## Art Festival Set For July 6 and 7

Some 6,000 art buffs, artists and spectators are expected to gather for the Rockport Art Festival on Navigation District property, just south of the Ski Basin, July 6 and 7.

The holiday weekend, sponsored by the Rockport Art Association, is an annual event attracting over 125 artists and craftsmen from all sections of Texas and as far away as Colorado.

The artists will exhibit their works in specially constructed cabanas. Virtually every medium known in the art world will be displayed.

Included in the show will be oil and watercolors, pastels, metal and wood sculpture, macramé, collage, crafts, pottery, stitchey, graphics, ceramics, decoupage and batiks.

All exhibits will open at noon and close at 8 p.m. both days. There is no admission charge

and food and beverages will be available.

The association embraces over 100 members.

The Association will again have tents for rest areas, hospitality areas, etc. and they need the financial help from local merchants and civic clubs.

## City Orders Two Trucks

The City Council on Monday awarded contracts to Commercial Motors of Aransas Pass for a half-ton pickup truck for \$3,098 and for a two-ton dump truck for \$5,833.15.

Commercial Motors was the only dealer to submit bids although the city invited other dealers to turn in bids. Kolb Chevrolet in Portland sent a letter stating that they could not supply 1974 trucks and were taking orders only for 1975 models.

In other actions, the Council: --Accepted an offer by Aransas County to pay half the cost of \$2,900 to have the effluent ditch cleaned out. The work will be done by Bartlett Construction Company and the city will pay half the cost.

--The aldermen agreed to cooperate with the county to try to work out a plan to hire a dogcatcher for both the county and the city and develop a plan for control of dogs.

--It was announced that the city will pay the expenses for Jack Bright, Kenneth Howland and Ronnie Hinz of Rockport Volunteer Fire Department to attend the firemen's training school at Texas A & M July 21-26.

--Council granted a request from the Rockport Fire Department to sponsor a carnival (Castle Shows) on Navigation District property south of the Ski Basin July 8-21.

## Drive-In Banking Service Extended

Partly in response to the growing popularity of its four-lane motor bank and to provide additional convenience for customers, First National Bank will operate its motor banking service from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday, starting Monday, July 1, it was announced by James H. Sorenson, Jr., bank president.

There will be no change in the present lobby banking hours of 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. on Friday, he added.

From 2:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday when the lobby is not open, normal motor banking services will be somewhat curtailed because accounting records will not be available. However, during these "extra" hours deposits may be made, checks cashed and payment made on loans. Also, change may be obtained by business firms and telephone bills paid at the motor banking lanes.

Sorenson also pointed out that any business transacted after 2:30 p.m. will become a part of the next banking day's business, just as it has always been with business transacted during the 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. lobby banking hours on Fridays.

## Tom Jessee Day At Lions Meeting

Lion Tom Jessee, public relations manager (on leave) of RYSCO, was honored at the regular June 20 meeting of the Rockport Lions Club at Ramada Inn. He was presented as a member willing to support every community project sponsored by the local club.

The management of Ramada Inn reported that the large plastic LIONS CLUB seal removed and taken by persons unknown from the restaurant entrance after 10:30 p.m., Sunday, June 16, can be returned with no charges pressed, if undamaged.

Most of the business meeting was occupied with a discussion of the relative duties of the president and talltwister in a local club situation.

Outgoing president Robert Konvicka also announced final plans for the "famous" July 4th annual barbecue at the Rockport Harbor Park Lions' Club BBQ Pit. Beef, chicken, and sausage plates will be \$2.50 this year (no children's plates); sandwiches will be \$1.25; bulk beef BBQ at \$3.25 a pound; and sausage at \$1.25 a link.

Lion Konvicka announced it was decided to follow previous practice of one serving line and a special line for bulk purchase.

## Electric Power Cost to Increase

Central Power and Light Co. customers will get another jolt next month.

Company officials announced that the cost of electricity will go up again but most customers won't get their new bills until July.

Users will begin paying \$2.51 more for 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity. The \$2.51 being added represents a 35.2 per cent increase over last month's fuel adjustment and an 8.2 per cent overall increase from the May base of \$30.54 for 1,000 kilowatt hours. The May and June adjustments amount to \$9.64 over the April base bill of \$23.43.

CPL has increased use of fuel oil to replace natural gas during June. More fuel oil has also been purchased on a spot basis, according to a spokesman.

S.E. Kelly, Jr., CPL district manager, said fuel costs will increase another 19.01 cents per million BTU for June electric bills. Cost of fuel on May electric bills was 74.09 cents per million BTUs.

Kelly said the increased cost of fuel is due to a 65 per cent curtailment in natural gas supplies from Lo-Vaca Gathering Co. during May.

The curtailment forced CPL to burn 286,809 barrels of oil in its power stations to produce the electricity in South Texas.

Cost of fuel oil, according to Kelly, is nearly twice as high as natural gas. Spot-purchased oil costs more than \$2.20 per million BTUs compared to a maximum of \$1.40 per million BTUs for natural gas. Lo-Vaca has contracted to supply more than 75 per cent of CPL's energy needs.

Kelly said that CPL had adequate gas supplies in early June but couldn't guarantee it would continue through the summer.

## Forty-six Graduates To Attend College

Forty-six of the 84 May graduates of Rockport-Fulton High School have indicated that they will attend some type of college this fall by requesting that a copy of their high school transcript be mailed to various Directors of Admission.

Twenty nine graduates have chosen four year colleges, twelve will enter a junior college, three will attend a technical school, and two will enter a business college.

Southwest Texas State University at San Marcos is the most popular choice with eleven graduates to begin studies at that institution. Five students will enter Texas A & I at Kingsville, three have chosen The University of Texas at Austin, one will attend Rice University at Houston, two will venture to Lubbock to attend Texas Tech University, and two will go to Texas A & M at College Station. Four students will live in Rockport and commute to Del Mar College in Corpus Christi. The remainder of the college bound students are scattered among various institutions around the state.

Many scholarships have been won by the graduates and a large number will receive financial aid from many sources. As an example, five of the seniors will begin college with music scholarships.

In addition to those who have chosen a school, a number of the graduates have not yet decided where they will attend and some have chosen to work before they begin their higher education.

Twenty two seniors graduated in January and of those three are known to have already entered college.

School administrators feel that the 1973-74 graduates will represent this community well as they begin another chapter in their lives.

The counselor's office of Rockport - Fulton High School plans to do a follow-up survey in the fall to find out what all the graduates are doing. Results of that survey will be published at that time.

## Many Persons Protest Increases In Valuation of Their Property

Owners of property in Rockport and Aransas County began pouring into Aransas County Courthouse Monday morning to find out the new, higher valuation which will serve as the basis on which the next city,

county and school district taxes will be levied.

As explained in the Pilot last week, virtually every piece of property in Rockport and Aransas County now has a higher valuation as the result of a

revaluation program conducted by Davis and Wilson, Houston tax consultant firm.

So many people showed up at the Courthouse that numbers were handed out so the property owners could be served in their proper turn.

The procedure went like this: first you were informed as to the new valuation of your property. Then, if you wanted to protest, you would wait your turn to appear before the Board of Equalization in another room at the Courthouse.

Actually, three Boards of Equalization are working together all this week representing the City of Rockport, Aransas County and Aransas County Independent School District.

An indication of the large number of persons checking their new property valuation (some staying to protest to the Boards of Equalization and others going home after deciding the new figure was fair), can be gained from the report that by 10 a.m. Monday, more than 80 property owners had showed up -- and many more were expected all week long.

The three Boards of Equalization are being presided over by County Judge, John D. Wendell.

Each board is polled when value adjustments are proposed.

"We hope all three boards will agree on one value," said Wendell, prior to start of the sessions.

In contention are land and improvement values worked up by Davis & Wilson in the first county-wide property revaluation since 1962. With the study contracted for by the county over a year ago, the city and school district have agreed to share the \$112,000 cost in order to utilize the new values.

Wendell said values went up "pretty well all over the county" in the mass appraisal.

This is particularly true where land values are concerned, Tom Haney, a representative of Davis & Wilson, said. Haney said waterfront property footage which ranged from \$35 to \$75 a front foot has been raised to \$100 to \$220.

John Lewis, a member of the board of equalization for the school district, said it had been found that a "great many properties have appreciated in Aransas County" at the rate of about 10 per cent a year.

Waterfront property has especially increased in value in recent years because of its growing scarcity, officials said.

Board members several times said that values arrived at for the approximately 18,000 inventories in the county were based on sales.

The three boards faced up to at least one unique problem Monday when representatives of Bass Brothers Enterprises, owner of St. Joseph's Island, appeared to ask for a value adjustment.

"There is no way to put a value on an island," Haney said, after the county and school boards dropped acreage increases proposed on the island by about 20 per cent.

Art Hamilton and Butch Darby, both of Fort Worth, prevailed upon the two boards that have the island within their jurisdictions to "split" the overall 63 per cent value increase on the 32,000 acres.

A compromise of 43 per cent was finally reached. This resulted in the placement of a \$100-an-acre value on approximately 7,040 acres described as high land (the old value was \$70 and the original new value proposed was \$125), while a value of \$30 an acre was placed on the remaining acreage (the old value was \$21 and the original new value proposed was \$35).

No change was requested in the value reached on improvements, which was hiked from \$197,000 to \$238,000.

## Nuclear Plant Moves Closer

The Atomic Energy Commission has accepted for docketing the application by four South Texas Electric Utilities to construct a jointly-owned nuclear generation station, AEC has informed the participants.

The docketing of the application which is expected on July 5, establishes its place in sequence of applications being filed by a number of utilities to build nuclear plants. It also marks the beginning of review of formal requests to build the plant to be located in Matagorda County between Bay City and Palacios.

The four utilities participating in the project are Central Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi, City Public Service Board of San Antonio, the City of Austin, and Houston Lighting and Power Company, Project Manager for construction of the plant.

Each of the proposed plant generators will produce 1,250 megawatts of electricity and will be powered by a pressurized water reactor built by Westinghouse Electric Corporation. Cooling for the plant will be provided by a cooling water reservoir to be constructed on the site.

Docketing of the application establishes the approximate date for other activities to be carried out during the review.

The schedule calls for issuance of a construction permit and beginning of construction by early 1976. Completion of the first generator is anticipated in late 1980, with the second following in 1982.

## Vitamins—In the Age Of 'Supernutrition'

COLLEGE STATION—“If a few vitamins are good, then lots of vitamins must be better” has been said more than once.

“It’s just not true,” one foods and nutrition expert says—“too many vitamins don’t make you healthier—they might even be harmful.”

She’s Sally Springer, foods and nutrition specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service The Texas A & M University System.

“Fat-soluble vitamins A, D, E and K are stored in the body and excess amounts taken for an extended time may be toxic,” the specialist warned.

Because of this danger, the Food and Drug Administration has limited the amount of vit-

## amins A and D supplements sold across the counter, she added.

“If a person restricts his diet to specific foods and takes supplemental vitamins over an extended time, toxic symptoms of certain vitamins may appear,” she continued.

Water-soluble vitamins—C and B-complex—do not stockpile in the body—so excess amounts of these do neither good nor harm. The body simply doesn’t use them.

“Good nutrition in our ‘age of supernutrition’ comes from eating a wide variety of foods every day. Excess vitamins don’t help your health,” the specialist concluded.

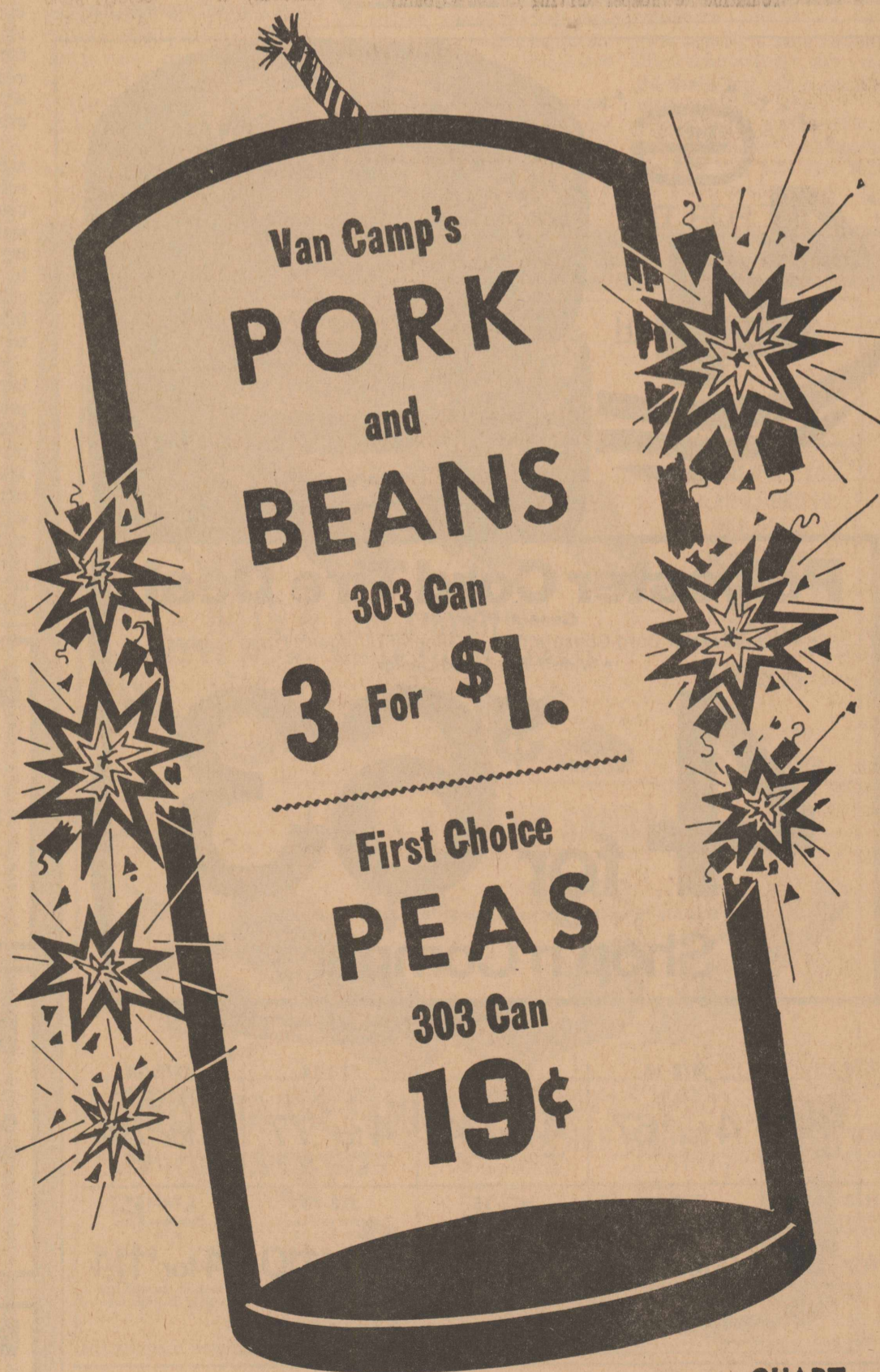

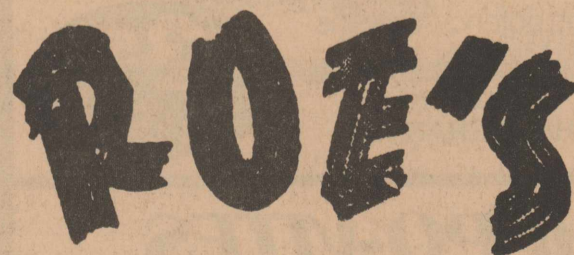

## The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN -- Many people who plan to move do so in the summer. If you're one of those who will be packing up and heading for new territory soon, be sure you select a reliable moving company to transport your belongings.

Because whether it's a cut-

glass punch bowl or a well-used tricycle, your household goods probably would be hard to replace.

Attorneys in our Consumer Protection Division warn that some "hot haulers," or illegal moving companies, are in operation and that dealing with them

could result in some problems. For one thing, many of the illegal movers cannot or do not offer proper insurance for your goods.

For another thing, consumers who unwittingly deal with a bootleg moving company could possibly be liable for prosecution under the Motor Carrier Act, enforced by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

There are three classes of moving companies: (1) unregulated ones that can move goods from their base city to another; (2) companies licensed by the Texas Railroad Commission to move goods anywhere within the State; and (3) companies licensed by the Interstate Commerce Commission to move goods between states.

Spokesmen for the Railroad Commission say that many interstate movers have Texas representatives who are also licensed as intrastate movers themselves.

If you plan to move from Wichita Falls to El Paso, for example, you will need a company licensed by the Railroad Commission as an intrastate carrier. Picking a company from the telephone book, as many people do, is no guarantee that you'll get a properly licensed mover.

The best way is to check with the Railroad Commission to see if the movers you are interested in are listed as certified companies or as designated agents for such companies.

In order for a company to be certified, it must prove the need for increased service. Public hearings are held and, if the need is demonstrated, a permit can be granted by the Railroad Commission.

Specialized carriers holding certificates or permits for the transportation of household goods must adhere to certain requirements.

If a mover says offhandedly, "I'll move you to Dallas for \$200," beware. He's not a licensed mover. If he were he would have to take a look at your goods, give you a written estimate of the moving cost, weigh his truck both before and after loading your goods, and check the weight against a fixed tariff rate to determine the actual cost.

He would also have to notify you if the cost exceeded the ori-

ginal estimate by 10 per cent or \$25.00, whichever is greater. And, in addition, he would have to inventory all of your belongings and give you a copy of the inventory.

Certified intrastate moving companies must also be bonded, carry insurance, pay a licensing fee, and pay transportation taxes. Individuals employing such movers can also take out additional insurance on their goods, if desired.

If you want to lease a truck and move your own goods, be sure you choose a reputable company for that, too. There are statutes that prohibit the leasing of a truck by one individual to another for a move if requirements regarding such things as proper insurance have not been met.

Any questions about regulations involving a moving company can be answered by the Railroad Commission, the Department of Public Safety, or the Attorney General's Transportation Division. For assistance with other consumer problems, call our Consumer Protection Division, your district or county attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.

### Summer Tax Savers For Farmers

"The summer months offer farmers a chance to save on income tax by paying their children for farm work and by combining vacation and business trips."

This word comes from Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist in agrribusiness management for the Texas Agricultura Extension Service at Texas A & M University.

"A farmer can deduct wages he pays to his children and still claim them as dependents as

long as he provides over half of their support. The wages must actually be paid for work performed. To establish an employer-employee relationship, definite jobs should be performed, regular hours should be established, and wages should be agreed upon and paid by check."

The support test is not hard to meet if the children are living at home or are in school, notes Hayenga. "As long as they earn less than \$2,050, the children will not have to pay income tax. Also, dependent children working for parents do not have

to pay social security taxes, but then they do not gain social security credits either."

A farmer can also deduct business related expenses from business-vacation trips as long as business is the primary purpose of the trip, points out the economist. To do this, records of activities and costs of the trip should be maintained. Before going on a major business-vacation trip, it may be worthwhile to check the Internal Revenue Service publication No. 463, "Travel, Gift and Entertainment Expenses," adds Hayenga.

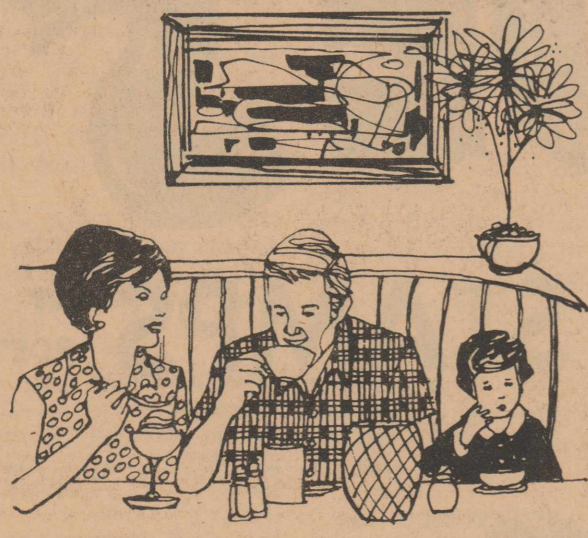

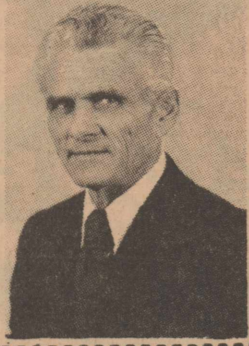

## OUTDOORS 'n things

In the United States there is no area so blessed with wildlife as South Texas. Nowhere is there a finer herd of white-tailed deer. Of course, the Edwards Plateau region has more deer, but what we lack in numbers we make up for in quality. When you go hunting in the Hill Country you're pretty sure to get a deer, but you don't really expect to get a big deer or a trophy head of antlers. Texas has more white-tails than any other state, and more wild turkey - many of which are found in South Texas.

The javelina population is the highest in the United States, and 95 percent of the white-winged doves that nest in Texas are found in the Rio Grande Valley. The other five percent are scattered out no farther north than Medina Lake. Although quail populations are subject to extreme fluctuation, there are usually as many here as in any other area of the state.

Waterfowl, of course, are

found in abundance all along the coast, and more than 80 percent of the North American redhead duck population spends the winter in the Laguna Madre. Ducks and geese range well back from the coast as do many species of birds that are classed as non-game.

Other forms of wildlife, not classed as game, are found here and are, in themselves, important to our heritage and to our economy. Predators, such as coyotes and bobcats, are found throughout the brush country. There are many people who would pay for the privilege of hunting these animals with predator calls, but, as far as I know, no rancher has ever taken advantage of this fact.

South Texas is the home, either full or part-time, of several species that are classed as "rare and endangered". These include the whooping crane, bald eagle, peregrine falcon, osprey, brown pelican, Atwaters prairie chicken, all-

igators, red wolf, mountain lion, and various aquatic mammals.

With such a great resource available, I can't understand why its habitat is being so rapidly destroyed, and why the economic potential is being overlooked.

Bird watching, wildlife photography, and nature study is growing by leaps and bounds, but, except in a few areas right along the coast, these activities are almost totally ignored by South Texans. People are willing to pay for the privilege of pursuing their hobby, but their money goes begging in this area. Very little waterfowl hunting is done in South Texas except right along the coast, yet, during most years, there are ducks on just about every stock tank and farm pond in the brush country. These little lakes wouldn't support very many hunters per lake, but there are so many of them that the total money that would be paid to hunt on them would probably surprise you. Most of the white-wings in the Valley feed in Mexico, but if the farmers down there would leave small fields of grain unharvested they would have good hunting to offer the thousands of hunters who converge on the area with their money in their hand. Even deer, the only wildlife crop thought of as profitable, are only utilized to about 50 percent of their potential.

with just a little bit of planning and some free advice from Parks and Wildlife biologists the wildlife of South Texas could be a tremendous economic asset and the basis for a recreational spending boom. 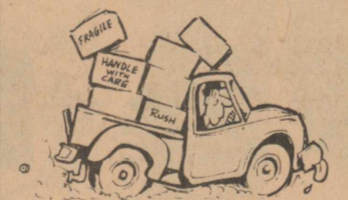

**SAFE BOATING WEEK PROCLAIMED**

Governor Dolph Briscoe has proclaimed the week of June 30 through July 6 Safe Boating Week in Texas.

The Texas Safety Association, along with boating groups across the State, urged Texans to pay special attention to boating safety during the July Fourth holiday when water traffic is always heavy.

The official proclamation pointed out that there are now 432,558 boats registered in Texas. "This increase in recreational craft greatly intensifies the water safety problem," reads the proclamation, "It is imperative that all boatmen observe the basic rules of boating safety if we are going to keep the loss of life and property at a minimum."

In 1973 there were 74 boating deaths in Texas. Sixty-five of these contributed to drownings. Deaths like these can be prevented, according to TSA officials, if boaters will take the simple precaution of wearing a personal flotation device.

At least half of the recreational drowning victims in the United States last year never intended going into the water in the first place. Either they were

involved in a boat sinking or they slipped, tripped, or fell into the water. Most of these "surprise victims" were not wearing a flotation device -- and none was handy.

Keeping personal flotation devices handy not only makes good sense safetywise, but Texas law requires that on recreational boats sixteen feet and longer, there must be a Coast Guard approved wearable device for each person aboard. In addition, one throwable device must be carried.

For smaller boats and all canoes and kayaks, one buoyant cushion is required for each person on board. However, the Coast Guard recommends the use of wearable devices.

TSA also urged Fourth of July boaters to begin thinking safety on the way to the water. Familiarize yourself with the basic rules of boat trailing, buckle your safety belt, observe the 55 mph speed limit and have a good holiday, says the safety group.

## TIPS TO CUT ENERGY BILL

To combat the new higher electricity costs announced by Central Power and Light Co., company officials stress that every energy-cutting action results in savings.

The best place to start is with the big user - air conditioning. CPL is asking customers to set their thermostats up to 78 degrees. "Every degree below 78 increases your electrical bill by 10 per cent," said Clark Council of the company's public relations department.

Air conditioning filters also should be cleaned every two weeks for efficient use, he added.

Another major energy saving tip is to have six inches of insulation in the ceiling and 3-1/2 inches in the walls. Council noted the importance of good insulation, saying that with no insulation in a home the customer's electric bill would be double.

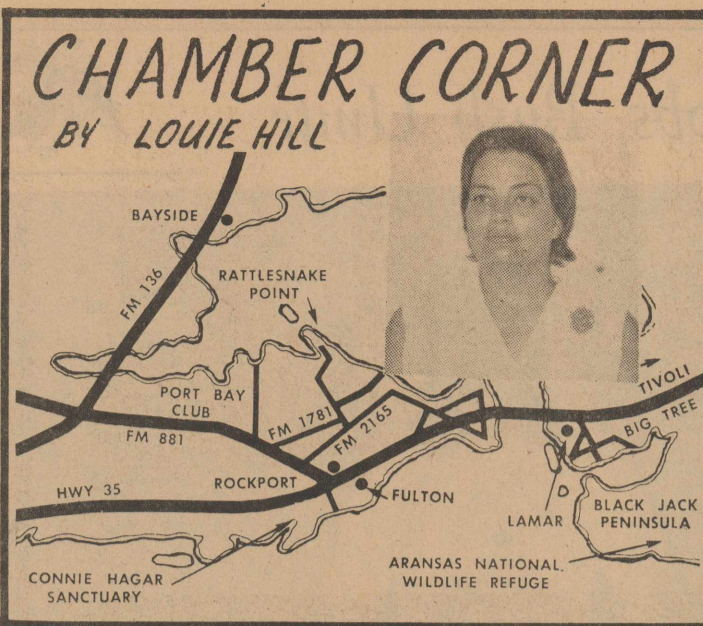
Other energy saving tips include turning off extra lights; switching off TV sets when they are not being watched, leaving doors, refrigerators and freezers closed as much as possible, weather stripping doors, ceilings and windows and always trying to use full loads when using dish or clothes washers or clothes dryers.

If the average customer in the city uses 950 kilowatt hours per month, theoretically a cut-back of 95 kilowatt hours would reduce consumption by 10 per cent.

An idea of what such a savings might entail is indicated by CPL's estimate of the average usage of electrical appliances in kilowatt hours per month: Dishwasher, 30; black-and-white television, 30; color television, 40; refrigerator-freezer (frost-free, 18 cubic feet), 190; window air conditioner (summer months 6,000 BTU), 420; and a ton air conditioner, 810.

Booklets with more energy saving tips are available from the local CPL office. A consumer services department also is available to help customers with their energy saving problems.

### Home Gardeners

#### Can Stretch Moisture

COLLEGE STATION--- Hot, dry summer weather is here and that means following certain practices to "stretch" the moisture available for your lawn and garden.

"Wise use of available moisture helps keep your lawn and garden plants growing and healthy while at the same time reducing the amount of irrigation water required," points out Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To start with, Janne suggests a good mulch at least two inches deep around flowers, shrubs and

other plants. This reduces evaporation loss from the soil surface, lowers the soil temperature, reduces weed growth and cuts down on soil cultivation. Shredded pine bark, pine straw, wood chips, chopped wheat or oat straw or other organic matter is good for mulching.

When watering, the horticulturist recommends soaking the soil to a depth of 6 to 10 inches. Of course, where the soil surface is sloping, watering should be reduced to avoid excessive runoff.

"Deep watering encourages deep root penetration and provides a greater reservoir of moisture for plants. This enables plants to withstand dry

weather better than when waterings are light and frequent. After a thorough soaking of the soil, watering can be delayed until plants begin to wilt."

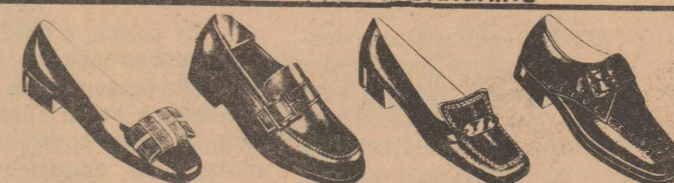
Janne advises applying fertilizer, insecticides or fungicides to plants only when there is moisture in the soil. Severe foliage burn can occur if these materials are applied when plants are under water stress conditions. Fertilize lawns when needed since a well-fertilized lawn will use water more efficiently and will require less water to keep it alive.

Raising the cutting height of your lawnmower one-fourth to one-half inch will also reduce the water needs of your lawn.

**Parks and Wildlife Department officials.** Here are a few plants to watch for:

-- The horsetail, a primitive rush-like plant found in swamps and stream beds which is also known as the scouring rush, pipes, joint grass or foxtail. Although this plant is not likely to be eaten by humans, the young shoots have been mistaken for wild asparagus.

-- Fly poison, a plant which is sometimes mistaken for the wild onion because of its multi-layered bulb. Found in deep East Texas in sandy bogs and open woods, this extremely toxic plant lacks an onion-like smell. Hands should be washed thoroughly after handling this plant because of the possibility of poisoning yourself by touching your hands to your mouth.

-- Death Camass, another plant that can be mistaken for the wild onion but which also lacks the characteristic smell of onions. This plant can be found all over Texas in sandy pinewoods and bogs, limestone gravels, meadows and prairies. It has a potent alkaloid which causes vomiting, diarrhea and death in many cases.

-- Blue flag, a wild iris found in meadows, swamps, bottomlands, and forest borders. It is sometimes confused with sweet flag, calamus or young cat-tail by wild food collectors. The plant can cause digestive upsets.

-- Bouncing bet, found in waste areas, roadsides and ditches. Its mucilaginous juice, which can be used as a soap substitute because it lathers,

It is one of several poisonous plants in Texas which can kill you, according to the Texas
