Rebels Stab J B Pirates 48-6

Five down and one to go was what the Rivercrest Rebels were saying after their victory over the James Bowie Pirates. The Rebels, seeking their third consecutive district championship, are the only undefeated team in district play. However, they face a tough defender, New Diana, next week at the Rebel Stadium. The Rebels boosted their record Friday night by stabbing the Pirates 48-6.

The Pirates surprised the Rebels by putting the ball in the air on their first possession. The Pirates completed their first pass, and went 35 yards to the Rebel 30 until the receiver was stopped by Bubba Edge. The Pirates then operated on the ground, but failed to get yardage and on fourth and four they put the ball up again. This time the Rebels were ready as James Strickland intercepted the Pirate attempt at his own 20 and returned it to the 30 yard line where the Rebs took control for the first time.

On the first play Wade Cline exploded around the right end for a gain of 31 yards. From there Cline, Edge, and Paul Froelich got the ball to the five, and Strickland went through the middle for six points. Froelich's extra point kick was good.

The Pirates again tried to pass their way down field and this time it was Stan Wood who picked off a pass and returned it 25 yards to the James Bowie 35. The offense then drove down to the twelve, but a fumble gave James Bowie possession again. The Rebel defense worked as a unit and forced the Pirates to punt and the offensive team took control at the James Bowie 42 yard line. The next touchdown belonged to Edge who did everything, but score. He consistently edged away from the Pirates on seven carries, and then Cline took the ball across the line from the one. Froelich again connected with the extra point and the Rebels led 14-0.

After the kickoff the Pirates set up on their own 48 yard line and inched their way forward. On third down and ten yards to go James Bowie ran a reverse and went 25 yards for a score. The point after attempt was no good.

The Rebels scored once more before the half as they accepted a Pirate punt on James Bowie's 34 yard line.

A six yard run by Cline followed by runs of nine, 11, and eight yards by Edge gave the Rebels another touchdown. The Rebs tried for the extra two, but failed to convert and took a first half lead of 20-6.

Starting out the third

quarter the Rebels received the ball and set up their offense on their own 38 yard line. The point thriving Rebels pushed the ball down field and Edge scored his second touchdown for the night on a ten yard run and then made the extra point

good.

James Bowie penetrated into Rebel territory, but was forced to punt. The Rebels started their offense from deep in their own territory. They did not stay there long, however, as Cline and Edge, with an occasional run by

Strickland, pushed their way down field. Cline took the honors on a two yard run and then Strickland passed to Scott Ward for the extra points. The third quarter ended and the Rebs leading 36-6.

Coach Groves sent in his second string offense to operate during the remaining quarter. Backs, Terry Fulbright, John Hines, and Billy Stewart, lined up behind quarterback Stan Wood. On their first possession they drove 45 yards for a touchdown, with Fulbright going 30 yards on the point getting carry.

The Rebs scored again on their next possession and all the new backs were credited with yardage. Hines had a 20 yard run to the 15, but a clipping penalty brought the ball back. Rivercrest drove forward, and Wood finding himself on the two yard line scored on a keeper up the center. The Rebs then held the Pirates and took a 48-6 victory.

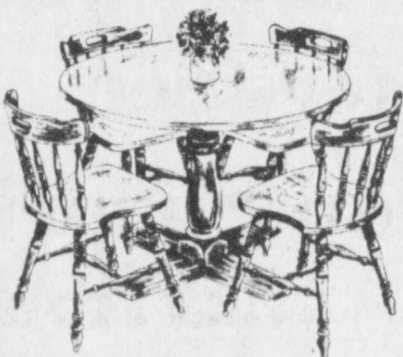

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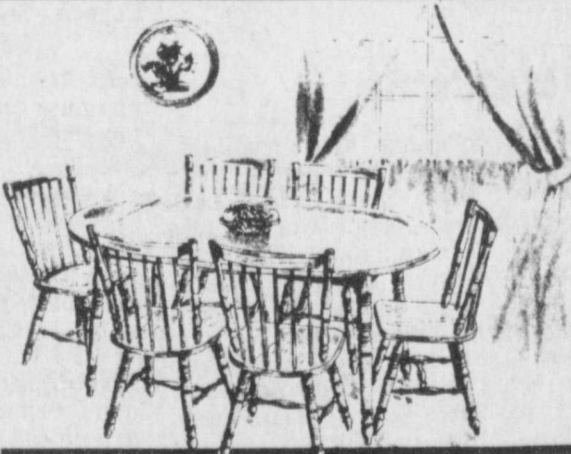

A retail theft seminar covering shoplifting, check fraud and employee theft is planned for Tuesday, Nov. 11, to provide essential information to business owners and salespersons before the holiday season. The seminar will be sponsored by the Lamar County Chamber of Commerce, Paris Junior College's Continuing Education Division and the Small Business Administration.

All interested persons are invited to the event scheduled from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. in the Alford Center for Lifelong Learning on the PJC Campus. No tuition will be charged, said June Jones, director of continuing education at PJC.

Presenting the seminar will be Happy Hilderbrand-Olsen of the Dallas District Office, Small Business Administration; Tom Wells, Lamar County Attorney; Ed Ellis, assistant county attorney; and Charles Whitley, chief of police in Paris.

APPLE JUICE

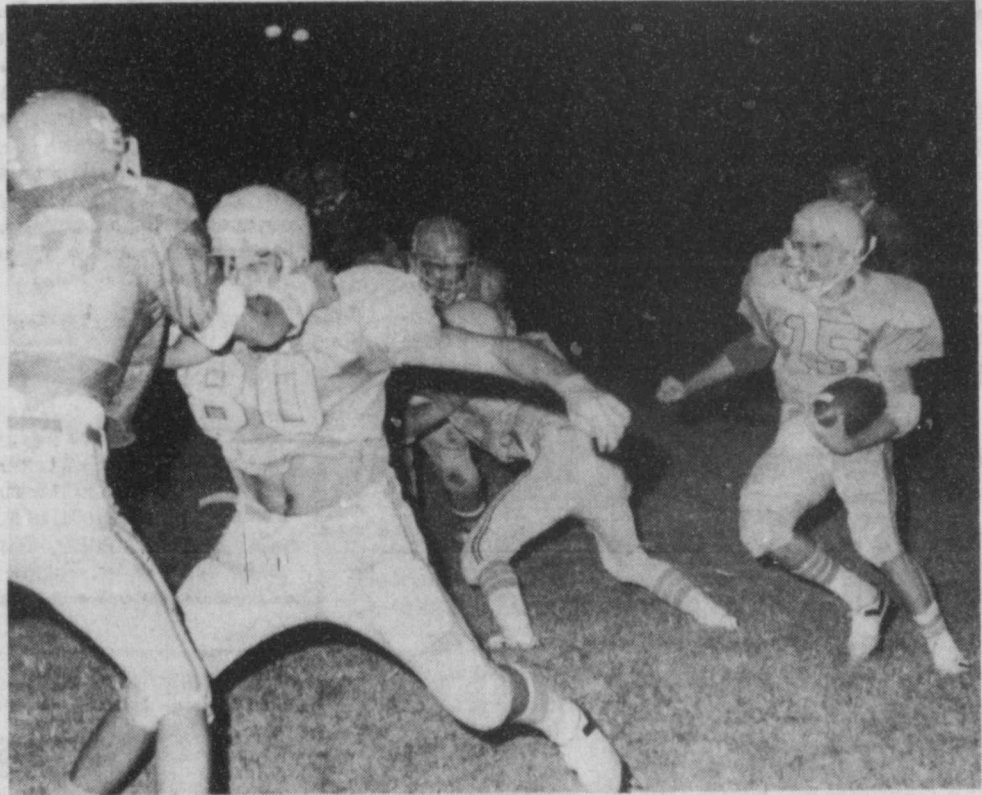
Nearly 42 million gallons of apple juice, made from about 12 million bushels of apples, make their way into American homes each year.

Apple juice is the same product as sweet cider but is often clarified, say specialists with the N.C.A. Extension Service.

Most of the suspended apple solids, which give sweet apple cider its cloudy, opaque appearance, have been removed, and the juice is pasteurized to destroy fermentation and spoilage microorganisms.

It is then hermetically sealed or vacuum packed for preservation.

Unopened, apple juice needs no refrigeration and will keep well for a year or longer. Once opened, it should be refrigerated or it will lose flavor and spoil.

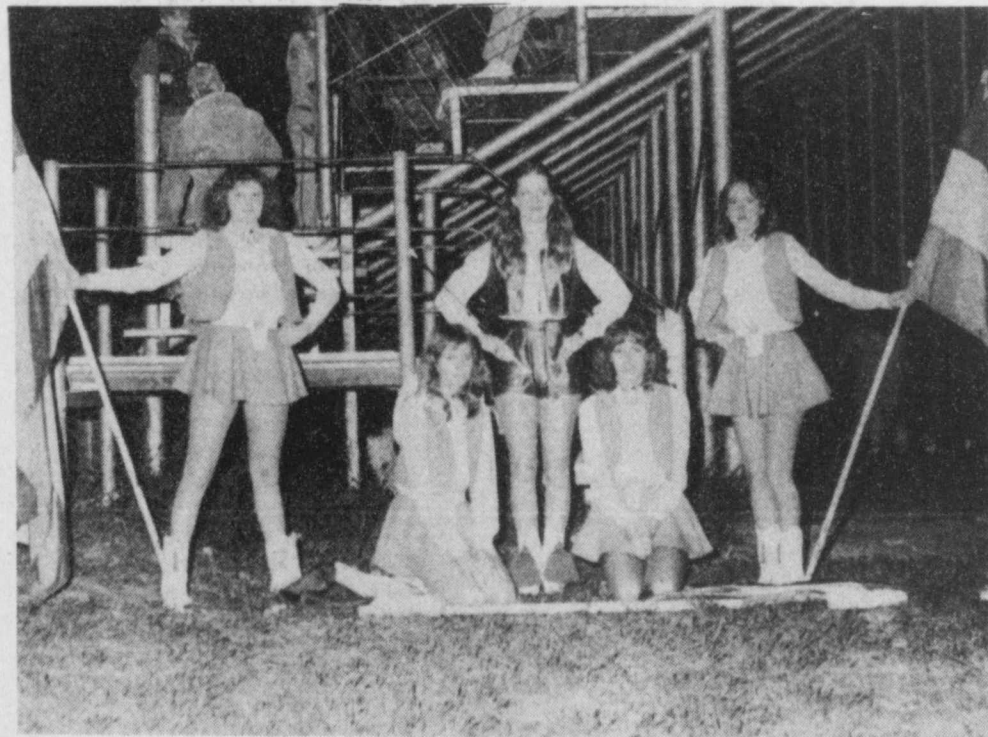

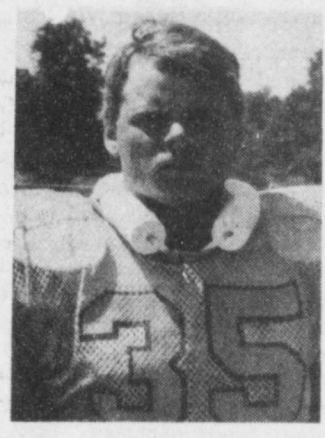

Use Chain Saws Safely

Buzzing sounds of chain saws at work fill the air this time of year—sounds that can signal impending danger.

"A chain saw is one of the most potentially dangerous power tools on the market today," points out Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Individuals using light-weight chain saws for trimming trees, cutting firewood or clearing land should be aware of hazards associated with their use."

Each year some 23,000 persons require hospital emergency room treatment for chain saw injuries, Nelson points out. Two of every three chain saw injuries to operators and bystanders are caused by inadvertent direct contact with the chain saw blade due to a failure to follow recommended operating procedures.

Chain saw accidents occur in many different ways. For instance, an operator may reach across or hold work too near the moving saw. Or he may lose control of the saw through loss of footing, sudden turns, climbing above ground level, shifting of the saw's weight while cutting at or above waist level, or through chain saw "kickback."

"Kickbacks can occur when something touches the top of the saw blade, causing the saw to jump or kick back at the operator," explains Nelson. "Kickbacks may also occur when the chain is misfiled or loose, when a cut is started too slowly, or when the blade nose strikes another object."

In addition, if the bumper at the rear end of the blade is not against the wood being cut, the chain riding across the wood may jerk the saw forward and out of the operator's hands.

According to the engineer, protective equipment is important to safe operation of a chain saw. He suggests protecting the eyes, head, ears, feet and hands from injury by wearing protective eyewear, a bump cap, heavy

shoes and light, non-slip gloves. Ear protectors are also a good investment for prolonged use of a chain saw. "Another key step in chain saw safety is to keep the saw in good working order," emphasizes Nelson. "This includes sharp saw teeth, correct chain tension, proper lubrication and a properly tuned engine."

As a minimum precaution, study and understand the owner's manual before making the first cut, adds the engineer.

Cotton Council

Delegates to the National Cotton Council will convene Jan. 25-27 in Atlanta for the industrywide organization's 43rd annual meeting.

Committees will gather at the Hyatt Regency Jan. 23 to begin reviewing the past year's activities and develop recommendations on Council policies for 1981. These recommendations will be acted on by delegates at the final day of the meeting. Council Board Chairman C. Hoke Leggett, Hobgood, N.C. will preside over the general sessions and President Herman Probst, Anson, Tex. will deliver the keynote address. Several nationally known guest speakers also will appear on the program.

The meeting is expected to draw some 1,800 industry leaders from across the Cotton Belt. Attending will be producers, ginners, warehousemen, cottonseed crushers, merchants, textiles manufacturers, and cooperative representatives.

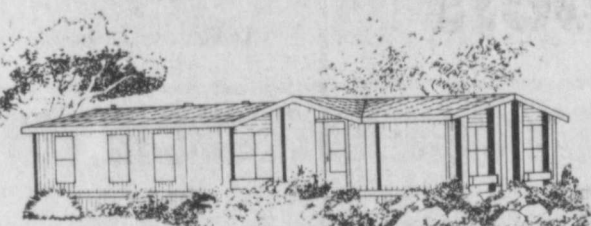
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Bogata Assembly fo God Sponsors Birthdays

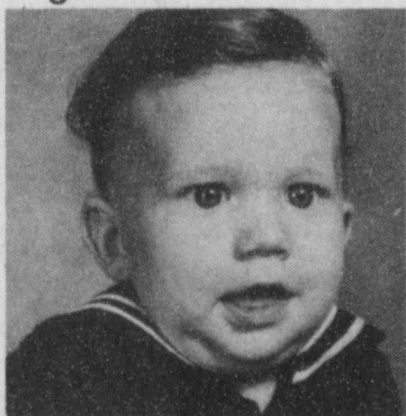

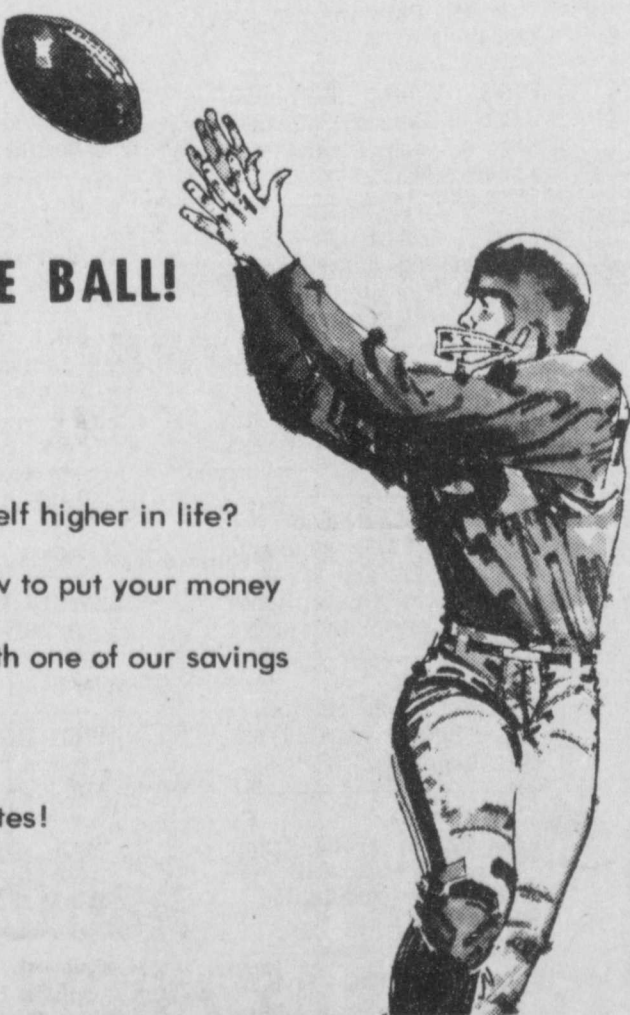
