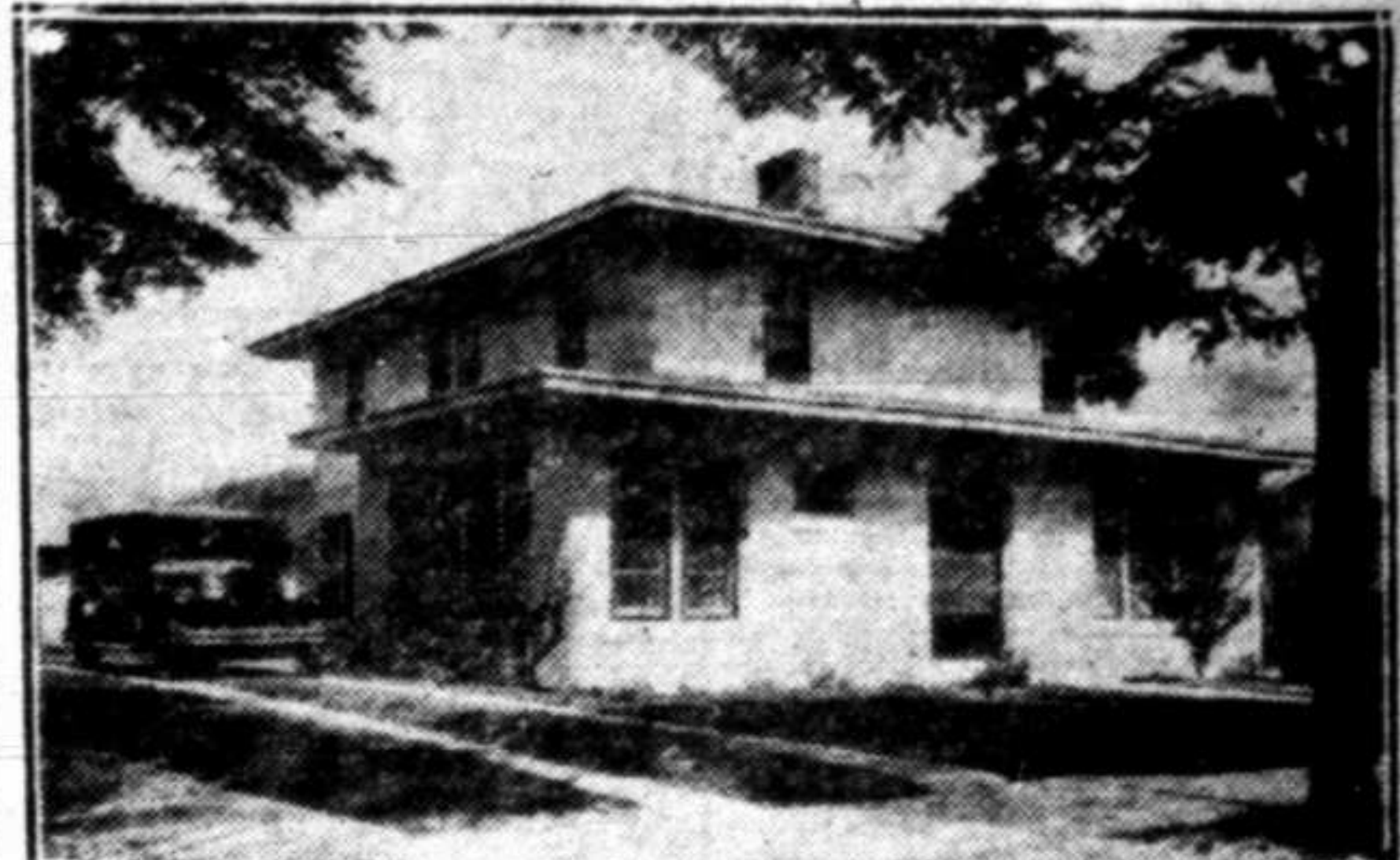
BUSINESSES VISITED IN ROBBERIES IN FIVE PLACES

FLOYDADA, Oct. 7.—Filling stations, garages, and business establishments in towns on the South Plains continue to be the victims of burglars and this week Floydada suffered its fifth loss from this source. Previous to the robbery of the Floydada Drug company here on Tuesday night there had been three fillings stations and a garage looted several weeks before. About the same time losses were sustained by firms at Roaring Springs, Crosbyton, Petersburg and Littlefield.

Watches to the value of approximately \$150 were stolen from the Floydada Drug company last week. An attempt to open a safe proved unfruitful and the burglars left quietly, leaving no clues for the officers to work on. Evidence showed that the robbers entered through a skylight in the rear of the building and left the same way.

At each of the places in the different towns looted by the burglars only cheap tools are used in opening safes and cash registers. A crow bar, a sledge hammer and a cold chisel or two seems to be the only tools the marks on the safes indicate. Officers have failed to report any arrests made in any of the towns.

THE LIFE STORY OF DR. ECKENER

CHAPTER XIV

It is now interesting to turn from the business of arranging for the financing of far-flung shipping lines, and Dr. Eckener, the scholar-pilot of the first dirigible to circumnavigate the globe, to Hugo Eckener, the boy of some 40 or 45 years ago. For by turning back to the boy, we may better understand the genius of the man—the air pilot who learned to ride the storms.

On the Bay of Pinesburg young Hugo Eckener learned to sail. He showed more of a natural aptitude for the sea than for the air. He became the weather-vane of the sailing community, and now we come to Dr. Eckener, the pilot, first on the ZR-3, then the Atlantic in 1924, and the Graf Zeppelin, crossing the Pacific on the world cruise.

Dr. Eckener was preparing to leave Friedrichshafen with the Graf Zeppelin when he was asked what routes he would take.

He decided that when we get to start, he replied. "No two ways will follow the same route. We will select the one that promises the best weather. We may sail as far north as Newfoundland, or as far south as the equator. Or we may start on one and change to the other before we get there."

His words were prophetic. Half way out, 12 hours' sail beyond the equator, he found from ship and land reports radioed to him that a great storm was swinging up from the Gulf of Mexico.

Storms are not arbitrary things arising from nowhere, bound nowhere. They follow certain natural laws. The air is warmed or cooled by the contact with the earth. Cool air is heavy and pushes the lighter, warmer air aside. Because the earth's surface is of various temperatures at various points, the air is constantly in motion. The movement of the earth tends to set the air currents turning in great concentric circles. High pressure areas or "highs" mean generally fair weather, low pressure areas or "lows" bring storms. The storm areas, sometimes 500 miles across, revolve around the world, from west to east, lagging behind the world's rotation, and in the northern hemisphere, in a counter clockwise direction.

The storm, reported to the ZR-3 moving north-easterly across the Atlantic, was due ahead. If the ship continued on its course, it would presently encounter the south end of it head on.

Dr. Eckener studied his charts and made his decision. "Change the course 90 degrees," he said. "We'll head for Newfoundland."

From New York from central Europe by way of the Azores and the Azores would strike the laymen as curious navigation. But when the wind was as a boy, when this one struck the new American ship, he met it on the north, not the south side of it.

Since the great circle of the storm was turning in the opposite direction to the hands of the clock, the top of the storm was moving toward him, not against him.

Checking his motors and giving them a chance to rest he drove the ship toward Newfoundland and New England coast at 100 miles an hour. He had ridden the storm—put it to work for him. . . .

Also on the first return trip of the Graf Zeppelin from Lakehurst, Germany, in 1928, Dr. Eckener utilized the storm, although took him somewhat off his guard. New York had given him a reception and inland cities were urging visits by the big ship. The commander was anxious to get off.

He headed back over the north Atlantic, taking the Lindbergh route, the great circle course. Twenty passengers and one stowaway aboard.

Heading up the New England coast toward Newfoundland, Dr. Eckener was in good spirits. Cape Cod, outermost part of Newfoundland, reported clear weather with a light west wind. The passengers stayed up until near morning to watch the ship pass over New York and Montauk Point had taken to bed after breakfast, and risen to eat chicken, vegetables, salad, very cold with champagne on the lunch table and a second helping for the asking.

In the afternoon the sky became overcast, white caps appeared, fog in the ship hit a series of bumps. It entered into fog 10 degrees warmer. Eckener flew, being through the fog until evening. Their proposed route was to pass Cape Race at 100 miles offshore. It was no small surprise to the navigating officers then when Commander M. R. Pierce, American observer, picked up the lights of Trepassy Bay. . . .

Now the speed of an airship is always plus or minus the speed of the wind. In this case, the wind had been blowing a terrific gale without any of the passengers dreaming of so smoothly had the ship moved.

To the 60 mile an hour speed of the motors had been added perhaps another 60 by the vicious southwest gale. Instead of missing Newfoundland by 100 miles, as they feared, they were over in a few miles after Pierce discovered the lights, due to the amazing speed of the ship as it rode the storm.

Now the passengers knew they were in a gale. At times the ship was so strong that the ship motionless. It swung forward like a log.

The Graf's motors were very powerful. Storms in time play themselves out. In a few hours they had cleared the Newfoundland coast and by noon the next day the ship had some 500 miles and they found themselves in mid-ocean.

Dr. Eckener's presence on the ship is never merely formal. He is the actual commander of operations. No one could drag him from his great chair in the control car when difficulties are ahead. He takes his rest only when things are quiet. He had had but eight hours sleep out of 112 on the Graf Zeppelin flight to America; had even less on the way back.

Again, on the round the world flight, one of the first reports received from Japan as Siberia was crossed, told of a typhoon ahead. It held no terror for Eckener. It was merely his old "low" magnified by the meteorology of the Orient. Like the storm areas of the mid-Atlantic, a typhoon swings in concentric circles. Dr. Eckener and the Graf took out after the typhoon. They caught the tail of it and swung down the coast at 100 miles an hour, landing at Tokyo before they were expected. There the Graf found harbor in a hanger, which by the irony of fate had been built by Eckener in Germany and awarded to the Japanese to be re-erected on the other side of the world.

The accident which denied a power car at Tokyo, causing a day's delay in the start across the Pacific to Los Angeles, gave Dr. Eckener the opportunity to seize the tail of another typhoon which was passing up the Japanese coast, and hurried the steps of the speeding Graf. For 40 hours the former amateur sailor drove his ship by blind reckoning, only on three occasions getting sight of the stars to check his calculations. Finally, not a great distance from the California coast, a Japanese steamer was sighted. He hailed it by wireless, asked his position, checked it with the navigators.

"Not bad," he smiled. "We are but thirty miles off."

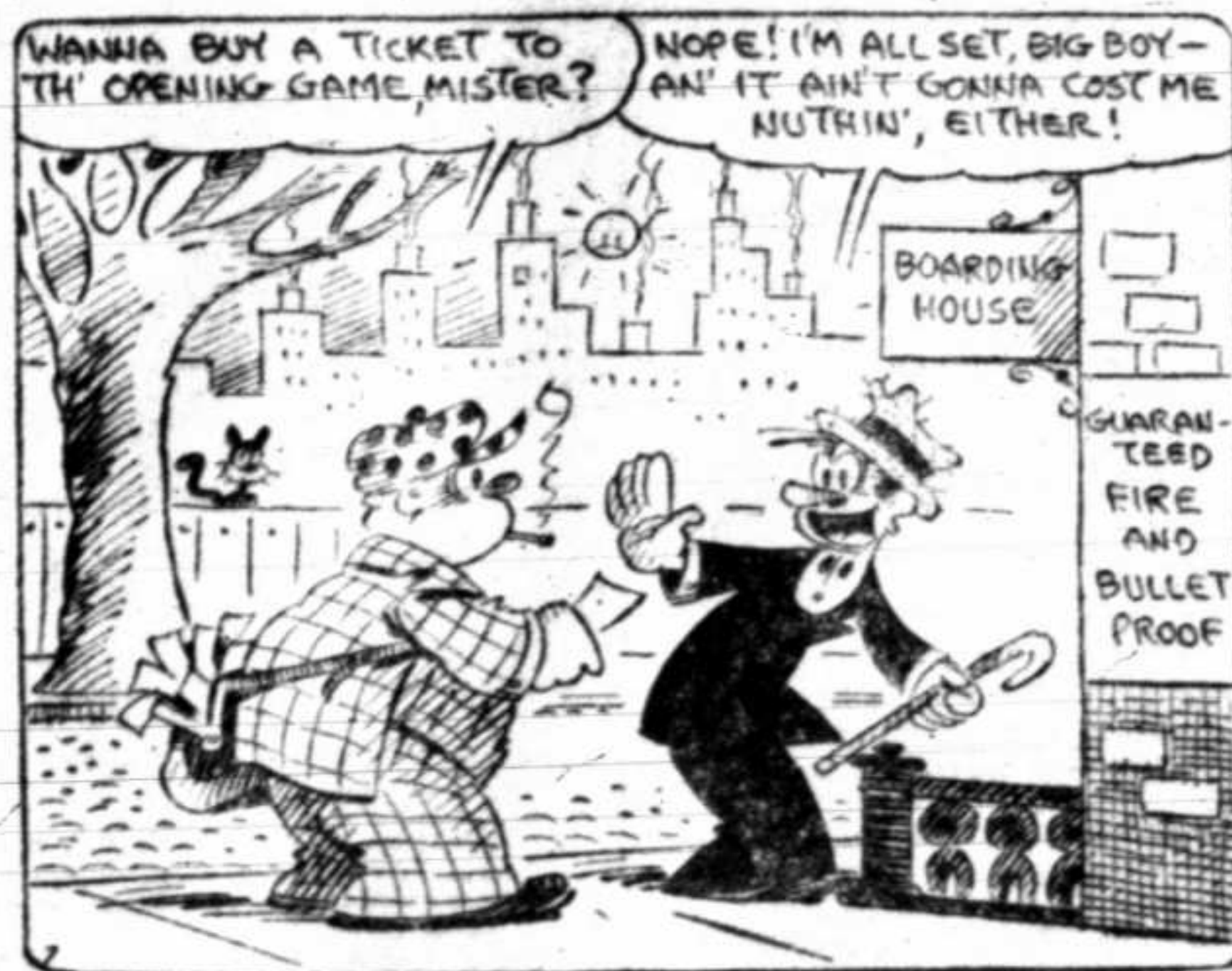

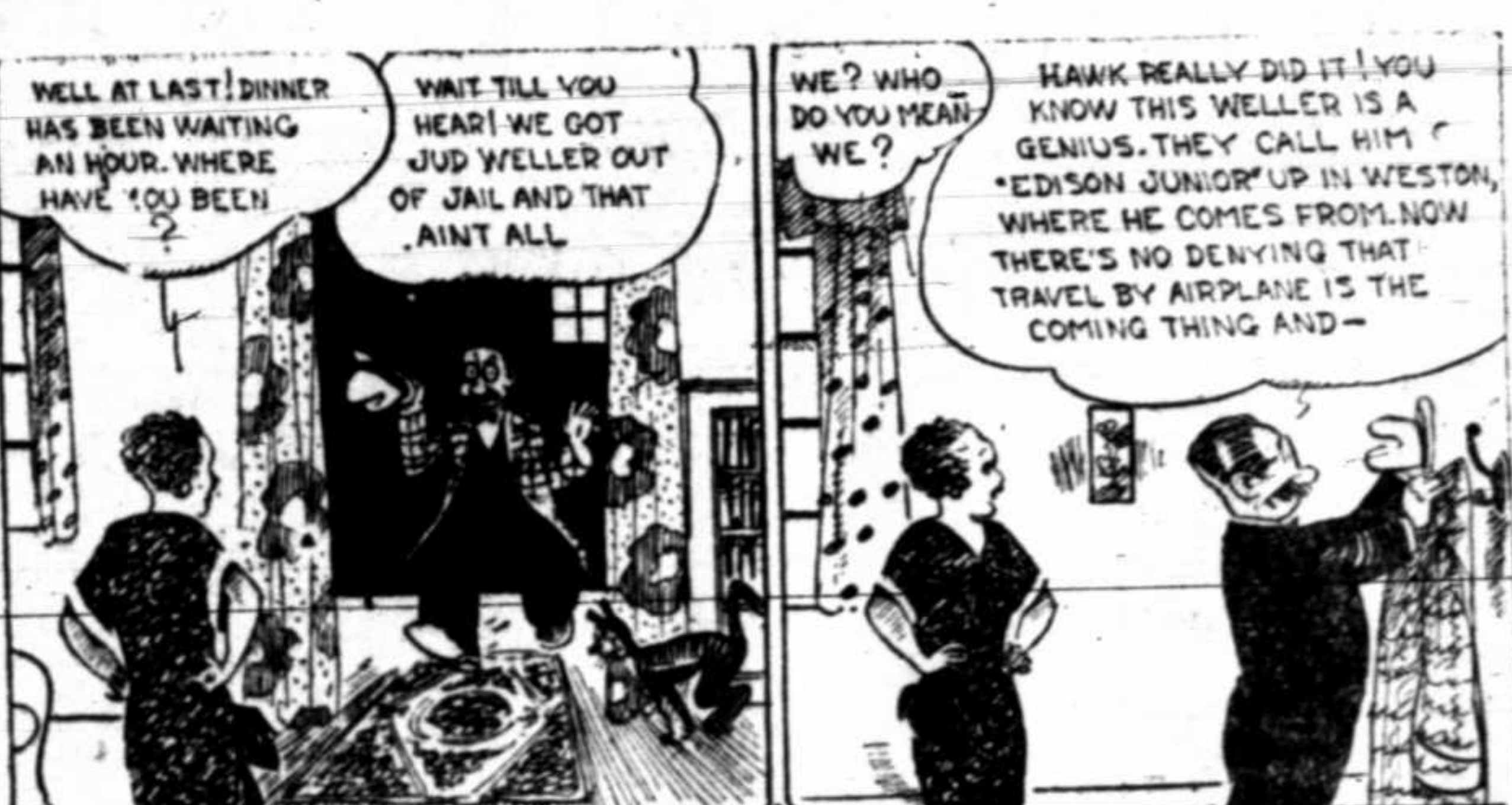

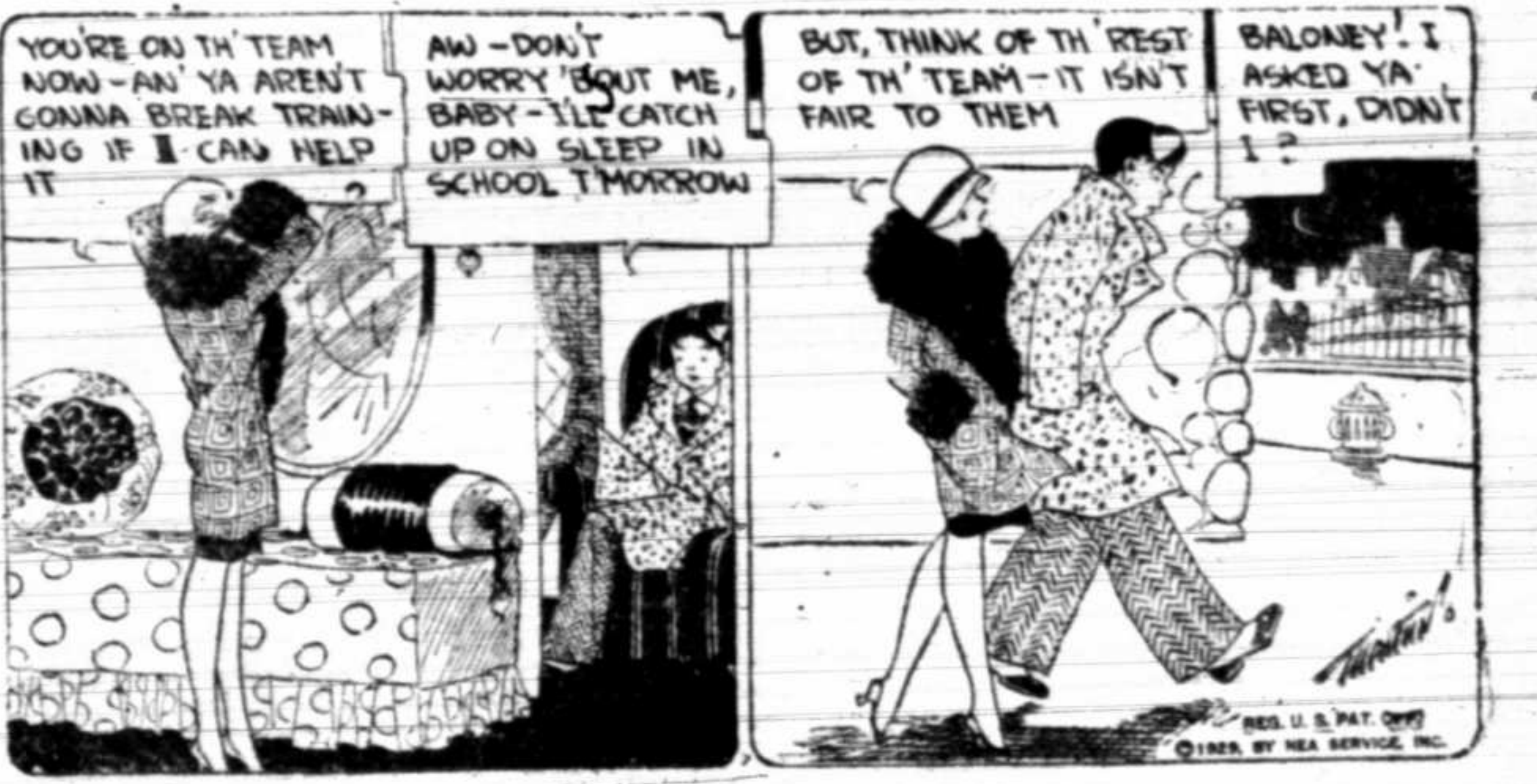

The compress has compressed 3,593 bales this season. Since June 1st, 7,562 bales of cotton had been received at the local compress.

TERRY COUNTY 4-H CLUB BOY MAKES \$55.39 FROM CLUB PIG IN 4 MONTHS

A nine-year-old Terry county 4-H club boy, Boyce Verner, realized a profit of \$55.39 from a club pig in four months time, with the sale here Saturday to the McDonald Packing company of a 332.4 pound barrow.

The price paid by the McDonald Packing company was \$12.50 per 100 pounds, which was \$3.75 per 100 pounds over the top price offered on the Lubbock market, \$2.75 per 100 over the Fort Worth market and \$2.00 over the Chicago market.

The barrow was exhibited at the Panhandle South Plains fair, winning the champion club fat barrow, and with the premium won here and at the Terry county fair netted the Verner boy \$37.50 for premiums.

The pig was put on feed on June 1, at the age of two months, at that time weighing 45 pounds. At the time it was sold, the pig weighed 332.5 pounds, making a gain of 287.5 pounds in the 125 days time.

Food consumed by the pig while the Verner boy had it consisted of 103 pounds of 33 per cent protein supplement, obtained from a commercial feed house, and 710 pounds of home grown milo, crushed. Total value of feed was \$16.17, which, added to the \$7.50 paid for the pig originally, made the total cost of the pig \$23.67, with \$41.56 purchase price and \$37.50 premiums totaling \$79.06 received for it, or a profit of \$55.39.

Revival Closes At Slaton Sunday Night

SLATON, Oct. 7 (Special).—A two weeks revival campaign at the First Baptist church here was closed Sunday night. Dr. W. R. White, pastor of the First Baptist church, Lubbock, was the speaker. Thirty five new members were added to the church during the two weeks, according to Rev. B. G. Holloway, pastor.

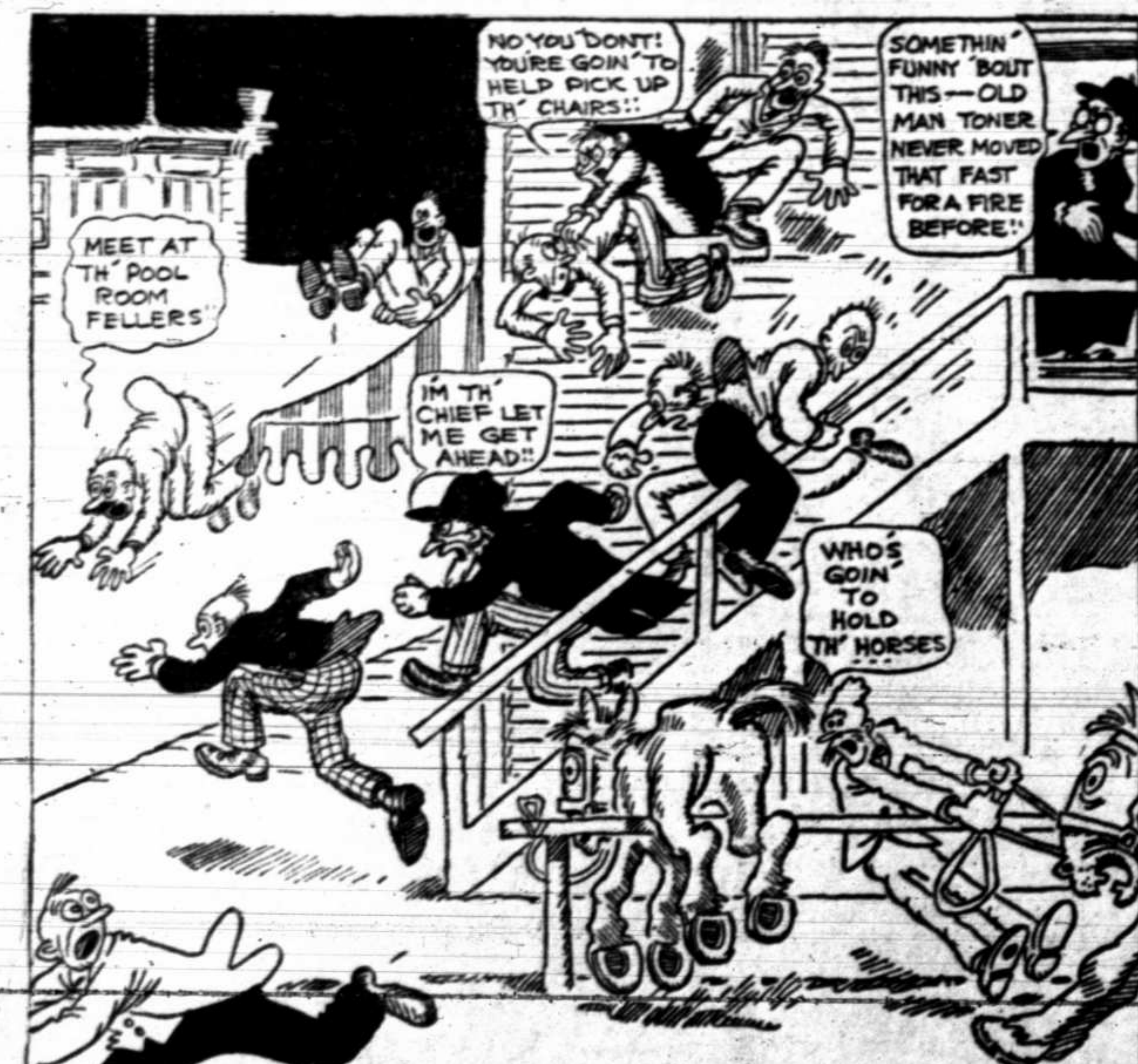
