DeKALB BEARS TAKE FRIDAY GAME FROM TALCO TROJANS

Talco Trojans winning streak of two games was ended Friday night when they lost 12 to 6 to the heavier Class AA DeKalb Bears at Talco stadium on a last minute touchdown by the favored Bears.

The Trojans had won two earlier games and were primed for an upset Friday. They came close to a tie, but couldn't hold DeKalb off in the last minutes.

DeKalb wasted no time getting on the scoreboard. Halfback Connally Atchley took the opening kickoff back 95 yards for a Bear touchdown. Fullback Charles Daniels tried to run the extra points across, down the middle, but was stopped.

From there, the Trojans managed to hold the Bears in check until the fatal final minutes. They allowed only two first down.

Talco squared the score early in the fourth quarter. Quarterback Gerald Morris threw a seven-yard pass to Halfback Jackie Martin for the touchdown that made it 6-6. Morris tried to pass to End Mickey Via for the extra points but the throw was incomplete.

The Bears wouldn't be denied. They started a drive late in the fourth and went to Talco's one-yard line. From here, Quarterback David Wilsford plunged over. He tried to run the extra point and failed but the Bears still had their 12-p margin.

Talco's whole line was outstanding on defense. But for the opening kickoff and the late drive, the Trojans dominated the game.

Light rain fell during portions of the game. The field was muddy from earlier downpours, however.

In the third quarter Fullback Johnny Hood of Talco, returned the kickoff 65 yards to the Bear 16 yard line on a beautiful run. However, Talco lost the ball on a fumble and their chance to score.

In the fourth quarter the Trojans scored on a pass from Quarterback Gerald Morris to Halfback Jackie Martin, good for 7 yards and 6 points. This was set up by a 24-yard pass from Morris to Martin after DeKalb had fumbled.

The frantic Bears battled back and threatening several times, finally scored in the closing minutes of the ball game as DeKalb Quarterback David Wilsford

plunged over from 1 yard out. Again the extra point failed.

With 41 seconds left, the Trojans tried to muster a rally, but DeKalb intercepted a pass and ran the clock out.

The starting lineup for the Trojans was: Ends Mickey Via and Charles Lewis; tackles, Charles Blackburn and Dale Funderburk; guards, Joe Clark and Donald Gipson; center, Wood Sanford; QB Gerald Morris, halfbacks Cecil Loftin and Jackie Martin, and fullback Johnny Hood. Talco had previously beaten Quitman 14-6 and Cooper 44-6. Co-captains for Talco were End Mickey Via and FB Johnny Hood.

Trusty Flees With Red River County Sheriff's Auto

A trusty at Red River County jail flew the coop Wednesday night.

And adding insult to injury, he apparently escaped in an auto belonging to Sheriff Slim Hulen's wife.

Red River authorities identified the escapee as Edward Lee Turner Jr., a Negro male serving a short sentence after pleading guilty to the theft of a pistol. He had been working at the jail as a trusty.

Turner apparently walked away from the jail about 7:30 p. m. Wednesday. A 1950 Ford belonging to the sheriff's wife was in the driveway at the jail, went missing about the same time.

The Negro trusty who fled the Red River County jail in an auto belonging to the sheriff's wife was in more trouble Tuesday.

Twenty-year-old Edwin J. Turner was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Ben Mooring Monday on a charge of violating the Dyer Act.

Officers said Turner drove the car, a 1950 Ford, to Hugo and abandoned it. He was late arrested after returning to Paris.

The whole trouble started with theft of a pistol. Turner pleaded guilty to the charge, and was to have been released the day after the jail break.

CAMPBELL SOUP CO. TAKES OPTIONS ON LAND NORTH PARIS

Mayor Robert McWherter of Paris, Wednesday announced that Campbell Soup Co. of Camden, N. J., has taken option on approximately 500 acres of land at Paris, as a possible site for a future food processing plant.

The acreage is situated north of the city on Loop Highway 286.

The Mayor stated that officials of Campbell Soup Co. were considering the possible purchase and development of this tract as part of a long range planning program. He emphasized if the tract is purchased, it would not necessarily mean that the company had decided to build a plant upon the site.

A definite decision to build might not be made for some time and would depend upon many factors, including the results of further agricultural experimentation; the population growth of the Southwest and general economic conditions.

Campbell's principal products are canned soups, spaghetti, blended vegetable juices, pork and beans, tomato juice and frozen convenience foods. The company markets its products under the well known brand names "Campbell's Franco-American," "V-8," "Swanson," and "TV."

Campbell's principal manufacturing plants in the United States are located at Camden, N. J., Chicago, Ill., Fayetteville, Ark., Modesto, Calif., Napoleon, Ohio, Omaha, Nebr., Sacramento, Calif., Salisbury, Md., and Worthington, Minn. There is also a major manufacturing operation at Toronto Ontario, Canada.

The Mayor also reported that negotiations with Campbell have been going on since January of this year and that the Paris Industrial Foundation, the Chamber of Commerce and employees of the city government have done an outstanding job.

Highway Dep't Repaving FM 71 From US 271 East

State Highway Department has been at work for three weeks, widening FM 71 from US 271 east to Meadows Curve. Grading is completed and most of the road-building foundation material placed on the road.

Both the City of Talco and Arkansas-La. Gas Co. have laid new pipe lines for water and gas, putting them on the sides of the road.

A committee from the Chamber of Commerce called on District Engineer Youngs to try to induce him to pave the full width of the street to the corporate limits, but no soap.

They also asked him to recommend a Business Loop in Talco for maintenance purposes, but it looks like a committee from the CC must go to Austin before the Highway Commission to get action.

Advertising Shifts

Clarksville Times: National advertisers have sharply reduced their spending in newspapers and magazines. Budgets for these categories have been trimmed more drastically than overall outlays. TV appears to have been the chief beneficiary of this shift in emphasis. Weekly publications have sustained a relatively greater loss than dailies. Had all classifications of advertising been curtailed proportionately, country papers would be finding difficulty staying in business. It is encouraging to publishers of weekly papers to be informed that a ten-year study conducted by Cunningham & Walsh, an advertising agency discloses that of all major media newspaper reading alone remains unchanged by the presence of TV in the home. Nothing substitutes adequately for the home-town paper.

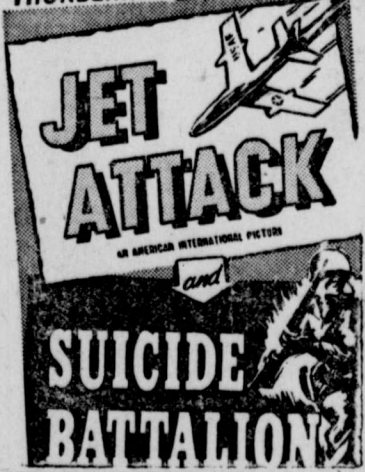

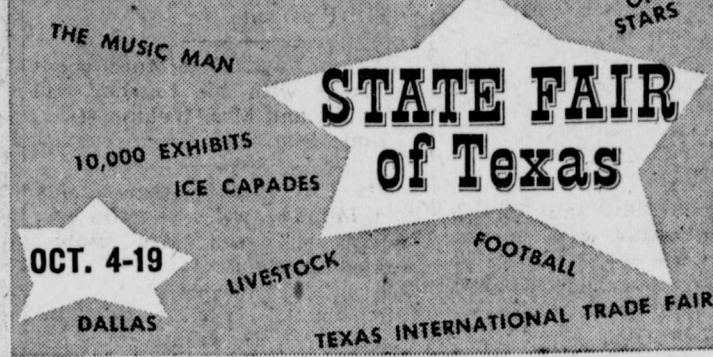
TRAINING UNION HOLDS MEETING

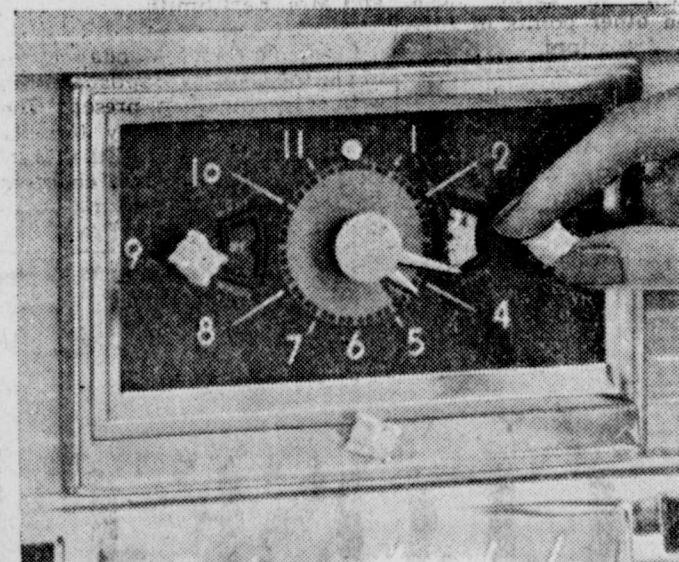

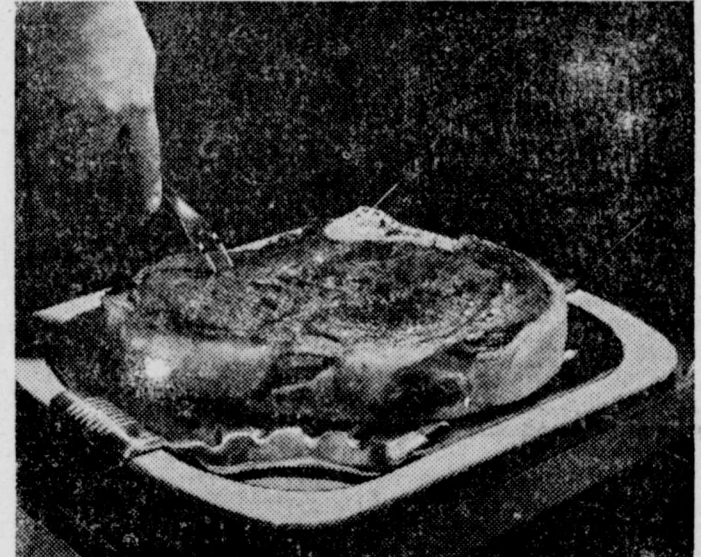

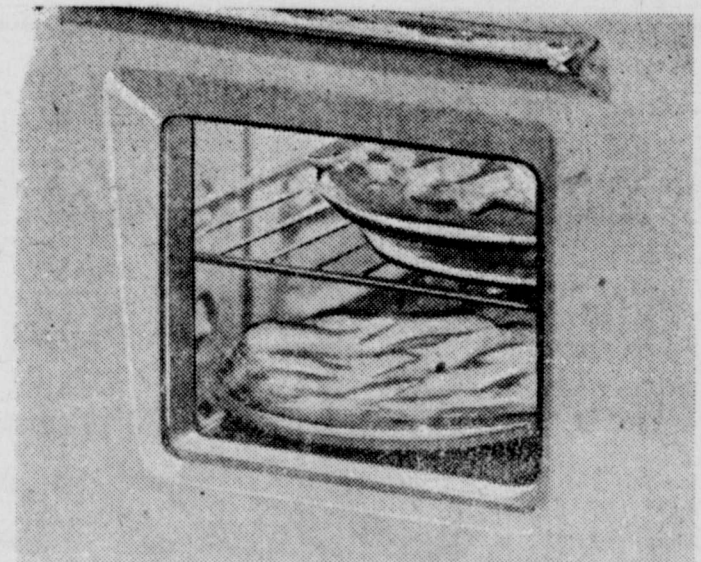

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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

Austin.—Teacher pay raises, an issue that has packed legislative galleries in past years, will probably return next session.

Base pay raises of almost \$600 a year will be recommended to the Legislature by the Hale-Aikin Committee. This group of 24 lawmakers and private citizens has spent almost two years in a massive study of ways to improve Texas' public school program.

Its recommendations, now being readied for final presentation, would, for the most part, involve extra spending running into the millions. Cost of moving up the floor on teacher salaries is estimated at \$70,000,000 a year.

Advocates say better salaries are necessary to attract and hold enough good teachers. But even within the committee there were objections.

Rep. L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi, co-chairman, voted against the raise recommendation. He said this, plus other proposals would mean "about a quarter of a billion dollar tax bill."

Other committee members said they felt the problem was not a shortage of teachers, but unequal distribution. While small districts may have trouble filling facilities, they said, some cities have a surplus.

Many legislators, elected on "economy in government" platforms, can be expected to echo Hale's sentiments. Since a huge state deficit is foreseen without raising the cost of anything, the squeeze could be especially acute.

Teachers, always a potent force because of their number, might be substantially reinforced by the current concern to "catch up with the Russians" in education. A head-on clash between these groups and the economy forces might well provide the flashiest fireworks of the next session.

NO THANKS.—Another Hale-Aikin Committee suggestion: Texas should quit accepting federal money for the school lunch program and vocational education.

Federal funds now received are estimated at \$9,000,000 a year. Committee said local districts and parents should pay for these services.

It did recommend, however, that federal aid be continued to districts where military installations bring in a large non-tax-paying attendance.

Other committee recommendations:

1. State should quit levying property tax, leave this source to local districts.
2. Permanent School Fund should be kept as an endowment, not spent for current needs.
3. Counties, not state, should bear the cost of maintaining county school superintendents' offices.

BRIGHTER WEATHER.—Texas Securities Board reviewed its first year as a separate state agency and declared the "investment climate" had improved under tougher regulation.

Securities Board was set up by the last Legislature by combining functions formerly handled partly by the Secretary of State's office, partly by the Insurance Department.

Texas' investment climate "was very poor" when the new law went into effect, said Board Chairman Maurice Bullock. Score for the "tightening-up" years: (1) a drop of 37 per cent in the number of licensed securities dealers, (2) investigation under way in 215 cases of possible securities law violation and (3) 75 cases referred to district attorneys over the state.

Bullock said the Board's aim was to weed out the wild promotion schemes so as to restore confidence in Texas securities, but not to be so zealous as to discourage legitimate offerings.

LOCAL PARKS URGED.—Several parks now under the administration of the State Parks Board should logically be in the hands of local communities, according to State Auditor C. H. Cavness.

Cavness' audit report on the Parks Board noted that Gonzales State Park had been turned over to the city of Gonzales. Others used on a community basis also could be community operated, he said.

Cavness also noted the addition of six new parks to the state system.

COLLEGE BUILDING ADVANCED.—Twelve state colleges have sold \$12,375,948 in building bonds—after adjusting to "buyers market" difficulties.

Representatives of the schools, meeting in Austin, first offered \$17,500,000 worth of bonds on a 10-year payback basis, but got no offers. Several of the schools already had let contracts for construction, feeling sure the bonds would sell.

Bonds were then re-offered on an 8-year basis and partially sold. Remaining bonds may be offered later.

WATER NEEDS FORECAST.—Demand for Texas surface water is expected to triple in the next 50 years. Prediction is by Harry P. Burleigh, area engineer for the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation.

Where will it all come from? Burleigh says enough water is now being wasted to meet that demand. Problem of saving it is up to engineers to solve. Needed is a simple, low-cost means of capturing run-off water now flowing into the Gulf of Mexico and delivering it to points where it is needed.

Burleigh was one of 10 speakers at a water conference sponsored by Texas A&M College. Gov. Price Daniel praised the recently adopted statewide water program and urged against sliding back into apathy as a result of recent drought-breaking rains.

Revision in the rate structure for city water users was proposed as one means of conservation. Lubbock hydrologist W. L. Broadhurst said that increasing the rate instead of decreasing it as more water is used would cut down household waste.

HIGHWAY WORK AT PEAK.—Two-thirds the way through 1958 the State Highway Department already has placed as much highway construction work under contract as in the entire record-breaking year of 1957.

Total for this year reached \$224,000,000 this month. Low bids opened in a two-day tabulation for this month's proposed projects amounted to \$28,669,432. Department spending on Texas roads in the next three years is expected to reach one billion dollars, Highway Commission Chairman Marshall Formby said.

Normal Growth For Children

Worried because one child in your neighborhood has grown faster than your son or daughter? Here is what editors of Kiplinger Magazine say in their September issue about the normal pattern of growing.

Birth to 1 year—A period of rapid growth in length and weight. Birth weight trebles by the first birthday.

1 to 3—Physical growth slows down some, and appetites tend to lag. Boys attain half their mature height at 2.2 years; girls at 1.7 years.

3 to 5 or 6—Growth becomes slower than at any time between infancy and puberty. Appetites are dull.

5 or 6 to 10 or 11—A period of slow, steady physical gains with a tendency toward underweight. Girls' rate of growth may pick up at 9; boys' at 11. Boys reach

75 per cent of mature height at 8.9 years; girls at 7.2 years.

10 or 11 to 16—A time of very rapid growth. Appetites may be voracious or picky. Boys' rate of growth in height reaches a peak at 14 or 15; girls' at 12 or 13. Peaks in weight gains come six months later. Boys have 90 per cent of their height at 13.7 years, girls at 11.4 years.

16 to early 20's—Growth in height ends between 16 and 20 or 21. Growth in weight should end in early twenties.
