IT'S SPORTING THING TO PLAY IN BEST STYLE

NEW YORK, June 11.—It is characteristic of the modern modes that clothes for playtimes are highly specialized. Tennis frocks are unlike golf togs; yachting takes costumes all its own and polo suits are distinctly different from ordinary riding habits.

Since tennis and golf are the major sports for warm days, much time and care have gone into styles for these pastimes.

One-piece tennis dresses are the established order, made of silk, pique, linen, wash satin, and even of voile. While always looking more correct on the courts than color, though with the advent of red and blue tennis balls, it is likely that in another season the white frock will have real rivals in the color field.

Tennis Frocks Fuller
All tennis frocks this season have skirt fullness, whether it comes via a circular skirt, pleated, godets or one of the new divided skirts, with matching shorts underneath. All are sleeveless. Some of them have sunback. Yokes, unusual collar cuts and touches and such novelties as having the shoulders lie flat are all featured.

For golf the cardigan sweater outfit still retains its supremacy. Sometimes pleated silk skirts and tuck-in blouses are chosen. But the overblouse has by no means relinquished its favor.

Croquet is gaining many advocates as a gentle summer pastime. Some smart little croquet suits feature silk or linen overalls, with short sleeved silk or handkerchief linen shirts and big floppy hats.

Beach outfits of course are a story in themselves. Yachting and other boating outfits, however, come rightly in the category of tennis and golf togs. Blue and white is the accepted color scheme for nautical togs, but orange flames out in some costumes and pastel tones are very popular.

Modernism Sets Sail
A new boating outfit is modernistic in its flag design. Modern flags hang from a mast on a knitted blouse of pale blue. The blue crepe skirt has two tiers of narrow pleats, one forming the upper part of the front of the skirt, the other fashioning a knee flounce at the back. The knitted scarf has flags like those on the blouse. A beret in light blue chenille has a darker blue trim.

One white flax crepe tennis frock that I have seen several points of interest. The frock belts at normal waist line with a white belt and below the skirt is made of inverted box pleats. A notched sports collar has a double tie, one side black and the other white which fashion a sailor's knot and leave the ends flying.

The vogue for separate packets is shown here. There is a printed pique coat for a white background with little sprays in green, red and black. It is cut flaring, does not fasten and is slightly below hipline.

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WEEKLY CABLE REVIEW

Americans have a large interest in events of the past week in Europe.

An international committee of experts at Paris, sitting with some of the best minds of American finance and under the chairmanship of Owen D. Young, agreed on proposals for final liquidation of the damages and costs of the world war. Not only will a major part of the reparations which Germany is called on to pay find their way to the United States in payment of war debts but this report is expected to hasten French ratification of the long-standing Mellon-Berenger debt settlement.

MOSCOW (AP)—An expedition of the State Institute of Music, after nearly a year's search on foot for folk songs and musical instruments, brought back 100 songs and 84 instruments from the Smolensk district and White Russia. This summer the same men will search the Crimea and the Black Sea coast.

Seeking Settlement
In Great Britain Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald and other labor leaders too have the guidance of the foreign policy of the kingdom with the avowed intention of seeking peace and disarmament. The Premier said he would even try

to attend the next assembly of the League of Nations because of the predominant importance of disarmament. President Hoover will surely have here a champion of his pronouncements for reduction in the navies of the powers.

The Catholic church won for the Vatican City recognition as a sovereign state and moved for reconciliation of the spiritual desires of its children in Mexico with the government of that country. Ratification of the Lateran accords ended the theoretical state of war between the kingdom of Italy and the Holy See.

Troubles Arise
Nationalist China and Soviet Russia were poor neighbors in Manchuria last week. Chinese authorities raided consulates in search of evidence of Russian aid to opponents of Nanking.

Consuls and others were detained and Moscow threatened removal of diplomatic immunity for Chinese representatives in her territory. At Madrid the council of the League of Nations, in committee form, took up the question of treatment of the "under dogs" of the reconstructed map of Europe. There are more minorities than states in Europe and all are acutely race conscious.

PERU (AP)—The historic straw-hat monastery founded in 1140 is to be purchased by the city and added to the public park on the Hill of Petrin. The gardens of the cloister are especially beautiful.

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CONFERENCE BRINGS MORE OPPOSITION TO HOOVER OIL PROGRAM

STORM SHOWS NO SIGNS OF SLOWING UP

REQUA SAYS COERCIVE REGULATION MIGHT BE FORTHCOMING

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., June 11 (AP)—The storm of opposition against President Hoover's order withdrawing government land from oil prospecting which swirled from representatives of the Rocky Mountain states showed no signs of abatement today as the governors' conference called by President Hoover to consider means of conserving oil went into its second day of work.

Called specifically to consider the feasibility of an interstate compact which would control production by limiting drilling, the conference early became a forum of debate on the Hoover order with arguments predominant in opposition to it.

One Supports Policy

Representatives from only one Rocky Mountain state New Mexico, supported the Hoover policy, Hugh B. Woodward, lieutenant governor, declaring his state was confident the administration had every intention of protecting the welfare of the Rocky Mountain states.

Sharing the limelight with opposition to the Hoover order was the statement made by Chairman Mark L. Requa, in his opening address that if the states and the industry

could not cooperate and conserve he would urge rigid government co-ercive regulation.

Practically every leader of the country's oil industry heard Mr. Requa as he declared such control to be the only alternative if co-operation was not forthcoming.

Wilbur Goes West

Secretary Wilbur, after a brief address, sat silently throughout the barrage against the order he is carrying out, but today was on his way west, where he will preside over the commencement exercises of Stanford university. He may return later to the conference.

Independent operators, after an unsuccessful attempt late last night to place the conference on record as opposing the Hoover policy and favoring a tariff on oil, held the attention of the opening sessions today. Several associations announced their intention of opposing any compact which would limit the amount of foreign oil imported declaring that such oil can be placed on the market in New York at a lower price than can American crude.

This foreign oil, they said, was produced and transported to this country by American operators and under those conditions could be controlled.

Three States Agreeable

The big three of the oil producing states, Texas, Oklahoma and California went on record as being interested in, but not enthusiastic about, an interstate compact. M. M. Crane, of Dallas, representing Governor Moody said he and other Texas delegates were willing to learn, but all they could do was listen and carry back to Governor Moody and the Texas legislature reports on what they had heard.

Foundation Spends Much During 1928

NEW YORK, June 11 (AP)—The Rockefeller Foundation disbursed \$21,690,738 in 1928 for the advancement of medical science throughout the world, says a review of the Foundation's work for the past year. Since 1913 the board has paid out \$144,189,400.

The activities consisted chiefly in promoting the development of medical knowledge by aiding schools of medicine, nursing and hygiene in many parts of the world; advancing the cause of public health by helping governments fight certain diseases and strengthen their local health service, and carrying out an extensive fellowship program by which 800 men and women were enabled to pursue additional studies.

SILVERWARE LOOT IS FOUND IN AUTOMOBILE

BREWSTER, N. Y., June 11 (AP)—Silverware valued at \$10,000 was recovered by state police Monday in an abandoned automobile here a few hours after it was stolen from the Millbrook, N. Y., home of Thomas W. Lamont, partner in the J. P. Morgan banking house.

Mr. Lamont is enroute home from Paris where he has been an alternate United States representative to the reparations conference.

WOODWARD CITES UTILITIES WORK

AUSTIN, June 11 (AP)—Senator Walter Woodward of Coleman, sponsor of a bill to regulate public utilities through a commission, which the senate Monday refused to print on minority report, today charged that "by false and deceitful propaganda, utilities have defeated the measure."

Senator Woodward predicted that "the time will come when taxpayers will arise and place the power of utilities control where it belongs, with the people."

Senator Woodward said that hundreds of telegrams had poured into Austin during the past three days from city and county officials who had never read the measure.

"I cannot understand why officials in smaller towns would oppose a utility bill," he said, "when it affords them protection against unreasonable rates. Most assuredly they have been misled and are not representing the best interests of their citizenship."

Bad Eyes

The importance of providing proper educational facilities for children with defective vision is stressed in a recent statement by Mrs. Winifred Hathaway, associate director of the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, who points out that many a child suffers great injustice in school simply because nobody realizes that he has weak eyes.

"Educators have found," she remarks, "that many children who have been accounted stupid, dull, morose, mentally sub-normal and even criminally displayed excellent intelligence and pleasing dispositions as soon as their defective vision was recognized and they were placed in sight-saving classes. The necessity for some children to take the same work over again, a serious educational waste, is frequently traced to eye difficulties."

Aside from the great host of children whose troubles can be ended by the provision of glasses, Mrs. Hathaway estimates that there are at least 60,000 school children in the nation who need to be educated in special sight-saving classes. At present, she says, there are not enough classes of that kind to accommodate a tenth of the number.

Disregarding Safety

The Department of Commerce requires all men who would get licenses as commercial airplane pilots to take extremely strict medical examinations.

The doctors who give these tests, it seems, have to be constantly on their guard. Scores of men, who know they are not physically qualified, try to hoodwink them and get passing marks that they do not deserve. Few, if any, succeed, yet the doctors have to be exceedingly vigilant.

This represents a rather queer quirk in human nature. The strict physical examination is as much a safeguard for the pilot himself as for anyone else. If a man isn't properly equipped physically he can't fly safely. Yet many men disregard this and try to become pilots anyway. They seem to overlook the fact that by doing so they are simply jeopardizing their own lives.

Revived

You can't keep a good man—or a good nation—down for long. The World War German merchant fleet, once one of the greatest in the world. After the armistice, merchant ships flying the German flag were scarce.

Now, however, the German merchant fleet is four-fifths as large as it was in its prime pre-war days. It had in 1914 a tonnage of 5,200,000; now it has more than 4,000,000 and is growing fast.

Only the British and American merchant fleets surpass it in size; and a writer in the current World Work predicts that Germany's fleet will pass America's in the next few years and press hard on the heels of Britain.

This fact is a high testimonial to German industry and efficiency.

A Sign

Another sign of the times in regard to the future of aviation is found in General Motors' purchase of 40 per cent of the stock of the Fokker airplane concern.

Ford was the first of the big automobile manufacturers to enter the aviation field and the Stout monoplanes he builds are giving service all over the country.

Then Packard followed suit by experimenting with a Diesel engine for airplanes. This engine, it is said, is now about ready for the market. Now General Motors steps in. Obviously, these automobile manufacturers see a tremendous future in that field. They are providing for their participation in it by getting

The plan to finance dormitories for Texas Technological college, introduced in the Texas state senate yesterday by Pink L. Parrish, has all the earmarks of what we need here. It is to be hoped that no monkey wrenches are tossed into the machinery between now and the time when they start laying the first bricks.

Dormitories mean more than "more buildings" on the Tech campus. They mean more than "more room" in which to house students. In the case of Texas Technological college they mean the solution of a problem which has worried college authorities ever since the institution opened its doors. That problem is one of discipline and welfare of students.

When Texas Tech opened its doors in the fall of 1925 there were few people in Lubbock engaged in housing students, who had ever had any dealings with college youngsters before. While conditions have improved since that early day college authorities will admit today that in the housing of students they face one of the most serious problems of administration.

There are certain rules and regulations bearing upon the social life of Tech students, both boys and girls, which can not be enforced without conscientious and intelligent aid on the part of people operating rooming houses for students.

Scatter if you will more than 2,000 young boys and girls from one end of this city to another, and then try to keep track of the things they do. You might do it with a regiment of National Guardsmen, but without the aid of the shock troops it's doubtful if you could cut the caper!

Supplant the present "hit or miss" system of housing Tech students with large, well-run dormitories and you will see a different era of campus life in Lubbock. Then, too, there is the proposition of smaller rents which, in all probabilities, will be available under the dormitory system, attracting larger numbers of students from any angle at which you view it, the proposition of dormitories for Texas Tech—built on a finance plan but eventually reverting to the ownership of the state—is a winner.

Working for the people in first one capacity and then another, he has become almost as much a part of the building—and he's still a poor man.

It seems peculiar that after all these years it should suddenly be discovered that J. T. Robinson—two, by the way, is unknown personally to this writer—has been skulking in the by-ways. WASHINGTON, June 11—Two reasons are commonly given to Washington to explain the Senate's habit of going into executive sessions where the utmost secrecy is supposed to be preserved.

Second, so that a small handful of Democrats, willing to vote for confirmation of a presidential nominee along with the regular Republicans in return for reciprocal favors, may do so without letting their constituents know anything about it.

The first idea is rather frivolous. Of course senators are not supposed to tell what happens in secret session, so a member could theoretically do whatever he liked with impunity, but few senators are so lazy as to want to empty the galleries and look the doors instead of stepping outside for the pleasure of a cigar.

It has worked often for executive sessions and this one comes from the conservatives who want the secrecy of such sessions maintained and who are awfully sore when a newspaperman reveals, as Paul R. Mallon did, the roll call on a nomination. The attacks on Senate secrecy have been so universal and so loud that this may be the first time their viewpoint has been fully explained in print but here it is, given to your correspondent by the extremely conservative Senator Hiram K. Bingham of Connecticut, the tallest man in Congress.

"The general practice in all bodies which try to get the best results is to consider personalities in private," explained Senator Bingham. "Religious, fraternal and business organizations all do this. The largest corporations are run by directors and they always discuss personnel matters in private.

"The truth is that reputation is a delicate plant, and the higher a man gets the easier it is to smear his reputation without the slightest justification. There are many reasons why someone might want to smear a man's reputation when he is nominated for a federal position by a hint of scandal such as can leave a permanent scar. Anyone can throw mud at a public character.

"In the heat of a political campaign some allowance is made for such attacks and they are not so harmful. Also, any really harmful and untruthful attacks can be made the subjects of suits for libel. But the Senate is a deliberative body and the words of senators not only are given great weight, but when uttered on the Senate floor, can not be made a basis for libel action.

"A great many matters come up in executive sessions which newspapermen know about, but refrain from publishing, which might damage a man's character. If I get an anonymous letter concerning a nominee or hear an unconfirmed report concerning his character or qualifications, I can raise the issue in an executive session and have it checked up. But if these sessions were public I would either have to let it go unmentioned or take the chance of wrecking a reputation by repeating something untrue.

"We might have some story of a man involving a man's wife—and there have been several such instances in the last few years. Or

A. C. C. PLANS IMPROVEMENTS

ABILENE, June 10—Construction of a \$50,000 auditorium to seat 2,000 people has been started by Abilene Christian college on the institution's new campus here.

The city is preparing to pave some of the streets in the addition and the local traction company will soon start operating a regular bus service to the college.

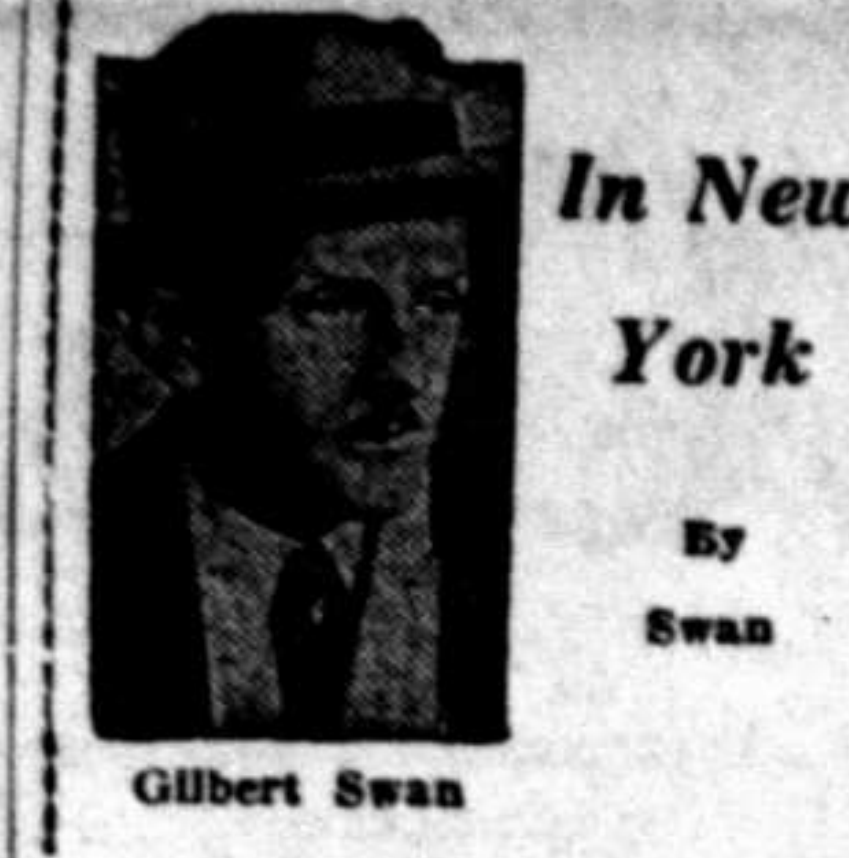

"I don't think there's any doubt that executive sessions provide the best means of getting the best men into office and keeping bad men out with the most fairness both to public interest and to the individual.

Abides by Majority Vote
"Any time a majority of the Senate wants to make public a roll call taken in executive session it will be all right with me. But the decision ought to be made in each particular case.

"Sometimes a senator who has promised a few persons that he would vote for a man's confirmation learns things in executive session which cause him to change his mind. Then he has to make explanations to as why he broke his promise, which may sometimes be impossible.

"In Connecticut, where I had my first legislative experience as lieutenant-governor, the state Senate always votes in secret session on judicial confirmation. Not only that, but they take a secret ballot, and the system has always worked out well."

The word auto-intoxication means self poisoning. Auto-intoxication is a poisoning of the body by its own waste products.

You'll find that charlatans annex all sorts of degrees to their names which are either given by some societies which they themselves have founded, or from very low grade institutions that have no official recognition.

"Can you give me a formula to relieve itching skin? I have an intense itching of my legs, from ankle to knee (nowhere else on my body except sometimes my scalp). There is no breaking out of any kind, no hives or eczema, nothing but the dryness of the skin. At times I can rub off fine particles on account of the dryness. I have tried many greasy formulas, but no relief. When I remove them the itching is so intense it is sickening. MISS L."

Itching, without apparent cause, is known as pruritus. However, there is a cause for any disagreeable sensation in the body, so you should have a physical examination of the skin. Dry skins are most apt to be itchy. I would also try wearing rayon or silk thread stockings. If you do not get any relief, you should see a skin specialist.

For local treatment, do not use greasy applications, but use a glycerine solution—one-fourth glycerine and three-fourths plain or rose water. Three to four drops of carbolio acid to eight ounces of the solution may make it more effective. Use this twice a day and rub it well. This will overcome the dryness of the skin. Dry skins are most apt to be itchy. I would also try wearing rayon or silk thread stockings. If you do not get any relief, you should see a skin specialist.

LAW IS DEALT TO OFFICIALS

SIX CITY OFFICERS IN LEADVILLE, COLO., CONVICTED

(By Associated Press)
DENVER, June 11.—The law dealt penitentiary sentences today to six residents of Leadville, Colo., convicted of a conspiracy to violate the prohibition law.

Federal Judge J. Foster Symes in pronouncing the sentences declared: "You can not snap your fingers at the United States government. Leadville is not bigger than the United States—as you have sought to make it."

Fined \$1,000 Also
With the exception of Police Captain John Yammich, the convicted men each drew \$1,000 fines and two years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth. Yammich was sentenced to a year at Leavenworth.

The court explained that James Brubaker, the convicted man, was shown that he was obeying orders from superior officers.

Those who received the heavier sentences at Leavenworth were City Councilman William H. Corbett, Walter (Hop) Rittmeyer, a former deputy United States marshal, Swan Lindholm, George Burhardt and Joe Fakini. The last four were proprietors or employees of dance halls and soft drink places on Leadville's notorious Harrison avenue.
