OCHILTREE COUNTY SHIPS OVER 3,000,000 BU. WHEAT TWENTY-TWO NEW HOMES STARTED SINCE HARVEST

NEW HOMES STARTED SINCE MONTH AGO, MANY ARE REMODELING

SEVEN HOMES COMPLETED OR NEARLY FINISHED—NEW CHURCH, TWO GARAGES, THREE NEW BRICKS, ARE ALSO BUILDING

A very substantial building boom is going on in Perryton as evidenced by the number of new homes and buildings going up at the present time. Nine homes have been started since the Herald's last report a month ago, making a total of twenty-two new since harvest.

In addition to this building, a new tile and stucco

being built, two garages added to the business district building is being re-erected and three new brick buildings are being built.

ing new for Perryton is constructed by T. W. Johnson and E. Irvin in the form of a tile duplex home. It is located on the corner facing south, block east of the Methodist church. Each side of the duplex has four rooms and a bathroom. The building is to be covered with stucco, is to have double windows inside, and well throughout.

TWELVE ELEVATORS THIS COUNTY HAVE SHIPPED 2,163 LOADS GRAIN

ALL ELEVATORS FULL AND THOUSANDS MORE BUSHELS ON FARMS AWAITING STILL HIGHER MARKET; PROSPECTS GOOD

Ochiltree county elevators passed the 3,000,000 bushel mark in wheat shipped this season, Tuesday evening, when the number of cars from the twelve elevators operating in the county totaled 2,163 as determined by a survey taken by the Herald.

Grain shipments total approximately 3,234,500 bushels from this county, which indicate that the Herald's

before harvest estimate of five millions of bushels is nearly correct. All of the elevators are full and very little of the wheat stored on farms has been sold as yet, although the market has been strong during the past two weeks.

The five elevators at Perryton, three at Farnsworth, only two of which are in operation this season, two at Huntoon, two at Wawaka, and one at Twitchell, are the twelve elevators that made the shipments.

Wheat acreage this fall shows a large increase over last fall, hundreds of acres of new land being broken with the plow and put into wheat. Practically all of the wheat is planted although there is still some going on. With the ample supply of moisture received this fall, the prospects seem exceptionally good for an even greater crop next spring.

TEMPORARY SHEEP PASTURE

Sheep can be successfully and economically raised with temporary pastures, numerous forage crops being used for such pastures, says the United States Department of Agriculture. Soil and climatic conditions should determine largely the kinds to be grown. More sheep can be raised per acre on temporary pastures than on permanent pastures with soils of equal fertility. Pasturing sheep on annual crops makes it possible to rotate pastures more frequently and thus lessen the danger of infection by stomach worms, and other internal parasites where it can be successfully provides better winter and spring pasture for sheep. Oats and field peas together an excellent spring pasture for sheep. Where the soil is beans make one of the best pasture crops for sheep. Crop can be pastured from the first frost.

COMMUNICATION CALLS FOR A LOT OF WIRE

At the end of the first quarter of this year the total investment in telephone plants in the United States was \$3,095,000,000, according to figures announced by the American Telephone & Telegraph Company.

At that time there were 17,165,631 telephones in the whole country. Approximately 1,600,000 were equipped with dials.

About 54,000,000 miles of wire is needed to serve these telephones. That is enough to circle the earth 2,100 times at the equator. Of this, 47,000,000 miles are used for connections between the subscriber's instruments and the central office switchboards; 7,000,000 miles are used for toll and long distance circuits.

HORSE FEED HINTS

Oats are one of the best grains for horses. Compared with corn, oats have more protein and less carbohydrates. They may be fed either whole or ground. For very young animals they should be rolled or ground. In the case of horses that eat too rapidly, it is advisable to place a little chopped clover hay or some whole corn cobs in the feed box with the oats to prevent the danger of choking.

Where corn is used instead of oats it is a good plan to provide leguminous hay for the animals, since corn is somewhat low in protein. Alfalfa and corn are receiving much favor when fed together to horses. In the absence of legumes a little linseed meal or other protein concentrate may be included in the ration. Any changes in the horse diet should be made gradually.

This loss takes the form of increased quantity of feed consumed per pound of gain, arrested growth of young pigs, and shrinkage in weight of fattening hogs. Only one species of lice commonly affects hogs, and this parasite obtains its food by puncturing the skin of the animal and sucking its blood. The lice can be eradicated by hand applications, spraying and dipping. Dipping is the best method of applying treatment. Crude-petroleum and coal-tar-cresote dips are effective remedies.

When a sheep drops the cud, disease of the teeth or sore mouth may be looked for. In other cases it is due to acidity of the stomach or to inferior feed.

normally returned to the mouth for mastication, but owing to acidity, bad taste, or to pain in chewing, the feed is dropped from the mouth. This accounts for quantities of half-chewed feed sometimes found on the ground. The mouth or teth should be attended to if diseased. Baking soda in from 1 to 2 teaspoonful

doses will counteract excessive acidity of the stomach. A purgative, such as epsom salt in 4-ounce doses may be given. A good quality of feed should be provided.

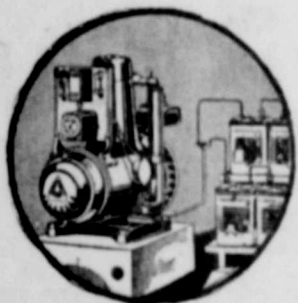

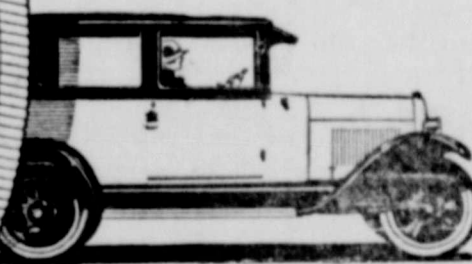

PIGS OR WORMS

Pigs severely infested with worms will sometimes show symptoms resembling those of hog cholera. While swine are seldom free from worms, the older hogs are not to

any extent disturbed by their presence. Sanitary hog lots, well drained, and treated with a coat of slaked lime at frequent intervals, will do much toward preventing worm infestation. It is especially important to protect young pigs from worms. Chenopodium (wormseed oil) may be given in doses of one drop of oil for each 2 pounds of

live weight, mixed with about 2 ounces of castor oil for each animal. Animals weighing over 100 pounds should be given 3 to 4 ounces of castor oil. Keep the pigs off feed overnight before treatment.

God, through Moses, gave to the world the foundation principles of successful agriculture: I want my people, the farmers and agricultural workers of today to read, know and love the Book and, through its inspiration to make our beloved Texas indeed the garden spot of the world.

THE BLESSING

"Wherefore ye shall do my statutes, and keep my Judgements and do them, and ye shall dwell in the land of safety.

"And the land shall yield her fruit and ye shall eat your fill, and dwell therein in safety." Lev. 25:18-19.

The laws of morality given to us in the Ten Commandments through Moses, hold good today just as they did centuries ago.

I. Use uniform quality re-cleaned and tested seed. "Thou shalt not sow thy fields with mingled seed." Lev. 19:19.

II. Grow legumes. "When he hath made plain (smooth) the face (of the ground) thereon doth he not cast abroad the fitches (vetch) and cast in the principal wheat?" Is. 28:25.

"GRAFTS"

Is it true that the American people love to be grafted? Some one has said it was and I feel sure it has been proven true in Perryton and I suppose people everywhere are about the same, as we have surely done our part toward supporting certain kinds of grafters. By the term Grafters, I refer to people who produce nothing, earn nothing, do nothing to help the world, but like parasites live off of people who by honest, persistent effort and hard labor either physical or mental, have managed to live and to get together a few shekels.

But being a Methodist and even being allowed the honor of being a Methodist steward, I shall confine my remarks on this particular phase of this subject to the grafts practiced on the church of which I am a member and for which we as a denomination get credit or criticism.

Well, if we must have a show with us all the time, let's at least keep them out of the church for while I

make no special claims as to my piety, and wish in no way to leave the impression that I am sprouting wings, only claim to be a red-blooded American, he-man, trying to live the Golden Rule, yet being raised in a good, old fashioned Methodist home, I love the Methodist church for many things. One of which is the fact that it has borne with me and my weakness and allowed me to be a member, though doubtless a poor one, since I was six years old and for its many sacred memories, I love it too well to want to see its banners dragged in the dirt and slime of commercialism or its standards lowered by every traveling grafter that wants to fleece the public.

I fell sure, before this, some one has called me a Moss Backed Methodist Steward, or compared me to some antiquated fossil of the prehistoric age. Well, I have no desire to curry public favor, no aspirations or run for public office, so I don't care whether you agree with me or not, or even whether you like what I have written or not, you will have to admit it is true.

Volumes could be written on the knee-joint and its diseases. I would like my readers to remember these points:

(1) That all knee affections are serious or capable of becoming so.

(2) That rest and heat are among the first things thought of in successful treatment.

(3) That massage in any form may be positively injurious.

(4) That a skilled physician and surgeon should be consulted on the appearance of knee-symptoms.
