NEW YORK, June 19. (AP)—A man said to answer the description of the "Queens slayer" tonight shot and critically wounded Morris Horwitz, 50-year-old insurance broker, near his home in Brooklyn. Horwitz said the gunman stepped into his automobile as he started the motor to drive it to the garage at his home. Ordering him to drive rapidly the intruder sat down beside Horwitz, who believed the order a joke. He started at a moderate speed, and laughed when the man ordered him to go faster. Suddenly the intruder struck him with the butt of his pistol, and Horwitz drove off the gasoline and stopped the car. He was shot in the chest. The gunman leaped from the machine and fled.

Hunt Organized

Plan To Free Chicago Of Gang Murder Laid By New Police Heads

CHICAGO, June 19.—Elaborate plans were completed tonight for clearing Chicago of gang murders as a result of the assassination ten days ago of Jake Lingle, Tribune crime reporter, whose death has as yet been unsolved.

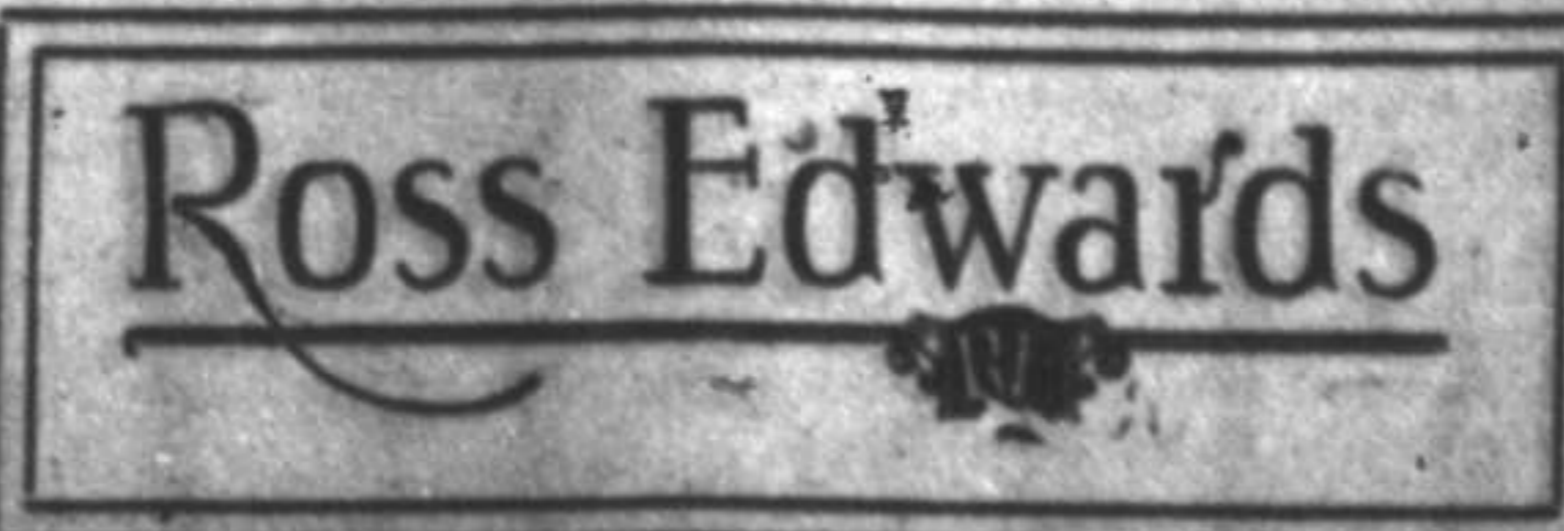

New Tariff Is Protested by French Group

Suppression of Favored Nation Clause Recommended Unless United States Fails to Enforce New Duties

PARIS, June 19 (AP)—The committee on customs of the chamber of deputies in an order adopted today unanimously requested Premier Tardieu to make representations to the United States government against enforcement of the new tariff bill, and, failing to obtain satisfaction, the committee recommends suppression of the most favored nation clause between the United States and France.

PROTESTS TO WHITE HOUSE
WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—All foreign protests against rates in the Smoot-Hawley tariff bill will be forwarded by the state department to the White House and the tariff commission.

The last communication was received by the department and forwarded to congress on June 2. The French government then submitted data relating to rates on imitation pearls, silks and silk stockings.

Department officials said today that while all communications received previous to the enactment of the tariff act had been sent to congress, the law now was in force and protests regarding it no longer would be needed at the capitol but would be turned over to the tariff commission, which will deal with rate changes.

Baby Locked Out By Law Can Now Come To America

CHICAGO, June 19 (AP)—The little baby the law locked out can come to America now, for its mother, after long years has become an American.

Nine years ago Fred Spears, in the navy, found a young woman lying wounded in the streets of Vladivostok, in whose harbor his ship was at anchor. He carried her to a hospital and, weeks later married her.

Marriage Not Valid
But the marriage was without the authority of his superiors. His ship bore him away, and left the bride behind.

In the Philippines, months later, Spears was joined by his wife and there was a new ceremony, but the baby was left in China because the law said it could not be brought into America as it was not American born nor of American parentage.

But today Elizabeth Cosensova Spears had qualified for citizenship papers, and within 90 days their baby—a baby no longer—will be on the way to America.

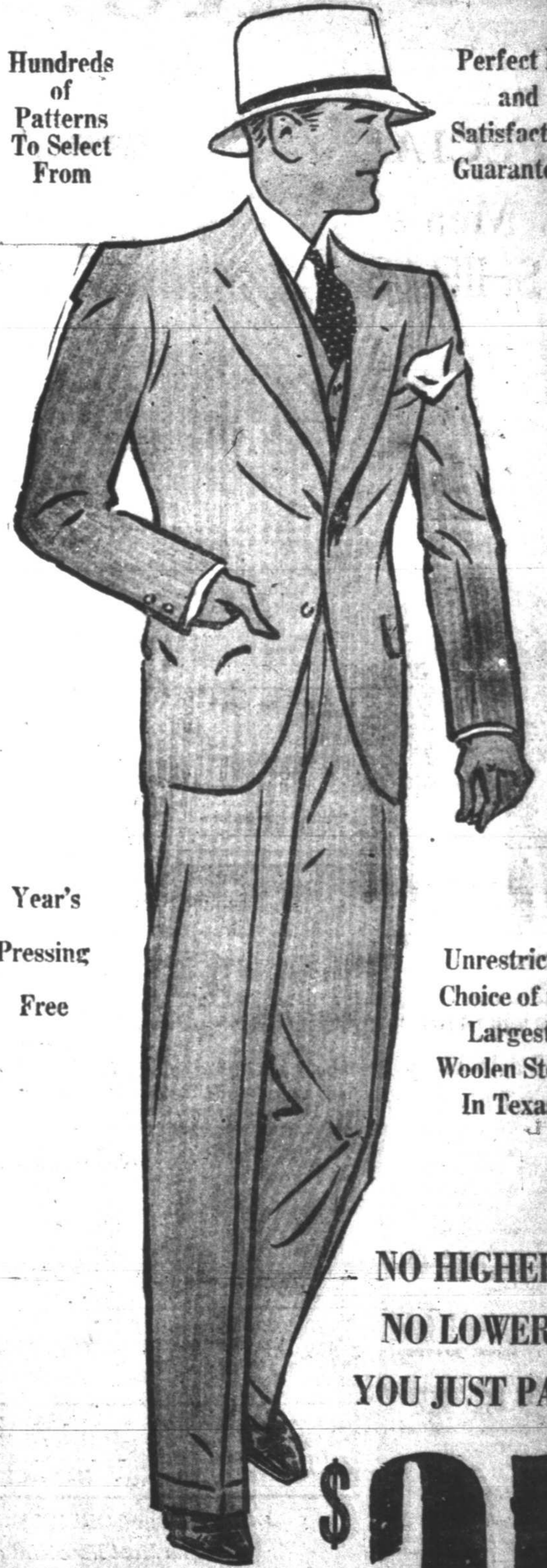

Fire Hazards Are Attacked

Immediate Steps Needed for Rectification on Conditions in State Buildings, Fire Marshal Reports

AUSTIN, June 19. (AP)—Immediate steps should be taken to rectify existing fire hazards in state-owned buildings, J. W. DeWesse, state fire marshal, said in a report on his inspection of eight institutions with the board of control.

The eight buildings inspected were: State Orphan's Home, Corsicana; Rusk State Hospital; North Texas State Hospital, Terrell; Texas Training School for boys, Gatesville; Abilene State Hospital; Wichita Falls State Hospital; Girls' Training School, Gainesville; State Home for Dependent and Neglected Children, Waco.

Condition Flayed
Badly overcrowded conditions were reported at the North Texas State Hospital, the institution designed for a capacity of 1,500 and now having 1,848 inmates. The report also stated there were insufficient fire escapes and that several of the buildings were badly in need of rehabilitation and repair. The report also showed that X-ray films were inadequately protected.

At the Texas Training School for Boys DeWesse reported he had found open buckets of gasoline in the garage; loose hay and shavings; no inside protection in any of the buildings; open wiring and open building in need of additional fire escapes.

A deficiency of hose, nozzles and fire extinguishers was noted at the Abilene State Hospital. Other items condemned at this institution were: Unapproved projection booth; unsafe storage for X-ray films; open wiring; bad drops and extensions; antiquated fuse and switch boards; and unprotected motors.

Storage Bad
Bad storage conditions for X-ray films and unapproved projection booth were noted at the Wichita Falls State Hospital. Other hazardous conditions cited were: Open oil containers; bad wiring through X-ray building; and generally bad wiring; drops at extensions.

Lack of sufficient exits, a deficiency of hose, open wiring in halls and lack of fire hose and extinguishers was noted at the Girls Training School.

Among the items condemned at the State Home for Dependent and Neglected Children were: Insufficient fire extinguishers; non-standard projection booth; bad drops and extensions and the lack of adequate outside protection.
