Lion Governor Visits Local Club

Lion Club Royalty was in town last Wednesday as District Governor Bob Levo of Brownfield made his official visit to the local Lions Club.

Governor Levo was introduced by District Governor Bill Chancy. Levo made several announcements to the club including the fact that Tahoka is leading in the District Contest through October.

Convention and Conference dates were announced. The Mid-Winter Conference will be held in Brownfield January 15 and 16th, with Dr. Schmidt of Georgia, an International Director, being the keynote speaker. The 2T-2 District Convention will be held in Lamesa on April 14 and 15th.

Governor Levo recognized the Tahoka club as one of the top clubs in the District and urged the club to stay busy in all activities. He cited the fact that Tahoka's original Lion Club had folded and the town was definitely ready for

an active club.

Lion Bill Griffin announced that Food and Fiber Week is the week of November 15 and that next weeks program would be Don Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers.

Lion Harry Short announced that three young ladies from Girls Town at Whiteface would bring the program on November 24th. November 24th will also be the annual Bosses Day Meeting.

The First National Bank will open for business next Monday morning in its new, modern bank building located on the block formerly occupied by Cicero Smith Lumber Company.

An open house, however, will not be held until a week from this Sunday, November 28, from 2 until 5 p.m., when all people of the area will be invited to inspect the complete plant.

At the same time, Southwestern Public Service Company will be open for inspection by visitors at its new quarters adjoining the bank on the south. SWPS moved to its new quarters last week.

Workmen are busy this week putting finishing touches to the building, installing new equipment, landscaping the grounds and moving many of the records from the present bank building.

The building is of contemporary Spanish style architecture, exterior finish of exposed marble aggregate. Interior design features pastel colors, most modern furnishings, and abundance of room for customers and bank officers and employees.

The building contains about 8,000 square feet of floor space, plus a 2,000 square foot basement, and 1,500 square feet office space in the adjoining building for SWPS. Also, there is a community room of about 900 square feet which will seat about 75 people. Court yards enhance the beauty of the building.

F. B. (Pete) Hegt, bank president, has been with the institution a little more than 41 years. Active vice presidents include Garland Thornton and Warren Embree. Dr. C. M. Phillips, who bought majority stock along with his son-in-law, Jim Moore, in 1966 from Mrs. W. B. Slaton, is chairman of the board.

W. T. Kidwell and Bryan Wright were recently added to the board of directors. Other directors include A. C. Verner and W. H. Eudy in addition to Phillips, Moore, Hegt, Thornton and Embree.

8 Accidents In Lynn County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of October, according to Sergeant H. E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 0 persons killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1971 shows a total of 64 accidents resulting in one person killed and 64 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1971, shows a total of 595 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 294 persons injured. This was 96 more accidents, 14 less fatalities, and 26 more injured than during September.

The 19 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Carson, four; Kent, Lubbock, Wise, Roberts, and Wheeler, two each; Crosby, Hale, Parker, Stonewall, and Hemphill, one each.

Indians View Local Farming

Three soil conservation specialists from India were here Monday inspecting local farming methods in company with Allen Sheppard, conservationist of the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District.

They were V. C. Katti, deputy director of agriculture, of the state of Mysore, India; M. A. Masheer, divisional soil conservation officer, Andhra Pradesh state; and S. K. Sandhwan, assistant soil conservation officer, Haryana state. The latter state is in the north of India and the first two in southern India.

The men have been in the States since August 26, and will return home Dec. 24. They had briefings in Washington, D. C., and have spent four weeks each in El Paso and Big Spring, currently are

in Brownfield, and will next go to Canton, Ohio.

They were sent here by their state governments in a current program to update and modernize Indian agriculture.

At the Welch Flippin farm they inspected parallel terracing done now, on the Jiggs Swann farm they inspected surface irrigation practices, and more briefly inspected other Lynn projects.

The men claim India is undergoing vast and rapid change under its democratic form of government and is rapidly wiping out poverty.

Under the old caste system, the country had 560 states mostly owned and dominated by princes and small dictators. Under the reformed government, there are now 30 states, there is opportunity for all to earn a living, and

the country is becoming able to feed and clothe its own.

Most individual farmers till seven to 80 acres of land. At least seven acres of irrigated land are required to sustain a family, and it is possible for a family to live on 15 to 20 acres of fertile dryland. Irrigation from streams and wells is extensive.

Just about every crop grown in the U. S. is grown there, including wheat, rice, cotton, sugar cane, peanuts, corn, maize, millets, oil seeds, vegetables and fruits.

Common day labor is paid 3.5 rupees or more a day, and skilled labor 10 to 50 rupees a day. A rupee has a value of seven and a half rupees to an American dollar.

All three men are college graduates.

Board Hears Audit Report

The Tahoka ISD Board of Education held its November regular meeting on Thursday evening, November 11, and heard representatives from the firm of Bollinger, Seegars, Gilbert, and Moss, a Lubbock accounting firm, present the annual audit report of all school funds as well as other phases of the school operation for which audit is required.

Other business consisted of the approval of textbook committee recommendations for the year and various routine reports of the school district operation. Textbook areas for which the textbook committee will examine sample textbooks and make recommendations for new adoptions are as follows:

Basal Reading, Grades 1-3; Vocal Music, Grades 4-7; Texas History, Grade 7; Advanced Texas Studies, High School; Social Studies, Grades 1-6; Earth Science, Grade 8; English Composition, Grades 11-12; Related Math 11, High School; Driver Education, High School.

Each year certain textbook contracts expire and new adoptions are made. All textbooks that are adopted for use in the State of Texas are examined and recommended by a State Textbook Committee that has been appointed by the State Board of Education. Each local school district, each year, is to have a local textbook committee appointed by the local Board of Education. The local textbook committee examines sample textbooks that have been approved by the State Board of Education for use in Texas Schools and makes recommendations for

such adoptions as are to be used in the local schools.

Nov. 15 - 21 Special 'Food, Fiber Abundance Week' Set

What is "Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week?"

It's that week (Nov. 15-21) just before Thanksgiving when special emphasis is being placed on the blessings of the abundance of food and natural fibers that come from the farms and ranches of Texas.

"Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week" represents a concerted effort on the part of virtually every segment of the vast agricultural industry to gain consumer appreciation for the abundance, quality, variety and value of Texas agricultural products.

Involved are representatives of farm organizations, agricultural firms, commodity groups, federal and state government agricultural agencies and institutions, universities and their research and extension arms, farm news media, trade associations, chambers of commerce, banks, utility companies, political leaders and many others, including a lot of individual farmers and ranchers.

C. G. Scruggs, Dallas, vice president and editor of The Progressive Farmer, is chairman of the TF & FAW Council; and Leon Slaughter, Abilene, special projects director for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, is co-ordinator.

Vice chairmen include: Dr. H. O. Kunkel, College Station, Dean of Agriculture, Texas A&M University; Dr. Wayland Bennett, Lubbock, vice president for academic affairs, Texas Tech University; Don Blacketer, Honey Grove, farmer; James L. (Curly) Hays, Abilene, West Texas Utilities Co., is treasurer. Governor Preston Smith and Agriculture Commissioner John C. White are serving as honorary chairmen.

All of the publicity and other work being carried on by the Council is being done by volunteer workers from the involved organizations. Money to finance the promotion is being raised by voluntary contributions from interested organizations and in-

dividuals. TFB has contributed \$100.

TFB President J. T. (Bo) Woodson is serving on the Finance Task Force which is charged with the responsibility of raising money to pay for the publicity materials, stamps etc. A goal of \$10,000 was set by this group.

Activities planned include statewide publicity through newspapers, magazines, radio and television, billboards, special displays in supermarkets. A speakers bureau will take the story to garden club civic clubs, etc.

TFB Information Director Bill Hoover is serving as chairman of the Newspaper Publicity Task Force. Publicity packets including photos and releases have been sent to all 550 daily and weekly newspapers in the state.

Co-ordinator Slaughter said the purpose of all these activities is to "imprint in the public mind a positive image of Texas agriculture by drawing attention to the abundance, quality variety, and value of Texas agricultural products."

In pointing up the importance of the observance Chairman Scruggs said, "In this day and age of confusion and confrontation, drugs, pollution, etc., all of us tend to forget that through the unparalleled efficiency of agriculture, America is the best-fed, and at the least cost, of any nation in the world."

ATTENDS MEETING—More than 400 cotton men were in Lubbock for a meeting of the Cotton Board (Nov. 4). The group included W. L. Edelman, Friona; Clarence Kitten, Slaton; and L. C. Unfred, Tahoka. They heard a report on research and promotion projects being conducted by Cotton Incorporated. The Cotton Board receives \$1 per bale from growers to finance the program and contracts with Cotton Incorporated to carry it out.

Cotton Harvest Gains Momentum

The South Plains cotton harvest slowly gained momentum during the past week as stripping operations increased in all counties, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock. This was reflected in the increase of cotton samples received at the U. S. D. A.'s Lubbock, Brown field, Lamesa and Levelland offices.

The four classing offices classed 6,800 samples during the week ending Friday, November 12th. This brought the total classed this season to 9,600. Through November 12th last year 306,000 samples of the 1970 crop had been classed.

The current crop is two to three weeks later than normal due to unfavorable weather conditions during the spring and summer months.

Quality of this early cotton varied widely depending on the conditions of the fields at the time of harvest.

Low Middling Light Spotted was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 19 percent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling made up 12 percent, Low Middling 15 percent and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 16 percent.

One-half of all cotton classed at the Lubbock office was reduced a full grade because of bark.

Staple length averaged 3 1/32. Fifty-eight per cent stapled 3 1/32 and longer.

Only eight per cent of the cotton "miked" in the Lubbock office was in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, 9 per cent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 23 per cent 3.0 through 3.2, 37 per cent was 2.7 through 2.9 and 23 per cent was 2.6 and below.

Trading was slow on the Lubbock market due to the small volume of cotton harvested. Prices were steady.

Prices offered for these early bales indicated a strong demand for South Plains cotton. Prices ranged from 25 cents for low grade, low micronaire cotton to 31 cents for high grade, long staple cotton. Most of the cotton traded in the Lubbock market has been in the price range of 25 to 28 cents.

Prices quoted by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Low Middling 31/32 26.20, Low Middling 1 - 1/32 26.30, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 26.40, Strict Low Middling Light

Spotted 1 - 1/32 - 26.60, Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32 26.05 and Low Middling Light Spotted 1 - 1/32 - 26.10.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$58 to \$70 per ton.

YOUR STATE REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS

No fault automobile insurance. The various states have proposed 20 different plans. Many argue that this will not lower insurance rates in Texas. The main point they say is that Texans now pay less than 24 states. Being 2nd in the number of automobiles and 4th most in population in the nation.

Vendors Drug Program. This law failed in '67 and '69 and was passed in '71 but not until the people of Texas turned down the welfare amendment. The bases for this act was to spend more tax money for welfare by taking the drug allowance to welfare recipients out of their monthly assistance check and paying the money to the druggist which is not to exceed \$12 per month. The Legislature appropriated 11.9 million in state money. . . . This is in addition to the 80 million constitutional ceiling. . . . and an additional 35 million to purchase drugs for welfare recipients will come from the Federal Government. Some think the federal money is a gift but it is just more tax.

H. B. 378 makes it unlawful to hunt deer, antelope, etc. with a .22 caliber and rimfire ammunition.

H. B. 727 allows counties power of eminent domain for waste disposal systems, as well as the power to prohibit waste disposal within county lines.

S. B. 76 prohibits dumping trash on public and private property without written consent. Fines up to \$200.

A fast growing industry is visitors to Texas. They spent \$1.4 billion last year.

The national average per capita expenditures for state government is \$303 per per-

son. Texans cost is \$230 and is the 5th lowest in the nation compared to others. They say it's a bargain, but I wonder how many bargains we can stand.

On gubernatorial candidate in Houston indicated he favored mass transportation in urban areas, but the Legislature in its wisdom practically dissolved the transportation commission by cutting the appropriation to only \$40,000 and the mass transit act is laying dead in my subcommittee of state affairs. We are talking about enough money to initiate the Texas water plan.

Did You Know? . . . 51 percent of your tax dollar goes for public education . . . that only 6 of 10 persons in the first grade ever graduate from high school . . . that only 3 of these 6 enroll in college . . . that only 1 ever graduates from college.

The Honorable James E. Nugent of Kerrville will be a top contender for Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives. He is a conservative Democratic, 12 years service, a lawyer and very knowledgeable of rules. He says we need some changes and reforms and I agree. If you would like him to come to your home town, let me know.

District 73 has been changed to District 77 and consists of Andrews, Gaines, Hockley, Martin, Lynn, Terry, and Yoakum Counties. I was deeply disappointed in losing Dawson County to District 63 represented by Renal Rosson of Snyder.

New Pest Control

Persons engaged in the business of structural pest control must be licensed before December 7 with the newly created Texas Structural Pest Control Board.

Purpose of the board is to develop standards for licensing structural pest control operators and to regulate methods and practices of pest control to prevent adverse effects on human life and the environment.

Structural pest control operators have until December 7 to become licensed with the TSPCB, explains Dr. Philip Hamman, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. All inquiries and applications for licensing should be sent to the Texas Structural Pest Control Board, P. O. Box 13026 Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

According to Hamman, the new licensing requirement applies to all pest control operators who are engaged in controlling pests which may infest households, warehouses, railroad cars, ships, docks, trucks, airplanes or other structures or the immediate adjacent outside areas. There are about 1,100 such operators or pest control businesses in the state.

The TSPCB is composed of seven members, four of whom are appointed by the

Governor for two-year terms. To be eligible for appointment a person must have been engaged in the structural pest control business for at least five years. In addition to the appointed members, the board also consists of the Commissioner of Agriculture, Commissioner of Health and the head of the Department of Entomology, Texas A&M University, as ex-officio members.

Persons who have been in the structural pest control business for at least two years should apply for a temporary license which shall be valid for a period not to exceed two years, points out Hamman. Other applicants will require further examination prior to licensing.

Each initial or renewal license will be \$50 for each place of business and \$5 for each employee who is engaged in structural pest control services. All licenses must be renewed each March 1.

According to the entomologist, the board, after a notice and hearing, may suspend or revoke a license, refuse to issue a license, or refuse to renew a license when an applicant or licensee has substantially failed to comply with the board's standards and regulations.

With 4:16 left in the second

quarter Clodfelter took a pitch out from quarterback Flores and went around right end for 21 yards and another Ralls touchdown. Clodfelter failed to make conversion on a run left the score at halftime at 13-12 in favor of the Bulldogs.

In the second half of action Padarez brought the kick off back to the Tahoka 41 and the Bulldogs then moved the ball 59 yards (with exchange of fumble mixed in) to score. Jimmy Bailey got the tally over left guard for 1 yard. John Thomas was stopped on the attempt to run the conversion, giving the A. J. Viertel's troops a 19-12 lead.

The Tahoka Bulldogs after receiving a punt moved to the Ralls 19 yard line and on 4th down Zedlitz kicked a 36 yard field goal with 10:01 left in the game to put the Bulldogs out front 22-12. On Tahoka's next possession, Atwell passed to Gary McCord for 35 yards to the Ralls 29 yard line but the Bulldogs were penalized for clipping back to the 44. The next play a interference was ruled on the Ralls Jackrabbits at the Ralls 8 yard line. Two plays later Atwell, on a fifty bit of faking circled right end for 6 yards and the Bulldogs final TD. Louis Zedlitz kicked the conversion to end the scoring for the Bulldogs for the night.

On the third play after the kickoff Clodfelter broke over left guard and raced 71 yards for another Ralls touchdown and then he raced over right tackle for a 2 point conversion with 4:02 left in the game to bring the score to 29-20 in favor of the dogs.

Padarez then brought the kickoff to the Bulldog 43 yard line where Ladd Roberts, Phil McClendon, Dean Rogers, Jimmy Bailey and John Thomas carried the ball to the Ralls 16 and then Padarez carried the ball to the Ralls 8 as time ran out. 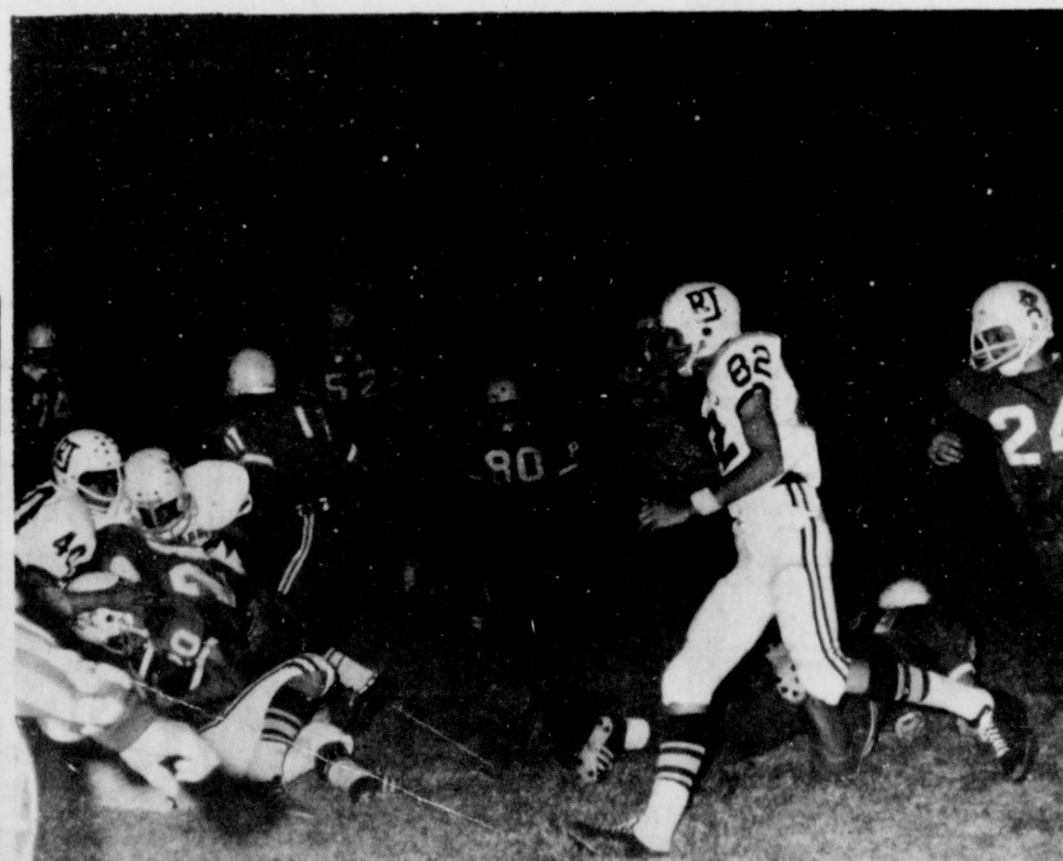

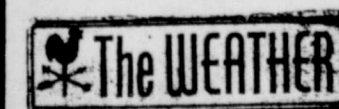

Pork supplies are abundant, and good values include Boston butt roasts, shoulder steaks, one-half or one-fourth loin cut into chops, loin roasts smoked hams and ham portions, picnics (whole or slices) and canned hams.

Fryer chickens are special features in many markets this week, so buy extras for freezing if you have adequate storage space. Grade A large size eggs still offer the best combination of quality and economy for your egg money.

Frozen turkeys are coming to market in greater number this week, with prices about the same to slightly higher than last year. Some stores will be offering specials, but don't wait too long to order a bird if you're choosy about size and type.

Fresh fruit and vegetable items in best supply at the most economical prices include apples, oranges, bananas, pears, grapes, cranberries, potatoes, dry yellow onions, mustards, collards, turnips and greens, cabbage, carrots, salad tomatoes and rutabagas.

4 Eggs
1 Cup sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup flour
3/4 lb. candied cherries
1/2 lb. candied pineapple
1/2 lb. dates
4 cups chopped pecans

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Fall Application of fertilizers for next year's crop has advantages over waiting until next spring. Anhydrous ammonia and other nitrogen carriers can be applied anytime after the soil temperature falls below 50 degrees Fahrenheit with little worry about nitrogen loss through leaching.

This is because of a drastic slowdown in soil microbial activity that is necessary for changing the immobile ammonium ion to the highly-mobility nitrate form in nitrogen. This slowdown begins at 50 degrees and the action stops entirely at about the freezing point.

Hootenanny Is This Saturday

The regular monthly Hootenanny will be held this Saturday night, November 20, at 8 p.m. in the Tahoka Community Center.

The Hootenannys held every third Saturday of each month. Everyone is invited to attend and all musicians are invited to participate. No admission is charged.

Most irrigated grain sorghum fields have soil moisture conditions that are favorable for ammonia application right after harvest. This means that less power is required and that retention of the material is not a problem.

Another distinct advantage of fall application is the availability of equipment and better weather conditions. The fertilizer often costs less in the fall. Also, less soil moisture is lost if the applications are made right after harvest rather than waiting until the next spring.

Phosphorus can also be applied in the fall. The main point to remember with phosphate is that it could be incorporated into the soil before planting.

The Extension Service's Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock offers West Texas producers a complete soil testing program. In addition to the routine analyses for soil reaction and the major elements, tests are also made for salt, sodium and the micronutrients.

The final report also includes fertilizer suggestions for the yield goal the producer specifies for the individual fields that were sampled. My office can supply information on soil sample collection and mailing.

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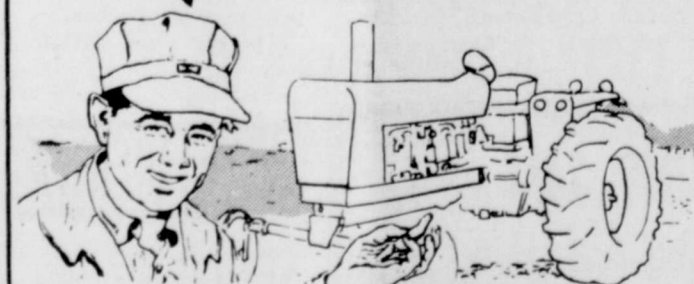

Tax Collections Normal For Oct.

1971 state and county tax collections were normal through the month of October 1971, compared to October 1970. Approximately 56 percent of the taxes were paid on the current roll, which was about the same percentage wise, compared to last year at this time.

Gross collections were \$202,074.63, before discounts, which amounted to \$6,057.42, net collections being \$196,017.21. Collections were divided as follows, State amount \$26,405.94; County \$102,036.36 - 4th Plains Water Dist. \$1,511.34 and Hospital District \$72,120.99.

Three per cent discounts were allowed for October payments, two per cent is being allowed for November and 1 per cent will be allowed for December.

VOTER REGISTRATION:

Voter registration for the month of October was much lower than the same month last year. Only 634 registered, compared to 814 for the same month last year. 722 have registered this year to date, according to George D. McCracken County tax assessor & collector.

Every one 18 years of age and above, who will have resided in the county 6 months and the State twelve months, must register in order to be eligible to vote in elections for 1972.
