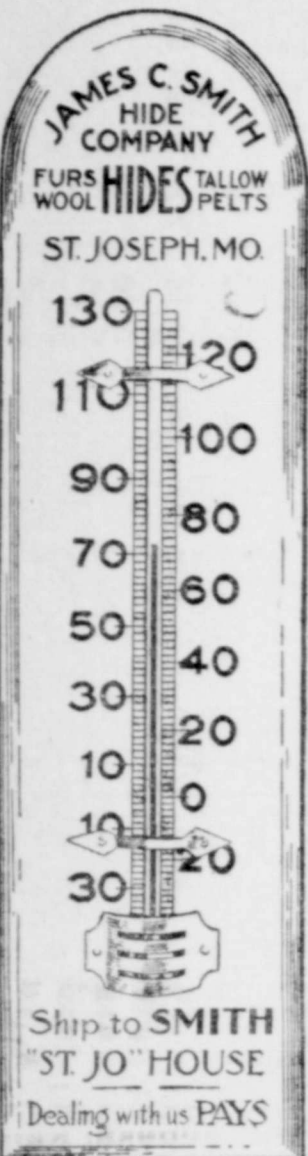

GOLD AND PROOF ARE GONE

Thieves Steal \$50,000 From Bank of England—Evidence is Now Missing.

London.—The international gang of thieves, which planned and executed the recent theft of \$50,000 from a consignment of \$1,000,000 from the Bank of London to the Credit Lyonnais in Alexandria, Egypt, is proving more than a match for the English and continental police. When the consignment reached Alexandria it was found all the boxes were sealed, but that two contained lead instead of sovereigns.

According to the messengers of the Bank of London great precaution was taken in preparing the consignment of gold. It was first packed in bags containing \$5,000 each. Five of these were placed in each case. The 40 cases, each clamped with iron bands and bearing eight seals, were loaded on a steamer and carried to Bremen. On the ship they were kept in a strong room to which there were three keys, kept by the captain and the chief officer.

Representatives of the Credit Lyonnais received the cash at Bremen and transported it by rail to Trieste, where it was transferred to an Austrian steamer, which delivered it to Alexandria.

Although the theft was not discovered until the cases of gold arrived in Alexandria, it is believed the theft occurred on the railroad portion of the journey.

MUSEUM OF RECORD OFFICE

Doomsday Book is Chief Treasure of Place Which Attracts Many American Visitors.

The little museum which forms part of the record office in Chancery lane is a British institution better known to Americans than to the thousands of Londoners who daily pass its doors.

Of course, the most treasured of the museum's exhibits is the Doomsday book, but hardly less interesting are the gunpowder plot papers, the Wellington papers, the log of the Victory, the last letter which Nelson wrote with his right hand and the first he "scribbled" with his left hand after losing the right one, the treaty of peace—strongly reminiscent of the Field of the Cloth of Gold—between Henry VIII and Francis I, illuminated books worth a monarch's ransom and royal charters galore.

All these things, however, do not seem to interest the Londoner, and seldom will one find more than a dozen people in the museum and of

these the majority will not be Britishers.

"This museum," said an official, "is better known to Americans than it is to Englishmen. Americans are not only interested in the Doomsday book, royal charters and exchequer records, but naturally in things pertaining to their own country."

"They like to see William Penn's signature appended to a petition to King James II. praying that the difference between Lord Baltimore and himself may soon be heard by the lords of the plantations, 'the delay being very ruinous,' that of George Washington to a letter to his 'great and good friend' King George III, concerning the exchange of ratification of a treaty of amity, commerce and navigation concluded in November, 1794, as well as the signatures of John Adams, Stephen Hopkins, Benjamin Franklin and Thomas Jefferson on various documents."—Fall Mail Gazette.

DOG IS HIS ALARM CLOCK

Bell Tied to Mongrel's Leg Rings Every Morning at Rising Time.

North Fairmont, O.—Samuel Forsythe believes he has the best dog on earth, as he does not need an alarm clock to awaken him in the morning in time for work. His dog, which is only a mongrel, does it for him. Forsythe says the plan has failed only once in two months.
