Register Monday For Your Sugar

On Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, May 4, 5, 6, and 7, the government of the United States plans to register every living person in the United States for sugar rationing. This one registration will be used for rationing many other commodities.

In Burkburnett the registration will take place at the Hardin Grade School between the hours of 8 a. m. and 8 p. m. each of the above named days. School will be dismissed on Monday May 4th, and all teachers will assist in the registration on that day. It is hoped that every one will register on that day who possibly can do so, as school will go on as usual the remaining three days. If you cannot come on the first day be sure to come on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday.

One member of each family 18 years of age or older can register for all in that household. Any member of a family 18 years of age or older can register for all the members of that family, and to avoid crowding it is strongly recommended that only one member of each family come to register for the family and that this member be the mother.

Pre-School Child Census to Be Taken At School Monday

As a part of President Roosevelt's vaccination program, a census will be taken of all pre-school children, (children who are under six), on May 1, during the sugar rationing sign-up, in the local schools, according to Mrs. J. M. Willingham, president of the Burkburnett Parent-Teacher's Association.

Our local organization has undertaken the sponsoring of this vaccination program, said Mrs. Willingham, for children under six years of age against diphtheria and small pox in answer to the President's request. Every parent is urged to see the family physician and have this protection given to children under six immediately.

Representatives of the local Parent-Teacher's Association will attend a meeting called by Dr. Lewis C. Robbins, director of the Wichita Health Unit on plans for the taking of the census on May 1, Child Health Day, at the Wichita Falls City Auditorium.

The President has called for these vaccinations because all war dangers are not from guns and bombs. The danger of epidemics is great in time of war.

The President's program is being sponsored throughout Wichita county by the City and County Councils of the Parent-Teacher's Association, Civilian Defense, the Wichita County Health Unit, and the Wichita County Medical Society.

Former Residents Are Left Homeless

Crowell, Texas, April 29—Eleven persons were dead Wednesday and 200 injured in the wake of a tornado that ravaged this Foard County seat Tuesday night, causing property damage estimated at \$1,500,000.

Out of a population of 1,900 persons, approximately 1,600 were homeless and Red Cross workers were speeding relief to those without shelter.

Mr. and Mrs. Tex William Allen, former residents of Burkburnett, were among those who lost their home and contents. Mr. and Mrs. Allen were out riding around when the cyclone struck and miraculously escaped death when a car in which they were riding was struck by a large moving van. The car was damaged but they escaped serious injury. When they returned to their home they found their home and furniture completely wrecked.

A martial area was established in the courthouse square, with soldiers from Victory Field at Vernon and Sheppard Field at Wichita Falls in charge. Commanding the area were Maj. Bob Arnold, commanding officer of Victory Field, and Maj. E. H. Barr of Sheppard Field.

A curfew of 9 p. m. was established here Wednesday morning and all travelers were urged to avoid the city.

200 Houses Destroyed
The twister struck between 8:30 and 9 p. m. Tuesday and it was estimated that 80 per cent of all the buildings in Crowell were damaged. More than 200 houses were demolished.

Sheriff A. W. Lilly estimated property damage at \$1,500,000.

125 In Hospitals
More than 125 persons required hospitalization, most of them being taken to Vernon. The overflow from three Vernon hospitals was taken to Quanah and to private residences in Vernon.

Of the 125, between 30 and 40 were gravely injured and four or five had no chance to live. Scores of others were treated for minor injuries in Crowell by more than 20 volunteer physicians and nurses.

No One Kicks A Dead Dog



In 1929 there was an event in Chicago which attracted the most brilliant educators in the country. People came for thousands of miles for the occasion. Not a football game; not a political powwow. No, the occasion was the inauguration of a young man of thirty as president of the fourth richest university in this country: the University of Chicago; a university with an endowment of seventy million dollars.

The young man who was to be inaugurated as president had worked his way through Yale as a waiter. But now the great sat at his feet: Robert Maynard Hutchins.

I was not there, but I got a glimpse of it from the late Dr. Jefferson Davis Sandefer, formerly president of Hardin-Simmons university, Abilene, Texas. Dr. Sandefer sat on the platform next to the father of the new president. Turning to him he said, "I notice that one of the newspapers made a bitter attack on your son today."

This was stating it mildly, for young Dr. Hutchins had not only been attacked by the newspapers and by the educational bigwigs, but had been bitterly denounced.

Dr. Hutchins' father sat for a moment, thinking, then said quietly: "Yes, that's true. But remember, no one ever kicks a dead dog."

Remember that the next time someone attacks you. The moment you raise your head even slightly above the water level of mediocrity, you will discover a lot of jealous, envious, critics on the banks of the river ready to throw mud balls at you. Some of the mud balls will have rocks inside. This has been true throughout the ages; and it will be true until human nature changes. La Rochefoucauld, the French philosopher, said many years ago: "If you want enemies, excel your friends; but if you want friends, let your friends excel you." Why is that true? Because when our friends excel us, it gives them a feeling of importance; when we excel them, it gives them a feeling of inferiority. So if you accomplish anything in the world, expect to be attacked, denounced, condemned. That was the fate of Robert Maynard Hutchins, of Abraham Lincoln, of Socrates, and of all the good, capable and great men who have ever lived.

So expect jealousy, criticism and envy—expect them and take them in your stride. That's what General Smedley Butler learned to do. As a young man he was very sensitive to criticism. He was easily hurt. But he joined the U. S. marines as a private and battled his way up to the top. He declares in his autobiography that he had been cussed by every possible combination of bitter, insulting adjectives in the English language. So now when he hears someone calling him a blankety-blank-blank, he says he never even turns his head to see who is talking. So the next time you are attacked for accomplishing something, why not take it as a compliment. It shows you are alive. Verily, no one kicks a dead dog.

Has New Class

Instead of classifying men as either physically fit or unfit for military service along certain rigid standards, the army had worked out a new class, men who, if certain defects were corrected, would be marked fit for duty.

This was a new designation under the Class I-A grouping. It will be called "Suspended I-A."

In it will go men who have been declared unfit for dental reasons because of nasal obstructions, hernias which can be repaired, or stomach troubles correctable by dieting.

The new draft rules also called for men to be sent to hospitals for three-day periods if there was real doubt about their physical ability. There more detailed study could be made, and perhaps some minor repair work done.

Once these men have been corrected physically, they will be subject to re-examination by the army medical staffs, and if marked O.K. would be taken out of the suspended list and put in full Class I-A.

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Tin Cans Do Their Bit in War Program



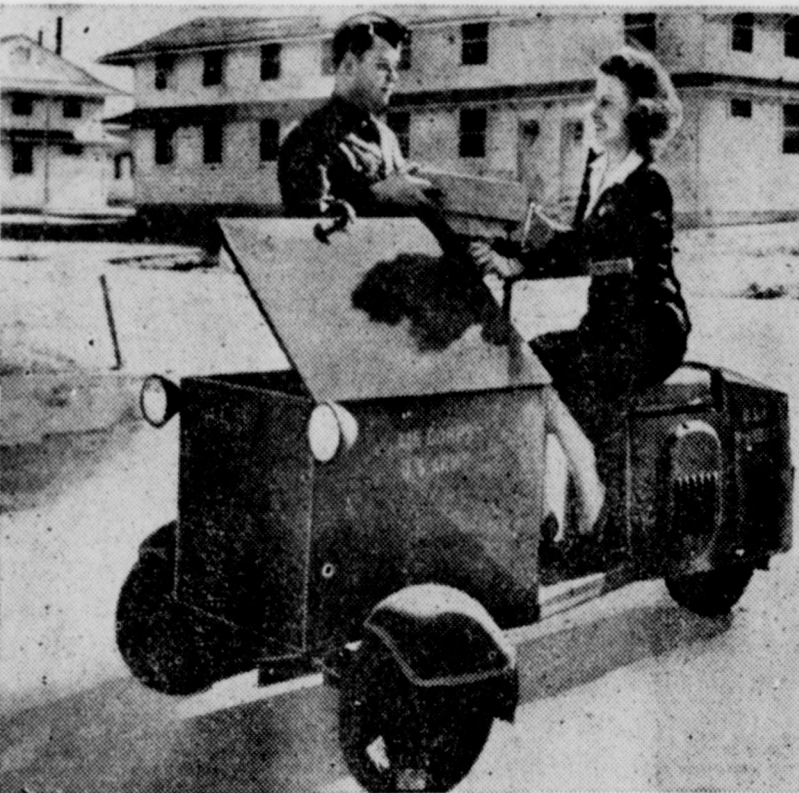

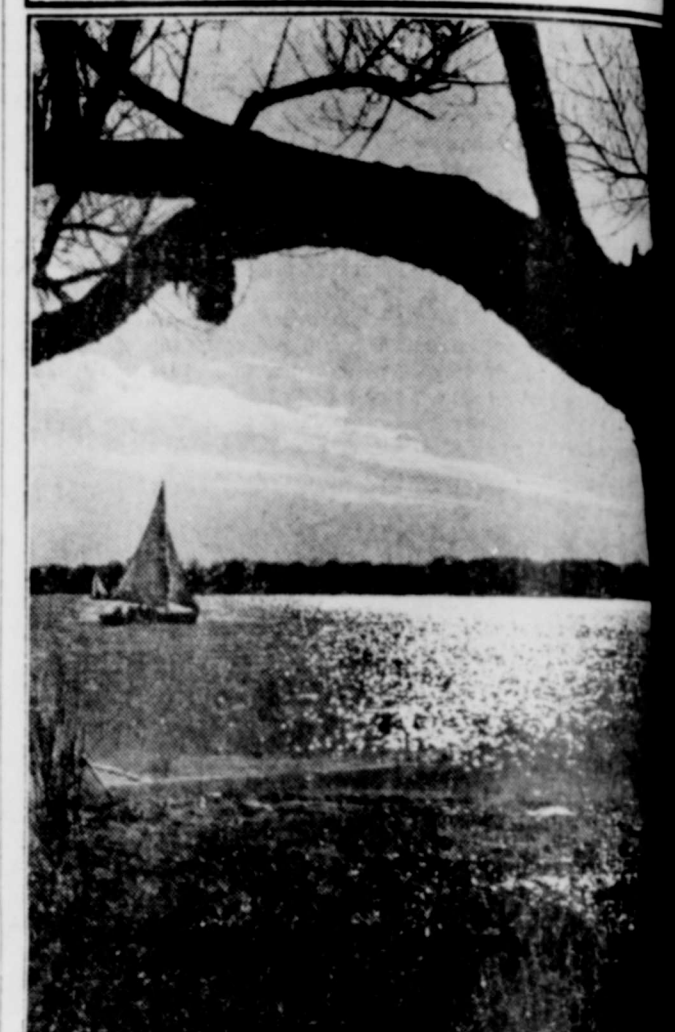

The SNAPSHOT GUY GETTING SHARPER PICTURES

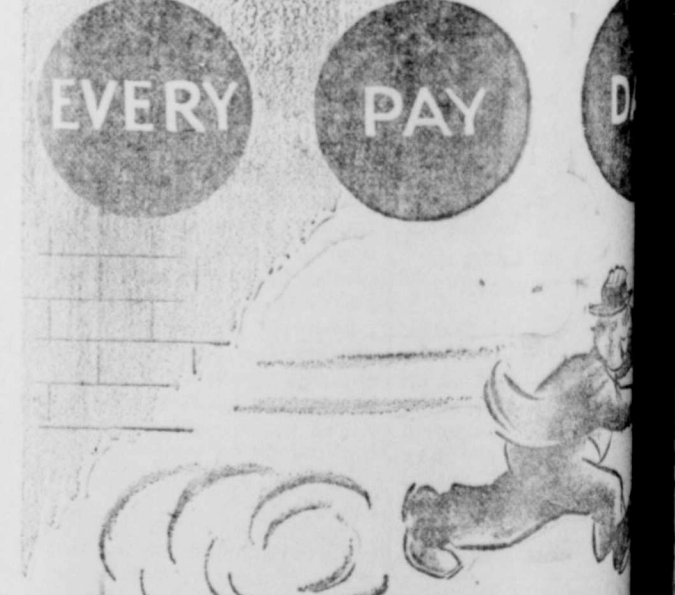


Much of the appeal of this splendid snapshot lies in the fact that from the foreground to the horizon is sharply in focus—sharpness in your snapshots.

SHARPNESS in every picture, with relatively few exceptions, is extremely important to its success. It is, I think, something we should all strive to attain. And fortunately it's not difficult to achieve. The way I see it, sharpness in a photograph depends principally upon three things: First, a steady camera; second, correct focusing; and third, correct exposure. Get those down pat and you'll have little trouble in your picture making. But let's take those points one by one. First, the important matter of camera steadiness. To achieve this goal you must practice handling your camera until you are absolutely familiar with its operation. Or, better yet, get the tripod habit. Placing your camera on a tripod every time you take a picture, or at least resting it against a firm support, will insure sharper pictures consistently.

Next, there's the matter of correct focusing. If you range finder on your camera, use it. Among its accessories, a distance from camera carefully, especially if you're trying to get a sharp picture. Or, try focusing it off. The length of your average snapshot is about 1 1/2 feet. So, if you're taking a picture of a person, get maximum depth of field. When using a shutter, don't try to handhold it. Use a tripod or a support. For all practical purposes, exposures of 1/25 second or 1/100 second exposures will give you sharp pictures.

THE other morning I watched a squirrel enjoying spring. He nibbled a swelling green bud—then in sheer exuberance seized the tip of the branch, swung hilariously from side to side, and letting go, made a flying somersault, landing by some happy sureness, right side up on a lower branch.

Now, I don't know whether this high glee was the result of the squirrel's switch from the oily nuts of winter to the juicy green buds of spring—but it's likely. For don't we all feel friskier as we turn from rich, heavy dishes to the perky freshness of springtime foods?

For example, look at the dinner planned here. It's soundly nourishing and well balanced, to keep us fightin' fit and robust—but at the same time it has lively flavor, lightness and the springtime freshness of young spinach and rhubarb and asparagus.

*Cream of Asparagus and Shrimp Soup
Ham Loaf with Mustard Sauce
Fresh Spinach
*Tomato-Cheese Biscuits
Stewed Rhubarb with Cookies
Milk or Coffee

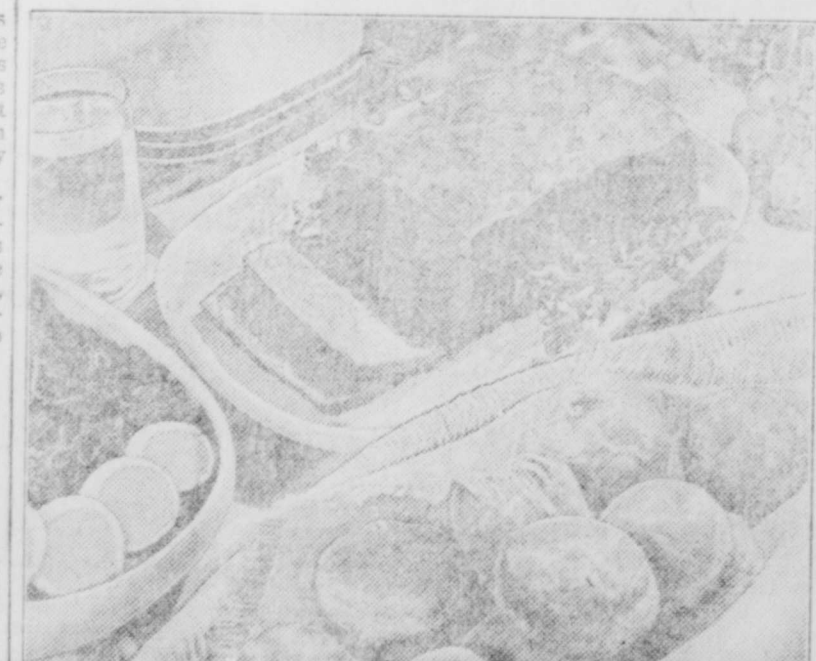
Anything with asparagus in it seems like spring—so this is how we make this delicious soup:

*Cream of Asparagus and Shrimp Soup

1 can condensed asparagus soup
2 1/2 cups milk
1 can (5 1/2 oz.) shrimp
1-16 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Stir the milk into the asparagus soup, then heat. Cut the shrimp into 4-5 pieces and add to the soup with grated lemon rind. Serves 3-4. Even the biscuits served with this dinner have springtime liveliness of flavor:

*Tomato-Cheese Biscuits
2 cups flour
1/4 teaspoon soda



The freshness of spinach and lively flavor of ham-loaf and tomato-cheese biscuits are features of this dinner.

2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons shortening or butter
1 cup grated cheese
1/2 cup tomato juice

Sift the flour, then measure, add soda, baking powder and salt and sift again. Cut the shortening or butter into the flour, then add the grated cheese and mix well.

Add the tomato juice gradually and mix together until a medium soft dough is formed. Toss on a floured board and roll out the dough. Cut into individual biscuits, put on buttered baking sheet and bake in a very hot oven (450° F.) for 12-15 minutes. Makes 15 biscuits (2 inches diameter).

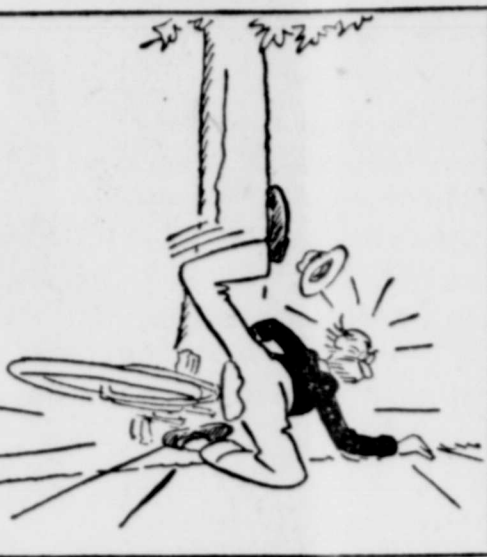
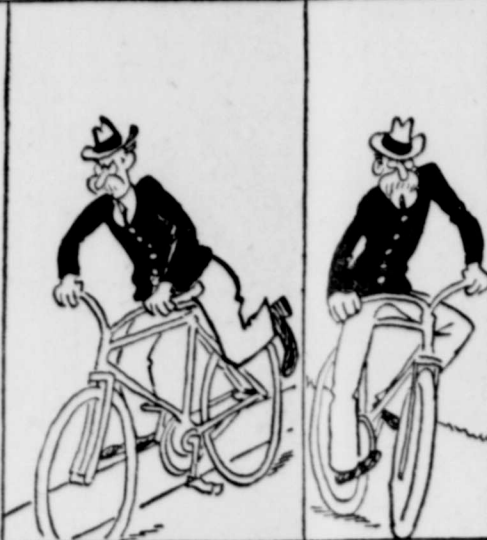

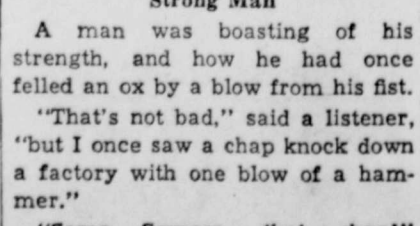

Lesson for May 3

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THE DAY OF ACCLAIM

LESSON TEXT—Mark 11:1-11; Luke 19:41-44.
GOLDEN TEXT—Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord.—Mark 11:9.

The last week of our Lord's earthly life had come. "Normally, in fact almost universally, the last week of a man's life is of practically no significance. In many cases he is too sick to speak with any clear intelligence, and, of course, when ill, is incapable of doing any noteworthy deeds. In our Lord's life, the last week was the most important of all, and to it more space is given (in Scripture) than to any one whole year of Jesus' ministry" (Dr. Wilbur M. Smith).

The first day of that week found our Lord riding into Jerusalem in humility, and yet in royal majesty, to present Himself as Israel's King and Messiah. We find

I. The King Seeking Man's Help (Mark 11:1-7)

How surprising that the One who made and upholds all things (Col. 1:16, 17) should have to say, "The Lord hath need of him," in sending for a humble beast of burden. Yet therein lies a marvelous truth. He has graciously so ordered the universe that He has need of us and of our possessions. That was true in the days of His flesh, when He had voluntarily become poor for our sakes. In a somewhat different sense, but nonetheless precious, it is true today.

To be needed by anyone—to have that which can be used—is always encouraging, but to find that the Master needs us and what we have to give, is truly inspiring. Let us learn to give as readily as the owner of the colt (vv. 5, 6), and let us also learn the important lesson of unquestioning obedience taught in verse 4. "They went their way" to do what the Lord told them to do. How greatly simplified and glorified would be the lives of Christian people if they would thus obey Christ.

II. The King Receiving Man's Homage (Mark 11:8-11)

Presenting Himself as their Messiah, Jesus received the enthusiastic acclaim of His disciples and friends, who were probably joined by others who were drawn by the excitement. But the Pharisees did not join in (see Luke 19:39, 40) nor did the city, not even knowing who He was (Matt. 21:10, 11). So it is today; some love and praise Him, some hate Him, others just ignore Him. Of which class are you?

He gave Jerusalem and the nation a final opportunity to receive Him. It was not yet too late, but it was their last chance. Such a time comes in the life of everyone of us. They rejected Him. What do we do?

But let us not forget that there were those who shouted, "Hosanna," who cast their garments down before Him and waved palms of victory and joy. Thank God for their holy enthusiasm. Pray God that we may have a little more of it. We have come to the place where nobody shouts "Hosanna" or "Hallelujah" except the church choir—and they do it only in carefully modulated tones. We cheer at ball games or at a political rally, and while we surely do not want that same kind of confusion in the church, it would be quite appropriate to bring some real enthusiasm into our Christianity.

Our Lord knew that it would not be long ere the multitude would be changing their cry to "Crucify Him," for He knew their sinful hearts. So in the midst of His day of acclaim we see

III. The King Weeping Over Man's Sin (Luke 19:41-44)

In times of great joy or under unusual circumstances we are prone to think only of our own pleasure or our own need. But with Christ the need of the souls of men was never for a moment forgotten. He might well have gone on to Bethany to rest and rejoice with His friends over His triumphal entry into Jerusalem.

This constant and tenderhearted concern which Christ had for the city which hated and was soon to crucify Him; this remembrance of their need even in His brief hour of public acclaim, may well teach the church a much needed lesson. Many churches are prosperous, well cared for, and even popular. They are prone to rest back and ride the crest of the wave of popularity, forgetting the souls of men and women in need, many of whom live under the very shadow of the church. Shame on us for such callous indifference in the light of our Lord's agonized weeping—for such is the meaning of the word in Luke 19:41.

Others may observe that their city or community is hostile to the gospel, that men would rather crucify the Christ than receive Him. And so they are content to have their snug little spiritual retreat where they meet to comfort one another and to congratulate themselves on their spiritual haven. Again we say, shame on us!

"Waiting for a taxi," Joan replied with dignity.

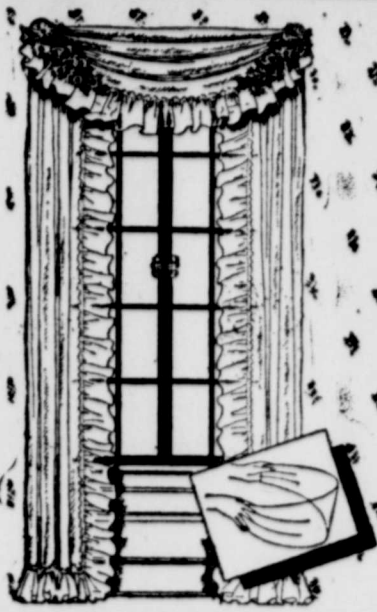
"Well, jump in, my girl!" Paul ordered cheerfully.

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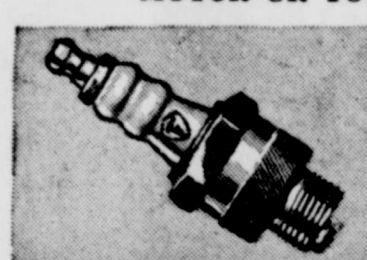

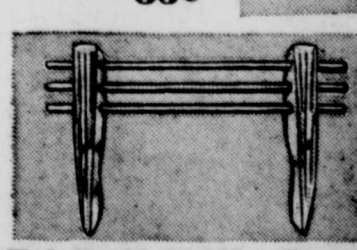

Do You Know Texas?

A reader of this newspaper can get the answer to any question of fact about Texas by writing A. Garland Adair, Curator of Patriotic Exhibits, Texas Memorial Museum, Austin, Texas.

In Recognition of Spain's influential role in the history of Texas, the Spanish flag of Aragon, Leon and Castile is displayed among the six flags of Texas on the east wall of the Great Hall of the Texas Memorial Museum, as well as the Spanish seal with the date 1519, inscribed thereon.

Q. Was any of Texas' public land ever given to soldiers for their services in the Union armies during the Civil War?—J.F. A. Bascom Giles, commissioner of the General Land office, states that a law was passed granting Northern soldiers certain amounts of public land; but, as far as he knows, no such grants were ever made.

Q. Did the State of Texas ever have a department of weights and measures?—B.M. A. Yes, Charles E. Baughman, now chief clerk of the Department of Agriculture, was the last commissioner of weights and measures which was a separate department until abolished and added to the Department of Agriculture. Mr. Baughman assisted in preparing the bill for the abolition of the department which he headed during Governor Pat M. Neff's administration.

He Financed A War:—Thomas F. McKinney, member of the firm of McKinney and Williams of Galveston and Quintana went to New Orleans in 1836 and borrowed on his own signature \$100,000 for the Republic of Texas. His note was regarded as worth more at that time than the struggling young government was worth. He was never repaid in full, and never has Texas conferred any honor upon him for his great sacrifices, although he died a poor man in Austin in 1873. Not even a county or city in the state is named in his honor.

Q. Did pneumonia claim many lives during the first World War?—D.C. A. Pneumonia killed more soldiers than were killed in battles during the first World War. Meningitis was the next most serious disease.

National Guard: The first unit of the 36th Division, Texas National Guard was first organized when Texas was still a Republic! The 141st Infantry, 36th Division, traces its history back to its forebear, the old "Washington Guards" organized April 7, 1836. I. B. Chance was captain. This is the only unit of the Texas National Guard which can trace its history back to the days of the Republic.

Q. What was the cost in dollars and cents of the first World War to the United States?—E. B., San Marcos. A. The direct cost was two billion dollars plus ten billion dollars in loans. The total cost to all nations was about 188 billion dollars, of which the Allies and the United States spent two-thirds and the enemy one-third.
